

\$804,000 Suit Filed Against Police Officers Here

A \$804,000 suit against several police officers and the City of Henderson was filed this week by Joseph Paquette of 319 E. Van Wagenen Street. The 23-year-old Paquette

has charged in a federal suit, that Henderson police officers illegally bugged his mail truck using an electronic bugging device to eavesdrop on him beginning

Feb. 2, 1975.

Paquette said Henderson Police Chief Floyd Osborn, Sgt. Walter Zawrotny, Sgt. Howard Avery and Officer Edward Echols were

responsible for the invasion.

The complaint asserted Paquette was threatened and illegally detained at the police station against his will Feb. 7, 1975 and again on May

9 officers entered his home,

arrested him without a warrant and placed him in jail.


Avery was convicted of a gross misdemeanor in District court and given a two-year suspended jail sentence for

conspiracy to commit trespass in connection with the incidents.

The device reported was placed in Paquette's truck in connection with a drug investigation.

Boulder City--The home folks out here are chuckling, sort of kidding on the square at what's happening to Vegas' big gaming industry. The folks are saying -- we told you so -- and are pointing back to 1950 when they gathered in the local theater at a rousing pre-incorporation meeting and stood right there until a "no-gaming ever" clause was inserted in the home rule charter.

They say now that they saw then there would come a day like now when a big hotel and the state gaming authorities would bring disgrace to the whole area by allowing cheating to go on knowingly while they were "investigating" the who-done-its for several months before closing in on the cheaters.

The people here are wishing County Commissioner Bob Broadbent still had his drug store where everyone used to gather to give Bob their curealls and their troubles. Bob was their man who carried the big stick on the Vegas strip.

Bob got to be known as "Straight-arrow" as he fought crimp, crap and corruption.

Now the folks out here wonder if their man Bob will straighten out the mess which the fabulous MGM Grand Hotel got into when their owners allowed perhaps thousands of customers to be fleeced out of their gamblings while they were "investigating" with the state's gaming authority's permission and assistance.

Folks wonder if Bob will carry the big stick, as he did before, in criticizing the gaming commission for knowingly allowing cheating to go on --. They are wondering if Bob can get to Governor Mike on this one. Bob and Mike have always been friendly sort of, because Mike was a school teacher in Henderson while Bob was putting prescriptions together in Boulder. They are in opposite parties but they stand for law and order, they've always said.

Folks here have figured out how if you walk from the public park to the city hall and back over to Pete Tasio's Central Market, then you will be walking the same distance as from the MGM's front door past all its gaming machines to the last crap table and into the poker room --.

They say here that you won't find cheating along that walk in Boulder. In the days way back they figured if they'd want to keep Boulder clean and green it would be better to stay away from businesses the law finds it too tough or too touchy to handle.

Council Approves Pump For Greenway Reservoir

With residents of Mission Hills and the southern end of the city complaining about the lack of water over the week-end the city council Monday night approved an emergency expenditure of over \$1,000 for the installation of a booster pump for the Greenway Reservoir.

City Manager Don Dawson said the money could come from the land fund.

Dawson said the golf course, the part which is fed from the Greenway reservoir, will be watered during the hours between 11 p.m. and 3 a.m. in an effort to conserve water for residents. Some residents said they could not get water

to their coolers on Saturday. Dawson said, "The increased development in sections 19, 27, 29 and 30 and Mission Hills subdivision has placed an unusual demand on the Greenway Reservoir. Installation drawings have been completed by the city engineering department.

Installation will be made with the city forces as quickly as the booster pump arrives." Dawson said it is possible the city may be able to borrow a pump until a new one can arrive.

He said the health, welfare and safety of families presently served is directly affected.

Animal Ordinance Causes Stir Here

An ordinance governing domestic animals has caused a stir among Henderson residents who appeared at the city council meeting Monday night to protest its enforcement.

A.R. Hurd, who said he has lived in Henderson since 1946, presented a petition containing 300 signatures, protesting the ordinance. He said they worked on the petition for only one day and could have obtained many more signatures had they had a longer time.

The ordinance was printed in the Henderson Home News with the admonition that the city would be inspecting yards to determine the number of pets or foul.

City Manager Don Dawson suggested that there are probably about 3,000 chickens within the city, and said there should be no citations issued until a committee of the council meets with local residents at 7 p.m. on Saturday night at city hall.

Councilman Carlton Lawrence asked when the ordinance was enacted and was told it was enacted in 1969.

The city said that many people in section 27 are installing domestic animals such as cows, goats and pigs at their homes.

Official action by the council will be taken following the Saturday night meeting.

Robison Will File For Assembly District 22

Asael I "Ace" Robison, 32, of Moapa Valley announced the plans this week to file as the Republican candidate for Assembly District 22.

Active in community, civic and church affairs, Robison said he believes in local autonomy to give people a more effective voice in government.

"I feel that strong, understanding leadership at the local and state levels is essential in order to influence events and direct the course of our society," Robison said.

"This cannot be done by

representatives who serve special interests and whose actions, though honest, must be scrutinized in terms of those special interests and their influences," Robison said.

Robison is a third generation Nevadan, and graduated from the Moapa Valley Public Schools, and the University of Nevada, Las Vegas. He attended McGeorge School of Law in Sacramento, Ca.

Robison is the son of Dell H. Robison, who served for 25 years as a member of the Clark County School Board.

He is married to the former Anna Marie Hoyt, who taught Home Economics for two years at Boulder City High School. The couple have four children.

Robison is a sales representative for Xerox Corporation in Las Vegas.

They lived in Boulder City while Mrs. Robison was teaching school. Ace's father moved to Moapa in 1909 and his family has lived there since.

One of the issues of the day, Robison believes, is the location of the Community College.

"I think the outlying areas should be served by Community Colleges and this is a logical outlying area. The populations of Boulder City and Henderson amounts to about 25,000 people, all of which are a greater distance from higher education than where the college is proposed in the area of Las Vegas."

Chief Osborn Invites You To Join The Fight Against Burglaries

"Every citizen of Henderson can help in the Burglary Prevention Month campaign to reduce losses due to burglary," Police Chief Osborn said today. Your cooperation is needed to help reduce the surge in burglaries which result each summer when families leave their homes for vacation trips and weekend outings. By learning and practicing a few simple home protection hints, residents can keep their homes from falling victim to a vicious intruder.

BURGLARY PREVENTION MONTH DECLARED

The month of June, 1976 has been declared by Mayor Lorin L. Williams to be "Burglary Prevention Month" in Henderson. During this month, your Police Department will provide information to help you protect your home from burglars.

357 BURGLARIES LAST YEAR

Failure to know and practice the fundamental techniques of home protection was largely responsible for the 357 burglaries committed in our city last year. Although most people didn't intentionally invite intruders to ransack their home, they might as well have hung up a sign saying, "No one's home, burglars welcome!"

A stroll around your neighborhood any day will tell you at a glance who's away; their porches will be cluttered with circulars; an accumulation of milk bottles on the step; an

unkempt lawn; an empty garage with the door open; or a bulging mailbox. All of these are tip-offs that'll broadcast "no one's home" to anyone canvassing the neighborhood.

In the evening, most empty homes can be spotted too - just for the dark houses. It's a known fact light is one of the best deterrents to crime, yet most homeowners go out for an evening and leave their homes completely dark. Or, they'll go off for a weekend or vacation and leave the same light burning day and night. No light at all, or a light burning continuously is a good giveaway "no one is home."

A simple, but effective means of having light in your home every evening, is by connecting a Time-All automatic timing device to one or two lamps. Such a timer will turn a lamp "on" early in the evening, then turn it "off" several hours later. With lights turning on and off during the evening hours it'll give the appearance someone is home and may avert a possible burglary attempt!

CHIEF FLOYD OSBORN LISTS PRECAUTIONS FOR HOMEOWNERS

Chief Floyd Osborn went on to say that most burglars pick the easiest targets they can find. They want to get in, get the loot and get away as quickly as possible. Therefore, if you put several obstacles in his way, he is less likely to try to break into your home, but will seek "easy pickin's" elsewhere. By observing these few simple pre-

cautionary steps, you can reduce the possibility of a burglar selecting YOUR dwelling as his target next time you're away.

1. Close and lock all doors, including porch, basement and garage. Use pin-tumbler cylinder locks on outside entrances and safety latches on the windows.
2. Connect a lamp to a Time-All automatic timer to turn lights in the home on and off each evening. Since noise is a deterrent connect radio or TV to a timer.
3. Protect all doors and windows with an inexpensive, portable burglary alarm which sounds whenever someone attempts to break in.
4. Light up your porch and yard with outdoor lights to increase the likelihood that an attempted burglary would be seen. These lights can also be timer - controlled, if desired.
5. Be sure all screens are fastened from the inside.
6. Never leave all valuables lying around; keep them in a safety deposit box, and if you're leaving for a weekend or longer, Chief Osborn also suggests:
7. Notify your police department when you'll be leaving and how long you expect to be away.
8. Cancel all deliveries, such as the milk, laundry, cleaning, etc. Also, be sure to discontinue the newspaper or arrange to have it sent to your

vacation address.

9. Have a neighbor, or your post office, hold all mail until your return.

10. Arrange with a friend to mow the lawn and sweep your sidewalk once a week. Also ask him if he'll pick up any circulars or handbills that may be left on your porch.

11. Leave your shades and blinds as you normally do; closed blinds keep the sun out, but also make an effective screen for the burglar.

12. Never advertise your departure with an item in the local paper. Give the story about your vacation to the newspapers after you've returned.

There is no such thing as a "burglar proof" home, said Chief Osborn. But, he went on to say, following the suggestions listed above will help to protect your home whenever you're away.


for months so as to snare the cheaters.



From Ugly Rocks To Beauty

God forgot to put any beauty in it. But spend a little time with a local Henderson man, and you begin to get the yearning to grab a big lunch, fill your gas tank and head for the mountains.

And once you've met Dale Bracken, it's unlikely you'll forget him, the desert, or the beautiful jewelry he and his brothers make in their spare time. And jewelry isn't the only interest they have in the production of unusual items.

Dale himself strikes one as just a big country-western man with a big friendly smile and a beard that lets your imagination think of an old prospector of years gone by. His huge hands, one of them usually holding a can of his favorite beer, don't appear to be the hands needed to do small delicate work required in the making of jewelry. But as one looks at the collection of items he has, you'll read-

ily notice large hands hinder him non at all.

I forgot to ask him, but as you sit looking at the collection of beautiful polished stones, and as he names off the type of rock it's made from, you get the general idea he is really a geologist. I don't think he is but he might be, because his knowledge of rocks and where they can be found is tremendous.

And me, the names of many of those stones are lost to my memory except for a couple most of us would recognize. Agate and turquoise. But don't ask me to list the rest of them.

There's a lot of work, skill and just plain know how in being able to take a dirty, irregular stone that most of us would think worthless.

First, there's the select of the stone. Then comes the splitting, general shaping and the polishing. Thankfully, the polishing, in most cases can

be done in a small tumbler, using a fine, powdery grit and after perhaps hours in the tumbler out pops a beautiful stone.

And sometimes, after all this work, there can be disappointment, a stone may not have the beauty it needs to make an attractive piece of jewelry.

Then comes more work, the filing or grinding of one side to make a pendant, for necklaces, earrings or rings. Many times the stone can be used just as it comes out of the tumbler to make many varied types of jewelry.

Half the battle is won after the polishing but now comes the selection of the proper type of setting, the right kind of chain, the selection of just the right size of braided nylon cord and in the case of earrings, whether to make them for pierced ears or to make to clip on type.

In some cases, some silver items must be hand shaped or cast. But in most cases, the mounting is bought and ready to receive the stone, but still there are times a mounting must be changed or re-shaped to accept a particular stone.

Then comes the task of putting the small clasp or pin on the back to hold it to your tie or a woman's blouse. This requires a delicate task known as silver-soldering.

When I think of all the work required to make these works of art, I really wonder how he can sell them at such reasonable prices. But sometimes a man's pride in his skill is worth more to him than money.

Another admirable quality about this whole situation, is Dale's brother was injured in an accident sometime ago and is partially unable to use his left arm and leg. He has almost completely mastered the art of making jewelry and finds there are still only a few things he is unable to do. But lots of faith in himself indicates he'll soon master those few objections.

Dale's brother has a collection of old antique bottles, one of the best collections I've ever seen. Unique in this collection, and probably only old-time residents of Henderson can remember, is six perfect, old Pepsi-Cola bottles, with the Henderson, Nevada stamp on them. Who remembers when Henderson had a Pepsi-Cola plant?

This brings us to

another of Dale's and brothers qualities.

They look for old and sometimes, antique bottles that have a broken top or neck, use a cutting technique, clean and polish the old bottle add a stem or setting to the bottom and Presto, you've just bought a glass you can use for drinking purposes or with its history, a beautiful conversation piece for your what-not shelf or mantle.

Dale also holds a full time job at TIMET, so one wonders how he can muster the time for extra work at home.

So here's this week's salute to brothers who contribute a lot to the prosperity of Henderson.



Troops L and K, 163D, Armored Cavalry of Henderson has been in its new location since 1971. Its history goes back to 1928 when it helped provide coastal artillery defense for the nation. Between 1948 and 1967, including a call to duty during World War II, it provided air defense. In 1967, it switched to

sachusetts militia, making a proud tradition of 340 years. It is a state-organized Army unit, composed of citizens who undergo a minimum of forty-eight hours of drill and two weeks of active training a year in addition to the initial training of 4-6 months. Regular Army officers serve as instructors and inspectors.

Training includes drills once a month with the unit and fifteen days training every two years at Gowen Field in Idaho, with every third year spent at Fort Bliss in Texas. There are 626 personnel in Southern Nevada, with Henderson's Armory having at least forty per cent Henderson and Boulder City

residents. According to Staff Sergeant David Nettelbeck, this figure is "a little short at the moment."

We have spots open in the infantry, mortar and mortar maintenance."

Nevada gives special benefits of four days of Army pay for two days worth of work. It pays half the tuition at both universities and at the community colleges. It is one of a half a dozen states which offers special license plates for Guard members.

The National Guard is subject to the call of the governor except when ordered into action by the president of the

United States. It has a two fold mission of providing trained and ready forces to augment the Army in case of emergencies, thus making up to forty per cent of the Army's manpower and to provide trained manpower for use by the governor in case of emergencies.

Locally, the Guard has helped the Civil Defense with flash flood emergencies. During the Nelson Landing tragedy, the Guard had fifty personnel on duty providing security. Last fall, the Guard was called out to combat the forest fires that raged around Mt. Charleston.

The Guard also works with the Environmental Protection Agency to check local water pollution. Sergeant Nettelbeck has gone out and "checked quite a few samples" of Lake Mead, the Colorado and Virgin Rivers.

Until a 1903 act of Congress, each state formed, maintained and controlled its own militia, with the federal government having control only in time of emergency. After 1903, the federal government set up standards and controls.


One of the standards is the role of the female in the National Guard. It has spots for females

only as medics. At this point in time, it can't


assign them to Class One (combat) units under orders of the Pentagon.

Community relations include cooperation with its members primary employers "as much as possible," community service projects like the clean up of Vegas Wash, which according to Nettelbeck, "was a real dump before we cleaned it up."

The National Guard is at the community's assistance. Nettelbeck extended the invitation: "if anybody is interested, give us a call here."

105 Arrests Made During Month Of April

There were 105 arrests in Henderson during April on 124 charges according to Chief of Police Floyd Osborn in a monthly report.

The bulk of the arrests were bench warrants numbering 41, with 32 arrests for driving under the influence of alcohol being the second largest group.

Felony arrests included six for narcotics, two assault with a deadly weapon, two forgery, and one embezzlement. There were four arrests for murder in the Downer murder case from January

in which the juveniles have been reclassified as adults.

Other arrests included six for disorderly conduct and four battery arrests.

There were 42 traffic accidents including five injuries and zero fatalities. Two hundred and forty-two traffic citations were issued, 191 of them adults citations, 25 juvenile, and 26 parking citations.

Juveniles apprehended numbered 37, 17 booked at the Juvenile Department, and 17 citations issued. There were nine runaways four curfew violation. 3

larceny, four narcotics, three battery, three receiving stolen property, two assault with a deadly weapon, two cases of vandalism, four others, and three warned and released to their parents.

There were 310 meals served to prisoners in the jail costing a total of \$186.41 at 21 cents per meal. Court revenue came to a total of \$13,918, \$7,398 collected in citations, \$6,385 from arrests, and \$135 from parking tickets.

Twenty-five burglaries were reported with a total loss of \$5,686. 20 cases of Grand larceny totaling \$5,168, 32 cases of Petit larceny coming to \$991, and Grand theft auto with \$340. There were no robberies reported for the month of April.

The Cessna twin-boom plane carried the wing identification N1731M, and was valued at \$75,000.





Learning Center Dedication Set

The New Horizons Center for Learning announced plans for the dedication of the building which officially opened as Nevada's first full-time facility for children with learning disabilities in January of this year. Ceremonies will begin Friday, May 21st, at 11 a.m.

Officiating will be master of ceremonies, Kenneth Gragson with special guests to include Mrs. James Santini who will make a special presentation in behalf of husband, Congressman James Santini, Monsignor Carmody, and Lt. The Center, which is a non-profit non-sectarian school, has a current enrollment of 10 full-time students at the Junior High level. In addition to the day school it services an average of 35 youngsters in supportive after-school programs to remediate their learning disability handicaps. Additional services include diagnostic prescriptive work and parent education programs.

During the past year the organization has been active in the community in a number of projects to bring to the attention of the public the plight of the learning disabled child. Included have been exhibits at the various fairs and the Boulevard Mall, seminars and the recent visit of noted pediatrician, Dr. Sidney J. Adler of California. In addition to public education programs, the organization has been involved in a series of fund raising activities to enable the opening and financing of

the center. Parents and teachers and members of the business community have actively supported Circus Circus carousel rides, sale of fund raising tickets, giant coloring books and

subscriptions to Nevada Magazine. Of particular note was the Celebrity Softball game held last October. The students at New Horizons have organized their own

bake sale and car wash to aid in supporting the Center. The project has attracted wide support in the community with the Uptown Kiwanis tak-

ing learning disabilities as their project.

More recently, New Horizons was the beneficiary of the Jr. Mesquite Club's annual fund raising event which was highly successful in that over \$5,000 was realized. Individual contributions and those of organizations such as the Animal Hospital Association of Las Vegas, have all gone to make the survival of the Center possible.

The evening of the dedication will be an Awards Banquet beginning with cocktails at 6:30 P.M. at the Las Vegas Jockey Club. Dr. Mark G. Beals, professor in department of special education at UNLV will deliver the Newell C.

Kephart Memorial Address as the keynote message. The recipient of the Outstanding Nevada Award is Sister M. Jean Clare Little well known for her service to youth in public and parochial schools and dedication to the founding of the Center. Serving as honorary chairmen of the evening Awards Banquet are Governor Mike O'Callaghan who will be represented by Special Assistant Harriet Trudell, Bishop MacFarland of the Diocese of Reno, Mayor William Briare and Oran K. Gragson a long time friend of Sr. Jean Clare Little.





Santini Calls For Hearing On Utility Rates

The dramatic utility rate increases hitting consumers throughout Nevada have prompted Rep. Jim Santini to request Congressional field hearings to investigate the reasons and impact.

In a letter to Rep. John Moss, D - Calif., chairman of the House Subcommittee on Oversight and Investigations, Santini said, "I'd like to get first-hand information concerning the price squeeze situation and determine if positive steps can be taken on the federal level to improve the regulatory process."

"The consumer is often caught in the middle, having little or no input into the regulatory decisions, and suffering the consequences."

Santini said the hearings could provide a setting for the power companies -- including Nevada Power in Las Vegas and Sierra Pacific Power in Reno -- to explain the economics behind the rate increases and the provi-

sions of rate structures. "The hearing would also allow the consumers a chance to voice their opinion on a matter that so directly affects their lives on a daily basis," Santini, a member of the Subcommittee added.

The Subcommittee, part of the Commerce Committee, has been active this session in energy matters. Moss said he is reviewing the Santini request.



Rural Areas Report

Nevada ranchers have received nothing but lip service from the federal government in regard to the serious problem facing them. The Congress intended that the local ranchers and stockmen be both considered and involved in the decisions which affect grazing on public lands and the livestock industry, but the overwhelming amount of evidence shows they get much talk and little action from the powers in Washington.

I therefore, have put together a plan to start the pendulum on its backward swing, not to a point where we begin

again, but to a point where all benefit. The ranchers and the livestock industry, the environmentalists, the miners and sportsmen, and the citizens of Nevada and our country.

This three-pronged plan of action include:

Step One -- Introduction of a bill requiring that all fees generated from public lands be turned back for range improvement, except fees specifically designated for return to states and Indian tribes. A portion now goes into the federal general funds.

Step Two -- Co-sponsorship of Senator Hansen's

bill to create a statutory formula on grazing fees that would take into account the cost of production, price of beef and other market conditions.

Step Three -- Introduction of an amendment that would require the BLM to enter into a 5-year agreement with individual permittees of grazing lands. This measure has just passed the Senate and is awaiting House action.

Under Step One, a moratorium would be placed on grazing fees at the current level and lands could not be closed until the

economic impact statements were concluded and taken into consideration as part of the overall picture.

Grazing fees estimated to be collected in fiscal year 1976 total \$16.6 million. Estimated fees for fiscal year 1977 total \$20.5 million. Under law, a revenue sharing plan for use at home, and the ranchers and their families receive direct benefits from those funds. A percentage of the fees are but the remaining monies go into the federal general fund. It seems to me that all would profit better if that portion which goes into the general fund were put back into the land.

Step Two was introduced because a new statutory formula is the most equitable way of handling a risk-involved situation. Under the bill, the BLM annually would determine the amount of usage on grazing lands.

The 5 year agreement plan was introduced because ranchers have spend millions of dollars of their own money since the passage of the Taylor Grazing Act in 1934 on improving public lands. But under current rules, the investments could be considered risky. The B.L.M. can pull grazing permits.

Under my amendment, the BLM would determine the amount of AUMs available during a given year on a section of grazing land, depending on the quality of the land at the time. In addition, if for any reason the grazing rights were terminated, the ranchers would be reimbursed for their personal expenditures, less any amount already amortized. I firmly believe such a guarantee will spur more ranchers to invest

their own money to improve grazing lands, and in the long run everyone will reap the harvest.

I have also suggested to the Presidents of both the American and the Nevada Cattlemen's Associations the possibility of a court suite to help bring the entire problem of the environmentalist - rancher disputes into perspective.

The B.L.M. currently is acting under a court order to perform environmental impact statements. The court decision was not appealed. Such a suit brought by ranchers might force the issue into a higher court where all sides in this issue would be taken into consideration.

The world and national food demands dictate that food produc-

tion on the public lands be increased and that grazing be recognized as one of the highest and best uses of the public lands



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

Dr. Mark G. Beals, Professor at UNLV Department of Special Education, will deliver the keynote address at the upcoming New Horizons first annual Awards Banquet at the Las Vegas Jockey Club, Friday, May 21st. The event will benefit children with learning disabilities.

A graduate of Lycoming College in 1956 Dr. Beals received his Masters Degree at the University of Hawaii in 1958 and Doctorate at University of Arizona. In addition to his classroom responsibilities at UNLV he is in charge of the Generalist Program and Student Teaching at the University. He has also served as consultant to a number of school districts and is currently consultant to the Bullhead, Arizona School District and the Diocesan Schools of Southern Nevada.

Beals is well known in the field of Special Education having an extensive background in the areas of mental retardation and exceptional children. Much in demand as a speaker, Dr. Beals has presented a wide range of papers before professional societies throughout the United States since 1966. In 1973 he presented "The Mojave Project; a Model LD Program" at the International Association for Children with Learning Disabilities conference in Detroit, Michigan.

Eight years ago, while serving as professor at Northern Arizona University, Dr. Beals met Dr. Newell C. Kephart, one of the world's ten leading experts in the field of learning disabilities. This meeting sparked his interest in the field of children with learning disabilities which had up to then been concentrated in the areas of mental retardation and child psychology. He was instrumental in obtaining the services of Dr. Kephart as an Adjunct Professor at UNLV.

Upon initiation of the learning disabilities program at the University, Dr. John VanVactor, who had worked with Kephart at Purdue University, was added to the UNLV staff. VanVactor is currently serving as consultant to the Clark County School District.


It is largely through Beals' cooperation and expertise that the New Horizons Center for Learning was founded. The organization has been active in Clark County for the past four years. Much of its philosophy is based on Dr. Beals' implementation of Kephart's theories of the "total Child" concepts into practice at the Mohave Valley Project in Arizona in the late sixties. In tribute to Dr. Kephart, Dr. Beals has titled the keynote message for the New Horizons Awards Banquet the "Newell C. Kephart Memorial Address." Mr. Martha Kephart, widow of the educator who died in 1973, will be the honored guest at the banquet.

Special presentations of the evening will include the Outstanding Nevada Award to Sister M. Jean Clare Little for her services to youth and efforts in establishing the Center, Nevada's first full time facility for children with learning disabilities. Other awards will include the Newell C. Vo-Tech Offers Outstanding Carpentry Class

Southern Nevada Vocational - Technical Center has many worthwhile programs open to high school students and adults. Among these, one of the finest is the school's Carpentry class, taught by LaRel Stephensen and Mr. Robert Graf.

The program was initiated at Vo - Tech in 1967, the school's second year. The class is taught in 3 phases: Exploratory - which gives the student an overall view of the vocation; Basic Carpentry, and Advanced housebuilding; in which students actually construct full - size homes.

After completion of the curriculum the boys are administered the Apprenticeship Entrance Examination for the Carpentry Union. One senior student this year, Mike Thompson, scored 100 per cent on the test.

Mike, along with others in the Capentry Department, is a member of the Vocational - Industrial Clubs of America (VICA). Members of the club recently attended the Nevada State Carpentry Convention, the Southern Nevada Youth Fair and the Tri - State Vocational - Education Day.

At the State Convention held April 29 - 30, four students took awards; Mike Thompson, first place in Framing; Rick Beauchamp, first place in Millwork; Henry Corella, Third place in Millwork; and Dean Blazek third place in House Wiring.

The trip to Hawthorne, Nevada, where the con-

ference was held, was financed entirely by the club through the sale of hardwood cutting boards. The boards were sold at school to teachers and students, and at the Southern Nevada Youth Fair.

Mike Thompson and Rick Beauchamp will now represent Nevada at the U.S. Skill Olympics in Miami, Florida. They will compete in skill contests against other first place winners from all 50 states. The tests consist of two parts - written and performance skills.

At the Tri - State Competition held in Cedar City Utah, VICA members entered their personal projects against students from Arizona,

Utah and Nevada. The Sweepstakes Award in Advanced Woodwork was won by Mike Thompson with a walnut hutch he built for his mother.

Mike, who is Vo - Tech's Valedictorian this year with a 3.70 average, also won the Grand Champion Prize at the Southern Nevada Youth Fair.

At the Youth Fair, Mike, in jest, put a \$3000 price tag on his hutch. To his surprise, two people were ready to pay that price. He declined the offer however, because the work he put into it and the final result meant more to him than money ever could.

Another student, Henry Corella, received

the Grand Champion Award at the Youth Fair. His hutch, like Mike's was designed by him from scratch.

Henry is a deaf student at Vo - Tech and works in the Carpentry Department in association with Mrs. Martha Wright, the deaf student instructor. Henry will enroll in Carpentry an extra year so that he may enter the Apprenticeship Program with his brother.

The Carpentry Program at SNVTC usually places about 75 per cent of the students in jobs. The department is proud in the fact that these prospective employees are very well prepared to work in their field.

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

You'd think we'd all be up to our ears in ball points ... but of course it isn't so. As a matter of fact, the production facility is now on a two shift operation trying to catch up to the nationwide needs for their quality product.

During our early visits to Boulder City's newest industry, we became entranced by all the intricate machining, etc., that goes into the manufacturing of ball point pens. With the cooperation of President Paul Fisher and Vice President Chuck Woodworth, we were given a grand tour of the operation and the many operations that go into the manufacture

of the seemingly simple item were explained to us.

It boggled our minds ... and we'd like to share some of the clean, quiet operation with you.

Get The Point?

Our first trip was through the point assembly building. It is here that raw materials are almost miraculously converted into highly precisioned point assemblies.

The operation begins with two types of "raw stock" used to make the machine blanks that will hold the point. Brass and stainless steel blanks are produced here, each in a separate machine fed by a long ribbon of the appropriate metal.

The brass machine was chugging away at the faster clip and Chuck explained that the brass is easier to work with

and that the machine stamps .. or cold heads .. the tiny pieces of brass into their desired shape after they are automatically chopped from the brass ribbon entering the machine.

The stainless steel operation is slower as the tiny steel slug must be machined to its desired shape.

The Merry - Go - Round

The blanks are fed into one of five Swiss automated point assembly machines. Three of the machines assemble the brass points; the other two are geared for stainless steel operation.

The blanks and ball points (manufactured elsewhere) are fed into hoppers which in turn feed them onto a rotating turntable for assembly operations. What a sight to see as the stations on

the turntable lower themselves in unison to perform one operation, then lift while the turntable is rotated by one station ... moving the parts along to the next station. There's precious little time lost as the merry-go-round works without rest. The brass machines turn out about 70 completed ball points each minute; the steel points produced per minute number about 54.

The theory and basic design of the intricate ball point machinery was invented by Paul Fisher, although a Swiss firm later filed patents on their modified designs.

Torture Tests

As each batch of 1,000 points rolls out of the point assembly machine, they are grouped and taken to a special testing machine where sample

points undergo a variety of torture tests. Hooked into a cartridge, they are first scribbled (to remove excess oil) followed by a handwriting test in which specific words and designs are written. Each is chosen to point up a specific weakness in the point assembly.

But they're not done yet. Each cartridge is weighed and then placed on an automatic writing machine that writes for exactly 100 feet. The car-

tridge is again weighed to determine how much ink was used. Each point (fine, medium or bold) and each color and type of cartridge has its own criteria for acceptance as a Fisher point.

Still more to come. Selected points and cartridges are subjected to a four mile test where they write for 20,000 feet. Their writings are analyzed for continuity, clarity, etc., and of course the fact that they

survive at all to complete the grueling test. Only then are the point assemblies certified as being O.K.

This is but one part of the entire operation ... but as Chuck Woodworth describes it ... It's the very heart of the whole thing.

In a later article, we'll look at the cartridge assembly and the design section of Boulder City's newest industry ... Fisher Pen Co.

On May 7, Rally and Nadine will return to Ariz. and in July they will each return to their own countries.

The students at B.C.H.S. want to wish them good luck and a pleasant stay while visiting America.

Ed Harvey, NEWS Circulation Manager, interviewed Rally on his reactions to the United States. His interview is run below:

Q. When did you come to America?

A. I came in America last July, 1975.

Q. Where all have you been in America?

A. I've been in Grand Canyon in Arizona, at the Hopi-Navajo Reservation, Canyon de Chelly, Petrified Forest, Painted Desert, and so many other places in Arizona.

Q. When will you return to the Philippines?

A. I'll be going back to the Philippines on the fifteenth of July. I'll be leaving Arizona on the fifth of July for the bus trip to Washington D.C. and from there back to the Philippines.

Q. What do you like most about America?

A. I like most everything in America, most especially my host family in Morenci, Arizona, and of course all the people who are living here in this country.

Q. What do you like least about America?

A. What I don't like is the weather here, sometimes it got so hot and sometimes it got so cold you couldn't grow anything because of it.

Q. What have you most enjoyed doing while you have been here?

A. I enjoy talking to people about my home country and of course about myself and I think almost everything I do.

Q. Would you recommend America as a place to live to your friends?

A. I surely would recommend America as the number one place to live where in almost everything is here compared to where I live, what I mean is that the civilization is more advanced and America has more facilities.

Q. Would you like to live in America?

A. I sure like to live in America, right now I don't like to go back to where I live, but I'm obliged to go back and can't come back here after two years.

Q. What will you do when you return to the Philippines?

A. I don't know yet what I'll be doing when I go back home. I don't know yet if this year will count for my education or not so I really couldn't tell. If this year will count I might go to college, but if not I think I'll be helping my brother in the field as well.

Q. Are the people here the same or different compared to the people in your country?

A. The people here are the same compared to the people in the Philippines, I mean the same in customs and everything except the people there are a brown race and only few could speak accurate English because we're not English speaking people anyway, we have our own language and there are around 85-90 different dialects there.

Q. What is the government like in the Philippines?

A. The government in the Philippines is the same as what you have here which is democratic form before, but now it is

There are times when a very unusual or really striking picture can be made by shooting obliquely toward the morning or afternoon sun. Such backlighting can create a lacy effect by outlining leaves and foliage with light. A girl's hair can be extra beautiful when backlight from a setting sun creates a halo of gold. To get the details in the shadows, you'll have to use about four times the exposure shown by a meter. Check this by taking a reading the other way, of the cast shadow. Nevada's Judicial Structure Under Discussion

Chief Judge Herbert M. Schwab of the Oregon Court of Appeals addressed the Nevada Legislature's joint committee on the judiciary Saturday morning. The committee, chaired by Assemblyman

Robert Barengo (D-Reno), is currently completing hearings concerning the possible reorganization of Nevada's judicial structure.


Speakers this weekend included Nevada's Chief Justice E. M. "Al" Gunderson and Dean Ernst John Watts of the National College of the State Judiciary. Regarded as a leading national expert on intermediate courts of appeals, Chief Judge Schwab was invited to testify at the recommendation of Chief Justice Gunderson, to present a comparative analysis of the various forms of such courts throughout the United States.

Chief Judge Schwab's remarks detailed the problems presented by a rapidly growing population and a burgeoning of public laws. Such pressures, he said, cause people to rely more on the advice of lawyers, who in turn must find their answers in the opinions of

the courts. The Oregon jurist urged the Nevada Legislature to consider an intermediate court of appeals as an

alternative preferable to expansion of the state supreme court. He explained how enlarging the supreme court above its present five justices would produce difficulties in communication, as it has elsewhere, thus failing to produce corresponding increase in output of decisions.

The legislative committee also questioned Chief Justice Gunderson and Dean Watts regarding Chief Judge Schwab's recommendations. Both concurred in the views of Oregon's authority, and made specific recommendations concerning possible forms for an appeals court in Nevada, if the Legislature implements Judge Schwab's suggestions.



Boat Storage Facility Opens

Boulder City welcomes a new service this week as Boulder City resident Lido Paglia unveils his new boat storage facility on Industrial Road in the industrial park.

The yellow cinder block structure visible from Nevada Highway is but the first of several such units planned for construction on the property.

For right now, boaters are offered 27 storage stalls, each measuring a large 11 by 31 feet, in which to store their boats and trailers between outings on Lake Mead. Lido says the stalls are the largest in the Las Vegas area. In addition, the first building contains six small mini-storage cubicles, each ten by ten feet.

The entire structure incorporates first class design and construction

throughout. The walls are all of cinder block construction. They project through the roof to provide extra fire-stop protection. The floors of the units are concrete. Each stall has individually controlled lighting; each offers a huge ten by ten foot door opening to allow campers to easily back boat and trailer into the stall. All units have an easily raised, torsion spring, roll up doors.

Lido had the idea for construction over a year ago. He was finally able to purchase the property a short time ago and translate his dream to reality.

A well known builder for 23 years in the Las Vegas area, he himself moved to Boulder City about a year ago. He saw the need for a well constructed, covered boat storage facility and made plans to offer that service here.

unit is but the beginning. He has plans to construct additional storage facilities as the need arises. Each will offer solid, safe and maintenance free storage. All will be separated by wide driveways to allow convenient access to the stalls.

Full outdoor lighting will add safety and confidence for users of the facility which is "open" 24 hours a day all year long. A permanent office and watchman's facility is planned soon as are restroom facilities, showers and other conveniences.

Artwork came from schools throughout Clark County. To go on display at the Boulevard, works had to survive elimination at the school and zone level.





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Birth Of A Nation

PART 21 What Is Independence?

During those weeks of May 1776 when the American army was retreating from Canada, the Continental Congress was debating the important issue of independence.

On May 6, John Adams introduced a resolution recommending that the

colonies form new governments to take the place of the former British dominated governments. Meanwhile, on the same day, twenty-five year old James Madison took his place in a convention of delegates in Virginia. This marked the entry of James

Madison into national politics, and his participation in the most important colonial assembly in American history. Many years later, after the fighting had long been stopped, Madison would end his political career as president of the nation

he helped to create

From this Virginia convention came two epochal acts of statesmanship: A resolution ordering the Virginia congressional delegates to move that the United Colonies be declared free and independent states. And a Declaration of Rights whose provisions furnished material for the Declaration of Independence and the Bill of Rights of the United States Constitution which had not yet been written.

Throughout the colonies independence was being discussed, but many important officials bewailed the unrational aspects of that theory. On May 9, one unhappy man wrote to Washington suggesting that independence was expected to be a form of government that, "by being independent of the rich men, every man would then be able to do as he pleased."

Even Patrick Henry privately opposed an immediate move for independence in a speech on May 7. After the Virginia independence resolution was adopted, he wrote letters opposing action on it in the Continental Congress.

His fear that England would fight the independence movement by offering France half of America was ridiculed by some, but to others it seemed a real possibility. However, on May 2, unknown to Patrick Henry, the French court had agreed to grant the Americans a subvention of a million livres to aid their revolutionary effort.

After that brief period of uncertainty, Henry decided to lead the independence forces. "He became a pillar of fire... He inflamed, and was followed, by the convention," wrote one contemporary.

In a resolution Henry cited at length the tyrannies of king and parliament, declared the people of Virginia absolved of allegiance to the crown, and requested that the Virginia delegates in Congress exert their ability in procuring an immediate, clear, and full Declaration of Independence.

On May 15, 1776, Henry's resolution for independence was adopted by the Virginia convention. The congressional delegate galloped off to Philadelphia, while a new continental union flag waved above the capital at Williamsburg. Before the Virginia delegate arrived in Philadelphia, the Congress had already approved the Adams resolution which also called for independence.

In humility, Congress ordered a day of fasting, humiliation and prayer for Friday, May 17, 1776. That day was also named a Virginia feast day. A collection was made for treating the soldiers, continental forces were paraded, and Patrick Henry's independence resolution was read aloud to the army while the Union Flag of the American states waved in the breeze.

Readers also found that the publisher of the Virginia Gazette had removed the British seal of Virginia from the top of page one, replacing it with a type box bearing the words: Thirteen United Colonies--United We Stand--Divided We Fall.

This was the answer to the rumor which had just swept the colonies that the

Unit Award Presented

Seventy-nine National Park Service employees have received a Unit Award for Excellence of Service from the Department of the Interior. The Award was for "efforts performed beyond the line of duty in the search and recovery of flash flood victims and property during September and October, 1974." The Award was signed by Secretary of the Interior Thomas S. Kleppe.

On September 14, 1974, a flash flood swept through the Eldorado Canyon on Lake Mead National Recreation Area, killing nine persons and causing \$500,000 in property damage. Park employees and volunteers worked long hours for more than four weeks following what has been described as "one of the worst natural disasters in a National Park area." According to Gary E. Bunney, Acting Superintendent of Lake Mead National Recreation Area, "We are very proud of those individuals who worked so hard under extremely hazardous conditions in the search and recovery operations."

Bunney advised that as another summer season ministry was sending an army of forty-five thousand Hessians and British soldiers against America.

EOB Offers Free Sack Lunches Here

This summer, the Economic Opportunity Board of Clark County is again offering a free sack lunch program to benefit children from lower-income families who are involved in countywide summer recreational programs. The program will begin June 7.

EOB's Deputy Director, James Tyree, in announcing the program, stated that it will be administered through the Nevada State Department of Educa-

tion and that EOB will be responsible for preparing and distributing the lunches.

Tyree noted that "EOB is the only agency in Federal Region IX where youth from the community actually do the preparation and distribution themselves. The sack lunch program therefore provides jobs and training for youth as well as providing a needed public service."

Eligibility is based on the requirement that

one-third of the children receiving sack lunches are eligible for free or reduced-price school meals. The income standard is for a family of four making \$6,260 per year or less. Incomes eligible vary depending on family size.

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
Pets Must Be Moved From Cemetery By July 19

An illegal pet cemetery on federal lands near Las Vegas slated to be transferred to the State of Nevada must be removed, according to a Bureau of Land Management (BLM) spokesman.


John Boyles, BLM Las Vegas District Manager, said the Division of Colorado River Resources, on behalf of the State of Nevada, has requested the BLM to take action to eliminate the pet cemetery since it is unauthorized and could interfere with the development of the land following State acquisition.

In 60 days, all surface structures at the site, about 4 miles south of Railroad Pass in Eldorado Valley, will be removed. Boyles emphasized animal remains will not be disturbed, and pet owners can remove personal property and transfer their animals anytime before July 19th.


"The entire matter is unfortunate," he said. "I realize the pet owners involved might not have known the cemetery was illegal and probably had their animals buried there in good faith. However, the land has been identified for transfer to Nevada. By law, the BLM cannot sell, lease or transfer the land to anyone but the State. Since the State has requested us to act, we must clear the property. We have no choice."







There was a time, some seventy-odd years ago, when one of the most visible pieces of Americana was the town band concert. In that vanished era before television (or even radio) one of the few sources of live entertainment was the gathering, in suitable weather, of townsfolk to listen to the stirring music of John Philip Sousa, played by a community band in gilded uniforms and seated in their splendor on an ornate gazebo in the town square.

Well, the years and changing tastes have pretty well done in that quaint institution. But on the evening of Monday, May 10, the Basic High School music department did its best to recapture the mood and the music in a final appearance for the 1975-1976 season.

For Diana Tomlinson, eight years the director of vocal music at the school, it was a true farewell; she moves to a new position at Bonanza High School in Las Vegas this fall. The occasion was duly noted in a short speech by band director Brent Cecil, and acknowledged by Mrs. Tomlinson.

The weather cooperated beautifully with the effort, which was the

school's contribution to the U.S. Bicentennial. Virtually every musical group affiliated with the school was represented, and in a 90-minute concert, each had its turn.

Contrast was one of the program's highlights. The age of the music stretched from the 1830's to contemporary pop. The band opened the show with the National Anthem, appropriately enough. They followed this with Sousa's march "El Captain." Next came a medley of old American tunes, entitled "1836: New Land, New Nation." Sitting in the audience out-doors in the school's quadrangle area, under a near-full moon, I could almost believe I had been transported back to the world of 1910; at least until the sound of motorcycles along Palo Verde Street brought me back to 1976.

It's too bad Channel 5, after their splendid job covering so many facets of our recent Industrial Days celebration, couldn't have had their TV camera present to bring the musical and visual delights of the program into homes throughout the valley. Well, maybe next year.

arrangement of "America the Beautiful," bringing to a close the first (and traditional) part of the Bicentennial concert.

The school stage band opened the second half, dedicated to contemporary music of the jazz and pop variety. Of all the groups heard, the stage band, which to the uninitiated is another word for dance or jazz band, suffered the most by the acoustical shortcomings of the quadrangle. They set up at a far-back corner, which further muddled their sound in echo and reverberation. At times, only the rhythm section could be heard, with brass and saxes lost in the murk of bouncing sound. If they were received with somewhat less enthusiasm by the large crowd, their unfortunate placement was not doubt in part responsible. Occasionally the trumpets cut through the mud, but very seldom.

All jazz solos were impossible to hear from the audience. Coming on to close the show was Totality, the large pop singing group, stunningly costumed and definitely the visual treat of the evening. They sang and danced, and presented a string of soloists that included Vonnie Kelly, Betty Barton, Bryan Lamb, Eileen Twitchell, and Randy Trujillo. One could see the generation gap at work during their rock-flavored performance, with the older members of the audience wincing slightly at the volume they projected, while the younger listeners (and the members of the other choruses) applauded and cheered wildly. My own opinion was that their ensemble work was excellent, as was most of the accompaniment provided by the stage band, but most of the soloists were undistinguished or singing in a style they had not mastered.

Perhaps the hardest part of being an entertainer (and this is what Totality strives to be) is that confidence and sureness that comes from years of working face-to-face with critical contemporary audiences. And here, most notably, the soloists of Totality brought home the realization that this was, after all, only a high school singing group. Time will solve these problems for the soloists if they wish to pursue this type of music: time and exposure to the realities of singing for audiences that are not prejudiced in one's behalf before a note has been sung. But then, professional entertainers do not have to cope with a heavy schedule of academic studies and other activities every day of their lives, as students do. As it was, Totality was wildly appreciated by its contemporaries, so they have nothing to be ashamed of.

I have now heard a complete season's concerts by the vocal and instrumental groups of the Basic High School music department. Improvement was obvious in all areas, both musically and in the staging. Some of the clumsy technical problems of earlier concerts had been solved, which shows that time and proper supervision work wonders. All in all, it was a year that proved again and again how much talent there is in Basic High, and how anxious that talent is to be heard in the best possible light. There is every indication that 1976-1977 will be even better. For one thing, the school has finally agreed to put band in the regular school schedule, instead of making it a class held before school officially begins. This should bring in students who, because of bus schedules, could not participate in band this year.
