Help For Park Improvements

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Over \$100,000 in federal assistance has been applied for by the City of Henderson for park improvements, and the applications will go before the Regional Planning Council Thursday.

The city Parks and Recreation Department has applied for Morrell Park improvements at \$62,500 for federal funding and \$62,500 for the applicant, and \$37,500 for Wells Park improvements.

The city has also requested a federal grant for the police department of Henderson for civil

liability training for police officers for \$1,800 from the federal government, \$480 from the applicant and \$120 from the state.

The Morrell Park improvements would include increasing shade


and picnic areas around existing maintenance restroom buildings, three additional acres of irrigated turf with landscaping, one so' all

fencing, and redoing the two

existing tennis courts and add two new lighted courts.

The Wells Park improvements include upgrading existing picnic areas, additional picnic tables. drinking fountains, and barbecues. resurfacing and striping the existing asphalt basketball courts. install some horseshoe pits. construction of two lighted tennis courts and some additional irrigation system, turfing and landscape plantings.

480 Acre Camarlo Park Wins Approval

Special Legislative Report

By Senator James I. Gibson

The most far reaching legislation passed by the 60th session was the package of bills which provided substantial tax revision and relief effective this July. You will be hearing about this package as time goes by and especially prior to next election when question 6 which has to do with property tax reduction will be on the ballot. The legislature's tax package will be repealed if question 6 passes the second time so it will be very important for the citizen to understand just what each approach does for the taxpayer. In this article I shall present information on two of the bills of the legislature's tax package. We will pursue

other bills in the future. Two of the key bills in the Legislature's package were Senate Bill 204 and Assembly 616. They will be discussed today.

S.B. 204 and A.B. 616, which have been signed by the Governor, constitute a comprehensive tax reform package that provides for substantial tax relief for Nevadans through the property tax and sales tax and places limitations on future growth of state and local expenditures. This package provides for across the - board property tax relief for all property owners by lowering the maximum combined tax rate, state funding to replace the taxes lost, exemption of sales tax on food, additional property tax relief if state revenues exceed expectations, limits on requested state expenditures and limited local government expenditure.

Across - the - Board Tax Relief

S.B. 204 statutorily reduces the maximum constitutional \$5.00 property tax rate to \$3.64 on each \$100 of assessed valuation. This new rate is the maximum for all public purposes and cannot be exceeded. This rate reduction is accomplished by repealing the requirement that counties contribute 11 cents for the state's Title XIX (Medicaid) program, by the state replacing \$1.00 of the current \$1.50 school levy through the Distributive School Fund and by the state giving up its 25 cent levy. This will save the taxpayers approximately \$169 million in property taxes during the next biennium. The bill also exempts household

personal property which will save the homeowners an additional \$7,500,000 over the biennium. No local government will lose any portion of their tax rate because of the reduced statutory limit since the state replaces the entire amount of property tax lost due to reducing the rate.

The \$1.00 share of the current school levy will be replaced by eliminating the current 70 cent mandatory levy and reducing the current 80 cent optional levy for schools to 50

Trigger Additional Tax Relief

S.B. 204 provides that in fiscal year 1980-81 even greater property tax reliet may be granted if state sales and gaming revenues exceed expectations next year. The revenue produced by these two taxes for the first three quarters of FY 1979-80 will be compared with the first three quarters of FY 1978-79 and if these two taxes exceed their 1978-79 levels at that point by 12 percent or more, additional relief will be triggered. This relief is accomplished by adjusting the allowable school rate of 50 cents up or down and the state replacing the equivalent amount of money through the school fund. Conversely, if available state revenues are lower than projected, a smaller amount of tax relief will be granted.

Growth of State Government

S.B. 204provides that the Governor's Excutive Budget submitted for approval to future legislatures must be limited in growth by state population and inflation. Under this proposal, the 1975-77 biennium becomes the expenditure base and increases are allowed from July 1, 1974, for both population growth of the state and inflation.

Growth of Local Government

S.B. 204 provides for an expenditure "cap" on all levels of local governments that receive taxes or license fees. These limitations are tied to the local entities' current year budget as a base and allowances are made for population increases and a modified inflation factor. Population increases are those from

Mr. Tracht is survived by his wife, Violet Tracht of Boulder City; two sons, Kenneth Tracht of Las Vegas and Lawrence Tracht of Sumner, Washington; and four grandchildren.

In lieu of flowers the family has requested that donations may be made to the Heart Fund.

Judge to Receive Increase in Salary

Municipal Judge Jim Jensen was expected to receive an increase in salary from \$14,000 per year to \$16,500 per year following city council action last night.

The raise would give Jensen a 7 per cent raise for the next three years, with \$17,655 for 1980; \$18,891 for 1981, and commencing on the first day of July, 1982, the municipal Judge's salary would be \$20,000 annually.

The Judge had requested an increase in pay to \$20,000 because of the increased work load.

Four Juveniles Injured In Rollover

Four juvenile boys were injured in a traffic accident Sunday evening at approximately 8:10 p.m. when the pickup truck in which they were riding went out of control, left the road and rolled about three times.

The accident occurred on Mission Drive about 1/4 mile west of Arrowhead Trail. The truck was driven by a 16 year old boy.

Three boys were ejected from

the bed of the truck, police reported. Two of the boys suffered minor injuries and the third was reported to be in critical condition and underwent surgery at Southern Nevada Memorial Hospital for a severe head injury.

The fourth boy, riding in the cab of the truck, suffered injuries but refused treatment at SNMH.

An 18-hole golf course and 480 acres of planned unit development which includes a shopping center and condominiums, was approved Wed. night by the city planning commission for Camarlo Park, Inc.

Single family homes are now under construction by Camarlo Park on Sunset Road on the south side of the highway. The new development would take place on the north side of the Sunset Road.

According to information provided for the planning commission, there will be 1600 units constructed, with 216 acres for condominiums.

The zone change which was before the planning commission, will go before the city council July 2. The Camarlo Park development is near the Paradise Valley or Green Valley development in Henderson.

Commission **Leaves Door** Open to Alarcon

The Nevada Gaming Commission concurred with the recommendation of the Nevada State Gaming Control Board when they denied Gabriel Alarcon, Jr., a Mexican newspaper manager-businessman, as an investor in Westworld.

He was told by the commissioners that he could reapply when his bookkeeping had been converted to the extent that investigators can trace his finances.

Alarcon was informed that although the commission encourages foreign investments, commissioners cannot use a different standard for assessing his finances than that which is applied to United States applicants for gaming licenses.

The week before the Gaming Control Board, meeting in Carson City, gave a recommendation to deny a gambling license for Alarcon because his financial records were not -up to U.S. standards.

The millionaire seeks to invest \$1 million in the Westworld theme

Television producer Burt Sugerman of Los Angeles has already been approved as the majority owner of Westworld's parent company. David Gotterer, a partner in the certified public accounting firm of Mason and Company in New York, was approved Thursday by the commission as a director and one percent owner.

The commission also approved by unanimous vote, the application by Westworld for a nonrestricted gaming license for blackjack.

before the base year to the year in which the new budget is being prepared as certified by the Governor. If a local government disputes its estimated population, they may appeal to the Nevada Tax Commission, whose decision is final. Increases for growth for special districts may be based on indices of other than population with the approval of the Department of Taxation. The inflation factor is 80 percent of the last five years average increase or decrease. This factor will change each year as the oldest year is dropped off and the newest year added to the Consumer Price Index.

The bill provides that the "cap" may be overridden by the governing body of the local government to meet unforseen situations that threaten life or property, and situations not under control of the local government when approved by the Legislative Commission. In addition, an override may be obtained for new programs or increased spending by a majority vote of the people. Such an approval expires after two years.

Growth of School Districts

S.B. 204 provides for a limitation on the amount of property taxes a school district may levy. Under the tax relief plan, the state will replace the existing 70 cent mandatory tax levy and 30 cents of the optional 80 cent levy. The amount of taxes that can be derived from the remaining 50 cent levy is limited in growth. The average levy from this 50 cent tax for the previous three assessment years becomes the base from which the allowable levy is calculated. The base is adjusted for changes in enrollments and inflation. The enrollment adjustment measures the change from the same three years that constitute the base to the current year. The inflation factor if 80 percent of the last five years average increase or decrease. The base levy, the base enrollment and the inflation factor all change yearly as

oldest year of each is dropped and a newer year added. These moving factors in the formula have the effect of reflecting more current conditions in the calculation of the allowable levy.

If greater or lesser tax relief is triggered in the second year of the biennum, the limitation on the school levy will also change since the cap will always be on the levy that is available to the school districts. If, for instance, in 1980-81 state revenues exceed expectations and an additional 10 cents of the 80 cent optional school levy is replaced by the 'state the limitation would change to one on a 40 cent levy since schools would only be allowed to levy that amount.

Appropriations

S.B. 204 contains appropriations to the Distributive School Fund to fund the cost to the state of the property tax

relief program. These ap- & propriations include the trigger amounts.

Expiration of Tax Relief

S.B. 204 and A.B. 616 both provide that the property tax relief and exemption of sales tax on food shall expire by limitation should Question 6 pass in 1980.

A.B. 616), taxpayers in Nevada will realize tax savings estimated at \$106 million in 1979-80 and up to \$137 million in 1980-81, depending on state revenues.

In addition, expenditure limitations may produce additional savings to Nevada taxpayers in many areas of the state.

Force Band Plans O'Callaghan Con cert

The Stephen Groesbeck band, a local group, has requested to use O'Callaghan Park to hold a concert on Sat., July 28 from 8 p.m. to 12 p.m. and the request was approved by the city parks and recreation board.

The matter was to be presented to the city council last night at a recessed meeting.

Groesbeck assured the board and staff that the facility would be cleared at 11:30 p.m. so any litter could be picked up by the band prior to the midnight curfew. There would be two reserve police officers present.

The recreation board also

discussed the possibility of a sports complex which would alleviate the scheduling problems experienced this year.

With a sports complex revenue could be generated from concession sales, it was pointed out. Sparks, Nev., has a sports facility and as much as \$10,000 a year in revenue is generated from just the sale of beer.

A motion was made by John Holman and seconded by Joe Phillips to recommend to the city council that a sports complex be seriously considered, that siting and funding be studied and expedited at the most reasonable opportunity.

Energy Program Presented at Rotary

"The United States has six percent of the world population yet we use 30 percent of the total energy. It seems hard to believe that such a small group uses that much," Bill Vorheis, an engineer at Kerr-McGee Chemical Company told fellow members of the Henderson Rotary Club.

Vorheis credited the initiative and drive of the American people to the large use of energy.

The area resources of energy are "finite," not "infinite" and becoming more difficult to find. We will have to look for alternate sources of energy such as nuclear fuel and coal, he suggested.

"Coal is the most extensive fossil fuel that exists and we have a 200 to 300 year supply."

A resolution establishing a new, higher salary range for the city officials, was expected to be approved by the city council last night.

Included in the resolution, which City Manager Bob Campbell said in some cases will not increase the salary at this time, were the city manager, director of public safety, city attorney, director of public works, director of parks and recreation, director of finance, director of planning, director of personnel, and city

Campbell said some of the appointed officials of the city are already receiving a higher salary than the beginning salary suggested in the new resolution, but the higher salary schedule will allow for raises.

The salary ranges estab-

lished are as follows: City Manager - \$31,000 to

\$36,000.

Director of Public Safety -

\$27,000 to \$32,000. City Attorney - \$27,000 to \$32,000.

Public Works Director -\$27,000 to \$32,000.

The director of parks and recreation, director of finance and director of planning, personnel and city clerk would have as their salary range from \$22,000 to

\$27,000. The department heads salaries are reviewed annually by the city manager.

The "spark plug" of the Boulder City Chamber of Commerce is changing career fields.

Nell Olson, the Chamber's Executive Director since 1971, will leave her present position on July 1. Her warm and winning ways will be difficult to replace.

Nell first became associated with the B.C. Chamber in February of 1971 as a part time secretary. Her enthusiasm and talents for the vital Chamber position were obvious and it wasn't long before the Board offered her the manager's slot in June of that year.

At that time, the Chamber roster listed approximately 55 members.

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The treasury hovered around \$4,000. The Chamber office was located in Gilleard's Laundry building on Nevada Highway.

How things have changed. Today, thanks in large part to Nell's vitality and imagination, the membership roll has swelled to 179 and the working treasury has more than doubled. Visitors and others seeking Chamber information may do so in the modern Geodesic Dome Chamber office finished in January of 1976.

When one thinks- "Chamber." one thinks of Nell. Her accomplishments are many. Certainly one of her biggest successes was the involvement of the Chamber and the community in Bob Banner's Almost Anything Goes television productions; an involvement which brought Boulder City national fame.

The initial telephone call was made to Nell's office. At that time no one knew anything at all of the planned production or of what was involved in the way of requirements, etc. The answer had to be given in a hurry. Nell saw the possibilities. A hurried telephone canvass of Chamber Board members gained an O.K and Boulder City was launched on what was to be one of the most rewarding and fun-filled episodes in its history.

The original Superstar Team was chosen. On a hot weekend in the spring of 1974, the team and a few





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
