

Council Votes Not To Abandon Market Street For Parking

"It is absolutely essential for part of Market Street to be abandoned because the parking situation is in terrible shape," Bill Boyd, who along with his father Sam Boyd owns the Eldorado Club, related during a public hearing on their controversial request for the street vacation.

"We have spent in excess of \$1.5 million on our expansion and remodeling. We are now 95 per cent finished and the 185 spaces available to the public we now have will not

be enough."

Boyd explained that an additional 115 spaces could be gained, making room for a 300 space controlled parking lot, well lighted with a 24 hour attendant, similar to the Silver Nuggets.

There would be a 50 cent charge to park, refundable upon presentation of a validated ticket from the club's cashier's cage.

"Whether the council approves the vacation request or not, we intend to fence in our parking facilities and have a controlled parking situation," Boyd declared.

Tony Marnell, architect for the Eldorado, told the council that "the city has to make way for private developers to provide private parking as cities cannot afford to provide public parking."

Attorney Monte Morris, representing Pratt Prince who opposed the vacation, compared the vacating of the street to a little finger.

"Your little finger might not be of great value to your hand but cut it off and you'll never get it back again."

"Besides," he continued, "all that old asphalt has sentimental value."

The other main opponent to the vacation, the Rainbow Club, was represented by Attorney George Rudiac.

"Is it a private benefit or a public benefit?" he asked. "Why not buy Water Street or Boulder Highway?"

"We don't own Boulder Highway," Councilman Carlton Lawrence answered.

Rudiac revealed that "the Rainbow Club is looking at some property to buy" though he would not reveal the exact location - "but across from the club that would provide 60 parking spaces."

"Sixty public parking spaces on the Catholic Church property should be furnished by the Rainbow Club," Boyd replied. "We have done it for years ... it's about time they do."

Though the staff of the city's Planning Department had given a nod of approval to the vacation some months earlier, the planning commission had turned thumbs down on the request at their September meeting.

Following Monday night's public hearing, Councilman Gary Price made the motion to

concur with the planning commission's recommenda-

tion.

Councilwoman Lorna Kesterson compared the parking situation to the weather. "Everyone talks about it but no one does anything about it. At least the Boyds have made a start."

When the final vote was taken, Mayor Lorin Williams and Kesterson favored the vacation. Voting against it were Councilmen Phil Stout, Gary Price and Carlton Lawrence.

Las Vegas Downs To Report Progress Nov. 7

A report on the progress of Las Vegas Downs race track construction will be presented to the city council Monday night.

At the request of the council, a report was to have been given at the Monday council meeting, however, Ted Dotson, attorney for the Downs, asked that the item be postponed until Nov. 7.

City Manager Bob Campbell told the council he had received a call from Dotson asking that the item be postponed. At the last inquiry of the council it was brought out that penalties against the Downs equal around \$59,000.

-- Approved a resolution of intent to rezone six acres of land in section 4 for a travel trailer development for Floyd and Pearl Osborn.

-- Approved a resolution of intent to rezone 20 acres in section 33 for trailer estates with horses.

-- Sent to committee an ordinance to rezone a portion of section 8 from Rural residence to single family residences.

-- Sent to committee an ordinance to rezone a portion of section 34 from R-R to commercial for the Old Vegas Development.

-- Sent a land committee meeting for the Charles H. Meyers land request to Oct. 24.

-- Set a public hearing for Nov. 7 for revenue sharing funds.

A proposal which would provide for parking in the center of Market Street to relieve the shortage of parking in the downtown area, submitted by Art Liebert and Dick Thurmon of the Rainbow Club, is expected to be studied by city officials.

Home News Paper Boy Injured

Chuck Adamson, 16, of 119 Fir Street was injured Tuesday afternoon in a bicycle accident on Center St. He was transported to the hospital by ambulance.

Councilwoman Lorna Kesterson asked City Manager Bob Campbell to study the proposal and submit a recommendation to the city council.

Handicapped Get Break On Water Bills Here

An ordinance giving reduced water rates for eligible disabled persons was approved by the city council Monday night.

The action would reduce the water bills for eligible persons by \$60 per year. A similar ordinance is already in effect for elderly retired persons.

Joan Taylor, the city's representative for the handicapped, spoke to the council, stating that many handicapped persons do not want special treatment. "Many of them are too proud to accept help," she

said. "The tool is here for them if they want it," Councilman Gary Price said.

Councilman Carlton Lawrence, sponsor of the ordinance, said that criteria would be set up to determine who is eligible. He said that they must be totally handicapped and heads of households and must make application.

The base charge of \$5 per month paid by other customers would be eliminated for the elderly and the handicapped. They would continue to pay for the water they use.



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



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THE PANAMA CANAL IS AN AMERICAN AFFAIR

Difficulties between Columbia and the Panama Railroad continued during the entire construction period, causing trouble for the United States long after the railroad had been completed.

In February 1852, festivities were planned on Manzanillo Island, the terminal site of the railroad. On this island where Columbus had landed many years older, the cornerstone of the first brick building on the terminal was being laid. In a formal ceremony, the new city was christened Aspinwall, honoring William H. Aspinwall, president of the Panama Railroad Company.

Columbia officials immediately repudiated the gesture, renaming the city Colon, in honor of the island's discoverer.

Panama Railroad officials refused to honor the Colombian decision. For years the confusion continued, with some calling the city Aspinwall and other calling it

Colon. Mail was addressed variously to Aspinwall, Colon, Colon - Aspinwall, and other variations of the two names. Finally in 1890, Colombia issued orders to its postal department that any matter addressed to Aspinwall or any variation thereof be returned to sender. The railroad had to capitulate. Colon the city has been called ever since.

Despite all the difficulties, railroad construction continued. In a driving rain at midnight, January 27, 1855, the rails were finally joined, some ten miles from Panama City.

The mighty oceans had finally been united by steel rails through American technology and initiative. The job had taken five years and cost \$8,000,000. In accordance with the original treaty, the railroad company was now awarded permanent title to 250,000 acres of real estate on the Isthmus of Panama.

Programs that were offered ranged from "How To" to practical sessions to discussion of the latest developments in the field of Recreation and Parks, and the philosophical overtones and social implications of todays working situations. It was a week of reaching out, communicating and of learnings. The congress provided an excellent opportunity in bringing delegates together to share ideas, problems, concerns, successes and accomplishments.

The annual gathering of Recreation and Parks professionals and citizen supporters, as well as others whose work has an impact on the movement, offered an invaluable opportunity to share experiences and expertise and to go home refreshed and invigorated.

Highlighting the congress, Governor O'Callaghan was on hand to greet the delegates at the Opening General Session of the Congress. The Honorable James A. Joseph, Under Secretary of the

The Siamese cat (unlike other cats) has the distinction of owning a lovely white coat for summer and changing to a fuller, warmer, and









Freedom In Our Hands

Every time you pick up your newspaper at your doorstep or take it out of your mailbox, freedom is in your hands.

Your newspaper is a living, everyday illustration of the freedom that is embodied in the very first amendment to the Constitution of the United States of America. The Founding Fathers of this nation, who wrote the blueprint for the greatest experiment in government the world had ever seen, felt so strongly about freedom that they themselves annexed the Bill of Rights amendments before the Constitution could be submitted to the several sovereign states for formal ratification.

Through its free choice to present the news, to interpret the news, and to make comment on the news, your newspaper in every edition relies upon those basic rights and freedoms. In the process of pursuing its every day duties and obligations to you, your newspaper stands as the first line of defense against any action or any effort that may tend to infringe upon those rights and freedoms.

What is the newspaper's freedom is your freedom. One is dependent upon the other. One cannot be free without the other.

Every newspaper reader has the freedom of his or her choice in selecting the newspaper, the stories, the features, or the editorials he or she may want to read. Every reader has the freedom to respond to any of those articles or to any of those commentaries. As long as

choice is readily available and the avenue of response is open, your freedom is secured.

When you have no choice or you cannot take issue, the freedom of the press is imperiled and your freedoms are consequently restricted.

Certainly newspapers are different. Certainly they reflect opposing views. Certainly they support conflicting ideas. Certainly they espouse different programs and policies.

As surely as there are different types of readers, there are different types of newspapers. This in itself is the guarantee that freedom belongs to both the press and the public. That fact is important and essential to our system.


As surely as there are differences, both in the press and in the public, there will be those who are critical of the press. That, too, ensures a basic freedom.

Think back to the years and the circumstances that produced the totalitarian regimes in Europe. Did any Italian newspaper endure under Mussolini? Was any German newspaper permitted to take issue with Hitler?

Essential to their control and power was a press that presented only what they wanted presented. There was no choice or freedom, either for the press or for the public.

They could not afford to permit the press to be free because they could not allow the people the freedom of thought, choice and expression.

Freedom is basic and essential to all of us. When you have your newspaper in your hand, you have freedom in your hand.

The Coles love Dallas Alice for she has come through as a Champion regardless of being cast



MDA OFFERS PATIENTS FREE FLU SHOTS

The Southern Nevada Chapter of the Muscular Dystrophy Association is offering free anti influenza inoculations again this year to patients afflicted by muscular dystrophy or related neuromuscular diseases, Mrs. Joyce Avery, president of the chapter announced.

MDA's medical advisors recommend that patients seven to 18 years of age be given a single dose of split-virus vaccine and that patients six years old or younger be given two

doses of the split-virus vaccine, separated by an interval of four weeks or more in order to achieve satisfactory antibody responses, Mrs. Avery said. Whole-virus vaccine is recommended for patients 18 or older.

The whole and split-virus vaccines are being made available by the U.S. Department of Health, Education and Welfare this year and are for protection against both A-Victoria and B-Hong Kong influenza, Mrs. Avery said.

Swine flu vaccine will not be made available this year, because it is unlikely that swine flu virus will constitute a medical threat in 1977-78.

Children with neuromuscular diseases are considered at high risk of serious illness if inflicted with influenza viruses and should receive flu shots annually, Mrs. Avery said. Other vaccines should not be administered at the same time, however, and patients allergic to eggs

should not be vaccinated.

The Southern Nevada Chapter of MDA will pay for flu shots given to all patients it serves, whether shots are administered by patients' personal physicians or by physicians at the MDA clinic.

MDA supports 181 clinics throughout the U.S. including Puerto Rico and Guam. The MDA clinic serving this area is located at the Sunrise Hospital Medical Center.


Congressman Howard Baker To Speak To Republicans

Extension Specialist At U. of Nevada Reminds Parents about Halloween Costume Safety

Goblins, witches, and maybe the big pumpkin can be "spooky" things to young trick or treaters on Halloween night.

But, while these things prefer mystical danger, a child's halloween costume can be a real hazard.

Mrs. Jean Margerum, Cooperative Extension Specialist in Clothing and Textile at the University of Nevada, once again issues a reminder to parents that safety should be kept in mind on "Trick or Treat" night. It's not far off now.

She suggests that the costumes be planned ahead with the idea of preventing an accident or a miserable cold. The costume should be warm as well as safe.

Clear vision for the youngster, she says, can be insured by using makeup for facial disguise rather than covering the face with the usual mask. Streaks of lipstick, eyebrow pencil, eyeshadow in blues, greens, and purples can quickly create a clown face or a "man from mars" look.

If masks are used, she continued, cut the eye openings plenty large so vision can't possibly be impaired. And, avoid masks that inhibit breathing.

It's a good idea to add reflective strips of tape to jackets, hats, sleeves and pant legs. "Trick or Treating" is done at night and the reflective tape greatly increases the chances that motorists will see children as they walk residential roads. Clothing, even white, does not show up like the tape, Mrs. Margerum says. Bicycles, wagons and even shoe soles can be quickly decorated with the adhesive tape. (The tape is available usually from some dime stores, bicycle shops and hobby shops.)

Of considerable importance from a safety standpoint, Mrs. Margerum points out, is to use flame proof costumes. Children will probably be near lighted jack-o-lanterns or other sources of fire during their evening frolic with the ghosts. Remember that sheer, loosely woven fabrics burn more easily than heavy, tightly woven clothes.

If long or bulky costumes are used, be sure that your youngster can walk easily without tripping. Children excited by the outing and not paying attention can be awkward and dressing them in cumbersome, oversize clothing makes moving around that much more of a problem.

Mrs. Margerum suggests planning for a costume that will include a cap or hat, a warm vest or jacket and warm pants to prevent body chilling. Body heat is lost most rapidly from the head, so hats are a must in cold weather. Knitted caps are too porous to keep out wind, so a tightly woven fabric with a lining or a leather-type cap is better. If the torso is kept extra warm, she concludes, body heat will move into hands and feet.

Excess Lands Hearings Announced

Locations and guidelines for public hearings in El Centro, California and Phoenix, Arizona in November to receive testimony on proposed regulations affecting excess irrigated lands on Bureau of Reclamation Projects were announced today by Lower Colorado Regional Director Manuel Lopez, Jr.

The El Centro hearing November 21 will be at the Imperial County

Fairgrounds located 3 miles north of El Centro on Highway 86. The Phoenix hearing will be November 22 in the Civic Plaza Convention Center at 225 East Adams. Each hearing will be from 9 a.m. to 12 noon and 1 p.m. to 5 p.m., continuing from 6:30 p.m. until conclusion.

Lopez said requests to testify at the hearings should be sent to his office: Regional Director, Lower Colorado Region.

Bureau of Reclamation, Attention: 400, Boulder City, Nevada 89005, Tele: (702) 293-8652. The deadline for receipt of requests is five days before each hearing.

Oral presentations will be limited to 10 minutes in order to accommodate the large number of people who are expected to request time to be heard, the Reclamation official explained.

High-ranking officials

and technical personnel from the Department of the Interior will attend the two hearings which are among the 10 that will be held throughout the West. All will be held in November. Court reporters will make transcripts of each hearing.

Lopez said the proposed regulations affect lands in excess of 160 acres to which water from Reclamation projects can be delivered under Reclamation law. They were developed as a result of a Federal District Court decision in August 1976 which directed the Bureau of Reclamation to initiate public rulemaking procedures in the sale of excess lands on Reclamation Projects.

In 1950 the total expenditures by the federal, state and local levels of government in these United States was 34% of the personal income; in 1974 it was 40%; in 1976 it is estimated to be 42%. A disturbing factor here is that government salaries are a part of the personal income and also a major part of the total government expenditures. When the government salaries are subtracted from personal income, the percentage of government expenditures to personal income (for the most recent period) changes dramatically, increases to 46% in 1974 in place of 40%, the 1950 percentage remains at 34% which tells us quite a lot. It tells us how much faster government costs have increased since 1950 -- Government salaries are now a meaningful portion of the personal income.

We speak of conserving a bit of our heritage for future generations; of saving a piece of wilderness, etc., for our children and their children to visit and enjoy.

There is another viewpoint of that which we are leaving our children.

When our son was 12 years old, the Federal government debt was \$252,770,000,000. The federal debt this year is estimated at \$690,000,000,000, and one of our grandchildren is 12 years of age. When our son was 12 years old, the per capita Federal debt was \$1,855. My grandson owes \$3,300 today. What it will be soon, we can only guess. We do know that, with current budget predictions, it will be at least \$60 more by the end of next year.

Total annual government per capita costs -- federal, state and local -- was \$468 when our son was 12. The total now is in excess of \$2,500.

When my son was 12, the maximum combined social security tax paid by me and my employer was 2% of \$3,000 or \$60 per year. This year, 1977, the combined rate is 11.7% of \$16,200 or \$1,895.40 -- one half of which is \$947.70. What will it be in the near or distant future? Well -- I should worry, I'm 65 years old. Let the kids work hard to pay for my entitlement -- I now hope our kids are my greatest natural resource.

To put the social security bill into perspective, it should be compared to something. The property tax is being belabored by almost everyone as a bad tax -- a terrible unjustified impact. It is a heavy tax burden. The total property tax bill in the United States in 1975 was \$51.5 billion. The total bill for social security was \$67.6 billion -- \$16 billion more than the property tax bill and the fund is in a deficit position.

Judicial Planning Council To Meet

Supreme Court Justice E. M. "Al" Gunderson announced today that the second meeting of the Nevada Judicial Planning Council, which he chairs, will commence at 11 a.m. Friday, October 21 in the old Supreme Court room of the State Capitol Building in Carson City.

The planning council was created earlier this year as an official agency of the state Supreme Court. It is studying various projects which will improve the administration and operation of the Nevada Court System. In addition to Justice Gunderson, other members are: Justice Noel Manoukian, supreme court; Attorney General Robert List; District Judge Mike Fondi of Carson City; District Judge Addehlar Guy, Clark County; Justice of the Peace Edward Lunsford, Elko; Municipal Judge Clifford Segerblom, Boulder City; Justice of the Peace Richard Minor, Reno; Clark County Public Defender Morgan Harris; Las Vegas businessman Irwin Kishner; and John De Graff, director of the Administrative Office of the Nevada Court System.

A major point of the meeting will be a presentation by Professor Geoffrey Peters, director of the Creighton Legal Information Center, Creighton University School of Law, Omaha, Nebraska, on the rural legal informa-

tion center established by that school in 1974. The project has been credited with being an exemplary project by the National Institute of Law Enforcement and Criminal Justice. The Judicial Planning Council is considering establishing a similar project in Nevada.

It was the greatest moment for the local chamber, headed by the executive manager, Nell Olsen, and the Board of Directors and Pres. Jim Ordowski, for they did not hesitate to take on the work for they knew that this was an opportunity to further the fame and superiority of the "Oasis" in the desert. It worked! Our teams won the National Trophy. We won as well our place in the sun as a lively community going forward towards greatness with giant strides. It must be stressed that every business will benefit by joining the Chamber of Commerce. The Christmas Promotion is in full swing at this writing. If ever the NEWS benefited from advertising it is from the Chamber of Commerce. The good will of that fantastic group of business people welcomed, appreciated and as proof of our belief in them the NEWS is also a member.

It All Began in 1931 With Instant World Fame

The Las Vegas Rotary Club was addressed by Louis C. Crampton, gov-

ernment expert hired to accept and study all applicants who desired to open a business in Boulder City. By April 11 1931, Mr. Crampton had received 2366 applications for concessions at the new townsite. At this time there were 300 people living at the camp sites, with 800 men employed by various firms. By the end of 1931, Mr. Crampton had sorted thru 3000 applications and by mid-1932 there were 100 established businesses and you can be sure that Louis Crampton, special attorney for the Bureau of Reclamation, had sifted carefully. Later this task was taken over by Sims Ely, City Manager of Boulder City.

There were two of everything and there were four "Men's Wear" businesses. There were three dentists but only one doctor (Dr. J.R. McDaniel delivered our babies at home, at camp sites and in Las Vegas at a hospital if we insisted). We had the largest department store in Nevada, it was the gigantic Six Companies Inc: complex with every known product including furniture under one roof. It took full page ads in both of the then Las

Vegas papers (Elton Garrett as editor in chief had his office in the Big 6 building) and he handled everything for the town by the dam site! The Boulder City Builder's Supply Co: (later to be known as the busiest lumber and brick factory business in the state short of Six Companies's themselves) is the self same lumber yard we see on Nevada Highway, presently owned by a local business man who


plans great changes there.

It's History! The Browder Bldg. and the charming building housing Electronic Unlimited is about the only unchanged edifice of those historical beginnings. Central Market began in the blue medical building now owned by Dr. DeBellis but renovated by Dr. Wacsher and his wife, Eve. It had also been the "Elks Lodge" before they

purchased the TWA depot. Do our readers realize that TWA first began in Boulder City?







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Santini Co-Sponsors Home Buyers Bill

Representative Jim Santini has co-sponsored a bill in the House of Representatives to help first-time home buyers overcome the skyrocketing cost of housing.

The bill is tailor made for communities like Reno and Las Vegas which are experiencing sizeable growth and an influx of young families.

The bill, entitled the Young Families Housing Act, would permit the first-time home buyer to

save for a downpayment through a tax free savings account known as the "Individual Housing Account" (IHA).

Santini said the IHA would allow the potential home buyer to deposit up to \$2,500 per year in a tax free account and withdraw the money at any time to use in purchasing a home. The account could not exceed \$10,000.

"This bill will help make the dream of home

ownership a reality once again for the average American," Santini said. "It is especially geared to the young family buying a home for the first time."

It would also provide for a gradual monthly mortgage payment that would start low and rise slowly in proportion to the family's long-term income growth, he said.

"The bill provides positive buying incentives without creating another government giveaway program," Santini said.

He cited a booming housing industry and rising inflation as the two major reasons why many young people have been priced out of the housing market.

Timeless Question - Diana or Christ?

Christian Science lecturer George Louis Aghamalian of New York City chooses the title of a painting, "Diana or Christ?" as the subject of his lecture to be given on October 24 at 8 p.m. at Grace Community Church, 1150 Wyoming Street, Boulder City.

The painting -- depicting a Roman girl forced to choose between worshipping the goddess Diana or following the teachings of Christ Jesus signifies something more to Aghamalian than a mere record of one ancient decision. He feels that a timeless message can be derived from the painting.

"We still have to make

the same choice between the Christ and false gods" says lecturer. And he continues "What are some of these modern day gods that try to control our thinking? Fear, hatred, immorality, astrology, drug and alcohol addiction, discouragement, dishonesty."

Mr. Aghamalian defines "false gods" as those things which claim to have power and presence apart from God.

The decision between "Diana or Christ" needs to be made daily, says the lecturer; and the proper choice has a helpful, healing effect in our everyday affairs. Along this line, Aghamalian recounts instances of healing -- healings of physical problems, rocky personal relationships, and financial lack.

As a Christian Scientist, Aghamalian feels that the Christ -- the power and presence of God, and man's relation of sonship to Him -- is a timeless force for good. The lecturer explains: "The Christ is God's presence, God's activity. This activity is always good. It enlightens. It harmonizes. It heals."

"Jesus of Nazareth was given the title of the Christ, because he understood and proved this divine presence more than any individual who ever lived" says the lecturer.

Aghamalian is a member of the Board of Lectureship of The First Church of Christ, Scientist, in Boston, Massachusetts. For more than 25 years he's been active in the healing

ministry of Christian Science, a denomination founded in the nineteenth century by Mary Baker Eddy. Christian Science churches around the world offer free public lectures such as this one which is sponsored by the Christian Science Society of Boulder City. A local Christian Scientist, Mrs. Helen H. Sadd Second Reader, will introduce Aghamalian.



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
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A COMMON SENSE APPROACH TO MAKING OUT A WILL

BOSTON, October 10 -- The drawing up of a legally recognized will is one of those somber chores that many of us put off indefinitely. Others, having performed the task once, fail to recognize the need to constantly update and revise the document as their financial life

changes. More importantly, as federal and state tax statutes change, even the most recently revised wills can be rendered ineffective. Contrary to popular belief, drawing up or revising a will is usually a simple and inexpensive

procedure. Yet, in 1975, 70 percent of the 1.9 million Americans who died left no will. Even people on the lower end of the economic ladder can point to estate potential far exceeding what one would normally estimate. You don't have to own a palatial home to

have an "estate." Group life insurance, company profit-sharing, pension plans and social security benefits all constitute estate potential that should be considered in drawing up a will.

Although the restructuring of the tax rate system in 1976 eases the tax burden of smaller estates, the consequences of a poorly outlined will may substantially diminish the value of your estate.

There are three steps that can be taken now to ensure your wishes are carried out at the time of death.

- Retain the services of

a trusted family lawyer or contact a local professional lawyers' organization for the names of lawyers who can assist you in drawing up a will. Fees vary, but a basic will is relatively inexpensive. Don't hesitate to inquire in advance about the lawyer's fees. You'll need a complete inventory of assets. Include: savings, stocks and bonds, life insurance, all property (home, car, furniture, etc.) or anything else that may be of value to the heirs.

- After a review of your list of assets, the lawyer will need to know your plan for distribution. He

should be shown deeds, bank books, stock certificates and other documents to best advise you whether a change in title might be prudent in order to save taxes. Also, in the event of the death of your chief beneficiary - you and your wife are killed in an accident, for instance - who will receive the benefits?

- The lawyer will also ask you to appoint an executor whose chief responsibility is overseeing distribution according to terms of the will. A simple, modest estate could be served, in the interest of economy, by your spouse or trusted

relative. A more complex estate frequently requires the services of a co-executor, such as a bank.

In the case of a substantial estate, it might be wise to consider the services of a qualified estate planner. All lawyers can draw a simple will, but a lawyer who specializes in estate planning may be more versed in the ramifications of estate and inheritance taxes.

If you already have a will, it should be reviewed from time to time. A revision may be necessary if any of the conditions listed below have occurred:

- The death of the will's executor.
- You've moved to another state or country.
- Acquisition of new assets.
- A change in the state inheritance laws.
- Federal estate tax laws are altered.
- Your marital status has changed.
- A child, now grown, no longer needs as much help, or another child may need more help than his brothers or sisters.
- And finally, the will should be viewed as a living document. It reflects your situation today and ability to provide for loved ones in the future.

VA Question & Answers

Q. - I have remarried since the death of my veteran husband. My child is receiving benefits as a result of his father's death. If my present husband adopts the child, will the VA benefits be terminated?

A. - No. Adoption does not affect the benefits payable to the child as the result of the natural parent's service.

Q. - Is burial in a national cemetery permit-

ted for all veterans or just those who are destitute?

A. - Burial in a national cemetery is available to any veteran who was discharged under conditions other than dishonorable. There are no income considerations.

Q. - I have a \$10,000 Service-Disabled Veterans Insurance policy. When will I get my first dividend?

A. - Present laws do not provide for dividends on this insurance.

Q. - What is the maximum amount of work-study hours available to a G.I. Bill student for one year?

A. - Veterans-students enrolled full time may complete a maximum 250 hours under the work-study program per semester, or 750 hours in each calendar year.

Q. - I receive VA pension, and am also going to school under the G.I. Bill. Are my benefits considered income for pension purposes?

A. - Yes, but amounts actually spent for education expenses may be deducted from this. You should report the entire amount, along with any deductible expenses.

Q. - Is the widow of a veteran killed in service entitled to a VA home loan?

A. - An unmarried widow of a veteran who died while on active duty may receive VA home loan benefits on a one-time basis.

Q. - I have lost my original discharge paper. Can the VA help?

A. - Your local VA office can assist you in obtaining a certificate in lieu of the lost document.

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Salazar Tabbed Number One UNLV Grappling Find

Gone however, because of academic reasons or other personal problems are seven other lettermen whose combined record included 105 wins.

With this split of five lettermen returning and seven lost, coach Finfrock could have a pessimistic outlook heading into the upcoming season. Instead, Finfrock predicts the Rebels will have another strong year.

Finfrock has had what he describes as a "bumper recruiting

year." His number one find is Anthony Salazar, a four-time Nevada AAA high school state wrestling champ. Salazar, out of Basic High School in nearby Henderson, Nevada, ran off 38 straight wins his senior year. He compiled a career prep record of 105 victories with only four losses. Salazar is regarded by many as one of the top prospects in the entire country.

Joining Salazar is freshmen John Everett of Eldorado High School, who was also undefeated as a senior (35-0), and posted a 94-7 career mark.

Tim Billingsley, a two-time Nevada State champion from Winnemucca, Nevada, will be under Finfrock's guidance this season as will single year title winners Mark Tomlinson and David Pearce who wrestled for Finfrock when he was coaching in the high school ranks. John Washington is another one-time Nevada state champ (1976), and high

school All-American last year.

Other incoming freshmen include Ted Law, a European schoolboy champion; New Jersey native Bill Jackson; Craig Schaner from Michigan; and local recruits Jaun Manzur, Mike McGuire, and Rich Swan.

Several of the new wrestling Rebels for the 1977-78 season will come by way of the junior college system. A quick peek at this group reveals a half-dozen of the nation's finest: Tyrone Rose is a junior college All-American and a California high school state champion as well.

Howard Fritner is a twice-crowned Arizona prep champion who also placed fourth in the NJCAA tournament. Mike Garcia, a splendid wrestler from Arizona, won two high school state titles and was named a junior college All-American twice.

Finally there is big Brad Stohr, an undefeated junior college

heavyweight two years running. Stohr is the strongest man on the team and one of the strongest on any of the UNLV athletic teams. Stohr can bench press an amazing 480 pounds. He was the Washington state high school champ.

The Rebels also have an attractive, first-rate schedule with dual meets against Utah State University, UCLA, University of Arizona, Stanford, Drake University, Idaho State University, Arizona State, and the University of Utah. The Rebels will also meet the powerful Athletes in Action squad in an exhibition match in Las Vegas.

The Rebels will also host the third Rebels Wrestling Classic, and participate in the University of Arizona Tournament, the San Francisco State Invitational and a 16-team tourney at Biola College.

Therefore, with the personnel on this year's edition, and a schedule as fine as any for a

second-year program, Finfrock should enjoy this year as nicely as he enjoyed the first UNLV wrestling season.
