Old Vegas' Resort To Open in June

Robert Shelton, president of Old Vegas, has announced the appointment of Phyllis E. Fetter as manager of group sales for the western theme park now under construction in Henderson.

A native of Marion, Ohio, Mrs. Fetter will take up offices in Las Vegas immediately to promote Old Vegas. When the project is complete, she will operate out of the park offices. Prior to joining Old Vegas, Mrs. Fetter was director of marketing for the Arizona office of tourism.

Her background includes 10 years as assistant director of resident halls and food services at the University of Southern California. Later she worked in sales and marketing at several prestigious hotels in Arizona, such as the Hilton Inn, Desert Inn and Skyline Resort and Country club in Tucson.

Mrs. Fetter's duties will include marketing for Old Vegas as well as coordinating group sales and travel to the park. Assisting Mrs. Fetter will be Linda Hunt, administrative assistant to the president of Old Vegas.

Scheduled to open in mid-June, Old Vegas will recreate the vivid and colorful past of Southern Nevada, while providing fun, excitement and entertainment for the entire family.

Dominating the park from the Boulder Highway, will be a replica for the old "Mormon Fort". Great care has been taken to insure the authenticity of the colorful history of the Las Vegas area, while capturing the spirit of the old west. Additional plans call for a 12,800 square foot motion picture sound stage similar to Old Tucson's where dozens of major motion pictures and television shows have been produced.

Phase 1 of Old Vegas will include, in addition to the "Mormon Fort", a recreation of Charleston Square, Flying Jenny Airfield, Old Block 16, where the first lots were auctioned off by the railroads in 1905, an antique railroad that will run throughout the park, plus numerous other attractions. Another antique railroad car will be installed at the park, which will serve as staff offices for Old Vegas employees.

Subsequent phases of Old Vegas will begin construction immediately following the June opening of the park.

Two Controversial Items Before Council Tuesday Night

Two controversial items will again come before the city council tonight. Both items ended in a 2-2 vote last week when Mayor Lorin Williams was absent from the meeting.

The first item to be considered will be the rezoning of 61 acres near section 19 from R-R (rural residence) to R-1, (single family residence).

The land requested for rezoning is in section 24. The first parcel is 29 acres fronting on Crestway Drive which is in the westerly section line of section 19. The second request for change is for 32 acres and construction would be by Young American Homes. There would be 4.3 units per acre. The proposed subdivisions would include full offsite improvements and a paved 26 foot wide access road on Sherwood from the subdivision area to Pacific Avenue. Objections to the rezoning stemmed from concern about increased traffic in section 19 to Pacific Ave.; overloading of Pacific Avenue with additional traffic; condition of existing streets in section 19, possible reduction of value in section 19 property because of the higher density zoning.

agenda which ended in a 2-2 vote last Monday night was the awarding of the city's towing. A motion was made by Councilman Gary Price and supported by Councilman Carlton Lawrence, to award the contract to SNAP for another year. Councilmen Phil Stout and Lorna Kesterson were in favor of making the award equal to both companies since they both are located in Henderson and are equally qualified.

Other items included on the agenda are a land proposal by Arby Alper of Skyharbor Airport, a business license for "Yesteryear Bar" for Mark Kramer. Others include the approval of a financial institution for agreement in lieu of bond in Highland Hills, labor contract for police officer, bids for a sewer crossing at Lake Mead, use of rooms 6 and 7 for senior citizens, authorization to seek bids on five vehicles and final map for sunrise subdivision No. 11. For a committee meeting to be held following the recessed meeting, Eliot Alper's land request will be discussed, along with the school site relocation and an ordinance amending ordinance No. 404 for section 7.







The Elderly As Crime Victim

As we begin to recognize the existence of crime against the elderly as an indisputable fact, and we begin to accumulate evidence that this problem needs to receive as much, or more attention than many of the other areas of current concern to the criminal justice system, we are forced to analyze the special vulnerability to crime which exists in our aging population.

It has been recently estimated that in some situations in our society. the aged are up to eight times more vulnerable to certain types of serious crime than any other segment of the population.

We have also been told that the fear of crime is the major concern of elderly residents in several locations throughout the country.



A number of factors which tend to indicate

Now it is necessary to examine the reasons for the special vulnerability of the aging as a group to criminal activity perpetrated against them by members of other age

the special vulnerability of older citizens to criminal attack. These include (1) Older people are more likely to live alone. Social isolation increases vulnerability to crime; (2) Older people have diminished physical strength and stamina, hence they are less able to defend themselves or escape from threatening situations; (3) older people

suffer from physical and more easily hurt

ailments, such as loss of hearing or sight, arthritis, and circulatory problems which increase their vulnerability; (4) Older people are physically more fragile

should they opt to defend the aselves; (5) Po-

tential criminals are aware of the diminished physical capacity and the physical vulnerability of the elderly, and thus are more likely to seek out an elderly target; (6) there is a greater likelihood that older

people will live in high crime neighborhoods rather than in suburbia as a result of diminished income and of being rooted in central cities. Thus they find themselves in close proximity to the groups most likely to victimize them (the unemployed, teenage drop - outs, etc.); (7) The dates of receipt by mail of monthly pension and benefit checks are widely known (and hence the dates when older people are most likely to have cash on their person or in their

public transportation is more likely among older people who, for physical, financial or other reasons, are less likely to drive or own a private automobile; (9) Because of loss of status and a decreased sense of personal efficacy associated in American culture with being old, older people may be less likely to process complaints through the criminal justice bureaucracy and draw upon available community resources for protection and redress.

When the factors listed above are combined with reasons for special vulnerability mentioned in the writings of other professionals, gathered as a result of "self opinion" surveys conducted by several groups concerned with the problems of the aging, and correlated with the opinions of law enforcement officials.

The following list of factors causing special vulnerability to personal or property loss as a result of criminal behavior against the elderly population in this country emerges:

1. Isolation - The reason for this factor being listed first can be stated very simply. Because such a high percentage of older citizens do in fact live alone in our society, and because physical and social isolation create an atmosphere in which criminal activity is directly invited, older people in our society are especially vulnerable to crime. When we contion has no family with whom they are in immediate contact, and that the overwhelming majority of them live in separate quarters from any family that they do actually have, the problem begins to become immediately apparent. 2. Location - Because of the preponderance of low-income members in the aging population, this group tends to occupy the housing areas in closest proximity to the "high crime - rate" areas of most communities.

3. Physical factors -Physical strength, the diminished physical strength and endurance of older persons render them much less able to defend themselves or to successfully complete flight from any possible criminal situation. Unable to fight and unable to flee successfully, the elderly most often are forced simply to remain caught in the criminal circumstance and be-

come its victim. 4. High visibility of weaknesses of potential victims, since in most cases the elderly potential victims of the criminal act live in close proximity to those who would victimize them, and since their physical ailments are so obviously detected because of a slow walking pace. the use of cane or walker, etc., it is practically impossible for the elderly to conceal their physical vulnerability from potentially predatory criminals. As one elderly person recently stated emphatically, to me, "They knew I was. alone, they knew I was crippled, they thought I had money, and it was only a matter of time until they got me." 5. Rigid schedules and determined by the arrival of their pension checks or some similar occurrence. In such circumstances, the accompanying trip to the bank, or the very familiar expedition to the grocery store, has the same effect among potential predatory criminals as the hoisting of a flag with the wording, "I've got money." The number of assaults, thefts, of various kinds, purse snatchings, etc., perpetrated against elderly pensioners on check day speaks much more eloquently than perhaps any other indicator of the extent to which potential criminals have clocked the financial calendar of the potential elderly victim. 6. Emotional and mental weakness - Persons who suffer from emotional disturbances in general tend easily to become criminally victimized, and the mentally retarded at all age levels appear frequently on the receiving end of criminal activity. The mentally infirm aged are also prime victims for the fraudulent salesman, health quacks and real estate schemes. The latter in particular

may use the "Great American Dream" of retirement and happiness in the sunset years as an inducement to the aged person to invest in long term plans designed to obtain for the operator monthly payments, for plots of land in undeveloped, and sometimes, undevelopable areas, rather than in homes or apartments that would really fill the needs of the aging investor.

Oftentimes, investment frauds are easily perpetrated against the elderly because of the feeling on the part of the investor that he has only a few more years, and that he must make quick gains if he is to enjoy the fruits of his investment during his lifetime. Another contributing factor to such fraudulent manipulations is the "Kamikaze Syndrome" in which the elderly person thinks, "I will take an excessive risk in order to possibly achieve great gains because, even if I lose, I will not be around long to suffer from the loss."

When judgment is impaired because of diminished intellectual functioning or emotional stress, other dangers arise which threaten the personal safety as well as the property of the aging victim.

For example, persons are permitted to gain entrance to the homes of elderly individuals through certain ruses which would probably be clearly detected by those functioning at a higher level, mentally or emotionally. 7. Ageism - Finally, elderly citizens are rendered even more vulnerable because of the prejudice of ageism itself. This systematic prejudice against older people which includes stereotyping them, setting them aside as different, and in some cases outright hostility toward them, probably because we fear seeing in them

what we dread most in our own lfe - cycle, marshals all the forces of both economics and prejudice effectively to interact in such a way as to force most elderly persons to function with all of the disabilities commonly acknowledged to be part of minor - group membership in our society, with all the special vulnerability to exploitation and abuse which tends to accompany minority group membership.

In summary, because of so many factors within the elderly person himself, such as the physical, mental and emotional, and because of innumerable factors operating outside of the elderly person, but inherent in our competitive economic system and the larger culture, it seems indisputable that the elderly are indeed especially vulnerable to activities both against their person and their

property.


