### Property Assessments Shown

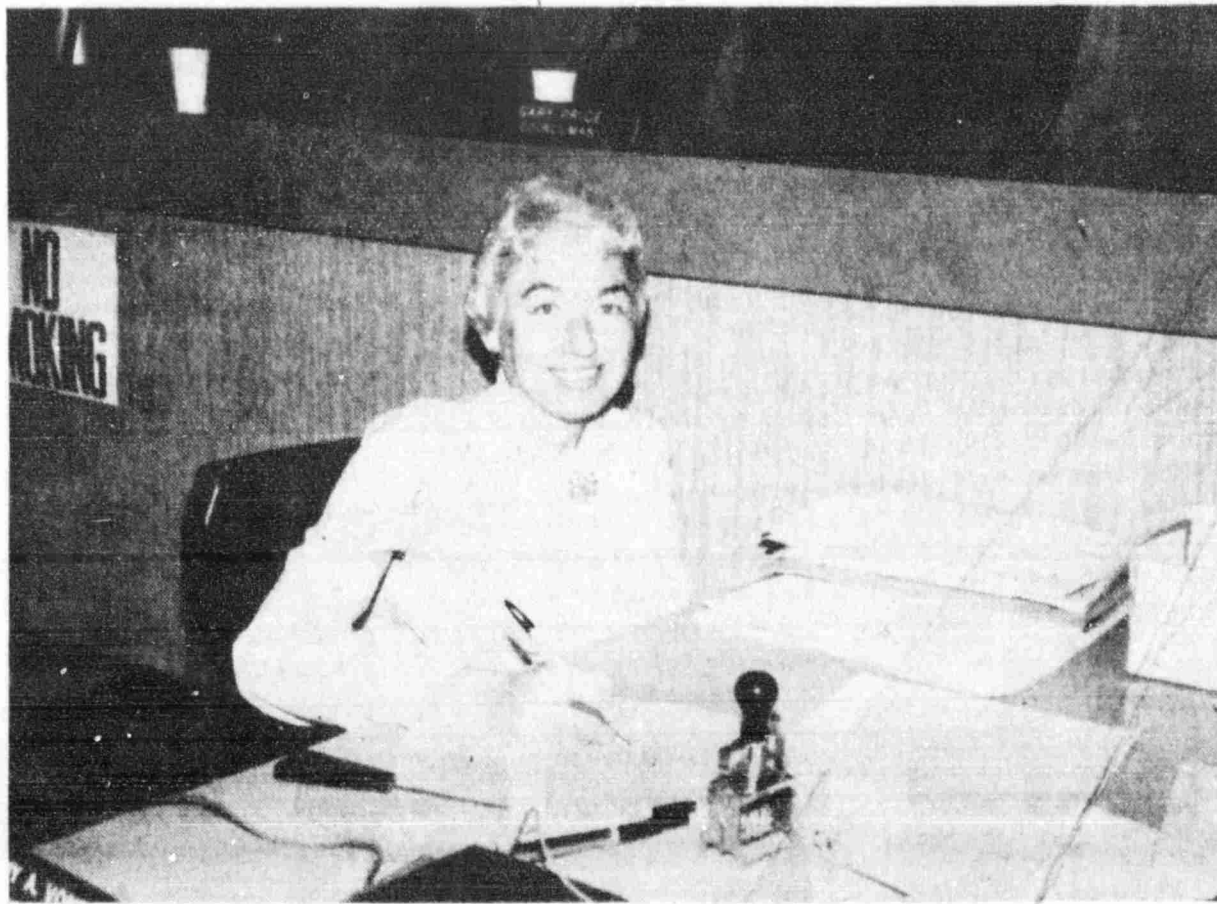
The property assessment rolls for Boulder City and Henderson are contained in 20 pages of this newspaper today, according to J.E. Dutton, Clark County Assessor.

State statute requires that all property in the county must be reappraised and reassessed at least once in each five - year period. Reappraisals may occur in less than five - year periods when significant increases or decreases occur in a certain vicinity, particularly where structural improvements may be added during the intervening four - year period.

Dutton said the Boulder City and Henderson areas were reappraised during last year, but where improvements have occurred, they will be picked up between the five years.

The industrial plants in Henderson are assessed every five years, however, the equipment is assessed every year, the new added to the tax rolls and the old deleted.

Property owners who disagree with the Assessor's appraisal of their property may file a petition with the county board of equalization.

### Dorothy Vondenbrink — City's Answer Gal

"I had never worked in government before ... in fact, I didn't even know what a city clerk did," laughed Dorothy Vondenbrink as she told the story of how she was hired by the city as deputy city clerk nearly ten years ago.

The lovely, silver haired, soft spoken Dorothy had made up her mind early in 1968 to come West. She quit a lucrative job as an executive secretary for a well established firm in Ohio and, after visiting friends and relatives along the way, arrived in Las Vegas.

But finding a new job was not easy. "I was told I was over qualified," she said.

After applying for a number of positions without result, she went to an employment agency. They called one day and suggested she go to Henderson and apply for the

opening of deputy city clerk. "You mean the job advertised in the newspaper?" she asked.

She did just that and later in the day received a phone call from Genevieve Harper, then city clerk.

"You are just the person I've been praying for," Mrs. Harper said. "The job is yours."

Dorothy started working for the city April 28, 1968, exactly three months after arriving in the area, and though she may not have known what a city clerk did then, she learned quickly through the excellent instruction of Mrs. Harper.

Dorothy Vondenbrink's name appears on all legal documents which she must sign and attest, she countersigns contracts and checks issued by the city, subdivision

maps, bills, ordinances ... she has become an expert on Henderson.

Her office is an information and public relations center for Henderson "where we can give quick information if the public wants it," she explained.

"I have to know what is going on so I can help." Basically she is secretary to the city council and the keeper of the records.

"I keep all the records of the city, all ordinances, resolutions, and minutes of all council meetings in permanent journals."

One of the jobs she has been doing in her "spare time" is retyping the old minutes. "Then we put everything on microfilm. I have set up an in-

The Bureau of Reclamation's Southern Nevada Water project II construction staff has moved from temporary quarters in Boulder City to a permanent office at 834 East Lake Mead Drive, Henderson, Lower Colorado Regional Director Manuel Lopez, Jr., has announced.

Making the move were Project Construction Engineer Don Fillis and 29 members of his staff. The new mailing address is Post Office Box E, Henderson, Nevada 89015, Tele: 702 - 565 - 6471.

Construction is expected to get underway in December on the first major contract to build the \$110 million Southern Nevada Water Project's second stage that will deliver additional Colorado River water to the Las Vegas metropolitan area. The \$3.2 million contract was awarded last September to a joint venture of Kordick and Rados, Irvine, California, for construction of the second stage Main Aqueduct "B" Line.

The "B" line will begin at the site of proposed Pumping Plant 1B, to be built at the Alfred Merritt Smith Water Treatment Facility near Lake Mead. It will extend to Regulating Tank No. 2, adjacent to the east portal of the Project's River Mountains Tunnel. The "B" line will parallel the existing first stage main Aqueduct "A" line.

## Assessment District Planned

Preliminary action to start a water assessment district to provide water to 51 property owners in section 4, near Lake Mead Drive, was taken by the city council Monday night.

The cost of the district is estimated at \$238,079.75. According to City Attorney Kent Dawson, the average cost of the district for the owners of five-acre tracts is \$3,570.10. However, Dawson said that some assessments will be as high as \$9,000 where the water line covers the entire five acres.

The district will be located on Cadiz Avenue from the center line of Aden Street to the center line of Naples Street; from Emden Street from the center line of Athens Avenue south to a point 165 feet south of Essex Avenue and from Essex Avenue from the center line of Cannes Street to the center line of Milan Street.

## CITY FACES SERIOUS WATER PROBLEMS

"The present line can sustain between 350 to 425 homes," Jeff Billingsley, Public Works Director, told the city council during a discussion of the city's water facilities to the Green Valley area.

"The usage out there is greater than in the city where the average is 250 gallons per capita per day," he explained.

"Contractors working in the area can use up the water supply in minutes. We have tried to educate the water truck drivers to open up hydrants slowly and close them slowly."

The area is already experiencing water problems sooner than either the city or the Green Valley developers anticipated due to its rapid growth.

The problem is who will pay for the necessary work to upgrade the water system to the area.

Just now there is one line which delivers about a thousand gallons of water per minute.

"We must have a bigger tank completed by 1980, just two years away, which is our commitment to Phase II of the Southern Nevada Water Pro-

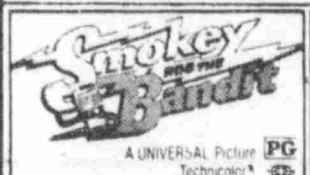

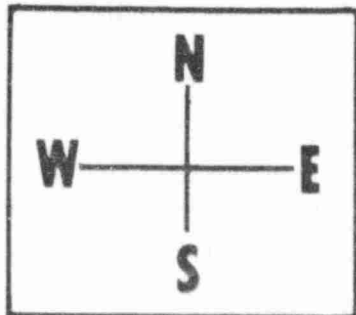

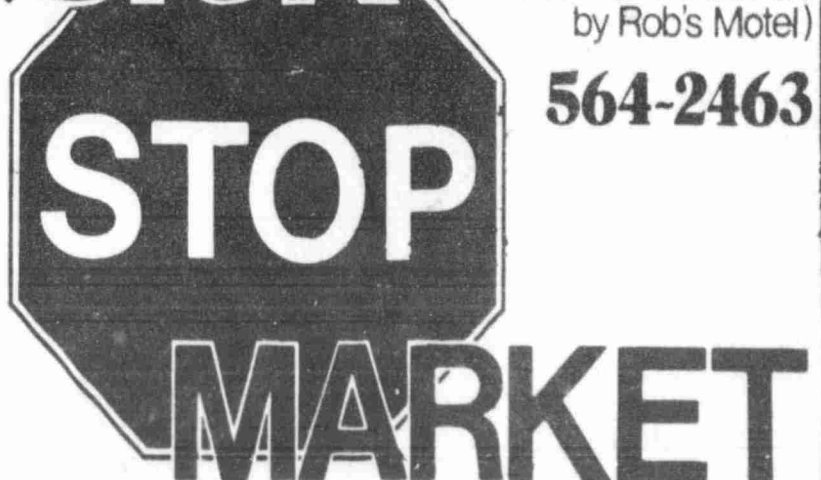

**Sen. Richard Bryan Speaks At Rotary**

"A critical concern for us is to diversify our economic base," State Senator Richard Bryan told Henderson Rotarians at their weekly meeting Tuesday.

Bryan was guest speaker to the group and during his brief but informative talk touched on several subjects of interest.

Because of the high taxes in the East, which he observed during a summer visit, "Atlantic City has the temptation to experiment with gambling and it is a threat to us in Nevada," he emphasized.

We can't be complacent. We have the most attractive tax structure in the United States and we must expand our tax base in Southern Nevada with more industrial development. It has been done in the northern part of the state and Southern Nevada, Henderson, offers many opportunities for it also."

He mentioned the Whack - a - tax campaign which is now being waged to educate voters to repeal or phase out the inventory tax in next November's election.

"Most of the western states have already repealed it and for us to remain competitive we must also phase out this unfair tax." Once we are rid of it, it will be just one more argument to be made in favor of warehousing."

"Unemployment benefits for those who quit their jobs was costing us \$2 million yearly but now, with new legislation, no longer can a man quit his job and draw unemployment. He must first find employment and then be laid off to collect," Bryan explained.

Other subjects touched upon were NIC insurance, ERA, a referendum to expand the city limits of Las Vegas which must have the majority of vote of both Las

Vegas and the unincorporated areas, tax relief for senior citizens and competency tests for high school graduation.

Bryan explained that competency tests would be given on the third, sixth and ninth grade levels, thereby giving

educators an opportunity to spot students with learning problems and time to work with them.

He concluded by urging everyone to let their legislators know their thoughts. "Don't hesitate to write or call us," he said.

**Thanksgiving Special Informative**

Local producer Harry Kane came out last Thursday with a Thanksgiving special on the Judicial system in Clark County. Filmed at the Court House at a nominal cost, it was the second special he has produced in recent months through Channel 5 with Murray Westgate serving as moderator.

The show consisted of interviews with District Attorney George Holt, Justice of the Peace Miriam Shearing and District Court Judge Paul Goldman

Each explained their particular part in the judicial system and gave the viewer a much clearer idea of the function of those particular offices.

It was also a good opportunity for Holt and Goldman to explain their positions in the Terry Hill trial which has come under a great deal of criticism in recent weeks.

For those of you who have missed the first two specials, Kane is in the process of planning a third, to be aired Christmas morning.

**Council Gives 'Do Pass' Recommendation to Mural Project**

The City Council gave a do pass recommendation to take \$2000 from the Beautification Commission budget for a murals project at their recessed meeting Monday night.

Karen Morris, art resources teacher with the Clark County School District, and Dundee Jones, director of the Parks and Recreation Department made the presentation to the council.

Morris told the story through a slide showing, pointing out that blank walls can be transformed with eye-catching murals as students have been doing in several locations in Las Vegas.

The Las Vegas projects started when Mayor Bill Briare visited Seattle in 1976 and viewed some of the murals that have been executed in that city. When he returned, he contacted the Las Vegas Recreation Dept. and with the assistance of the Nevada State Council on the Arts, the project was launched.

The first murals were done by Western High students and now Basic and Bonanza students are getting involved. Murals are already planned for several walls at Basic High.

After the "in school" murals have been completed the next commitment will be on municipal walls.

The multi - purpose building at the Civic Center as well as several other civic center buildings were pointed out as adaptable for murals.

Harry Kane, speaking from the audience, suggested that the water tank on Horizon Drive would look greatly improved with paint.

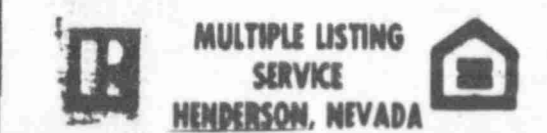

## Utility Companies Seek Tax Fund Collection

California - Pacific Utilities Co. and Nevada Power Co. were involved yesterday in a hearing before the Public Service Commission with a request that they be allowed to collect tax money from patrons for extending power lines in certain areas.

The purpose of the contributions in aid of construction rule is to provide a procedure for the utility to protect the utility and its ratepayers by providing for sufficient funds to be available in the event the utility must pay the tax effect relating to contributions in aid of construction.

These CIAC contributions are non-refundable payments made by the customers who ask for services in an area where there are inadequate lines exist, according to Ron Langford, manager of Cal-Pac here. Langford said the tax is a 92.3 per cent increase in the cost to the customer. Water and sewer companies are exempt from the tax.

Developers and builders of individual homes in isolated areas are two examples of customers who would have to pay the charges.

For years the money collected by utilities for the customer in aid of construction charges

was treated as nontaxable by the Internal Revenue Service, but now the federal agency has

decided to make the money taxable, Lenzie said. That is why the companies want to col-

lect tax money on the charges. Legislation to exempt electric and gas utilities

is presently before congress but the bill has not been enacted and there is no assurance it will be.

- 3 cups all-purpose flour
- 1/4-1/2 tsp. soda
- 1 3/4-2 sticks margarine (depending on moistness desired)
- 1 egg
- 1 1/2 tsp. almond extract
- 1 cup blanched, regular or slivered almonds

Sift dry ingredients together (exclude almonds). Melt margarine, mix with dry ingredients. Stir in egg and flavoring; knead until egg is absorbed. Form balls the size of a walnut. Press one almond (or a couple slivered) in center of each. Use lightly greased cookie sheet. Bake at 325 degrees for about 15 minutes. Check. Store in air-tight container. # Henderson — Its Economic History

Maryellen Vallier Sadovich, a noted Nevada historian, and a Henderson resident since 1954, treated our readers with a most unique bicentennial series during 1976. This year, she has researched the local newspaper files and the archives of Henderson's City Hall, the Chamber of Commerce, and BMI, to produce an economic history of Henderson from the first day of incorporation to the present.

With the knowledge that Henderson's General fund and Utility fund were over \$70,000 in arrears, the Mayor and councilmen spent the October 6, 1958 council meeting discussing possible solutions to their problem.

There were suggestions that the minimum water rate be raised, that fire and police personnel be reduced, that use of city vehicles be curtailed, that the office of Chief Administrator be abolished, that various city personnel be terminated, and that the salaries of Mayor and councilmen be reduced. Later, one councilman even reiterated the old suggestion that BMI be brought into the city limits.

Each suggestion brought lengthy arguments that continued through the meetings held during October and November. Meanwhile, on October 20, a request for a raise in salary for the police and fire personnel came to the council, and on Nov. 17, Mayor Byrne submitted a recommendation that included an average of a 6.6 per cent raise in the salary of all city employees.

To accommodate their debts and new expenses, the council on December 1 voted to raise the minimum water rate from \$3.00 to \$5.00 per month. This action was favorable to the Mayor, but when the council also voted unanimously to terminate 3 city personnel, Mayor Byrne vetoed the proposal. No real consideration was given to the old argument that BMI should be annexed into the city limits.

During the early months of 1959, the increase in water rates would be the only really new source of income to the city, but already work was being completed on a gigantic, income generating project that had its origins in the early months of the administration of Mayor French.

At a council meeting on March 1, 1954, Mayor French had announced "a bill now pending before Congress will give the city vast acres of land, many more times the present size of the community. The land -- four townships in all -- had been claimed by the Eureka Land Company, but that claim had been declared void, and Senator McCarran had promised to introduce a bill in Congress which would give that land to the city of Henderson." On April 21, Senator

Pat McCarran presented in the Senate, a bill that would turn over to Henderson approximately 7018 acres of land surrounding the city. McCarran's bill, drawn up on the suggestion of Mayor French, provided that ownership would be in fee simple and the land would be available for the city for any expansion -- available to be sold by the city to any private interests at whatever the prevailing land prices might be. Value of the acreage was estimated to be approximately two million dollars.

Residents expected the transaction to be simple and immediate, but that was not the case. On August 4, Senator McCarran telephoned the city offices to announce that the Henderson land bill had run into unexpected difficulty. The Navy had asked that option on the land be held up for future possible "secret usage."

For a time it seemed the dream of 7000 acres for an expanded Henderson would never materialize. Mayor French made several trips to Washington, but Senator McCarran passed away before the plans were finalized. Later, Senators Bible and Malone attempted to push the matter to completion. When in November 1958, Howard Cannon was elected Senator to replace Malone, he too continued to pursue the matter of securing the 7000 acres surrounding Henderson for the community that had supported him with nearly 2500 votes.

Finally, during the week of December 18, 1958, agents from the Bureau of Land Management met with Henderson officials to determine a final price for the acreage. These agents reported that the price of \$700,000, or \$100 per acre, had been set by the government. But Mayor Byrne insisted this price was too high for the undeveloped, desert land, and negotiations were delayed until a price could be agreed upon.

Rock collectors, amateur or professional, find solace, pleasure, exercise, interest, and sometimes real "finds" in their profession or hobby. This article is being written geared toward the amateur. The professional is already aware of the areas to find rocks and the dangers so consequently he will prepare himself accordingly when on a hunt.

Cleo McDonald of Henderson has been en-

joying camping trips and rock hunts for twenty years. She did not join any clubs or societies for "rock-hounds" but took up the hobby and shared her interest with her husband, children, and later, grandchildren. Cleo has been through the gamut of experience with her rock-hound jaunts. It was but three years ago when Mrs. McDonald and her grandchild were lost on the desert after having strayed from the rest of

the party. It was a fear-stricken night for the two, and a cold one. "The desert is mighty lonesome at night, especially if you are lost, and with a little child at that," remarked Cleo. The lady together with her grandchild became a newsitem written up by the HENDERSON HOME NEWS.

Not to be stopped, Cleo went on with rock-collecting. "Boots should be worn when rock-hunting," Cleo stated, "in that

they are easier on the feet, insulated against heat or cold, and offer more protection from rough terrain, side-winders, scorpions and the like!" Cleo was especially grateful for her boots when climbing a hill, looking for a special type of rock just outside of Jean, Nevada, when she stepped into a nest of side-winders. "There they were, crawling all around me, side-winding rattlers every size imaginable. I couldn't

believe it! I ran out of that nest so fast that I met myself going! It was a miracle that none of them struck at me. If it hadn't been for my boots they could have gotten me on the ankle, or I could have turned my ankle on the way out of there," she said. Cleo's collection includes gold, silver, and turquoise in its natural form with copper. Mica, iron ore, obsidian and onyx specimens are also credited to her son's expeditions. mahogany, agates, volcanic rock and black sand from Hawaii, agates from Australia and petrified wood.

spot," she continued "was Warm Springs, Georgia, where we toured the "Little White House" and saw all of President Franklin Roosevelt's personal things as well as Eleanor's.

Then we went to see the cyclorama, the Battle of Atlanta, not a movie. There is just no way to describe it except to say 'spectacular, superb.' It's on the ground, where the battle was fought during Civil War days, in three dimensional panorama with music and sound effects so realistic you feel you are a part of the conflict. The picture measures 50 feet in height and 400 feet in circumference, painted in 1885. There is no way to tell where the picture ends and the manikin soldiers and horses begin."

The Pools started their trip with a visit to Quin-

ton, Oklahoma, where they had been former residents. They also stopped in other Oklahoma towns to visit with relatives and renew old friendships.

"The autumn colors were beautiful and we took many pictures trying to capture the beauty of the scenery," Mrs. Pool said.

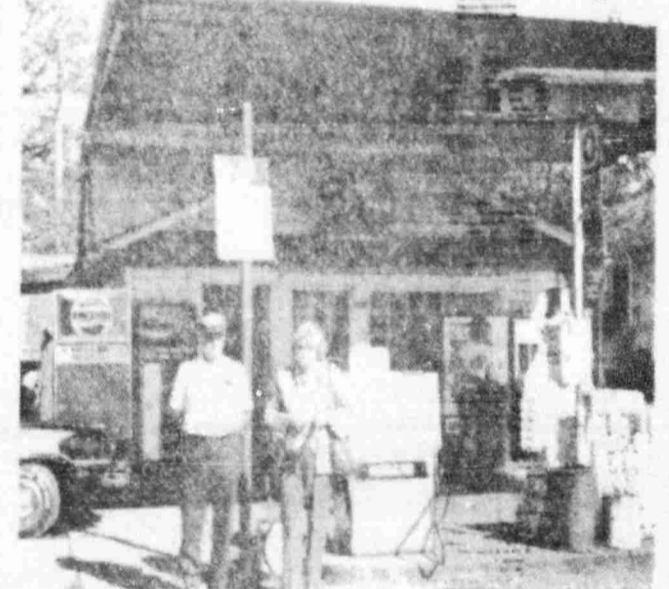
"It covers more than an acre with many plants, magnolias and hickory trees."

### Bighorn Sheep Season Opens

The last of Nevada's 1977 trophy big game hunting seasons opened Saturday (Nov. 19) for the taking of desert bighorn sheep in 14 of the 16 management areas of the southern portion of the state. This season will remain open through December 18. Bighorn sheep hunting areas 73 and 74 on the Air Force Bombing Range do not open until December 17 and will close January 1, 1978.

A total of 72 resident and nine - nonresident tags were originally available for this year's hunt and according to Nevada Dept. of Fish and Game, 587 resident and 672 nonresident applications were received attesting to the popularity of the hunt.

As in the past, this year's season is open to the taking of male trophy rams only, of at least seven years of age or with a Boone and Crockett score of 144 points using the horn with the most points doubled.

All tag holders are required to attend a Hunter Indoctrination Course where they learn, among other things, how to determine the size (score) and age of sheep at great distances.

Sheep hunters are also required to have in their possession, while hunting, a spotting scope of at least a minimum power of 15. The spotting scopes are used as an aid in determining the size and age of individual animals.

Those who take a bighorn sheep are required to have their tags validated and the skull sealed by personally presenting the skull and hide to a representative of NDFG within five days after the animal is killed.

Those unsuccessful in taking a sheep must present their unused tag to a representative of NDFG for cancellation within five days after the close of the sheep hunting season.

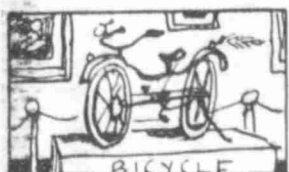
The only other big game season still open is for the taking of mountain lion. This season runs through April 30, 1978. There were 129 resident and 22 nonresident tags originally available and all have been issued.

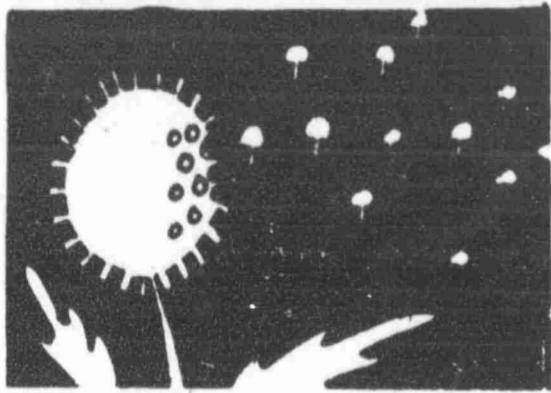

## ROOTS



### A Botanical Briefing

A plant is a plant is a plant, but in cultivating and maintaining your own houseplant collection, it eventually becomes necessary to understand a few botanical terms. Forthwith are some simplified definitions to dissolve some of the mystery surrounding plant terminology. To start at the beginning--

A spore is a minute, one-celled body which is responsible for the reproduction of ferns, fungi and moss. Most other plants reproduce by pollination, the botanical term for sexual intercourse between plants. Sometimes

two totally different plants will cross-pollinate and create a third plant unique in shape, texture, foliage, color, and/or bloom. This new plant is known as a hybrid or a variety. Occasionally a hybrid will be variegated; its foliage will contain contrasting coloring, creating somewhat of a marbled effect.

If there are no spores or pollens around for reproduction, a plant may be propagated in a number of ways. Leaf cuttings may be started in soil after pinching off a leaf at the node, that little knob where the leaf initially nudges its way out from the stem. Stem cuttings may be rooted in soil or water once the cutting has been removed from a plant just below a node. Succulents, plants which store water in their stems and/or leaves, are the most successful plants to propagate by leaf or stem cuttings.

Plants become rootbound, or potbound, when every possible space within the pot becomes occupied, thus causing the roots to extend through the drainage holes. When plants become rootbound, it's time for repotting.

### Bids Awarded On Water Line Pump Station

Bids to provide a water line to the proposed reservoir R-4 and the P-3 pump station were awarded by the city council Monday night in a recessed meeting.

On the recommendation of Geoffrey Billingsley, public works director, the pump station contract was awarded to M.M.C., Inc. in the amount of \$117,000 and the 18 inch water main was awarded to Burdick Contractors in the amount of \$181,981.20.

Winter came to Southern Nevada this past week and all but put a stop to fishing at Lake Mead and Lake Mohave. Both fishing pressure and success were down in most areas and except for Lake Mead's striped bass and hatchery rainbow catch as the result of trout releases several weeks ago, there would be little to report. Strippers began hitting in the Hemenway Harbor area almost immediately after the release several weeks ago and have continued to supply action right up to the present time. Most of the strippers have ranged in size from about five up to 20 pounds in weight and have been hitting large rebel, rapala, redfin and hellbender lures trolled at their natural running depths. A few anglers have taken good sized strippers drifting the shoreline and casting surface lures, or jerking other type lures along the surface. Strippers are being caught at all times

of the day but in general, the late afternoon and early evening hours are considered most productive. A trout release at Overton Landing several weeks ago failed to attract any anglers and until this weekend failed to produce any strippers. A check this Sunday, however, recorded a 16 pound striped bass caught trolling at the mouth of the Muddy River and three fish each about three pounds in weight caught on live bait near Echo Bay. Only one pan-sized trout from the recent Overton release was accounted for although this weekend's catch did include several rainbows of two to three pounds in weight.

Quite a few persons, including many children and senior citizens, have been taking advantage of the recently released trout in the Hemenway Harbor area. The fish may be small in size, but judging from the anglers' enthusiasm for both

the small trout being caught from shore and the occasional big striper from a boat, the trout release has been appreciated by a great many people. Because of the public's favorable response to the recent shoreline release of trout, Nevada Department of Fish and Game has announced additional trout plants at Hemenway Harbor on Friday, Dec. 2 and again at Callville Bay on Friday, Dec. 9.

Bass fishing in the Cottonwood Cove area has been rated slow this week by Harold Harper of Searchlight Storage and Bait. He says smaller fish are coming from 10 to 25 feet of water off the protected points with a few larger fish from depths to 45 feet using nightcrawlers and waterdogs. Deep trolled hellbender lures and spoons up to an ounce in weight, also are producing a few catches of bass. In the deeper channel areas of the lower basin

trolling with needlefish and flatfish lures at 60 to 70 feet is resulting in fair catches of rainbow trout. Shore fishermen at Cottonwood Cove are also taking trout with marshmallows and cheese baits with this type angling expected to improve as water temperatures drop.

Weekend checks at Willow Beach revealed only six of the 48 anglers checked caught fish.

They accounted for four catfish and four small rainbow trout. Willow Beach's lucky anglers, however, were the divers competing in the Silver Flippers' "Anything Goes" contest. Twenty-five competitors speared 412 carp in the allotted time from midnight Saturday to 1 p.m. on Sunday. The winning team of Dick Hurlburt, Max Groom, Jerry Walker and Howard Carver accounted for 100 of the fish entered.

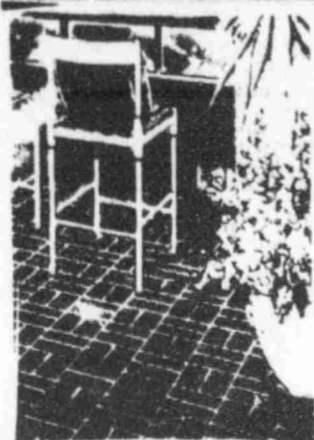

## TOPICS FOR TAXPAYERS

### Thanksgiving in Order For Congress' Delay

By Ernest L. Newton

Americans have a good deal to be thankful for this week -- and this year. It appears that the Congress of the United States is going to adjourn for the year without enactment of any additional harmful legislation. At least we can hope.

President Carter painted himself into a corner when he tried to deliver on all 111 pages of campaign promises which he made in his drive for the power of the presidency. The Congress was so swamped with major (and in many cases ill-prepared) program, such as it was, was swallowed by the House without adequate chewing. But the Senate was not to be overwhelmed. The Tax program was too much for the House and when major morsels were withdrawn (the \$50 tax rebate) the credibility of the whole program came into question. The Panama Canal treaty was so hastily presented that the consent of the Senate (and the House?) was, at least temporarily denied. The resources of tax revenues were just not big enough to fund the massive new social programs his backers expected him to support.

And finally, the new and inexperienced staff at the White House just can't seem to get a grasp on Washington. The apparatus in Washington is much larger, more complicated and more knowledgeable than that in Atlanta.

Two major matters appear close to resolution. The "energy" program may have a chance of

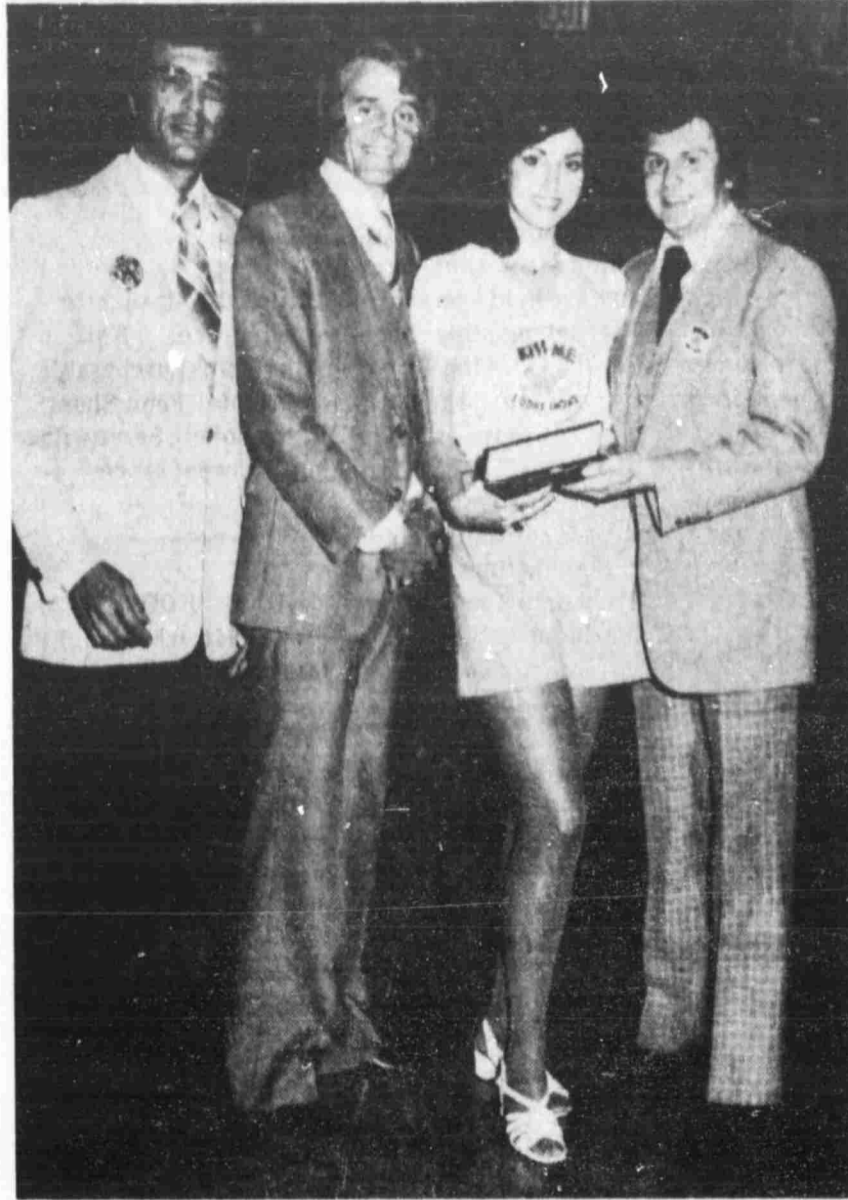
resolution if the House and Senate conferees can see the opportunity to allow a free marketplace to solve a problem created by government interference. The success of that program will be in direct proportion to the degree of release by the dead hand of government.

The Social Security problem may be even more difficult. For 40 years a government has been intent on buying the votes of workers nearing retirement by providing ever expanding retirement benefits and by bowing to the demands of government employees who want nothing to do with a retirement program that has inadequate sources of money. Just last month the Congress overwhelmingly defeated a proposal to place all government employees under social security. The employees wanted no part of it -- even if supplemented by a somewhat reduced government retirement plan.

The result will -- must be a massive increase in taxation of employees and employers who are a part of the social security system. Benefits will probably be reduced or deferred, or both. Tax rates will rise to as much as 15% of pay and demands for increased "take home pay" will fuel the fires of inflation. It is not an attractive forecast -- but essential.

Perhaps after the Christmas recess, government will gain a new insight into the limitations of governmental activity.

Perhaps Congressmen will have time to re-read the Constitution which they have sworn to uphold.

## Real Estate Broker Service Valuable

Although a few home sellers may regard real estate brokers as merely superfluous middlemen, an examination of the services brokers provide reveals a totally different picture.

To understand the scope of their services, it's first necessary to understand something about the nature of the transaction they handle.

Buying a home, especially for the first-time buy, can be a traumatic experience. No other experience in life compares with it. Among other things, the decision to purchase a home entails a serious financial commitment. For most families, their home is the largest investment they will ever make. Accumulation of the downpayment alone may mean years of sacrifice and saving.

Although the seller already has had this experience and is interested in realizing maximum financial benefit from his investment, he often is under some pressure to dispose of his property -- possibly due to job relocation or other personal reasons.

When the complexities of financing, contract signing and closing are added to this, it's easy to see why selling a home can become a complicated transaction. Furthermore, each transaction offers a different set of challenges to the broker.

How, then, does a broker help a seller? What services can he offer to speed the transaction and help the seller obtain a fair profit?

Another item of importance: he arranges to show the home at times convenient to the seller.

When qualified buyers are found, the broker shows them the property and sells its features. As an objective third party, he can answer questions and respond unemotionally to criticisms of the home.

If the buyer decides to purchase the home, the broker handles negotiations and often helps the buyer find financing. The broker also may put the buyer in contact with other professionals who become involved in sales transactions.

In short, although the broker is a middleman, his services, far from being superfluous, help a seller reach his goal: getting the best price in the shortest amount of time and at minimum inconvenience. For more information on these services, contact the LAS VEGAS Board of Realtors.

false face, a false front. I question whether the one inside me is the same as the one "up front."

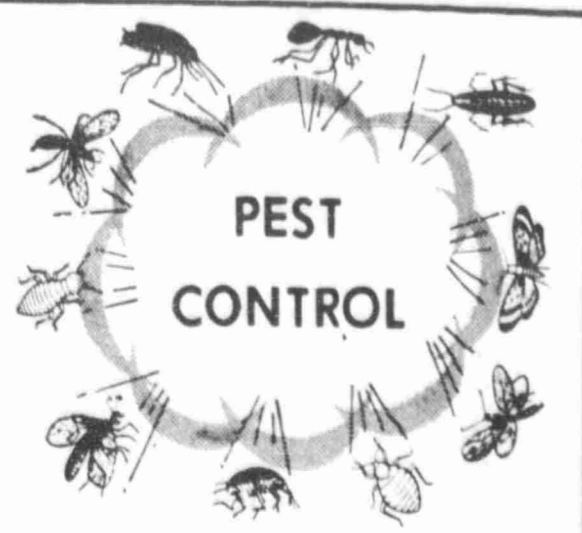

## FEDERAL ELIGIBILITY STANDARDS CHANGED

The Nevada State Welfare Division has advised that effective January 1, 1978, the Division will adopt new Federal income eligibility standards and revised food stamp coupon allotments. Coupon allotments are adjusted twice a year to reflect changes in food prices as published by the Bureau of Labor Statistics.

On January 1, the amount of coupons allotted for a four-person household will be increased from \$170 to \$174 a month, with adjustments for other household sizes in line with revised scales. The maximum income eligibility level for a family of four will be correspondingly increased from \$567 to \$580 per month.

**Overton Hunt Regulations Explained**

Hunters planning to make reservations at Overton and Key Pittman Wildlife Management Areas for the second portion of the split waterfowl season may do so beginning Nov. 28 at either management area or at the Las Vegas Fish and Game office.

Nevada Department of Fish and Game will confirm hunt reservations on a first-come first-served basis to the hunter or his representative who appears in person with the appropriate hunting licenses from 8 a.m. until 5 p.m., Monday through Friday at all three locations through the end of the hunting season.

From Dec. 5 through the end of the waterfowl season, hunting at Overton Wildlife Management Area will be confined to 38 assigned hunt locations with up to three hunters permitted to hunt as a party at each location. Hunt areas at Overton will be marked by numbered stakes with hunters required to remain within 30 yards of their assigned location.

When making reservations to hunt at Overton, hunters will be asked to

specify whether they wish to hunt in a field, at a pond, in bulrushes or on the lake and after reporting at the checking station, will be assigned by a drawing to a specific location within their broad area of choice.

An Overton hunter with a reservation will be considered a "no show" if he does not present himself at the checking station one full hour before shooting time. Non-reservation standby hunters must register at the checking station upon arrival and will be permitted on the area if the reservation quota is unfilled. However, no hunters will be permitted to enter the Overton area after 8 a.m. on any hunt day for the remainder of the waterfowl season.

The second portion of Clark and Lincoln County's split waterfowl season resumed Dec. 5 and continues for geese through Jan. 1 and for ducks through Jan. 22. Hunters are advised to consult the official 1977 hunting season regulations for specific details regarding season dates, bag limits and other restrictions.

**"Last Remake of Beau Geste" opening at Rainbow Theatre**

**FOREIGN LEGION ROUTED IN MARTY FELDMAN'S ZANY COMEDY, "LAST REMAKE OF BEAU GESTE"**

Hanging from a drainpipe, fifty feet above the ground, Marty Feldman called "Cut!" Two days later, he crashed through a window, rolled over twice and moaned "Cut!" About to be executed by a firing squad, at point blank range, he mimed "Cut!" But the cruelest "cut" of all came on an isolated beach in Spain when Feldman

approved the final scene of "The Last Remake of Beau Geste," ending six months of comic mayhem.

Recalling the bruises, bumps and contusions he suffered, playing a misfit member of the French Foreign Legion, Feldman had only himself to blame. Universal's zany spoof, opening Nov. 30 at the Rainbow Theatre, was directed by the comedy star from his own screenplay with Chris Allen, based on a story he wrote with Sam Bobrick. That tale, in turn, was inspired by novelist P.C. Wren's legendary hero, Beau Geste, the subject of three earlier, more traditional desert epics.

Production of "The Last Remake of Beau Geste" began last summer in Ireland, where Feldman assembled a cast including Ann-Margret, Michael York, Peter Ustinov, James Earl Jones, Trevor Howard, Henry Gibson, Terry-Thomas, Roy Kinnear, Spike Milligan, Avery Schreiber, Hugh Griffith, Irene Handl, Sinead Cusack, Henry Polic II and Ted Cassidy. As the co-author of the script, Feldman said, he had a particular actor in mind for each role. As the director, he added, he was "extremely lucky" to get every one of them.

"I cast the picture in pairs," he went on. "Every villain has a sidekick. Because - as even Shakespeare knew - a villain must have someone to confide his nasty plots to."

Thus, Peter Ustinov as overbearing, overweight, half-mad Sergeant Markov has an evil ally in sneering Roy Kinnear, Equal in villainy, if not in girth are Henry Gibson and Henry Polic II, a pair of rail-thin French rogues. Most off-beat of all the villains are the Arab assailants, James Earl Jones (the celebrated star of "The Great White Hope") and Avery Schreiber (the moustachio'd hero of countless corn chip commercials).

Feldman's reasoning, in teaming them, was oddly logical. "Jones and Schreiber are like my eyes," he said. "They go together. But they're not really a matched set."

The only character who stands alone is Digby Geste, Beau's identical twin brother. "Once again," said Marty, "I was able to sign the one actor I wanted for the role. Me."

While the movie's early scenes are set in England, circa 1906, Feldman chose to film them in Ireland, where the countryside still exudes an old-world atmosphere. (Later, he would film the Moroccan scenes in Spain to take advantage of that country's

desert, climate and technical facilities.)

First of the Irish shooting sites was Dublin's infamous Kilmainham Jail. The scene called for Digby to escape from jail in an attempt to join Beau in the Foreign Legion. Performing his own stunts, Feldman raced across rooftops, dangled from a giant hook, and sailed headlong through an open window. Anticipating scrapes and bruises, he was not disappointed. "Hopefully, they'll prove worth it," he said. "A broken rib for a small laugh is a bad deal, but a minor bruise for a big laugh is a fair exchange."

The scene shifted to stately Adare Manor in Limerick County. Its occupants, The Earl and Countess of Dunraven had agreed to loan their magnificent home to Universal only after meeting Feldman and discovering his interest in Victorian art objects.

The Dunravens' more than \$2,000,000 worth of furniture and paintings were soon complemented by Marty's mad notion of what Sir Hector would have on his walls. Included were mounted mice and a hippo's head, devouring someone identified as Uncle Thaddeus.

Adare Manor proved a movie maker's dream, and filming stayed ahead of schedule until disaster struck. Star-director-writer Feldman caught chicken pox. "I wouldn't have minded if it was horse pox or bull pox, but chicken pox really got me down," he said later.

Production shut down until Marty's recovery, then moved to Spain, where production designer Brian Eatwell built the Legion outpost, Fort Zindeneuf, in two places. On a bald hill on the outskirts of Madrid, he constructed the interior of the fort, and in Matalascanas, on the Atlantic coast, he erected the exterior. To bridge the gap, he shipped 2,000 tons of sand from Matalascanas to Madrid, an act which inspired workmen to question the sanity of their Anglo-American visitors.

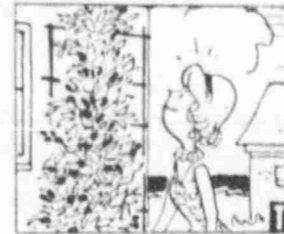

State statute 361.225 mandates that assessed value of property should be based on a ratio of 35% of the appraised value which is predicated from market (sales) value. Assessor's appraisal value may be determined by dividing assessed value by .35.

State statute requires that all property in the County must be reappraised and reassessed at least once in each 5-year period. Reappraisals may occur in less than 5-year period when significant increases or decreases occur in a certain vicinity, particularly where structural improvements may be added during the intervening 4-year period.

Where property assessment values have been changed, either increasing or decreasing from previous fiscal tax years, a postal notice shall be mailed to any owner affected by assessment value changes which the County Assessor must consider under the rules and regulations of prevailing State laws.

Property owners who may disagree with the Assessor's appraised value of their property may file a petition with the County Board of Equalization to determine if their assessments are equal with others in their areas.

The filing of a petition is done by completing a form which will be available in the County Assessor's Office, then scheduled for presentation to the County Board during their meetings which will be held in January of each year.

The State Board of Equalization meets during the month of February. Petitioners who may be denied an adjustment of their assessments by the County Board may further appeal their case to the State Board of Equalization, and if denied there, they have final recourse by taking their case to district court.

## Deer Seasons Over -- Tag Returns Needed Now

Deer hunting in Nevada has ended for this year, according to Nevada Department of Fish and Game, but the state's wildlife management agency is reminding hunters that their hunt shouldn't be considered complete until they return the questionnaire portion of their deer tag.

All recipients of the 21,028 resident and 2,335 nonresident deer tags this year are required, by state law, to return

the questionnaire portion within five days of the close of the season after answering the few questions asked.

According to the department's game division, "The information requested is much needed and is used annually not only to assess the total harvest but is invaluable in the management of deer herds throughout the state."

"It only takes a few minutes to answer the questions asked on the

postcard questionnaire that each deer tag recipient received attached to his deer tag. The card is self-addressed and self-stamped and all the holder has to do is drop it in a mail box."

"Deer hunters have been cooperating in greater numbers in recent years in filling out and returning their hunt questionnaires although many fail to do this easy task annually and these are the people we are appealing to this year," a

game official reports.

He said whether or not a hunter was successful in harvesting an animal, he must return the questionnaire return portion and failure to do this jeopardizes the hunter's right to participate in future hunts under Nevada law.

Those who received tags for other hunts such as antelope and elk are also required to report the success of their hunts on similar questionnaire return cards.

## Application Forms Available for Park Service

Application packets are now available for those interested in summer employment with the National Park Service, according to Western Regional Director Howard H. Chapman.

"The packets containing application forms and a list of available positions may be obtained by writing to the Employment Office, National Park Service, Western Regional Office, 450 Golden Gate Ave., San Francisco, Calif. 94102, or by calling 556-6429," Chapman said.

The summer employment period in national parks is between Memorial Day and Labor Day. Applications for summer unskilled laborer (including roads, grounds and trail work), aides, technicians, and park naturalist and ranger positions will be accepted at the Western Regional Office or any National Park Service area from Dec. 1, 1977 through Jan. 15, 1978. The application period begins and closes earlier than last year, Chapman noted.

Applicants for any National Park Service position must be U.S. citizens and be at least 18 years old.

Areas of the National Park Service System in Western Regional located in Arizona, Calif., Hawaii and Nevada will hire about 1,000 additional employees for the summer season, but nearly 75 percent of the positions will be filled by returning employees.

"This means," Chapman explained, "that only of the 10,000 or more anticipated applications for consideration in Western Region park areas, only 250 new hires will be selected for jobs in the Region's 38 parks."

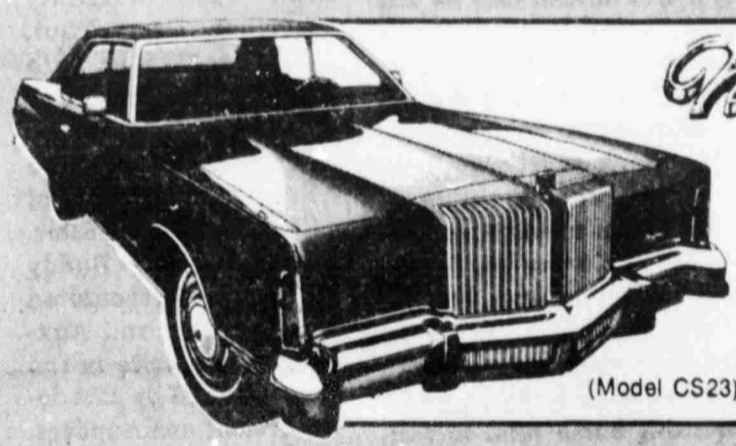

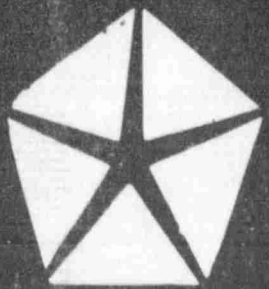

She was a part of the newspaper that took care of the front counter, the telephone, the countless newsboys, the purchasing for the presses, the linotype machines. She handled the payroll, then went out to collect accounts so we could make the checks good at the bank.

If there was ever a left hand to the publisher it was Virginia. The right hand position has always been held by Lorna, as I hope will continue to be forevermore.

Virginia Campbell had great loves in her life -- her husband George and her son Kurt, and her grandson -- Bobby. For them she was the typical mother, wife, grandmother ... always there to serve, always there to advise, always there to iron out the problems -- always there to be a part of the fun that always pervaded the air of the household.

Virginia lived for the wonderful days George brought her. He always being an out-going fellow, it was natural that he was popular and always called upon to serve the public in some capacity. In both Boulder and Henderson you'd always catch Virginia -- or "Hootie!" as George nicknamed her, always sitting at George's table as he headed the Chamber of Commerce, Rotary, charter committee work, Masonic matters.

These were vital people during the history of each city's fight for democratic home rule. In fact, one night "Hootie" ran a victory party for George, as the early results showed he was elected to one of the then three spots on the county commission. After a hectic evening of celebrating at The Campbell's Six-Company house in Boulder, it developed George lost the election during the night when the valley votes came in.

Virginia, if plied with questions, would agree to talk a bit about herself. About her brother's part in the building of the dam. About her brother-in-law's helping Jake Dieleman get the "I Pick 'em up" business started in Vegas, how nice and thin George was when he came out of the Navy after the war, where he served as a diver fixing blown out submarines.

Virginia was the only stable part of our newspaper for awhile and while arguments between bosses blossomed into heated scenes -- she would quiet us down and caution us to be quiet or we'd lose our customers.

Virginia Campbell passes on, a victim of cancer, but this is one thing for sure -- her family and friends will keep her alive as long as all of us live -- with stories and thoughts that will be rekindled wherever conversation of the good old days come up.
