

# Eldorado - Rainbow Street Fight On Monday's Agenda

Following a spirited one hour and forty - five minute public hearing, the City Council voted to purchase the corner of Market Street and Rainbow Street for future use.

Person ... and Atomic Street is a thorn in the side ... I would like to have time to study this ... it's a very important move ... we have to make but any decision would be premature. A request was made to the Eldorado Club and the council with a recommendation for approval from the Planning Commission.

Bill Boyd, one of the owners of the newly remodeled club, explained that the benefits which could be gained by the city would include a two story 503 garage structured to eventually go higher, 31 spaces for recreational vehicles and a 100 room hotel which could go as high as seven stories at a later time. "The maintenance and taxes on the street would be

paid by the Eldorado," Boyd pointed out. "There would be additional revenue through additional gaming," he said, explaining that the club would further add on to their gaming facilities. "And we would be employing about 100 more local people than right now. "There would be additional revenue," he continued "from

the sale of Market Street ... we're not asking to be given the street, we intend to buy it. "There would be an additional number of tourists staying in the city, many for two or three days ... and the city would also derive revenue from the room tax." Boyd explained that the Eldorado had recently undergone a \$1 1/2 million expansion and remodeling and they

would be spending about \$2 million more if the vacation is approved. He concluded his case saying there would be "no material injury" to anyone. George Rudiak, a spokesman for the Rainbow Club which is the main objector to the vacation, called it "public

## Building Reaches \$14 Million For Four Months

It seemed like all of Henderson and Boulder City joined Tuesday night -- for, from our vantage point high up there near the rafters -- we picked out so many home town faces -- who enjoyed along with the rest of this 7500 crowd an evening with Old Blue Eyes -- Frank Sinatra -- and his friends.

Most exciting was the good news and the feeling that came as Tom Wiesner at the microphone announced that more than one million dollars had been contributed by this audience this year for the sponsoring of athletic scholarships at UNLV.

Be you from Yale or Harvard, Notre Dame or Ohio State, Texas or Alabama, Stanford or USC ... never there or anywhere in college circles can a claim be made of fund raising of or near this more than a million dollar amount for sports sponsorship.

Sure -- those colleges draw more at the football and basketball gate -- and those colleges thus have more money to use to run their sports departments -- but none can touch the scholarship aid Southern Nevada annually gives its fast growing, young, colorful Rebels.

Ninety - eight per cent of those who pledged 500 bucks last year did it again this year!

No wonder, then, -- the thank you party the Rebels fund - raisers ran Tuesday night -- where doctor's degree man from UNLV -- Sinatra -- willingly gave his time to put frosting on the cake.

As one of the speakers mentioned -- We're No. 1 in basketball with Tarkanian, No. 1 in football with Knap, and No. 1 in the community response to our scholarship drive.

Just a word of caution -- money can buy great athletes -- and great athletes can bring championship teams -- but because we've seen how rigid the National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA) can get in tracking down proselyting of athletes, it is important that the UNLV authorities insist on sticking to the letter of the law.

We've seen universities pay kids for going out to the stadium each night and counting the goal lines ... getting 400 a month for same.

We've seen where universities hire a high school coach to get that year's star from that high school to sign up.

We've seen where a Cadillac would go to the parents of a kid for signing up to go to a certain school.

### Art Espinoza, New Housing Chairman

Former Assemblyman Arthur Espinoza was elected chairman for a one-year term of office for the Clark County Housing Authority at its meeting of Wed., April 19.

Commissioner W.R. Hampton, former Mayor of Henderson, was elected vice chairman for a similar term.

The Housing authority received notice for HUD of approval to award a contract for the rehabilitation of Hampton Court Apartments to GCMC, Inc., of Palos Verdes Estates, Ca., for the low bid of \$584,477.

Bill Cottrell, executive director of the Housing Authority, told the commissioners that modernization funding in the amount of \$163,000 for work on piping systems at Landsman Gardens was almost assured though no written confirmation has been received to date.

Eva Jane Richardson of Boulder City has been named as a half-time rental clerk at Espinoza Terrace, replacing Laura Frank who has been promoted to a full-time program management assistant in the central office.

The Building boom in Henderson continued to be almost four times over that of last year at this time, and last year was a banner year, according to John Quinn, superintendent of building and safety.

In the first four months of 1978 the total is \$14,704,839, as compared to \$4,621,589 for the same period last year, Quinn said.

The building for the month of April reached \$4,852,489 as compared to \$2,374,146 for the same month last year.

The biggest amount of building is in new homes which amounted to 4,504,470 or the month of April. Other building permits were taken out for duplexes, residential alterations and additions, concrete work, patios, garages, utility buildings, new commercials, fences and walls, signs, pools and grading.

There were 1272 inspections made during the month, 37 clean up violations and 37 compliances.

### City Heads Get 5% Pay Hike

Non-classified employees of the city, including the city manager, city attorney, city clerk and others, were approved for a five per cent raise in pay by the city council Monday night.

The pay hike brought the city manager's salary to approximately \$30,000; the city attorney from \$25,977 to \$27,276; city clerk from \$19,838 to \$20,830; public works director from \$23,690 to \$24,875; the recreation director from \$19,570 to \$20,873; the finance director from \$19,570 to \$20,549; planning director from \$21,373 to \$22,442 and the personnel director from \$19,570 to \$20,549.

The pay raise will go into effect on July 5. City Manager Bob Campbell explained that before the department head pay review some senior subordinates were paid nearly the same as the department heads.

The raise also included benefit adjustments in keeping with other city employees. The increases add more than \$7,497 per year to the city's budget.

Most other employees of the city are represented by six various union organizations.

### Fire Dept. To Test Lines, Hydrants

On May 8, the Henderson Fire Department will begin flow testing, flushing, and repairing of the fire hydrants in Henderson.

Local citizens are advised that the flushing of the hydrants and mains may create a temporary cloudy or silt residue problem which may damage clothing during washing; and it would be advisable to postpone clothes washing on the days that hydrants are

flowed in your area.

Check your local newspaper for the weekly schedule of hydrant flowing, or call the Fire Department at 565 - 9275 to find out when your area is being tested.

You can also test your own water prior to washing by running a small amount into your sink and checking it for any evident cloudiness or silt residue. Flow testing will usually be done between the hours of 9 a.m. and 5 p.m.

# Mrs. Lyle Burkholder Celebrates Silver Anniversary With Alpha Beta

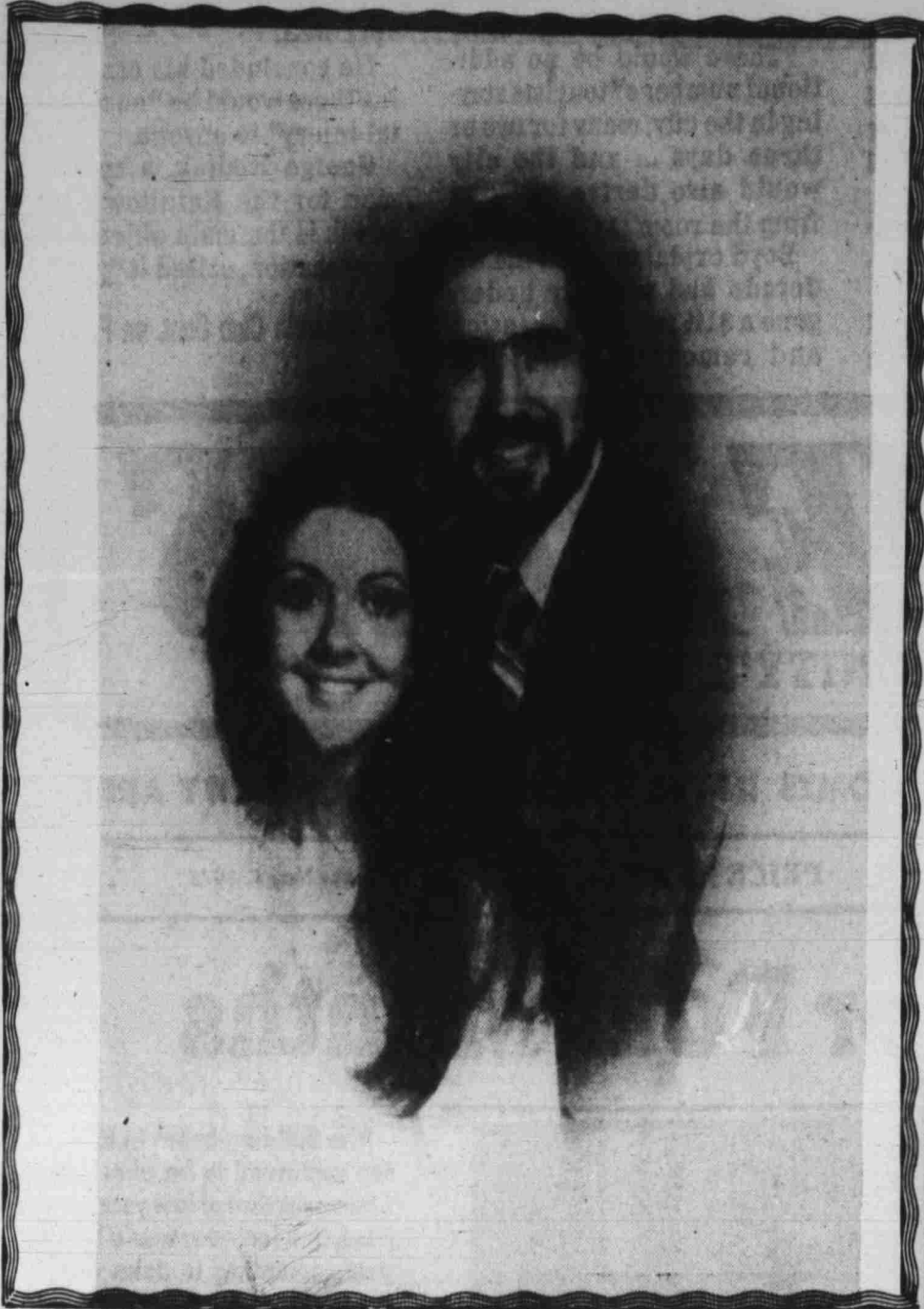

Oh--so many violations... and we saw them all caught. Either the schools got booted out of the conference, the kid got booted out of school, or the university was put on probation -- put to shame in headlines across the nation.

Would you believe that Tommy Harmon once played freshman

football at Marquette and the same week switched to Michigan where he later became All-American. The stories could be piled up into an unusual book of backroom chicanery by college coaches.

That shouldn't happen here -- especially with the eyes of the world seeing an unheard of amount of one million dollars has been raised to help athletes who come to UNLV.

Kids legitimately recruited, properly coached, properly educated, can bring fame to the school and fun for the fans. The key -- to this writer -- lies in the coaches' abilities to pick the kinds of kids who'll produce big time results.

Yes -- we have a treasure here with fans who'll help -- now it requires vigilance over the goose that layed the nestegg ... so as not to kill the egg.

## Basic Basketball on Montoya Menu

"One of coaching's greatest thrills is sitting in the local coffee shop dissecting the game with town boosters."

Sitting in a coffee shop dissecting next season's cage challenge was newly appointed Basic head varsity coach Ron Montoya.

Montoya, low-key off the floor but intense between opening and finish whistles, talked not of sky-high cagers and win-at-any-cost basketball. He gloried in the blend which ultimately makes men of boys.

"Whether I'm counseling during academic hours or basketball practice," he said, "I place myself in the youngster's shoes and get my result."

The 27-year-old Montoya, varsity assistant to basketball coach Sherrill Stephens last season at Las Vegas High, will fill the rare role of counselor-coach at Basic.

"He was hired because he excels in both areas," Basic athletic administrator Don Taylor said.

Montoya reflected on the path which led to

coaching.

"I was working out in the gym at California State (master's degree) when frosh coach Bill Van Gundy queried me about a basketball job. My answer was a quick yes, but until that time I had never considered coaching," he asserted.

Van Gundy, Montoya's basketball coach at St. Mary's College (Moraga, Calif.) had him in mind for the head junior varsity post in Pleasant, Calif.

Ron got the job. In two years he won 20 and lost 19.

The successor to Mike Dietmeier said he needs the support of fans to stake the school to a winning tradition. Dietmeier quit during the Southern AAA Zone tournament last season after a dismal five year 17-103 record.

"I feel great about this challenge (last season's club quicksanded to a 1-24 record) but I can't do the job without the support of the townspeople," Montoya exclaimed. "I hope the community will be patient."

Montoya believes support helps competition.

"We want people raising holy Ned," he said. "That's a lot better than the apathy of recent years. But everyone wants a winner. With the fans' help I'll turn it around."

Montoya turned his attention to strategy.

"I don't believe our personnel now is geared to a running game," he uttered. "We'll stress defense. We'll have to exercise patience. We'll work for high percentage shots. Control is defense. Without the ball the opposition can't score."

Montoya shifted to intensity and fundamentals.

"I like Bobby Knight's (Indiana) moves," he injected. "He's a fired up coach. I know his frills forward and backward. He combines offense with defense. For example, he drills four against four. When the ball changes hands the defense immediately captures the offensive mood and visa versa. That's transition basketball. You know, last season's Basic team bogged down on defense. But I don't intend that as criticism of the

coach."

The new coach targeted two players for next season -- junior Jimmy Lozano and Seniro Mike Holliday.

"Lozano's broken collarbone suffered in football last season limited him to two JV basketball games in the first semester," he noted. "In the second semester he was short eligibility units. But he excels in shooting and defense and I expect him to provide the key to our upcoming club. Holliday is good under the boards and the hit department. He could well provide strength."

Montoya recalled he coached Lozano as an 8th and 9th grader.

"He was on the Nevada Stars which participated in the Boys' Congress International tournament," he stated.

The new mentor hailed Stephens as a force in his career.

"Stephens made me a complete coach," he said.

Montoya injected the name of UNLV coach Jerry Tarkanian.

"I revered him as a kid. I grew up in Riverside, Calif. Tarkanian started his career at Riverside City College."

The new appointment hopes to push a summer program.

"Before school is out I'll have varsity, junior varsity and incoming

freshmen working out," he said. "I hope to include 7th and 8th graders with the help of the Henderson Boys' Club and the Burkholder 8th grade coach."

Taylor said Montoya was hired over eight applicants -- all from within the system.

"We're high on Ron," the administrator commented. "He's a super guy. He sold us not only on his coaching ability and philosophy, but his expertise as a counselor. Stephens' recommendation went a long way toward this appointment. Ron excited me during our long interview."

Taylor and Principal Frank Brusa earn Montoya's respect.

"Frank and Don were super cooperative," Montoya exclaimed. "I can work with both of them and I'll certainly do my best."

Taylor said Montoya is under no immediate pressure to produce a winner.

"He has three years to put us in motion," he commented. "We don't expect a state title soon, but things will change."

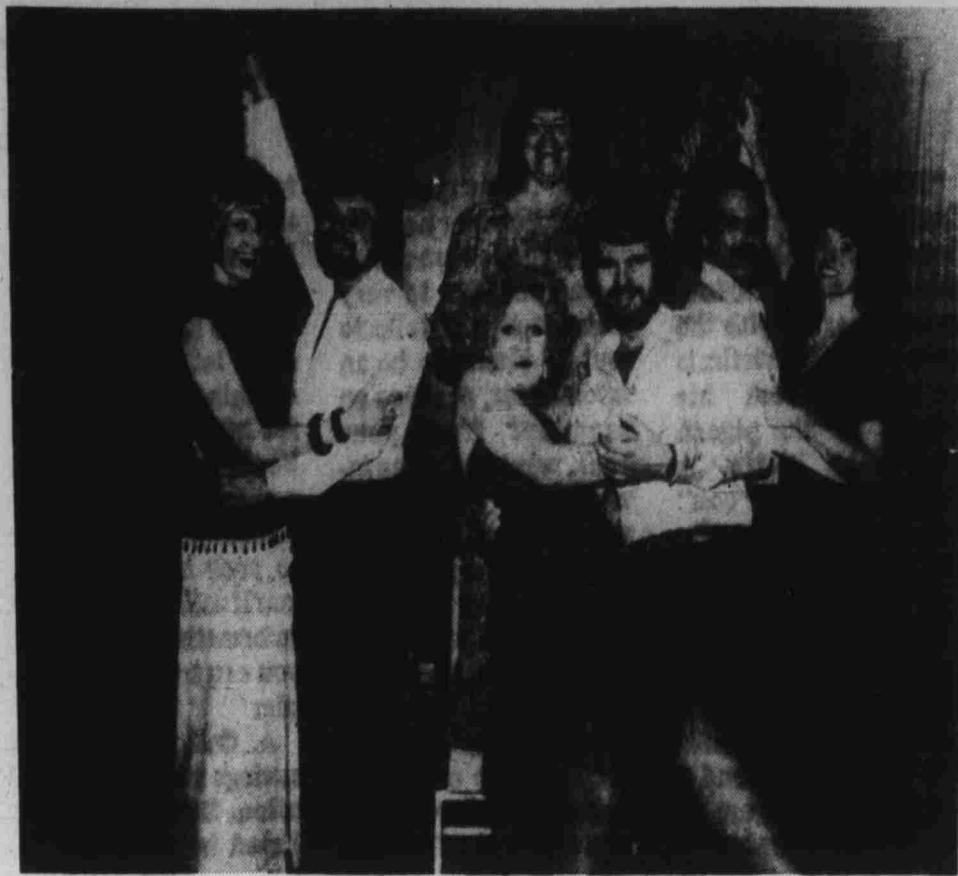

## Your Refrigerator Could Be A Life Saver

Did you know that your refrigerator could help save the life of someone in your family, including yourself?

The "Vial of Life" program got underway this week all over Clark County and both the Henderson Fire Department and the three local pharmacies are participating in the program that has saved lives of people in other parts of the country.

The "Vial of Life" is a small bottle containing important medical information about the residents who dwell in individual homes or apartments. This bottle is to be attached to the bottom of the top shelf, right side of the refrigerator so that a firefighter, paramedic or police officer can find any important information necessary to save a life in a crisis.

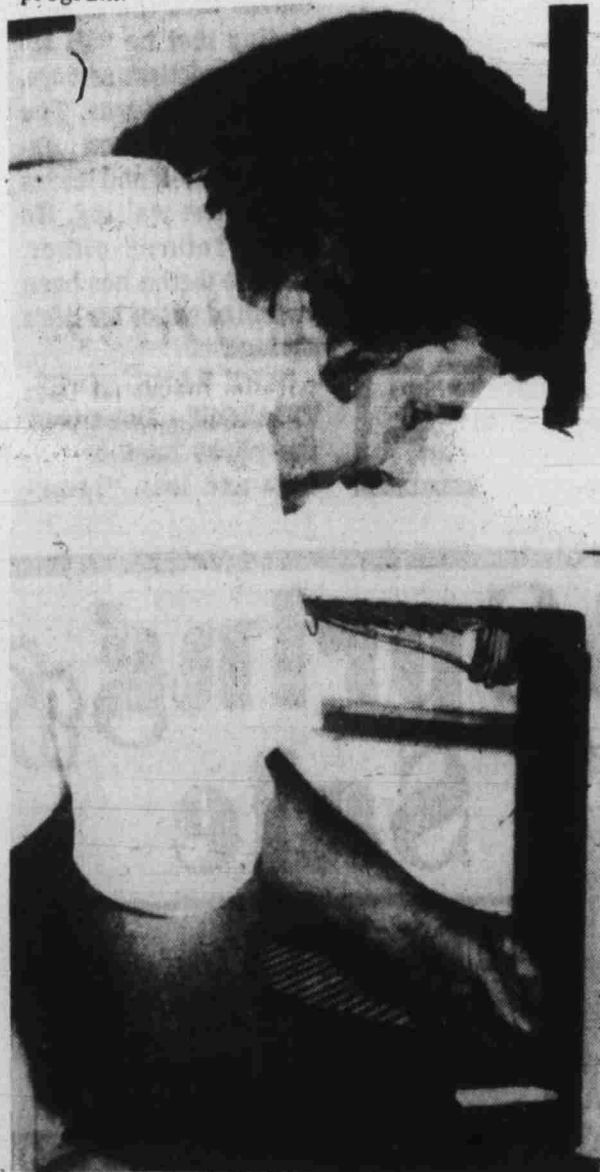
All you need do is go to the fire station, J & K Pharmacy, Medical Arts Pharmacy or Skagg's Pharmacy and pick up your packet which contains a form to be filled out and your vial or bottle.

The form will contain such information as the name of your doctor, your hospital and insurance company. You also can write special medical information such as the types of medication used by family members and their blood types, and any other pertinent information a doctor would need to know in case of an emergency.

The "Vial of Life" program was the idea of Fred Jameson, a member of the Las Vegas Fire Department. He had read about the program in other parts of the country and thought it could also be done in Clark County. With members of a senior citizens committee, he worked to start the program in time for the beginning of National Senior Citizens' Month in May.

Although the program was coordinated with a senior citizens committee, the vials can save anyone's life and therefore has been expanded to include everyone regardless of age. A \$1 donation is being

asked of those not in the senior citizen ranks and it is hoped that everyone will participate in the program.

# "The Senior Citizen And 'Con' Games

FROM THE CRIME PREVENTION UNIT HENDERSON POLICE DEPARTMENT

**BE ALERT** - Have you ever been confronted by a smooth talker or confidence man? These men are professionals when it comes to double talk and many times they have talked citizens out of their life savings. Don't let this happen to you. If you should be asked any of the following questions or find yourself in a situation like these, call the Police immediately.

1. Have you come into contact with a stranger who showed you a large roll of money and told you he would split it with you if you would show "good faith" by putting up your money?

2. Has someone come up to you and offered to bless your money or remove a curse or perform a ritual which would make you rich? Don't laugh, people have actually lost their entire savings this way.

3. Has a person claiming to be a bank examiner or Police investigator said he needed your help in catching a bank teller who is believed to have withdrawn money from your account? If this has happened to you or does happen, report it at once to the bank and to the Police.

**"THE PIGEON DROP"** Each year swindlers fleece the American public by using various techniques, all with the same result: the victim is separated from his money! In "the pigeon drop" the victim is selected by two "con" men (or women), usually on a busy street. One con man bumps the intended victim and then engages him in conversation. At this time the other con man walks up and states that he has just found a bag and asks them to witness his opening it. The bag is then opened and is found to be full of money. He then asks both parties to wait while he consults his boss. He returns and reports a large sum of money in the bag which they will all share if they all keep quiet. To guarantee that no one will talk, each is requested to put up a sum of money as evidence of good faith. The victim is then talked into withdrawing his savings and turning it over to the bag man. The bag man then leaves with the money, stating that he will return the victim's savings. He never returns. The accomplice then excuses himself and leaves the victim waiting. He never returns either, and the victim has been swindled out of his life's savings.

**"THE BANK INVESTIGATOR"** - Don't trust the phony bank or savings and loan "investigator". You meet him at your home or he calls you by phone then comes to see you. He is very serious when he talks to you. He claims to be an investigator, perhaps an examiner from your bank, maybe a Police investigator or government agent. He has brought along deposit slips from your bank and other official papers. He could get your money. Here's how: 1 - He tells you that the bank is checking up on a dishonest employee. He says that one of the tellers at the bank is suspected of stealing funds from customer accounts. The man asks to see your book, then tells you that records at the bank show a much smaller balance in your account. 2 - He explains how you can help him. He says he wants to make a test to see what the suspected employee does when a customer draws money out of his account. The investigator suggests that you go to your bank, draw some money, then let him use it for the test. He even offers to provide transportation to the bank. He also says that a bonded messenger will pick up your money. 3 - You give away your money. After you've withdrawn the money, the man (or his messenger) gives you a receipt and takes the money. He tells you how he plans to trap the suspected employee by having the money returned

to the bank for examination. But once the man has left, you'll never see him again. Your money will be gone forever, so don't let a stranger get anything from you. Don't let him see your bank book. Don't sign any papers. Whether he's phoned you or has come to your home, just say you'll call back later. Get information from people you can trust. For example:

A. Call your bank or savings and loan association. Dial the number listed in the phone directory, NOT a number the stranger may have suggested.

B. Call the Police.

**"THE HOME REPAIRMAN"** - Beware of the phony repairman or engineer who offers to check your chimney, furnace, catch basin or other installation. Such a person comes to your home. He is in working clothes, perhaps carrying a ladder or kit of tools. But the repairman will be very smart. He'll try to deceive you if you don't stop him. 1 - He pretends to inspect. If you allow him to check the chimney, for example, he deliberately breaks off some bricks. If you let him check the furnace, he damages some of the pipes or a part of the control mechanism. 2 - Then he reports serious damage. He shows you the bricks or other broken material and tells you a repair job must be started right

away. He says your house could catch fire very easily. 3 - Finally, he makes you pay. He quotes a low price, then asks for a cash deposit. If you don't have enough cash, he offers to drive you to your bank so you can draw on your account. Then with your money in his pocket, he simply disappears. Or, after quoting a price, he asks you to sign an order. Once you've signed, however, you may get a bill that's a lot higher than the amount the man quoted you. Because of certain words in the order, you are legally obligated to pay the bill collector, even though the work was not properly completed. The man may also talk about other work. If he gets you to sign, however, you could be forced to keep paying for a long, long time. So, take the time to check carefully. But don't let him go into your basement or on the roof or in your backyard.

**CHECK THEIR STORY:** Ask the man for his name, address, phone number and the name of his company. Tell him you will call the next day. Then get some information about the man. For example:

A. Check the phone book, see if either he or his company is listed.

B. Talk to neighbors. One of them might know about the man or be able to check on the work his has proposed.

C. Talk to an officer of your bank or savings and loan association or call the Better Business Bureau.

D. Call the Police.

**"THE SWITCH GAME ARTIST"** - Be on guard when a helpless stranger asks for your advice. Such a person stops you on the street or in a large department store. It could be a man or a woman, someone old or young, well-dressed or shabby-looking. Listen closely as the person talks to you. He'll have a story to tell you. But before he's finished, you might lose a lot of money. Here's how: 1 - He or she gets your attention. It might be a man who asks how to get to a certain hotel, a woman crying pitifully as she approaches you, or someone who simply asks to talk to you. 2 - He tells you he has a large sum of money. He shows you an envelope and inside you see a small neatly tied roll. On the outside of this roll is a large denomination bill, \$20 or more. The person tells you that he's afraid of carrying too much cash then explains that he has just arrived from a foreign country or that the money is an inheritance, or that he found the money instead. 3 - He asks for your help. He many want advice about a safe place to put the money. He asks, for example, whether you would be willing to keep the money while he's looking for a hotel or he inquires about a reliable bank. If the man has told you he found the

money, he offers to share it with you on the condition that you help him in some way, perhaps hold the money while he talks to a lawyer. In any case, the man talks very fast and you get a bit confused. 4 - Another stranger appears. The number two stranger has heard you talking with number one and asks whether he can help in some way. Number one explains the problem to number two. Number two thinks about the problem, then says you certainly look very honest. He suggests that you be entrusted with the money. Number one agrees that you look honest, but says you should

provide some "earnest money" to show your good faith. Since you don't have much money with you, you agree to go with them to your bank or savings and loan association. 5 - You withdraw the "earnest money" from your bank account. Outside the bank, you put the money into an envelope given you by number one, then hand him the envelope. Number one takes the other envelope out of his pocket and thanks you for showing good faith. Number two also praises you and suggests that your money will be returned to you. Number one agrees heartily, saying that he'll give it to

you now. A moment later, the two men tell you they must say good-bye. After they have left, however, you discover -- 6 - It's your money he took! You open the envelope and recognize the roll that number one showed you when you first met him. You untie the roll and see that there's only one bill! Inside the bill are many sheets of blank paper. You realize that the two envelopes looked alike and that number one had switched them. You also understand now that the two men knew each other and were working together to cheat you.

If you've read this carefully, we are sure you won't be the victim of a switch-game artist. However, if he does get your money, promptly call the Police for emergency aid. If possible, try to contact the Police before the man gets your money. Your call is free.

These are only a few examples of how confidence men work. Always be on your guard when discussing money matters with anyone. If you suspect something, notify the Police IMMEDIATELY.

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# Henderson - Its Economic History- Part 49 of a series

Maryellen Vallier Sadovich, a noted Nevada historian, and a Henderson resident since 1954, treated our readers with a most unique bicentennial series during 1976. This year, she has researched the local newspaper files and the archives of Henderson's City Hall, the Chamber of Commerce, and BMI, to produce an economic history of Henderson from the first day of incorporation to the present.

As 1965 progressed, and population continued to increase, Henderson's need for city water also increased. On June 1, BMI increased the city's allotment from 5 million gallons to 7 millions per day, even though on peak days during the summer, the amount used was frequently 10 million gallons per day.

Other areas of southern Nevada suffered from the same problem of a limited water supply. It was for this reason that the Nevada delegation in Washington formally proposed a multi-million dollar Southern Nevada Water Supply Project which would provide additional water from Lake Mead for southern Nevada.

The project was "absolutely mandatory," said Senator Cannon, "if the demands caused by the phenomenal growth of southern Nevada were to be met. This gigantic water supply project will insure the continued orderly growth and prosperity of one of the fastest growing areas in the U.S."

A hearing on the proposed project was scheduled for May 20 in Washington, and letters from the Chamber of Commerce and from the City of Henderson were written to the chairman of the Senate Subcommittee on Irrigation and Reclamation requesting

favorable consideration of the project during the current session of Congress.

But as it became evident that Las Vegas Valley might get more water from Lake Mead, it also became evident that "if all the water in Lake Mead was delivered to the Las Vegas Valley Water District's system, the district would be unable to distribute it without a multi-million dollar expansion of its present funds." That was the reason offered for the necessity of a \$15,700,000 Water Bond Issue which the people of the Valley were required to vote on in July

1965.

Henderson people voted overwhelmingly to support the issue. And it was explained, that bonds would be retired from sale of Lake Mead water, not from an elevation in property taxes.

Late in October, 1965, President Lyndon Johnson signed the bill approving the \$81 million Southern Nevada Water Supply Project. At the time, officials explained that the first phase, costing nearly \$50 million would deliver 123,000 acre-feet of water to the Las Vegas Valley municipal and industrial complex. When complete, the entire project would tap Nevada's full 300,000 acre-feet allotment of Colorado River water from Lake Mead.

But it was one year later, in October 1966 before congressional approval was granted on a \$1 million appropriation to be used for pre-construction planning for the project.

"I can't recall any other single project that has claimed so many hours of my time," said Senator Alan Bible. He also assured local officials that he would press the Bureau of Reclamation to get started as soon as possible on the surveys and planning phase that was financed by the appropriation.

"The final project will provide pumping facilities, reservoirs and pipe lines, including four-mile tunnel through the mountains, to bring Colorado River water from Lake Mead to the Las Vegas Valley's municipal and industrial complex. The water will be the life blood of Clark County."

Planning sessions were scheduled in 1967, but it would be a long long time before Southern Nevada Water Supply Project would be completed to expand facilities that would support the economy of Henderson.

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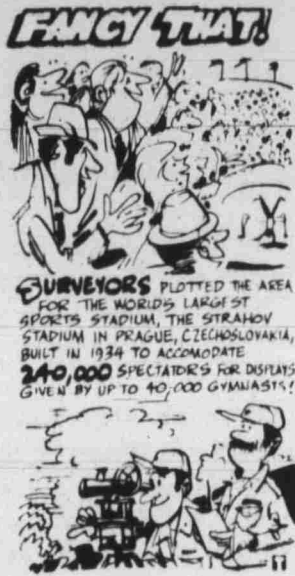

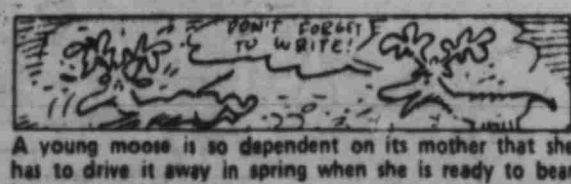

## Taylor Students Study Economics

Homemade whole wheat bread, topped with freshly made butter churned by the students themselves - and later eaten by them - furnished a delightful close to a series of discussions about economics in Mr. Eric Walker's sixth grade class recently.

Beginning with the precept that an economic system is the manner in which labor, resources and skills are brought together to produce and distribute things people want, the class had studied, in simplified terms, how our economy works.

Friday afternoon the students played roles as producers and consumers and helped to make decisions in both groups.

Since in pioneer days economics probably were easier to understand, the students were given the problem of producing and consum-

ing a basic food - bread and butter.

On each desk were small amounts of grains of wheat, to be pounded and transformed into whole wheat flour. (When the basic idea was clear, a food processor speeded up the time element by finishing the task and providing a bowl of the needed flour.)

Again, in the interest of saving time, Mrs. Walker became an entrepreneur by offering a needed item - a loaf of already baked bread.

The boys at one table and the girls at another, were given a jar of whipping cream for each table. At a signal to begin, each student individually shook the jar for a few minutes and then passed it to the next in line. The frantically shaken jar went round and round the tables until the boys won the race with a jar of

newly churned butter.

Since the number of slices of bread was less than the number of prospective consumers, the value of each thereby increased and a problem in arithmetic arose. Should the slices be divided into halves, thirds or fourths? Decisions had to be made.

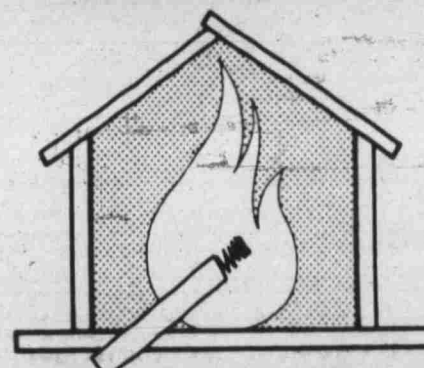
Later, in describing the social studies unit to the librarian, students Kim Shepherd, Keith Case, Eddie Clegg and Uvette Gonzague were enthusiastic about the booklet, from the United States Department of Commerce, which had been used as a text. In their words, "the definitions were easy to understand, the cartoons made it fun and the facts were stated clearly."

Words such as labor markets, goods and services, supply and demand, capital goods, natural resources and competition, were used by the students with such confidence and clarity that it would seem that the teaching unit was a success.

rights against private rights" and asked "Is this vacation really necessary?"

Rudiak explained that the Rainbow owners had bought the club 11 years ago with the knowledge that Market and Water Streets were the main streets of the city and they had remodeled their club with the reliance of the fact they would have use of both streets.

They recently paid \$260,000 for the old thrift store building and they too plan to build a hotel, Rudiak revealed.

"We find it impossible to proceed with these plans" if the vacation is approved. "Oh, they might make a parking area," he continued but "won't build if Market Street is vacated."

"I don't think this is good planning and I don't think this is in the public interest," he reiterated.

Rudiak also challenged the Eldorado as to how the circum-

stances have really changed since six months ago when the Eldorado made their first request for the Market Street vacation.

Robert McNutt, a Las Vegas engineer, and Jay Downey, former County Planning Director, also spoke on the issue.

Both called the vacation "premature action, especially with the Civic Center plans not finalized," and advised closing the street on a temporary basis.

"Use it and see what happens," suggested McNutt "but maintain status quo as owner of Market Street."

Tony Marnell, architect for the Boyd's proposed development, said "private enterprise has to help public enterprise because they can't always do it themselves."

It was learned following the meeting that the council was concerned over a possible law suit by the Rainbow Club should the vacation be approved.

**Old Memories Of Old Friends As Morry Zenoff Enjoys 50th Year in Journalism**

**EDITOR'S NOTE:** Esther Shipp was an essential part of the Boulder City news for over 25 years. You can ask her about anyone in Boulder and she probably has a file on them. It was a sad day when Esther decided she could no longer write for us. LJK.

Dear Lorna:

Who has a letterhead?? Probably the best thing about writing for the Boulder City NEWS was that I did NOT have to agree with Morry. Otherwise my job would have lasted less than six months, instead of more than 25 years!

The Zenoffs hired me as a "string writer" soon after taking over the paper. I had been doing publicity work for a couple of organizations under the former owners. During World War 2, I wrote a series of articles for information of the public on the blood typing project of Cactus Rebekah Lodge—right after the RH Negative factor was discovered, and whole blood was still given for transfusions.

Imagine my pleasure when Dolores asked if I would like to write a column about things here and there in town! Actually getting paid for something that I enjoyed doing! The Zenoffs taught me to check my facts, not to write about someone without permission, and—to use less adjectives! My coverage expanded, until it included weddings, obituaries, feature stories, as well as personal items.

Then, working up in the office itself, while we published in B.C., was quite an experience! One day, a whole page of set type—including a big ad—fell on the floor while being lifted on to the press. Enough said. One week, we had the front page all prepared—with large headlines—announcing the death of the Regional Director. At midnight, when the hospital told us he was still alive, the front page had to be re-arranged. Believe it or not, he died exactly one week later, on Wednesday night, so that all of the saved type could be used. In those days, we could accept late news items if they were important, to be up-to-date.

Back in 1952, when our son Mike was born, the Zenoffs set up a mock front page announcing his birth—just waiting for word from the hospital to fill in the details—and this was used as a birth announcement to our friends out of town.

One year, when John was ill for a long period of time, the Zenoffs hired me to interview business people in Henderson—just so I could have a little extra income. (Most of those nice folks are still thriving in our neighboring town, and some have expanded.)

So—I think the Boulder City NEWS for adding many friends in my life, and congratulate Morry on surviving 50 years in the journalism field. Ask any newspaper person—you keep holding on for the love of it in your blood, not to get rich!

us "I was there."

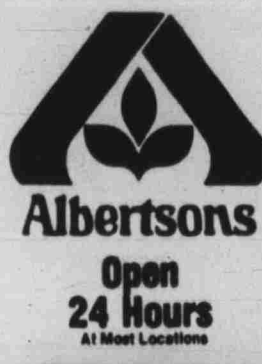

# Rachel, A New Town For Nevada

Treasured memories of her young womanhood in a remote Nevada mining camp brought smiles to the face of Ruth Wilkinson of Henderson recently when she was invited to take part in the dedication of a new town in the Sand Springs Valley, 150 miles from Henderson, on State Highway 25, nearly forty miles west of

park, a small store, a bar and recreation center, all located in trailers, completed the business section of the new settlement. Wells were drilled and large, diesel powered generators were brought in to provide limited electrical power. Thoughtful businessmen from Caliente, over a hundred miles to the east, drove

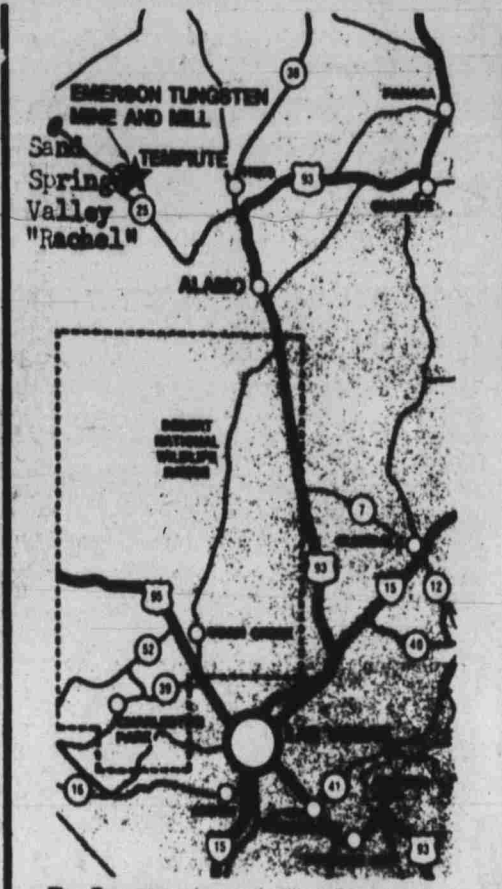
school tent, and ate her meals at the boarding house with 45 men. A piano, laboriously transported to the camp by Eva Koyen, was the only source of entertainment, and community singing echoed through the camp each evening.

The Wah Chang Mining Corporation took over the mine in 1951, but when that company's government contract was completed in 1957, the mine was closed once again, and the camp abandoned. For a few years Tempiute remained a ghost town, and only a few ranchers lived in Sand Springs Valley. But in 1968, Union Carbide leased a number of claims and did extensive drilling. Construction of a new mill to process ores from the old Koyen claims began in 1974. Production began in 1977, and hard rock miners, working underground with modern equipment blasted and hauled 1000 tons of tungsten ore per day from the old mining district. The new mill was constructed on the site of Ruth Wilkinson's tent school house.

It was these modern miners who brought their mobile homes to the subdivision in Sand Springs Valley. The seven school-age children in the camp of approximately seventy adults are bussed to Alamo. They will never know the dubious pleasures of attending classes in an old fashioned, one room, tent school like the one taught by Ruth Wilkinson. Coins dropped in the slot of a music machine at the local bar will never bring forth the glorious, hand-clapping sounds that once came from Eva Koyen's piano. But there are now many advantages in the valley.

Development was extended when an Idaho corporation purchased 3000 acres of farm land near the mining settlement. Many acres were planted, and power lines were installed during the past few months. On March 22, 1978, at 5:30 p.m. the whole town cheered when lines were energized, and electrical power was formally turned on. The residents of Tempiute Village formed a non-profit power company and held meetings dedicated to consideration of

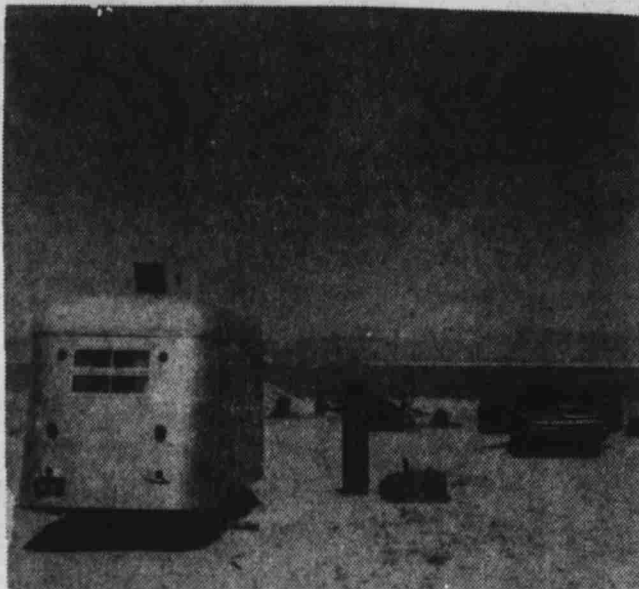

### Ruins of Freiburg

Ruins of Freiburg, an old silver-lead-zinc mining camp, lie on the northeast end of Mount Worthington, the tall peak that forms the northern boundary of the Sand Springs Valley and remains snow-clad for many months of the year. Huge caves have also been located in this area. And forty miles to the southwest, on Baldy Mountain, the historic Groom mine is still active. Artifacts of the gold seeking 49'er parties have been located in this area over the year. And it was at Groom that the author B.M. Bower lived with her husband. Her popular story, "The Voice of Johnny Waters," was written about incidents surrounding a mine and a spring in that area. The Sheahan family who owned the

### Primitive Standards

The residents of Rachel indeed live in an environment primitive by modern standards, but their lives scarcely compare to that of the family of Wesley Koyen, an Alamo prospector, who located sheelite tungsten at Tempiute, in a gulch which he named for his wife Eva in 1934. Here Eva and Wesley Koyen and their children lived in tents and rude shacks, while a milling operation was organized that brought other miners to the camp.

It was to this camp at Tempiute in 1940 that twenty-year-old Ruth Bradley came as a teacher for the seven children that were taught their letters in a tent school house. Before she married a miner named Russell Wilkinson, Ruth lived in a corner of the 14' x 16'

Jones, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. John Jones, the first baby born in the settlement, and delivered by her father in their trailer home.

A parade led by baby Rachel and her parents seated in a horse-drawn farm wagon, followed by speeches, games, and a ham and turkey buffet, entertained the many visitors. And much interest was expressed in this town that had its inception in 1975, when Union Carbide Corporation re-opened a tungsten mine in mountains that form the southeast boundary of Sand Springs Valley, 55 miles from Alamo, the nearest town.

Miners found the long drive to lodgings in Alamo too strenuous, and soon began seeking parking spaces for their mobile homes in the Sand Springs Valley that spreads out flat and beautiful toward the Nye County line. A rancher sub-divided a part of his ranch lands in the valley where water lies less than one hundred feet below the surface, and a trailer village was soon organized. A mobile home rental

community. As these pioneers passed the long, lonely months in their new desert homes without telephones, television, schools, or entertainment facilities, they used their free hours exploring the beautiful mountain ranges that encircle the valley. Cool fishing streams, enchanting hidden canyon, hunting grounds and the ruins of old mines and ghost towns were discovered in this remote area that has been settled at various times in the past and then abandoned as mines closed and inhabitants sought more populated areas.

Two miles southwest of the Union Carbide operation are the ruins of an silver-lead deposit known as the Old Tempiute Mine, located in the 1860's by silver prospectors. In this vicinity, too, treasure seekers have long sought the mysterious Lost Evans Mine said to be located in a large cavern that was once inhabited by prehistoric men. The ruins of the silver camp, Tybo, still remain near natural warm springs that burst from the

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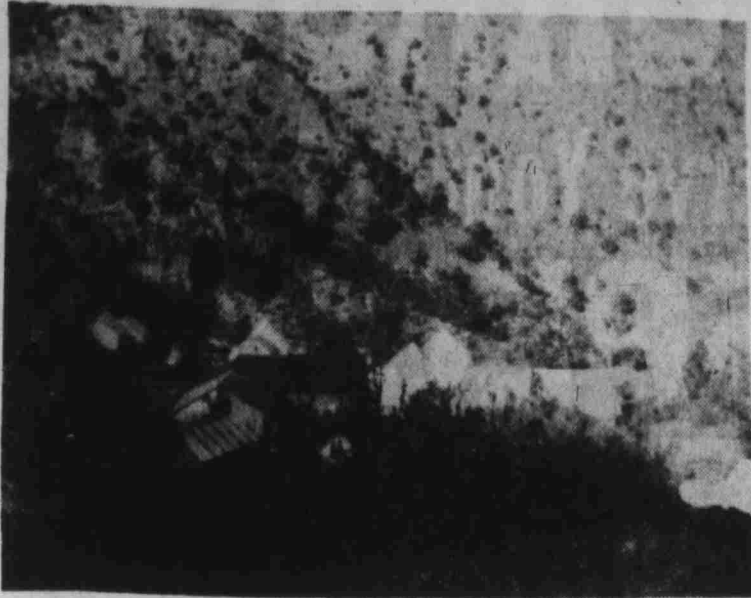

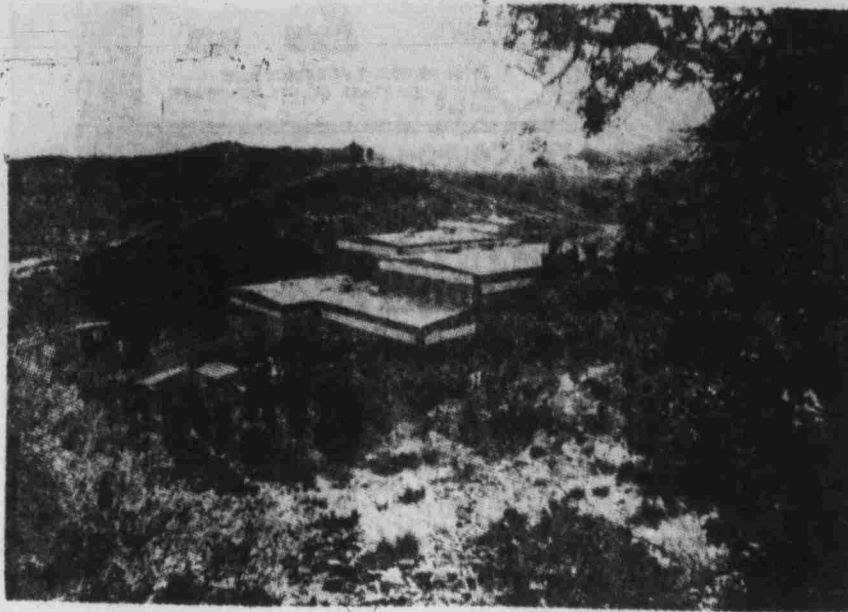

Tempiute tungsten mine in 1940, when Russell and Ruth Wilkinson, of Henderson, worked there.

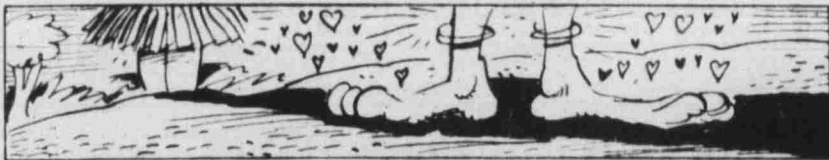

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# Community College To Have Summer Session

Looking for a change of pace? Sign up for a summer class with the Clark County Community College, Henderson program. This year we will offer some 20 classes during the first summer session May 30 to June 30.

Registration for courses listed below will be on May 23 and 24 from 2 to 8 p.m. at the Henderson Civic Center, Room 33 and at the Cheyenne Campus, 3200 E. Cheyenne Ave., N. Las Vegas on May 25 and 26.

Courses may be taken for credit or audited. Both fees are \$13 per credit - audit hour. It is not necessary to have obtained a high school diploma to enroll in Community College courses.

For additional information feel free to call the Henderson office at 565 - 6945.

The following are some brief descriptions of classes being offered.

### Accelerated Reading

The course offers the poor, inefficient reader the opportunity to increase his reading speed through the efficient use of his visual, functional and perceptual skills. The course stresses eye coordination and movement and strategies to achieve ease in reading.

### Speed Reading

A closed circuit, color television reading presentation, completely individualized. It explores the techniques for increasing reading speed. Increases of 100 percent or more can be gained. Prerequisite: For the average reader with a minimum 10th grade reading comprehension.

### Skimming and Scanning

A 30 lesson, 15 hour course teaches the student highspeed selective reading. Highly recommended for anyone doing extensive reading at the college level.

### Vocabulary

The students are tested and assigned to their work comprehension level. One credit is given for each proficiency level of completion.

### Spelling

Spelling instruction is tailored to the student. Patterns of English serve to correlate the sound of English to its spelling. Techniques to improve perception and word retention are employed. The study of spelling demons helps to rid spelling errors.

### Study Skills

The objective is to give the student a complete review of the essential study skills needed for the effective study of subject matter at all levels. Audio cassettes give step - by - step instruction for more meaningful individual instruction.

### Creative Writing

A course designed to give students writing experience, introduce them to salable types of writing, and sharpen their writing to commercially acceptable quality.

### Life Career Dev I

A course designed to give practical application to the process of career selection and development. Session will include values clarification, setting goals, exploring self, expanding options, overcoming barriers, using information, work effectively enhancing relation, planning and decision making.

### Composition and Rhetoric I

Study and practice in the writing of standard American English.

### Composition and Rhetoric II

A continuation and extension of Comp. & Rhetoric I with the addition of literature as a means to further training in composition. Special emphasis on the investigative paper.

### Fundamentals of Math

A basic course in arithmetic. Some topics

covered are fractions, decimals, measurement, percent, ratio, and the metric system. This course utilizes an audio-tutorial approach in a lab atmosphere with emphasis on individualized instruction.

### Intermediate Algebra

A second course in Algebra for students who have completed the equivalent of one year of elementary Algebra in high school.

### College Algebra

Designed for the liberal arts students as preparation for further study or to understand mathematical applications in other fields. Topics include the study of real numbers and their properties, relations, functions, linear, quadratic, logarithm and exponential, and polynomial functions, systems of equations and inequalities, metrics, sequences, series and probability.

### Filing

Study of basic alphabetic filing rules and correspondence filing procedures.

### Records Management

A study of alphabetic, numeric, geographic

and subject filing. Methods, procedures and systems of correspondence storage, retrieval and retention.

### General Psychology

A study of the principles of human behavior, including discussions of motivation, perception, learning and personality development.

### Macrame'

A course designed to introduce the basic knots and their application to functional and decorative Macrame' pieces. The projected number of pieces which may be completed by participants is 5 or 6.

### Beginning Ceramics

This course is intended to give an introduction to ceramics to the beginner. It will include the proper handling and cleaning of greenware in preparation for firing; basic ceramic techniques of glazing, underglazing and translucent and opaque staining on bisque; and the demonstration of casting molds and loading and firing the kiln.

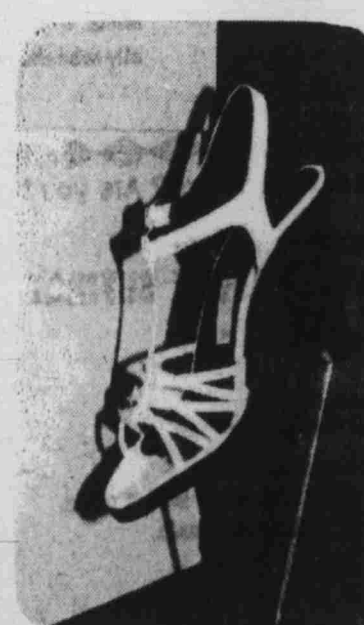

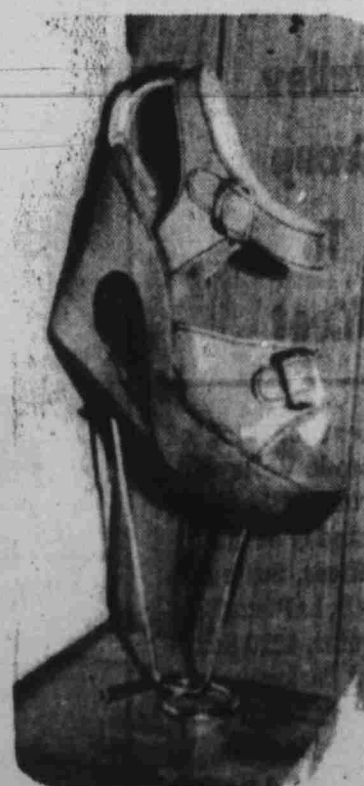

She sits quietly waiting with her master in Dianne's Pet Fancies, a pet shop owned and operated by Bruce and his wife, Dianne. Heller and Bruce are about to be photographed! Her intelligent canine eyes look soft and placid. It is almost hard to believe that with one word from her master, she would turn into a raging attack dog. "Heller has had a full and exciting life," Bruce informed us, "and this is to be her retirement. The remainder of her life will be spent in doing just as she pleases leading a playful and regular 'dog's' life!"

Heller has turned ten years old now. She walks with the grace of a true lady knowing inwardly that her life has been quite different from the average canine. She is the bearer of the 1972 "Lassie Gold Medal Award," a citation pre-

with articles written by her owner, Bruce Sessions. She was the first narcotics detector dog to be used by the U.S. Navy working the Ports of Entry in the USA. Bruce and Heller worked as a team. In many instances Naval Intelligence would wait for the arrival of Heller when they were "stumped" on a narcotics lead. "Heller would come through in most cases," Bruce mentioned. week hospital stay. "Even the Army could not believe a dog would return to work after receiving such serious injuries," Bruce stated.

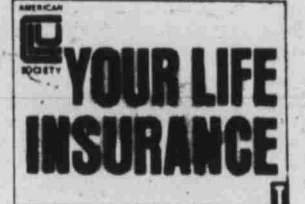

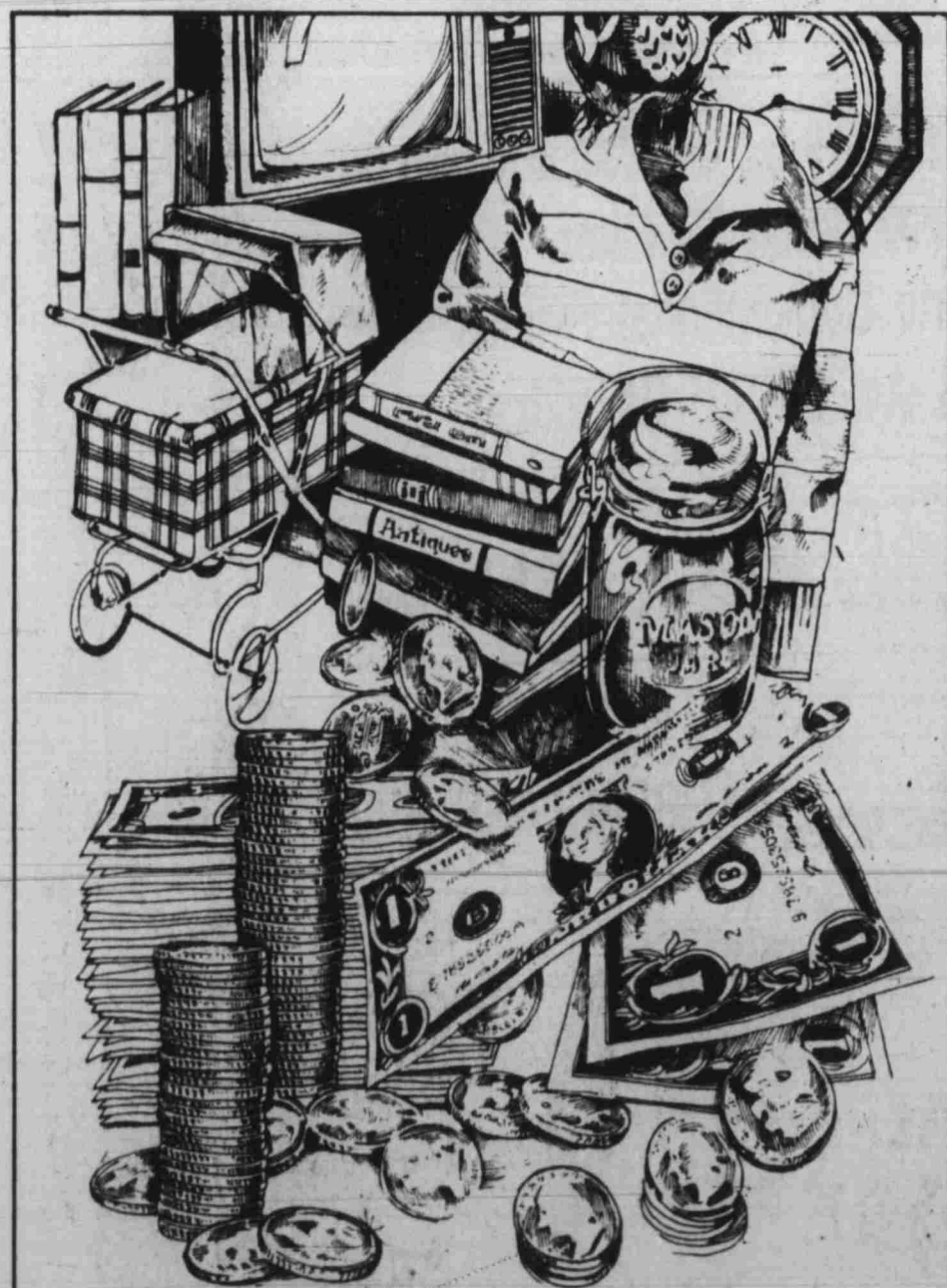

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### Solar Energy: What's In It For You?

Heat from the sun is free, but the equipment you need for using it isn't, and a lot of people are still in the dark about what's practical and what isn't. These questions and answers may help shed a little light.

**Q. Can I heat my whole house from the sun?**  
 A. Solar energy for whole-house heating is still in its infancy. Systems are available but they require a big investment. The equipment needed for widespread practical use is still a few years down the road.

**Q. Why should I heat just the water in my house?**  
 A. Solar water heating systems can be a practical way to save on fuel and fuel costs and these systems are available now.

**Q. What hardware do I need?**

A. Solar collectors (sky-light-like panels mounted on your roof or on a small platform beside the house) to absorb the sun's rays. At the proper angle, panels can even go on the side of the house, or on an outbuilding, as long as they face due south. You also need a medium for transferring the heat, a storage tank, interconnecting pipe and, in most cases an auxiliary heater. You can get equipment, including collector panels of aluminum that put a lot less strain on a roof because they weigh 67 pounds each instead of 200 for the Sun Set Solar Heating System made by the Rheem and Ruud divisions of City Investing. It works on a "cascade principle" of heat exchange, which transfers maximum heat into the solar storage tank by diffusing solar-heated fluid over the entire surface of the

tank. During operation, the system requires only two gallons of transfer fluid—water plus a corrosion inhibitor—instead of anti-freeze.

**Q. How do most solar water heaters work?**

A. Essential to any system is the collector, a glass or plastic-covered shallow box with an absorber plate of aluminum, copper or steel. As the sun's rays heat the absorber plate, liquid is pumped through the panel, absorbs the heat and carries it to your storage tank.

**Q. Can I really save money with a solar water heater?**

A. Yes, but even if you couldn't, solar heat makes ecological sense. Happily, it also makes economic sense. A good solar water heater costs about \$1,600 plus installation, fits into your existing system and provides 50 to 80 percent of the hot water needs of an average family.

## Topics for Taxpayers

### Taxpayers Urge Fiscal Responsibility

"The terrible burden of inflation which the people have suffered during recent years is becoming intolerable." Executives of state taxpayer associations comprising the National Taxpayers Conference are convinced that most of the responsibility for that inflation must be accepted by the federal government, and urge adoption of governmental policies that will reduce or eliminate this burden and insure the return of the economy to a productive cycle.

Specific decisions need to be made promptly by the Congress in order that the incipient recovery now being experienced may avoid disaster. Among those specifics are the following:

1. Abandonment of any effort to "roll back" the social security tax increases enacted in 1977.
2. Abandonment of any effort to fix prices at which goods and services may be sold in our economy.
3. Removal of federal dictation of the standards imposed on the states in the operation of welfare programs; and

at the same time release to the states of revenue sources which would allow states to fund a level of welfare programs suitable to their unique situations.

4. Enactment of measures that will encourage (rather than to discourage) the accumulation of capital resources for the expansion of job opportunities in productive enterprises.

5. Encourage the prompt development of energy resources throughout the country by reducing or eliminating the intrusion of government into market decisions bearing on the profitable development of badly-needed energy supplies within our country.

6. Abandonment of ef-

orts of government to dictate the conditions under which the people are allowed to inaugurate new enterprises and to expand those which are successful.

The conference is convinced that the principal deterrent to economic growth in America is the failure of the federal (and some state and local) governments to live within current income. We urged the President and the Congress to adopt and pursue as their primary goal, the achieving of a balanced federal budget within the next two fiscal years. Rejection of that goal (or even its deferral) constitutes a hazard from which our country may not be able to recover.

Sound Words From A Wise Lady

Muriel Humphrey, making the transition from wife of a great public servant to her new status as junior Senator from Minnesota, seems to be showing the same steady good sense that we've come to expect from her during the last thirty years.

Many people like the way she has settled quietly into her new position of responsibility. Furthermore, many like the way she avoids the temptation to speak out on every issue before the Senate—so that when she does, we owe it to ourselves to listen.

Senator Humphrey recently announced, for instance, that she is fully committed to passage of the Labor Law Reform Bill, which is scheduled to come before the Senate some time this year.

Muriel Humphrey suggests that it would be well for a lot of people to actually see what is in the bill (S. 2467). When they do, she predicts, "I certainly hope this important legislation will receive the overwhelming support of Congress and the nation." So do we.

Many agree with Senator Muriel Humphrey and hope the Senator will act quickly and wisely to pass the Labor Law Reform Bill. These people seem to be in good company, along with Secretary of Labor Marshall and seven of his predecessors; a number of experts in labor-management relations; and a very large group of civic, women's and minority organizations. They can't all be wrong!

A number of lobbying organizations have been attacking that bill. They claim it would upset the balance between labor and management in this country. Some of the opponents of the bill get very exercised about that bill, and suggest that it would somehow lead to a 'labor dictatorship' over all the rest of us.

Nonsense, says the Senator from Minnesota. She offers a welcome, clear-headed contrast to all that oratory. She says frankly that "during the brief period that I have served as a Senator, I have been concerned over the exaggeration and distortion regarding this bill that has been

## Creeping Orange Invades The Desert

Ranger, what is all the orange stuff on the desert plants? This is the most common question asked by visitors to the Alan Bible Visitor Center during the last month. The orange plant is a parasite called Dodder that is usually found growing on Burro Bush. Dodder has also been seen attacking Creosote Bush and several other desert plants. This parasite belongs to the genus CUSCUTA and is a close relative of the Morning Glory. Although related to the Morning Glory, Dodder behaves more like mistletoe.

Dodder is mostly seen this time of year as a dense tangle of orange or sometimes yellow strands interwoven through the host plant. The parasite begins life as a small brown seed in the soil. After germination, tendrils develop and shoot skyward to attempt contact with a host plant. The tendril, if successful, will twine itself about the host many times to secure itself. If unsuccessful in locating a host plant, it will use

up the reserve food supply in the seed and die.

After contact is made, the parasite will inset a haustoria into the host and begin to absorb its food and water. Haustoria are absorbing organs of the Dodder created exclusively to siphon off nutrients. As the Dodder grows, feeds and envelops its host, the root section of the parasite soon disappears and severs all connections with the soil. It is then free to inject more haustoria and parasitize several hosts at once.

After establishing itself, Dodder will produce many minute flowers in clusters on the stems. From this many seeds are formed. The seeds may be fully viable in the soil for up to five years, waiting for just the right set of circumstances. This has been one of those years.

Dodder can be controlled by hand pulling before seeds are produced, or cut away infected portions of the host plant. Dodder can kill the host if infestation becomes heavy.

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Nevada Historical Society's "This Was Nevada" Series  
**Nevada's Fables, Fabrications And Frauds**

In pioneer Nevada, when all else failed, newspaper editors fell back on some of the better lies told by the local residents. It was an age of exaggeration and optimism that expressed its spirit in the highly

improbable, but hilarious, tall tales that were the ultimate in humor on the frontier. In an election year almost a century ago, the Tuscarora Times - Review accused the Carson City Appeal of supplying campaign oratory to political can-

didates:

"The Carson Appeal, which furnished candidates with campaign lies by the wholesale lot before election has a lot left over, which it advertises as follows: A lot of hand-sewn campaign lies, copper-riveted and made of the best seasoned material, left over from the recent political contest, will be sold cheap for cash at this office. These lies will resist the nailing process, and are warranted to knock a candidate's political support from four to nine hundred. Imitation lots are being offered for sale in the eastern counties, of which the public are cautioned to beware. None genuine unless the brand of this office is stamped on the edge of the goods. Also small jobbing lots of snake and duck stories available for small country weeklies. Apply on the premises."

In Eureka, the Sentinel's editor saw fit to print:

"Mrs. Van Auken was startled one day by the sight of a large rattlesnake making its appear-

ance in her kitchen where she was at work, and seizing her by the skirt tried to pull her toward the door. Woman's curiosity at last overcoming her fear, she followed the snake down to the lake, where she was still more horrified to find her little daughter on the point of drowning. Seeing the little one fall into the water it seems that the snake, with astonishing instinct, crawled to the house to give warning (Editor's note: The author of that yarn should be made an Indian Agent at once.)"

Not wanting to be beaten at the game, the editor of the White Pine News reported that a local prospector swore that the following was true:

"Bill Nuckolls, a prospector, fell down a prospect shaft forty feet deep, right into a nest of blacksnakes. Most men would have died of fright, but Nuckolls was not that sort of man. He tied several snakes together and started them up the side of the shaft, tying a fresh snake as

fast as the rest wriggled up. Pretty soon the head of the snakes got over the edge and started downhill. Nuckolls kept tying on fresh reptiles until he had used up a couple of hundred, every snake there was in the shaft. By this time the crowd of snakes on the outside was strong enough to pull him out of the shaft and he soon reached Mead's ranch, safe and sound."

The Chinese were always a source of amusement to the pioneer. The Oriental's attempts to master European tools of mining technology was frequently good for a laugh. The Carson Appeal is the source for the following "windy."

"Chinese teamsters have made their appearance in Winnemucca, but when their horses get balky, they have to hire an American blasphemer to throw the necessary cuss words at the head of the beasts. They now have a proficient swearer on a regular salary whose work gives the best of satisfaction. If the business increases there will be plenty of work for good, reliable swearers at \$80 per month. Persons applying for the

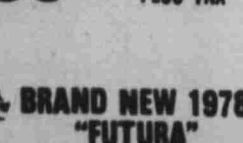

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# The Wizard of Words

**Amorphous, Ambiguous**  
 If today's column turns out to be amorphous (a more fuss) or ambiguous (m big you us), it's due to the nature of the words under discussion. Amorphous means having no definite form; lacking in definite shape; unorganized. Ambiguous, on the other hand, means something that is unclear, or open to various interpretations, lacking definite meaning. Amorphous and ambiguous are octaves of each other, with amorphous referring to a more organic shapelessness, and am-

biguous referring to a conceptual shapelessness. If we take some jello, not quite hardened, and plop it out on the table, the resulting mass is amorphous. Clouds of smog oozing across the sky are described as amorphous. Grease spots on the driveway are normally amorphous. Amorphous means something (or someone) without definite shape, or form. Ambiguous, on the other hand, can refer to something which has a definite shape, but the meaning of that shape, or form is unclear. A

good percentage of modern art and poetry is ambiguous. The form and structure may be definite, but the meaning is uncertain, or can be taken in several different ways. It's ambiguous. Politicians and generals are adept at making definite, precise statements which are nevertheless ambiguous. "Forward moving defense" is an example of a recent ambiguous statement by one of our generals. "Reserved optimism tempered with practical caution" was a recent ambiguous prediction of our future economic condition.

Ambiguous comes from the Latin word ambigere. Ambi means "around" and agere means "drive." Someone who is ambiguous "drives around," or wanders around his subject without ever arriving at precise definition, clear expression. Herbert Hoover's domestic policies might be described as ambiguous - wandering around without arriving at a definite framework -- or they might be described as amorphous, lacking definite shape or form. A blob of jello, on the other hand, can hardly be described as ambiguous; much better described as amorphous.

Because of overeating and lack of exercise, a lady's figure might become amorphous - lacking definite shape, precise form. Because of over-thinking and lack of insight, a man's speech becomes ambiguous - lacking definite meaning, precise description.

To precisely delineate the difference between amorphous and ambiguous (and perhaps give a concluding example) we might say that amorphous is "organic amiguity" whereas ambiguous is "amorphous conceptuality." (How much more definite, precise and clear can I get?)

### Women and Herbs

The magic and mystery tied up in herbs goes back at least as far as Homer's day. It wasn't merely a chant or a twitch of the nose that gave goddesses power over particular humans; a magic potion here and there at least added to the effect of the goddesses' power. And in medieval history there are endless stories of witches and their potent brew, love charms and magic potions. But, on a more practical level, it was women, for the most part, who were responsible for the con-

tinuance of herb production in an era when science and industry caused the rational man to scoff the once believed magical effects and healing powers of herbs. With the advent of the Industrial Revolution came a society of thinkers that based its production on logic, observation and fact. Medieval apothecaries dissolved in the wake of modern, scientific equipment and date; and industries squatted upon the land that had previously been so profitably used for herb agriculture.

When World War I hit

and the new pharmacies were without necessary medicinal ingredients, a group of English housewives formed an herb growers association in an effort to grow new herbs and collect already available herbs needed for drugs to help ailing soldiers. Eventually, encouraged by the government, the National Federation of Women's Institutes was

born out of this herb gathering effort, spreading throughout Britain in some 6,000 branches. The federation brought to light man's need for herbs even in modern society. Similar successive groups were formed during and after World War II. Their goal: to make sure herbs would always be available to man's needs in the future.

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

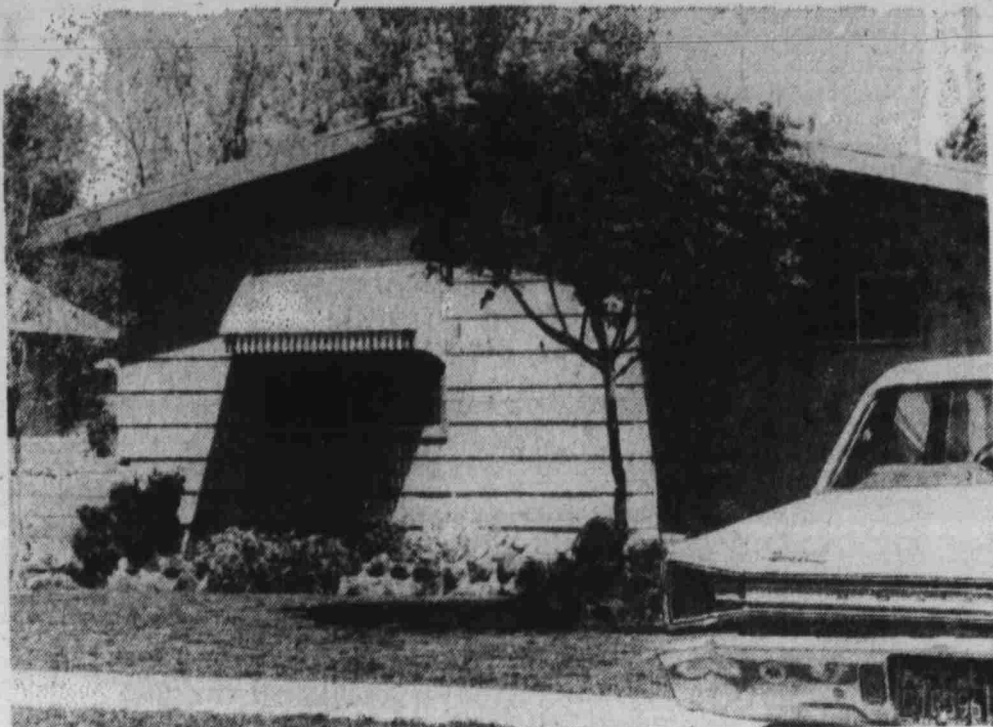

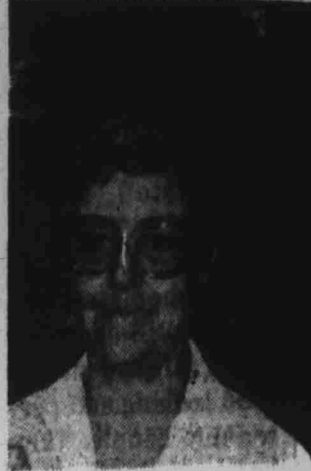

Mopeds are increasingly popular -- and any vehicle that gets 180 miles to the gallon is going to become more popular than ever as gas prices go up. The little motor - assisted bikes cost \$200 to \$600.

The definition of a moped states that the motor has a maximum piston displacement less than 50 cc, rated at two brake horsepower or less, and is capable of a maximum speed of less than 30 MPH. Anything more powerful is a motorcycle, and must be licensed and insured as such.

Many states have restricted mopeds to certain roads and limited speeds. Check each locality before you ride.

Before you travel on your moped, be sure you know how to ride it well. Never ride on major roads where the traffic is going faster than you are. Wear a helmet, drive defensively, and use color and lights to make yourself conspicuous.

Your moped must be insured on its own auto policy, with adequate liability coverage. (There is limited liability coverage for the moped in your home-owners policy -- limited to your own backyard, that is, not public streets.)
