In 1975 she was selected as Beta Sigma Phi's Woman of the Year for her past and present service to Girl Scouting, Clark County Child Welfare Board, Citizens' Advisory

Request For Funds For Pittman Made

An application for a three-year grant from the Department of Housing and Urban Development for a grand total of \$777,900 to develop the Pittman area was approved by the city council Monday night.

The money will be used to control flooding conditions, install new streets, curbs, gutters and street lights in the Pittman area, along with the construction of restroom facilities at Wells Park.

The development of this proposal reflects the highest priority established by the local citizens who were personally consulted on three occasions at meetings held at the Pittman Women's Club.

It was pointed out that the money being applied for is in competition with other cities. Initial notification about the results from HUD will come in July.

The first increment would be the paving of Merlayne Drive, Moser Drive, Price Street, Evelyn Ave. and Foster Ave. The Park restrooms would also be constructed. The total for the first increment would be \$164,900.

Public hearings were held in the Pittman area by the city council in conformance with HUD requirements.

Street Vacation Provides For New Eldorado Hotel

The threat of a possible lawsuit didn't appear to intimidate the City Council Monday night as they voted 4-1 to approve the Market Street vacation - a controversial issue that has been growing hotter over a period of weeks.

Although Monday's action was just a recommendation, final approval is expected to be given at the next regular council meeting May 15.

The lone dissenting vote to the vacation came from Councilman Carlton Lawrence who said that he had requested the issue be deferred to committee as he was concerned about the "traffic pattern."

"There doesn't appear to have been any definitive progress on the parking problems downtown ... I'm no further along now than I was then," he said, calling the action "premature."

"I've made everyone else mad," he added. "I might as well make the Boyds mad, too."

The street vacation request from the Eldorado Club will pave the way for a badly needed 100 room hotel and parking garage in the downtown area.

Bill Boyd, part owner of the Eldorado Club, has said they will break ground on the \$2 million project within weeks while the Rainbow Club's at-

torney, George Rudiak, has said they will most certainly file a suit against the city.

The Rainbow Club owners have held firmly, since the controversy first began to rage, that the vacating will hinder access to their property and hurt their business.

In making the motion for approval, Councilman Gary Price added several stipulations: that the Eldorado post bond guaranteeing completion of construction of the hotel and garage within a given period of time, that a section of the parking area be non-validated, that an 8' to 10' walkway along the vacated street be deeded to the city and be kept open to the city and that the Eldorado pay full value of the property vacated.

Other conditions include agreeing to pay any and all compensation ordered by the court to be paid to the city for all legal fees incurred in defending the vacation including the hiring of independent legal counsel; and that no parking spaces be taken away until the same number of spaces can be provided elsewhere.

After consideration Boyd said they were conditions they could "live with."

Burrows - Smith Named City's Financial Adviser

Burrows Smith and Co. of Salt Lake City was selected by the city council as financial advisers for the city in its proposal for \$38 million worth of improvements over the next five years.

Also considered for the financial position was the Denver, Colo. firm of Boettcher and Co.

Hal Smith, a former Nevada Assemblyman and resident of Henderson, represented the Burrows Smith firm. He said his firm is the only Nevada firm that has had 50 years experience in representing Nevada Municipalities.

"We've never had a serious default," Smith said. "Whatever form of securities and improvements you need, we can put a financial package together to meet your needs."

Stephen McConahey represented the Boettcher company. He emphasized that his company specializes in new innovations. He said that Henderson has a challenge and his company can meet that challenge.

The capital improvement program includes water projects, sewer improvements, storm drain projects, heavy equipment purchase, fire and police projects and parks department projects.

The city is currently \$2.9 million in debt and spends 14 cents of every \$1.33 it gets from taxes on paying debts. If the city were to float the necessary bonds to pay for the capital improvement plan it would spend about 25 cents per \$1.33 on debts. The preliminary plan was approved by the city council with the stipulation that the capital improvement plan would be subject to annual review and updating.

In making a motion to accept Burrows Smith, Councilman Gary Price said, "We need someone that's here." Councilman Carlton Lawrence said he thought it might be well to try a new fiscal agent with new ideas and possibly far-reaching connections.

Councilwoman Lorna Kesterson asked City Manager Bob Campbell his opinion.

Campbell said the city could be comfortable with either firm, but on the basis of fees, Burrows Smith offered the most attractive fee.

Lawrence said it was his understanding that the fees were comparable.

Campbell said that on the basis of information received that day there was an approximate 30 per cent difference. Approval was unanimous.

Land Bank Request Denied

A multi-million dollar corporation which was interested in building a \$3 million major hotel complex, complete with show room banquet facilities, shops, restaurants, etc., will apparently have to look for another location after the City Council Monday night could not agree unanimously to bring the acreage the corporation desires out of the land bank for public bid.

The property in question, 40 acres in Section 21 and the highway frontage immediately adjacent to the parcel on Boulder Highway and Horizon Drive, is owned by the city of Henderson and, according to land bank procedures, the council must unanimously approve bringing city owned property out of the land bank before it can be placed for public bid.

Councilmen Phil Stout and Carlton Lawrence were opposed to offering the land for sale while Mayor Lorin Williams and Councilmen Gary Price and Lorna Kesterson favored the action.

Former City Manager Don Dawson, acting as agent for the corporation which for the present wished to remain

anonymous, made the request for the property to be placed for bid.

"This would only be the beginning," Dawson told the council. "Once a major hotel builds in an area it is a drawing card to all communities."

Dawson explained that there are 330 rooms available in Boulder City and 106 in Henderson and while the Boyd's proposed new hotel will add an additional 100 rooms, for a city like Henderson with a population of around 20,000, more rooms are still badly needed.

"It was the intent of the Federal Government to sell the land and get development," he continued. "We have development ... homes ... but not commercial".

It was pointed out that should the council not choose to accept the bids received for the property it should always be put back into the land bank.

Lawrence, in giving his reasons for denying the request, said "This is entirely too nebulous."

Since the decision was just a recommendation by the council, final action will be taken at the next regular Council meeting.

12-Year-Old Charged With Car Theft After Chase

A 12-year-old Las Vegas youth, suspected of stealing a three-quarter ton pickup near Chaparral high school, ended up in custody of juvenile authorities after metro officers pursued him at high speeds through Las Vegas to Henderson.

According to Captain Jim Goff of the Henderson police department, the youth was forced to stop by Lt. John Conner of Metro as he attempted a sharp turn at the intersection of Kansas and Basic streets in Henderson. Conner said he deliberately struck the side of the pickup as it spun and pushed it into the curb where it struck the telephone pole.

Goff said the vehicle had a

flat tire at Nellis Boulevard and the youth continued to drive the car at a high rate of speed. The rim came apart at Texas and Boulder Highway.

The boy was described as small for his age. His size contributed to the wildness of his driving because he was not fully capable of handling the large pickup truck, police said.

The youth was taken to juvenile hall, charged with car theft and a series of traffic violations including reckless driving and failing to stop for police. The pickup truck he was driving was a stolen 1976 three-quarter ton Ford that was reported stolen from Courtesy motors on Boulder Highway.

The City of Henderson is in the process of completing an engineering study for improved wastewater treatment facilities. Sizing the facilities so that they will have adequate capacity to treat wastewaters for a designated period is one of the basic tasks that must be accomplished. The size of the facilities selected depends upon the size of the population that is expected to be served. A decision must be made now with regard to the size of the population to be planned for.

Citizen input is desired relative to determining public attitudes about what is an acceptable rate of population increase over the next 20 years. Recently, two population forecasts were completed for Henderson. The first forecast estimates that Henderson will have 81,000 people by the year 2000 and the second that Henderson will have 148,000. Both estimates include the rapidly developing Green Valley area. The current population is estimated at 22,000.

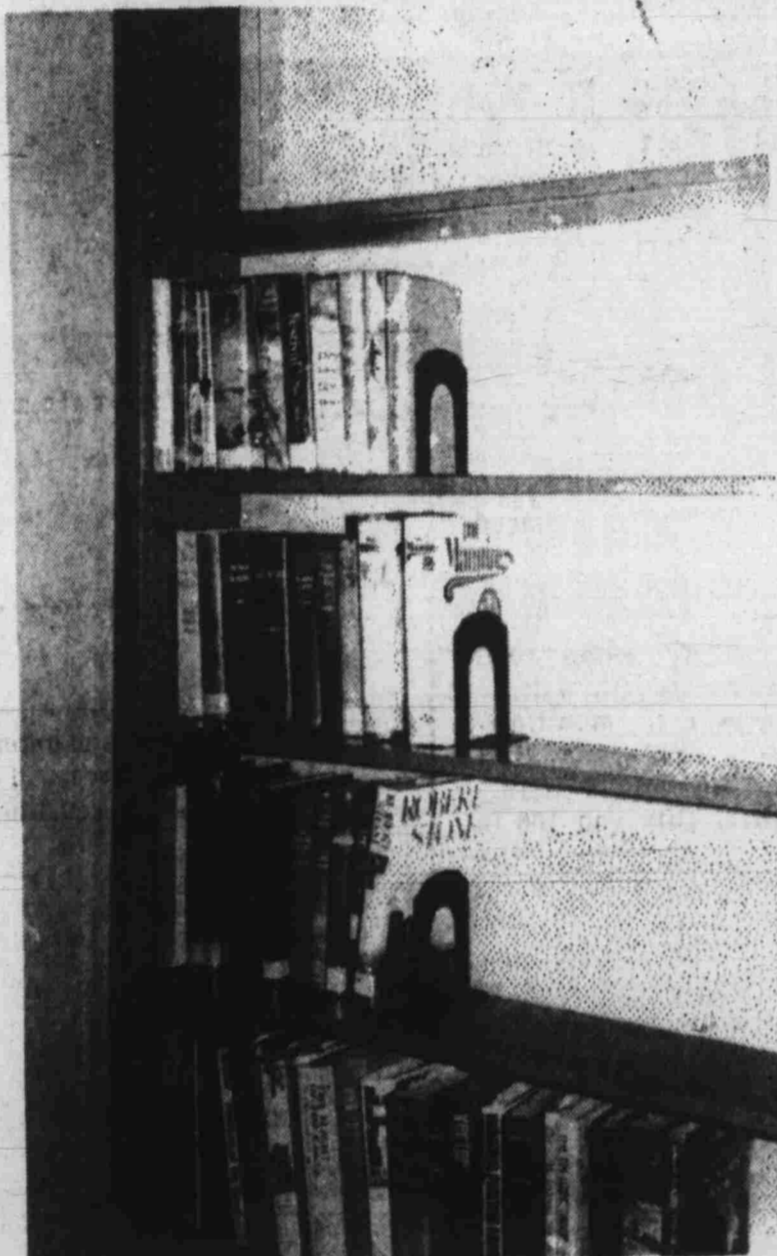
There are different consequences associated with varying growth rates. Both forecasts indicate major growth in Henderson and hence the need to expand services, such as, water and sewer, roads, schools, recreation, police, fire and medical. The differences between forecasts relate to the rate at which Henderson will have to expand services, undergo changes in community life style, and incur indebtedness.

Chamber Critical Of County 208 Plan

The Board of Directors of the Henderson Chamber of Commerce, the week before last, held two special meetings on the proposed 208 Waste Water Management Plan. One of the meetings was with city officials to discuss the far reaching effects of the recent plan. The 208 Federal Water Pollution Control Act required that the Governor designate a management agency to implement an area waste treatment plan.

The Governor appointed the Board of County Commissioners as that Management Agency. A time span of two years was allotted to the county to study and development of a 208 plan. The county began the project in June of 1976. It took them some 16 months, to study and identify the problems concerning water quality for Clark County. From October, 1977 to April 1978, they published the recommendable plan. However, the most crucial and final part of the study was not released until last month. It totally broadened the Water Quality Plan to include: Land use, housing, transportation, air quality, solid waste, flood control, energy, noise, etc.

This would give the County final authority over Henderson as well as the other cities in such matters as where shopping centers would be built, or playgrounds, or how often our streets are to be swept, or what type of landscaping we will be allowed to use. Totally because they all have an effect on ground water runoff or sewage.

The Board of Directors of the Henderson Chamber of Commerce felt that this responsibility should be placed with a regional Board of Environmental Management. The Board should consist of elected representatives from Boulder City, Henderson, Las Vegas, North Las Vegas, and the County. It was decided by the Chamber Board that this would guarantee the people of all entities a hand in the planning of their environmental affairs. The Board drafted a resolution to that effect and copies of the resolution were sent to:

Governor Mike O'Callaghan, Thalia Dondero, Chairman County Commissioners; Commissioner Robert Broadbent, Las Vegas Chamber of Commerce, North Las Vegas Chamber of Commerce, Boulder City Chamber of Commerce, City of Las Vegas, City of North Las Vegas, City of Boulder City, City of Henderson.

After discussing with the Governor, Senator Jim Gibson, Commissioner Broadbent and others it was clear that under Nevada State Statutes 244.9222, 244.9262, and 244.9263, the County was given the responsibility over an area wide waste management plan for all four cities. It is planned to amend the state statutes at this coming legislative session to allow the establishment of management board made up of elected representatives of the four cities and the county to be the management agency for Clark County. We predict that there will be infighting over the make up of the management Board as the Chamber will not stand still for any thing short of fair representation for Henderson.

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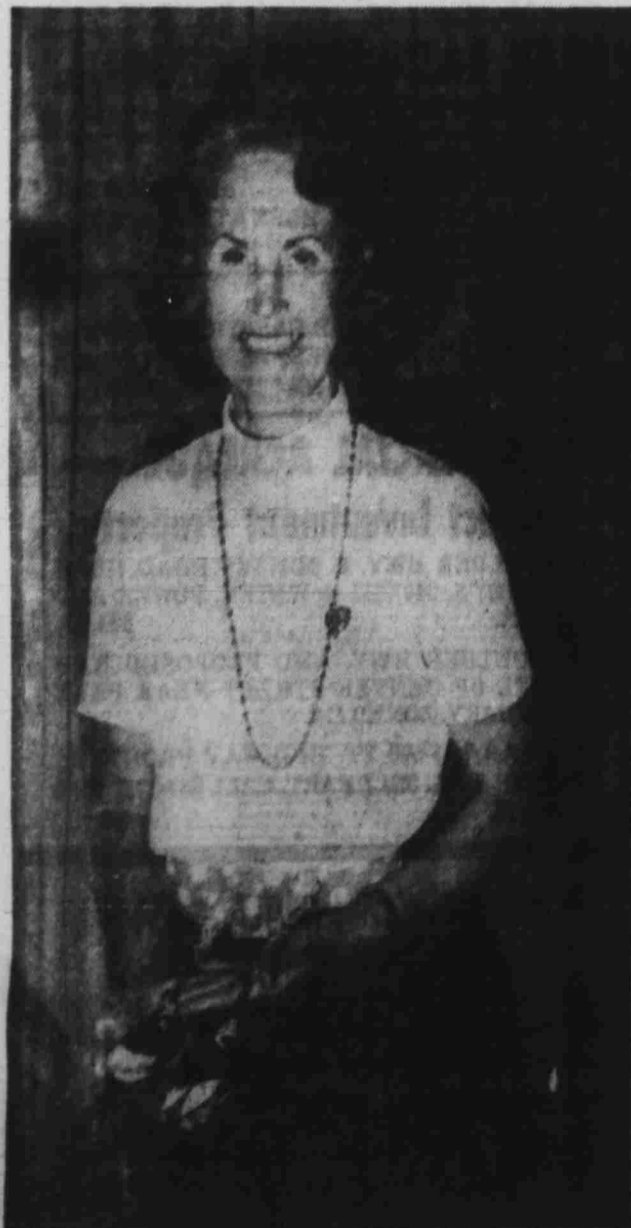

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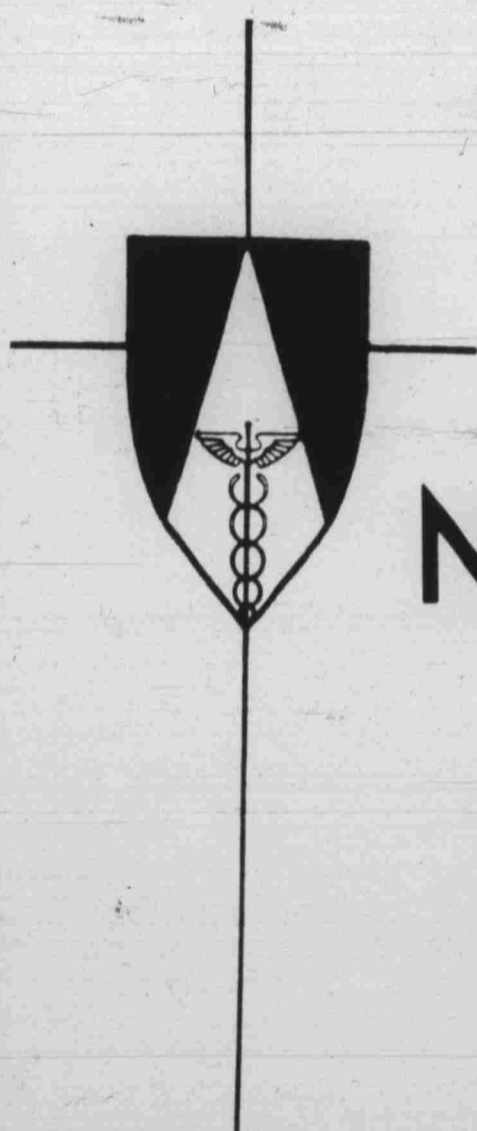
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Marines Stop Germans At Les Mares Farm - Fred Rinker Was There

June of 1978 marks the 60th anniversary of the Battle of Belleau Woods, a battle which has been credited with keeping the Germans from entering Paris back in 1918.

"There are probably only about a dozen Marines veterans of that conflict left," Fred Rinker, who is himself a survivor of the battle, commented.

He can still name several who are alive and where they are living such as General Shepherd in La Jolla, Calif., another in Chicago Heights, one in New Mexico.

Rinker, a native of Indiana, enlisted in the Marines when he was 16, giving his age as 18.

"The Fifth Marines Regiment was organized in February," Rinker re-

called. "I was in Cuba then and they sent a ship around to round us up. We had 92 men to start with and built this up to 200 men when we got back to the states."

Rinker's Marine unit was the only one to serve in World War I with the infantry.

The story of the battle goes something like this: On June 1, 1918, the 55th Company received orders, with the rest of the Second Battalion, Fifth Regiment, which was bivouacked near Pyramides Ferme, to proceed through Marigny and take up a position about one and one half kilometers northeast of the town.

They stated that the French, a few kilometers ahead, were slowly falling to the rear, and directed the Second Battalion to form a line of resistance which was to be held until the last.

"The French were really frantic," Rinker recalled. "The Germans were advancing a kilometer a day and if they weren't stopped, they'd be in Paris."

"We'd never been in a battle before," he continued. "We'd had training in trenches but we'd never been in a battle. We really had no hopes of defeating them, just hoped to slow the Germans down for a few days."

Rinker continued to explain that "we were spread in one single line across the fields with no reinforcements. We had no machine guns to speak of... just a gun called a chau chau which

didn't work half of the time."

The Marines dug in along the line they had taken up and placed their automatic rifles in the most effective positions. On the right the 55th Company was connected with the 51st Company, but on its left there was a gap of some five hundred yards between the farm and the edge of Bois de Veuilly where the 43rd Company was, and, as the company front was so large, no men could be spared to fill this gap. That night the shelling around Les Mares Farm was quite heavy, but there was no infantry action.

On June 3 the 55th Company was under a heavy shell fire all the morning by the German

guns. That evening the barrage increased and the Germans attacked in a very open formation, preceded by scouts. An outpost of some ten Marines opened on them and a little later the left of the line became engaged.

The Germans set machine guns up in the woods opposite the outpost and worked around to its right. Their machine gun fire became quite intense, several casualties occurring, so the outpost fell back to its place in the American line.

It is believed that a number of German casualties resulted and that the fire of the Marines surprised and confused them.

Meanwhile, a strong attack was being made on the Les Mares Farm. The Marines had no machine guns to aid them, but their rifle fire was exceptionally fine, each man aiming coolly and deliberately and not a German got closer than a hundred yards of the line.

Fighting continued during the fourth day and all was quiet that night. It is believed that the enemy withdrew from the immediate front of the 55th Company.

Nothing important occurred during June 5 and the 55th Company was relieved that night by the French, and proceeded to a support position for the attack the following day.

That little stand at Les Mares Farm, seemingly then but an unimportant

part of the larger operation which frustrated the Germans in their last effort to gain Paris, has now taken its place in history as an important incident.

Rinkers said he didn't think he was ever really scared.

"Remember, I was under 18 and if I had been afraid I could have gone to my lieutenant or captain and told them my real age... they suspected I was under age... and I'd have been on my way home right then."

"I never gave death a thought," the 77 year old Rinker said. "The majority of the Company were under 21 and we all shared the feeling that (death) it's not going to happen to me."

General John J. Pershing called the Battle of Belleau Woods "The Gettysburg of the War. For the United States, the biggest battle since Appomattox and of the greatest magnitude of any engagement that American troops had ever had with a foreign enemy. Not in the Revolution, the Mexican War or the Spanish conflict had as many soldiers participated in a single engagement."

Rinker went on to fight in other combats before the Armistice was signed, putting an end to World War I, the war, believed by those who fought, to be the war to

end all wars.

In World War II he re-enlisted and served in the Philippines and New Guinea. While in the service of his country he won the Silver Star, the third highest United States medal awarded, fifteen other medals

plus numerous citations, all of which are framed and hang proudly on the walls of the Rinker living room.

The name Belleau Woods was later changed by the French Government to "Bois de la Brigade de Marines" and the ground deemed

to the United States.

Today a monument stands on the historic spot, bought by thousands of Marines and former Marines, in tribute to the battle and those who died keeping the Germans from entering Paris in 1918.

Henderson - Its Economic History -

by Maryellen Vallier Sadovich

Maryellen Vallier Sadovich, a noted Nevada historian, and a Henderson resident since 1954, treated our readers with a most unique bicentennial series during 1976. This year, she has researched the local newspaper files and the archives of Henderson's City Hall, the Chamber of Commerce, and BMI, to produce an economic history of Henderson from the first day of incorporation to the present.

The first week of the New Year, 1967, brought news from Senator Bible announcing that \$500,000 had been released to the Bureau of Reclamation to finance an immediate start for pre-construction planning on the Southern Nevada Water Supply Project.

"This is the green light we have been looking for," the Senator said. "I'm pleased the Administration recognized the importance of this project in deciding which appropriations would be used and which would be withheld."

While the preliminary action on the SNWSP continued slowly with the federal appropriation, the Henderson Council heard recommendations from the finance specialist, Milton Weiss, who had been retained by the city as a Financial Consultant to make a financial Methods Analysis investigation for Henderson.

The purpose of the investigation was to ascertain whether or not accounting and financial procedures used by the City could be improved, whether or not all possible sources of revenue had been utilized, and where additional financing could be obtained.

The opening statement of Weiss's report

was significant. "Additional revenue must be brought into the City Treasury."

To accomplish this goal, Weiss suggested that "Revenue must come from sources other than tax dollars inasmuch as our tax share will probably be lowered due to increased School District demands."

Methods of introducing money into the city treasury were also suggested by Weiss:

A. INCREASE IN WATER AND SEWER RATES: Although he was certain this was not a popular idea, Weiss was adamant in his suggestion that water and sewer rates should be elevated. He also suggested that the money accumulated from such increases not be used for salaries, beautification, etc. "It should be used for the necessities involved in operating expenses, and refurbishing of underground water supply," he said.

Weiss also recommended establishment of a "sinking fund" providing for a 10 percent reserve of all profits or surplus to be held in a Reserve Fund for replacement costs for water and sewer systems.

However, under the Charter, all revenue from the utility operation of the City is placed in the General Fund and

used for operation of the City's Services. Establishment of a Reserve Fund as suggested by Weiss would require a Charter change, so the matter would be delayed for a time.

B. SALE OF MUNICIPAL BONDS AND EMERGENCY LOANS: To introduce this method of obtaining funds for the city, Weiss suggested that the City would be in a better position if it were to take advantage of the Municipal Bond Market. "The Debt Service of the cities pre-empts any other need in the division of the tax dollar," he said. "and, when a city has no Debt Service to satisfy, their share of the tax money is reduced. Therefore, buying equipment, improvements, etc., on a time payment policy is beneficial in that the growth of the community helps pay the cost, and we are able to provide money to use when needed, and our share of the tax dol-

lar is greater." At the same time, Weiss suggested that Federal Grants would provide additional revenue. However, as most programs operate on a matching fund basis, they would be out of reach to Henderson since the city, in 1967 had no funds available to match the federal funds.

When the Council met on January 11, they unanimously concurred that the City Charter be changed to raise the city debt limit from 10 percent to at least 25 or 30 percent, which would allow the city a wider margin in which to work due to the low assessed evaluation in the City.

"It was felt that to get the growth the City needs it will have to have a certain amount of bonded indebtedness," is the way the action was described in the "Minutes of the Henderson City Council" for January 11, 1967.

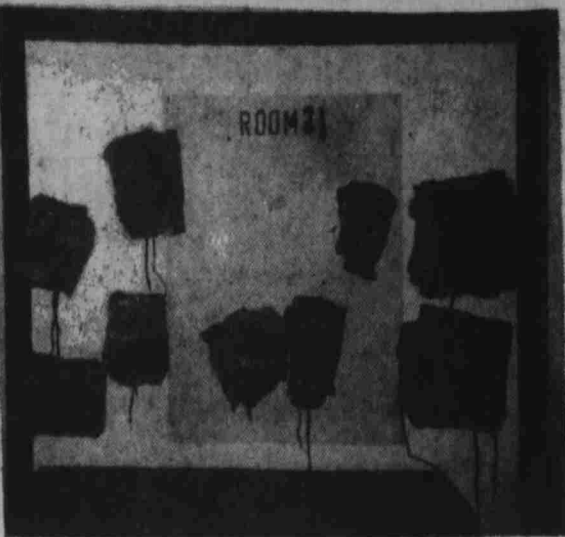

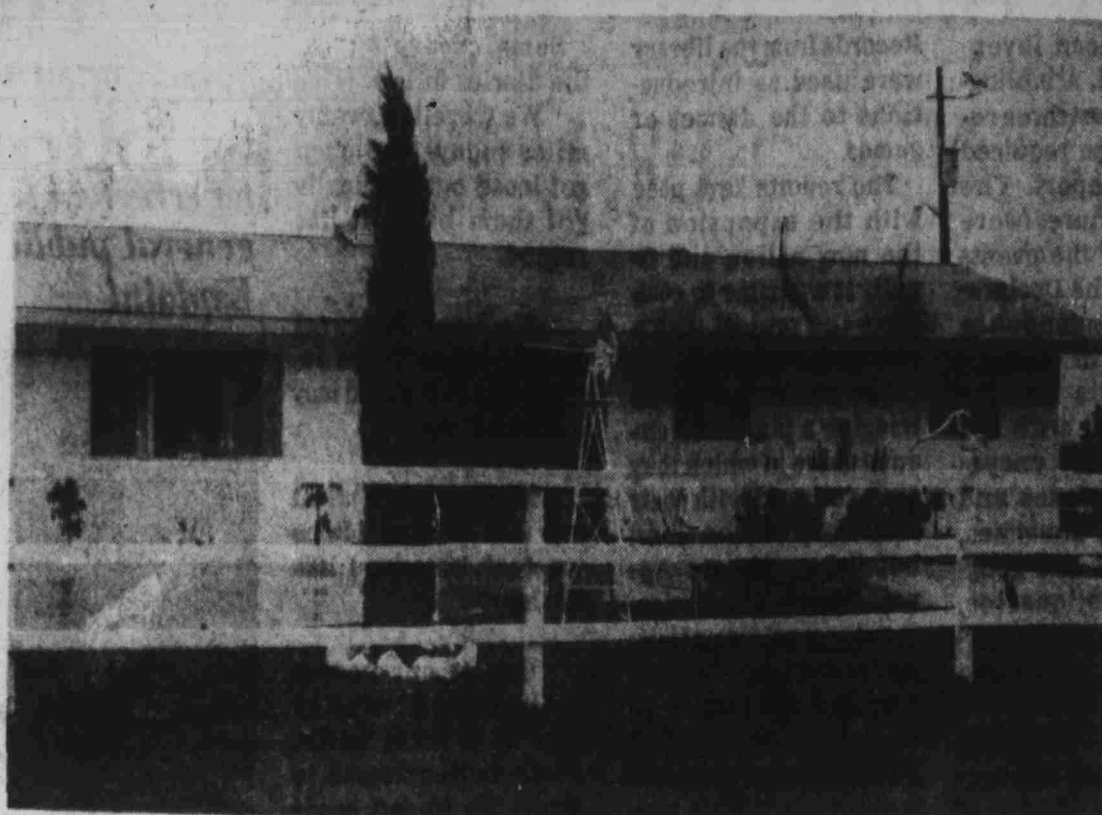
windmill, hanging lamp old-fashioned ice tongs (Chuck fashioned and made), and an old pump from a Nebraska farm.

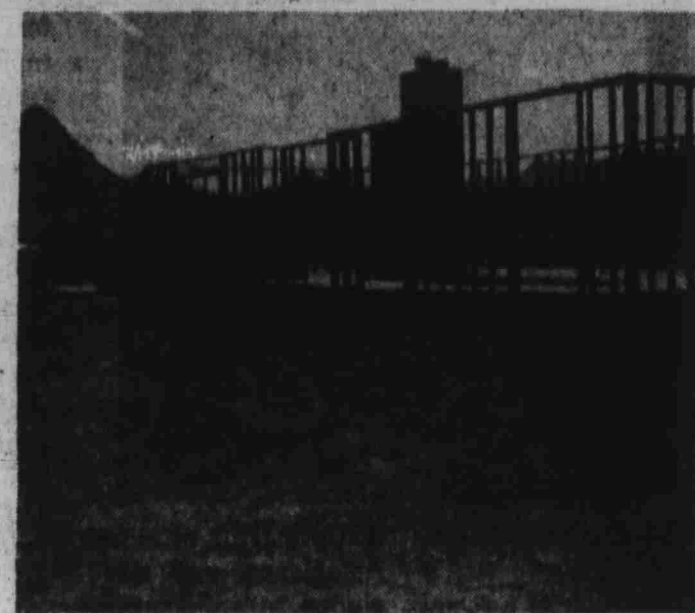

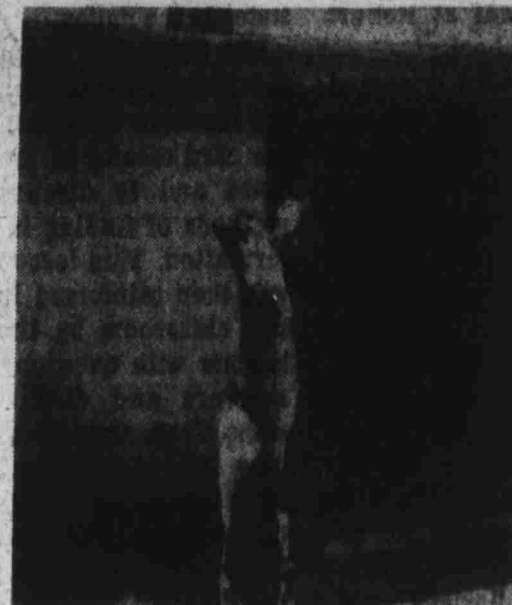

FROM THE CRIME PREVENTION UNIT HENDERSON POLICE DEPARTMENT 'Self Protection Tips For Women'

DON'T MAKE IT EASY: Women have always been prime targets for muggers, robbers and rapists. Your best means of protection is preventing the situation before it happens.

Here are a few basic rules for you to follow to help reduce your chances of becoming a victim of rape or robbery.

A. In your car:

1. Keep the doors locked and windows rolled up in your car. Always lock your car after parking it.

2. Upon returning to your car, check the parking lot for suspicious persons.

3. Before getting inside your car, check the back seat.

4. Plan your route to avoid high crime areas and poorly lighted streets.

5. Never pick up hitchhikers.

6. If you are followed by another car, don't take him home with you. Go where there is help.

7. In case of car trouble, raise the hood and tie a white cloth to the aerial. Lock yourself inside the car and wait for help from the Police.

B. On the street:

1. Plan your route, especially at night. Follow well-lit and well-traveled streets.

2. Walk with someone else whenever possible.

3. Avoid dark places, short-cuts, bushy trees and shrubs, and sparsely traveled areas.

4. Carry your purse close to you and be suspicious of strangers.

5. Never accept rides with strangers.

6. Carry a small flashlight with you at all times.

7. Have your keys ready in advance so that your house or car door can be opened without delay.

8. If confronted by an armed person demanding money, give it to him. Your life is worth more. Look at your assailant so you can describe him later.

9. If attacked by a rapist, use every means available to you to get out of the situation or draw attention from others. Only you know your strengths and weaknesses. Do what you can without causing harm to yourself.

C. In your home:

1. Get good locks and use them on all doors and windows.

2. Draw your blinds and drapes to prevent prowlers from watching you.

3. Don't automatically open your door to someone who knocks; know who is outside.

4. Request sales peo-

ple and repairmen to show identification before admitting them.

5. Never remain alone in a laundry room in an apartment house.

6. Don't indicate on the phone that you are alone. If the call is obscene, hang up.

7. Single women should list their name in the directory with last and initials only.

8. When leaving for an extended period of time, notify a neighbor and the Police. Eliminate any indication that you are absent.

Plan for emergencies. Know where to get help. Report all incidents to the Police immediately.

The longer you wait, the less chance there is of catching the suspect.

Describe the attacker as best as possible:

Race - White, Black, Latin, Oriental, Etc., Height and Weight - Approximate, Eye and Hair Color - Light, dark, Age - Approximate, Vehicle used: Type - car, truck, motorcycle, color, make or model, license number.

'Jogger' Coming To Vegas

The drive from Las Vegas to Carson City, or vice versa, can be a long, boring trip most of it through flat desert terrain. No wonder so many people prefer to fly!

But for a young man named Bill Cawelti, the 457 miles presents a real challenge and he is about to embark upon the trip and establish a world record for wheelchair endurance as well as attempt to raise \$30,000 for the education and grants program for the Governor's Committee on the Handicapped.

Cawelti was paralyzed eight years ago in a truck accident. Since then he has been confined to a wheelchair. He will be leaving May 14 and says he is going to try to average 80 miles a day and finish the trip in six to nine days.

is a total state project. It is a cross country fund raising trip and anyone in the state may make a pledge and it is hoped that many will. All pledges are for the single participant, Bill Cawelti, but the funds raised will help with assistance for public information and educational programs for the handicapped.

Cawelti has been preparing for this endurance contest by "jogging" 20 miles every morning and six miles in the afternoon. A special lightweight chair has been designed by him with three wheels instead of four; racing bike tires replace the normal treads and there are high precision bearings and double push rims. It cost \$2,000.

The longest run he has made so far has been 30 miles in a fund raising event but he hopes to be up to 50 miles by the time he starts the trip next Sunday.

The distance for the Rollathon has been rounded out to 450 miles to simplify the computation of the amount of personal pledges. If a sponsor pledges 1 cent per mile and the full distance is covered, he will pay only \$4.50.

In the event Cawelti doesn't go the full distance, the sponsor pays only for the distance covered.

This game young man will be followed by his wife Bobbie, who is also confined to a wheelchair, and a friend Bill O'Neil in a motor home.

If you should be asked to be a sponsor for this state project, it is hoped you will say "yes." Bill Cawelti is ready, willing and able to take the gamble - and he's in a wheelchair. One cent a mile for his efforts isn't that much to ask, or pledge.

The hardest part of training has been the wear and tear on his hands in rolling the chair, Cawelti reports. The skin keeps breaking on his hands and gloves make the problem worse.

"I'm going to try to push 10 to 12 hours per day and I expect a top speed of 30-35 miles per hour."

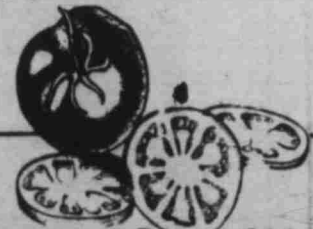

Mike Daly, Las Vegas and Reno businessman, announced today that he will begin campaigning immediately as a Democratic Candidate for the Office of State Controller.

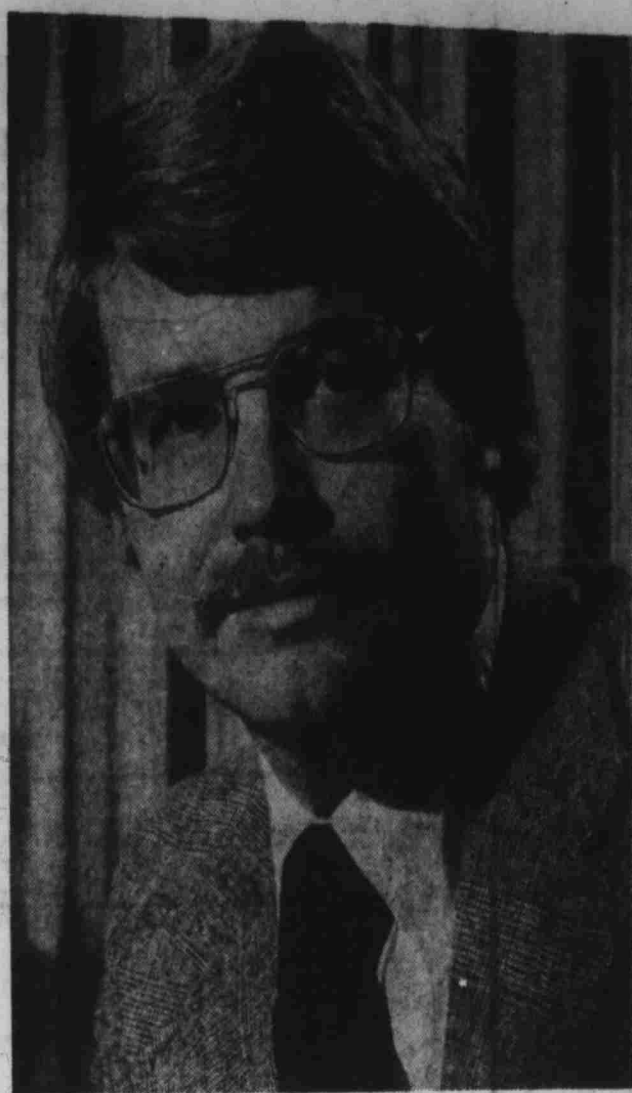

Daly is the state chairman for the 1978 Arthritis Telethon, and secretary of the board of directors, Las Vegas YMCA. 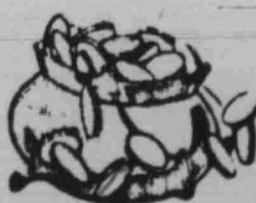

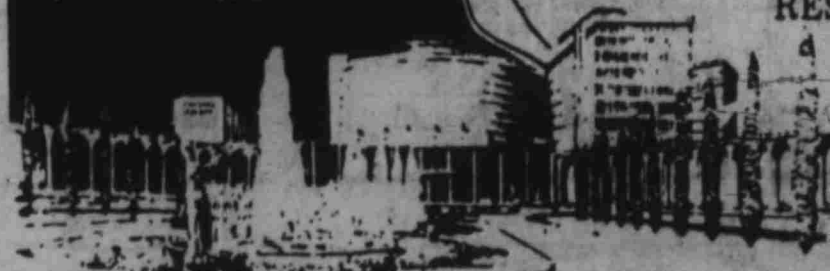

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Motorboat Noise Level To Be Enforced

With the height of the boating season just around the corner, Nevada Department of Fish and Game (NDFG) is reminding boat operators that it is illegal to operate their boats on certain state waters if they emit noise levels above a certain decibel (dba) rating.

"To maintain a high quality recreational environment and reduce medical hazards associated with excessively high noise levels, the State Board of Fish and Game Commissioners adopted a regulation in 1976 that prohibits the operation of a boat upon lakes: Tahoe, Pyramid, Walker, Washoe, Topaz, Mead and Mohave; Reservoirs; Lahontan, Rye Patch, Wildhorse; or the Colorado River, in such a manner to exceed a noise level of 86 dba measured at a distance of 50 ft. from the motorboat," reports NDFG Director Glen Griffith.

According to Griffith, "Boating law enforcement officers of the department are equipped with decibel meters that will be used to test boats on various waters throughout the state. Violators face citations and resulting fines as assessed by state justice courts."

Vial Of Life

The Vial of Life program has been correlated originally through the Senior Citizen program for the greater Clark County area. It's a plastic vial that will be attached to the bottom of the top shelf, right side, of the refrigerator. This vial contains information that will be useful to firefighters that may have a fire in that home and there are no occupants. It will tell them who the next of kin is to contact to secure the building, insurance man, his telephone number, etc. It will also be a tremendous aid to the paramedics or EMT's in emergency situations to help them to determine what immediate help that they can give to a person if they be unconscious or medicare number, if it be a senior citizen, for transportation by ambulance; also if they are pre-registered at a particular hospital where they would like to go, who their doctor is, what medication they are on, etc. We anticipate nearly 25,000 senior citizens to participate in the greater Las Vegas, North Las Vegas, Henderson and Clark County areas.

Distribution of the vials and the forms will be done through participating pharmacies and neighborhood fire stations. For the senior citizens points will be set up at the Senior Citizen Centers throughout the greater Las Vegas and Clark County areas.

Vials to the senior citizens will be free; a \$1 donation will be requested from the general public. The packet from which the vial will be given will also contain safety information, circled telephone numbers for windows, doors, their home and other pertinent related material.

An intensive testing period conducted by NDFG last year found that nearly all factory-equipped boat engines, if left intact or unmod-

ified, meet the 86 dba requirement. High performance engines can be adequately muffled with various devices available through most marine

dealers. "Most of the motorboats that currently do not meet the sound level restrictions are of the competitive type for

which certain exceptions have been granted," Griffith explained. "Under permit for NDFG and other appropriate authorities,

depending upon the exact area, sound level regulations will be waived during sanctioned and authorized events along with the

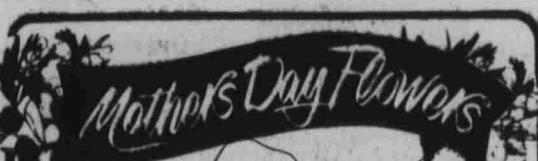
practice period prior to the race." Both Arizona and California have similar motorboat sound regulations that have been in-

effect for several years. The adoption of Nevada's regulation provides for uniform enforcement on interstate waters.

Type II Marine Sanitation Device Regulations Waived

Recent discussions between the U.S. Coast Guard and the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) have resulted in a waiver of Type II or III Marine Sanitation Device (MSD) requirements for vessels under 65 feet equipped with toilet facilities.

Under the waiver, Type I devices can continue to be installed on new and existing vessels until such time as a practical Type II MSD can be developed. When sewage control technology has developed such that adequate Type II devices are available for

small vessels the waiver will be rescinded says EPA. During this interim the EPA will review their standards of performance for MSD's with a view towards possible revision.

The previous MSD waiver of 11 NOV 1977 requiring existing vessel owners to maintain proof of a "Firm commitment" to purchase a Type I MSD, is now unnecessary for vessels 65 feet or less and proof need not be maintained.

For all vessels over 65 feet in length with installed toilets, all present MSD standards and

regulations still apply. All new MSD installations on these vessels after 30 JAN 1980 must be a Type II or III. All state designated "no-discharge" waters will remain as such and are

not affected by the waiver of Type II or III MSD requirements. Further information concerning Federal Marine Sanitation Device Regulations may be

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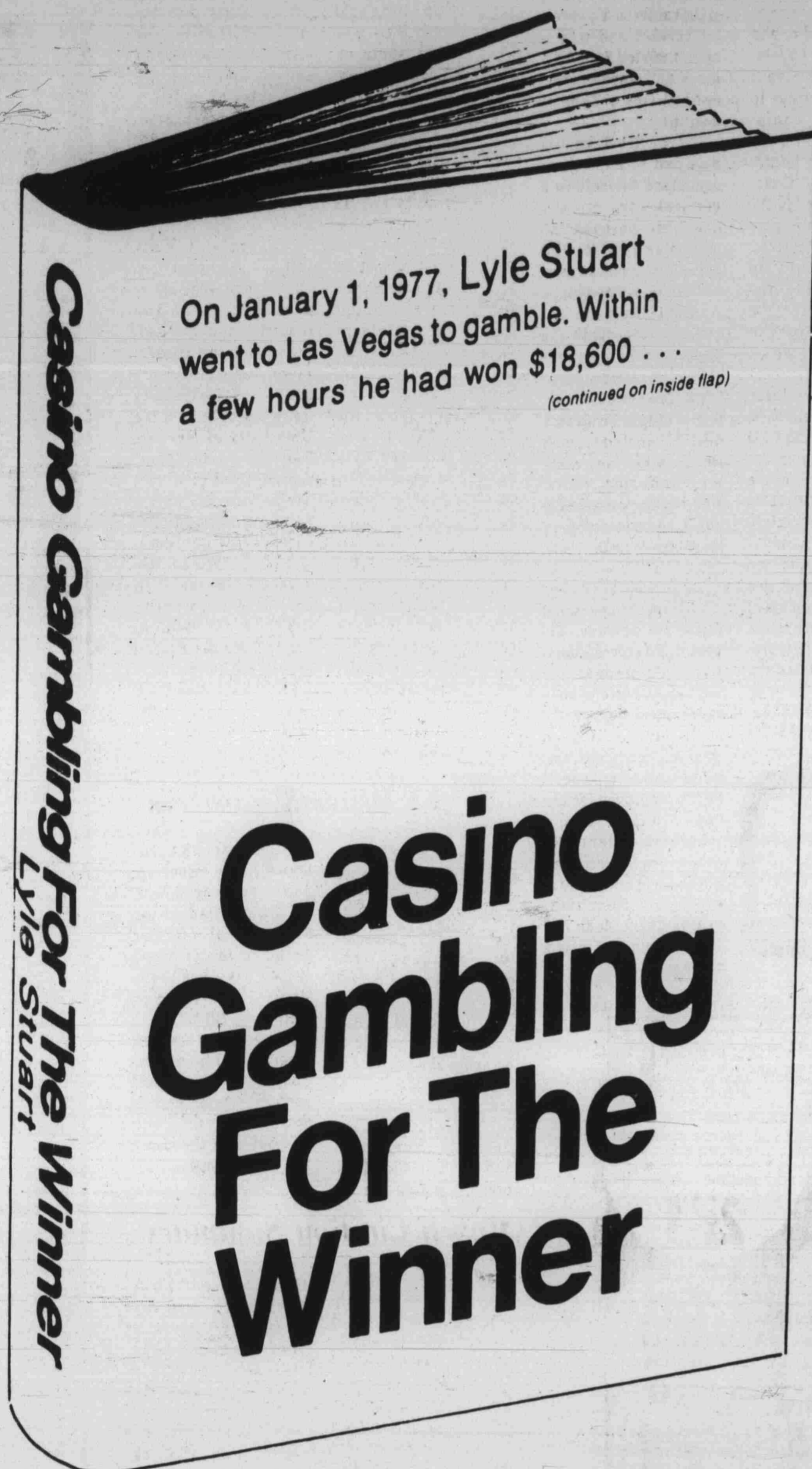

**Bob Rose Gives Soviet
Slide Presentation To
Boulder City Rotarians**

Lt. Gov. Bob Rose was the featured speaker at last week's Boulder City Rotary Club meeting at the Railroad Pass Casino and presented his talk and slides from his trip to the Soviet Union last year.

Rose was one of 12 young political leaders from across the country chosen to participate in the three-week tour, which was sponsored by the American Council of Young Political Leaders and coordinated through the U.S. State Department.

While presenting more than 70 slides of cities such as Moscow, Kiev, and Alma-Ata, as well as the countryside seldom seen by American tourists, Rose cautioned all Americans to be vigilant against the attempt by Communists to dominate the free world.

"We must realize that the Communist Party has only one goal in mind and that is the conquest of the world," Rose said. "The United States is the only nation strong enough and with the will power to fight the Soviet Union to a standstill, and if we do not do it, no one else will, and the freedom of the world will be jeopardized."

"I was surprised to learn that only 10 percent of the people in the Soviet Union actually belong to the Communist Party, but these are the most influential people in the country, and their goal of world conquest still remains the dominant objective of their government," Rose said.

Rose said from a personal standpoint the people he visited with were friendly and good hosts. He said that while the Soviet economy in general is far behind that of the United States, many Russian citizens think their lives are much improved over that of previous generations.

The tour in which the Lieutenant Governor participated included visits to USSR government agencies, collective and state farms, industrial enterprises, research institutes, schools, recreational facilities, museums, art galleries, and the ballet.

The tour was one of the programs sponsored by ACYPL in which leaders of the U.S. and other nations meet and exchange ideas and view points.



HERBS UNDER LIGHTS

The best place for an herb garden, of course, is in the kitchen, and if you don't have a window in your kitchen, you can still do it by installing two 24-inch 40-watt fluorescent tubes. Be sure you locate your garden away from radiators, floor vents or heating ducts and far from the stove. Also, ar-

range the herb pots so that foliage and stems don't touch their neighbors or any other surfaces. Herbs are quite sensitive about this.

Potting media for herbs is pretty standard regardless of the variety. Pre-packaged potting mix with about a teaspoon of lime or crushed egg shell added to each pot suits them fine. Use clay pots with good drainage. Leave fluorescent tubes on for 14 hours a day, minimum, and keep lights within 3 to 5 inches of plant tops. From October to March, fertilize every other

month with a mild solution of fish emulsion fertilizer. The rest of the year, feed them once a month with fish emulsion.

For artificially lit herb gardens, basil is an excellent choice and, even with frequently harvesting of leaves, the basil plant will grow nicely in a four-inch pot for about three years. Chive is another good grower even if you snip at it often.

Keep herb pots evenly moist and spray weekly after the lights go out for optimal growth.

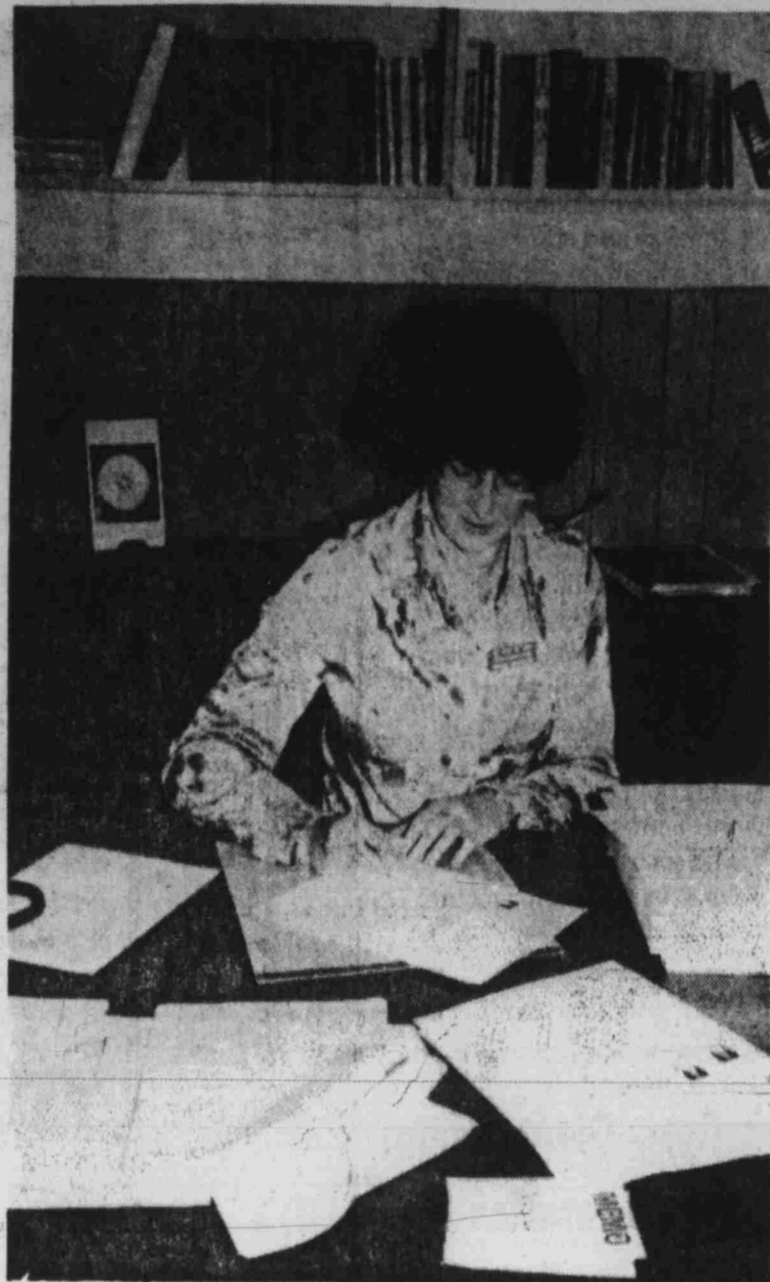

VIAL OF LIFE

If you had a fire in your home and you weren't there, would the fire department know who to call? Next of kin? or your insurance man?

If you're a senior citizen or person with a medical problem, if fire personnel arrived at your home to treat you and found you unconscious, would they know a brief background on your medical history - what medication you are taking? Your doctors name?

Fire departments in Southern Nevada are engaged in a program for the public called, the Vial of Life. A plastic vial secured in your refrigerator, will usually protect it from fire or loss. From the general public a dollar donation is requested, senior citizens can pick up their vials free at participating drug stores or at their local senior citizens centers.

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THIS IS OLDER AMERICANS MONTH

President Carter and Governor O'Callaghan have proclaimed May as Older Americans Month. Many communities in Nevada have scheduled special activities in May. On local and national scenes, May is a special time to honor Older Americans for their continuing and past achievements, and to raise public awareness of their particular concerns. It is a time for each community to check how well it is doing for its older citizens' desire to lead independent, satisfying, productive lives.

The needs of older people are at least as varied as those of any other age groups. Urgent needs for some are housing, transportation and well-balanced meals. Other needs are home health services, recreational, social, cultural, and educational. Most need productive activity, paid work, work at home, or volunteer service outside.

A universal need of all Americans and Nevadans over 60 is respect and dignity in their

home, family, neighborhood, community, and nation. Basically, that is what Older Americans Month is about.

The elderly form a far greater proportion of the population than they did early in this century. While the population as a whole tripled from 1900 to 1978, the number of persons over 85 increased by 17 times, and the number of persons over 75 increased 10 times.

Educationally, the profile of the elderly becomes steadily brighter. Persons now in the 60-64 age group have a median of 12 years of education, whereas the average for all over-60's is 9 years of schooling.

There are many more women than men in the over-60 group - 135 women for each 100 men. As age rises, the disparity increases. There are five elderly widows for every elderly widower. This is a major factor in the trend toward living alone. Another factor is greater financial independence. Almost 8 million Older Americans live alone, and the proportion is increasing. About a million Older Americans are in nursing homes. Many elderly are on the verge of losing their independence because of isolation, low income, disability or very advanced age.

At present there are 23 senior citizen centers in Nevada communities and there are six more in the development stage. Many communities have nutrition programs that serve well-balanced hot meals to older people at group sites and carry meals to shut-in elderly persons. The Nevada Aging Services Nutrition Program now supplies funds for 71 different sites. There are also health, minor home repair, transportation, legal, information & referral, and other senior social services operating throughout the State.

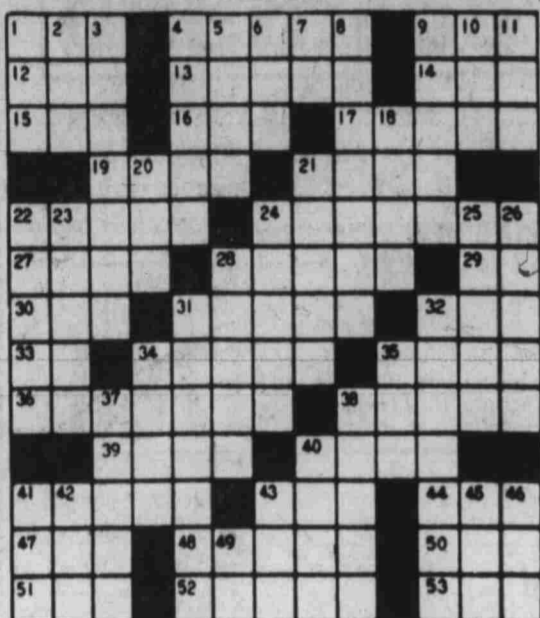

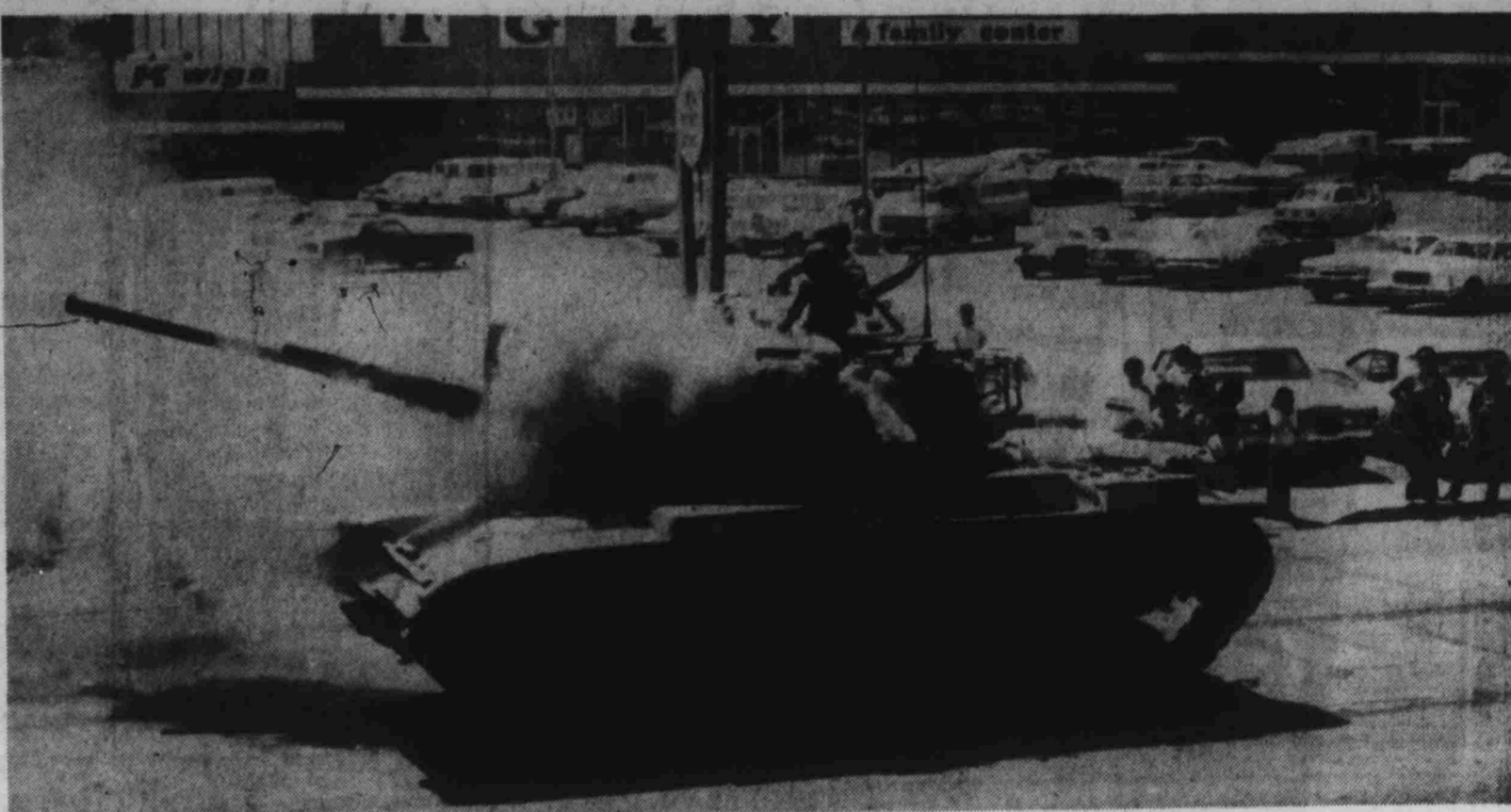

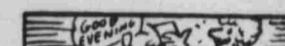

Topics for Taxpayers

If anyone except the seven employed staff people is pleased with the "1978 Health Systems Plan" hatched last month at a cost in excess of a quarter of a million dollars, that pleasure was notably absent as citizens in six public hearings last month voiced their concern. From the start, the efforts of the Greater Nevada Health Systems Agency were suspect. That agency was created and funded by federal legislation designed to impose national "goals" and standards on the people of Nevada. The agency was incorporated as a non-profit organization in Nevada in order to become eligible for federal money -- lots of it.

The the agency took off in all direction. The "Health Systems Plan" proposes to impose its judgements on hospitals, doctors, nurses, school systems, mental health clinics, drug rehabilitation agencies, dentists, nursing homes, environmental agencies and vital statistics compilers. The highly efficient and responsive forces of the marketplace are either denigrated or ignored.

Much of the citizen resistance to the plan was concentrated in the field of health education, with an unfortunate neglect of some of the more far-reaching and damaging aspects of the "master" plan. The sections drawing the most "flack" were those which proposed that governmental resources be expended to provide "accurate and complete information on reproduction, sexuality and fertility control ... to all."

Most of the "goals" stated in the report have general public acceptance. (Although some of them are supported by questionable research.) The basic fault lies in the bureaucratic delusion of adequacy which permeates the whole 482 page report. The underlying assumption is that "government" can either induce or compel the attainment of those goals by massive use of tax-exorted money or the brute force of a police state.

Forced compliance is the secondary weapon. First, the Agency has employed the talents of Joyce and Martin Advertising, Inc., to "sell" the plan to Nevadans before it is submitted June 1 to the Department of Health, Education and Welfare for continuation of the funding. The report overlooks a couple of basic facts. No program can be devised that will absolutely remove the incidence of illness and death. Health care delivery in Nevada is better than almost any other place on earth and most of the inadequacies can be charged to governmental interference with the delivery mechanisms. That governmental interference has taken the form of efforts to provide everything for everybody at the expense of the taxpayers. And, hence, recipients no longer have to weigh the benefits against the costs. It follows that over-utilization has become chronic.



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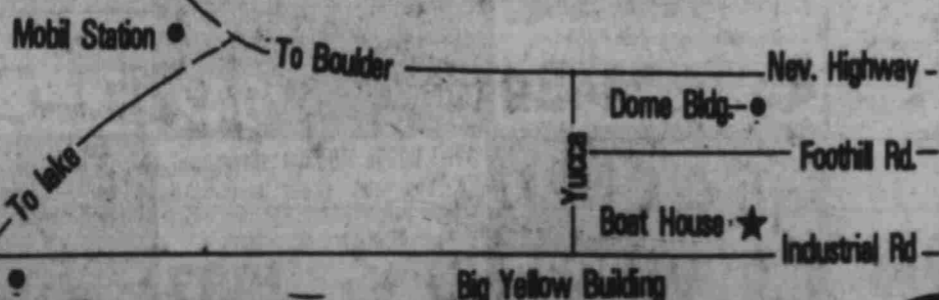

Governor Proclaims Nevada Metric Week

Governor Mike O'Callaghan has proclaimed the week of May 8-12, 1978 as Nevada Metric Week.

The Governor said in his proclamation that the United States and Canada have begun an extended program of changeover to the metric system of measurement, and that traditional units of measure will be replaced in engineering, science, trade and other areas by the international metric system. Many segments of the

American economy are already implementing use of the metric system, and public education is turning rapidly toward instruction in use of this standardized system of measurement.

The Nevada Department of Education has sponsored approximately 50 workshops for teachers to date, and approximately 40 presentations to the general public.

Ron Gutzman, consultant with the Depart-

ment of Education, said that many classrooms in Nevada are recognizing the week with displays of metric projects.

The general public face metrics every day. In the grocery markets most products are marked with dual units and some are packaged to metric specifications. We also see metrics now in the tool, auto, and clothing industries.

The Nevada Metric Committee, a non-profit organization, has sponsored many community awareness projects, such as booths at fairs, conferences for the general public, and free materials upon request. The committee is willing to answer questions about the metric system. Their office is located at the U.S. Department of Commerce, 777 West Second Street, Reno, Nevada.

The Working Woman: How to Portray that Professional Image

Suburban or urban, paid employee or community volunteer, today's woman is more often than not working and volunteering outside the home.

If you are one of the nearly 50 percent of all American women gainfully employed, or one of the

countless others active as a community leader, you should be as conscious as your male counterparts about the public image you convey.

You may dress the part, speak the jargon and adopt the mannerisms — but does your photographic portrait project your professional

image? A frilly, romantic, feminine photograph will be cherished by your loved ones. But, it would hardly suffice for release to newspapers when you've achieved a new level of success at work or been elected to head an important committee.

More and more com-

panies recognize the value of a photographic portrait that can be used to illustrate publicity or advertisements, sales brochures, annual re-

ports and internal communications. Often these photographs are multi-purpose, color views showing the professional on the job — a

surgeon at the hospital, a lawyer in court, a research scientist or engineer in the laboratory, or the manager at the plant.

If you don't have a photograph that conveys your role as a working woman, now's the time to make an appointment with a professional photographer. Wherever you would like to be portrayed, consider this advice from Paul Ness, a former portrait studio owner and now marketing coordinator for portrait photography, Eastman Kodak Company: "Generally, it is best to wear the type of clothing and makeup you would for work. Your business photograph should be a flattering but realistic portrait of you as your colleagues and customers see you."

Ness offers these additional suggestions to help you prepare for your next sitting:

- Opt for long or three-quarter length sleeves that flatter, no matter what the pose.
- Select dark or medium-toned clothing. Color selection can help place the emphasis on your face in the photograph.
- Avoid busy patterns.
- Use scarves and jewelry for accents. If you normally wear glasses, be sure to have them on hand for the portrait.
- Look natural by wearing your everyday makeup. Keep lip and cheek color to minimum.
- Keep your normal hairstyle, making sure it is clean and shiny. This is no time to experiment at the beauty parlor.

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WIDOWHOOD: THE FUTURE TOO MANY WOMEN FACE

There are over 9 million widows in the United States, women who have suddenly found themselves face to face with being on their own after perhaps thirty or forty years of marriage.

Sharpening forgotten skills can help her compete in today's job market; resuming her education may fulfill a youthful dream; handling her finances can bolster her self-esteem; and enjoying the company of children and grandchildren

will help assuage her loneliness.

Many widows have made the adjustment successfully; a program involving just such women is sponsored by the American Association of Retired Persons and Action for Independent Maturity. Check all pockets; close zippers, hooks and eyes; and pre-treat heavily soiled areas on collars and cuffs. Apply a liquid detergent or a prewash spray directly onto the stain. But watch it! The spray can soften fingernail polish, causing it to rub onto

clothes. The minutes between home and the washer with the pre-treating product on the clothes won't cause damage and will save time at the laundry.

Proper loading will save time and trouble. Don't pack items into the washer. Overloading results in poor cleaning, excessive lint and extra wear on the fabrics.

A slim pocket calculator that slips into her handbag will be an efficient aid to busy woman executive.

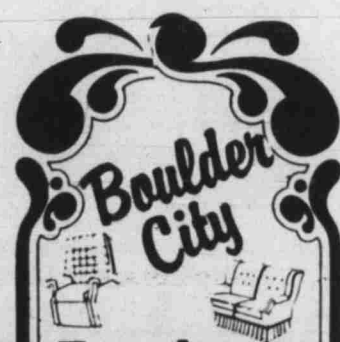
A Special Gift

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MOTHER'S DAY GIFT GUIDE

A Salute to the Pioneer Woman, for Mother's Day

This Mother's Day we should pay tribute to the homesteading women for whom life was the hardest!

Facing a grinding succession of primitive chores from daybreak to dusk, making soap and candles, sewing clothes, drawing water, feeding livestock, struggling to keep a dirt-floor clean and educating the children was enough to try a saint, but simple loneliness was hardest to bear, explains Harold Warp, historian and founder of Pioneer Village at Minden, in south central Nebraska, 12 miles from I-80.

Yesteryear's mother, if we picture her in a sun-filled kitchen, in all her bread-baking glory and well-starched neatness, existed with the wealthy — not on the plains. In contrast to this, many a good country wife spent her beauty and strength in the early plains kitchen; the heart of the sod-house and its only heated area, serving as dining

room, washroom, living room, it was — as you can see in the typical sod house at the Village — primitive and crowded beyond the point of intimacy.

Cooking, the kitchen's major activity, was done in an open hearth fireplace that meant sooty, smoke-laden air, arms that glistened with heat — summer or winter. Burning year-round, the fire had one constant demand: dry wood. Very hot was the only temperature, with variety in cooking an unachieved goal. (One such kitchen circa 1830 is on display at the Harold Warp Pioneer Village in the Evolution of Homes and Crafts of the Past Building.)

Probably the most punishing physical labor in mother's routine was laundry. Miracle detergents and pushbutton machinery were unknown; it was the frontier wife's wont to stomp or beat the clothes with paddles or flat rocks. One creative man made a treadmill

driven by farm dogs — this can be seen in the evolution of washing machines at the Village.

What brought lines to mother's face was the worst of all dreads: foreclosure of the mortgage. Improvements, machinery, or payment-of-outrageous-freight

rates for crops laid the family prone to falling prices; drought, fire, storms, or the debilitating descent of swarms of locusts led to debt, despair and disbelief in their woes.

Yet, somehow or other, the pioneer woman prevailed as teacher, mother and

helper to her family, nor did she, even when left manless, seek help from the government, or a handout from anyone. Harold Warp explains, "An offer of a helping hand would not be refused, but it would be repaid as she etched out her place in history." †
