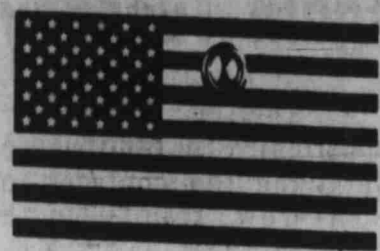


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Publisher Gives Review Of Trip Into Darkest Africa

(Written enroute home from Venezuela, Brazil, Nigeria, Liberia, Africa ... April 4 ...)
We're in it brother, we're in it up to our ears, you and I ... into Africa's problems, be it their prosperity, wars, peace,

survival or downfall, with - and or against friend or foe, which right now includes the names of the world ... Russia, Cuba, Saudi Arabia, England, West Germany, et al.
From this vantage point as a member of the White House press corps, we have tailed the man you've elected president, Jimmy Carter, first in Venezuela (and it's oil problems) then in Brazil, (where we weren't welcome,) then Nigeria (where you realized you've acquired the African continent as part of your lifestyle from now on) and Liberia,

(where an exclamation point was put on it all).
Yes, partner, Africa is as close as Vegas, Henderson and Boulder City -- in your daily life, and you'd better know it.
For Africa we've learned by discussion with men more in the know than a simple country editor -- men in public office, analysts with the nation's best press, and from a down - to - earth on the scene common citizen observation post we have elected to look from -- Africa will be the site of World War III, if there is to

be a war one day.
Africa, the third continent, so large and so rich and so able to be the source of mankind's food, minerals, energy, manpower, can also be the place where World War III will be averted.
And that brings us up to now this trip...and maybe a good reason that President Carter and his inside group of advisors (averaging 35 years of age) are here sticking our national nose into more foreign affairs. Sort of Nero fiddling while Rome burns -- for there are many national problems

in the USA we learned as we traveled.
Carter and his men seem either stuck with a human rights flag they flew to get him elected -- or are insisting on preaching it around the world (as we have done in Poland, India, France, Belgium, Iran.) (Carter didn't preach it in Saudi Arabia, where religion runs the oil country.)
Or, maybe, the Carter administration is engineering one of history's greatest world wide campaigns that may one day bring peace to the entire earth, or, may lead us into

war.
How to read it -- which way do we go with this -- you name it. But -- let's write it on the blackboard ...
Most important of all the conversation this week ... was not only that which was allowed to be printed by the World Press -- but also that material we received behind the scenes in off - the - record chats between Carter and military leader General Obazanzo of strong Nigeria.

LDS Hydroponic Garden Groundbreaking Set

Groundbreaking ceremonies for a hydroponic garden in the Center Street area of the city near the Henderson Boys' Club, will be held by the LDS Henderson Third Ward Sat. at 5 p.m. on the site, according to Bishop Stanley Albiston.

Officiating at the ceremonies will be Leonard Stubbs, stake president of the Henderson, Nevada Stake.

The new structures will feature a building 22 feet by 70 feet of modern design with an auxiliary building for offices and an area for starting plants to be transplanted into the

main building. The crop produced will be tomatoes which will be sold locally and the money will be used for the Church's welfare program.

The project is expected to cost around \$24,000 and is in keeping with the general church program to establish welfare projects for the various Wards to be self-sufficient.

The building will be located on one acre of land, fenced and landscaped. The members of the Ward will be instrumental in constructing and maintaining the project.

City Towing Contract To Be Discussed Again Tuesday

For the second time during Monday night's City Council meeting, the council voted to a 2-2 tally, this time over the lucrative contract for towing privileges and to whom it should be awarded.

Councilmen Carlton Lawrence and Gary Price voted to renew the city's one year contract with SNAP-TOW while Mayor Pro-tem Phil Stout and Councilwoman Loran Kesteron voted against the issue.

It was then postponed until a recessed meeting set for next Tuesday, April 11 at 7 p.m. when it is hoped Mayor Lorin Williams will be back to break the deadlock.

Monte Morris, speaking for All American, Inc., said the awarding of the contract should be done the all American way, giving each firm an

opportunity. The continuance of giving the contract to SNAP-Tow results in a "monopoly."

"In fairness, it has to be rotated," he maintained.

SNAP-Tow's lawyer, Edwin Pomeranz, claimed that "if the service operation works, why should it be changed. It should be awarded on merit."

SNAP-Tow has held the city contract for the last seven years and during that time the service has been excellent.

However, during the past year All American has also met all the specifications as set forth by the city and is requesting an opportunity to also do the city's towing.

"If they don't do a good job, the contract can be taken away from them," Morris said. "They just want the opportunity," he concluded.

City Purchase Of Water From County Approved

The city council Monday night approved an agreement to purchase water from the Las Vegas Valley Water District to serve the Green Valley area and the agreement was also approved by the L.V. Valley Water District on Monday.

The agreement is for interim water service until Henderson is able to build the facilities it needs to provide water to the area at the completion of the second phase of the Southern Nevada Water project.

The water line to service the area, will be constructed by the American - Nevada Corp. to the tune of around \$350,000. The 13,000 feet of water main will extend from Boulder Highway to the Green Valley area near Paradise Valley. It is expected that the line will supply water for up to 4,000 residential units.

The contract with the district is the result of lengthy negotiations and discussions. The base rate of \$562 per month and 40 cents per 1,000 gallons is excessive of the amount of the present rates of \$5 per month and 28 cents per 1,000. However, according to City Manager Bob Campbell, the city will "break even" when 250 to 300 homes are being served, and "that time is fast approaching."

--Approved a resolution of

intent for Clemons F. Walker to rezone a portion of section 17 from C-2 to R-3. The land is located behind Safeway between that store and the city park.

--Approved a resolution of intent to rezone a portion of section 4 from RR (rural residence) to C-2 (commercial, for Robert J. Glassburn and Jane B. Corn.

--Approved a resolution of intent to rezone a parcel of land located in section 18 from residential to C-2 commercial for the construction of a motel on Lake Mead Drive and Water Street.

--Approved resolutions of intent for rezoning of sections 31 and 32 to general commercial for Richard C. MacDonald and Tauri Investment Corp.

--Approved a use permit to operate a used clothing store at 1729 North Boulder Highway for Zelda and Donald Tracy, 601 Cameo Circle.

--Approved a special events liquor permit for St. Rose de Lima Hospital employees for May 6.

--Approved an intent to enter into a refunding agreement with Verl Sanders.

--Set a recessed meeting for Tues., April 11.

--Approved authorization for the city manager to apply for community development block grants.

--Approved the 1978-79 tentative budget.

Market Street Vacation Hearing Set May 1

A public hearing on an application to vacate a portion of Market Street for the construction of a three-story hotel, was set for May 1 by the city council Monday night.

Prior to coming to the public hearing, the matter will be discussed by the city planning commission. This is the third application for the Eldorado Club for a vacation. The first was withdrawn by the owners, Sam and William Boyd, and the second was turned down by the city council because the business community protested the closure of Market Street.

The proposed hotel, the first planned for Henderson, would have 66 rooms and would feature a two-story parking area across Market Street from the Eldorado Club. The hotel would be con-

structed adjacent to the present casino in the parking lot. The Eldorado Club just recently underwent expansion and it is expected if the application is approved the Eldorado would be ready for occupancy by the first of the year.

One of the main protestors at the last public hearing on the Eldorado Club was Pratt Prince, a pioneer barber who owned a barber shop near the area to be vacated. Since that time he has sold his barber shop to the Eldorado Club. The vacation was also protested by the nearby Rainbow Club.

Recent proposals by the city to provide parking on Market Street through an assessment district was turned down by downtown merchants.

208 Plan Would Outline Restrictions In Henderson

Clark County's water quality management plan, referred to as the 208 plan, may affect Henderson in various ways and councilmen were not too much in accord, according to Monday night's city council meeting.

Although primarily concerned with wastewater treatment, groundwater and stormwater management and land use, the plan includes a section dealing with keeping streets free of clutter that could wash into storm drains.

This could mean that Henderson would have to improve and beef up its street sweeping schedule.

The Clark County Commission will be the water quality planning agency. The county planners will be the environmental planning agency... and an environmental resources advisory board will also be created in connection with the plan designed by federal mandate to solve water pollution problems. If entities wish federal money for sanitation purposes, they must agree to

comply with the 208 plans.

Councilman Carlton Lawrence took exception to the county commissioners being the planning agency and also being appointed by the Governor as the air quality controllers.

"It's not the first mistake Governor O'Callaghan has made," Lawrence said.

Richard Atwater, 208 project coordinator, and John Buchanan, management analyst, were present at the council meeting to clarify points.

Atwood said the study attempted to identify the problem areas including those near Henderson.

The advisory board would be made up of non-elected, non-employee people. On the 12 member board, six would be from the county, three from Henderson, and one each from North Las Vegas, Henderson and Boulder City.

Lawrence and Mayor Pro Tem Phil Stout said they felt the group would be more effective with elected officials.

Pittman Improvements May Get Funds

Approximately 25 Pittman residents attended a meeting Tuesday night at the Pittman Community Center to discuss proposed improvements to the area being contemplated by the city.

The city council Monday night approved a request by the administration to proceed with an application to qualify the Pittman area for a Housing and Urban Development (HUD) block grant which would bring up to \$200,000 per year for the next three years for improvements such as streets, sidewalks, curbs,

street lights, parks, restrooms, and other public facilities.

City Manager Bob Campbell explained Washoe and Clark County are eligible for \$750,000. North Las Vegas automatically gets \$200,000 off the top, but Campbell said he feels the Pittman area would qualify for some of the money.

The first application must be sent in by May 15 and approval or disapproval will come in July. If the application is approved construction could begin from 9-12 months from now.

Mayor Pro Tem Phil Stout attended the meeting and introduced City Manager Bob Campbell. Gil Valdez helped organize the meeting. Other city officials present included Public Works Director Jeff Billingsley, Deputy Public Works Director Jay Rassler, Planning Director Bob Gordon and City Auditor Jerry Webster.

Campbell said the city will draw up tentative plans with input from the citizens who at-

tended the meeting and then another meeting will be held in Pittman.

The vote taken by the survey showed that 13 of those surveyed feel street paving is very much needed and three felt some is needed.

Eleven of those surveyed felt curbs and gutters are needed and two felt that some is needed.

As to sidewalks, nine felt they were very much needed, four felt some were needed and one felt none were needed.

Eleven people felt street lights were needed very much and four felt that some were needed.

Thirteen people felt restrooms for the park are very much needed and two felt they are needed some. Water improvements and sewer improvements brought little enthusiasm as eight for water and seven for sewer felt they were very much needed, one for water some needed and two said they were not needed. Four felt some sewer improvements were necessary and two said none are needed.

Twelve people felt flood drainage improvements are very much needed and two said there is some needed.

Ten felt playground improvements are very much needed and five felt that some were needed.

Six felt a senior citizen center is needed and two said it is a little needed and three said it is not needed. Two people said some stop signs are needed in the area.

Claims Against City

Two claims have been presented against the city, one claiming the city damaged a home wall, the other a septic tank.

A formal complaint against the city turned over to the insurance carrier Monday night by the city council for Robert A. Bjornson, 240 Sherwood.

Bjornson claimed the city's earth mover was putting excess dirt from the street on his property and drove over the septic tank and caved it in. He said that no one was at home at the time, but it destroyed

the tank and will have to be replaced. He estimated the damage at \$1,000.

The other complaint was received from Ed Shaughnessy of Ed's Auto Repair, who claimed that due to the cutting of Victory Road to allow for a pipe trench, it caused extensive cracking to the stucco on his home at 10 Victory Road.

After making a check of the home, city officials denied the claim stating that some of the cracks are obviously old and have been double painted. They said other houses in the area show no cracks at all.

Zone Changes For Section 24 Postponed

Before a packed council chamber, the City Council voted to a 2-2 deadlock Monday night over a zone change requested by Young American Homes.

Mayor Pro-tem Phil Stout and Councilman Carlton Lawrence voted in favor of the request asking for a change from R-R (rural residential) to R-1 (one family residential) while Councilman Lorna Kesteron and Gary Price opposed the change.

Mayor Lorin Williams was absent from the meeting due

to illness.

Following the vote the request, plus a similar request from Black Mountain Realty, was postponed until a recessed meeting, scheduled for next Tuesday, April 11 at 7 p.m., when it is anticipated a full council will be present.

A number of residents from Section 19, which is adjacent to Section 24 and zone rural estates, vehemently expressed their opposition to the change of 32 acres which would allow for between 120 to 130 tract homes.

G.C. Wallace of Wallace Engineering spoke representing Young American Homes. He explained that it would be a totally improved subdivision with the developer providing water and sewer, paved streets, street lights, curbing, etc.

"The area streets are planned for this type of density," he said.

Bill Richardson said he has property between the two sections and had planned to build a home for his son. "I

bought the property for ranch estate property," he explained. "If the zone change passes, there won't be much property left up there. Please consider the wishes of the people affected," he pleaded.

Another resident of Sec. 19 explained that they had bought property as a "safe retreat from development in Las Vegas. The traffic of 200 additional homes would not make it safe for my children."

Dean Goodale explained that he lives in a tract home

now but plans on building in Sec. 19 within a year. He expressed concern that \$70,000 homes on one side of the street "won't be worth much if there are \$30 to \$40,000 on the other side.

Bob Gordon, Planning Director, said he really didn't want to get involved in the discussion but explained that "R-R zone is a holding zone until an area starts to grow."

Another concern expressed by the opposition was the fact that there would only be one

access road, Sherwood, into the subdivision and would pose a great traffic problem on Pacific, the only main road into the business section of Henderson.

In making the motion to approve the zone change, Lawrence said "We need R-1 zoning for Henderson to survive. R-E zoning costs more to the city. As long as we have fulfilled our obligation, I move for approval."

PAY YOUR POWER BILLS AT TOPS MARKET

Knowing World War III must be averted, they talked of how to mediate, negotiate, cajole, persuade those country's leaders, tribes, talk them out of the current trends they are taking.

Nigeria doesn't necessarily go for Carter's cure - alls. Nor does Carter go for Nigeria's. But -- they are talking along the same lines.

The leaders this week say something has to be done NOW, to get the trouble - makers together.

The blacks feel Africa is for them and those here feel the Blacks can lead the way if given tools to get it on. What tools --?-- financial aid, industrial capability, technical know-how that will build this new world that lies ahead.

And, entwined among all this -- Nigeria and those black countries it controls -- go along with President Carter's human rights -- which this week he brought down to detail ... Man free from military confrontation; man free from racial prejudice, from discrimination, from apartheid ... man free to work, play, select his leaders, speak his mind; man able to be educated.

It sounds like an old story merely brought up to date ... but this is the gift of Carterism ... and it is directed by satellite, short wave, secret and public courier to Moscow, South Africa, Ian Smith, the world over.

The men around Carter are doing their NOW thing this way ... trying to set up summits Begin - Sadat - like summits -- to put all the cards on the table and get them to air out their beefs, then try to mediate by logic. Carter's hand as he meddles, is well loaded with aces ... he has most of the free world on his side if this is enough to win or scare or educate the likes of South Africa, Russia, or whomever else is lurking in the unknown back ground ... then Jimmy The Great has moved in where others fear to tread ... or is moving in at a time no one figured he needed to ... to start or thwart what you must and please believe -- a

possible third world war.

The Carter Nigeria - Liberia Brazil - Venezuela talks this week seemed at the start to be another joy ride. Unlike his first trip at the turn of the year where that trip pointed up the Middle East problem -- which is sad, unfortunate, with an end yet to be determined.

But this place called Africa fellow -- we're talking of a biggie in comparison. And -- these fine wholesome, colorful, black people we visited don't want war any more than you or I.

They are working. They are getting educated. They are so proud of their heritage. They feel they deserve that peace and freedom be theirs ... instead of trouble. They tell us they'll develop into strong countries, the world will praise one day. They show you their homes, their kids, their tribal clothing. They know there is still filth and disease to clean up and clear out -- but mind you ... they seek not our sympathy for they say: "God made us strong to live through this. Our bodies are not suffering nor are our minds. We have made it for centuries and we'll make it forever. You want to help with your advanced techniques? Fine. Give us tools and we'll get there faster. We don't want planes we want what doesn't grow here and what we can't produce. In exchange, we'll give you what we turn out to take care of what you don't produce.

It is as simple as all that. They told it to Carter. He told them we'll try to guide and counsel and best find them a way. He said because we were developed and they were developing, it was the world's job to help them.

Nigeria, then, was the focal point -- the hotspot -- the place where the president had to get down to cases to work out where each side stands or would stand in the jockeying for position that does on among major powers, jockeying just in case negotiations don't go right, jockeying just in case some dummy drops a bomb like the Palestinians did in Israel just when peace

efforts were reaching second base.

Liberia, a four - hour stopover, is a peaceful land of plantation working blacks ... where rubber seems to be No. 1. Carter here repeated his human rights message ... reciting it phrase for phrase ... trying to drive home what our country was founded upon -- and has tried then -- freedom, with all men being created equal.

Big crowds turned out, it was a national holiday. In Brazil our president ran into the feeling he wasn't as wanted, hadn't been invited, and he actually wound up sleeping in the home of a Mayor instead of the usual grand palace or the nation's top residence.

Brazil is free but feels it hasn't been given enough help. It feels it will become the best nation on earth -- and that we should keep our nose out of there ... advice - wise.

Brazil said it would supply its own way out. You help us and we'll be much obliged ... but let's trade on an equal basis. Brazil says it is soon going to be self - sufficient. If you walk the beaches and boardwalks of beautiful Rio de Janeiro, you might agree with travel experts ... that here is the most beautiful place of all.

Venezuela -- well -- it is along with Nigeria, one of our biggest suppliers of oil, so Carter treated them like customers with respect, and his human rights bit was in line. The Venezuela President did make some points. The very first outing with -- an ok -- already, we accept the human rights doctrine ... but let's lay it aside this time and talk fact and item and -- when are you going to send in some modern equipment? We're using squirt cans and bare hands where we should have computers, modern drilling tools, sophisticated production machinery and how about raising the price of oil?

Yes -- oh, yes -- partner -- President Carter either got our foot in it deeper -- or started a new form of international discussion that could abort a world conflict. And -- everyone ... but everyone around here felt Africa could be the battlefield -- if? Time is on man's side now. The devil may win out if time should fail to win peace. Personally, I'll go with what we learned this week, the Nigerian motto -- "Unity and Faith." Our nation is "In God we Trust."

Africa -- Black Africa, could be so very great -- as a gigantic Democratic amalgamation of nations.

This much -- Carter's visit brought home for us ... realize.

Carter's trip has turned on the light to darkest Africa. Carter moved Africa right smack next door. And maybe rightly so.

Of it all, I'd say -- let the African do it alone -- they aren't ignorant -- give them help when they call and when they qualify Democratically.

And Carter has said enough any more and it'll look like campaign oratory.

Hospital Donates Disposables

St. Rose de Lima Hospital is participating in the "Vial of Life Program" by donating small disposable containers.

The Vial of Life committee, in cooperation with the Fire Department, hopes to provide the area's 40,000 senior citizens with a container which can be taped inside the individual's refrigerator.

Inside the vial is a typed sheet listing the residents names, doctor, insurance information, preferred hospital and a brief medical history. Most importantly, the sheet will show what medication the residents can or cannot take. In an emergency, police or paramedics can use the sheet to help save the

residents.

Fire departments have found that the interior of refrigerators often stays intact even during the immense heat of a household fire. The committee stresses uniformity in the location of the vial, taped under the refrigerators top shelf on the right side. Using this uniform system, firemen and police will always be able to find the information.

St. Rose de Lima has donated approximately 200 vials to date and will continue to provide the containers. Participation in the program is both a community service and a good way of recycling items which are normally thrown away.

To Be A Police Dispatcher Takes Patience & Skill

There are so many jobs that the general public usually takes for granted, whether it's in a small town or in a metropolis.

Being a police dispatcher seems to be high on that particular list, often being stereotyped on such shows as 'Adam-12' or 'Police Story' as nasal-voiced, frigid old women. But that classification doesn't hold true in Henderson, as was plain to see when talking to Carmen Wise, who has been employed as a dispatcher for ten years.

"You just have to like the job in order to stay at it. I've seen a lot of dispatchers come and go," explains Carmen with a smile. It's easy to see why, when ten different calls come in to her in the space of five minutes, each asking her to check the teletype and the Scope for priors on cars and individuals.

Becoming a good dispatcher takes a lot of patience and the ability to talk on the phone, answer calls, check the teletype, and help anyone coming into the office. "You have to be in two places at once," laughs Carmen.

The dispatcher is also responsible for contacting the Fire Department. If a serious accident takes place, he or she must release an ambulance, police and, if fatal, the coroner. So a lot must be taken into account when sitting at that desk answering the incoming calls from the surrounding community.

Dispatchers are put on a three to six month probation period to see whether or not the job is suited for their particular personality. As Carmen explains it, "Some people just can't handle the constant pressure."

There is no special day or time when the calls are extremely heavy, although the Swing Shift seems to be the busiest for them. There are usually three to six cars on patrol, depending on court cases and such. But if a need for more officers comes up, the lieutenants or captain can be called upon for immediate back-up.

"Our prime function is the radio and to help the officers out in those cars," comments Carmen. Of course, they don't forget the calls, either.

There are presently five dispatchers, four women and one man:

Carmen Wise, employed 10 years; Linda Maddox, 1 year; Sue Blair, 2 years; Mary Pate, 2½ years; and Gary Lancaster, 1½ years.

The majority of the calls received are disturbances - family or neighborhood - all minor, usually. There

have been a few interesting calls, like when the woman called on Sunday to ask the police to "make those bells stop ringing", referring, of course, to St. Peter's Church. And on an unusually windy day, someone called to find out when the wind was

going to stop blowing! The job seems extremely rewarding and judging from the attitude displayed by Carmen Wise, it is also a successful career.

Hardy is a 22 year resident of Henderson and graduated from Basic High School with the class of '71.

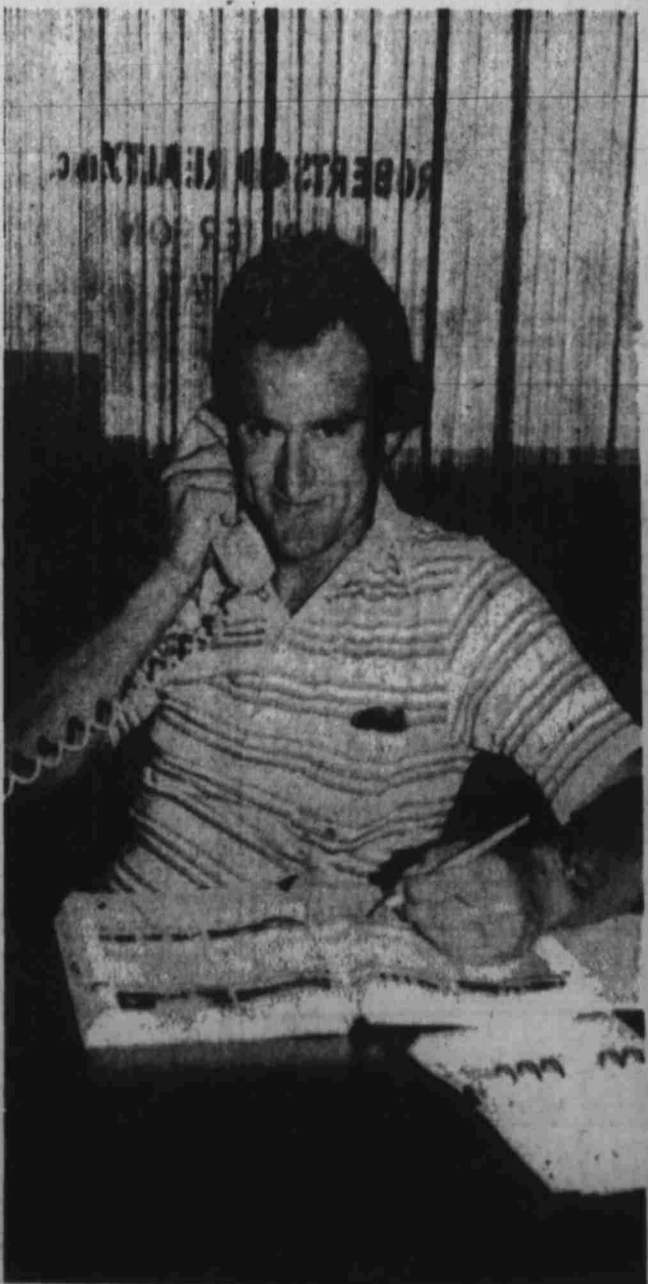
For the past four years he has been in the construction field, building homes from the ground up and is familiar with all phases of home building.

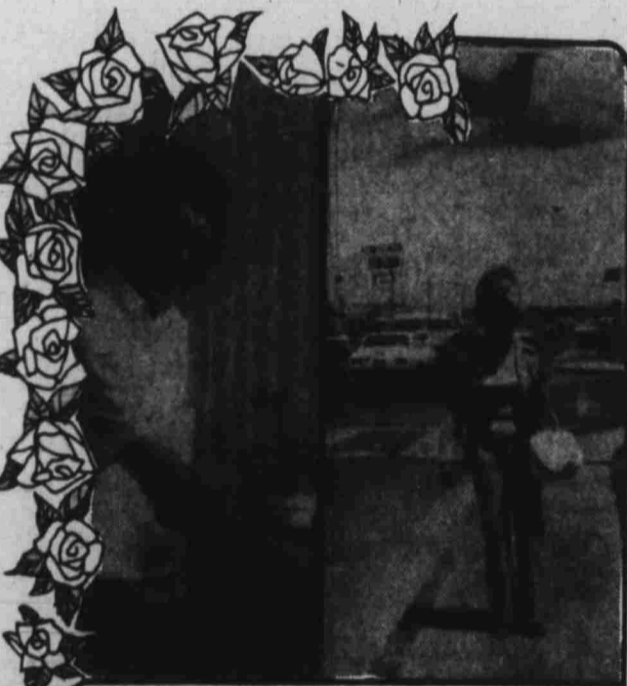

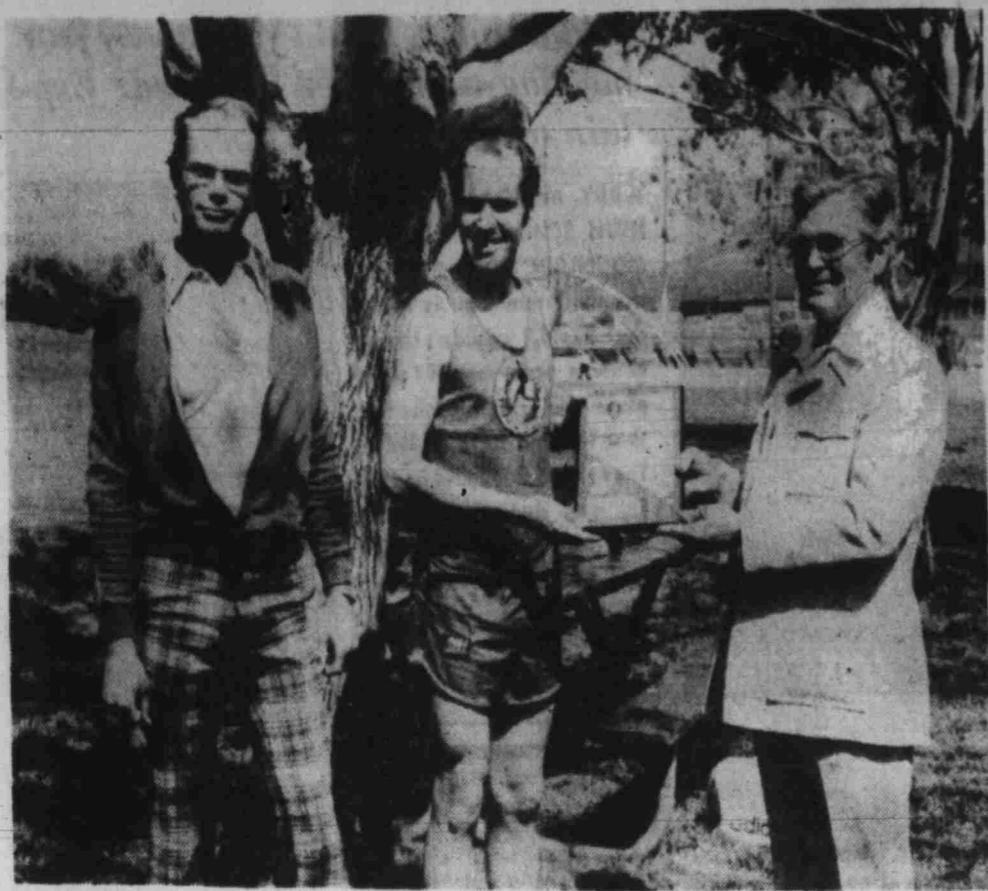

Henderson - Its Economic History-

Petitions began to circulate as early as July 1962, in citizen-inaugurated movement to secure a charter for the City of Henderson, as many residents became dissatisfied with their city government.

Mayor Byrne failed to indorse the movement for a city charter in 1962, saying: "I'm not convinced Boulder City and Vegas, both charter cities, have profited by having the city manager form of government." This early effort failed, but the next year, in February 1963, a new ef-

fort to change the city's government from the general laws to a Charter form of City Council-Manager, was initiated once again by a group of local citizens.

A charter form of government would call for the election of five Councilmen, they explained. One would serve as Mayor, and a City Manager would be appointed by the Council. Following the presentation of a petition with sufficient signatures to the Council, an election would be necessary to elect 15 qualified elec-

tors who have resided in the City for at least two years to form a city charter.

Once again Mayor Byrne spoke against the movement, suggesting that the \$5000 necessary for an election would better be spent on city improvement. He also explained that the petition would require approximately 850 signatures, which would have to be presented to the Council for verification. Twenty days after the signatures were verified the Council would be required to call an election

to choose 15 qualified electors. The electors would for the charter beginning ten days from their election, and within 90 days thereafter, they would be required to submit the proposed charter to the City Council.

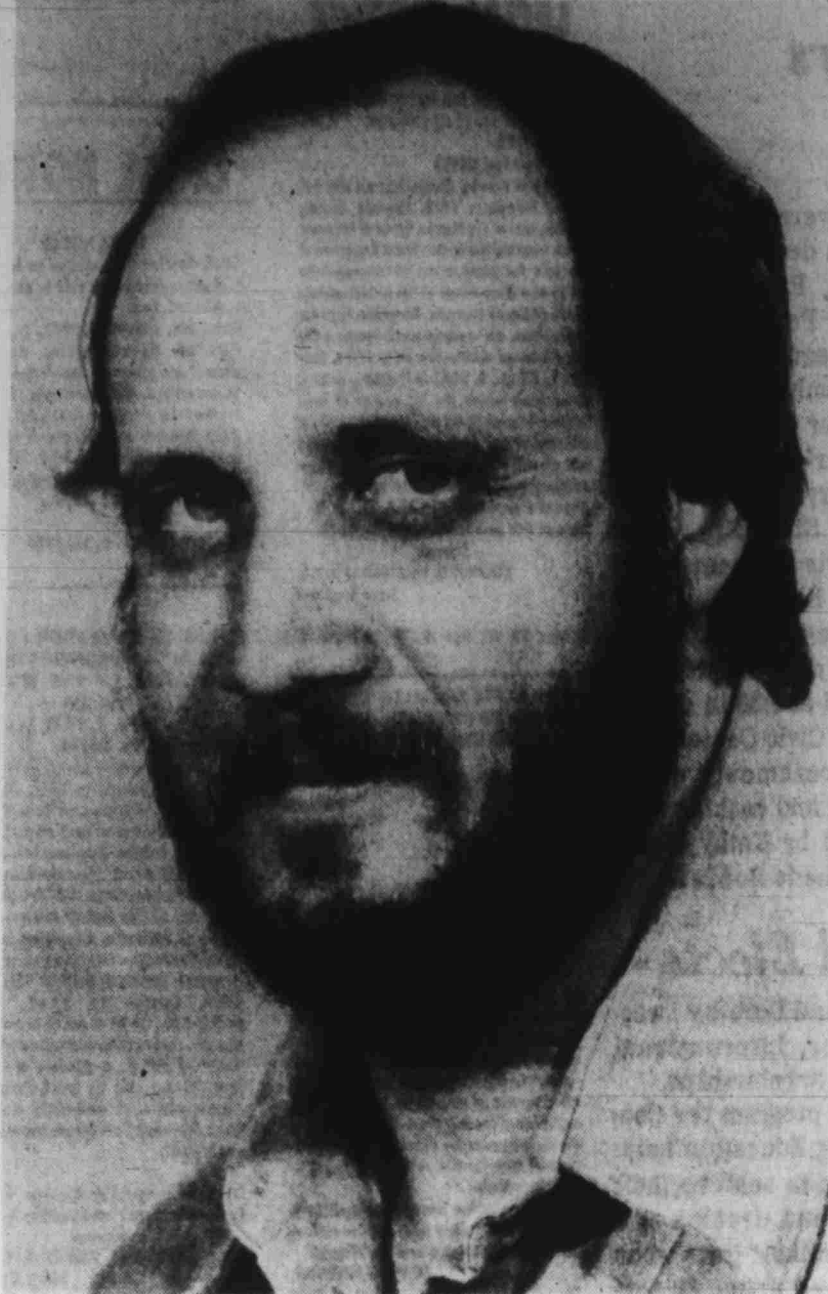
The expense of the election would be considerable. Then, within ten days the Council would be required to publish the charter in full in a local newspaper and posted for 30 days, at considerable additional expense.

Within five days after the posting period, the Council would be required to provide for another election to vote on the charter, at still more expense: If the charter was approved it would become law, and then still another election would be required to elect the new commissioners, at still another expense. After that election all old officers and all old Boards and their officers would be abolished and new ones formed.

Obviously Mayor Byrne was not enthusiastic about a new form of city government, and in a news release he stated that the present government was operating "efficiently, orderly, and progressively." He also said that the city had been highly praised by independent auditors for the administration and economical operation within the limits of a

"meager" budget. But the City Charter proponents went constructively ahead with their plans. A petition for Charter government with 1208 signatures was presented to the city council on March 4, 1963. But meanwhile, the state legislature had passed a bill, AB 46, which would allow the election of city councilmen at large rather than from their own district. AB 516 was also passed which would change the method of achieving a Charter government. This bill required that the city council call the election for the 15 member charter commission within 40 to 50 days after the petitions were certified, and provided that the period of 5 days for making up the charter ballot for election of the charter commission be extended to 30 days.

These changes did not halt the charter proponents, but in May, the city attorney announced that at least 600 of the Charter petition signatures were in doubt. The Charter enthusiasts would be forced to seek legal action to challenge the decision of the city attorney. Rather than do this, and to hampered with the delay of court action, they determined to circulate another petition. This effort too was destined to fail, and when 1963 ended Henderson had not yet been changed to a Charter government city.

Profiles In Art

Serge McCabe, prominent Southwestern photographer, graphic artist, and educator, will co-judge the Henderson Industrial Days Silver Anniversary Art Show and Competition April 15 and 16 at the Henderson Civic Center Auditorium.

McCabe's credentials are impressive and numerous; his achievements include awards for Best Design for Billboards in Nevada (1977), Best UNLV Summer Cover Brochure Design (Best in Western States 1977), First Graphic Arts Show at UNLV Gallery, Member of the Board of Directors of Artspace (1978).

Born in Dunkerque, France; McCabe visualizes the arts within the contemporary framework of our society, tempering this view with a certain continental approach that combines to form a unique as well as personal style. McCabe describes himself as a Renaissance Man due to a wide variety of skills and interests which include silversmi-

thing, woodworking, ceramics, and backpacking. An accomplished diver and underwater photographer, he lists a Certificate of Achievement from the United States Park Service for Exploration of Devil's Hole as a favorite commendation.

McCabe's commercial work combines innovation with the use of identifiable formats and subjects and are dealt with in relatable terms. By using these methods, he has gained commercial success as well as public recognition.

Dulcimer Craftsman Feature of Annual Tasting Spree

An exhibit and demonstration in the art of handcrafting musical instruments will be one of the features of the Henderson Service Club's annual "Tasting Spree" to be held April 22 at the Masonic Hall from 2 to 4 p.m.

Paul Geiger of Las Vegas will display many of the beautiful instruments he has made and which are for sale, including the Appalachian

or Mountain Dulcimer. The dulcimer is the American version of folk zithers which became popular in Europe during the Middle Ages. These zithers were developed from the monochord which was used in monasteries as a teaching aid to demonstrate scales. The peasants turned the single stringed monochord into a folk instrument by adding "drone" strings for a fuller sound.

The oldest known instrument of this type is the German Scheitholt. The popularity of these folk zithers spread throughout Europe, assuming new names, shapes and playing styles in each region to suit the tastes of the local people.

The Mountain dulcimer was developed by the Germanic settlers of Appalachia. It is probably the easiest stringed instrument to learn to play and its characteristic sound (dulcimer means sweet song) is a pleasure to hear in any home.

This year's Tasting Spree theme is "World

The National Park Service and EROS are participating in a cooperative demonstration project in which earth orbiting satellites and high-flying aircraft use remote sensing techniques.

From these studies, basic maps will be made locating broad plant

cover, geological structures and water sources. In the future these studies may allow the Park Service to monitor the changes in plant cover brought about by grazing animals. Potential flood areas and mineral deposits may also be located during this study.

A technical report will be compiled that will aid the National Park Service in better managing the recreational resources of Lake Mead.

Life Insurance: Are You A Good Shopper?

Interestingly, buying patterns this year prove that consumers have started shopping around for life insurance in much the same way they look for a good price on an automobile or television.

"Consumers have discovered that the cost of virtually identical life insurance can vary widely among different insurance companies," said Robert T. Jackson, chairman of the board of Phoenix Mutual Life Insurance Co., a Hartford, Conn. company that continues to be among the lowest cost companies in the nation.

How to determine the lowest cost is another matter. The premium on any one policy tells very little about its cost; it is simply the amount that must be paid in order to keep the insurance in force. Actual long range cost is determined by a multitude of factors that boggle even the minds of experts.

Until recently, the 20-year traditional net cost method was a popular way of comparing insurance costs. The method subtracts the sum of any dividends and the cash surrender value (at the end of 20 years) from the total premium payments. This often made it appear to the policyholder that not only would the insurance company return the premium payments, but the policyholder actually would make money on the coverage.

While it made many insurance companies look good, it did not show the policyholder just how much interest the premium money would have earned had it been invested elsewhere.

Hence, the interest adjusted method has become a widely used cost compar-

son gauge. This method takes into account that premiums are paid, and dividends and cash values are received at different times over a number of years. "The life insurance product is unlike most others in that it sometimes lasts for twenty, thirty, even forty years," noted Jackson, "and a lot happens to the value of the dollar over those years." The fact that the interest-adjusted index recognizes the time value of money, makes it a useful guide for comparing similar policies offered by different life insurance companies.

There are at least two sources for the current index. Most insurance agents have that information on hand and several states are required by law to present it to clients. In addition, the index is published by the National Underwriter, an impartial third-party source of insurance information. This publication is available in most insurance libraries.

Life insurance purchasers can also check a company's financial rating and reputation from another third party source like A.M. Best's, a company that has analyzed and rated insurance companies since 1899. "A low cost life insurance product from a company with a poor financial rating may not prove to be a very good bargain," Jackson said. Jackson also cautioned consumers to keep the insurance they now own and only use the interest-adjusted index when considering buying more insurance coverage.

"It's rarely a good idea to drop one's existing policy for that of another company, regardless of a low cost index. This is especially true if many years have passed since you purchased the policy, since insurance

generally costs more as you get older. There are a few exceptions to this rule; it's best to get the advice of your agent. He or she has the knowledge and training needed to make sound insurance recommendations."

DEREGULATION FIGHTS INFLATION

The Congress is quickly approaching a vote on legislation to reform the economic regulations which govern the nation's airline industry. Already many airlines are calling for dramatic reductions in fares in anticipation of a more competitive system. The Wall Street Journal recently reported that the profit margin for the industry as a whole rose dramatically last year and indicated that price reductions were a factor.

How can the airlines make more money by chopping 40 to 50 percent off the price of a ticket? Quite simply, the new low fares have been filling up seats on once empty flights. The government for years has been pricing the airlines out of the transportation business. It is the Civil Aeronautics Board which from offices in Washington controls air fares, instead of allowing a competitive marketplace to determine the best price to meet demand.

Today every major study produced on the subject concludes that due to regulation, both consumers and the industry suffer. The General Accounting Office

reports that consumers waste up to \$1.8 billion annually in high fares while the airlines make the lowest return on investment of the thirty largest industries in the nation.

Leading the fight in the private sector for increased airline competition is an extraordinary coalition forwarded by the American Conservative Union and the Aviation Consumer Action Project. The Ad Hoc Committee for Airline Regulatory Reform combines conservatives and liberals as well as business and state and local organizations in the reform efforts. These efforts are indicative of a growing mood in the nation that the Congress should act to reduce the burden of regulations of business.

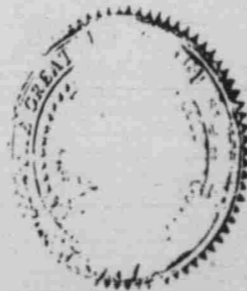

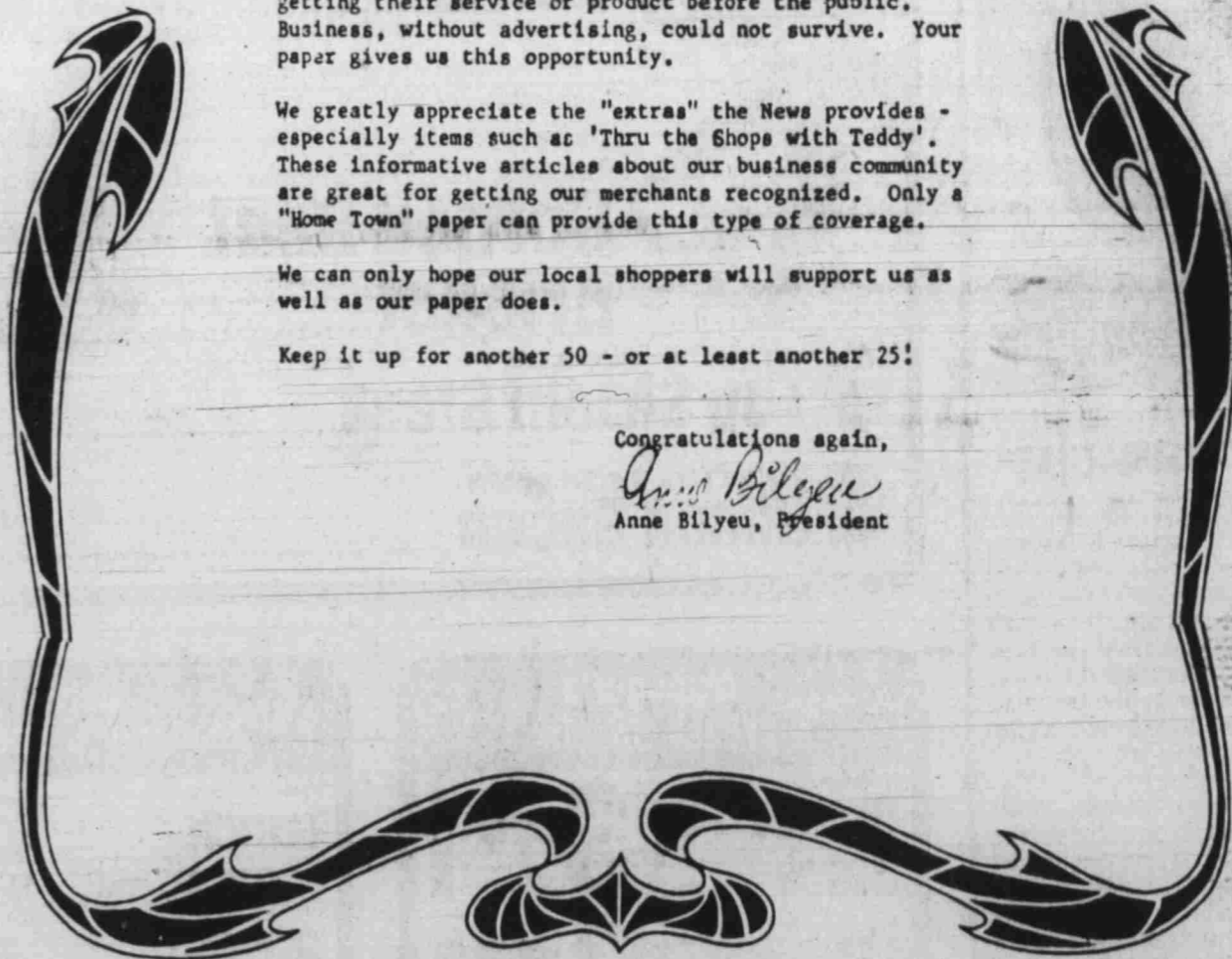

Dufus and His Carnival Life

If you visited the Ray Barber Carnival in Boulder City last week, you probably enjoyed the rides, and the many booth operators undoubtedly encouraged you to play their games. And maybe you stopped at some of those colorful, eye-catching booths. Perhaps you stopped at a booth containing a small tank filled with water covered with floating

saucers. There you needed to throw a ping-pong ball into a saucer to win a prize. That was Dufus's booth...

Dufus is a genuine traveling-show man. He became a booth operator--called jointees in the trade--two years ago. During his two years with the carnival 25-year-old Dufus (his carnival name) has worked his way up to head agent and owner of his booth. He has traveled throughout Nevada, Idaho, Montana, Oregon

and Washington. He loves to travel, and he loves the carnival life.

"My booth is like a small business," he said. "I own it and call my own shots. I like the open air, the outdoor life, and I enjoy meeting people. In this business you have to like people or you won't make it. ...No, I'd never want to work in an office."

Nevertheless, sophisticated business calculations are required to survive in the seemingly simple carnival life. For instance, Dufus rattled off figures and percentages about his booth like an accountant reading an income statement. Dufus must buy his prize inventory, rent the land his booth occupies, pay the owner of the carnival a portion of his income. Dufus must decide how many saucers in the tank produce the highest profit; that is, he must decide how many prizes he will give away per dollar income.

He even knows how much a steady wind cuts his profits, for the wind will group the saucers together making it easier to win.

In addition, Dufus uses good business



psychology. For example, he would like to install a stereo system in his booth to attract people. He knows how to advertise each time he gives away a prize. With great ado and much shouting, he jumps on his booth's counter and

shows off a stuffed animal he is about to give away. He creates noise, and noise attracts people.

Like any successful business, Dufus maintains a set policy. He only gives away the big stuffed animals seen hanging in his booth. He doesn't reach under the counter and give away a cheaper, small prize like some booths. Through experience Dufus discovered that, although he pays more inventory, he makes more profit by giving away only big prizes: His customers are happy, and happy customers bring more business.

Indeed, Dufus knows the psychology of his business. In fact, Dufus has taken some university psychology courses and plans to major in psychology.

"I have to understand the people in my business," Dufus explained. "I've gotten to where I can tell if someone is going to play my game or if he's just browsing."

The carnival man is an intelligent operator.

"We're effected by the economy more than many businesses Dufus continued. "What people spend here is extra money. If the economy gets tight, then people don't come to the carnival. I've had some long dry spells where I've run out of money, didn't have enough money to stay in a motel for the night, and had to sleep in my booth. I've gone a couple of days in a row with nothing to eat. But I've also had some thriving days. There have been times when I've taken in \$1000 a day."

Dufus is proud of his small business and works hard. "The carnival business is tough," he said. "We travel on Mondays, set up the carnival on Tuesdays, and open on Wednesday. From Wednesday through Sunday about 10 a.m. to midnight or later, about 14 hours a day. After a full day Sunday, we pack and leave the next morning. It's sure hard traveling on Monday after being up most of the night."

How did Dufus become a carnival man?

"After graduating from high school I spent four years in nuclear ar-

tillery in the army," he replied. "After I got out of the army, I got a job as a cook, then as a real estate salesman. Later, when I was out of work, I met this guy in a tavern who was working a carnival booth and needed some help. I accepted, and here I am."

Before he joined the carnival, Dufus also played the guitar in some bands. "I love the guitar and play it whenever I get the chance. It helps me relax," he said. The exhaustive carnival life is risky and non-dependable, but it's a serious business. From March to November--the carnival season--jointees work long strenuous hours.

"During the season, I try to save enough money to survive the three off month," Dufus remarked. "If not, I work as a bartender in my hometown." He lives on Whitley Island in Washington.

Dufus indicated that he likes the other carnival workers and they are "sort of a big family."

"The best location for a booth is at the exit of a popular ride like the Zipper where there is a constant flow of people," he said. "We take turns putting our booths in the favorable locations so everyone gets a fair chance."

Even though the carnival life means long, hard days, Dufus is happy. "I really like this business, being my own

boss," he expressed. "I even have a few ideas for other booths. Someday I hope to invest in more booths and use those ideas."

And Dufus plans to stay with the carnival. "I wouldn't leave the carnival unless I got a good offer at some other job. It would have to be a

pretty good offer because I like what I'm doing."

The rugged carnival life takes its toll, though. Dufus commented in a dreamy way, "My goal is to earn enough money to buy a cabin, way, way, out in the wilderness, away from people, and never have to work again."

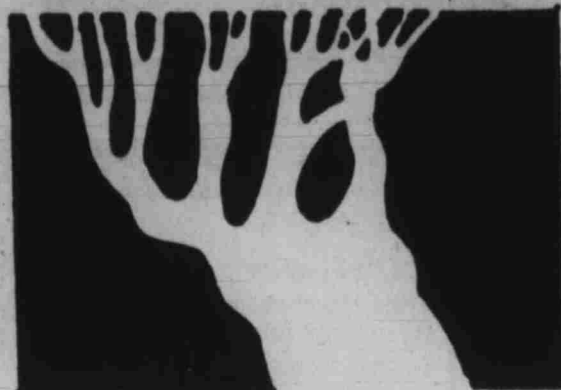

Dormancy

"The key to success with house plants lies in the imitation of the natural environment." -- Raymond Poincelot, author of Gardening Indoors with House Plants

Although it's impossible to recreate all the natural conditions to which plants were once

accustomed, most in-door gardeners make concerted efforts to make plants feel at home in the home. Granted, temperature, lighting, and humidity conditions will vary but, generally speaking, plants will adapt to slight changes and still perform their normal functions, one of which includes dormancy.

At least once a year, most plants go through a

rest period, caused by the cessation of activity in seeds, stems, or buds. Usually this rest period is triggered by changes in natural conditions: daylight becomes shorter and less intense and temperatures cool down. The majority of plants that go dormant do so between December and February.

When a normally active plant suddenly stops growing or when its leaves begin to wither away, the plant is most likely becoming dormant. In the case of gloxinias, caladiums, cyclamens, and achimenes, the signs of dormancy are obvious; in other plants, dormancy occurs more subtly.

During dormancy, plants need to rest, preferably in a shaded area. They should not be fed or repotted and watering should be kept to a minimum. As soon as new growth resumes -- the average dormancy period is six to eight weeks -- begin watering slightly more often, gradually reaccustoming the plant to its normal watering schedule and lighting conditions.

The class will be held April 6 through May 6 on Thursdays from 7 to 9:45 p.m. and on Saturday mornings from 9 to 11:45 a.m. at the Civic Center in Room 32.

R.K. McKnight, Jr. will instruct. He has had years of experience with boating as an owner, examiner and instructor. He has served as vice-president of the Indian Wells Valley Council of the U.S. Navy League and Committee chairman of the Sea Cadet Program at China Lake.

Completion of the class will give the student two credits. The fee is \$26.

Common sense, applied with knowledge of fundamentals, is the wise guide for sensible use of recreational waters, according to McKnight. The course is designed to suggest the scope of inland lake activities and of the small boats (to 65 feet) used, to present the need for respect of water and weather as a matter of survival, to sketch a guide for safe and acceptable conduct aboard small craft and to provide insight on

the maneuvers of small boat handling. These are the objectives of the course.

Some thoughts will be presented on the functioning of recreational watercraft -- oar, sail and powered screw; on proper use of lines and anchors; on handling single and twin-screw power boats; on docking, mooring and berthing procedures; and on quick-fix mechanics and emergency first aid such as CPR and the Heimlich maneuver. Lectures are supported by dockside and water demonstrations.

Students may register for this class at the first session on Thursday, April 6. For additional information call 565-6945.

Those attending from Basic High School were Lorri Smith, Jeff Corn, Hector Trejo, Kelly McGinty, and Jolynne Haven. From Boulder City High School Kevin Polk, Bret Forman, Angel Gomez, Shari

Boyles, and Shelly Burt attended.

The Youth Conference is designed to allow the young people to talk and express their opinions without the interference of adults. It is quite similar to the Sun Youth Forum except that there is not an adult moderator to preside over the teenagers and the conference is statewide.

The topics discussed this year were Student-Youth Rights, Marijuana and Alcohol, Youth Employment, Education, and Juvenile Justice.

The students select the topic they want to discuss and join that

particular group. They are then asked to talk about the problem and come up with three recommendations. For example, the Youth Employment group decided Vocational Training, in the schools, a better communication system between counselors and students (such as a centralized bulletin board listing job information), and a more extensive program similar to CETA, but able to assist all economical levels, to be the most logical answers to the current unemployment problem among young adults.

The recommendations

are then presented to the entire body of students for a vote of ratification.

If they are passed, each recommendation is presented to Governor Mike O'Callaghan and to the legislature to think about in the spring of next year.

Governor Mike O'Callaghan and Attorney General Robert List both made an appearance at the conference. They expressed pleasure at seeing the young people attempting to solve current problems, and assured the assembled group that their efforts were not being wasted.

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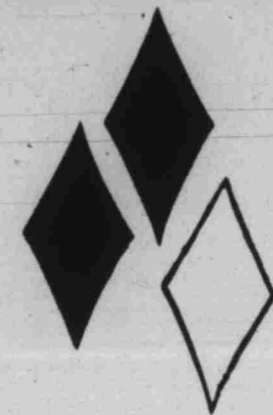

The power of erosion can create many spectacular natural phenomena.

The blue sky as background makes a natural arch impressive indeed.

We will meet in the lobby of the Alan Bible Visitor Center at 9 a.m. sharp on Saturday, April 8. The hike will meander down white rock canyon, through a secluded wash and up to a natural arch. We'll drive 17 miles round trip and hike 6-7 miles round trip. No advance registration is necessary. A Park Interpreter will be your guide.

Dress for the hike depending on weather conditions to be encountered. One should have sturdy, comfortable shoes, a hat to ward off the sun, and sunglasses. If you sunburn easily, apply sunburn preventative. A small backpack (day-pack) is an easy way to carry food, water, and personal gear while hiking. Please leave pets at home.

Bring a robust lunch, snacks, and at least one quart of water. In the event of inclement weather, the hike may be cancelled or the destination changed.

Striping Costs Cut

Riddle: What has lost five feet and is saving \$40,000?

Answer: Highway stripes.

Highway stripes? That's right, according to Nevada State Highway officials who are omitting five feet of paint on the broken center lines and thus expect to use 12,000 gallons less paint per year.

Mike Anrig who heads highway maintenance operations for the state said crews throughout Nevada have started using the new spacing as recommended by the Federal Highway Administration and cost savings are expected to accrue to about \$40,000 over a year's time.

Each painted section in the center line will now measure 10 feet instead of the previous 15 with no apparent loss of clarity. "In fact," said Anrig "even engineers who thought the difference would be obvious were unable to tell the difference."

Topics for Taxpayers

by Ernest L. Newton Tax Laws Sometimes Used To Buy Votes

During the election campaigns this year voters can expect candidates to attempt to garner voter support by promising "special treatment for special people" in the enactment of tax revision laws. That has become a familiar pattern in past years as candidates appeal to "elderly, indigent, people on fixed income, public employees, rural people or urban people" or some other segment of the population that has a substantial number of votes that are for sale. But maybe some intelligent and sincere candidates will bring forth one proposal that, in the past, has been attractive to almost every voter of every sub-class.

That would be a proposal for a general, overall, sweeping reduction in the exorbitant cost of government and a promise to reduce the burden of taxation for everyone. Such a proposal has always attracted voters. Remembered is a presidential candidate who

was elected on a promise to "reduce the cost of government by twenty-five percent." Or another, much more recent, who swept to victory on the promise to reorganize and reduce the expensive bureaucracy with which the country is saddled.

Unlike the false promises made by national candidates in the past, Nevadans have the opportunity this year to elect candidates who will not only promise to reduce the impact of governmental costs, but who are willing and able to make good on those promises. Such a program could be a "winner".

The usual "come on" is to offer tax relief to a "special interest" group. Such direct tax relief is, of course, unconstitutional in Nevada. But the constitutional provision is side-stepped by giving tax rebates to special interest groups who are thought to bear a disproportionate burden of taxation. But more and more people (voters) are coming to recognize that

sort of program as an obvious effort to buy political favor; and not an effort to achieve fairness in taxation. For, as a matter of fact, the benefitted constituency actually gets more for their tax dollars than the more affluent members of society who have a much smaller dependency on government programs.

Taxes in Nevada (viewed either as a percentage of per capita personal income or as dollars per person or per household) have increased enormously in the past ten years. Costs of government have compounded as government attempts to take over more activities and to fund programs that used to be paid for by the beneficiaries. Whenever some group of people, however small, identifies a "need" the first thought is to run to government (state, county, city or school district) to secure funding for its satisfaction. Oftentimes the effort to tap the pub-

lic till requires more work than would an effort to fund the activity in the productive sector.

It will be interesting to see if some candidate will take the gamble that a

program of general and massive tax reduction will attract a majority of voters. The historical success of such a proposal would indicate resounding approval.

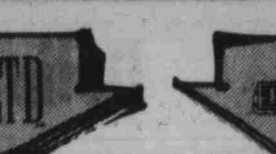

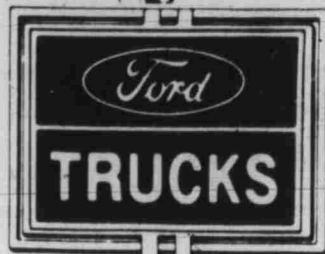

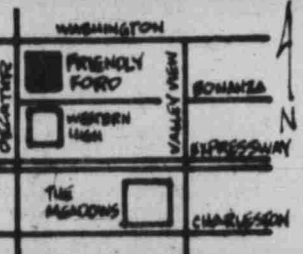

Many a morning have seen Mike having his daily walk and we've struck up a close friendship."

The Chronicle published some of Mike's favorite St. Patrick stories. We will file them for next St. Patrick's Day.

Mike has written his memoirs of early Boulder City and they are a part of the depository of the Teddy and Bill Collection. In one letter Mike remembered the late Jessie Shelton who worked for countless years at the local telephone office. Mike was

the sole ranger on duty and the only way Jessie could relay an SOS was when she had received a telephone call that required the ranger's attention. She would push a button and this turned on a red light on the top of the water tank. Mike would radio in and Jessie would tell him where to go. In one 10 year span Boulder City was a crime free town. The jail held no prisoners of note. Doors remained unlocked and children played on the streets without fear.

It was as safe at night as it is now in daylight, maybe safer. Mike transferred to Page, Arizona where he and the late Perlie Morris worked together.

Basic CPR Course Offered

A basic course in Cardio Pulmonary Resuscitation is being offered by the Clark County Community College due to popular demand.

The course will be held April 22 through the 20th of May but to be eligible you must attend a one hour pre-class on Saturday, April 8 from 9 to 10 a.m. at St. Rose de Lima Hospital annex. Registration will follow from 10 to 11 a.m.

The course will provide the basic factual knowledge of Cardio Pulmonary Resuscitation (CPR) as well as its practical application and overall technique. The use of recording mannikins will verify

implementation of correct procedures.

The class itself will be held on Saturday mornings from 10 a.m. to 1 p.m. on April 22 and 29 and May 6, 13 and 20 in the hospital annex.

There is a \$13 fee for the one college credit class and a \$7.50 course material fee payable to the hospital. CPR is the skilled ability to provide artificial breathing and circulation of the blood to a person whose breathing and heartbeat have stopped. It is the current method for reviving heart attack victims, and victims of electric shock, drowning, choking, head injuries and automobile

accidents may also need this lifesaving procedure.

This course also appeals to persons who have heart attack or stroke victims within their family.

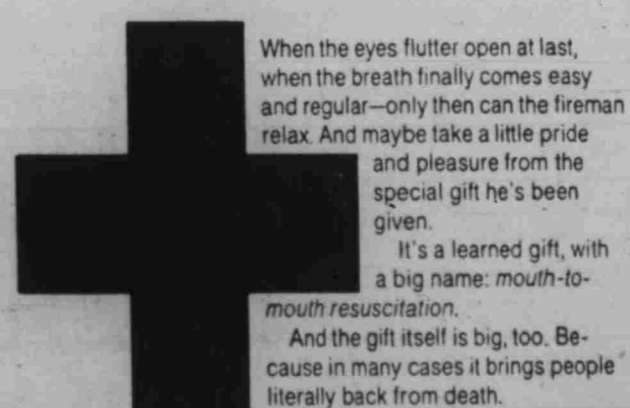
The materials include a set of workbooks giving detailed instructions and illustrations for CPR. These provide refreshers and exercises for home practice and review later.

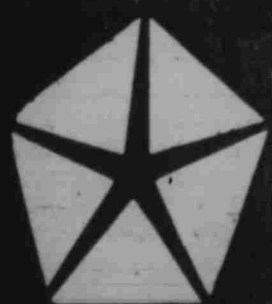

McGowan To Run For Controller

In response to inquiries from members of the press and others, I feel it essential to advise all interested parties of my intentions as relates to the Office of State Controller.

I intend to seek re-election to the Office of State Controller.

Indeed, the position of Controller is a full-time job and there is a tremendous amount of work to be completed by the end of the fiscal year. My energies will be devoted to that task in the months ahead.

In announcing my intentions, I'd like to note we are very satisfied with the success of our new accounting system. The system is sophisticated and modern and, as such, allows for efficiency in the Controller's operations. This system is particularly helpful because the Controller's Office has grown to the point where well over one billion dollars of transactions are handled each year and they are processed efficiently and accurately.

I also look forward to the continuing challenges of the other duties on Controller including the State Highway Board, State Board of Finance and State Data Processing Commission.

In a nutshell, I am proud of the accomplishments of our office and want very much to serve the citizens of this state for another term.

Wilson McGowan was born on a ranch 12 miles south of Yerington, a third generation Nevada. He attended school in Yerington, was graduated from Yerington High School and Healds Business College

in San Francisco. After finishing his education he returned to the family ranch, managing it for his father until 1944, when he and his wife, Marie, bought a ranch in Lovelock.

McGowan represented Pershing County in the Nevada State Senate for ten years -- 1956-66.

During his tenure as a State Senator, McGowan served eight years on the Finance Committee, four years as chairman. His fellow Senators elected him a member of the Legislative Commission for seven years. He also served as a Nevada delegate to the Western Conference of the Council of State Governments, and for four years was a member of that organization's executive board.

In 1966 he was elected to his first term as State Controller and moved to Carson City. He has since won re-election in 1970 and 1974 and he and his wife, Marie, remain residents of Carson City.
