Bill Boyd, one of the owners of the newly remodeled club, explained that the benefits which could be gained by the city would include a two story 503 garage structured to eventually go higher, 31 spaces for recreational vehicles and a 100 room hotel which could go as high as seven stories at a later time.

"The maintenance and taxes on the street would be paid by the Eldorado," Boyd pointed out.

"There would be additional revenue through additional gaming," he said, explaining that the club would further add on to their gaming facilities.

"And we would be employing about 100 more local people than right now.

"There would be additional revenue," he continued "from the sale of Market Street ... we're not asking to be given the street, we intend to buy it.

"There would be an additional number of tourists staying in the city, many for two or three days ... and the city would also derive revenue from the room tax."

Boyd explained that the Eldorado had recently undergone a \$1½ million expansion and remodeling and they

would be spending about \$2 million more if the vacation is approved.

He concluded his case saying there would be "no material injury" to anyone.

George Rudiak, a spokesman for the Rainbow Club which is the main objector to the vacation, called it "public




Former Assemblyman Arthur Espinoza was elected chairman for a one-year term of office for the Clark County Housing Authority at its meeting of Wed., April 19.

City Heads Get 5% Pay Hike

Non-classified employees of the city, including the city manager, city attorney, city clerk and others, were approved for a five per cent raise in pay by the city council Monday night.

The pay hike brought the city manager's salary to approximately \$30,000; the city attorney from \$25,977 to \$27,276; city clerk from \$19,838 to \$20,830; public works director from \$23,690 to \$24,875; the recreation director from \$19,570 to \$20,873; the financedirector from \$19,570 to \$20,549; planning director from \$21,373 to \$22,442 and the personnel director from \$19,570 to \$20,549.

The pay raise will go into effect on July 5. City Manager Bob Campbell explained that before the department head pay review some senior subordinates were paid nearly the same as the department heads.

The raise also included benefit adjustments in keeping with other city employees. The increases add more than \$7,497 per year to the city's budget.

Most other employees of the city are represented by six various union organizations.

were given favors to give kids passing grades.

Oh -- so many violations ... and we saw them all caught. Either the schools got booted out of the conference, the kid got booted out of school, or the university was put on probation -- put to shame in headlines across the nation.

The rules allow helping kids get board, room, book, tuition and a job. The rules insist the kid have passing grades, legitimately. He can have a paid tutor, if necessary, but he must first and foremost be a passing grades student.

The rules allow just os much visiting of compuses by prospective athletes, so much visiting of coaches with the kid's parents -and then there is a cutoff date ... where the kid's decision is made.

Would you believe that Tommy Harmon once played freshman football at Marguette and the same week switched to Michigan where he later became All -American. The stories could be piled up into an unusual book of backroom chicanery by college coaches.

That shouldn't happen here -especially with the eyes of the world seeing an unheard of amount of one million dollars has been raised to help athletes who come to UNLV.

Kids legitimately recruited, properly coached, properly educated, can bring fame to the school and fun for the fans. The key -- to this writer -- lies in the coaches' abilities to pick the kinds of kids who'll produce big time results.

Yes -- we have a treasure here with fans who'll help -- now it requires vigilance over the goose that layed the nestegg ... so as not to kill the egg.

BE ALERT - Have you ever been confronted by a smooth talker or confidence man? These. men are professionals when it comes to double talk and many times they have talked citizens out of their life savings. Don't let this happen to you. If you should be asked any of the following questions or find yourself in a situation like these, call the Police immediately.

1. Have you come into contact with a stranger who showed you a large roll of money and told you he would split it with you if you would show "good faith" by putting up your money?

2. Has someone come up to you and offered to bless your money or remove a curse or perform a ritual which would make you rich? Don't laugh, people have actually lost their entire savings this way.

3. Has a person claiming to be a bank examiner or Police investigator said he needed your help in catching a bank teller who is believed to have withdrawn money from your account? If this has happened to you or does happen, report it at once to the bank and to the Police.



"THE PIGEON DROP" Each year swindlers fleece the American public by using various techniques, all with the same result: the victim is separated from his money! In "the pigeon drop" the victim is selected by two "con" men (or women), usually on a busy street. One con man bumps the intended victim and then engages him in conversation. At this time the other con man walks up and states that he has just found a bag and asks them to witness his opening it. The bag is then opened and is found to be full of money. He then asks both parties to wait while he consults his boss. He returns and reports a large sum of money in the bag which they will all share if they all keep quiet. To guarantee that no one will talk, each is requested to put up a sum of money as evidence of good faith. The victim is then talked into withdrawing his savings and turning it over to the bag man. The bag man then leaves with the money, stating that he will return the victim's savings. He never returns. The accomplice then excuses himself and leaves the victim waiting. He never returns either, and the victim has been swindled out of his life's savings.

"THE BANK INVES-TIGATOR" - Don't trust the phony bank or savings and loan "inves-

tigator". You meet him at your home or he calls you by phone then comes to see you. He is very serious when he talks to you. He claims to be an investigator, perhaps an examiner from your bank, maybe a Police investigator or government agent. He has brought along deposit slips from your bank and other official papers. He could get your money." Here's how: 1 - He tells you that the bank is checking up on a dishonest employee. He says that one of the tellers at the bank is suspected of stealing funds from customer accounts. The man asks to see your book, then tells you that records at the bank show a much smaller balance in your account. 2 - He explains how you can help him. He says he wants to make a test to see what the suspected employee does when a customer draws money out of his account. The investigator suggests that you go to your bank, draw some money, then let him use it for the test. He even offers to provide transportation to the bank. He also says that a bonded messenger will pick up your money. 3 - You give away your money. After you've withdrawn the money, the man (or his messenger) gives you a receipt and takes the

money. He tells you how he plans to trap the suspected employee by having the money returned

to the bank for examination. But once the man has left, you'll never see him again. Your money will be gone forever, so don't let a stranger get anything from you. Don't let him see your bank book. Don't sign any papers. Whether he's phoned you or has come to your home, just say you'll call back later. Get information from people you can trust. For example: por -a

FROM THE CRIME PREVENTION UNIT

A. Call your bank or savings and loan association. Dial the number listed in the phone directory, NOT a number the stranger may have suggested. B. Call the Police.

"THE HOME RE-PAIRMAN" - Beware of the phony repairman or engineer who offers to check your chimney, furnace, catch basin or other installation. Such a person comes to your home. He is in working clothes, perhaps carrying a ladder or kit of tools. But the repairman will be very smart. He'll try to deceive you if you don't stop him. 1 - He pretends to inspect. If you allow him to check the chimney, for example, he deliberately breaks off some bricks. If you let him check the furnace, he damages some of the pipes or a part of the control mechanism. 2 - Then he reports serious damage. He shows you the bricks or other broken material and tells you a repair job

he makes you pay. He quotes a low price, then asks for a cash deposit. If you don't have enough cash, he offers to drive you to your bank so you can draw on your account. Then with your money in his pocket, he simply disappears. Or, after quoting a price, he asks you to sign an order. Once you've signed, however, you may get a bill that's a lot higher than the amount the man quoted you. Because of certain words in the order, you are legally obligated to pay the bill collector, even though the work was not properly completed. The man may also talk about other work. If he gets you to sign, however, you could be forced to keep paying for a long, long time. So, take the time to check carefully. But don't let him go into your basement or on the roof or in your back yard.

CHECK THEIR STORY: Ask the man for his name, address, phone number and the name of his company. Tell him you will call the next day. Then get some information about the man. For example:

A. Check the phone book, see if either he or his company is listed. B. Talk to neighbors.

C. Talk to an officer of your bank or savings and loan association or call the Better Business Bureau. D. Call the Police.

These are only a few examples of how confidence men work. Always be on your guard when discussing money matters with anyone. If you suspect something, notify the Police IM-MEDIATELY.

"THE SWITCH GAME ARTIST" - Be on guard when a helpless stranger asks for your advice. Such a person stops you on the street or in a large department store. It could be a man or a woman, someone old or young, well - dressed or shabby - looking. Listen closely as the person talks to you. He'll have a story to tell you. But before he's finished, you might lose a lot of money. Here's how: 1 - He or she gets your attention. It might be a man who asks how to get to a certain hotel, a woman crying pitiously as she approaches you, or someone who simply asks to talk to you. 2 - He tells you he has a large sum of money. He shows you an envelope and inside you see a small neatly tied roll. On the outside of this roll is a large denomination bill, \$20 or more. The person tells you that he's afraid of carrying too much cash then explains that he has just arrived from a foreign country or that the money is an inheritance, or that he found the money instead. 3 - He asks for your help. He many want advice about a safe place to put the money. He asks, for example, whether you would be willing to keep the money while he's looking for a hotel or he inquires about a reliable bank. Henderson - Its Economic History-

by Maryellen Vallier Sadovich

Maryellen Vallier Sadovich, a noted Nevada historian, and a Henderson resident since 1954, treated our readers with a most unique bicentennial series during 1976. This year, she has researched the local newspaper files and the archives of Henderson's City Hall, the Chamber of Commerce, and BMI, to produce an economic history of Henderson from the first day of incorporation to the present.

As 1965 progressed, and population continued to increase, Henderson's need for city water also increased. On June 1, BMI increased the city's allotment from 5 million gallons to 7 millions per day, even though on peak days during the summer. the amount used was frequently 10 million gallons per day.

ern Nevada suffered from the same problem of a limited water supply. It was for this reason that the Nevada delegation in Washington formally proposed a multi million dollar Southern Nevada Water Supply Project which would provide additional water from Lake Mead for southern Nevada.

But as it became evident that Las Vegas Valley might get more water from Lake Mead, it also became evident that "if all the water in Lake Mead was delivered to the Las Vegas Valley Water District's system the district would be unable to distribute it without a multi - million dollar expansion of its present funds." That was the reason offered for the necessity of a \$15,700,000 Water Bond Issue which the people of the Valley were required to vote on in July





1965 Henderson people voted overwhelmingly to

support the issue. And it was explained, that bonds would be retired from sale of Lake Mead water, not from an elevation in property taxes.

Late in October, 1965, President Lyndon Johnson signed the bill approving the \$81 million Southern Nevada Water Supply Project. At the time, officials explained that the first phase, costing nearly \$50 million would deliver 123,000 acre - feet of water to the Las Vegas Valley municipal and industrial complex. When complete, the entire project would tap Nevada's full 300,000 acre - feet allotment of Colorado River water

But it was one year later, in October 1966 before congressional approval was granted on a \$1 million appropriation to be used for pre - construction planning for the project.

"I can't recall any other single project that has claimed so many hours of my time," said Senator Alan Bible. He also assured local officials that he would press the Bureau of Reclamation to get started as soon as possible on the surveys and planning phase that was financed by the appropriation.

"The final project will provide pumping facilities, reservoirs and pipe lines, including four - mile tunnel through the mountains, to bring Colorado River water from Lake Mead to the Las Vegas Valley's municipal and industrial complex. The water will be the life blood of Clark County."

from Lake Mead, Planning sessions were scheduled in 1967, but it would be a long long time before Southern Nevada Water Supply Project would be completed to expand facilities that would support the economy of Henderson.

Old Memories Of Old Friends As Morry Zenoff Enjoys 50th Year in Journalism

EDITOR'S NOTE: Esther Shipp was an essential part of the Boulder City news for over 25 years. You can ask her about anyone in Boulder and she probably has a file on them. It was a sad day when Esther decided she could no longer write for us. LJK.

Dear Lorna: Who has a letterhead??

Probably the best thing about writing for the Boulder City NEWS was that I did NOT have to agree with Morry. Otherwise my job would have lasted less that six months, instead of more than 25 years!

The Zenoffs hired me as a "string writer" soon after taking over the paper. I had been doing publicity work for a couple of organizations under the former owners. During World War 2, I wrote a series of articles for information of the public on the blood typing project of Cactus Rebekah Lodge--right after the RH Negative factor was discovered, and whole blood was still given for transfusions.

Imagine my pleasure when Dolores asked if I would like to write a column about things here and there in town! Actually getting paid for something that I enjoyed doing! The Zenoffs taught me to check my facts, not to write about someone without permission, and--to use less adjectives! My coverage expanded, until it included weddings, obituaries, feature stories, as well as personal items.

Then, working up in the office itself, while we published in B.C.. was quite an experience! One day, a whole page of set type--including a big ad- fell on the floor while being lifted on to the press. Enough said. One week, we had the front page all prepared--with large headlines--announcing the death of the Regional Director. At midnight, when the hospital told us he was still alive, the front page had to be re-arranged. Believe it or not, he died exactly one week later, on Wednesday night, so that all of the saved type could be used. In those days, we could accept late news items if they were important, to be up-to-date. Back in 1952, when our son Mike was born, the Zenoffs set up a mock front page announcing his birth-just waiting for word from the hospital to fill in the details--and this was used as a birth announcement to our friends out of town.

One year, when John was ill for a long peiod of time, the Zenoffs hired me to interview business people in Henderson--just so I could have a little extra income. (Most of those nice folks are still thriving in our neighboring town, and some have expanded.) So--I thank the Boulder City NEWS for adding many friends in my life, and congratulate Morry on surviving 50 years in the journalism field. Ask any newspaper person--you keep holding on for the love of it in your blood, not to get rich!







The Wah Chang Mining Corporation took over the mine in 1951, but when that company's government contract was completed in 1957, the mine was closed once again, and the camp abandoned. For a few years Tempiute remained a ghost town, and only a few ranchers lived in Sand Springs Valley. But in 1968, Union Carbide leased a number of claims and did extensive drilling. Construction of a new mill to process ores from the old Koyen claims began in 1974. Production began in 1977, and hard rock miners, working underground with modern equipment blasted and hauled 1000 tons of tungsten ore per day from the old mining district. The new mill was constructed on the site of Ruth Wilkinson's tent school house. It was these modern miners who brought their mobile homes to

the subdivision in Sand Springs Valley. The seven school - age children in the camp of approximately seventy adults are bussed to Alamo. They will never know the dubious pleas-Groom mine still live in ures of attending classes in an old fashioned, one room, tent school like the one taught by Ruth Wilkinson. Coins dropped in the slot of a music machine at the local bar will never bring forth the glorious, hand clapping sounds that once came from Eva Koyen's piano. But there are now many advantages in the valley. Development was extended when an Idaho corporation purchased 3000 acres of farm land near the mining settlement. Many acres were planted, and power lines were installed during the past few months. On March 22, 1978, at 5:30 p.m. the whole town cheered when lines were energized, and electrical power was formally turned on. The residents of Tempiute Village formed a non profit power company

And much interest was expressed in this town that had its inception in 1975, when Union Carbide Corporation re - opened a tungsten mine in mountains that form the southeast boundary of Sand Springs Valley, 55 miles from Alamo, the nearest town.

Miners found the long drive to lodgings in Alamo too strenuous, and soon began seeking parking spaces for their mobile homes in the Sand Springs Valley that spreads out flat and beautiful toward the Nye County line. A rancher sub - divided a part of his ranch lands in the valley where water lies less than one hundred feet below the surface, and a trailer village was soon organized. A mobile home rental



Solar Energy: What's In It For You?

Heat from the sun is free but the equipment you need for using it isn't, and a lot of people are still in the dark about what's practical and what isn't. These questions and answers may help shed a little light.

Q. Can I heat my whole house from the sun?

A. Solar energy for whole-house heating is still in its infancy. Systems are available but they require a big investment. The equipment needed for widespread practical use is still a few years down the road.

Executives of state taxpayer associations comprising the National **Taxpayers** Conference are convinced that most of the responsibility for that inflation must be accepted by the federal government, and urge adoption of governmental policies that will reduce or eliminate this burden and insure the return of the economy to a productive cycle.

at the same time release to the states of revenue sources which would allow states to fund a level of welfare programs suitable to their unique situations.

5. Encourage the prompt development of energy resources throughout the country by reducing or eliminating the intrusion of government into market decisions bearing on the profitable development of badly - needed energy supplies within our country.

6. Abandonment of ef-

forts of government to dictate the conditions under which the people are allowed to inaugurate new enterprises and to expand those which are successful. The conference is con-

vinced that the principal deterrent to economic growth in America is the failure of the federal (and some state and local) governments to live within current income. We urged the President and the Congress to adopt and pursue as their primary goal, the achieving of a balanced federal budget within the next two fiscal years. Rejection of that goal (or even its deferral) constitutes a hazard from which our country may not be able to recover.

Senator Humphrey recently announced, for instance, that she is fully committed to passage of the Labor Law Reform Bill, which is scheduled to come before the Senate some time this year.



The Desert

Ranger, what is all the orange stuff on the desert plants? This is the most common question asked by visitors to the Alan Bible Visitor Center during the last month. The orange plant is a parasite called Dodder that is usually found growing on Burro Bush. Dodder has also been seen attacking Creosote Bush and several other desert plants. This parasite belongs to the genus **CUSCUTA** and is a close relative of the Morning Glory. Although related to the Morning Glory. Dodder behaves more like mistletoe.

Dodder is mostly seen this time of year as a dense tangle of orange or sometimes yellow strands interwoven through the host plant. The parasite begins life as a small brown seed in the soil. After germination, tendrils develop and shoot skyward to attempt contact with a host plant. The tendril, if successful, will twine itself about the host many times to secure itself. If unsuccessful in locating a host plant, it will use

up the reserve food supply in the seed and die. After contact is made, the parasite will inset a haustoria into the host and begin to absorb its food and water. Haustoria are absorbing organs of the Dodder created exclusively to siphon off nutrients. As the Dodder grows, feeds and envelopes its host, the root section of the parasite soon disappears and severs all connections with the soil. It is then free to inject more haustoria and parasitize several hosts at once.

After establishing itself. Dodder will produce many minute flowers in clusters on the stems. From this many seeds are formed. The seeds may be fully viable in the soil for up to five years, waiting for just the right set of circumstances. This has been one of those years.

Dodder can be controlled by hand pulling before seeds are produced, or cut away infected portions of the host plant. Dodder can kill the host if infestation becomes heavy.



Woman's curiosity at last overcoming her fear, she followed the snake down to the lake, where she was still more horrified to find her little daughter on the point of drowning. Seeing the little one fall into the water it seems that the snake, with astonishing instinct. crawled to the house to give warning (Edtor's note: The author of that yarn should be made an Indian Agent at once.)" Not wanting to be

beaten at the game, the editor of the White Pine News reported that a local prospector swore that the following was true:

"Bill Nuckolls, a prospector, fell down a prospect shaft forty feet deep, right into a nest of blacknsakes. Most men would have died of fright, but Nuckolls was not that sort of man. He tied several snakes together and started them up the side of the shaft, tying a fresh snake as

fast as the rest wriggled up. Pretty soon the head of the snakes got over the edge and started downhill. Nukolls kept tying on fresh reptiles until he had used up a-couple of hundred, every snake







Amorphous, Ambiguous

If today's column turns out to be amorphous (a more fuss) or ambiguous (m big you us), it's due to the nature of the words discussion. under Amorphous means having no definite form; lacking in definite shape; unorganized. Ambiguous, on the other hand, means something that is unclear, or open to various interpretations, lacking definite meaning. Amorphous and ambiguous are octaves of each other, with amorphous referring to more organic shapelessness, and am-

biguous referring to a conceptual shapelessness.

If we take some jello, not quite hardened, and

plop it out on the table, the resulting mass is amorphous. Clouds of smog oozing across the sky are described as amorphous. Grease spots on the driveway are normally amorphous. Amorphous means something (or someone) without definite shape, or form. Ambiguous, on the

other hand, can refer to something which has a definite shape, but the meaning of that shape, or form is unclear. A

biguous. The form and structure may be definite, but the meaning is uncertain, or can be taken in several different ways. It's ambiguous. **Politicians and generals** are adept at making definite, precise statements which are nevertheless ambiguous. "Forward moving defense" is an example of a recent ambiguous statement by one of our generals. "Reserved optimism tempered with

A blob of jello, on the other hand, can hardly be described as ambiguous: much better described as amorphous.

Entering the home on the top floor, the home is built on a slope like many of the Boulder City homes. The upper story includes two







The definition of a moped states that the motor has a maximum piston displacement less than 50 cc, rated at two brake horsepower or less, and is capable of a maximum speed of less than 30 MPH. Anything more powerful is a motorcycle, and must be licensed and insured as such.

Many states have restricted mopeds to certain roads and limited speeds. Check each locality before you ride.

Before you travel on your moped, be sure you know how to ride it well. Never ride on major roads where the traffic is going faster than you are. Wear a helmet, drive defensively, and use color and lights to make yourself conspicuous.

Your moped must be insured on its own auto policy, with adequate liability coverage. (There is limited liability coverage for the moped in your home . owners policy - limited to your own backyard. that is, not public streets.)


