RACE TRACK GETS TRUST APPROVAL

The Big Wastewater Honcho In San Fran Meets Tomorrow With Our Reps In Cities **Versus County Flap**

Another step toward clarification of the current cities versus county control of the future handling of wastewater treatment in Southern Nevada will be taken tomorrow when city hall officials and council members go to San Francisco to meet with the big honcho of the regional environmental protection agency -- Paul De Falco, Jr., regional administrator.

Just about all parties have now agreed, after hearing and reading studies plus reports from the attorney general down thru the county attorney to the city attorney that the state law reads the bosses in charge will be the county commission.

They also know that De Falco has layed down the law with a three point telegram -- which is printed below -- all points being warning signals that federal law requires states and counties to take the responsibilities if and when federal funding is to be used, or else!

Cities of Clark County are anxious to have something to say in the operation and in the development of their own facilities that will tie-in to the overall construction. They reel they if be left out or could be by more vote count on the commission, if and when an item comes up relating to any one area. The cities would like an overall agency composed of their reps as well as general public and county be set up and have powers to do rather than only powers to suggest and advise. They will be telling this all to De Falco, adding that they feel the state law could be changed if the feds would accept same. By a 4-1 vote, the trust will require a payment of \$35,000 for the first year and a ten percent increase per yoar for the 15 years the bond is in existence, for the City of Henderson in lieu of taxes

David Funk Jr., representing Las Vegas Downs, is expected to appear before the Henderson City council Monday night when the matter comes to a vote of the council. If it is approved by the city council it then will be sent to the State Board of Finance which must approve the underwriters or the financial institution planning to purchase the bonds and the method of finance.

Although plans call for a horse race track also, the construction at first will include only dog racing which will be conducted 300 days out of the year. The race track is located off Boulder Highway near the east end of Henderson.

During the three-hour discussion, Charles Burton, attorney for Las Vegas Downs brought out the fact that the Las Vegas Downs would be operating the race track as if it were renting the property from the city, however, the rent would be a fixed amount. 

ANNON SEES START OF OUR FREEWAY SPURIN 1980

(Editor's Note: The Vegas -Henderson - Boulder freeway project being one of the key issues of the moment hereabouts, this newspaper this week contacted the Senator Howard Cannon office in Washington asking for an update as of now -- and the following story is the result ... M.M.Z.)

(By telephone from Cannon's Office at Press Time)

Washington - Work on the Interstate 15 spur project between Henderson and Las Vegas, is slated to begin by the end of 1980, Nevada Senator Howard W. Cannon said Monday.

Cannon said the State Highway department has conducted location hearings and begun right - of - way acquisition for the first stage of the project. Bids for that .7 of a mile section will be sought in Dec. of 1980, he said.

Tentative date of seeking bids on the remaining two stages are Nov. 1981 and Oct. 1983, Cannon said.

RE: Your query of this date,

Response Follows:

1. If for any reason AWT Construction is stoppped or discontinued current and future EPA Grants for wastewater treatment works, will be jeopardized and will possibly force recovery of expended Federal Funds. Since fiolation of compliance schedule would occur, EPA enforcement action will ensue. Remedies under law are penalties up to \$25,000 per day and-or connection ban.

2. Failure to have an approved Section 208 Plan will jeopardize all future Section 201 Wastewater Treatment Construction Grants and Section 402 Permits in Clark County.

3. Failure to meet statutory dates of July 1, 1979, under Clean Air Act for air quality implementation plan approval will jeopardize Sewage Treatment Grants under Section 316, and will impose severe limitations under Section 176 on federal assistance including transportation projects and Air Quality Planning Grants, will preclude the approval of any new air pollutant source, and will otherwise jeopardize federal licenses and permits.



So I went up for him. We returned and he started artifical respriation on the man. A few minutes later he said the man was gone. When we arrived at the hospital to my surprise all the emergency doors were locked. We had to pound. to get some help. Finally 2 nurses came, they tried to pick the man out of the car, there were no orderlies at all. My husband had to help pick the man up, or they would have droppped him. They took him in, and in a few minutes a doctor arrived. So unconcerned about the whole thing, he casually walked in and examined the man. After about 1 minute he walked out and bluntly said he was gone. To top it all as we were leaving the hospital after 30 minutes the paramedics

The year was 1899, Nevada's number on newspaper, the TERRI-TORIAL ENTERPRISE described fierce political battles between the Silver Party and its opponents; labeling one faction as "hired guns". In 1900 the **Republicans** nominated McKinley for president and Roosevelt for vice president and adopted a platform calling for the gold standard and supporting imperialism. The Democrats countered with William J. Bryan and adopted a platfrom endorsing the unlimited coinage of silver at the ratio of 16 to 1.

In San Francisco and Virginia City, ladies wore the latest New York and Paris fashions, carried imported silk parasols and gave dress balls complete with champagne and fourteen course dinners. In the small, remote mining communities like Panaca most of the populace resorted to beer as the standard beverage since water was selling at the rate of \$10.60 per barrel and tasted of alkali.

Mine owners had adopted a wage of \$3.50 per day for above ground work and \$4.00 per day for men working below; this wage scale was considered high at the time and attracted many who hoped to make a quick fortune in the mines. 2-3 pound of beef (Cut to size of sugar cubes) 1-28 ounce can of tomato sauce

1 - 28 ounce can of stewed or whole tomatoes 1/4 to 1/2 cup of sliced jalapeno peppers, onion or green peppers

1 tbls. salt

2 tbls. (heaping) Cayenne pepper (the more pepper the hotter the chili) Enough Metican oregano, ground cumin

(Moderate mount) paprika (small amount)

Miners lived in frame shantys covered with canvas or in tents made of blankets, potato sacks and old clothing with whiskey barrels for chimneys. Piles of rubbish occupied any free space near these dwellings and dysontary was rampant; the usual cure being several doses of flour and water covered with black pepper and mixed to the consistancy of thick cream!

It was one thing to own a mine and another to get the ore to the stamp mills. Cost was prohibitive unless you were lucky enough to mine near one or the newly completed narrow guage railroads. Miners in the outlying areas were forced to ship their ore via the ponderous and heavily constructed ore wagons which meant providing water on the trail to teams of oxen or mules.

Life in early Nevada was rough, a challenge to all and a disappointment to many, but true to our heritage, we have endured in towns such as Pioche, Goldfield . and Tonopah!





Developer's Fees Get Council 'Do Pass' Vote

Fees to be charged land developers in the City of Henderson received a "do pass" vote from the city council Monday and final action will be taken at a meeting to be held July 3 at 7 p.m.

Tanzi Bess Cypher Weds Michael Caron

The fees were proposed by **City Manager Bob Campbell** who said the present rate of development in Henderson has created a "tremendous work load" on the present staff, particularly in the departments of engineering, planning and inspection.

Campbell said he feels it is important for these areas "to pay their own way" and not become a drain on the already existing tax base. He said it would also help pay for some added manpower that is chitectural review, \$50; street and alley vacation, \$75; planned unit development \$250.

Councilman Carlton Lawrence questioned the cost of a variance at \$100, and Mayor **Pro Tem Phil Stout suggested** a feasibility study for impact fees.

Councilwoman Lorna Kesterson questioned a \$50 architectural fee and a \$75 minor subdivision fee, since they were higher than other entities:

Campbell said the charges were representative of what it is costing the city. City Attorney Kent Dawson said most of the fees are not outlined in the ordinance so it will be a matter of approval by the city council.

Lawrence said he felt the council needed more information. Councilman Gary Price, Kesterson and Stout voted a "do pass" and Lawrence voted against it. Campbell said he feels the fees are justified because the people who are new residents should not have to gay for the new developments.



When voters by a 3-1 margin refused to approve the \$700,000-water bond issue in February 1971, the Henderson councilmen were faced with many problems, and City Manager Don. Dawson explained the situation:

"A \$500;000 5-year emergency loan had previously been approved by the council and the state, to start the improvement work on the deteriorated city water system and construction of a storage tank for water expected to be delivered to Honderson by the approval of the \$700,000 water bond issue."

But beef was another matter. It takes about two years for the beef production industry to recover from a market force. And no governmental action is going to change that. The problem arises when a governmental action interfers with the market forces and drastically retards the industry response to market price changes. The price of beef rose dramatically a few years ago. People stopppen buying beef. Producers reduced their herds and their produc-

tion when meat was no

longer saleable at a price that would cover costs.

When the price started to rise again, beef producers were faced with orders from the federal government prohobiting the use of vitamin and biological food supplements that have a history of promoting growth in meat animals. Animals grew slower. More feed was required to sustain growth. Costs of feeding were increased. The incentive (of higher prices) to grow more meat was eliminated by the increase in costs.

How much was the cost? Something more than \$2 Billion a year. . That translates to about 25 cents a pound for every pound of red meat consumed by people of the United States in a given year.

The governmental interference with the market place has two unfortunate results. The evidence is far from conclusive that deletion of the food supplements in American animal production has anything to do with the quality of the finished product. Also, the long arm of the federal bureaucracy cannot reach the producers of meat in foreign countries.

So, next time you are moved to complain about the price of meat at the butcher shop, reduce the price by 25 cents a pound and count that as a payment for governmental production contraols. You still have to pay for it; but you can't eat it.





National Guard Ends Training In Boise, Idaho

Annual active duty training ended this weekend for 370 soldiers of the 3rd Squadron Nevada Army National Guard at the Gowan Field training area south of Boise, Idaho.

The 3rd Squadron headquartered in Las Vegas, with units from North Las Vegas and Henderson, was one of the three principal units of the 163rd Regiment headquartered in Bozeman, Montana, that underwent the two-week summer training, nearly all of which was conducted in the field.

Considerable effort and preparation was put into the required training. Southern Nevada units, for example, logged over 1500 convoy miles in 2 and one-half

Richard Bryan Files For Attorney General

Pledging strict enforcement of state laws and "absolute resistance to unwarranted federal intervention in the afffairs of Nevada", State Senator Richard Bryan filed today for the Democratic nomination

for attorney general. The 40 year old Las Vegan also said he would encourage meetings with prosecutors and top police officials throughout Nevada "to exchange information and ideas, and to formulate a legislative program to combat Nevada's rising crime rate."

Bryan, a 10 year veteran of the Nevada legislature, said he is convinced "the people of this state stand together for vigorous and consistent enforcement of our laws. This will be done if I am elected attorney general, and it will be done without infringing upon individual liberties."

Addressing federal activities, Bryan said, "Nevada, more than any other state, has a history of federal meddling and intervention which goes beyond any accepted standards. We are perfectly capable of governing ourselves, policing our industries and taking action against offenders. We do not need nor want federal intrusion, and as the chief legal and law enforcement officer of the state, I would do everything possible to resist what has become a dangerous and distasteful policy of our federal government." Bryan also said he would attempt to provide legal opinions "as quickly as possible, consistent with exploring every legal consideration, so that the questions of cities, counties, state agencies and officials can be quickly resolved and they can move ahead with the business of government."



Bryan served two terms in the Nevada Assembly in 1969 and 1971, before election to the Senate in 1972. He was reelected to the Senate in 1976.

He has served as chairman of the Senate **Education** Committee and served last session as chairman of the Taxation Committee. He has also served on the Committees on Commerce, Judiciary and Environment and Public Resources.

During the 1969 session he was named Outstanding Freshman Assemblyman.

Bryan was graduated from Las Vegas High School, the University of Nevada, Reno, and Hastings Law School.



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



More than \$148 million worth of construction and bid invitations are expected to be issued by the Bureau of Reclamation during June, July, and August, it was announced by Commissioner of Reclamation, R. Keith Higginson.

Six equipment invitations will account for nearly \$18 million while 67 construction invitations will total more than 130 million. The five largest construction invitations, located in three western States projects, will account for nearly half of the 3 month outlay.

Among the largest invitations are two for construction of Reach 3 and Reach 8 of the Granite Reef Aqueduct on the Central Arizona Project. Reach 3 is a 12.8 - mile (20.6 kilometer) segment of the concrete aqueduct about 40 miles southeast of Parker. The Reach 3 invitation will be issued this month. The Reach 8 invitation, scheduled for August, calls for con-





While he declined to take the "Lion's share of the credit" for Nevada's sound fiscal position, Mirabelli said. "Our office has played and important role in bringing this about".



The esteemed citizen who honored the Damboree Committee by accepting the fun of riding as "Parade Marshal" in the 1978 parade is a man of so many interests and varied talents that one is hard pressed to squeeze him into the allotted space in the 1978 Damboree Program. Suffice to say, Elton Garrett is delighted beyond words and so are we as we share a few moments from the career that began in Clark County in 1929 when E.G. wrote for newspapers in Las Vegas until he was transferred to Boulder City where he became the first editor - in - chief in the new town in 1931.

In celebrating the 4th of July with the American Legion's 30th annual Damboree let us clap for Elton who has just completed 30 years being a real - estate salesman and a real - estate broker and graduating to the point of owning the Garrett Realty business. In 1979 we will have another birthday for Elton will have been in Clark County 50 years.

Elton's First Introduction To Solar Energy

It was 1929. A fellow newspaper man and Llton Garrett planned and carried forth the idea of building cabins side by side for a home in the town that numbered between 5000 and 6000 citizens in the days when the dam was heralded as the job to end the depression of the 30's. Hansen and Garrett built a lead pipe coil solar heating plant on top of the roof of the houses. The apparatus worked very efficiently. It was connected to electricity so that on days the sun did not heat the coils the electric heat took over. It was as though a prophet


spoke to Elton saying: "Some day you will be instrumental in bringing to the new town by the dam site a sophisticated Solar Energy Research Facility with men like Jerry Bradley who will develop in the futuristic laboratory a solar energy program that will place Boulder City on the map as being one of the moremost research centers in the world."

The story of how the Solar Energy facility finally arrived to Boulder City is contained in a learned article with Elton Garrett's by - line. This article will be printed in the NEWS for the enjoyment and appreciation of all of us who are fully aware that unless methods are proven that will utilize the "God - given free sun ray energy, which human ingenuity and combined effort is destined to harness." we are surely not leaving much of a heritage for our children. The quote above is from Elton Garrett, who has been an instructor of children in our elementary school system when the school (now City Hall) first opened its doors in 1932. Elton was to serve as school principal, until he became editor of the B.C. News.

In Las Vegas newspapers of the 30's we see several advertisements advocating the use of Solar Heater's in swimming pools. One business depended entirely upon orders for solar . heating for the home.

Boulder City in the Forefront for Solar Heating

The idea is not new. We are told that Egypt has been using the sun for heating water for thousands of years. We know for a fact that Elton wrote feature articles about the "Ragtown" tent cities that strung along the dirt road from Las Vegas to Boulder City. Once the pioneers had a feeling of per-

mance they used human ingenuity to keep their families from dying from heats that Bob Parker said did not drop below 112 at the damsite in the summer of 1931. One need only look back to those early papers to see that a heat record of 26 years was broken in that year of the beginning of **Boulder City. There was** no housing, no creature comforts, and the great Dr. Dill and his staff arrived to Boulder City in 1932: to remain until 1935 doing a series of tests to learn what could be done to present the

fatalities from heat prostration on a job that was to reach a peak employment of between 5000 to 6000 men on a 24 hour day basis.

From Desert Cooler To Sophisticated Solar Energy

The story of dipping sheets and canvas in the muddy Colorado to enable tired men and suffering wives and children to have a mement's respite from the heat has been told many time. We have pictures of the sturdy 50 gallon drum placed on top of shacks built of

scraps of lumber pirated from the dam - site. It would feed directly to the shower. Men with plumbing talents piped it into tent houses. When the late Tom Bailey died his Lakeview house still contained an outside shower with the 50 gallon drum perched atop the crude edifice. Conservation is Preservation

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(To our readers: Elton Garrett spent the better part of a week thinking about and researching this article which lists the events that led to the funding, Boulder City location and finally the dedication of the Solar Energy Facility on Jan. 9, 1977. Visitors are invited to see the building of tomorrow on Buchanan Blvd in Boulder City.)

It has been fun helping plant "seeds" that point toward human use of the endless energy which comes from the sun ... the utlimate source when the underground ones become not just expensive -- but SCARCE..

The sophisticated research center in Boulder City, set up by Nevada's Desert Research Institute, of our state university system, was not even a dream when George Hanson and I built a lead pipe - coil solar heater for our water tank in 1930. where dwellers now call their town North Las Vegas.

What did it take to get Jerry Bradley's crew set up at the south end of Buchanan Boulevard to help scientists of the world point the way for the kind of economy in use of the sun's rays that will some day make it competitive with gasoline and coal?

If you will but count the cars on any street. project the gallonage of gas used, extend it nationwide ... worldwide ... and then study the population explosion, increases in technology and TELL ME THE GASOLINE SUPPLY IN THE GROUND NEVER WILL RUN LOW.

The black hose on the roof of a home on Yuma Court supplies hot water for the swimming pool.

A man in Las Vegas

has been selling solar heaters for pools for years. The cost for effi cient use is the problem. Technical research has solved such problems as flying, sending men to the moon, orbiting satellites for communication and further presently undetermined purposes. Research pressure is

the answer for solutions yet unknown.

When Boulder City lost the privilege of housing the second institution of higher learning in Nevada, after two attempts a decade apart to achieve that goal, the hope of having a share of the work of Nevada's university system in our QUALITY COMMUNITY did not die.

What were the steps that led to the dedication of a Solar Energy Research Facility January 9, 1977, with cornerstone ceremonies conducted by officers of the Grand Lodge, Free and Accepted Masons, State of Nevada?

Though Boulder City had failed, during years while the Bureau of Reclamation ran our town, in getting the second university established in Boulder City, the willingness of the Federal Government to make free land available for a college, city officials two years after the town was incorporated opened the door for not only college use, but also for solar research.

Boulder City's Development Commission recommended on February 27, 1962, on motion by Cliff Segerblom, that the city council be asked to authorize free land for an institution of higher learning or for research toward solar energy.

The council so authorized on April 11, 1962, on motion made by Councilman Bob Broadbent and seconded by Mayor Morgan Sweeney.

Boulder City got her "foot in the door" in 1966 when Dr. David Bruce Dill, the grand old man of physiological research, returned for the fourth time to set up, hopefully, that type of research in whatever headquarters might be made available to him.

In 1932 to 1937 he had used basement space in Uncle Sam's municipal building. In 1964 he had used high school room.

I checked out hospital and dog pound building possibilities for him, in vain, and eventually through Supt. Delwyn Blue of the U.S. Bureau of Mines, arrangements were made through Washington, D.C. for him to use, for his university research work, what had been the titanium building.

Not only did Dr. Dill build up a research center there in his own field, but, water resources studies were added in 1970, with university and federal funding. Later biological science work added, and a congenial relationship with the University of Nevada Las Vegas Department of Biological Sciences was added with staff in Boulder City.

During several years around 1974 we instigated one visit after another by Desert Research Institute personnel to see potential sites for added University of Nevada research, of whatever kind would be most suitable, including horticultural and solar. Engineering personnel assisted.

A resolution was passed by the Boulder City Chamber of Commerce on September 19, 1974 commending our city administration "and all other officials and agencies who have worked for and are working for this (solar energy) project," urging continued efforts without delay toward acquiring necessary funding ... and that copies be sent to Nevada's senators and congressman.

Senate Bill 552 was quoted in a Nevada legislative report April 21, 1975, to appropriate \$370,000 ... for designing, construction, equipping a solar research laboratory in Clark County ... the Board of Regents to cooperate with the Public Works Board to that end.

State Senator James Gibson, whose father had had much to do with setting up "D.R.I." long ago, and who was a solar research enthusiast, was active as chairman of the Committee on Finance, toward getting this legislation through the legislature, with assistance of other senators and assemblymen.

Changes in sites agreeable to D.R.I. and Boulder City administration and actions by the Board of Regents, headed actively by Chairman James Buchanan, and with assists from Chancellor Neil D. Humphrey and **President Lloyd P. Smith** and many other officials eventually culminated in the planning and construction of the facility, which is largely heated and cooled by solar energy, and which is staffed with a personnel in touch with the world of research, including the Solar Energy Research Institute set up by the Federal Government at Golden, Colorado, near Denver.

THE

Michael Noland, originally in charge of the facility, was "promoted" to the position of deputy director of the facility at Golden. And Jerry Bradley's crew is "hard at it."

The Boulder City Bicentennial Committee established as one of many projects for 1976 the accumulating of plans and materials for contents of a cornerstone for the building. Grand Lodge officers officiated along with University and city officials and others between the building and the battery of flat collectors to the south on January 9, 1977.


Our Senators and Congressman have been contacted repeatedly through the years regarding possible federal help for solar research, and private companies far and wide are working toward the "break through" which will make use of heat from the sun more and more practical.

The 1977 Damboree theme pertained to the "energy," instigated partly by the fact that Boulder City is now in the forefront with the ultimate solution to power shortage, as well as center for hydroelectric power and, most important, human brain power and human - organization - power.

As coal often contaminates the air, nuclear energy bring fear of waste - excess, and gaso-LEAN supply grows expensive ... humanity world - wide will harness not only the winds, and certain of the rivers, possibly the tides, but ultimately more and more of that God - given free sun - ray energy, which human ingenuity and combined effort is destined to harness.

How Boulder City Produces This Damboree Without Admission Fees

In 1966 when I saw my first DAMBOREE the most amazing thought was How can a small town (about 5,000 people then) put on a patriotic, all - day celebration like this at no cost to the spectators? (Regarding the booths, see below.) With increasing involvement in the years that have followed, it has become clear that this is truly a ctitizens production. That is where the magic lies. Practically everyone in town, and some from far away, puts in a little bit and the result is one of the grandest, most patriotic, most complete Independence Day celebrations to be found anywhere.

It has been suggested that in writing this I will offend some, since their names may not be mentioned. We have tried to "cover all the bases" elsewhere in this edition, and all that can be said in that regard is that any sins of omission are not intentional. Your scribe is only human and on this eve of going to print any errors of commission or omission are hereby sincerely regretted.

HOW THE MIRACLE IS ACCOMPLISHED

First of all comes the planning of the production by the sponsoring organizations -- the duties laid on the various volunteer committees -- this takes place several months before DAMBOREE Day. Their work continues until the last spark of the last rocket falls, and through cleanup and reports during the days following.

The souvenir program

you are reading is made possible by all the people who purchased ads in it. From the fine business people with full page ads through to those with business cards, to widows and

survivors honoring folks in the Memory Garden. That includes a lot of people -- they all helped. Further, this program, in spite of the money raised to print it, would not be published without the untiring professional assistance of Boulder **City News Editor Bill** Harbour and his ever ready assitant, Teddy Fenton. They have come to our last - minute rescue and produced. Speaking of rescues, a gal named Jan, my ever lovin' "Brown - eyes," also was ready, willing, and, thank goodness, able.

Then we come to the Parade. Consider all the volunteer effort it took to create that spectacle .. the entry forms, the letters, the announcers' scripts, the lineup ... From fancy floats through decorated vehicles and on to decorated bicycles -- all represent a lot of effort.

Some people can be identified, like the business men in the Industrial Park – Fisher Pen Co., Carse Engineering, The Boat House, Joe Koenig, Mini - Storage, Big John's Auto Wrecking, Vogue Ski and A&M Marine – who provided the trophies and ribbons for the Parade winners. They deserve thanks and recognition.

How about the participants and the planners for the Independence Day Ceremonies? Try to imagine the planning, writing, and presonal hours of those who served us there.

Who can adequately thank the Musicians Union and their Transcription and Recording Fund for a concert such as we enjoy at noon?

There are 21 community, non - profit organizations here today who operate the booths on the Midway, starting with the sorority chapter pancake breakfast and ending with the Elks B-B-Q supper. The Midway is the only place the

public can spend money if it desires, but everyone is glad to because we always get good home - cooked food, drinks or other refreshment and entertainment at a reasonable price. Also, we know that every cent of profit made by these groups goes for some worthy cause, such as various charities, scholarship funds, local athletic and social services. There is no personal profit here -- only a vast amount of personal effort by individual members of those organizations.

The afternoon of games and contests arranged by the City Recreation Department certainly is an ideal demonstration of a community and many, many of its citizens getting together for a clean, wholesome, home town celebration. When the **Recreation** Department puts this together it is more than a day's work. A lot of time, preparation and dedication goes into it.

The All - Star ball game, the Savings Bond drawing by the Hostesses -- all of these are made possible by many hours of work by the people involved, from players to committee members, to Bond ticket salesmen.

Finally, to cap the climax -- the fireworks spectacular. As you and I watch and enjoy, think of the JAYCEES and their months of preparation, plans, and procurement

of necessary materials. Think of the manual labor needed to prepare the pyro - technics for ignition. Then consider the fund - raising done to be able to pay for the "rockets bursting in air." Contributing groups include City of Boulder City, Recreation Assn., Rotary, KPs and Pythian Sisters, Beta Sigma Phi Council, Firemen, BPO Elks, and American Legion. Many unidentified individuals gave support every dollar helps and is appreciated. It is not too late to help.

We would be remiss if we didn't recognize the complete cooperation of the City Administration the always willing help of the Public Works Department, the waiving of certain fees and water and power supply by the City Council, the splendid program of games and contests by the Recreation Department, and the early - rising City employees on a holiday to line the downtown streets with the Stars and Stripes.

It is not possible to identify all of those whose efforts and contributions make the DAMBOREE possible. We have been able to identify a few and, using them as an example, try to say thanks to all.

In the end the real reason it all comes together are the people of the sponsoring organizations -- American Legion Post No. 31 and BPO Elks Lodge 1682. These people, their wives, their families and their friends, members or not, have invested hours, days and weeks of toil that cannot be understood unless you would be able to follow them through the past months. No one can ever ade-

quately thank them except by supporting the DAMBOREE, enjoying the DAMBOREE, and working together toward our next 30 home town Independence Day celebrations.

The bringing together of over 75,000 boys into one great, gigantic, nationwide program and then getting them back home again safe and sound, imbued with a more thorough understanding of American ideals and principles, is a problem The American Legion solves each year in the American Legion Baseball program. These boys are brought together in an activity designed to teach practical and concrete lessons in sportsmanship and citizenship through the playing of America's own game of Baseball. The basic principle which underlies this program is the indisputable self - evident truth that Organized and Directed play molds Character.

Legion Baseball has become one of the major activities of the Americanism program because it offers many possibilities for teaching lessons in citizenship, while at the same time it provides an outlet for the restless summer energy found in youth. Such qualities as loyalty, respect for the rules, fair play, courage and physical fitness are essential to the proper development of the American Boy.

American Legion Baseball became a national program by action of the National Convention in Omaha, Nebraska, in 1925, and the first national tournament was held in 1926.

On February 14, 1928, the National and American Leagues of professional baseball agreed to underwrite the national program for \$50,000. In 1934, during the peak of the depression, the major league support was withdrawn and the program was supported by six of the country's large newspapers and one major oil company. In 1935 the major leagues again came in the fold and contributed \$20,000 to the program, this support continuing through the 1947 season of play. At the joint Major League meeting in December 1947, the directors again agreed to underwrite the Legion Baseball program for \$50,000, and this same action has been taken each year through 1953. In 1954 the figure was increased to \$60,000. The contribution swelled to \$75,000 in 1969.

The support by professional baseball has returned tremendous dividends. Many American Legion Baseball players are now active in major leagues, while estimated hundreds of others are on the rosters of minor league clubs.

Approximately 3,500 Legion Baseball teams enter competition each year. In addition, many thousands of teams, American Legion - sponsored or supervised, played on the nation's sandlots, giving more the 75,000 boys Legion Baseball experience.

Forty - eight continental departments and, in spite of the distance barrier, the departments of Alaska and Hawaii annually enter national competition. The Panama Canal Zone and Puerto Rico are also represented.

When the department champions are declared the national organization takes over and con-

ducts 8 regional tourneys. The regional winners then compete in the National Finals to decide the national Legion

Baseball championship. All national tournaments are played as double elimination events, with the national champion receiving a trip to the World Series played between the National and American League winners.

All our Boulder City delegates are members of the National Honor





Energy Conservation

Thursday, June 29, 1978

Energy conservation has emerged as one of the most logical ways to help bridge the gap between the nation's demand for energy and its available supply. Here in Boulder City, the **Bureau of Reclamation** has been actively involved in an effective energy conservation program aimed at reducing waste and increasing efficiency. Mr. Michael Roluti, an electrical engineer for the Bureau, is currently responsible for the energy conservation program. Mr. Roluti was appointed as the. energy conservation management coordinator by Regional Director, Manuel Lopez, Jr. During the course of the conservation program, many energy saving actions have been implemented. An effective employee awareness program was started. This was done by presenting facts and posing attitudinal questions in each issue of our Regional Personnel Bulletin. Also, several pamphlets and meaningful one-page fact sheets from the Federal Energy Administration and other agencies and-or organizations are distributed on a periodic basis to all employees. Occasional letters of reminder are directed to all employees about

carpooling guidelines. We also seek employee support in the conservation program and we hope to implement new conservation actions due to this program.

This year approximately 7,000 square - feet of insulation was added to the administration building. Also, reflective coating was added to windows where old coating was no longer useful. Lighting in all regional office buildings was checked, and meets federal lighting standards. We have identified to the Department of Energy, the Lower **Colorado Dams Project** warehouse which could serve as a demonstration project for solar - heating technology.

Part of the program is a monitoring system to permit evaluation of the conservation action taken and to show where further actions are needed. Actual utility and fuel usages are used and compared to the projected goals of the program.

We have had a great deal of employee cooperation, dedication, and commitment to the program. The results obtained thus far in the Bureau energy conservation program has demonstrated that we can make significant reduction in our energy consumption.





You can get voter information and register to vote without any charge.


If you're a Senior Citizen you will find that the Girl Schouts have arranged for you to rest confortable in their building, next to the Midway, away from the heat and with cool water available.




