Chamber Asks Council To Change Donation Policy On Christmas

A request from the Chamber of Commerce for \$1,000 to help with Christmas decorations, was allowed on the next city council agenda despite a previous ruling from the council that the city will not donate to any organization.

The council had made a pol-

icy for the administration not to place any requests on the council agenda.

Duane Laubach, president of the Chamber of Commerce, in a letter to the council said they were able to acquire sur-

plus garland and pole wraps due the fact that downtwon Las Vegas was changing its Christmas decoration program. He said they were able to make the purchase for about ten cents on the dollar for the whole lot. The total price was \$1,476. They paid half the amount and had planned to pick up the other half with

money from the city.

"In the interim," Laubach said. "the city was put in the awkward position and as a result adopted a policy restricting donations to civic groups and organizations. The Christmas donations were included in that policy." Laubach said he believes that the Christmas program is not necessarily performed by a single group or organization. Others are involved such as the Kiwanis, senior citizens, Boys' club, Moose Lodge, Rotary club, the schools and individuals. He said he felt it was a total community effort.

"We would encourage the council to reconsider the Henderson Christmas program as not being part of the intent of the policy adopted by the council regarding donations," Laubach concluded.

Would Employ 500

A manufacturing firm which would employ over 500 persons has had officials in the city this week looking over the possibility of locating in Henderson, it was learned here.

The firm, which asked not to be identified, send representatives here Tuesday to look over possible sites for their operations which would move here from another state. A decision is expected to be made this week.

If the firm selects Henderson it would hope to be in operation by next May.

This large firm, along with smaller ones have been looking at Henderson on almost a daily basis. SHOPPING CENTERS COMING Three major commercial areas are developing in Henderson.

One is a six-acre parcel of land being developed by a Salt Lake City firm between McDonalds and Stepman Dodge. This will include numerous shops, a major supermarket and drug store, along with a financial institution.

Another is a shopping center in the Victory Village area of the city along Boulder Highway which will include K-Mart and related stores.

Along Lake Mead Drive in the Victory Village area, plans are formed for a travel trailer park, motel, and apartment complex. A shopping area is also being planned for the Green Valley area of the city along Sunset Drive.

There are a number of housing developments, some ready to go and some in the future. Meyers, Lewis Homes and Chism, are continuing to build homes in the Horizon Drive area of the city south of the golf course.

Approximately 1,000 homes have been approved for the Green Valley area around the Paradise Valley golf course.

Individual home building is at an all-time high around section 19, section 27, and Mission Hills. Just recently the city council approved the sale of 120 acres to Lewis Homes in section 27 for approximately 400 new homes.

Doorn Estates, of approximately 150 homes, are planned for a subdivision near Palo Verde. Another



City Manager Bob Campbell said the short term improvement for the south end of the city (Mission Hills, Levi Strauss, Section 27) is to create a looping system by going under the tracks at a cost of around \$25,000.

Campbell said he is attempting to get federal funding for this project and should know within the next few weeks. At this time it "looks good," he said.

If the grant is not approved, then the city will have to approve funding from other sources.

The other area of concern is Green Valley. Final league standings were Colts, first place followed by the Cowboys. Raiders, Mean Machine and the Eagles.







Valley's Sophomore Billy White scored 24 points and collected 21 rebounds and Guard Otis Jackson added 18, to lead the Valley scoring.



In its newly revised "Guide for Professional Conduct," APTA's Judicial Committee interpreted a recent change in the Association's Code of Ethics as permitting the advertisement of fees for initial evaluations and for routine physical therapy services. Under the new guidelines, physical therapists will also be able to advertise certain factual information about themselves.

Kleven pointed out that physical therapy's role in health care has grown rapidly in the last dozen years. Many health insurance plans, including Medicare, now provide some coverage for physical therapy services. "Despite this growth, too many people still don't know about the service we provide and most people don't have comparative information on the costs of those services," Kleven said. "By lifting its man on advertising, APTA has removed a barrier to the public's right to information about physical therapy.'

Advertising by physical therapists must conform to specific guidelines laid down by



DMV Launches New Computer System

The Nevada Department of Motor Vehicles has begun a new distributed processing computer system ... the first of its kind in any Nevada state governmental agency.

Hale Bennett, chief of the Department's Automation (data processing) Division, today said the Department is utilizing "mini - computers" in four of its offices. The "distributed tele-

processing system" allows the Department to continue processing customer transactions through the mini - computer even when the State's main computer in Carson City may be down. Bennett said the De-

partment has placed the "mini - computers" in the Reno, Las Vegas, North Las Vegas and Carson City offices. The new system will

have its greatest effect on the Department's Registration and Driver License Divisions which process hundreds of vehicle registration and driver license requests daily.

Senior Computer Systems Analyst Donna Marsing, who is also manaager of Computer Systems Analysis for Automation Division, designed the wrote the specifications for the entire Registration project on the new system. She is now training and implementing the Registration procedures in branch offices. "After only two days

experience on the new system, each Registration employee in the Reno office was able to process up to 25 per cent more transactions daily," said Marsing. "The new terminals are currently being installed in the Department's Las Vegas and North Las Vegas offices." "Not only should the new system increase output," added Marsing, "but it will improve the accuracy rate in our branch offices." Marsing noted that the new program will greatly reduce the customer transaction time at the counters. Jim Whitworth, computer systems analyst for the Automation Division, is handling the implementation and training of the program in the Department's Driver License Division. He noted that in just a few days of training, driver license personnel have been able to cut their computer processing time on the computer terminals by one third. "Multiply that transaction time by hundreds of customers daily and the resultant time savings is truly substantial," he said. **Division Chief Bennett** noted the Department has just touched "the tip of the iceberg" in using the new system. "There is a whole litany of transactions which this computer system can handle which we have not yet even begun to tap." 




Creek Inn. He works five

often do on the re-telling. Now, though, this man Johnny is the living Scotty for tales of today and not yesterday. This man Johnny's story is one where a fellow about 37 years ago decided to go straight. .take hold of himself and see if he could quit drinking, smoking, tearing his body apart by wine-women-and-song... and counter attack by putting into effect a battle plan...the plan being how to live to be 100.

In his fifties he decided this and he is now going to on 83. He is now a scamp-



What makes it come home to roost is that Johnny tells us how to do the same...he tells you here and now how to live to be a 100.


"Our body is a temple, given to us to destroy or live to be a 100," he starts. "Remove all bad habits and replace them with good habits."

Now that's preaching and you didn't turn to this column today to get a sermon.

So we get down to the nitty gritty.

Here is what you mix together and eat every day. Almonds, pecans, walnuts, dates, figs, raisins, prunes, fruits [peeled], a spoon of olive oil and three spoons of honey. Apple juice poured into this concoction and there you have it -- the elixer of life.

You eat this main dish at noon and at times of the



day you get hungry. You make up fruit dishes for between meals naashing. Now sticking to just this

is tough, Johnny explains, but only until you become used to it. Self control -you must keep hold of that.

"You get it" is his start of every sentence and often the finish as you get up and walk the floors in the early hours with Johnny, listening as he pours you coffee, as he says...don't forget, a bowl of mixed fruit, no

sugar, little honey, olive oil -- boy what a clean bowel you'll have -- and no odor, he assures you -because of nature's cleansing. His preachings urge you to be a "fruitarian" with him. "You get it" ... eat the

right food. Fruit [no skins] and nuts, no vegetables. It's the olive oil and honey that make the difference. No sugar. Don't worry if you are a short sleeper. Quit that coffee, as he pours me another. Johnny sleeps four or five hours a night. He climbs up the little mountain behind the Inn each day, carrying his cuttings off the Inn's throw away food from the guests...cuttings and slicings from the steaks, chops, fish, etc...and when he gets up there high he has his little garden spot where the birds come and eat and sip water and they sing to him. He raves about how smart they are and how they intercommunicate.

"This is between you

pate when they are pregnant...it all goes into the child. Love is beautiful if you can live as one. He explains he learned it from living from a wife who was paralyzed and he learned to have the self control to take care of her as long as she lived

There's nothing wrong with me, Johnny goes on, I like sex. I'm just trying to see how it feels to live to be a 100. Doing it on fruit and nuts and self control. It's easy.

"I don't condemn nobody. That's up to them what they do. But I see it all. When you talk to a drunk, it's like talking to a wall. Lack of control and soon your body can't take it anymore. You lose the red corpuscles and the whites take over...and you die."

Teachers Hired By School District This Year

The Clark County School District hired 560 new teachers this year --307 to fill vacancies and the balance to handle increased enrollment and to make at least some inroads into teacher workload at the junior high level.

By far the largest group -- 189 teachers -are Nevada residents, but they came from 43 states and one foreign country .296 have college training beyond their Bachelor's Degree, including 91 with Master's Degrees and three with Doctor's Degrees, 305 have previous teaching experience, while 182 are new to the classroom and another 73 have had experience only as substitute teachers.

School District before and are returning after leaves of absence or are simply reentering the profession after resigning some time in the past for a variety of reasons. The 560 hired come from more than 5,800 people who contacted the school district's personnel office. From that number 2,341 completed employment applications and were interviewed here or in 64 locations visited by representatives of the Clark County School District.

Ethnically, 474 are Caucasian, 48 Black, 12 Oriental, eight American Indian and 18 Spanish American. 388 are women and 172 are men. They range in age from 20 to 63 and average just over 29 years of age.

But what about the 307 who left last year? 44 retired and another six died during the course of the school year. Another 67 took leaves of absence and say they expect to return next year or at a later time. 190 resigned for a variety of reasons, including other employment, leaving the state and family responsibilities.

Those hired this year bring the total teaching staff in Clark County up to 3,870, as opposed to about 3,650 last year.





Vegetable **Hanging Baskets**

To make a simple and stunning little hanging planter, you need only a vegetable, some string, and a few household tools.

Begin with a carrot, beet, parsnip or turnip. Remove any leaves that may be on them. Slice about one-half inch off the end opposite the stem end. About one-half inch below the slice, make three holes an equal distance apart. These small holes will be used for hanging the vegetable.

Using a knife or an apple corer, core out the center of the vegetable, taking care not to go all the way through. The hollow center will be used to hold water.

Take three equal lengths of string or wire and knot these through the three holes you made. Select a relatively bright spot for our vegetable and than hang it. Now fill the cavity with water. Be sure to keep the center filled with water at all times.

In a few days, sprouts will begin to show from the bottom of the plant. Eventually they will start looking like ferns and will curl up towards the top. Gradually they will cover the entire vegetable.

For experimentation sake, you might try making several of these unique little planters using a few different vegetables. This is one very economical and self-

satisfying way to increase






Overton Beach Development Concept Plan Released
