### **Zone Change Request Denied**

A request for a zone change for Halco, Inc., from R - R (rural residence district) to R-1, (one family reisdence), R - 3, (limited multiple residence district) and C - 1 (limited or neighborhood commercial) for 160 acres in the southwest quarter of section 9 at Pueblo and Warm Springs Road on the south side was before the city council last night.

The zone change request was previously denied by the planning commission by a vote of 4-0.

There were 28 persons owning property adjacent to the area in question who appeared before the planning commission and spoke against the petition because

they purchased land in a large lot area and wanted lower density sites with the view prevelant from the slopes in the area.

There were 20 communications, telephone calls and letters in opposition. There were seven written comments or ballots in favor of the rezoning.

The commission, in voting to deny the request, stated that the view from the site was excellent and that the higher density and commercial use would be detrimental there.

Thirty separate individuals. or firms owning 62 parcels located within the notification area received notice of the public hearing.

County for the Parks and Recreation Department, for the irrigation of Black Mountain Golf course, for the irrigation of the highway medians, and the balance to irrigate 33 acres of land for agricultural purposes, land located below the BMI tailing sites.

During the study Yarme said that extensive soil tests were made of the acreage and it was found to be feasible and economically feasible to grow crops such as bermuda grass and alfalfa. "Agricultural irrigation has been used successfully on the Mormon farm where they grow alfalfa and other crops."

Secondary effluents have been used on the Paradise Valley Golf course and Winterwood has used it exclusively for 15 years without any adverse effect. "This practice is gaining a lot of popularity throughout the country," he said.

As for the medians on Boulder Highway, a pipe could be run through to irrigate the plants, trees etc. and improve the aesthetic quality of the city.

Yarme said that this plan world have the lowest costs of any of the others presented. There are several major issues which must first be considered such as salinity, acquisition of land and obtaining the water rights through the state engineer.

Step two would be the design and for the city to obtain the funding for the project. It would take about 18 months for construction and hopefully would be in use by December, 1981.

Yarme estimated the cost of the project at around \$14 million. Henderson would seek to get a federal grant for the project which would be around \$11 million, or the federal share could be higher, he said. The remaining \$3 million will have to come from the city. He also estimated it will cost around \$355,000 a year to

# Sandpipers Collect Long Course Title

Deep team strength plus first place age division, individual championships by the Mock sisters, Pam and Kim, and by John Futrell helped the Southern Nevada Sandpipers capture the Third Annual Southern Nevada Invitational long course swim meet as they more than doubled the points totaled by runnerup Las Vegas YMCA.

The Henderson based AAU swim club did best for itself in the midrange age groups being led by the Sandpipers top performer for the meet Pam Mock who scored six first places in the girls eleven and twelve year old division - in the fifty meter freestyle, one hundred free, two hundred free, one hundred backstroke and one hundred breaststroke, and in the two hundred meter individual medley. Pam also took second in the one hundred meter butterfly. Also scoring in that girls age group for the Sandpipers were Shannon Hamlin with a fifth in butterfly. another fifth in the two hundred free, fourths in the one hundred breast and in two hundred medley, and sevenths in the fifty free and one hundred free.

Toni Cerrone picked up a sixth in the fly and a sixth in the breast while collecting a fifth in the hundred back and a seventh in the two hundred medley. Courtney Parochniak had a third in the breaststroke

Ron Inman swam well in this age group collecting a fourth in the one hundred breast and a sixth in the one hundred fly while Jim McCarthy finished fifth in the two hundred free, fifth in the medley, fifth in the onehundred back, and eighth in the one hundred free for more Sandpiper points. Scott Fielden swam a seventh place in the two hundred while Billy Schrader added a sixth,

The younger boys did as well in relays scoring a first in freestyle with the quartet of Goodman, Jensen, Schubert, and Cruzen, while Parochniak replaced Cruzen on the medley and aided in winning another first for the team. Individually in the fifty fly for this age group Brian Schubert had a seventh and Rhett Brewer an eighth.

In the nine and ten year old girls division the team of Lisa Perry, Wendy Martin, Rachel Torrez, and Lorrie Klosowski took second in the freestyle relay and

third in the medley relay while on the boy's side John Wouldridge, Todd Drietzler, Patrick Cruzen, and Chris Thongborisuite took second in freestyle and another second in medley with Morgan Bunker swimming a leg. Todd Drietzler added a fourth in the fifty fly and an eighth in the fifty back. The squad of Norman

Ballard, Jed Busch, Paul Effertz, and Bobby Werbicky picked up firsts in both their eleven and twelve year old age division relays while Norman himself got fifth in the one hundred back and Bobby an eighth at that distance in the breaststroke.

The open division for boys and girls scoring was wide spread for both sides of the Sandpiper lineup. In the one hundred breast Becky Bond placed seventh as well as in the two hundred breast. Anna Walls took a fifth in the fifteen hundred free while Geo Schrader placed seventh in the two hundred back and took the same spot in the two hundred fly.

Mari Barlow was by far the tops among the older Sandpiper girls with her first in the fifteen hundred free, fourth in the 400 I.M., thirds in the one hundred fly and two hundred free, an eighth in the one hundred back, second for the two hundred fly, fourth in the four hundred freestyle, fifths in the one hundred free and two hundred back, and sixth in the two hundred medley.

Cooking over coals, or grilling, is a dry heating method. Since it adds no moisture to soften and tenderize the meat during cooking, only cuts that are naturally tender can be prepared this way

Unfortunately, however, only 22 percent of a steer fits that description and, therefore, is suitable for barbecuing. The small supply and increased demand for outdoor dining keeps them priced at a premium this time of year.

Just check the price of cuts from the rib, short loin and sirloin areas to get the idea! The remaining 78 percent of the steer offers consumers an economical alternative. These cuts may be less tender, but there are more of them. Come summer, their sales drop in

favor of the more tender and. grillable cuts. With an even greater supply on hand due to less demand, these cuts (especially from the chuck and round) are frequently on special, and are an extra-good buy.

#### **Delicious results**

Now that you've learned which cuts are more economical, make certain that they come to the picnic table as deliciously tender and juicy as the costly cuts. Doing that will give you steak at stew prices! First, take a cooking tip from

If your bike has been standing for a while, the tires will need air. It's best to use a foot pump and pressure gauge to avoid over-inflation

• Pick up the front and then the back of the bike, and give the wheels another spin. If a wheel is wobbling from side to side, or if the spokes are loose, the wheel needs to be trued.

Truing wheels is something of an art that requires skill and patience, so take your bike to a reputable shop, like a Schwinn **Bicycle Dealer** 

· Check the brakes. The secret of good brakes is more often in the rims than in the brakes, because wobbly, lumpy rims prevent the brakes from working properly.

If the rims are fine, check the brakes by squeezing the levers firmly and then releasing them. They should snap back with a good solid feel.

If the brakes are sluggish, a cable may be binding in the housing. Check to make sure there are no sharp kinks in the cycling!
