

## Nine Finalists For Safety Chief Being Screened Here

A candidate for council approval for the newly created position of Public Safety Director is expected to be selected by mid-December and working by mid-January, according to City Manager Bob Campbell.

The number of candidates for the position has been cut from over 200 to nine, Camp-

bell said, and three are present city employees.

The three Henderson men are Fire Battalion Chief Bob Blankenship, a 14-year veteran of the department; Captain James Goff, head of operations of the police department and Lt. Tom Thompson, swing shift commander for the

Police Department.

The job pays from \$22,000 to \$26,000, according to previous experience and training.

Justice Research Associates, Inc., an assessment firm that will be interviewing the final applicants and recommending a finalist, will be in Henderson this week, how-

ever, Campbell said the Thanksgiving Day holiday will slow down the process some. He said the finalists will be interviewed in their homes and in their own communities. Campbell has stressed that it is important to choose the right person for the job.

Chief of Police Floyd Osborn and Fire Chief Don Richard will continue in their positions until the first week in Jan. Both have indicated to the city manager that they will retire.

Campbell said they are now trying to shuffle offices at the city hall to make room for the

new department head. He said there are other departments who also need more room in order to function properly.

He indicated the city is so busy doing the outside things that need done that it is hard to get the "in-house" things accomplished.

### Murals Program Presented To Chamber

What do these buildings have in common?

The multi-purpose building at the Civic Center, Kolob Credit Union, the Eldorado Casino, Channel 5, Ben Stepman Dodge.

Blank walls. Blank walls that could be transformed with eye-catching murals as students have been doing in Las Vegas, explained Karen Morris, art resources teacher with the Clark County School District.

Mrs. Morris was guest speaker at the Chamber of Commerce monthly meeting last Thursday and showed slides of several of the mural projects which have been completed by Western High School students over a six month period.

It all started when Mayor Bill Briare visited Seattle in 1976 and viewed some of the murals that have been executed in that city. When he returned, he contacted the Las Vegas Recreation Depart-

ment and with the assistance of the Nevada State Council on the Arts, the project was launched.

"Good positive things happen when people get involved," Mrs. Morris said as she explained that art students from Basic High and Bonanza are also getting involved in the project along with those from Western as the program is scheduled to spread into the county.

Frank Brusa, principal of Basic High, explained that first an "in school mural" will be done at Basic.

"Then our commitment is on municipal walls but a spin-off is possible after that," Dundee Jones, Director of the Parks and Recreation Dept. told the group.

For a mural to be painted, \$2,000 must be committed for the project.

The chamber members voted to go on record as endorsing the mural program.

### Black Mountain Residents Get Second Water Source

Residents of the Black Mountain area can breathe a little easier when they think of their water supply, according to Geoffrey Billingsley, public works director.

This week, work was completed which provides the hill area with two sources of water in the event that one source fails.

Prior to this time the only source of water in that area was BMI water. Now water is available from water received by the city from the Southern Nevada Water Project's first phase. The work was accomplished with waterbond money and is tied in with the installation which supplies the Mission Hills area.

Billingsley said a pumping station will be installed later at the Vista reservoir to insure better service. He said that it has happened in the past that the BMI water sources have been broken down and the people in that area were without water.

The architectural planning firm of Langdon & Wilson, of Irvine, California, has been selected to develop a master plan for the industrial park subdivision of Green Valley, according to the American-Nevada Corp., developers of the planned community.

"We are pleased to welcome Langdon & Wilson to the Green Valley project," said Mark Fine, President of American-Nevada Corp. "Our association with this renown firm will go a long way towards assuring the success of our community-of-tomorrow."

First tenant of the Green Valley industrial park is Buster Brown Textiles, Inc., who earlier this year selected a 20-acre site as the location of a 40,000 to 50,000 sq. ft. warehouse and distribution facility.

Langdon & Wilson have been actively involved in architectural planning and development since 1949 and have been responsible for more than \$500 million in construction to date. Completed projects include office buildings, hospitals, banks and college facilities.

Green Valley Nevada's largest planned community, with better than 8,400 acres in the Paradise Valley section of the greater Las Vegas/Henderson metropolitan area devoted to residential, commercial and industrial development.

Starr estimated the damage at between \$1500 and \$200, and he said he felt the work was done by juveniles.

The house belongs to the minister of the church at 240 Cholla Street. The fire started about 1:30 p.m. within insulation being installed in the house. Most of the insulation was burned.

Starr said the investigation is continuing.

### Council Hears Complaints From Sec. 24

"We have had three fires in our cars, one car burned up completely, we've had five different refrigerators...I'd just like to have a frig and a car," Genevieve Smith related to the city council Monday night.

Mrs. Smith and several of her neighbors in Section 24 appeared before the council to plead for assistance with some of the problems the residents of the area are encountering.

She explained that "the car batteries jump around" because of the condition of the road.

"We pay our taxes to Henderson but everything else is in Vegas. We have a Las Vegas address, Centel Telephone system and Nevada Power," Mrs. Smith explained.

Not only is the condition of the roads a problem but also the mail delivery.

"The post office boxes are

two miles down the road. We were told they won't come any further because the roads are so bad," she continued.

"Some of our mail has been lost but...we do love living in our new home," she concluded.

Mayor Lorin Williams suggested "we can take certain steps to make them (roads) passable, at least fill in the holes."

Chuck Hefner, another resident, said that there were no

flood controls, "without culverts the roads would wash away in the first rain."

Councilman Gary Price suggested the residents might want to form an assessment district which can be a long, drawn out procedure but would answer their problems.

Public Works Director Jeff Billingsley explained it could take anywhere from nine months to a year or a year and a half.

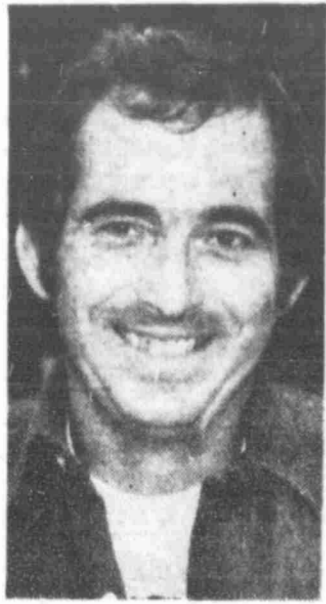

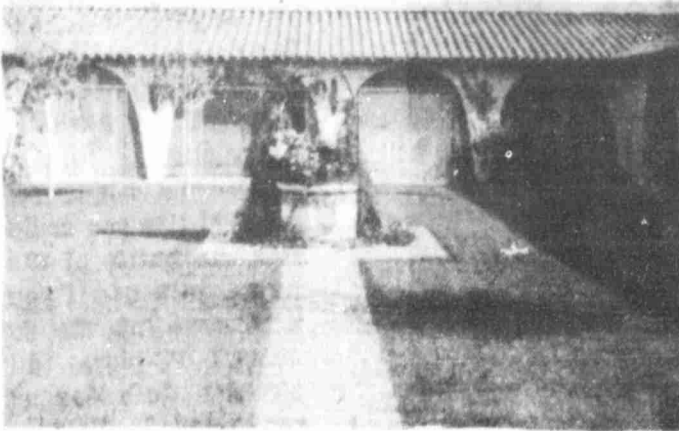

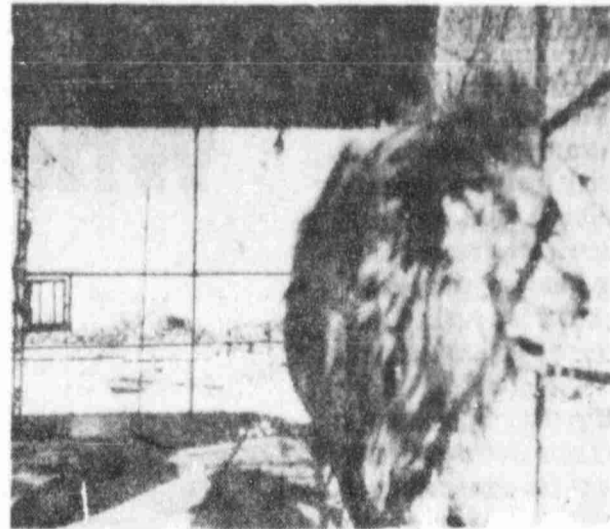

## THE PANAMA CANAL IS AN AMERICAN AFFAIR

part 18 of a series

With a copy of one of the most important treaties of the century treated under his arm, Wyse left Colombia, and hastened to New York to request an option to buy the Panama Railroad because of certain rights earlier sold and given to this line by Colombia.

The Compagnie Universelle du Canal Interoceanique de Panama was organized in 1879 in Paris, a stock company capitalized at \$60,000,000 with Ferdinand de Lesseps as president. World renowned as the builder of the Suez Canal, de Lesseps traveled throughout Europe and the United States selling stock and whipping up en-

thusiasm for the French canal in Panama.

In the United States he could not help but notice the opposition to the project, but still the French company went forward. Formal inauguration of work on the canal through the Isthmus of Panama under French direction was held with appropriate ceremony on New Year's day 1880. But the French endeavor was destined to end in failure.

Stock manipulation in the U.S. raised the price of the Panama Railroad, and France was forced to pay \$18,900,000 for control of the road, even though the railroad company remained a New York Corporation,

with an American board of directors elected by the company making decisions from Wall Street.

The French engineering teams sent to Panama encountered most of the difficulties that had plagued the earlier railroad builders. Yellow fever and other diseases killed some of the most valued engineers, and in 1882, an earthquake shook the Isthmus. The railroad was twisted and disabled for weeks, construction equipment was damaged, and when after-shocks continued, the construction had to stop as hundreds of terrified workers left the Isthmus.

How many of you reading this are over weight? Do you plan to do anything about it? Think seriously about it. Is losing weight the most important thing to you? Think how great it would be to go into a store and buy clothes. All the best looking most youthful and stylish fit without any alterations. Your health will be good and those of your family will be much better even though they may not be dieting. If you have children think what an asset it will be to them. It is entirely up to you.

There are many ways today each claiming you can lose from 5 to 20 pounds a month and costing from \$3 or \$4 a week to \$7 or more a day. You may lose the weight but as soon as you quit their method you will gain it back plus 15 or 20

more than you lost. What you have to do is to acquire new habits of eating that you are comfortable with and can live with the rest of your life. That may seem drastic but it is a reality. Ask anyone who has lost and has kept it off.

If you continue on the way you are now obesity can cause any number of medical problems. With today's inflation a medical doctor or hospital can be the beginning of the end.

# "Crime in America" From the Crime Prevention Unit of Henderson Police Department

The most natural and frequent question people ask about crime is "Why?" They ask it about individual crimes and about crime as a whole. In either case it is an almost impossible question to answer. Each single crime is a response to a specific situation by a person with an infinitely complicated psychological and emotional makeup who is subject to infinitely complicated external pressures. Crime as a whole is millions of such responses.

To seek the "causes" of crime in human motivations alone is to risk losing ones way in the impenetrable thickets of the human psyche. Compulsive gambling was the cause of an embezzlement, one may say or drug addiction the cause of burglary or madness the cause of a homicide but what caused the compulsion, the addiction, the madness? Why did they manifest themselves in those ways at those times?

There are some crimes so irrational, so unpredictable, so explosive, so resistant to analysis or explanation that they can no more be prevented or guarded against than earthquakes or tidal waves.

At the opposite end of the spectrum of crime are the carefully planned acts of professional criminals. The elaborately organized robbery of an armored car the skillfully executed jewel theft, the murder of an informant by an "enforcer", are so deliberate, so calculated, so rational, that understanding the motivations of those who commit such crimes does not show us how to prevent them. How to keep competent and intelligent men from taking up crime as a life work is as baffling a problem as how to predict and discourage sudden criminal outbursts.

To say this is not, of course, to belittle the efforts of psychiatrists and other behavioral scientists to identify and to treat the personality traits that are associated with crime. Many criminals can be rehabilitated. The point is that looking at the personal characteristics of offenders is only one of many ways, and not always the most helpful way, of looking at crime.

It is possible to say, for example, that many crimes are caused by their victims. Often the victim of an assault is the person who starts the fight, or the victim of an automobile theft is a person who left his keys in his car, or the victim of a loan shark is a person who lost his rent money at the race track, or the victim of a confidence man is a person who thought he could get rich quick. The relationship of victims to crimes is a subject that so far has received little attention. Many crimes, no matter what kind of people their perpetrators were, would not have been committed if their vic-

times had understood the risks they were taking.

From another viewpoint, crime is caused by public tolerance of it, or reluctance or inability to take action against it. Corporate and business (white collar) crime is closely associated with a widespread notion that, when making money is involved, anything goes. Shoplifting and employee theft may be made more safe by their victim's reluctance to report to the police, often due to a recognition that the likelihood of detection and successful prosecution are

negligible. Very often slum residents feel they live in territory that is useless for them even to try to defend. Many slum residents feel overwhelmed and helpless in the face of the flourishing vice and crime around them. Many have received indifferent treatment from the criminal justice system when they have attempted to do their duty as complainants and witnesses; many fear reprisals, especially victims of rackets. When citizens do not get involved, criminals can act with relative impunity.

In a sense, social and economic conditions cause crime. Crime

flourishes and always has flourished, in city slums, those neighborhoods where overcrowding, economic deprivation, social disruption and racial discrimination are endemic. Crime flourishes in conditions of affluence, when there is much desire for material goods and many opportunities to acquire them illegally. Crime flourishes when there are many restless, relatively footloose young people in the population. Crime flourishes when standards of morality are changing rapidly.

Finally, to the extent that the agencies of law enforcement and jus-

tice, and such community institutions as schools, churches and social service agencies, do not do their jobs effectively, they fail to prevent crime. If the police are inefficient or starved for manpower, otherwise preventable crimes will occur. If they are over-zealous, people better left alone will be drawn into criminal careers. If the courts fail to separate the innocent from the guilty, the guilty may be turned loose to continue their depredations and the innocent may be criminalized. If the system fails to convict the guilty with reasonable certainty and promptness, deterrence of crime may be blunted. If correctional programs do not correct, a core of hardened and habitual criminals will continue to plague the community. If the community institutions that can shape the characters of young people do not take advantage of their opportunities, youth rebelliousness will turn into crime.

The causes of crime, then, are numerous and mysterious and intertwined. Even to begin to understand them, one must gather statistics about the amounts and trends of crime, estimate the costs of crime, study the conditions of life where crime thrives, identify criminals and the victims of crime, survey the public's attitudes toward crime. No one way of describing crime describes it well enough.

Randy Alan Williams aka Randy Alan Holder, charged with sale of a controlled substance had his case continued to November 16 at 9:30 a.m.

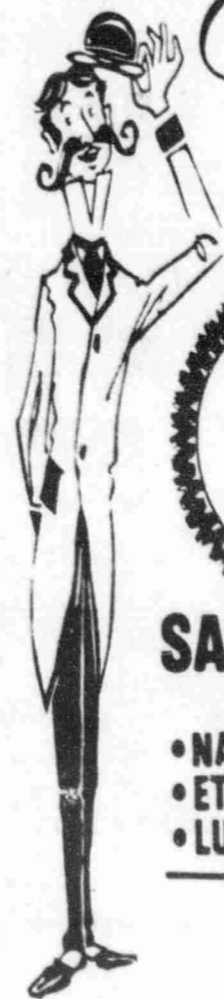
Florida and Jimmy Abeyta, charged with battery with a deadly weapon, had their case dismissed at the request of the state. Restitution was paid in full.

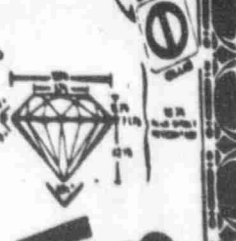

We at the Housing Authority were very much interested in your front page article on November 8 on the sale of the Victory Village site. Although we never owned the land, we still feel a "semi-proprietary" interest since we did own and manage the old World War II-vintage apartments located at the site.

Just a couple of comments in the interests of historical accuracy. The project was actually much larger than indicated in the article since we had a total of 518 apartments on this site (and another 324 in Carver Park). Also, the Authority was involved with management and maintenance of both projects from the beginning; in fact, the Authority was

created by the County Commissioners for the express purpose of operating not only Victory and Carver but also the Kelso-Turner Project in Las Vegas (still in existence and now operated by the Housing Authority of the City of Las Vegas).

You are correct in noting that the war-time units constructed in 1942-43 were built (and expected to last) for only 5 years. However, we actually had some of them under management for 30 years, since the last residents of both Carver Park and Victory Village were relocated in 1973.
