

An Old House in Henderson Makes the News

There are many new homes coming to Henderson and that isn't news to most people.

But this week an old home. came to Henderson and that is. news for our people.

The 67-year-old home constructed in Las Vegas in 1912 for Will Beckley and his wife, Leva, arrived at its final resting place at the Southern Nevada Museum site in Henderson after a five-hour trip

from 120 South Fourth Street on Mon.

The last trip for the home began at 5 a.m. and it arrived on the site at 10 a.m., two hours/prior to the time it had been anticipated by the movers. The Beckley family, Will's son Bruce, and his daughter, Virginia Beckley Richardson, donated the house to the museum. The site where it was will be turned into a parking lot.


The route followed by the 65-ton house, which was moved by Bland-Ford Moving Co., was mapped out by Jess Bachman and Henry Curtis. who spent many hours and money from their own pockets to map the route the house would follow.

"They measured and coordinated everything," Bernard Nolan, manager of the museum said. "Bachman spent three complete

weekends mapping out the course," he said. He said the two men were a "classic example of civic minded citizen" and he wished we had more.

The moving of the house turned south on Fourth Street, then west on Carson Street past the county courthouse to Casino Center Boulevard. There it turned


The shooting was termed "justifiable" by the jury which deliberated only a few minutes, according to reports. The two officers had been



Council Postpones Action On Rezoning Applications

Two controversial re - zoning measures came before the city council Mon. night and neither was completed by council action.

A request for a rezoning of commercial property near the Albertsons market for apartment dwelling was postponed for discussion at a committee meeting next Mon. night, and a request by Halco, Inc. to rezone a development of 160 acres near Basic High School was postponed at the request of the developer.

Appoximately 30 people attended the council meeting to protest the rezoning by Halco to change from rural residential (RR) to single family residential (R - 1), multiple family residences (R - 3) and neighborhood commercial district (C - 1).

The Halco request was previously turned down by the city planning commission and J. Downey, speaking for Halco, requested the item be taken from the agenda for a period of 30 days. Downey said, "We would like time to reevaluate the project in order to possibly relieve the protests which were at the planning commission meeting." Beverly Whitehorn, of La Habra, Ca., asked to speak to the council in protest of the rezoning since she had made. the trip especially for the meeting. She said she and her husband had purchased their property to build a home where they could retire with a view of the Las Vegas Valley. She showed pictures taken by her husband of the view from their property.

changed by the applicant. In that event the matter would return to the city planning commission.

The rezoning for apartments near the Albertson's shopping center and adjacent to Manganese Park, was postponed for further discussion in committee.

"There seems to be a lot of information on this item," Councilman Phil Stout said, so he requested it be sent to committee.

The zone change has been requested by William and Sherry Blanca of Ohio. The change had been previously approved by the planners and it was later discovered there was a discrepancy in the legal advertisement. It was readvertised and sent back to the planners and was denied.

Michael Sitton, represented the Blancas and C and E Construction, said access to the property had been cut off by the sale of property in the area, making it unsuitable for commercial. Darrel Phillips, owner of the adjoining property, said he sold the property in question with the understanding that it would be commercial and he opposed the apartment zoning. Councilman Phil. Stout made a motion that the zoning change be approved with the stipulation that Tuna St. be closed as access to the apartments, that Taylor Street be improved and that sewer be extended to Boulder Highway. The motion was seconded by Councilman Gary Price. Following discussion on the matter, a motion was made to table the issue for further study.

C.B. Armstrong, Manager of Kerr-McGee Chemical Corporation's Henderson Plant, said today that about 135 employees have been on strike against the Company since midnight, April 12, when labor agreements with three unions expired.

Involved are employees represented by the International Chemical Workers Union, Local 218; International Brotherhood of Electrical Workers, Local 357; and the United Association of Plumbers and Pipefitters, Local 525.

"Future negotiating sessions between the Company and the unions have not been scheduled, but Kerr-McGee continues to be willing to work toward a mutually satisfactory settlement of the dispute," Armstrong said.

February Citation Summary

Seventy-five errant outdoorsmen paid \$6,165 in fines and forfeited bail assessments during February, according to the Nevada Department of Fish and Game.

Leading the list of prevalent violations was fishing without a valid license, with 14 anglers paying \$700 in fines and nine paying \$450 in forfeited bail. Fines and bail forfeitures averaged slightly more than \$50, five times the cost of the resident fishing license.

Fourteen were assessed a total \$2,350 in fines and bail for using prohibited trapping methods. Other common infractions included fishing prohibited methods, with seven paying \$350. Five were assessed \$250 for hunting within a prohibited area.



Dolan Springs, Arizona, is about forty miles from here, in the heart of the desert. It is a small, peaceful settlement, just beginning to grow somewhat, with water and electricity available .commensurate with - its growth. Nex

Cliff Fellows and his

wife, May, have a spread there that is almost beyond belief. With loving care they have created a fascinating desert garden spot as a setting for their home. And as we approached their home, we were amazed at the rock work that has been put into it and we learned that Cliff did all this work him-

self, with the ready assistance of May.

When they first arrived there they had a four wheel drive Ford pickup and they started traveling over all the nearby trails. When they began to realize how many multicolored rocks and stones there were they started to collect them. And as their collection grew too large to handle, Cliff built a small shed to serve as a studio and they went into the costume jewelry-business. They have many varieties of quartz, including the lovely rose quartz. petrified wood, onyx, Nevada opal, and turquoise. They not only produce

costume jewelry. but from

the many small rocks they have gathered, May, with delightful imagination, has created some most interesting decorative pieces.

They invited us inside their home and May served us coffee while we learned about their former lives and how they happened to settle down in Dolan Springs. Cliff was born in .Kan-

sas City, Missouri, grew up there, was at one time

pitcher for the Oklahoma City Indians, and then went to work at the Ford Assembly Plant. May was born in Shelbyville, Missouri, and worked at the Ford Plant, where she had charge of the cafeteria while_Cliff was employed as an analyst for the Company. They began going together and were married. They remained in Kansas City, built a home there and lived in it for about twenty years.

Then Cliff suffered a back injury which required surgery, and he retired from the plant where, except for two years in the Service, he had worked for more than thirty years. and they sold the house that had been their home

for almost twenty years. It was at that time they decided . to come west. They looked around generally, but didn't choose any particular spot. Finally they bought their land. at Dolan Springs without having seen it. However, they say they never have... regretted buying it, even before they had electricity or running water.

They both are animal lovers, and although at first they were a bit dubious about the covotes, they now accept them as beautiful animals and feed them regularly. along with quail, chipmunks and ravens - whatever birds happen to join the party. Cliff showed us a photograph of a cow, a raven and a covote enjoying their food together in harmony. And Cliff often sits with them, talking to them as they eat. May

have closed off the Reservation and one cannot enter there without a special permit - and rightly so!

Cliff says when he was in the Service his outfit was 80° p.c. Indians and as Patrol Leader he came to know and like them_very much. And he says if they liked y ou (and they liked him) they would do anything they could for you. but if you didn't earn their liking and respect they would obey orders but they wouldn't speak to you except when compell? ed to do so.

One day Cliff and May went to Window Rock and chatted with an Indian woman who was eighty years old. As they had enjoyed talking with her. they decided to go back and pick her up and take her for a ride with them.

In the Reservation they came across an Indian walking along with a small boy, and each carried a musical instrument. Cliff and May stopped to speak to them, and the Indian said. "We are practicing a. recording to send overseas". Cliff had heard that in the Tribal Council no outsider is allowed to enter, but he commented. "I'd like to hear your band". The Indian replied that although it really was for Indians only, he would take them in as his guests. So Cliff and May went with him into the Council Room, and Cliff says they had beautiful mahogany desks where the Council sat. Before the orchestra started playing the Director warned all of them not to talk or even whisper. because the recorder would pick up the slightest sound. There were old people and children playing in the band, and Cliff says the music was beautiful, and that this was one of the greatest treats they have had since they have come to know the Indians. And they were pleased to learn that two or three years ago they had an Indian band in the Rose Bowl parade. While we talked we realized how comfortable and interesting the . Fellows' home is. One wall displays paintings that May had done, and at one end of the living room was a set of shelves which held some of her choice work with stones - some of it is delicate and lovely, and some pieces have a humorous aspect - all of it is delightful. They showed me an album full of photographs of the animals and birds that have come to them for food. And as I sat on the divan, there was a See DODAN SPRINGS Cont on page 16






says Cliff can sit . with them any time, but at the approach of anybody else they immediately · disappear. At present the coyotes are missing as it is their mating time, but they'll return bringing their babies with thom.

At one time Cliff was President of the Dolan Springs Chamber of Commerce, and started a campaign to preserve what he describes as "the loveliest and largest stand of joshua trees outside the Holy Land". So far the U.S. Department of the Interior has agreed to hold this land, and has assured them it will not be included in any land sold at auction. Cliff would like to see it as a park area. including a ghost town-(White Hills) and a -magnificent overlook known as "Quartermaster Viewport", offering an- impressive view of Granite Gorge of the lower Grand Canyon. And he can direct you to these impressive spots if you've the time to

When Cliff and - May started prowling about the countyrside, they went through the gate to visit the Indian Reservation. Cliff is a great champion of the Indians and feels they have had a bad deal ever since we opened up this country. And he says they have had their-troubles in and around Dolan Springs, in that people would tramp through the Reservation, shooting holes in their water tanks and cables, so now they

go on.

the simple funeral was conducted. It wasn't a big affair; not many were there. Mickey Thomas, cement worker; Francis Stay, air tool operator; Walter Klann, concrete ... and Oliver were in the small group.

> NIG was laid to rest, his days of play and joy were done. His feats of daring and his unbridled love for the great dam and its men continued on in the hearts. and minds of all who had been fortunate enough to know him.

> The legend grew while NIG rested in an obscure grave passed by thousands of tourists each year. Few even noticed the simple slab with the letters N I G. Of those that did spot it, few

understood its significance.

Finally, a year or so ago, a simple small plaque was installed on the canyon wall directly. above the slab. It read: "NIG ... The dog that adopted a dam. Born about March 1932, died about June 1936." Actually, the date of death is incorrect ... but the senitment expressed is not.

Last summer, a Wisconsin tourist, Clarence Kailin, saw the plaque and demanded it be removed. He termed it "racist" in nature. He launched a barrage of letters which finally resulted in the simple

memorial being removed from the wall in -March of this year


Reaction was immediate. Hundreds of persons have signed a petition circulated by Betty Rovacchi requesting the plaque be returned. Letters have been written to Nevada's * representatives and Congressman.

To date, no action has been taken. Bureau of **Reclamation officials** here said plans will be made to replace the plaque with an informational sign with "revised" wording. No firm plans have yet been started to this end.




