Oh -- For The Good Old Days--Of Our Own School Boards

Those of us who have been around Boulder and Henderson for quite awhile will react favorably to School Board Member Janet Sobel's attempt to get the legislature to allow he small communities to have their own school boards -- as

We've all lived thru the modernization program of uniting all the boards we used to have into one ... we've given it a chance and it has failed in at least one respect ... that of giving the parent, the school teacher, the PTA group input into running schools for the purpose of properly giving our kids just plain good reading, writing and arithmetic.

In the old days when Lyal Burkholder was chief of the Henderson schools and Elbert Edwards was chief of the Boulder schools, both of these-talented men were home towners and were always answerable from day to day to the operation's and the trials and tribulations of problems that always came up.

In those days, the parents in each community were as close to the schools as their kids were ... and if corrections or advice or help was needed, the parents got the job done right

And it was an honor for any local citizen to be elected to the local school board. The field of candidates was always a full one, each with a campaign plan, each with followers, and the resultant elections were as closely watched as are the city council elections now. In fact, this is all we got left of home rule .. city council elections and possibly the legislature and county commission seat.

With education of our children the most important to each parent, it naturally follows that each parent wants to make sure the kids are getting all the knowledge they can get to make them ready for what comes next.

Burkholder and Edwards always stayed in tune with the parents and the school board whom the parents elected. In several cases, the community would rise up and change faces on the board if members got arbitrary on issues.

We have learned with the experience of the one - county, one - board system that we're far removed, our voice is but one in many and the business is so much to handle that meetings have little time to take up the human element of education.

Multi - million dollar bond issues have been passed and these, of course, had to be because of the growth of Vegas, but there was no need for Boulder and Henderson to have a part of the whole picture. Much of Boulder's money to run its schools came from the government because there is a special fund Uncle Sam has for areas where federal employees' children need to be subsidized school - wise. Now the county board takes that money and may be spending it in Parumph or North Vegas, for all we know.

Funding in Henderson came from the same federal sources and there is supplemental help all school boards get from the loot the gaming industry spins off in state taxes.

We don't know how far Janet Sobel will get in her try at the legislature ... but we sure feel that parents should alert themselves on the facts; know that local boards will put them closer to the scene of action .. and enable any citizen to have a voice in the education of their children.

A letter to Jim Gibson or Jack Jeffrey or Nash Sena, directed to them in care of the state legislature, will let them know how you feel. This column will let them know how this newspaper feels. You're the ones they'll listen to.

Council To Discuss Garbage Rates

Black Mountain Disposal Service, has requested a 25 cent per month increase in their rates for collecting garbage in the City of Henderson, and a meeting to discuss the rates will be held Mon. at 7 p.m. by the City Council.

Approved for the increase to be effective by April 1, has been requested by Alfred Isola, president of the company which also does business as Silver State Disposal Co., Disposal Transportation Inc., Clark Sanitation, and Henderson Disposal Service, Inc.

Isola said that for the past three-and-a-half years they have effectuated economies without requesting increases in garbage rates while the cost of living has increased by 22.7 per cent from Oct. 1, 1975 to Nov., 1978.

The garbage company, in order to conserve costs of operation, has standardized garbage pickup days, both morning and afternoon shifts, to contiguous graphical locations in order to better utilize equipment and personnel, Isola said.

Other ways of economizing have also been installed, however, Isola said net income has decreased by 35 per cent despite an increase of gross revenues.

Drake Street to be Changed to Kola

Only one resident on the section of Kola Street between Center Street and Major Avenue appeared before the City Council Monday night to protest a name change for that portion of Kola to Drake Street, but that resident's protest seemed sufficient to convince the council to change Drake Street to Kola instead.

Lou Pappas, a former police chief, said he had lived on Kola Street since 1971 and he objected to the expense he would have to go through the changing credit cards, drivers license, etc. if the name were to be changed.

Planning Director Bob Gordon explained that in time it was going to create a worse problem than it already has if a name change was not made.

Drake Street, which runs just one block along beside the Henderson Boys' Club, was named in memory of a young man, Dennis Drake, who had done a great deal of work for the Boys' Club, and later died.

"Why not name some other street in the young man's name," asked Councilman Gary Price,

adding that with all the new streets being created in Henderson there should be one that could bear the name "Drake."

The council voted to deny the name change of Kola to Drake, then readvertise the name change of Drake to Kola, making it Kola all the way out to the foothills.

A public hearing will be held for the name change at a later date.

In other actions the council:

-- Approved a name change for a portion of Center Street as it exists from the Boulder Highway south across the Union Pacific railroad to Horizon Drive to Mona Lane.

-- Approved a name change for Perth Street to Parawan due to the similarity of sound to Firth which is crossed by Perth in Sec. 4.

-- Approved the vacation of a 20 ft. wide strip 300 ft. in length on the westerly side of Crestway.

-- Approved the vacation of a portion of right-of-way on Wagon Wheel, ten ft. on the north side and ten ft. on the south side.

-- Approved a planned unit residential development in Camarlo Valley consisting of approximately 72 lots on 5.7 acres in a R-3

Regional Planning Council Supported By Henderson

The Henderson city council, affirming the importance of the Regional Planning Council, apporoved the operations budget for the 1979-80 year for \$186,316.


According to Ray Lamb, executive director of the regional planning council, the budget reflects three funding sources. A total of \$115,316 would be provided by the planning council; \$53,000 from the Department of Housing and urban Development; and \$18,000 from the census bureau and local users.

Funding for staff is administered by Clark County, a member entity, and so the CCRPC staff is part of the county governmental system,

in that they are guided by the county personnel code and receive all benefits and obligations of county employees. Salaries are based on similar job classifications for county personnel and the fringe benefits, such as retirement, insurance, vacation and sick leave are also tied to the county personnel system.

Lamb told the council the council was set up to be funded from county taxes, however, he said other funding probably would be

Councilman Phil Stout said he felt the council was important and should be supported by 'the member cities.

Hunting and Fishing License Requirements

According to Nevada law, aliens are considered nonresidents for hunting and fishing privileges regardless of the length of time they have lived in the

"Only a citizen of the United States who has resided continuously in the State of Nevada for a minimum of six months may legally purchase a resident hunting, fishing or trapping license", said a spokesman for the Department of Fish and Game. All others must have a nonresident license before they can hunt, fish or trap in the state.

The only exception to the six-month residency requirement is for servicepermanently assigned to duty in Nevada, their spouses and dependents under the age of 21. They may purchase resident licenses immediately upon submission of proof of permanent assignment in the state.

Residents of Nevada serving in the Armed Forces of the United States and not stationed in Nevada may purchase resident hunting or fishing licenses at a cost of two dollars for each such

All persons in the field while hunting, fishing or trapping, must have the appropriate license in their possession and exhibit it upon the demand of any officer authorized to enforce the Fish and Game laws. Five Break Records in

"Records were set in five of the 27 categories of different native and introduced exotic species of fish. They are: a 53 pound two ounce striped bass taken from the Colorado River by Vernon Wells of Henderson; a one pound 10 ounce bluegill from Honeywell Pond by Larry Parker of Yerington; a 15 ounce arctic grayling caught from Desert Creek By George Delich of Carson City; a 27 pound N orthern Pike taken in Comins Lake by Kelly Maloperdos of east Ely; and 10 pound walleye caught in Rye Patch Reservoir by Mrs. Ken Darrah of Reno", reports Bob Sumner, Staff Fisheries Specialist who oversees the annual program.

Each of the five individuals will receive a trophy plaque engraved with their names and the fish's vital statistics.

"During 1978, we received 137 entries of fish that matched or exceeded minimum weight requirements set in the program. In addition to the five state records, 17 entries established new individual lake stream records," Sumner said.

Those who catch and enter the largest fish during the year in each of the 27 categories receive special golden trophy fish certificates. There will be 17 of these certificates awarded this year.



scraps of lace and embossed pictures. Then, with samples in hand, she visited stationery shops in New York and Boston and got \$5,000 in orders!

She quickly got together a staff of young women and setting them to work cutting and sticking together paper, fabrics, lace hearts. flowers and cupid bows. Most of Miss Howlands creations were expensive, up to \$5. or \$10 and even more. Several examples are preserved

in the Hallmark Cards Historical Collection in Kansas City, Missouri.

New ideas about design and modern printing processes make today's valentines very different from Miss Howland's time. But the red - and designs using flowers and hearts, are still seen everywhere. And the message of lving and caring, "Be My Valentine" - is one people never tire of hearing.



In a separate agreement, Johnny Mitchell, a principal share holder of Old Tucson, has agreed in principal to "transfer to Sugarman and Alarcon in excess of 100,000 shares" of OldTucson common and to establish a voting trust to assure the two men receive voting control of more than 50 percent of the company's outstanding common stock.

The company's capitalization authorizes 10 million common shares, of which 898,770 are issued.



Nevada Ranks First in Local Gov't Employees

Nevada has more local government employees (per 10,000 of population); than any other state in the union. The figures come from the U.S. Department of Commerce and are for October of 1977. Based on a state population of 633,000. Nevada had 576.9 state and local employees per 10,000 of population. State government employees were 167 (placing Nevada 22nd); local employees number 410 (placing Nevada first) and the combination placed Nevada third. behind Alaska and Wyom-

As might be expected, 41.64% of the state and local employees are in the field of education.

The total number of state and local government employees was 36,518 and in October of 1977 it required \$40,314,000., plus fringe benefits, to pay their wages. That computes out to an average monthly wage of \$1,104. for each employee.

With the addition of sophisticated equipment, and the "economies of scale" one might expect that in the past eight years or so, the number of employees per 10,000 of population would be reduced. But such is not the case. As a matter of fact, in eight years the number of full-time equivalent employees in state and local government per

increased by ten percent. The payroll for those employees has increased by 41.32% during the same period.

same period.

The problem, then, is one of declining productivity and increasing costs. It seems to take more people, doing less and being paid more, to get the same or similar results. The question then arises, are the results

good? College admissions officers and initial employers insist that young people are entering the colleges and the job market incompetent in the basic fields. We are told that high school graduates cannot read, write or do simple computations accurately. One of the most obvious failings is penmanship. Perhaps it is time to re-invent the

Palmer method.

Maybe we have missed the boat by placing so much emphasis on skills of typing and pocket calculators and neglected the teaching of the tests of reasonableness that enable people to spot errors. It doesn't do much good to teach youngsters "how to live" unless they have the ability to "make a living".



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
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

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The First Comstock Hotel

As was the case in the earlier California Gold Rush, many of the fortunes made on Nevada's Comstock Lode did not come out of the mines. Merchants, saloonmen, prostitutes, musicians, artisans and hotelkeepers all rushed across the Sierras with the miners in the 1860's and set up operations in Virginia City, Silver City and Gold

Among the earliest and most enterprising of these who followed the mercantile trade was John L. Moore of San Francisco. In March of 1860 he loaded up a wagon with \$1,600 worth of whiskey and set out for Hangtown (today's Placerville), but found the pass into the small mountain community closed by the deep snows of a late winter. Considering his options, Moore decided to go on across the mountains into Virginia City. In Sacramento he was able to hire a string of packmules and to purchase an additionalstock of rum, brandy, gin, blankets, tin plates, flour, nails and cigars.

Starting out in late March, he trailed his packtrain up over the mountains and twentyfive days later he and his gaunt, starving mules staggered out of the snowdrifts into Virginia City. As the packtrain moved up the main street. dozens of miserable, half frozen miners cheered and fired off their revolvers. Their good will soon turned to anger, however, and they grumbled impatiently as Moore slowly unloaded his mules, set up a large tent and rolled out the first carpet in Virginia City. This completed, he mounted a flag on the ridgepole, put up a sign reading "Board and Lodging" and went into business Inside, a canvas partition divided the tent into a hotel and a saloon. The battered sideboard of a wagon was mounted upon two whiskey barrels

and lanterns and candles were placed around the interior. The stock of liquor was arranged on the backbar and at a signal, the tent flaps were thrown back.

With a loud hurrah, a

mob of thirsty miners rushed into the makeshift hotel and began to order drinks. Moore had meanwhile hired a cook, rounded up a supply of bacon, potatoes, beans and coffee and begun to serve meals. Some rough tables were brought in and the tent was soon one gulping mass of miners shoveling in the food and calling for more. It was early evening when Moore opened up, but before dark he had already done \$200 worth of business. That night the hotel had thirty-six guests who paid a dollar each for a pair of blankets and a spot on the ground. A few men who could afford more luxurious accommodations slept on hay ticks. The stuffing went for fifty cents a pound that night, but the mules got in the next morning and ate it all. Wood shavings from nearby construction jobs served just as well, however, and did not appeal to the mules, so the hotel was soon back in business.

Unlike many other who squandered their new wealth on hard drink, bad women and stock market speculations. Moore plowed his profits back into his business. Hiring

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

addition, delinquent taxes of the owner can result a financial claim against real property and become an expensive problem for the unwary buyer. Tax

charges against Bell property are especially troublesome when public records fail to provide advance warning of their xistence because of some difficulty at the court house or other governmental office.

A buyer in a western state was surprised to encounter this type of hazard shortly after purchase when he received a notice calling for payment of delinquent property taxes. Previously, a title search of the public records showed the taxes to be paid.

Subsequent investigation disclosed that the taxes were erroneously paid by the pre-vious owner. Upon discovery of the error, a tax official cancelled the payment to make the taxes delin-quent—but the change was not reflected in the public records at the time of the title search.

Luckily, the buyer was protected by owner's title insur-ance issued at the time of his purchase transaction. The insuring title company paid the back taxes to save the buyer from financial loss.

Boulder High School Students Attend City Council Meeting

Some of the students at the Boulder City High School recently attended a City Council meeting as an assignment in their Government Class.

They were asked to write up their impressions of what they saw and heard.

Three of the papers are reproduced here.

January 9, 1979, I had the opportunity to at-: tend a City Council Meeting in Boulder City. Presiding over the meeting was Mayor Tobler. The three councilmen, the City Manager, and the City Attorney were seated on the platform. There was about fifty people present.

The meeting started at 7:30 p.m. with the Salute to the Flag. The Mayor welcomed the visitors and after the minutes from the last meeting were approved he asked for the agenda items.

The second item on the agenda was bid awards. In listening to the comments and questions I came to understand the procedures that the City uses when purchasing motor vehicles; how the City installs its electrical cables; how the City replaces lights on the baseball field and the cost involved; and how the telephone company operates.

The next item was "Porter Rezoning". I learned what "tabling" an item means. It means to leave it for further discussion at another time. Sometimes the Council has a workshop for these items. The workshop consists of a special meeting held for the one certain issue. This is what happened to "Porter Rezoning".

The most time was probably spent on item 4. This was the "Golf Clubhouse Course Plans." Needless to say a member of the council is a big golf fan so he had a lot to say. That issue was

also tabled. Item 5, "Land Matters", was the most confusing to me. There were eleven sub items under this topic but the only one I remember well was 5A the Airport Lease. This topic was very controversial and brought much comment from the floor. One couple jumped up and ran to the platform before they realized what they were doing-the Mayor had to tell them to sit down. After 45 minutes of this, item 5A was tabled. Item 5B thru K were explained quickly and a discussion was begun on item 6.

Within the next few minutes the rest of the 9 items on the agenda were talked over without any problems.

Upon leaving the meeting, I felt that I had a much better understanding of the workings of our City government and its operations. It also was an opportunity to meet all of the City officials.

I feel that it was quite an honor to be able to attend this City Council Meeting. It was educational and it made me feel involved. I think every citizen of Boulder

City should have this experience.

Tuesday, January 9 I attended the regular Boulder City Council Meeting, at City Hall. I concluded that there is more involvement in our city than I realized.

The meeting started out with the flag salute. With Mayor Tobler in charge and conducting he welcomed the audience, and our row of high school students. There were many familiar faces on the council board including: Mr. Andre, B.C. High Dean, Mr. Degernes (City Manager), Mr. Morris (a familiar lawyer), Mr. McEwan (a respected acquaintance of mine) a few other council members the city staff, and the press desk.

Number one on the agenda was the usual "Approval of the Agenda". Mrs. Kautz, who I believe was the secretary, read over the changes to be made to the agenda, both additions and deletions. The number two item

was entitled "Bid

Awards", six sub titles

followed. Item 2A, In-

ternal Communication System, involved a discussion of the cost to install and pay for this new telephone system. The city office's current telephone bill totalled \$760.63 per month. There were three types of systems to choose from. First a switchboard for \$1401.00 monthly, an electric telephone system for \$1054.07 monthly rental, and an offer for another system from Las Vegas Central Telephone Company for \$601.70. The council chose the Las Vegas Central bid. Item 2B for two police cars; a bid came from Las Vegas Dodge for two new cars \$14,586.00 minus \$1600.00 trade in on 2 chevy Novas. A bid from -Guadin Ford was decided on for item 2C, for a 1/2 ton 3cy. dump truck. Sunlight Electric gave the lowest bid of \$32,262.00 for an electric cable, (Item 2D) needed by the city. Floodlights for the baseball field were discussed, finally an acceptable bid was offered from Consolidated Electric \$4,902.00 Last was the turf sweeper which will be purchased from Motor Corporation. This will be for all grass areas except the cemetary and golf course.

Appeal Cap. 78-62, Porter Reasoning was listed next on the agenda. Quite a long discussion took place, involving the council and Mr. Porter of 667 Ave. A. When the discussion began to get lengthy it

was tabled. Golf Course Clubhouse Plans were submitted by J.T. Anderson Construction in a workshop meeting the previous night. The council asked that Mr. Anderson make a few changes, which he did and returned to the Council in this regular

meeting. Subject five was that of fland matters. They began talking about the airport lease that Mr. Leisburg was trying to get passed. He had a lawyer with him, this part of the meeting began to get very long, and drawn out. Items 5B and C were both tabled.


