School District - City, May Exchange Land

An exchange of land between the Clark County School District and the City for a school site near Horizon Drive was discussed by the city council Monday night.

The school district land is at Horizon and Greenway and it would be the next elementary school to be erected in Henderson.

Some concerns were expressed by the city for the location because of traffic patterns. It was proposed by the city that the school district be granted six acres south of

O'Callaghan Park, and that an additional ten acres be granted to the District out of the 80 acres still owned by the city and lying just west of the present Mission Hills. In return the district would release the 20 acres at Greenway and Horizon for some type of public recreational use in accord with the land grant patent.

It has been proposed by the city recreation director that the land be used for a sports complex with ball fields and other sports.

Curb Cuts For Handicapped Completed

Several mobility specialists from the Nevada Association of the Physically Handicapped visited Henderson last week to inspect the curb cuts which have just been completed by the City of Henderson.

Twenty - four cuts were made in the downtown section which enables the physically handicapped easier access to streets when necessary to cross. The city has also installed a number of handicapped parking spaces, blue painted curbs complete with signs, in strategic areas of town.

A city spokesman noted that people are parking their cars in front of some of the curb cuts which is illegal.

The specialists expressed great satisfaction with the manner in which the city has aided the handicapped.

They explained that their job is to visit hotels, restaurants, casinos, businesses, etc. and make recommendations on how the facilities could be improved for the use of the handicapped.

The Federal Government now offers a \$25,000 tax break to private businesses if they will enlarge doorways, put in ramps in place of stairs, install railings in bathrooms and make other improvements in existing buildings for the assistance of the handicapped.

There are now laws in effect which cover the construction of new buildings or an addition to a business already in operation.

Building Skyrockets To Over 19 Million **During March**

Building valuations for the first three months in Henderson exceeded the entire year of 1976, it was learned from John Quinn, superintendent of building and safety.

The valuations through March of this year totalled \$9,852,350, and for the same period last year the totals were \$5,714,005.

A new mobile home park with 298 spaces valued at \$1,200,000 helped bolster the

valuations, but the big emphasis was one new dwellings with 113 homes at \$3,883,080.

A new commercial and commercial alterations brought the totals up \$145,000 and \$320,145 respectively. Other permits included residential alterations and additions, patios, garages, fences and walls, pools and grading.

There were 816 inspections done during the month with 18 clean - up violations and 17 compliances.

Standards For Walls and Fences Receives A 'Do Pass'

The City Council made a "do pass" recommendation to accept the recommendations for standards for walls and fences in the commercial and industrial districts along major roads in the city as made by a committee of the Planning Commission.

The committee, composed of Gloria Castleberry as chairperson and Mary Roberts, met with Planning Director Bob Gordon on several occasion. They concluded that the real problem regarding walls and fences was one of enforcement of present ordinances rather than a need for a new ordinance.

Better communication between city departments for locating violations and following up until the required improvements are made was stressed.

Gordon commented that in the past few months numerous violations had been reported and acted upon.

Council Carlton Lawrence reflected that in the four and a half years that Gordon has been Planning Director the city had improved in appearance.

It was suggested that a member of the Planning Commission be appointed to

attend Council meetings to establish better rapport between the Commission and the Council.

Another suggestion was to change the wording "block wall" in the present ordinance to an "architecturally acceptable masonry wall."

Strict enforcement of use permit conditions is needed, the recommendations state, either requiring the conditions be met before the use permit is issued or establish a method of follow up at a later

For those uses where a block wall is not required by ordinance, the committee felt that chain link fencing with plantings and or redwood slatting is satisfactory and more attractive than block walls. However, there needs to be assurance that the plantings will be watered and maintained and also that the slats will be maintained.

A method of bringing businesses up to standard is needed, such as setting a time limit in which to bring their property up to standard.

Other suggestions included publishing a newsletter in the HOME NEWS urging business people to comply with city ordinances and instigating a clean - up campaign with the assistance of the paper.

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"Living Legends" David Niven & Helen Hayes Co-Star In Disney Suspense Comedy another as her butler, holy cow."

For a couple of living legends, David Niven and Helen Hayes are pretty offhand. "Living legends, heavens how pompous," Miss Hayes demurred. "All we do is still go to the office."

The two Academy Award winners, with a century of acting between them, co - star in Walt Disney Productions' suspense comedy, "Candleshoe." Miss Hayes plays the mistress of a mansion that conceals pirate gold. Niven jumps from one role to

chauffeur, gardener, and a cavalry officer from India.

"David dislikes labels as much as I," Miss Hayes said, returning to the business of living legends.

"I have been called the first lady of the American theater, and recently the veteran actress. That bothers me so much that I made up my own label: the great white goddess of the American stage. Sometimes I call myself the

Miss Hayes, 77, has been acting since she was five. She made her reputation on the stage, and retired from it reluctantly when she grew allergic to theater dust. She went into motion pictures only because her husband, the late Charles MacArthur, was employed in Hollywood

as a screenwriter. "At that time I was a star in the theater in New York with a couple of big hits behind me and I didn't want to go to

California," Miss Hayes said.

"I wasn't bitten by the film bug, but Charlie wanted me there. He wanted out family to stay together.

MacArthur wrote the screenplay for his wife's movie debut, "The Sin of Madelon Claudet," and it brought her an Academy Oscar. Thirty eight years and 13 pictures later, in 1970, Miss Hayes won another Oscar for her performance in "Airport."

Unlike Helen Hayes,

David Niven has never felt comfortable in the theater.

"I came to Hollywood in 1934 without any acting experience, and so I enrolled at Pasadena Playhouse nearby. Thus I came to hate the theater," he said.

"I resented going to work when everybody else was going home to dinner. I liked opening nights because the possibility of disaster is very great and that's fascinating. But then you are

either in a flop, which goes on forever into

boredom. "So I am just a miserable stage actor. I love being part of an audience, but I loathe being

up on the stage." Niven was completely at ease in front of movie cameras, however, and never regretted the year he put in as an extra on the road to flicker fame.

"It was very rough going, but like all the extras in those days I had another job. I worked as a deckhand most of the time, which I enjoyed hugely."

Niven's luck improved when film producer Samuel Goldwyn made a mistake. Thinking he was signing the unknown actor away from Irving Thalberg, his archrival, Goldwyn put Niven under contract. Their turbulent association lasted many years.

Niven won Academy Award as best actor in 1958 for "Separate Tables." Characteristically he waves the applause away from himself.

"I always thank Deborah Kerr and Wendy Hiller. They won it for me," Niven said.

"They had to cry in the picture, which they did so beautifully that when I spoke the camera panned to them sobbing ... and I got the Oscar.

A member of the Disney alumni association along with Helen Hayes, Niven returned for "Candleshoe." He made his bow for the studio in "No Deposit, No Return," while Miss Hayes had done "One of Our Dinosaurs Is Missing" and "Herbie Rides Again."

"Candleshoe," adapted by David Swift and Rosemary Anne Sisson from a book by Michael Innes, also stars Jodie Foster and Leo McKern as fortune hunters on the trail of hidden treasure. Norman Tokar, under Ron Miller's executive producership, directed the color by Technicolor film for Buena Vista release. Starts April 12 at



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
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



This assures that vital resources are conserved and

Interestingly, the Act, which established the 200-mile fishing zone, also established regional Fishery Management Councils. These Councils develop fishery management plans for the stocks of fish off-our coast, subject to the approval of the Department of Commerce. The plans establish quotas for foreign and U.S. fishing. 


