

City's Future Horizons Explored By Campbell

A few days ago this space contained a "State of the City" message detailing some of the major endeavors of Henderson City Government during the past year. We are now be-

ginning a new fiscal year for the City, as well as welcoming two new members of the City Council. In the next few paragraphs I would like to very briefly discuss some of the major issues and concerns that are facing Henderson as a Community.

SEWAGE TREATMENT

Utilities that are provided as a municipal service are in basically very good condition with one major exception: sewage treatment. Our two present sewage treatment plants are old -- built in 1942 and 1958 --

and can no longer provide the level of treatment that is required under current pollution standards. For the past three years a "201 Study" has been conducted to determine the least-costly method of meeting these new requirements, and the study is now nearly complete. It calls for

construction of new treatment facilities, and an expanded program of using the effluent on highway medians, golf courses, and parks. This issue will be thoroughly discussed in the next several months, and at sometime in the next year or so will probably be placed before the voters. It is

a situation where we find the community in need of a vital but fairly unglamorous type of project.

It is time the big land holdings of the power allottees in Boulder City let lose their excessive holdings for public use. They're doing it ... at a time when prices are high and they'll make a bundle by it. We urged they do it back when the city was being started. No way, they said.

The same goes with BMI in Henderson ... holding the largest pieces of good in-city or

Local Cab Drivers Complain to DA

The Henderson Taxi Company and Whittlesea-Blue Cab are being investigated by the Clark County District Attorney allegedly for illegal withholding of weekly driver earnings.

According to the chief investigator for the District Attorney's Office, Beecher Avants, a "complete investigation" is being conducted into the two companies on complaints alleging the companies have been deducting certain wages from drivers and not providing them with itemized deductions.

Henderson Taxi driver Don Onorato and Whittlesea driver Bob Volin filed complaints last Thursday and additional complaints were filed Monday.

The two companies are involved in labor disputes between the Teamsters Union and Jim Bell, operator of both companies.

Henderson drivers claim Bell has been charging them

50 cents a gallon for gasoline since October 1977 with no record appearing on their weekly earnings.

Whittlesea drivers claim they are being charged 75 cents a day for various health and welfare benefits but Bell has failed to list the deductions on their paychecks.

According to Avants the companies have to give the employees some sort of written notification. "Drivers have been claiming they can't use the deductions for IRS purposes. They can't show that they have spent it."

Avants said he would be talking with company officials soon and could know by the end of the week if any charges will be filed.

Bell claims he is doing nothing wrong by making the deductions and not reporting them.

He said it had been done all over the country for years and if it was wrong, it would have been brought out by now.

Second Valley Bank for Henderson?

According to the State Banking Commission, an application from Valley Bank of Nevada to build a branch office on the corner of Sunset Road and Green Valley Parkway is pending approval.

In order for a bank to build a new branch in any location, they must first make application to the State Banking Commission which in turn investigates the possibilities of a bank in that location.

The investigation is based on capital requirements and whether there is a sufficient number of residents in the area to warrant the building of another branch, among other criteria.

The Home News has also learned that Nevada State

Bank is investigating the possibilities of opening a branch office in Henderson, to be located near the new K-Mart Store.

Dr. Kenny Guinn, administrative vice-president of Nevada Savings and Loan, informed the Home News that they had recently completed an economic study which had been submitted to the Savings and Loan Commission in Carson City in the first step of a legal process to open a branch in Henderson.

"We are very much interested in Henderson," he said "and would like to offer a full service branch to its citizens. We do a lot of spot business in Henderson now and feel it is the place to be."

Townsite Home Burned

A Townsite home, located at 15 Colorado Way, was almost destroyed by fire Thursday when a fire started in a back storage room.

The home, owned by Barbara J. Rolfe, was totally involved by the

time firemen arrived because the caller who reported the fire apparently gave the wrong street and address.

The fire started around 2 p.m. No estimate of the damage was available. The home was insured.

"During the summer months burglaries are up," Bob Lindsey, Community relations officer for the Henderson Police Department, told Rotary Club members Tuesday at the weekly meeting.

"I'm not saying this is because juveniles are out of school ... but I'm not saying it's not."

Lindsey quoted statistics on burglaries for 1978 in Henderson with 48 being committed by adults and 52 attributed to juveniles. He said he didn't have any figures for this year so far though "we'll probably have an increase," but at the same time "we're getting more property back and solving more cases than in the past."

Lindsey told Rotarians that burglaries are one of the nations worst crimes with a burglary occurring someplace every few seconds.

"Burglaries too often result in injury or death of the victim," he said. "You recall the cat burglar we had in Henderson a couple of years ago? This is also referred to as a 'hot prowler.' This type of burglary usually takes place when someone is in the home and this is when it can become a crime of violence."

Lindsey urged businessmen in particular to check their locks before leaving the business for the day ... are the lights on. "Don't be so concerned about profit ... if you get cleaned out by a burglar, there won't be any profit."

He cited a recent case where a business was burglarized and items valued at \$2685 were taken. "None of the items had serial numbers which had been recorded. Any business dealing in merchandising, banking, jewelry, having office machines ... get the serial numbers logged ... keep them in a safety deposit box or someplace where they will be saved."

He explained that items are usually fenced and very seldom are the serial numbers removed before being fenced.

He also urged business people to leave lights burning at their businesses during the night. "Is it going to cost you a lot to turn on a light in the interior? It sure helps us (police dept.) so we can see inside when making our checks."

"Try to protect your business ... citizen's awareness ... this is where it begins."

Lindsey offered to make a security check of each of the businesses. "We'll tell you your weak spots, your strong spots ... then it's up to you."

Pittman Area Alive With Activity

The Pittman area of Henderson is busy with activity as the street-drainage-park improvements get underway, the Hesse Corporation gets ready to build their new plant, the Sunset Road extension obtains a priority spot in Regional Streets and Highways projects, and U.S. Homes proposes to begin construction. A safe prediction is that this area will "come alive" over the next couple of years.

Our voter approved bond projects will soon be underway as the Council has approved going to bid on two of the three million gallon water reservoirs. Plans are to sell additional bonds in October to begin the Sunset Road sewer project.

This newsletter "WELCOMES ON BOARD" our two new City Council members. Kent Anderson replaces Phil Stout in Ward I, and Lee Zike takes the seat formerly held by Carlton Lawrence in Ward

4. This new Council faces many challenges and issues as our community "grows toward tomorrow" in the months ahead.

All appears "GO" on the 201 Wastewater Facilities Plan as final comments are received and addressed. The EPA has complimented the City of Henderson "for a thorough analysis of future wastewater management options for the planning area", and it has also received good reviews from other area agencies.

A special notation is due the much expanded Parks and Recreation program this summer as hundreds of youth and adults participate in dozens of activities throughout the City. The summer playground program is particularly notable with 50-100 children showing up everyday at each of five locations.

Some minor remodeling at City Hall is now underway in an attempt to gain a few more square feet of space. The west wall is being moved out several feet, and the interior is getting a much needed coat of paint.

Henderson has adjusted its 1979-80 budget to reduce spending as mandated by the legislature. Net loss to the City was \$156,000. Given the conservative nature of the original budget, City operations were not materially affected.

The recent garbage strike presented temporary inconvenience, but no real problems to most Henderson residents. Most residential customers missed three pickups during the strike, and two temporary drop sites were opened by the City.

A new fleet of smaller, energy-saving vehicles will be put in City service over the next few months. The compacts and subcompacts were approved by the City Council to replace some of the large-engine former police vehicles that were being used. And, emergency approval to install larger fuel storage tanks was given by the Council to improve the City's ability to purchase fuel when it is available.

Mark your calendars and make plans now to join the Third Annual "It's Happening

in Henderson Tour" tentatively set for Thursday evening, October 18. Over 200 people turned out last year for this joint City-Chamber of Commerce effort. It's a fun way to be informed and see all that is "happening in Henderson".

Six month building permit information shows over \$40.5 million in permits including over 700 new living units. This represents a 47% increase in construction activity over the same period last year. It appears we have been affected some by the concrete strike and the permit rush in Boulder City. Many new developments are in the planning review stages now, however, and are expected to move forward in the next few months.

You might be interested in a review of the system development charges established to pay the \$5.5 million in water and sewer bonds. They amount to a six month total of \$255,016, an amount well beyond the conservative projections that were made. The first bond payment of \$103,000 is not due until 1980. This new "concept" appears to be working very well.

It is anticipated, if we can continue to receive federal assistance, that improvement to the Pittman area of Henderson can continue. Over \$525,000 has been committed to that area, thus far, and we hope to continue for the next two or three years. It was hoped in the beginning that an infusion of public improvements would help to revitalize the Pittman area, and in turn generate additional private development. This has been the case with two industries and a large housing area now planned and close to construction. If we can keep the momentum going, Pittman can assume its rightful role as a vital part of the Henderson Community.

CIVIC CENTER PLAZA

Last year saw the completion of the master plan for this sixteen acre site across from City Hall; perhaps this year will see the physical beginning of a people-oriented, park-like complex where the public can conduct its business with various levels of government. A new "focal point" for our community as it "grows toward tomorrow", the complex could provide much needed administrative space and "one stop" service for the public. Deciding how and when to proceed with this proposal will be a major decision before the City Council.

EXPANSION OF SERVICES

The so-called "tax revolt" has fairly well indicated that people don't want or expect very many new services, and they want basic services provided as cost-effectively as possible. This is certainly an issue that our community will be wrestling with over the next few years. There is little doubt but that we will have to find a way to provide expanded police protection, fire protection, and street and utility maintenance as our community grows. Since this will have to be done with limited money, it means that "tradition" may go by the side if we can find a less costly way to provide adequate services. Hopefully we will have the cooperation of our personnel, including their union organizations, as well as the public as we explore alternatives. It is certain that Henderson will not be alone, but one of the many communities across the nation which may "dare to be different".

COMMUNITY INPUT

Input from the citizenry is important to any community, and certainly this is true in Henderson. The City government makes real efforts, I believe, in soliciting public opinion, responding to complaints and requests, and otherwise operating local government as the "partnership with the people" that it is intended to be. Continuing these efforts will be even more important as the community grows, and the lifestyle that Henderson residents enjoy can be preserved even with growth. With close to 70 square miles within our City, we are presently only around 20 percent developed. There is plenty of room to grow so long as it is compatible growth that pays its own way. Achieving that objective, and I believe that we can, will be the major challenge facing Henderson as it "grows toward tomorrow" and enters the 1980's with a solid foundation and a bright future.

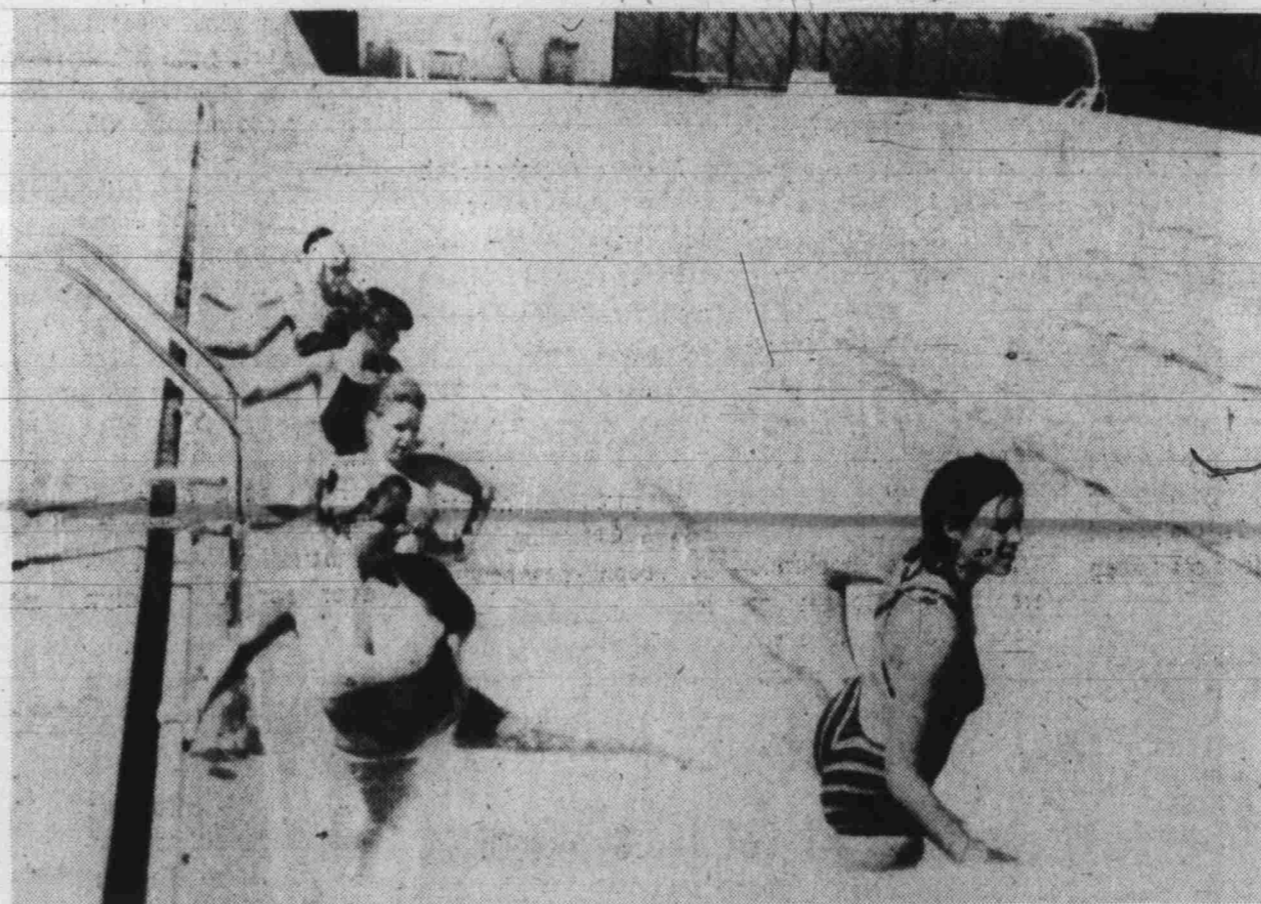
Proclamation

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What You Should Know About Shoplifting'

What is shoplifting? "Ripping off", "pinching", "liberating", "hooking", "snitching", "borrowing" - by any other name, it's still stealing.

The dictionary says shoplifting is stealing goods from shelves or displays of a retail store while posing as a customer.

The law says shoplifting is larceny, taking property with intent to deprive the rightful owner. Conviction means jail, a fine, or both.

"What's it to me?" It costs you money! Out of every dollar you spend in a store, 5 cents or 10 cents goes to pay for the things shoplifters take and to pay for security measures to fight shoplifting.

Shoplifting is a national epidemic of theft, and it's getting worse. \$3.5 billion in merchandise is stolen from stores every year.

One person in ten is a shoplifter. Losses are 2 to 4% of total sales, enough to cancel out profits for many stores.

Who shoplifts? All kinds of people, young and old, businessmen and students, blacks - and white, men and women.

Young people (under 18) make up more than half of all shoplifters. Girls greatly outnumber boys. Most come from middle income, suburban homes.

Average shoppers, people from all economic, educational and family background, most don't steal because of need.

Many have better-than-average jobs and incomes. Young women frequently "stretch" their budgets by shoplifting luxuries and extras.

Drug addicts often become shoplifters in order to support their habits.

Addicts usually sell what they steal at a small fraction of the real value of the items.

Store employees, from clerks to top executives, steal. The employee theft is a major problem for retail stores, especially those with a high job turn-over and many temporary personnel.

Professionals steal "on order", shoplifting goods that they sell to their own "customers" at bargain prices. This group is a small percentage of shoplifters, but they take expensive items.

Kleptomaniacs are compulsive stealers who are unable to stop themselves from theft. These people, who urgently need psychiatric treatment, make up less than 1% of all shoplifters.

Shoplifting hurts small merchants, for they can't afford the extra manpower and equipment to discourage shoplifting.

They lose money if they take time off to prosecute shoplifters. They find it hard to pass the costs on to customers.

Shoplifting raises food prices; supermarkets have a profit margin of as little as 1%, so they cannot afford the high cost of shoplifting. That is part of the reason food costs keep

rising. Shoplifting means higher taxes, police costs increase, court costs increase, community loses business and tax revenue when stores close. So our taxes go up.

Shoplifting creates mistrust. Stores are forced to become suspicious of everyone. Surveillance is increased and strict security measures are taken.

Today, stores have elaborate surveillance systems, more guards, some hidden behind one-way mirrors, plainclothes detectives, older men, average looking housewives, teen-agers, etc., television scanners, walkie-talkies, electronic tags that set off a loud alarm if an item is taken from a store without being paid for.

Some stores are starting large-scale public education campaigns, advertising brochures and posters, radio and television talks, and school discussions to alert people to the seriousness of shoplifting.

Stores used to let shoplifters off with just a lecture, but now the shoplifting problem is so serious that stores are prosecuting.

1. Laws are getting tougher, so stores in many states can now apprehend shoplifters before they leave the store.

2. Juvenile shoplifters are being brought to court. First offenders are usually put on probation. Many youngsters say, "But I didn't know that

shoplifting was a criminal offense."

The shoplifter creates problems for everyone; for himself the risk of arrest, punishment and public disgrace; for his family, the shame, tension and mistrust that are the consequences of shoplifting; for the community, loss of business, tax revenues and jobs if stores are forced to close; for the stores more people, new equipment that is needed for security and prevention plus a loss of merchandise; for the courts the burden of time consuming headlines and trials; for the police, time, money and manpower used pursuing shoplifting cases.

With all of this I'm sure you are asking, "What can one person do?" It is going to take individual and community concern to put an end to shoplifting.

1. If you see it, report it. You and other shoppers end up paying for what the shoplifter takes, so if you see someone shoplifting, let store authorities know about it.

2. Work with concerned groups such as civic, business, schools, law enforcement and religious groups, to increase public awareness. Few people are really aware of how serious the problem is.

3. Encourage honesty. Be proud of being honest. Let people know how you feel.

There is too much apathy as far as crime is concerned.

Leonard L. Poff, a 15-year-resident of Henderson and machinist at Titanium Metals Corp., passed away Monday in Henderson after a lengthy illness.

Mr. Poff was born March 18, 1916 in Lamar, Missouri. He was active in the LDS Church and served as Branch President in Webb City, Mo., and in the same position in Pittsburgh, Kansas.

The family moved to Las Vegas in August of 1963 and a year later moved to Henderson. They resided in the Ballerina Trailer Park for a year, then moved to Trailer Estates where they have resided since.

He suffered a heart attack in August of 1970 and had to retire at that

time. He married Freda Fletcher May 26, 1950 in Arkansas. She survives him.

He is also survived by sons George Poff of Fillmore, Utah, Charles Poff, Ft. Nuclear Medicine Comes to Local Hospital

A lovely New England lass with the title of Nuclear Medicine Technician can now be found five days a week, four hours a day, at St. Rose de Lima in the hospital's nuclear medicine unit.

The gamma ray machine, which sits off in a small room next to the x-ray department, actually belongs to some of the doctors who practice at the local hospital.

"The machine looks for things that hinder functions of certain organs," explained Jeanne Metherall, the technician for the machine. "It is only used when ordered by a doctor, generally for a specific reason."

Jeanne has only worked at the hospital for three weeks and so far has not made too many tests with the gamma ray machine but its use there is quite new as yet, although most of the Las Vegas hospitals have been using them.

The test is made by injecting the patient with a shot in the arm of radioactivity, just a very small amount. "Small amounts can help," Jeanne said. The length of time for waiting to make the test can vary greatly, she explained, from two to three minutes to several hours, depending upon what you are looking for. Then

it takes between three to five minutes to take a picture. Once the tests are started, it can take a half hour to an hour and a half for an exam.

Jeanne is registered nationally as a nuclear medicine technician after completing a two year course. She earned

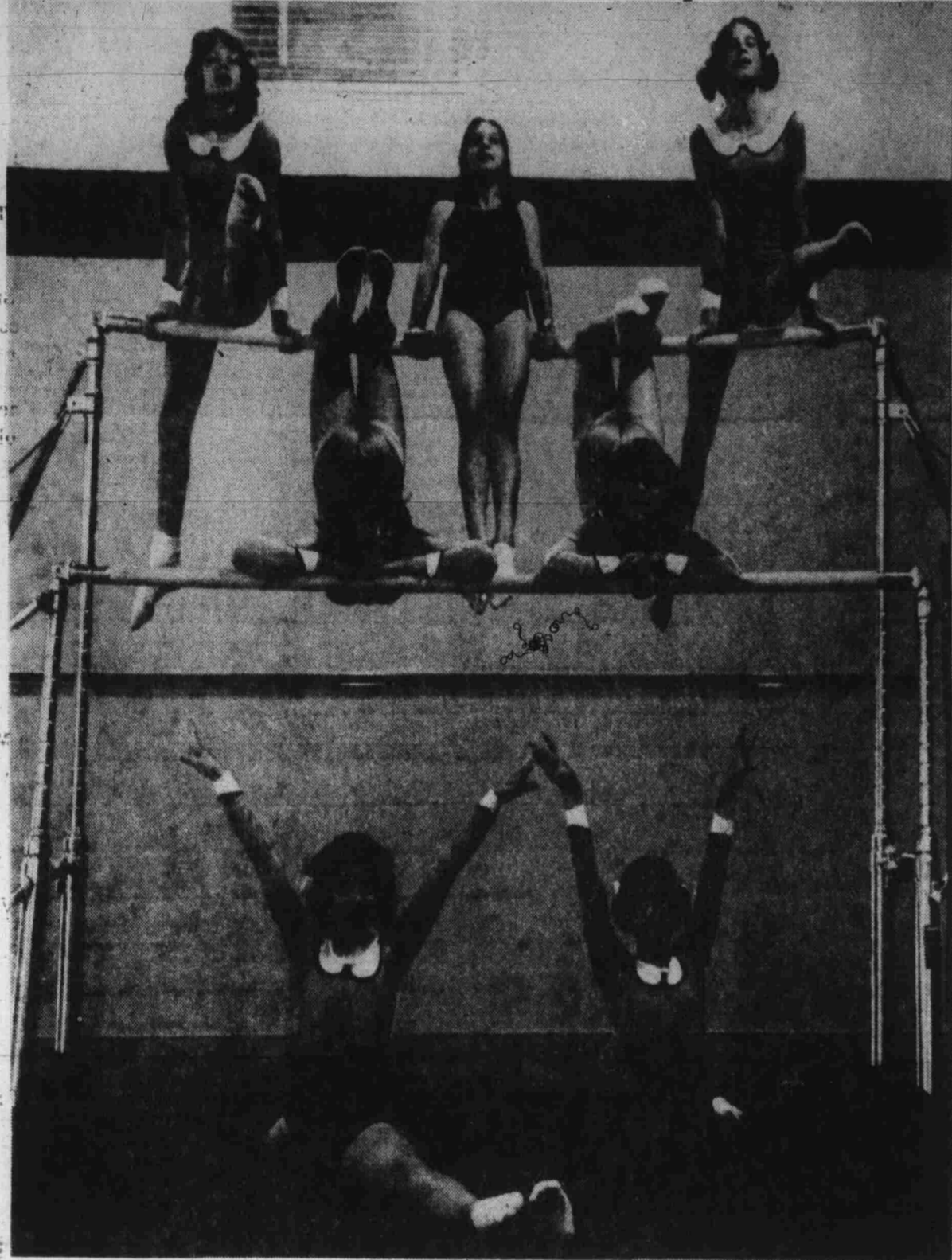

Mrs. Turner has been a realtor for a little over three years and started out with Morrell Realty after receiving her license. "In fact I took my realty license to work for Evalyn."



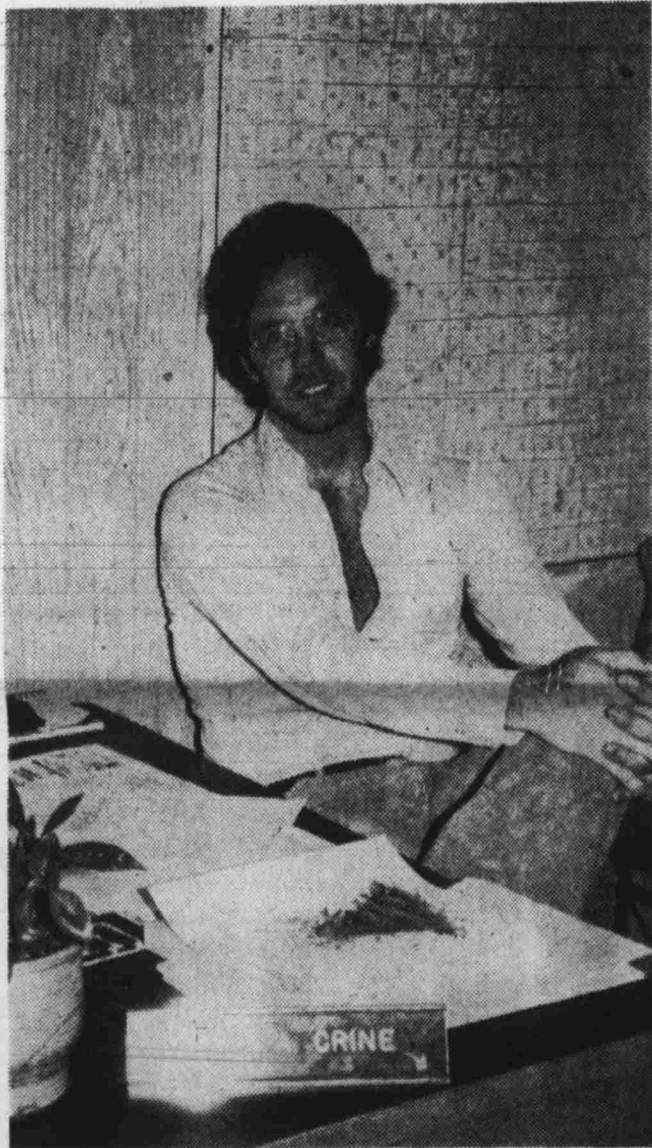

"I've known Arnold for about seven years, Kib-

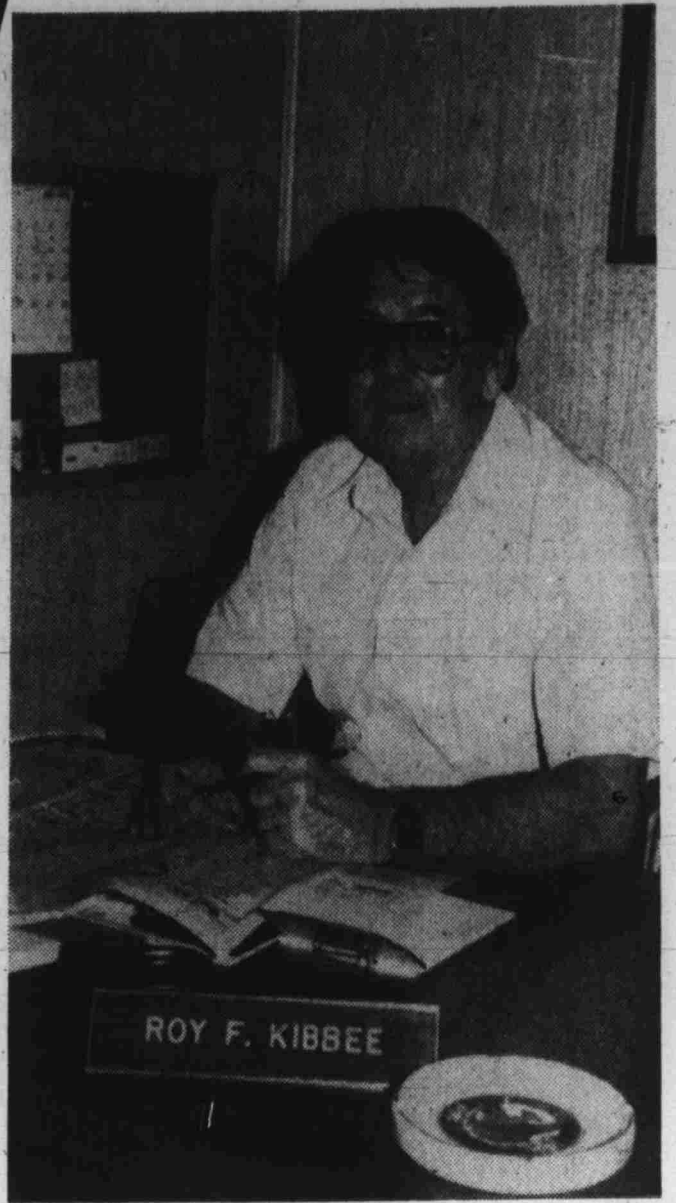
bee explained, "and it was really through him that I ended up meeting Evalyn and coming to Nevada after retiring for my second time.

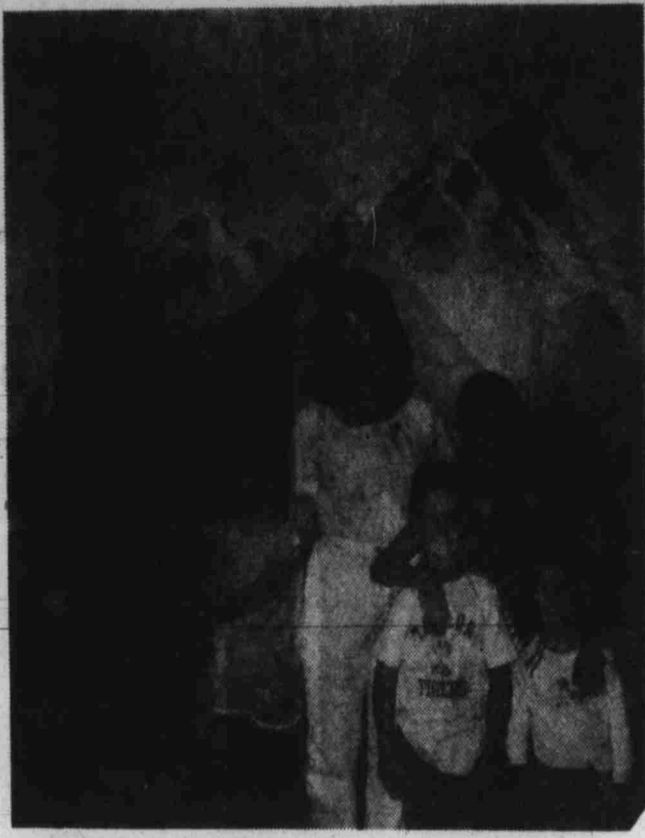
Home of the Week:

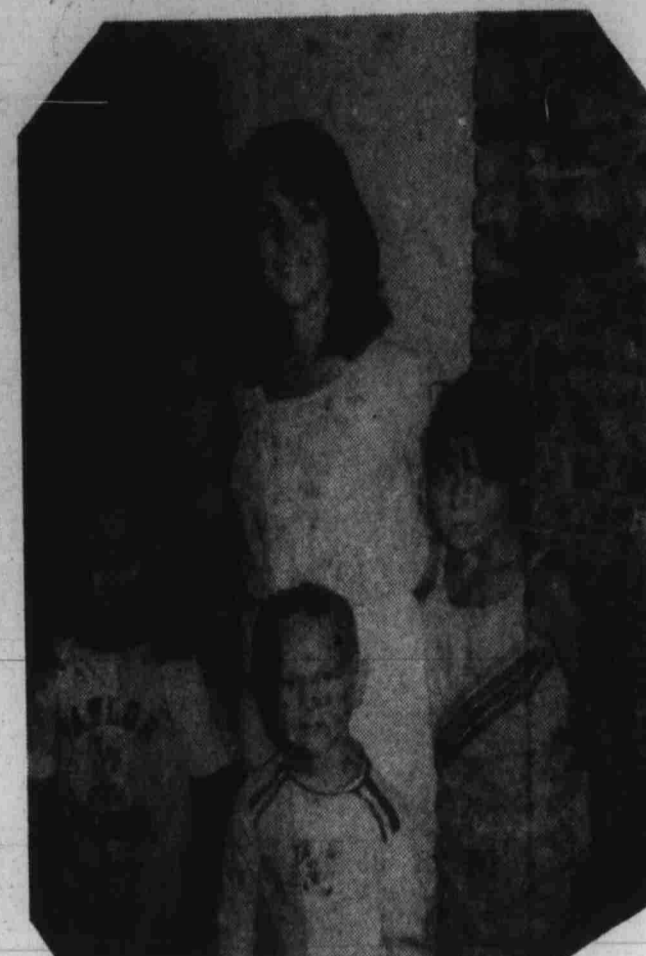
her. Sharon is quite proud of her mother who serves as counselor for the inmates of the women's prison. She has worked with the girls involved in the Sharon

Desert Bighorn Sheep Released Into Virgin Mountains

"Twenty-one desert bighorn sheep have been released into the Virgin Mountains of Eastern Clark County as part of a continuing statewide program to reintroduce this species into areas they once occurred but are no longer present," accord-

ing to Glen Christensen, Nevada Department of Wildlife Chief of Game Management.

"The sheep were trapped on the Lake Mead National Recreation Area in cooperation with the National Park Service according to terms of an

agreement that permits removal of surplus animals for transplant to other areas as needed. The Lake Mead population is being managed by both agencies to maintain sheep numbers at the maximum level consistent with their environment,"

he explained. The seven lambs, five rams and nine ewes were captured in a drop-gate panel trap surrounding a waterhole in the River Mountains near Lake Mead. All were marked with numbered aluminum ear tags in one ear with

the seven lambs also marked with color-coded plastic T-lock tags in the other ear. Six of the 14 adults were fitted with color-coded tags attached to leather collars with the remaining eight animals receiving transistorized radio transmitters.

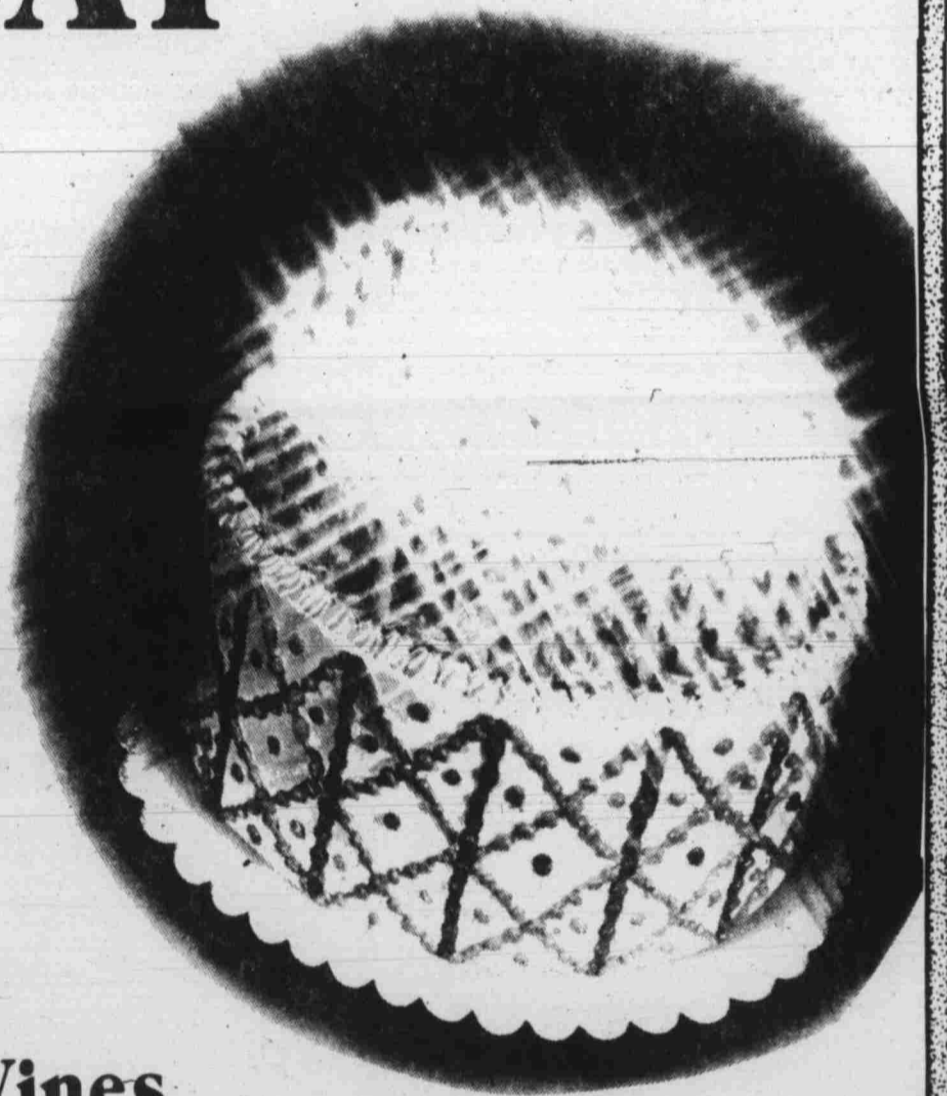

HENDERSON HOME OF THE WEEK

The exquisite home of John and Irene Powers could be termed "unique" with a touch of Palm Springs, Old Hollywood, and the glamour of the movie star. No wonder that it should be classified as holding these attributes for it wasn't too long ago that John Powers was providing the identical plan as second homes for such personages as: Ronald Reagan, Jackie Cooper, Steve McQueen, the late Groucho Marx and the late Bobby Darin - in Palm Springs exclusive Las Palmas Estates. John serves as the vice-president of Pardee Construction Company.

John and Irene moved to Henderson in 1969 from their home near San Luis Obispo, California. They had previously resided in Palm Springs. Their Henderson home on 254 Country Club Drive is one of the show tour homes which benefits the 'Home of the Good Shepherd' (for pre-delinquent girls). The back of the home overlooks the 11th hole of the Black Mountain Golf Course.

The home's exterior bespeaks of the French-Spanish Contemporary in design. The maintenance free landscaping with built-in sprinkler systems enables beautiful Pine trees and other flora to grow in a healthy and luxurious way. A half-moon or circular driveway leads to the front wrought iron gate which is centered with the surrounding exterior of Driftwood rock and white stucco.

Once inside the gate one is taken with the beauty of the covered front patio, flower and plant garden. White wrought iron garden furniture with pink cushions is located on one side of the patio with foliage while the opposite side shows an exotic garden with stepping stones. Irene pointed out one bloom on her Gardenia bush which is a rarity in the desert area. Camillias and Wisteria along with other greens captures the scene.

A wooden double block design door leads into the home. Stepping into the hallway-foyer on Italian tile of royal blue, gold and stone white, the Driftwood Rock is carried out on the right wall. To the right is a Baker's stand with shelves holding plants, statues, ceramics and knick-knacks. The home is generous with plants, and silk-flower floral arrangements. Scene stealer in the foyer's entrance into the living room is an antique music stand with candle and placed on the stand is a beautiful decoupage by Irene of an open book showing a picture of "Blue Boy" and the "Pink Lady" with gold edge pages.

The living room is expansive and Irene can take a graceful bow for the outstanding decor. Aside from decoupage, Irene enjoys planning the decor of her home and her taste is rich and delicate leaning toward the French Provincial. "I prefer off-whites, gold, pinks and lime greens," Irene pointed out, "and I always feel that a good white is in good taste." Off-white carpeting; a white statue of a whippet dog (Lifesize), 2 transitional love seats in white, gold, and pink; a Persian rug in moss pink, creamy white and soft green; an oblong wooden coffee table with throw pillows of pastel coloring underneath; and lime green chairs are seen on one side of the living room. Near the sliding glass door windows on the far side overlooking the backyard garden we see an off-white gold-trim Baby Grand Baldwin Piano with a crystal candelabra.

Decoupage art work by Irene hangs throughout the home and a real "compliment catcher" is a large gold leaf picture with a fine etching centered. Completing the sumptuous living-room scene is a hanging white wrought iron bird cage with artificial leaves joined foliage inside. A French Provincial desk with decorative white plume pens completes the decor.

The dining room is connected to the living room (New York Style) sporting an inlaid walnut and white dining table with lime green trim and matching seat cushions; a high gloss coated tea cart (made in Italy); an off-white buffet with hand painted flowers on each door; a China cabinet with special dishes and a full Nativity scene in miniature porcelain dolls from Mexico inside.

The landscaping of the backyard presents a miniature panorama resembling that of a Roman or Grecian garden. Irene, herself with the loveliness of a rare and blonde porcelain doll, posed for the camera before a miniature waterfall over rocks which led into a little river leading into the mini-lake. The mini-lake serves as a fish pond where the fish actually thrive. Seated before the lake is a favorite of Irene's - a fisher boy statue from Sedona, Arizona. Flowers and Aleppo Pine dot the landscaping.

The remainder of the yard includes a generous sized free-form heated swimming pool, a patio with turquoise furniture, a mini-golf course, a barbecue pit and a garden umbrella table with chairs. Leading out of the garden is an enclosed garden showing exotic greenery. "The Wisteria blooms and thrives in this area," Irene mentioned while ushering the writer thru a stepping stone pathway.

The kitchen, like the rest of the home, keeps the white theme with off-white formica counter tops, white appliances and the dinette shows a white wrought iron table and chairs with green leather cushions. Kitchen cabinets are of Birchwood. The dinette area sparkles with a photo gallery of the couple's children and grandchildren over Irene's built-in desk, drawers and cabinets. Oil paintings dot the walls - one large painting of bright spring greenery and little birds sitting on a branch is effective.

John's den is like a miniature hunting or ski lodge. Both avid skiers, John and Irene captured First Place 1979 trophies in the snow-skiing Senior Division at Brian Head, Utah where the couple are in the process of building a second recreation home. "John made the wet bar from wooden liquor crates of the type they had 25 years ago with a glazed wormwood countertop," Irene mentioned. Other conversation pieces are a mounted snarling Timber Wolfhead, ski and horse trophies for the couple's mounted riding in Sheriff's Posse at San Luis Obispo, Indian oil paintings and decor.

Back thru the kitchen and foyer we find an impressive sewing room. An Icelandic Sheep throw rug and pillows adorn the antique yellow gold hide-a-bed. A Zebra Director's chair, a portrait gallery of antique pictures of the couple's grandparents and ancestors hangs above and between the book shelves. A white sewing machine, and a closet with pull out adding machine and typewriter are all part of Irene's special sitting room.

Guest bedroom sports extra long twin beds and the home's Cathedral ceiling is quite noticeable here. Flowered wallpaper in pastel pinks, greens, and yellow carry out the scene with oil paintings of spring colors. Guest bathroom is dominated by bright pink, with off-white and gold trim fixtures.

Master bedroom is soft and feminine in pale blue and a king size bed with the summer bedspread of white eyelet and light blue dust ruffle is impressive. A long blue velvet bench sits by the foot of the bed. A generous gold leaf headboard of seashell design carries out the romantic theme experienced

throughout the home. Master bathroom exhibits a sunken pastel blue bath and the remainder of the room has blue and white fixtures with gourd accessories. The bath overlooks Irene's Wisteria garden where the mate of the fisher boy - "the little fisher girl" - sits peering into the bath.

There is so much more that could be said of the outstanding Showplace Home of John and Irene Powers but we can safely call the "key words" to this one as, "romantic," "refined," "exotic," and "glamorous!"

RENT PASS-THROUGH OF TAX SAVING IS HEADACHE

When the assembly taxation committee came up with the "tax-saving pass-through" for renters (Sec. 6 of Senate Bill 204) they were attempting to require that landlords pass on some of the savings in property taxes that the whole program made available. It was a difficult task. The resultant legislation creates an administrative headache, if there is anyone that can be found to administer the provisions.

The problem arises because of two basic constitutional requirements. (1) Legislation may not be enacted which abrogates or changes a private contract; and (2) the constitution requires that all property be equally assessed for taxation to the owner thereof. The first effort in the legislative session was to provide a "rebate" of part of the taxes paid on rental property, with the rebate going to the tenant. That would have entailed an administrative cost in excess of a quarter of a million dollars a year.

Finally there was devised Section 6 of the Act which requires each landlord to give his tenant (during the month of July) a statement showing the portion of the rent that was attributable to "property taxes" in 1978 and in 1979 and to reduce the periodic rent by the amount of saving from reduced property taxes in 1979. There are five exemptions from the requirement. But administration and compliance is a problem in many cases. For instance:

1. The tax bills for 1979 will not be available until mid-July, and the first payment is due in August. For landlords with several hundred tenants, the paperwork is overwhelming, since the statements are to be prepared and delivered to tenants "in July 1979."

2. Many commercial rentals are based on a flat "minimum" plus a share of the gross sales, net income or some other measure. In other cases the rent is calculated with a base minimum OR a share of sales, whichever is greater.

3. Some rentals are "with furniture and appliances" and some are without --- even in the same building. But the law says that rentals are to be apportioned on the basis of "area" alone and no account is taken of varying amenities or attractiveness.

4. Some properties are rented at prices that will not cover even the reduced impact of the taxes.

5. Some landlords have several hundred (even several thousand) tenants and the preparation of the statements within the time constraints is impossible.

But there is a ray of hope. Enforcement would be by complaint of the tenant. The landlord is relieved if he shows "good cause" for failure to make the timely rent adjustment.

Preferential Deer Tag Drawing Explained

Nevada resident hunters who applied for but were not awarded a deer tag in 1978 for the Controlled General Hunt are eligible for prefer-

ential deer-tag drawing status in this year's Controlled General Hunt according to an announcement from the Nevada Department of Wildlife.

Hunters eligible for preferential status in 1979 were issued a hunter courtesy card, Form L-23, that states they were unsuccessful in last year's deer tag drawing. Hunter courtesy cards were mailed after all deer tag drawings were held last year and those persons who were unsuccessful in the first and/or second drawing but who later purchased one of the few remaining tags sold on a first-come first-served basis did not receive a card nor will they be eligible for preferential status this year.

To qualify for the preferential drawing, hunters must attach the Courtesy Card, Form L-23, to the deer tag application. If two or more persons apply as a party on the same application (which is permitted), then each party member must have and attach a Hunter Courtesy Card.

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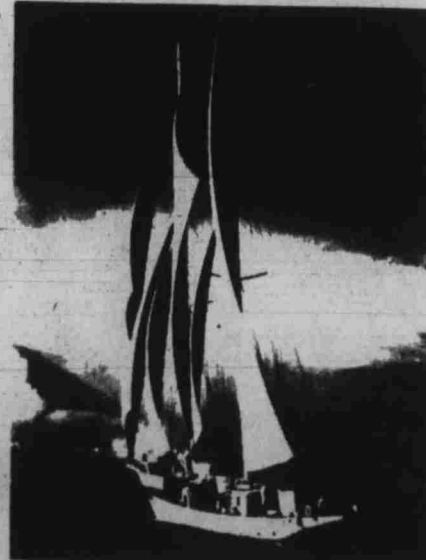

Laxalt Calls For Synthetic Fuel Development

Thursday, July 12, 1979

Nevada Sen. Paul Laxalt has urged adoption of a multi-faceted program to solve the country's energy woes, keyed by conversion to synthetic fuels.

"If the President refuses to lead, I hope he will allow himself to be led," Laxalt said in a statement issued Monday. "Continued delays on this most crucial and

vital issue will be tragic."

The cornerstone of the Laxalt program would see major financing of methods of extracting oil from coal and shale, with the goal of converting the country to synthetic fuel.

"Because of our abundant coal and shale resources, production of synthetic fuel would

make us self-sufficient and no longer dependent on the whims of OPEC," Laxalt said.

"I recognize such a program would be costly, but it would turn around our balance of payments picture and stabilize the economy by keeping our dollars in the United States instead of abroad.

"Also," Laxalt added,

"an all-out program to develop synthetic fuel would produce countless jobs for Americans."

The Nevada Republican noted a well-financed, aggressive synthetic fuel program could take five to ten years to produce substantial results, so he recommended other steps for more immediate relief.

"First, I would like to see oil decontrolled immediately rather than gradually," Laxalt said. "government controls and regulations are the main reasons we're in trouble today."

"Immediate decontrol would mean somewhat higher gasoline prices, but it would open up second and third level

drilling of wells which had previously been capped, providing an additional crude oil supply.

"Second, we should abolish the federal fuel allocation system, allowing the open market to put gasoline where it is most in demand," Laxalt said.

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Public Hearing Held On Social Security Regulations

The Social Security Administration (SSA) will hold a public hearing in San Francisco on July 12 to obtain public comments on proposed regulations governing conditions under which official SSA records and information about individuals can be disclosed.

Regional Commissioner Thomas M. Tierney, announced today. The San Francisco public meeting, which will be held at the Golden Gateway Holiday Inn, 1500 Van Ness Avenue, is one of seven meetings being held around the nation.

In announcing the public meetings, SSA Regional Commissioner Tierney said: "The proposed regulations deal with the procedures for disclosing information about individuals, and so such deserve careful public scrutiny. The provisions affect important rights to privacy, and we are making every effort to encourage people to consider these proposed rules and give us their reaction directly. For these reasons, SSA has scheduled meetings in seven locations around the country to all the public to present their concerns.

Public meetings are scheduled to be held in Boston and Denver on July 10, 1979; in Atlanta and San Francisco on July 12; in Chicago and Dallas on July 17; and in Washington, D.C. on July 24.

The meetings will be conducted as informal forums, with representatives from the Social Security Administration available to answer questions. Public officials, representatives of civic and public interest organizations and concerned citizens are invited to speak. Speakers and other interested persons may also submit written statements.

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Our Publisher Assesses President Carter in Present Emergency

Any talk about President Jimmy Carter seems to be an unpopular subject right now. But not with me.

I have a different feeling than most of the commentators on the whys of today's crisis at Camp David.

I feel President Carter is brilliant, sharp, stern, nasty and mean if needs be, kind and soft-spoken most often.

I feel he is a believer in every word he says. I feel he is deeply religious and considers God's help will be ever-present to help him and his nation.

His smooth preacher-like delivery in his speeches and in his treatment of the world's leaders in one-to-one meetings are his greatest virtue. He is not a dictator in his own home or his own inner sanctum. He is a listener and a question asker.

But -- he makes the decisions. He has his little circle of friends -- helpers, followers who have been with him since he ran for Governor of Georgia. He lives with them in the inner White House, be it Camp David or Jerusalem or Cairo or Vienna.

We speak of Hamilton Jordan (pronounced Jerden), Jody Powell, Jerry Rafshoon.

They, with Carter, see, hear and do everything together. Yet these four men around the president do not run him. He runs them. They are free to come up with input to him and they are free to argue in front of him, and with him. But they know Carter then backs away and makes his decision.

All of them believe in calling in experts. None of them believe they know it all. They know they are, in fact, limited and in a big job -- often in one where they are frustrated because they can't come up with the result needed.

They know, as does Carter, that the nation is down on all of them. Yet, they don't believe they've failed. They feel the situation of the world today has made Carter look so bad. They feel the world is not the normal world of previous presidential regimes.

They feel the independence of developing countries as well as developed countries has created international conflicts. But they feel, as Carter does, that this independence will lead to growth and strength and self sufficiency -- especially where the countries are seeking freedom, human rights and equal dignity with other countries.

Carter firmly believes the potential enemies can become friends of ours, including Russia, China, the Arab countries and the African countries ... as long as each entity is dealt with on a fair basis. They feel each country with problems -- like Iran, Lebanon, Syria, Brazil should be left to their own futures. They should be helped, these fellows feel, if their story sounds good and their efforts are clean cut and honorable.

Carter isn't winning his points and is disappointed at the turn of events. He cut off his national speech the other night because he saw a need for exact action instead of words that put salve on wounds. He sees his own America doubting, troubled, critical when he expected cooperation and patriotism instead of help as curealls.

Carter is a sad man. He felt he could have had for all of us what he promised when he ran for office. He is sad because the problems are so varied, so difficult, but he feels that he didn't bring them on. He feels the troubles have piled up from other reasons. Yet he knows the mass America expects he should have handled the troubles better and solved most of them by now.

Carter feels that a Kennedy or a Ford or a Kissinger couldn't do any better, except maybe they would be given more time to come up with solutions.

Each of the presidents in my lifetime -- Wilson, Harding, Coolidge, Hoover, Roosevelt, Truman, Eisenhower, Nixon, Ford -- has had problems and

has had good and bad times to handle. Today's problems seem larger to us because we are in the now and not the then. Carter feels equal to the task but

knows it will take more than he can do himself to solve the problems.

He, we feel, needs us -- united -- to help him carry on until all will be even-Stephan again.

Maybe it will not happen while Carter is in office. Maybe it will take a generation to bring a return to the good old days ... when our pockets aren't picked by high taxes, high prices, inflation.

Carter today is shooting for the answers. He isn't scared about those low ratings. He isn't going to be turned around by pressures. He is going to come up with the answers he and his little clan around him, aided by advice of experts they respect, the answers they hope will bring the results.

I've got to give him an A for honesty, an A for effort -- during a time in world history where the problems which he didn't create are too enormous for one man -- any man -- to handle as president of the United States.

It may be that it will take the magic of a Kennedy or the flair of a Monahan or the attractiveness of a Reagan or the simplicity of a Ford to bring the nation back again.

We'll measure who it should be when the 1980 elections come up ... Right now -- we'll go along with Carter for better or for worse.

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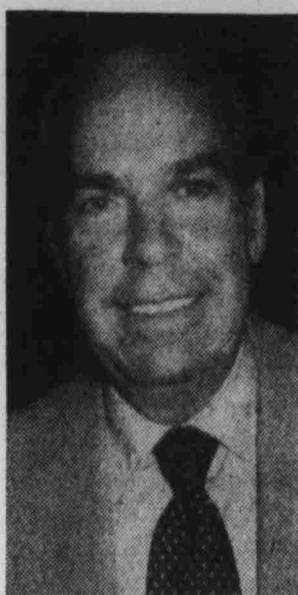

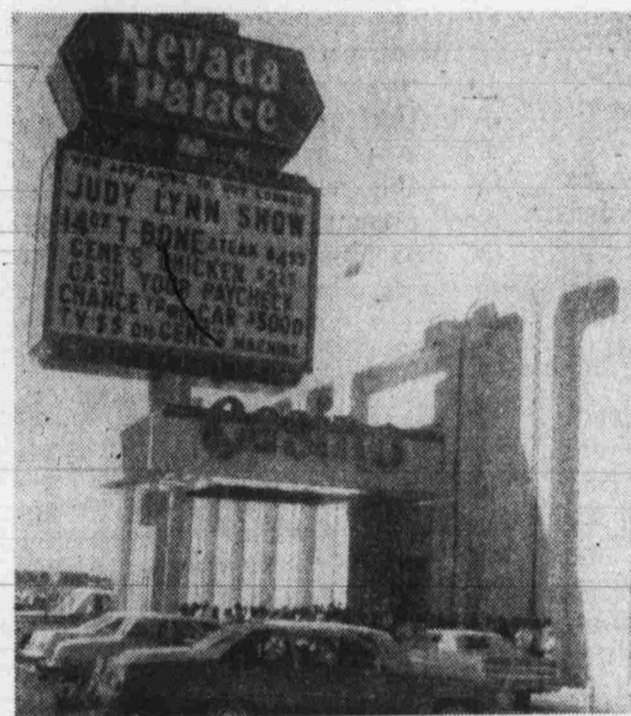

'Under The Sea Salad'

"Ahoj there, Matey!" This recipe comes "sailing" in from pretty Pat Doman of Boulder City. "I enjoy this recipe which I found in a gelatin book years ago, and invariably make it up for A.A.U.W. parties and organization/buffet suppers," Pat mentioned. She added that her husband, Michael, and daughters, Lorrie and Jenny, find this to be a family favorite.

UNDER THE SEA SALAD - is cooling with the "ebb tide" look of pears and cream cheese beneath a clear sea-green layer of lime gela-

tin after unmolding -
 1 Package (3 oz.) lime gelatin
 ¼ teaspoon salt
 1 cup boiling water
 1 can (1 pound) pear halves
 1 tablespoon of lemon juice
 2 packages (3 ounces each) Cream Cheese
 ½ teaspoon Ginger
 Dissolve gelatin and salt in boiling water. Drain pears, measuring ¼ cup syrup - add water if necessary. Dice pears - set aside. Add pear syrup and lemon juice to gelatin. Measure 1¼ cup of mixture into a 1 quart mold. **CHILL UNTIL SET**

BUT, NOT FIRM. MEANWHILE - Soften cheese until creamy - gradually add remaining gelatin blending until smooth - add ginger. **CHILL UNTIL VERY THICK - FOLD IN PEARS - SPOON THIS MIXTURE INTO MOLD AND CHILL UNTIL FIRM. UNMOLD ON CRISP LETTUCE.** Makes about 4 cups of 8 side salads.

The Department of Motor Vehicles has selected the Polaroid I.D.-3 Identification System to produce a new instant full color driver license. The System was chosen on the merit of speed, convenience, security, and improved service.

The size, basic I.D. information, and picture will remain the same, however, the position in which they appear will be changed. For example, the I.D. number, social security number, and expiration date will be highlighted in yellow for better recognition by the user and law enforcement officials.

Barton Jacka, Director of the Department of Motor Vehicles, explained, "The new license is more secure from alteration or counterfeiting." He continued, "This combination of security and convenience makes the new license more appropriate for the driving Nevadaan."

The procedure for obtaining a driver's license will remain the same.

Efforts are being made to shorten the time it takes to obtain a driver's license. Persons who receive notification for renewals, duplicates, or changes are urged to call for an appointment if they are to be processed either in Reno, Las Vegas, or North

Las Vegas.

Driver licenses presently in circulation are valid and will be replaced at the respective renewal date.

To date, 25 states, including the District of Columbia, now issue instant film over the counter driver licenses.

One 10-oz. package baby lima beans frozen in butter sauce
One 10-oz. package crinkle cut carrots-frozen in butter sauce-1 Tbsp. honey

Remove lima beans and carrots from pouches; place side by side on a large piece of heavy duty aluminum foil. Add honey; bring edges of foil together over center of vegetables. Fold over with a double fold, leaving a little space for expansion of steam. Seal ends securely. Place on grill over ash-covered coals for 35 to 40 minutes. Turn packet occasionally during cooking; open foil and stir to combine. Serves 4 to 6.

CHEESY SPROUTS 'N CAULIFLOWER

One 10-oz. package balt Brussel Sprouts frozen in butter sauce
One 10-oz. package cauliflower frozen in cheese sauce
1 tsp. prepared mustard

Remove Brussels sprouts and cauliflower from pouches; place side by side on a large piece of heavy duty aluminum foil. Add mustard; bring edges of foil together over center of vegetables. Fold over with a double fold, leaving a little space for expansion of steam. Seal ends securely.

Place on grill over ash-covered coals for 35 to 40 minutes. Turn packet occasionally during cooking; open foil and stir to combine. Serves 4 to 6.

CORN-ON-THE-COB

Remove the contents of a 6-ear package of frozen half ears corn-on-the-cob. Brush with butter if desired. Place each half ear on an individual piece of heavy duty aluminum foil. Bring edges of foil together over center of corn. Fold over with a double fold, leaving a little space for expansion of steam. Twist ends to secure. Place on grill over ash-covered coals for 45 to 60 minutes. Carefully open packets to serve.

Instead of butter, try Zippy Onion Butter.

ZIPPY ONION BUTTER

Combine one 143-oz. package dry onion soup mix with 1/2 cup softened butter. Spread on frozen ears of corn. Continue as above.

An Ice Cream Pudding Pie would be an appropriate dessert with one or any of the vegetable barbecues. To prepare, blend 1 cup of vanilla ice cream with 1 cup of cold milk in a bowl. Add a 4-serving size package of butterscotch flavor instant pudding and pie filling. Beat slowly with rotary beater or at low speed of electric mixer until blended - about 1 minute. Pour immediately into a baked cooled 8-inch pie shell. Chill until set, at least 1 hour, and serve proudly.

With peaches so plentiful, you might enjoy a Peachy Ice Cream Pudding pie, easily made by

peeling, pitting and slicing 1 medium peach and placing the slices in the bottom of a cooled baked 8-inch pie shell. The, thoroughly blend 1 cup cold milk with 1 cup of vanilla ice cream in a bowl.

Add a 4-serving size package of vanilla or French vanilla instant pudding and pie filling; beat slowly with rotary beater for about 1 minute. Pour immediately into pie shell and chill for about 1 hour, until set. Garnish with additional slices of fresh peaches and whipped cream - and have a fun time.

Draft Emergency Water Plan Circulated Among Agencies

The Interior Department announced today it is circulating copies of an emergency water plan which Federal agencies have drafted for possible use in survival and recovery situations in the event of a national emergency.

The Plan, prepared by an Emergency Water-Interagency Planning Group in Interior, is being circulated for review and comment by State governments, local water managers and civil preparedness agencies.

A recent executive order directed the Secre-

tary of the Interior to provide national leadership in developing and coordinating water emergency plans for use on an interstate, state and local government basis. The draft plan is technical in nature and is the product of several previous drafts. It does not have formal Departmental or agency approval.

Comments on the draft plan are due by July 30, 1979, in the Office of the Emergency Water Planning Staff, Land and Water Resources, Department of the Interior,

Washington, D.C. 20240. Based on the comments, the document will be revised and will be distributed for public comment.

After further revision, the emergency water plan will be submitted to Federal water and emergency agencies for final approval and publication. These agencies are the Departments of the Inter-

ior, Agriculture, Housing and Urban Development, Transportation, Energy, Commerce, Army, the Tennessee Valley Authority, Environmental Protection Agency and the Federal Emergency Management Agency.

A notice of the availability of the plan has been published in the Federal Register.

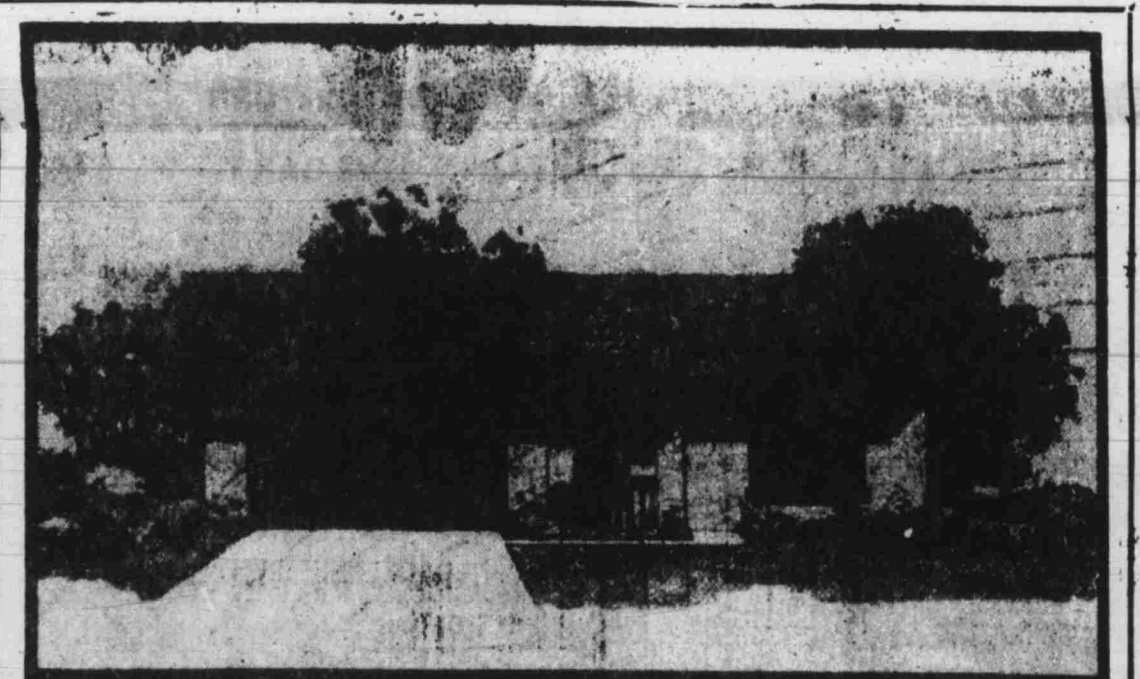

Are You Aware of the New Postal Regulations?

If you have small thank you notes or small bridal or baby shower invitations and try to mail them Sunday, July 15 or later, they will not be accepted by the United States Postal Service.

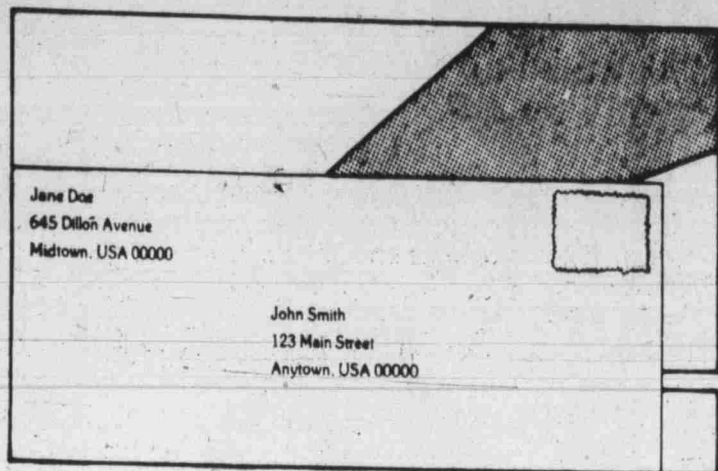
New postal restrictions on the size and thickness of letters go into effect that day in an

mail pieces. Items must be more than seven-thousandths of an inch thick, which is about the equivalent of a standard post card and less than one-fourth of an inch thick.

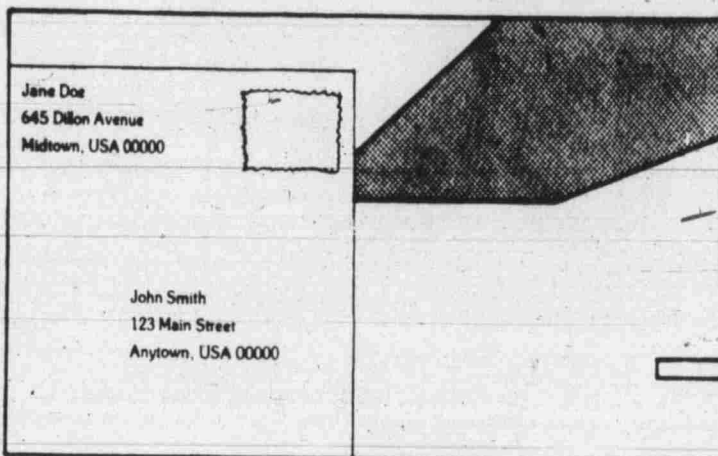
Such objects as hotel keys, identification cards and film mailers are not subject to the

minimum size standards, but may be subject to additional charges if the pieces are more than one-fourth of an inch thick.

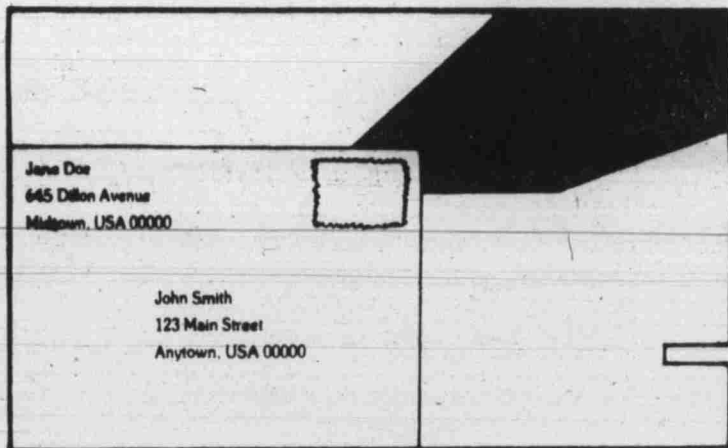
Mail that does not meet the standards causes machines to jam, damage to other mail and must be hand-sorted and stamped.

effort to improve efficiency of the mail service while trying to keep rates down.

Henderson Postmaster Joe Rodriguez said the postal service has been trying for two or three years to make these restrictions but have met with opposition from card companies and other customers so they could first use up their supplies of cards and envelopes not meeting the new requirements.

Letters and cards measuring less than 3 1/2 inches by five inches will not be accepted by the post office and will be returned to the sender and oversized and oddshaped pieces of mail will require additional postage.

Rodriguez explained that the postal service is getting more and more into mechanization. "It's a lot easier with the machines," he said, "but they are only calibrated for two or three sizes."

If the mail described is larger than 1 1/2 by 6 1/2 inches, it will be returned to the sender for an additional 7 cent surcharge. The surcharge also applies to odd-shaped mail with measurements between the minimum and maximum standards.

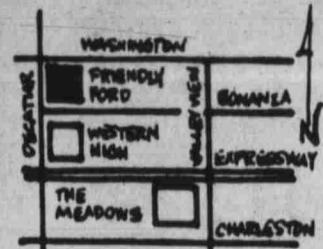

This year, as always, the workers have had printed over one thousand contracts, 600 have been mailed, 100 have been signed, the monies enclosed, and the "Art in the Park" is off and running. It seems the right time to tell the Bureau of Reclamation

that we do not take the use of the Government Park for granted. Its grass is so healthy that it springs right back again after 10,000 people trample it for two long, hot, days. We have enjoyed that park since it was placed there in 1931. Gardeners, Mr. Weede, Mr. Savage, Mr. Boynton, Mr. DeBoer, called that park their baby. No sooner had the green turf come up than here came entire families to cool off, concerts were conducted there, picnics were held, it was the only cool spot for miles around.

We Have Never Taken it for Granted

That park is the first memory that many of us "latecomers" had. Imagine the joy of seeing its spreading beauty as we rounded the curve after leaving Hoover Dam. The twin beauty of Lake Mead and Government Park, and later into Boulder City, the spreading lawns of the Dept. of Water and Power, Park Service and Edison. We have written

of it many times and when the word of the B.C. Art Festival goes out to the world our visitors go away chanting praises for "the most beautiful city in Nevada" and we know it to be true.

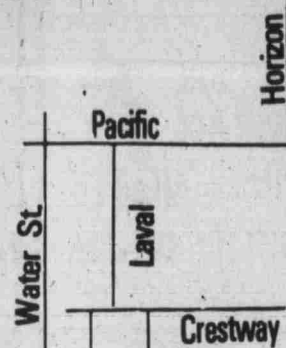
