Street. Each class will have their beautiful floats on exhibit along with the Queen

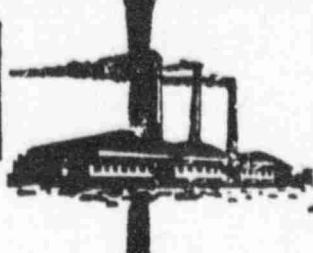

Inventory Tax

Topic of Chamber Meeting

The October Chamber of Commerce membership luncheon will be held today, Oct. 13 at 12 noon at the Swahky Club on Boulder Highway.

The program for the luncheon will be on the repealing of the Nevada State Business Inventory Tax. It will be presented by Carol Valardo, Co-chairman of the Nevada Committee to repeal the inventory tax and by Pete Kelly, executive director of the Nevada Retail Association.

For the past six years the local Chamber of Commerce has been working toward the inventory tax removal on business merchandise. The repeal will be put on the ballot next year for the vote of the people of Nevada. If passed, it will go into effect on January 1, 1979. The repeal will be a 20 per cent year decrease in the business inventory tax over five years.

There will be an extensive campaign to make the voting public aware of the importance of repealing the Business Inventory Tax. Because of the importance of the matter to all businesses, Chamber members are urged to bring a business guest that is not yet a Chamber member to the luncheon.

Roy Campbell of Basic Auto Parts, a long time Henderson resident and past president of the Chamber of Commerce, has been selected as Businessman of the month for November, an award sponsored by the Chamber and McDonalds.

Three new members will be welcomed into the Chamber this month. Ben DePue of T.T.I. Corporation, Jerold Lee Bergemeyer, Associate, Black Mountain Realty and Joe and Rita Roth of R and J Employment Service.

Council Ok's Request For Annexation

A public hearing was held at Tuesday night's council meeting on a request by Richard MacDonald for the annexation of ten acres in Section 31.

The request had the approval of the Planning Commission.

MacDonald explained that he would be using about four acres for a 5000 sq. ft. office complex that would have eight to ten bathrooms.

Mark Fine, representing America Nevada Corporation asked that the request be deferred but it was approved unanimously by the Council.

In other actions the Council approved the recommendation of the administration to award the bid of \$35,842.40 to Standard Wholesale Supply Co. of Las Vegas for water and sewer pipe.

Approved an agreement with the State of Nevada Safer Off - System Roads Program for the paving of Van Wagenen Street between Pacific Ave. to Lake Mead and for the paving of the Arrowhead Railroad crossing.

Referred to committee a request by Hoss Melton to rescind a revocable permit on King Street.

Bill Byrne Comes Out Of Retirement

Nursing Home Ombudsman

"If a patient in a nursing home or their representative has a complaint which has been ignored by the home's administration, then I am the person to contact for assistance," William B. Byrne said of his new position as Nursing Home Ombudsman.

The state of Nevada was one of the first states to create the position which was established under Title 19 and is funded by the Federal Government. It comes under the Division for Aging Services.

There are 47 licensed nursing homes throughout Nevada which come under Byrne's jurisdiction and they fall into three categories - skilled nursing facility, intermediate care facility and group care facility. Many of the patients are there on Medicaid and Medicare programs, the minority are private patients.

Basically, Byrne's job is to assure there is no abuse of the patients rights - that they are receiving the proper care to which they are entitled.

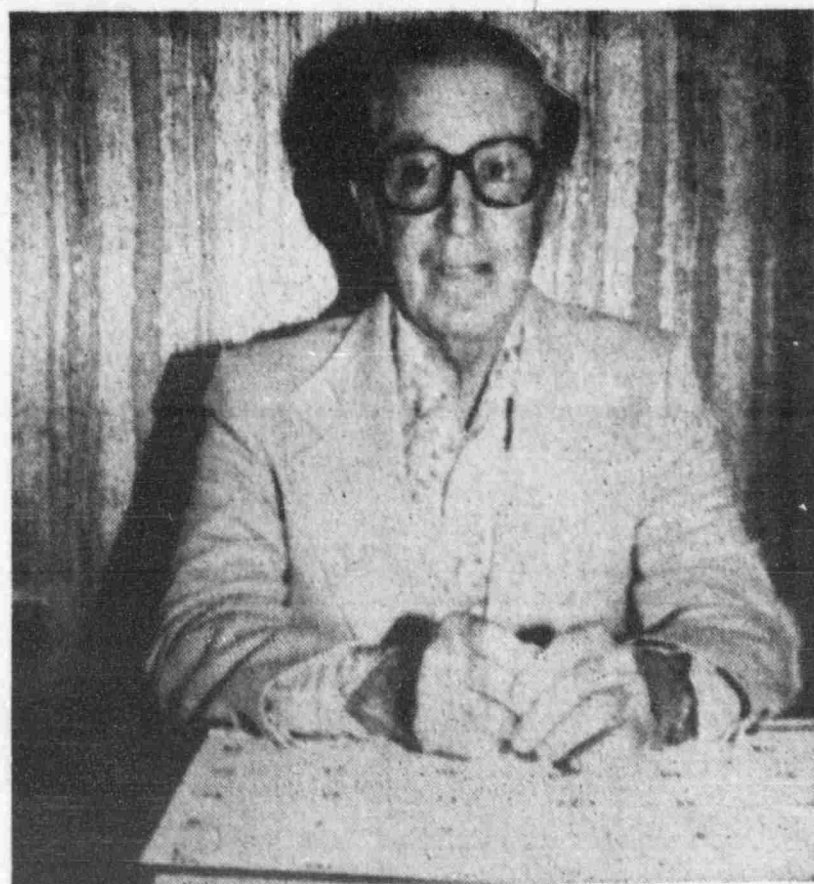
"The rules and regulations for nursing homes in Nevada are excellent," Byrne said "and the law gives me the right at anytime, day or night, to go

into a home unannounced to make a check on the facility or to investigate a complaint which I and the administrator of Aging Services deem valid."

Byrne just assumed this position about three weeks ago and thus far has spent a

good share of his time getting acquainted with the procedures his job entails and the past history of the various facilities around the state.

"A great majority of the administrators have cooperated and shown a desire to cooperate with me and the Division,"

Following several months of heated discussions, the signing of petitions and a vote for denial from the planning commission, a Public Hearing for the vacation of a section of Market Street comes before the City Council Monday night at 7 p.m. at which time final action will be taken.

Several local downtown businessmen have expressed strong feelings against the vacation when the request first came before the planning commission. A large turnout is expected to attend Monday night's meeting.

One of the documents Byrne has drawn up as a "Bill of Rights" to be made available to each patient or their representative upon admission to a facility, informing them as to what services the patient can expect and receive.

This shall become an official policy of operations of nursing homes in Nevada.

Byrne also plans to review and recommend any legislation that will improve the conditions in facilities.

For those of you who might not be familiar with the name Bill Byrne, in the early 1940's he served as superintendent of the Basic Magnesium Hospital, a grand structure (for early Henderson) that is now known as St. Rose de Lima.

During the 1950's, he was Henderson's first representative to the State Legislature serving three consecutive terms beginning in 1952.

Later, starting in '57, he was Mayor of Henderson for eight

Girls' State Great Experience For Student Body President

Though it was last June when Lorri Smith attended Nevada Girls' State and was subsequently elected Governor, it has just been in the past few weeks, since the start of school, that she has been able to implement some of the ideas she gathered while there.

"It really has helped me as student body president," Lorri said. "It was a highly competitive experience and I made eight different speeches during the week, running for various offices on different levels before being elected Governor."

"Student council meetings are now conducted by parliamentary procedure using Robert's Book of Rules for the first time in several years."

A new leadership class has also been formed at the high school for members of the student council. Held during Early Bird hours, Mr. Bill Horan is the advisor and class members receive one credit. At this time, all student council business is discussed, much to the pleasure of the faculty as previously council members would have to

be excused from classes during the school day for their meetings.

At Girls' State, which is sponsored annually by the American Legion Auxiliary, 103 girls from all over the state comprised of three representatives from each school, gathered to learn about government on all levels.

Bous' State was held simultaneously at another location. On the final day, both girls and boys gathered together in Carson City at the Capitol building to re-enact their legislature.

Each group had prepared five bills which were introduced. One of the proposed bills was to raise the voting age to 19 and lower the legal age to 19.

A second bill called for mandatory sex education in schools which was passed by the "legislators" but vetoed by the governors as being too vague.

One of the high points for Lorri as Girls' State Governor, was meeting Gov. Mike O'Callaghan.

"I thought I was going for a week's vacation," Lorri explained, "but it turned out to be a really marvelous education in government, an invaluable experience."

City Creates Director Of Women's Rights Position

Lettie Ness was appointed Director of Women's Rights for the city of Henderson following the creation of this position by the City Council Tuesday night.

Mrs. Ness will be the city's representative to any meetings on a county, state or federal level at which the city

feels there should be representation.

North Las Vegas and Henderson are the only cities that have not had a woman they could send and, it was understood that N. Las Vegas was in the process of creating such a position also.

The appointment is for a one year period.

City To Be Aided In Safety Director Search

The selection of a public safety director for Henderson will be aided by Justice Research Association, Inc., according to action by the City Council.

City Manager Bob Campbell told the council that many cities spend considerable time and effort in testing and evaluating candidates for a lower level classification, then often hire a top level administrator on the basis of appearance and "gut" reaction and little more.

About 203 applications have been received for this newly created position in Henderson.

The PSD will be over both the police and fire departments.

Campbell said pre-screening of the job applicants will be done by himself and Janice Wiese, personnel director. The applicants will be limited to ten.

The ten will then visit City officials, and their skills and knowledge will be tabulated. Phase three will be conducted by Justice Research Associates who will provide a technical report of its findings in conformance with City personnel policies and requirements. The cost will not exceed \$2,300.

"THE HOME REPAIRMAN"

Beware of the phony "repairman" or "engineer" who offers to check your chimney, furnace, catch basin or other installation.

Such a person comes to your home, he is in working clothes, perhaps carrying a ladder or kit of tools. You will probably believe he's honest, and won't feel suspicious as he talks to you. But the repairman will be very smart. He'll try to deceive you, one step at a time.

After quoting a price, he asks you to sign an order. Once you've signed, however, you may get a bill that's a lot higher than the amount the man quoted you. Because of certain words in the order, you are legally obligated to pay the bill collector. And you may have to pay even though the work was not properly completed, perhaps not even started.

Ask the man for his name, address, phone number and the number and name of his company. Tell him you will call the next day. Then get some information about the man and the offer he has made.

"The Switch-Game Artist"

Be on guard when a helpless stranger asks for your advice. Such a person stops you on the street, maybe in front of a bank or savings and loan, or in a large department store or shopping center. It could be a man or a woman, someone old or young, well-dressed or shabby-looking.

Listen closely as the person talks to you. He'll have a story to tell you, but before he's finished you might lose a lot of money. Here is how it could happen:

1. He (or she) gets your attention. It might be a man who asks how to get to a certain hotel, a woman crying piteously as she approaches you, or someone who simply asks to talk to you for just a moment.

2. He tells you have has a large sum of money. He shows you an envelope and, inside, you see a small, neatly-tied roll. On the outside of this roll is a large denomination bill, \$20 or more. The person tells you that he's afraid of carrying so much cash, then explains that he has just arrived from a foreign country, or that the money was an inheritance from a relative who died yesterday. Or, instead, he tells you he found the money, perhaps in a phone booth or on the floor of a crowded store.

3. He asks for your help. He may want advice about a safe place to put the money. He asks, for example, whether you would be willing to keep the money while he's looking for a hotel, or he inquires about a reliable bank. If the man has told

you he found the money, he offers to share it with you on the condition that you help him in some way, perhaps by holding the money while he talks to a lawyer. In any case, the man talks very fast and you may get a bit confused.

4. Another stranger appears. The No. 2 stranger has heard you talking with No. 1 and asks whether he can help in some way. No. 1 explains the problem, then says you certainly look very honest. He suggests that you be entrusted with the money. No. 1 agrees that you look honest, but says you should provide some earnest money to show your good faith. Since you don't have much money with you, you agree to go with them to your bank or savings and loan association.

5. You withdraw the earnest money from your bank account. Once outside the bank, you put the money into an envelope given you by No. 1, then hand him the envelope. No. 1 takes the other envelope out of his pocket and thanks you for showing good faith. No. 2 also praises you and suggests

that your money be returned to you. No. 1 agrees heartily, saying that he'll give it to you now. A moment later, the two men tell you they must say good-bye.

6. After they have left, however, you discover it's your money he took! You open the envelope and recognize the roll that No. 1 showed you when you first met him. You untie the roll and see that there's only one bill. Inside the bill are many sheets of blank paper. You realize that the two envelopes looked alike and that No. 1 had switched them. You also understand now that the two men knew each other and were working together to

cheat you.

"The Bank Investigator"

Don't trust the phony bank or savings and loan investigator. You meet him at your home, or he calls you by phone, then comes to see you. He is very serious, when he talks to you. He claims to be an investigator, perhaps an examiner from your bank, maybe a police investigator or government agent. He has brought along deposit slips from your bank and other official papers. He could get your money. Here's how:

1. He tells you that the bank is checking up on a dishonest employee. He says that one of the tellers at the bank is suspected of stealing funds from customer accounts. The man asks to see your bank book, then tells you that records at the bank show a much smaller balance in your account.

2. He explains how you can help him. He says he wants to make a test to see

what the suspected employee does when a customer draws money out of

his account. The investigator suggests that you go to your bank, draw some money, then let him use it for the test. He even offers to provide transportation to the bank. He also says that a bonded messenger will pick up the money.

3. You give away your money - After you've withdrawn the money, the man (or his messenger) gives you a receipt and takes the money. He tells you how he plans to trap the suspected employee by having the money returned to the bank for examination. But, once the man has left, you'll never see him again. Your money will be gone forever.

So don't let a stranger get anything from you. Don't let him see your bank book. Don't sign any papers. Whether he's phoned you or has come to your home, just say you'll call back later.

THE PANAMA CANAL IS AN AMERICAN AFFAIR

By Maryellen Vallier Sadovich PART 10 OF A SERIES

Although the Panama Railroad was a private stock company, the U.S. Government indicated its interest in the project by assigning some of its best Army engineers to help with the construction.

Problems soon mounted. New York speculators bought up Panama properties that would have been the most suitable to the Atlantic terminal site, and the company had to move its operation to the mosquito ridden jungle swamps of Manzanillo

Island. Malaria, cholera, yellow fever, and other tropical diseases decimated the labor forces. Clouds of mosquitos tortured the men even when they worked with their heads covered with gauze, and the company turned to

importation of Chinese labor, but they fared no better. Then dark-skinned laborers from Jamaica, Cuba, and Haiti were imported. They worked with success, for they seemed to be immune to

the problems of life in the tropics.

Political problems also appeared even before the company was formally organized. On New Year's Day 1849, a British war ship appeared off the coast of San Juan Nicaragua, the site of a proposed alternate rail route, and took possession of the settlement.

The Britains demanded the equal right in any canal "when and if a canal is built," and the United States decided to ignore this violation of the Mon-

roe Doctrine. In 1850, the U.S. and Great Britain signed the Clayton-Bulwer Treaty giving England equal rights and duties in the development of an Isthmian canal either at Panama or elsewhere. In exchange, Britain agreed not to interfere in construction of the Pan-

ama Railroad. Colombian officials might have protested such arbitrary arrangements with their country, but they were never consulted. And as work progressed, Colombia would have reason to fear the presence of their strong northern neighbor in Panama.

"It's all choice. How much are you willing to pay for the whistle?" The quotation is ascribed to Benjamin Franklin by John Jakes in his bi-centennial series. Franklin is said to explain it this way:

"When I was growing up in Boston, a visitor to our house gave me some pocket change. Later that day, in the streets, I met a boy playing a whistle. I'd never heard such a sweet sound. I offered the boy all the money I had been given --- and tooted that whistle mightily when I got home. My brothers and sisters broke out laughing. It came like a thunderclap when they, with my father's corroboration, convinced me that I'd paid the lad four times what the whistle was worth. The whistle instantly lost its charm. Ever since, the incident's stuck in my mind. Whenever I'm tempted toward a comfortable but wrong judgment as opposed to the one that's difficult but right, I say to myself, 'Franklin, do not give too much for the whistle.'"

Now, more than two centuries later, American's have the same problem. We're paying too much for the whistle. And, as in Franklin's situation, we are induced to carelessness because the money we pay comes (as his did) as an apparent gift --- his from a visitor; ours from an impersonal government.

Aetna Insurance has pinpointed the problem in advertising this month. They are urging medicare recipients to be more careful in their purchases of medical services. They point out that hospital charges have grown by more than a thousand percent, primarily from the "demand" created by patients who are the beneficiaries of government programs that pay a large share of the cost.

Greed pays a part, too. Patients expect (and sue if they don't get) uniformly successful results from medical treatment. Such results can never be guaranteed. Thus the cost of "defensive medical practice" and the cost of insurance to protect against the claims of disappointed patients has helped to skyrocket medical costs.

Some doctors have to bear a share of the blame, too. Those doctors (and other medical service providers) sometimes are like the little boy who sold the whistle to Franklin. They will take all the money available and give, or appear to give, added service just because the patient does not pay, directly, and does not object when the service, at the moment, appears overwhelmingly attractive.

There's probably no way to do it, but wouldn't it be nice if patients (like vacuum cleaner purchasers) could have, say, three days in which to disavow their contracts entered into a response to impulse buying, or overwhelming sales pressure?

Hunting Is Not A Competitive Sport

The power that drives this old world may well be what we generally call "competition." Certainly, the competitive urge makes things happen in work, business and athletics. But just as certainly, the introduction of competition has a disastrous

effect on the sport of hunting.

The man who heads for the game fields, and packs along the same competitive drives that motivate him in his working life, misses much. He is enslaved to the habit of comparing himself with others: "Did he take as many birds as the other guy? Was his buck the biggest in camp? Did he fill his license?" This poor soul never knows the pleasure of not having to prove anything, of doing something for its own sake.

In extreme cases, competitive hunting becomes not a sport at all, but rather an imprincipled drive to achieve, to win. At that point, the pursuit of game has nothing to do with ethical hunting.

The sportsman, though he enjoys good companions, is a solitary sort. Even while hunting with

friends, he makes his own judgments and evaluates the hunt in very personal terms. He establishes personal standards and lives by them. He knows that hunting is something that happens between him and the game, between him and the natural world.

For the competitor, time, money and luck are enough - sooner or later he will win if he spends enough and has enough. For the ethical hunter, time, money and luck are good to have, but not essential. Because he judges himself, and he sets his own rules, within the law, exclusive of what others may think or say.

That's the whole charm of hunting - doing something difficult and demanding for the simple sake of doing it. So that keeping score doesn't matter, and filling a license doesn't count. The important thing is doing it

right. And meeting the requirements that you establish for yourself. Solitary and individual.

Come to think of it, hunting is one of the very few things you can do in

this world according to rules you make for yourself. It doesn't make much sense to take the easy way out.

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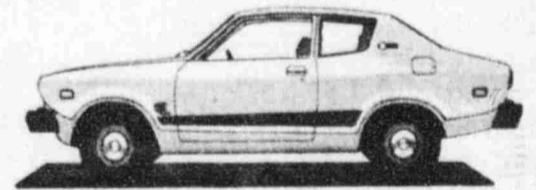
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The Wizard of Words

Environ (in vic run) means to form a circle around something, or to ring it, envelope it, enclose it. I may want to environ my new home - circle it - with Kentucky Blue Grass, for instance. Or to help keep the worms away, I may environ my garden - enclose it - with marigolds.

It is the principal's duty to environ his or her school with the atmosphere of learning, and create curiosity. The principal encircles the school with orderly structures; he envelops it with the dynamic presence of science and art; rings it round with beauty and truth. The principal environs the school; the teacher environs the classroom; the student environs his studies; encircles them with his attention, and envelops them with his creative wisdom.

The result of environing is an environment. Through my environing, I create an environment of Kentucky Blue Grass and marigolds. Through the environing of principals, teachers and students, the environment of the school is created. The environment is the collective result of all the things, attitudes and influences which have been environed.

The light, heat and sustaining power of the sun, for instance, environs the earth (encircles, envelops, encloses it). Naturally, with the environing action of the sun, the earth's environment - the collective result of the environing influences - would be drastically changed.

An environmentalist is someone who strives to environ his community - encircle, envelope it - with a practical sense of the inherent dignity, grace and wise sufficiency of the natural environment. An environmentalist works to integrate and harmonize the environing activities of his fellow earth citizens

with the environing process already on-going by old mama nature.

For instance, when a city begins to environ its streets - encircle, envelope, enclose them - with the noxious fumes of cars and industries, the environmentalist works to instill a sense of the self-cleansing, self-renewing aspects of the natural environment. When a society beings to environ its streams and lakes with chemical waste and debris, the environmentalist acts to bring the natural environing processes of filtering and purification into the awareness of city administrators and public utilities managers.

In today's column, I environed the word - encircled, surrounded, enveloped it - with my attitudes and insights. Environing is a natural process of suns, communities and peoples. To harmonize individual environing with the universal environment is the best of both social planning and creative artistry.

Environ means to encircle, envelope, enclose, as the "earth is environed by the infinite creation."

liaison can refer to any connecting relationship, such as between people, corporations or nations, or even between various words. Members of the same baseball team have liaisons with each other.

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
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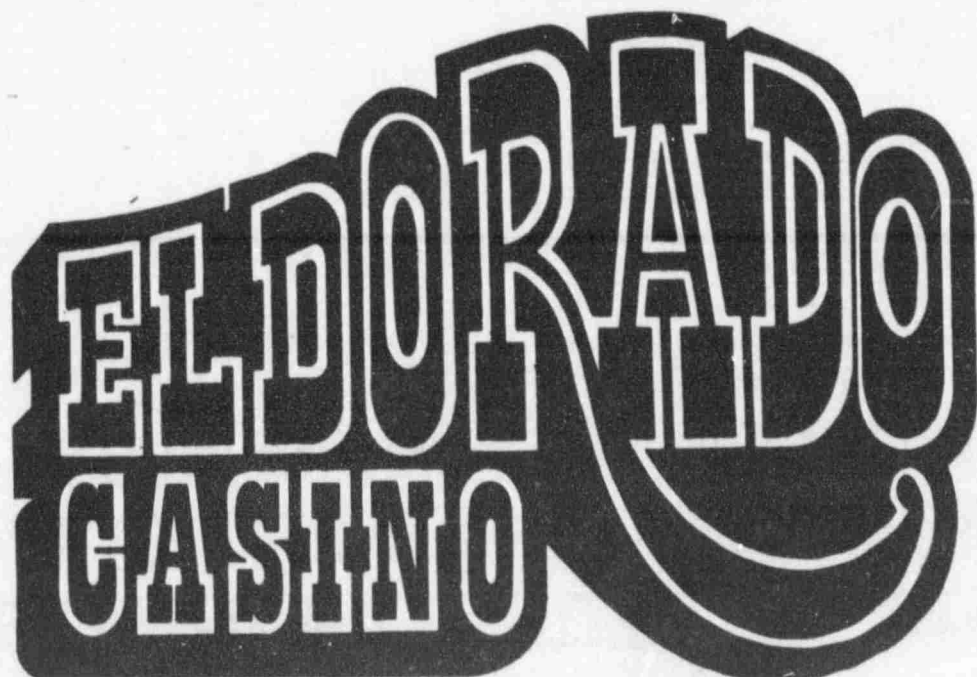

For anyone wishing to have a blooming Christmas cactus this year, October is the month to subject the succulent to the shock treatment it requires for budding.

There are several methods suggested to promote budding, none of which is more successful than the other. I would recommend using the method that is most suitable for you and, if that doesn't work this year, perhaps try another

method next year. You might also try experimenting with more than one plant.

Beginning in October, the plant needs a rest period of four to six weeks. Stop watering during this time. From six p.m. to eight a.m. each day, keep the cactus in total darkness. Christmas cacti need 14 hours of complete darkness daily during this shock period if they are to produce buds. The least amount of light will often inhibit bud formation. Cool temperatures are also required at this time.

If there is no danger of frost and the temperature range outside is 45 or 55, you may leave the cactus

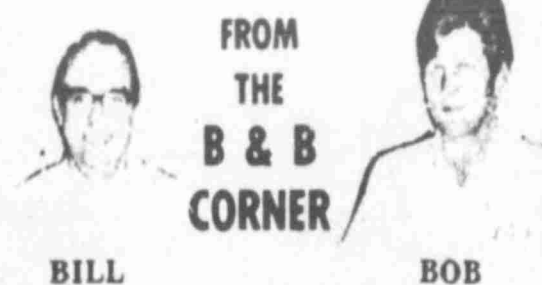

outdoors without water for the entire shock period. This method is less tedious and requires no extended darkness periods, but you must watch out for frost.

A third method recommended by some cactus enthusiasts is to let the plant dry out entirely during October until shrivelling begins to appear. Resume watering at this time and the cactus should start producing buds.

Christmas cacti are delightfully shaped succulents consisting of glossy round leaves connected in a chainlike fashion. The trailing chains make them attractive hanging plants, especially when their pend and flowers begin to bloom.

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Women And Social Security

Although social security touches the lives of everybody in one way or another, there are some aspects of the program that have special meaning to women. These features are discussed in a booklet called "A woman's guide to social security" which

is available at your nearest social security office.

The booklet is interesting and informative in that it focuses on how social security treats women in their varied roles -- as mothers, widows, divorcees, single, or married. A special publication for women was first published in 1964, and the present guide represents the latest of several revisions. The different versions reflect how the social security program changes in response to the changing needs of women as breadwinners and heads of households in their own right.

Today women constitute 40 percent of the total workforce and 47 percent of all women work. They make up 24 percent of all heads of households, according to the Department of Labor's Women's Bureau.

As a worker, a woman earns social security protection for herself and her family on the same basis as a male worker. She gets benefits if she retires or becomes disabled after having worked long enough under social security. Her dependents also may be entitled to benefits when she retires or becomes disabled. If she dies, her widower and minor children, or dependent parents 62 or over may be eligible for payments.

Until recently, one difference between the women and the male worker was that the husband of a

woman worker generally had to prove he was dependent on her in order to qualify for social security benefits, while a wife did not. A recent Supreme Court decision deleted the dependency requirements for husbands. Thus, if you are getting disability or retirement benefits, your husband may also qualify for payments on your earnings record if he is 62 or over. To qualify for survivors benefits on your social security record, he must be 60 or older, or between 50 and 60 and disabled, or caring for their children under 18 or disabled.

The booklet points out that a wife, regardless of age, can get social security payments if her husband becomes disabled or retires if she is caring for a child under 18 or a disabled child who is entitled to benefits. Without a child in her care, a wife must be 62 or older to get social security benefits when her husband retires or becomes disabled. The amount of the payment at age 65 is 50 percent of what the husband gets at age 65, but a wife can elect to draw reduced benefits at age 62. Medicare also starts at age 65.

A widow with minor children in her care may be entitled to widowed mother's benefits at any age. The payments continue until the youngest child reaches age 18 and later if she is caring for a child who becomes disabled before age 22.

Widows without dependent children may get reduced benefits at age 60.

Ordinarily a widow cannot receive social security benefits if she remarries. But if she remarries at age 60 or older, her widow's benefit can continue although it will be reduced. If her new husband receives social security checks, she can get a wife's benefit on his record if it would be larger than her reduced widow's payment.

The booklet includes other such useful tips as a reminder to notify social security whenever you change the name you use in employment, and how to report wages of household help for social security purposes.

In addition to Safeway's construction, the Shaver Investment Corporation, Lake Tahoe, Nevada, owners of the large site adjacent to the Safeway store, have reported that they are planning development in the near future of a shopping center integrated with the Safeway store. Negotiations are currently underway with several businesses for stores in the shopping center, the Shaver firm commented, and as soon as key leases are firmed up the construction will be scheduled.

Community Colleges Study Subcommittee To Meet

Assemblyman Thomas J. Hickey, (D) - Las Vegas, has announced a two-day meeting of the Legislative Commission's Study Subcommittee on Community Colleges in Nevada.

Assemblyman Hickey, Chairman of the Study Subcommittee, has set the first meeting for 1:30 p.m., October 18th and the second meeting for 8 a.m., October 19th, at the Little Theater on the campus of the Clark County Community College.

The meeting on the first day will give the subcommittee a chance to organize and determine study objectives. The second day's meeting will provide University officials, faculty, employees, and the public an opportunity to present testimony on the Community College System.

In announcing the meetings Assemblyman Hickey noted that "the last session of the legislature saw considerable controversy on the questions of Community College organization and on the need for additional campuses in the Las Vegas and rural areas." Assemblyman Hickey indicated that "the subcommittee plans to fully explore these questions as well as to assess the future need of Nevada residents for Community Colleges."

In addition to Assemblyman Hickey, Senators Gibson, Glaser, Raggio, Sheerin, and Assemblyman Bremner, Ross, Sena and Serpa are serving on the Study panel.

Gambling

O Nevada Wicked State
Cut the gambling ere to late
Lift yourself out of the mire--
Throw the crap game in the fire.

The poem appeared in the Feb. 10, 1909 issue of the Reno Evening Gazette expressing not only the sentiments of its Oklahoma author but of many Nevadans bent on cleansing their state of gambling. The crusade lasted 70 years but in 1931 the "intolerable and inexcusable vice" prevailed when Gov. Fred Blazer signed Assembly Bill No. 98 lifting all gamblings restrictions.

Gambling in Nevada began as early as 1850 when a Carson Valley resident set up games to attract California-bound emigrants. But it was after the Comstock Lode strike in 1859 that gambling established a strong foothold in the area.

"Thousands of California miners crowded into what would become Nevada. They brought with them their gamblers and their gambling habits," wrote Dr. Roske. "Dice games and roulette were popular gambling pastimes, as were the card games, poker, faro and monte."

When the U.S. Congress created the Nevada territory in 1861, opposition to gambling erupted under the administration of territorial Gov. James Nye, who passed strong laws banning it. Convicted owners and employees of casinos could be imprisoned for as long as two years and fined as much as \$5,000. Patrons were guilty of a misdemeanor and faced six-month jail sentences and \$500 fines.

Because of its extreme penalties the law was almost totally unenforced. When Nevada became a state in 1864 a new anti-gambling statute was passed reducing the crime of running a gambling establishment to a misdemeanor. The purpose was rigorous enforcement by lessening the previous penalties, according to Dr. Roske.

Gambling legislation see-sawed from amendment to amendment between 1869 and 1909, but with the advent of the Progressive Age in early 1900's came a spirit of reform. Gambling, along with prostitution and drunkenness, became a cause celebre for the Progressives.

The anti-gambling crusade gained a new fervor not known since the days of the "coffee and chocolate governor" Henry G. Bladell who in his 1866 state of the state address blasted gambling as "and intolerable and inexcusable vice."

2. Don't look at the menu. If you are on a weight reduction program, you know what you can have. Ask for it. If you look at the menu and don't see that right food, you may hesitate to ask for it or you may be trapped into ordering something which you know you shouldn't eat.

3. Order a salad and/or coffee immediately. Move the basket of rolls and/or condiments to the other side of the table. If you have something to eat which meets your diet requirements, and if you are not confronted with the constant temptation of nibbling, you will find it much easier to follow the food program.

4. Be the first one in your party to order. This avoids the "me, too" syndrome and keeps you safely on the good side of a major trap.

5. Dessert should be no problem. Melon, grapefruit, or fresh fruit cup, or other fruits are a safe bet and usually available.

So go ahead. Celebrate National Restaurant Month. Admire the restaurant's decor. Enjoy your friends company. Be cordial to the Maitre D, and send your compliments to the Chef for helping you stay on your diet.

What Is The Definition Of Roads

On occasion in this column I have discussed the bureaucratic snafus many of you run into dealing with the federal government. Today, I'd like to tell you of an experience this office had with the red-tape machine here in Washington.

The whole episode began with my simple request (or so I thought) to the Department of Interior and the Forest Service for their definitions of the word "road." You see, these agencies are engaged in a project to review so-called "roadless" areas on public lands around the country to determine which tracts might be suitable for possible designation as "wilderness" areas -- if a parcel is "roadless" it can become a candidate for a "wilderness" designation.

Upon first hearing of these reviews it occurred to me that many of Nevada's lands have roads used by ranchers and hunters, but these paths are maintained largely through their use and aren't paved or looked after formally. I could smell trouble.

Interior's Assistant Secretary for Land and Water Resources replied to my request (I expect to hear from the Forest Service shortly). He said our state has 8 million acres of estimated "roadless" areas. The Secretary then went on to give what he said was the modified version of a definition for "roads." It read, "An access route, not a 'way,' that is improved and maintained to ensure relatively regular use by vehicles having four or more wheels." This 22-word definition was then augmented by a 100-word explanation of the definition. For instance, relatively regular use is, "On a recurring frequency, and having a demonstrated need or purpose, use will recur for a predetermined, planned, or intended purpose; for example, equipment access to maintain a stock water tank, or private access however, casual or random vehicle use by off-road vehicles or recreationists will not qualify." That explanation of three words is 27 words longer than the definition itself!

The reason this whole issue of "roadless" vs. control. In this regard I have some correspondence on the matter between my office and the agencies as well as copies of letters sent from our state government to Washington. One letter in particular stands out. It was written by Thomas Ballow, Executive Director of the Nevada Department of Agriculture. Mr. Ballow was writing to Vern Thompson, Supervisor of the Humboldt National Forest on this matter of "roadless" vs. those areas with roads. He makes the following point talking about traditional uses of some of the parcels the Forest Service would define as "roadless." "You could get run over by a bus or car but the map (Forest Service's) would show a roadless area. Of course, this is absolutely unreasonable. No reasonable man would consider such an area as a roadless area. We recommend that the roadless area parameter boundary should be no closer than line of sight to the road. If you can see a truck or bus from a road to a point, then that point should not be included in a roadless area. Another rule of thumb could be a day's hike or about twenty miles. Certainly, an individual packing into a roadless or wilderness area doesn't want to hear, see or smell automobiles, diesel trucks, buses or trains." Mr. Ballow exhibits a lot of common sense and good judgement. It was refreshing to read a simple, clear explanation of an equitable way to judge an area as "roadless" or "roadless."

"roadless" set me off is because I suspected Washington's definition of "roads" might be such that Nevada and many other Western states could find themselves with much of their public land declared "roadless" and eligible for "wilderness" designation. Unfortunately, my misgivings were borne out when I considered the above explanation of a few words in the original definition plus Interior's added note that improved means, "Where an action has been directed to create a graded condition." And way is defined as, "An access route maintained solely by the passage of vehicles." Most of those areas we travel for either business or pleasure in rural Nevada, and consider "roads" after years of service, could be wiped out in the bureaucratic scheme of things through a masterstroke of gobbledygook.

All of this could lead to a very serious consequence. Should much of our public land be determined "roadless," and thereby eligible for "wilderness" designation, large tracts would be "sterilized" by Washington. No development or commercial use of any kind could be made of these parcels. Things are tough now with BLM, but they could be worsened. Recognizing that, I decided to start at square one and see what developed. There was no need to go to square two. We're trying to settle up here at the beginning with the agencies before any "wilderness" inventory gets too far down the road, so to speak, and out of our

Assemblyman Don Mello, D-Sparks, has announced the first meeting of the committee formed by the 1977 Legislature to study the fiscal conditions of local governments in Nevada. The study panel was created by the legislature after the Executive Director of the Nevada League of Cities indicated that both the League and the Nevada Association of County Commissioners' legislative priority was for a hard, close look at the fiscal health of Nevada's local governments.

Assemblyman Mello, Chairman of the Study Committee, has set the meeting for Thursday, October 13th, 10 a.m., in the Personnel Conference Room, first floor of the Las Vegas City Hall, 400 Stewart Avenue, Las Vegas. Other committee members are Senator Jim

Gibson and Assemblyman Paul May, Clark County; Senator Margie Foote, Washoe County; Las Vegas City Attorney Mike Sloan; Clark County Comptroller Darrel Daines; Wells Vice Mayor Catherine Igoa; and Sparks Mayor James Lillard.

The 1977 Legislature directed the committee to study local government fiscal management, short and long term revenue and expenditure trends, the utilization of existing sources of revenue, personnel and collective bargaining costs, and alternative sources of future revenue.

In announcing the meeting, Assemblyman Mello noted that, "While the legislature has assigned an extensive workload to the Committee, it should, with hard work, long hours, and lots

Well, the kids are back in school; the air has turned a little cooler and you can actually pull out onto the Nevada Highway without waiting twenty minutes for a break in traffic.

To most people across the nation, vacation time is over and thoughts have turned to bracing for the long grey winter. But, to many of us who live in the warmer climates and have a National Recreation Area in our backyard, thoughts have turned to warm sunny days, pleasantly cool nights and the chance to get out and do those things that we have waited all summer to do.

But before we go charging out into the desert back country to camp or scramble over the rocky country - side in search of those precious stones, there are a few things worth remembering. Fall is a beautiful time of the year to recreate in the desert; however, there are a few hazards that are inherent with this time of the year. The weather can be very unpredictable. One moment it may be sunny and warm and the next moment you might be trying to escape a heavy thundershower. Thundershowers may not only spoil a picnic, they also present a hazard in the form of flash - flooding. Never camp in a ravine

or wash and take to high ground if it starts to rain or you suspect rain in the high country.

Another hazard might be found under the rock or old mine timber. The "creepie - crawlies" which have been absent from view during the hot summer days may now be seen "creeping and crawling" in the cooler weather. Most of the creatures are perfectly harmless, making the desert a more interesting place to explore. Some, however, can inflict a painful (though seldom fatal) sting or bite. Rattle snakes, scorpions and black widow spiders are generally shy and hide under rocks and in rock

crevices. Always watch where you walk and never put your hands into dark areas without first checking for local residents. It is always a good idea to shake out clothing that has been exposed to areas where scorpions and spiders may live. That old pair of blue jeans or beach towel may look like the perfect place to a scorpion for a new home. Remember that these small creatures, like most animals that live within the Recreation Area, are protected. They play an important part in this desert environment and should be left alone.

Some other hints for safe desert travel:

1. Always tell someone where you are going and when you plan to return.
 2. Always carry a first aid kit, plenty of water and extra food.
 3. Be sure that your vehicle is in good running condition and that vehicle emergency equipment (flashlight, spare tire, jack, etc.) is serviceable.
 4. Finally, be sure that YOU are in good condition. Don't overdo it. Physical stress and exhaustion can kill... know when to quit.
