Inventory Tax

Topic of Chamber Meeting

The October Chamber of Commerce membership luncheon will be held today, Oct. 13 at 12 noon at the Swahky Club on Boulder Highway.

The program for the luncheon will be on the repealing of the Nevada State Busines Inventory Tax, It will be presented by Carol Valardo, Co-chairman of the Nevada Committee to repeal the inventory tax and by Pete Kelly, executive director of the Nevada Retail Association.

For the past six years the local Chamber of Commerce has been working toward the inventory tax removal on business merchandise. The repeal will be put on the ballot next year for the vote of the people of Nevada. If passed, it will go into effect on January 1, 1979. The repeal will be a 20 per cent year decrease in the business inventory tax over five years.

There will be an extensive campaign to make the voting public aware of the importance of repealing the Business Inventory Tax. Because of the importance of the matter to all businesses, Chamber members are urged to bring a business guest that is not yet a Chamber member to the luncheon.

Roy Campbell of Basic Auto Parts, a long time Henderson resident and past president of the Chamber of Commerce, has been selected as Businessman of the month for November, an award sponsored by the Chamber and McDonalds.

Council Ok's Request For Annexation

A public hearing was held at Tuesday night's council meeting on a request by Richard MacDonald for the annexation of ten acres in Section 31.

The request had the approval of the Planning Com-

MacDonald explained that he would be using about four acres for a 5000 sq. ft. office complex that would have eight to ten bathrooms.

Mark Fine, representing America Nevada Corporation asked that the request be deferred but it was approved unanimously by the Council.

In other actions the Council approved the recommendation of the administration to award the bid of \$35,842.40 to Standard Wholesale Supply Co. of Las Vegas for water and sewer pipe.

The club is currently undertoing a large remodeling and expansion program and with the abandonment of that portion of the street, the Boyd's feel they can supply additional parking spaces for the area which already faces a serious parking problem.

Several local downtown businessmen have expressed strong feelings against the vacation when the request first came before the planning commission. A large turnout is expected to attend Monday

night's meeting.

Bill Byrne Comes Out Of Retirement Nursing Home Ombudsman

"If a patient in a nursing home or their representative has a complaint which has been ignored by the home's administration, then I am the person to contact for assistance," William B. Byrne said of his new position as Nursing Home Ombudsman.

The state of Nevada was one of the first states to create the position which was established under Title 19 and is funded by the Federal Government. It comes under the Division for Aging Services.

There are 47 licensed nursing homes throughout Nevada which come under Byrne's jurisdiction and they fall into three categories - skilled nursing facility, intermediate care facility and group care facility. Many of the patients are there on Medicaid and Medicare programs, the minority are private patients.


Basically, Byrne's job is to assure there is no abuse of the patients rights - that they are receiving the proper care to which they are entitled.

"The rules and regulations for nursing homes in Nevada are excellent," Byrne said " and the law gives me the right at anytime, day or night, to go into a home unannounced to make a check on the facility or to investigate a complaint which I and the administrator of Aging Services deem valid."

Byrne just assumed this position about three weeks ago and thus far has spent a

good share of his time getting acquainted with the procedures his job entails and the past history of the various facilities around the state.

"A great majority of the administrators have cooperated and shown a desire to cooperate with me and the Division,"

After quoting a price. he asks you to sign an order. Once you've signed, however, you may get a bill that's a lot higher than the amount the man quoted you. Because of certain words in the order, you are legally obligated to pay the bill collector. And you may have to pay even though the work was not properly completed, perhaps pot even started.

Ask the man for his name, address, phone number and the number and name of his company. Tell him you will call the next day. Then get some information about the man and the offer he has made.

"The Switch-Game Artist"

Be on guard when a helpless stranger asks for your advice. Such a person stops you on the street, maybe in front of a bank or savings and loan, or in a large department store or shopping center. It could be a man or a woman, someone old or young, well-dressed or shabby-looking.

Listen closely as the person talks to you. He'll have a story to tell you. but before he's finished you might lose a lot of money. Here is how it could happen:

1. He (or she) gets your attention. It might be a man who asks how to get to a certain hotel, a woman crying piteously as she approaches you, or someone who simply asks to talk to you for just a moment.

2. He tells you have has a large sum of money. He shows you an envelope and, inside, you see a small, neatly-tied roll. On the outside of this roll is a large denomination bill, \$20 or more. The person tells you that he's afraid of carrying so much cash, then explains that he has just arrived from a foreign country, or that the money was an inheritance from a relative who died vesterday. Or, instead, he tells you he found the money, perhaps in a phone booth or on the floor of a crowded store.

3. He asks for your help. He may want advice about a safe place to put the money. He asks, for example, whether you would be willing to keep the money while he's looking for a hotel, or he inquires about a reliable bank. If the man has told that your money be returned to you. No. 1 agrees heartily, saying that he'll give it to you now. A moment later, the two men tell you they must say good-bye.

"It's all choice. How much are you willing to pay for the whistle?" The quotation is ascribed to Benjamin Franklin by John Jakes in his bicentennial series. Franklin is said to explain it this way:

"When I was growing up in Boston, a visitor to our house gave me some pocket change. Later that day, in the streets, I met a boy playing a whistle. I'd never heard such a sweet sound. I offered the boy all the money I had been given --- and tooted that whistle mighty proudly when I got home. My brothers and sisters broke out laughing. It came like a thunderclap when they, with my father's corroberation, convinced me that I'd paid the lad four times what the whistle was worth. The whistle instantly lost its charm. Ever since, the incident's stuck in my mind. Whenever I'm tempted toward a comforatable but wrong judgment as opposed to the one that's difficult but right, I say to myself, "Franklin, do not give too much for the whistle."

Now, more than two centuries later. American's have the same problem. We're paying too much for the whistle. And, as in Franklin's situation, we are induced to carelessness because the money we pay comes (as his did) as an apparent gift --- his from a visitor; ours from an impersonal government.

Aetna Insurance has pinpointed the problem in advertising this month. They are urging medicare recipients to be more careful in their purchases of medical services. They point out that hospital charges have grown by more than a thousand percent, primarily from the "demand" created by patients who are the beneficiaries of government programs that pay a large share of the cost. Greed pays a part, too.

Patients expect (and sue if they don't get) uniformly successful results from medical treatment. Such results can never be guaranteed. Thus the cost of "defensive medical practice" and the cost of insurance to protect against the claims of disappointed patients has helped to skyrocket medical costs.

Some doctors have to bear a share of the blame. too. Those doctors (and other medical service providers) sometimes are like the little boy who sold the whistle to Franklin. They will take all the money available and give, or appear to give, added service just because the patient does not pay, directly, and does not object when the service, at the moment, appears overwhelmingly attractive.

The power that drives this old world may well be what we generally call "competition." Certainly, the competitive urge makes things happen in work, business and athletics. But just as certainly, the introduction of competition has a disastrous

the game fields, and packs along the same competitive drives that motivate him in his working life, misses much. He is enslaved to the habit of comparing himself with others: "Did he take as many birds as the other guy? Was his buck the biggest in camp? Did he fill his license?" This poor soul never knows the pleasure of not having to prove anything, of doing something for its own

In extreme cases, competitve hunting becomes not a sport at all, but rather an imprincipled drive to achieve, to win. At that point, the pursuit of game has nothing to do with ethical hunting.

The sportsman, though he enjoys good companions, is a solitary sort. Even while hunting with

friends, he makes his own judgments and evaluates the hunt in very personal terms. He establishes personal standards and lives by them. He knows that hunting is something that happens between him and the game, between him and the natural world.

For the competitor, time, money and luck are enough - sooner of later he will win if he spends enough and has enough. For the ethical hunter, time, money and luck are good to have, but not essential. Because he judges himself, and he sets his own rules, within the law, exclusive of what others may think or say.

That's the whole charm of hunting - doing something difficult and demanding for the simple sake of doing it. So that keeping score doesn't matter, and filling a license doesn't count. The important thing is doing it

right. And meeting the requirements that you establish for yourself. Solitary and individual.

Come to think of it, hunting is one of the very few things you can do in

this world according to rules you make for yourself. It doesn't make much sense to take the easy way

For anyone wishing to have a blooming Christmas cactus this year, October is the month to subject the succulent to the shock treatment it requires for budding.

There are several methods suggested to promote budding, none of which is more successful than the other. I would recommend using the method that is most suitable for you and, if that doesn't work this year, perhaps try another



CHRISTMAS

method next year. You might also try experimenting with more than one plant.

Beginning in October, the plant needs a rest period of four to six weeks. Stop watering during this time. From six p.m. to eight a.m. each day, keep the cactus in total darkness. Christmas cacti need 14 hours of complete darkness daily during this shock period if they are to produce buds. The least amount of light will often inhibit bud formation. Cool temperatures are also required at this time.

If there is no danger of frost and the temperature range outside is 45 or 55,

The booklet is interesting and informative in that it focuses on how social security treats women in their varied roles -- as mothers, widows, divorcces, single, or married, A special publication for women was first published in 1964, and the present guide represents the latest of several revisions. The different versions reflect how the social security program changes in response to the changing needs of women as breadwinners and heads of households in their own right.

Today women constitute 40 percent of the total workforce and 47 percent of all women work. They make up 24 percent of all heads of households, according to the Department of Labor's Women's Bureau.

As a worker, a woman earns social security protection for herself and her family on the same basis as a male worker. She gets benefits if she retires or becomes disabled after having worked long enough under social security. Her dependents also may be entitled to benefits when she retires or becomes disabled. If she dies, her widower and minor children, or dependent parents 62 or over may be eligible for payments.

Until recently, one difference between the women and the male worker was that the husband of a



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

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

Gambling

O Nevada Wicked State Cut the gambling ere to

Lift yourself out of the

Throw the crap game in the fire.

The poem appeared in the Feb. 10, 1909 issue of the Reno Evening Gazette expressing not only the sentiments of its Oklahoma author but of many Nevadans bent on cleansing their state of gambling. The crusade lasted 70 years but in 1931 the "intolerable and inexcusable vice" prevailed when Gov. Fred Blazer signed Assembly Bill No. 98 lifting all gamblings restrictions.

Gambling in Nevada began as early as 1850 when a Carson Valley resident set up games to attract California-bound emigrants. But it was after the Comstock Lode strike in 1859 that gambling established a strong foothold in the area.

"Thousands of California miners crowded into what would become Nevada. They brought with them their gamblers and their gambling habits.' wrote Dr. Roske. "Dice games and roulette were popular gambling pastimes, as were the card games, poker, faro and monte.

When the U.S. Congress created the Nevada territory in 1861, opposition to gambling erupted under the administration of territorial Gov. James Nye, who passed strong laws banning it. Convicted owners and employees of casinos could be imprisoned for as long as two years and fined as much at \$5,000. Patrons were guilty of a misdemeanor and faced six-month jail sentences and \$500 fines.

Because of its extreme penalties the law was almost totally unenforced. When Nevada became a state in 1864 a new antigambling statute was passed reducing the crime of running a gambling establishment to a misdemeanor. The purpose was rigorous enforcement by lessening the previous penalties, according to Dr. Roske.

Gambling legislation see-sawed from amendment to amendment between 1869 and 1909, but with the advent of the Progressive Age in early 1900's came a spirit of reform. Gambling, along with prostitution and drunkenness, became a cause celebre for the Progressives.

The anti-gambling crusade gained a new fervor not known since the days of the "coffee and chocolate governor" Henry G. Blasdel who in his 1866 state of the state address blasted gambling as "and intolerable and inexcusable vice."

3. Order a salad and/or coffee immediately. Move the basket of rolls and/or condiments to the other side of the table. If you have something to eat which meets your diet requirements, and if you are not confronted with the constant temptation of nibbling, you will find it much easier to follow the food program.

4. Be the first one in your party to order. This avoids the "me, too" syndrome and keeps you safely on the good side of a major trap.

5. Dessert should be no problem, Melon, grapefruit, or fresh fruit cup, or other fruits are a safe bet and usually available.

What Is The Definition Of Roads By Senator Paul Laxalt

On occasion in this column I have discussed the bureaucratic snafus many of you run into dealing with the federal government. Today, I'd like to tell you of an experience this office had with the red-tape machine here in Washington.

The whole episode began with my simple request (or so I thought) to the Department of Interior and the Forest Service for their definitions of the word "road." You see, these agencies are engaged in a project to review so-called "roadless" areas on public lands around the country to determine which tracts might be suitable for possible designation as "wilderness" areas -- if a parcel is "roadless" it can become a candidate for a "wilderness" designa-

Upon first hearing of these reviews it occurred to me that many of Nevada's lands have roads used by ranchers and hunters, but these paths are maintained largely through their use and aren't paved or looked after formally. I could smell trouble.

Interior's Assistant Secretary for Land and Water Resources replied to my request (I expect to hear from the Forest Service shortly). He said our state has 8 million acres of estimated "roadless" areas. The Secretary then went on to give what he said was the modified version of a definition for "roads." It read, "An access route, not a 'way,' that is improved and maintained to ensure relatively regular use by word definition was then augmented by a 100-word explanation of the definition. For instance, relatively regular use is, "On a recurring frequency. and having a demonstrated need or purpose, use will recur for a predetermined, planned, or intended purpose; for ex-So go ahead. Celebrate ample, equipment access to maintain a stock water tank, or private access however, casual or ran dom vehicle use by offroad vehicles or recreationists will not qualify." That explanation of three words is 27 words longer than the definition itself!

The reason this whole issue of "roaded" vs.

"roadless" set me off is because I suspected Washington's definition of "roads" might be such that Nevada and many other Western states could find themselves with much of their public land declared "roadless" and eligible for "wilderness' designation. Unfortunately, my misgivings were borne out when I considered the above explanation of a few words in the original definition plus Interior's added note that improved means, "Where an action has been directed to create a graded condition." And way is defined as, "An access route maintained solely by the passage of vehicles." Most of those areas we travel for either business or pleasure in rural Nevada, and consider "roads" after years of service, could be wiped out in the bureaucratic scheme of things through a masterstroke of gobbledygook.

All of this could lead to very serious consequence. Should much of our public land be determined "roadless," and thereby eligible for 'wilderness' designation, large tracts would be "sterilized" by Washingcommercial use of any they could be worsened. Recognizing that, I decided to start at square one and see what developed.

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

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
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

Well, the kids are back in school: the air has turned a little cooler and you can actually pull out onto the Nevada Highway without waiting twenty minutes for a break in traffic.

To most people across

the nation, vacation time is over and thoughts have turned to bracing for the long grey winter. But, to many of us who live in the warmer climates and have a National Recreation Area our backyard, thoughts have turneed to warm sunny days, pleasantly cool nights and the chance to get out and do those things that we have waited all summer to do.

But before we go charging out into the desert back country to camp or scramble over the rocky country - side in search of those precious stones, there are a few things worth remembering. Fall is a beautiful time of the year to recreate in the desert; however, there are a few hazards that are inherent with this time of the year. The weather can be very unpredictable. One moment it may be sunny and warm and the next moment you might be trying to escape a heavy thundershower. Thundershowers may not only spoil a picnic, they also present a hazard in the

form of flash - flooding.

Never camp in a ravine

or wash and take to high ground if it starts to rain or you suspect rain in the high country.

Another hazard might be found under the rock or old mine timber. The "creepie - crawlies" which have been absent from view during the hot summer days may now be seen "creeping and crawling" in the cooler weather. Most of the creatures are perfectly harmless, making the desert a more interesting place to explore. Some, however, can inflict a painful (though seldom fatal) sting or bite. Rattle snakes,

scorpions and black

widow spiders are gen-

erally shy and hide

under rocks and in rock

where you walk and never put your hands into dark areas without first checking for local residents. It is always a good idea to shake out clothing that has been exposed to areas where scorpions and spiders may live. That old pair of blue jeans or beach towel may look like the perfect place to a scorpion for a new home. Remember that these small creatures, like most animals that live within the Recreation Area, are protected. They play an important part in this desert environment and should be left alone.

crevices. Always watch

Some other hints for

safe desert travel: 1. Always tell someone where you are going and when you plan to return.

2. Always carry a first aid kit, plenty of water and extra food.

3. Be sure that your vehicle is in good running condition and that vehicle emergency equipment (flashlight, spare tire, jack, etc.) is servic-

4. Finally, be sure that YOU are in good condition. Don't overdo it. Physical stress and exhaustion can kill ... know when to quit.

Yes, Fall is a wonderful time to visit Lake Mead National Recreation Area and the National Park Service hopes that you will have an enjoyable SAFE visit.
