A Woman Now Heads Animal Shelter

Women have invaded many of the fields which were formerly occupied only by men, and now Henderson has appointed its first woman deputy humane officer.

Vicki Cameron, 29, was appointed deputy humane officer after she took the written and oral exams and came out first. She replaces David McKenzie who recently retired after 12 years in the position.

It's not really a handy job for a woman -- picking up live and dead animals, but Vicki says it can be done and she should know because she's been in the business about six years.

"I've always been around animals," Vicki said, "My parents have a ranch in Caliente and we had horses and cows and dogs and cats."

She graduated from high school in Lincoln County high school and moved to Las

Vegas in 1968. She worked at a newspaper in Las Vegas and then took a job with the City of Las Vegas. She was a secretary for the animal shelter.

She decided to take the test for working in the animal shelter, placed first, but decided against taking the job until a year later.

"I like animals," she said, but she wasn't sure she could handle all of the facets of the work. Finally she decided to give it a try.

"I don't have any trouble picking up live animals," Vicki said, "dogs usually take more to a woman than a man and sometimes I succeed where they don't, however, picking up a dead animal is another matter."

The aspect of the work she doesn't like is the disposal of the animals. She becomes.

The employees are now being trained to render fast and efficient service when the store opens. "We are anxious to announce the opening date as soon as we finalize our department layouts for ease of shopping," said the manager, George A. Raymond.

The K mart is one of more than

1,900 K mart, Kresge and Jupiter stores operated by the K mart Corporation, headquartered in Troy, Michigan, and founded 80 years ago.

K mart employees, over 180,000 in the United States, are among those with the longest employment tenure in retailing. Over 2,800 have been with the company for 25 years or more. Many thousands more are enjoying pensions offered to all employees.

An additional note of interest is that all employees, after one year of service, are entitled to enroll in the K mart stock purchase plan.

Will Harry Polk Pave Mojave?

A number of residents on Mojave Lane in Trailer Estates crowded the council chamber Monday night to see what developer Harry Polk would say about paving a portion of that street.

Sixty-six residents of the street had presented the city with a petition requesting that something be done about the condition of Mojave Lane.

Acting city attorney John Marchiano said he had met with Polk that afternoon and they had talked of a trade-off of a small piece of property to be given to Polk for which he will pave the portion of road now unpaved.

Polk told the council he

would pave the road out to the service road which the city put in. "The service road ... you don't expect me to pave that?" he asked the council.

Polk also agreed to put in curb, gutter and sidewalk in return for the property.

Members of the audience asked when this would be done.

"The reason we're trying to work out an agreement is to get the job done as quickly as possible," Marchiano said.

Following a lengthy discussion, Marchiano suggested the council refer the matter to committee so that specific conditions could be worked out.

121 Acres of Recently Annexed Land Rezoned

Don Farmer of Equity Corporation was given approval by the city council Monday night for a zone change, from R-R (rural residential) to R-1 (single family residential) by resolution of intent for 121 acres of land recently an-

nexed west of Green Valley Parkway at Windmill and Pecos Roads.

Three conditions were placed on the approval: that the C-2 zone at Windmill and

Moratorium on Utility Construction By City Set For 90 Days

A moratorium on utility construction by city forces of 90 days was declared by the city council at the request of City Manager Bob Campbell, because of a "critical situation," a back-log of orders.

Campbell asked for the moratorium in main-line construction while the council-staff committee develops a plan for phasing the city out of the business.

He said the current requests are backed up for at least a six months period, and he said the people on the list are complaining, "but more importantly our maintenance needs are going unmet."

Campbell outlined projects in which the city is involved which he said he feels have precedent over

the utility construction. First are the four water reservoirs and two sewer interceptors approved by the voters; Wells Park improvements; Warm Springs Road Project; Lighting of dangerous intersections on Boulder Highway; the Horizon Drive and Gibson Road loop; City shop and maintenance facility and Morrell Park improvements.

Aside from the fact that I believe these projects have a much higher priority than individual water and sewer extensions, I am convinced that our construction costs are going up 1.5 per cent to 2 per cent per month. This presently amounts to around \$9,000 per month in increased costs for each month we lost on the above projects," Campbell said.

very attached to the animals and it becomes very personal to her. However, she said, she realizes that it has to be done.

Want to Serve

"I really want to serve the public at the shelter," Vicki said, "but we are so short handed that we will have difficulty. We average about ten calls a day but it seems that the biggest job we have is to make people realize that we are here."

The Henderson animal shelter is located on Moser Street in the Pittman area. There are a number of beautiful dogs and cats available there for adoption.

"We keep a log of every animal brought in to the shelter," Vicki said. "So if someone calls we can tell right away if we have their animal or not."

The animals are disposed of once a week so most of the animals are kept longer than the mandatory three days.

At the present time the shelter has three employees. Two are leaving and the city is advertising for one replacement. She wants people to know that the shelter is available to every citizen daily from 8-5. Right now the shelter has about 20 dogs of all varieties and ten cats. The phone number is 564-5551.

Asked if she has animals at home, Vicki said she has three dogs and two cats.

"All of them came from the animal shelter except one," she said. "Everyone I know and everyone in my family gets a pet for his or her birthday." She takes chickens and ducks home and at one time had an Iguana.

"The first week I worked I almost didn't come back," Vicki said, "but I guess you get used to what you have to do."

She looked across at a construction job near-by and said she was surprised to see a woman driving some of the big equipment.

"I guess me of all people shouldn't be surprised to see a woman in that kind of job," she said.

Matheny Case

Following a lengthy hearing yesterday in district court, Judge Howard Babcock took under advisement a suit filed by former Henderson Police Lt. Bob Matheny to get his job back.

Babcock is expected to make a decision within two weeks although no time was set for the decision.

Matheny was represented by Attorney John Fadgen who spoke at length but did not introduce any new evidence. The City and the city's civil service board were represented by Attorneys Aubrey Goldberg and Marvin Gross.

Matheny was fired by the city manager after he became embroiled in an arrest last summer. Matheny appealed the firing to the civil service board and the city manager was upheld. Matheny then appealed the case to district court.

50 Acre Annexation Gets Council Approval

A 50-acre annexation of land owned by Collins Brothers in section 13 near Green Valley, was approved by the city council Monday night.

D.E. Farmer made the request for Royal Crest. The annexation was recommended by the administration, however, it was brought out that utilities would not be available for some time.

The vacation of a street right-of-way for Palo Verde extension bordering on North Brook subdivi-

sion was also approved by the city council on the recommendation of the administration.

The vacation of rights-of-way for un-named streets in section 1 was approved by George Carpin. Three public hearings were held on the matters.

The city council ratified the appointment of Councilman James Seastrand of North Las Vegas to the General Obligation Bond Commission to fulfill the unexpired term of Gary J. Davis.

After questioning by Councilman Gary Price, a tavern and package liquor license was approved for Dominick Alicastro for Club Release at 1940 Parkson.

Architectural review for the new Baskin-Robbins ice-cream store, located at 510 S. Boulder Highway, near the Henderson Plaza Shopping Center, was approved.

Architectural review for remodeling the front elevation of Safeway at 638 Boulder Highway in the Henderson Plaza Shopping Center was also approved.

Community Cable TV Granted Business License

Despite the advice of the city attorney to grant a franchise rather than a business license to Community Cable TV, the city council voted unanimously to approve the business license for the company owned by Herman Greenspun.

Greenspun's son, Brian, vice president of the cable television company, explained they had permission from the Public Service Commission but it must be ready by January 1980.

"We found out we needed a business license in Henderson and we are on a tight schedule," the younger

Greenspun said.

The cable is being laid all up and down Green Valley.

Acting city attorney John Marchiano said the city was empowered to grant a franchise or a business license but strongly recommended the former as being in the best interest of the city. A franchise would spell out the details of how the operation is going to be.

Greenspun said he had no objections to a franchise but when he found this would take possibly six weeks to do, he said "we have orders from the Public Service Commission and we can't wait. There won't

be cable TV unless we can proceed."

Jeff Billingsley, public works director, said the laying of the coaxial cable hadn't posed any problems yet "so we haven't stopped them," though he said there had to be some kind of control because the lines will be laid next to power company and utility lines. "They can't put it anywhere they want."

The company must have their satellite receiving station in by October 20, Greenspun said. He added that they had the franchise for the entire populated area of Clark County.

Dollar Days Are Coming

Remember those bargains from local merchants that you get on Dollar Days?

Well, it's that time again, and next week the local merchants are marking their merchandise for those special days where you save dollars.

The advertising pages of this newspaper will be filled with bargains offered to local shoppers.

Pecos be eliminated; a design plan is to be submitted for the property within three months of approval of the reclassification by council; and that construction is to start within one year of the design approvals.

In other actions the council: --Approved a variance for John Minefee to allow five lots with less than 6,000 square feet in an R-1 district. At 1900, 1904 and 1908 Evelyn Street and 1901 and 1905 Margarota Street in the Pittman area.

Minefee started to build three small houses and when the concrete pads were laid out, they were located 10 ft. farther back from the street than the 25 foot setback. This pushed them to within 5 ft. of the rear property line.

City staff allowed the houses to be finished if a re-subdivision was initiated to gain the required rear yard.

No electrical service would be allowed until the subdivision work was completed.

Three of the houses are now finished and ready for occupancy with two buildable lots waiting, however the re-subdivision of land supercedes the old policy of the 4,000 sq. ft. buildable lots that exist all around this site. The R-1 district minimum size lots is 6,000 sq. ft. and these five lots are less than 5,000 sq. ft.

--Approved resubdivision map for John Minefee for five lots in Block 5 of the original Midway City subdivision.

--Approved a revised tentative map for Henderson Casa Linda Unit no. 4, consisting of 718 lots in 153 acres with seven acres of C-1 (neighborhood commercial) located with the R-1 off Pueblo, Warm Springs, Drake and Racetrack Roads requested by Delta Engineering for Halco, Inc.

SEC Charges \$4.8 Million Land Fraud Here

Four Henderson land developers who purchased land from the city, have been charged with defrauding \$4.8 million from investors who bought unimproved desert land, it was learned here.

The SEC said the property consists of 2,560 acres of unimproved dry desert land strewn with volcanic rock and mesquite brush with no supply of water or power. It is located just south of Green Valley.

In a civil action filed in U.S. District Court in Honolulu, the commission said the salesmen promised spectacular profits to more than 900 investors in Hawaii who purchased property from them in huge markups. The SEC claims the land was purchased for \$1,458,000 and resold 1,610 acres for a gross sales price of \$6,258,050.

The defendants failed to disclose that the sales prices included 30 percent to 40 percent commissions and markups of up to 956 percent over the purchase prices, the SEC said.

The SEC asked that a federal judge appoint a receiver to take over and manage all assets relating to the case and bar the defendants from future violations of federal securities laws to protect the public from their "unlawful schemes."

The defendants include Richard MacDonald, 58, his wife Frances, 55, and their son Richard, 34, who formed several business ventures to promote investments in Nevada land. Also named was Herbert Schley, 41, a limited partner in one of the ventures and the most prolific salesman the MacDonalds employed, the SEC said.

The business ventures, all based in Hawaii, included Las Vegas View Properties and Las Vegas Hawaiian Ventures, limited partnerships formed in 1971; Las Vegas Hawaiian Equities, a general partnership formed in 1972; Tauri Investment Corp., formed in 1972; and MacDonald & Associates Realty Inc., a licensed real estate brokerage firm incorporated in 1971.

According to the SEC, the MacDonalds learned in 1970 that two sections of undeveloped desert land near Las Vegas were up for sale. The MacDonalds formed two limited partnerships that, in March 1971, each acquired one square mile, or a section (640 acres), of undeveloped property in Henderson for a gross purchase price of \$352,000, or \$550 per acre.

The SEC said the partnerships each made a down payment of \$50,000 and agreed to pay the balance in seven years of monthly installments. A short time later, the MacDonalds bought two adjacent sections of land, one through a partnership that paid \$678 per acre, the other through a corporation that paid \$500 per acre. Those purchases included small down payments and promissory notes for the balance.

The MacDonalds then formed the brokerage firm and began offering fractional undivided interests in the four sections to the public at "enormous markups," the SEC said.

The initial sales price was \$4,240 per fractional undivided interest, or the equivalent of \$3,400 per acre, the SEC said. The MacDonalds increased the purchase price as sales progressed until investors were paying \$5,280 per acre by the end of 1974, or 956 percent above the price the business ventures paid for some of the property.

The defendants conducted high-powered sales meetings - which included a Las Vegas Chamber of Commerce film extolling the city's attractions - promising substantial profits to those who made "short-term" investments in the property, the SEC said.

The commission said the defendants:

-Failed to disclose that the property was owned by business ventures controlled by the MacDonalds and that investors could lose all claim to the property if the ventures defaulted on their obligations.

-Failed to reveal that the sales prices offered to investors had "no reasonable relationship to the true market value of the property."

-Failed to disclose that the sales prices included a commission of 30 percent to 40 percent.

-Made false assertions that the investments involved no risk, would be short-term and that investors would realize as much as 1,000 percent profit when the land was resold.

SEC Attorney Steven N. Machtinger said the commission's motion for a preliminary injunction and appointment of a receiver has been scheduled for August 6 in Honolulu.

McDonald said the allegations are based on claims that securities -- not land, were sold. He said his attorneys say there is no way the SEC can win its case against the MacDonalds.

He said the defendants hope to form limited partnerships with the 900 investors and then develop commercial and residential projects on the properties as joint ventures once the charges are settled.

Council Waives Hospital's Late Charges

St. Rose de Lima Hospital can start their fiscal year with a clean slate as the city council Monday night waived late charges amounting to \$3,837.57 which has been accumulating since 1973 on their garbage and sewer statements.

Sister Kathryn Noonan, controller of the hospital, wrote that she is "concerned about these late charges because it appears we have been negligent. Fortunately, you and the members of the council know that St. Rose de Lima as a non-profit hospital endeavors to serve the Henderson community and strives to pay for services rendered."

"Since the late charges have occurred due to the hospital constantly being one month behind in paying their bill, the council voted unanimously to waive the late charges since they are non-profit "and the only hospital the city has," said Mayor Lorin Williams.

In other actions the council: --Approved a request for the repair of the air conditioning at city hall for a cost of \$7,020, with funding to come from the city hall renovations account in the land fund. Action Air Conditioning will do the repairs.

--Approved a resolution to increase the spending limit on purchases that do not require competitive bidding from \$2,500 to \$5,000.

--Approved a resolution to change the salary schedule for the firefighters.

--Approved the job description for a senior engineering technician.

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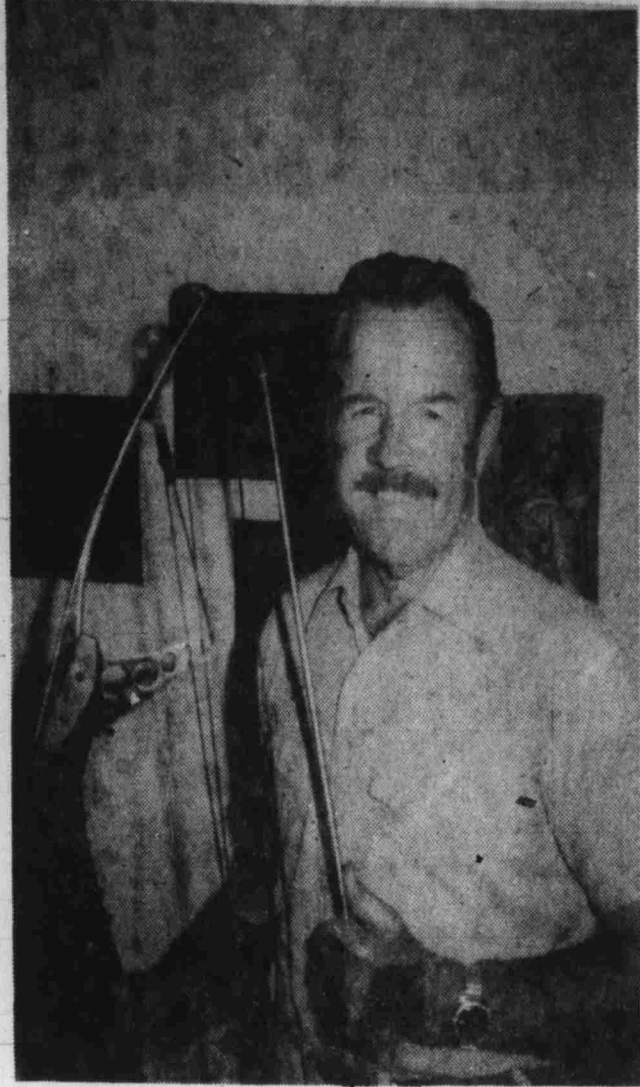
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"ACTION PEOPLE"

Believing in "living life to the fullest" Carlyle Sullivan can best be depicted as the Action Person's "Action People!" In all he undertakes, he gives the best within his scope (which is quite wide). In his life as Bailiff for the District Court since 1971, he meets the daily challenge of seeing that "order" is carried out within the courtroom. "Bailiffs are no longer the pot-bellied 'Hear ye, hear ye, the Court will now come to order' type as seen in the old movies," Carlyle pointed out, "but now we are looked upon as the protector of the courtroom, the inhabitants, and the presiding judge. We are police and F.B.I. trained in the procedure of protection and are called upon to qualify in the use of firearms!" The Bailiff is expected to take charge of the members of the Jury on cases calling for a jury. He guards, guides them to their hotel rooms, looks out for their comfort, and generally watches that there is no contact between the members and the outside world while in the midst of decision making. The Bailiff is employed by the County.

Weekends find Carlyle and his pretty and personable wife, Nancy, at their cabin at Mammoth Creek, Utah where they target shoot and fish; or perhaps one might find them and their children up at Mt. Charleston at the Deer Creek Range for archery practice, or at the Archery Range at Spring Mountain. Both Carlyle and Nancy are champion archers. Although Nancy "pins the roses" on Carlyle for archery skill, she can also take a big "bow" for her performance in capturing the Championship for 1977 and 1978 as Women's Nevada State Bow Hunter.

Both marriage partners have been married before. Mr. Sullivan's children by a previous marriage are adults and have gained credits in their own right: Larry - recently made Captain of the Henderson Fire Department; Steve - Basic High School Teacher; Madelon - Beauty Operator; Paul - Real Estate Broker and Meat Cutter (Henderson); Terry - Bailiff and Insurance Salesman; Greg - Counselor at the Spring Mountain Youth Camp. Mr. Sullivan serves as father to Nancy's children (all outstanding archers, dancers and brimming with talent): Nikki - Age 17; Deana - Age 16; Jimmy - Age 13; and Kimberly Age 12. Nancy Spence married Carlyle Sullivan in 1971 and they are both avid members of the "Mutual Admiration Society!" They refer to one another as "fantastic" and one would agree with their optimistic and enthusiastic approach to life.

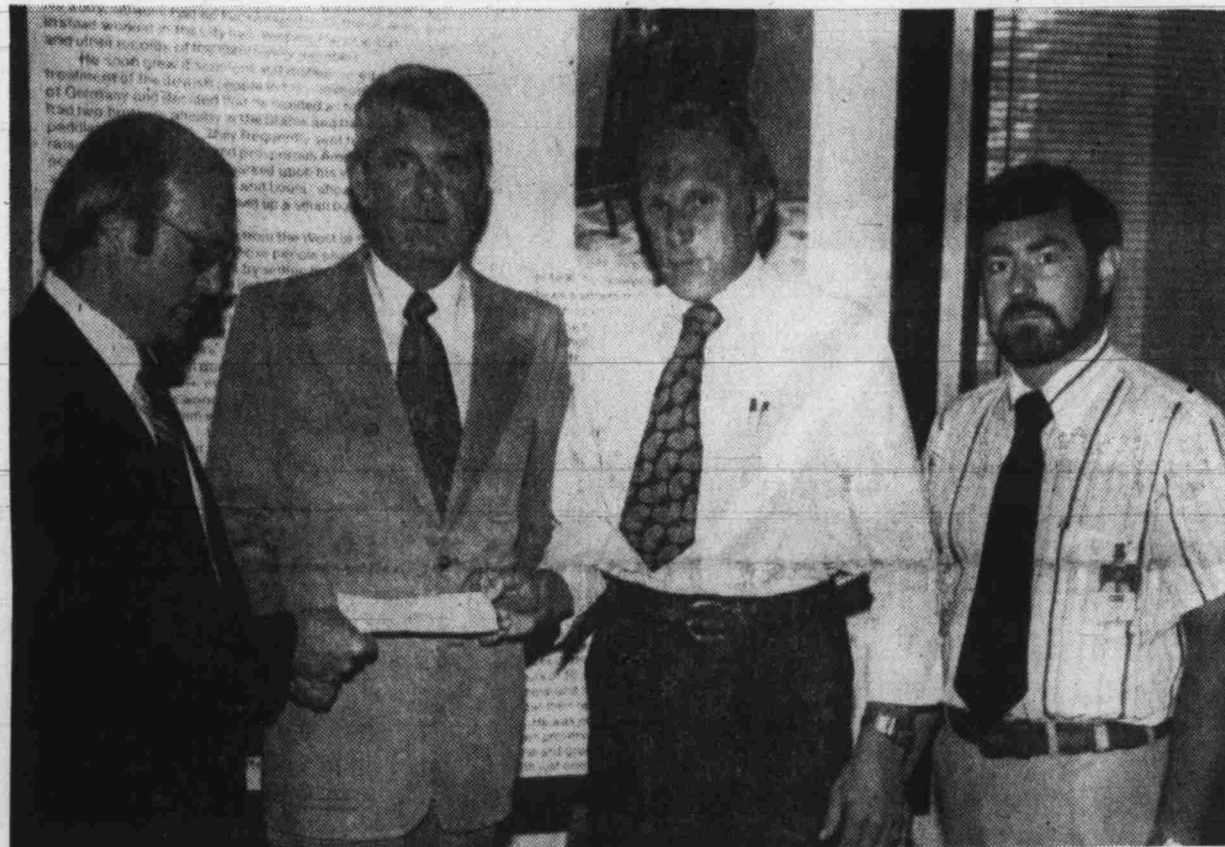

Michael Meyer, executive director of the club, and Joseph Cunningham, president, accepted the check which will be used for a summer program for boys and girls in the Spring Valley area of Clark County.

The organization had applied to the Foundation, which is located in San Francisco, for a grant to help fund their summer project and the money was presented to them through local Levi personnel.

Meyer explained that there were no services available to the boys and girls living in the Spring Valley area so, with the help of the Clark County School District which al-

"We are working with about 250 youth each day," Meyer said, "with a staff of four. One of our full-time staff members is heading it up assisted by three college students. There is outdoor recreation where the kids can play baseball, basketball etc. and also a games room with pool tables, ping pong and other indoor activities such as arts and crafts. Each week a food and nutrition class is held in the kitchen.

The program runs from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. each of the four days and on Friday field trips are taken to such places as Hoover Dam, Mt. Charleston and other area points of interest.

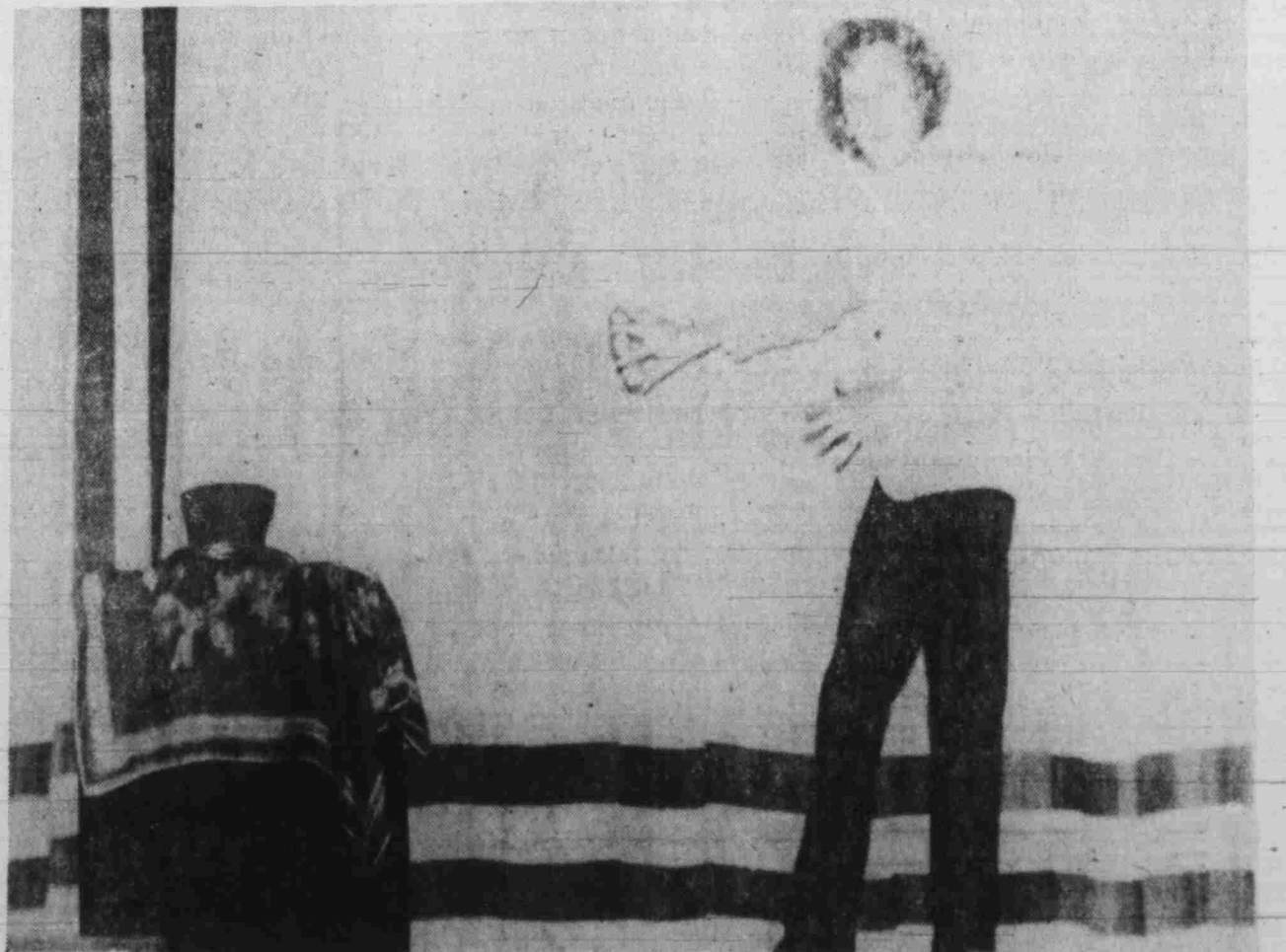
Skaters Sponsor Car Wash

"There is a place for women in fire departments," she said. "Although not many women are really interested in being on the truck, working with the heavy hoses,

this kind of thing.

"But the fire prevention business is a good place for women, they can read the code books just as well as a man, and they can do a good job of enforcing the codes."

Schmitz told Rotarians at their weekly meeting Tuesday that "you can save a buck if your business is safe."

Some of the dangers to look out for include defective wiring on appliances, extension cords not of a gauge equivalent to the electrical appliance on which it is being used, faulty wires on air conditioning units on the roof, gas equipment such as hot water heaters with flammable materials stored near by.

She also explained that, as of July 1, all buildings with sprinkler systems must be inspected and flowed three times a year

and at least one of those times by a licensed contractor.

"If you don't flow it then you don't know if the valves are open," she said, explaining that, especially around a building where new construction is taking place, rocks can get into sprinkler system water lines and cause them to plug up.

Schmitz warned that many restaurant owners

may have to have their kitchen hood system installations redone as former installation companies did poor jobs. These should also be checked two times a year.

"The best fire prevention is good housekeeping," she concluded, and fire prevention innovations will eventually pay for themselves through lower fire insurance rates.

This picture of Edith Bigelow was taken in 1949 in Los Angeles, Calif., where she was studying to become a Welcome Wagon Hostess -- an occupation at which she never felt very successful and continued for only a short time.

A native of British Columbia, she came to Nevada with her husband, Eddy Bigelow, in 1949 and lived in Las Vegas five years before moving to Henderson.

Eddy had a garage in Las Vegas and was an expert at "souping up" cars for use in drag racing.

One Sunday afternoon they decided to take a drive out the Tonopah Highway. They were approaching a hill when a car came over the top, traveling at an estimated speed of 110 miles per hour. The driver touched the brakes and tried to pull the car to the side of the road and instead it went over the center line and hit the Bigelows' car.

Edith had a number of broken ribs and both arms were injured. Her right arm was broken at the elbow and a number of other places. She spent five weeks with her arms tied up to an overhead support and was in the hospital two months.

Their small son, Eddy, was also injured.

Edith's fingers were all badly broken and it took years of work to make them do the things fingers are meant to do. As a beginner, she mended runs in nylon stockings and did invisible mending. She also did alterations on suits for Perry's Men's Shop.

Edith was a member of Toastmistress Club for a number of years and was always being evaluated for holding her arm in front of her stomach; a stance which is always frowned upon in Toastmistress circles. It was ages before any of the members realized that Edith couldn't straighten her arm.

Edith and Mr. Bigelow came to the parting of the ways a number of years ago. Her daughter Sheila Suphus and partner Ruthann Ware operate a painting and wallpapering business; son DeWayne Martin is serving with the Air Force; son Ed is secretary of Wallternatives Inc., a fine arts company specializing in murals and Steve is employed as Q.M.E.D. in the engine room of a ship which carries bananas and coffee and 112 passengers; the Santa Mercedes of the Delta Line.

Steve has learned to speak Spanish and is presently studying Portuguese. Steve went to Europe with his mother in 1972 and liked travel so much he enrolled in the Harry Lundeberg School of Seaman-ship.

Edith also has two sons by her first husband, Jack Chester. Son Jack owns a hotel in Fort Renfrew, British Columbia and Roy is a mechanic in Kamloops, British Columbia.

Recently, Edith enjoyed a trip to England as a member of the Friendship Force, inaugurated by President and Mrs. Carter. She was a guest at the home of Peggy Higgin on Newcastle on Tyne. The trip, organized locally by Lila Zona, included 254 Americans and lasted 11 days.

MORE PLANTS COMING HERE TO SUPPLY STATE STOVE NEEDS: OFFICIALS EXPLAIN

There'll be more plants coming to Henderson to serve as suppliers to the needs of State Stove & Manufacturing Company, we were informed in an interview with the firm's vice-president and co-owner Herb Lindahl here yesterday.

"There will be a box container factory for sure and others who make component parts for our water heaters will be locating here to be nearer to their market," Lindahl said.

Accompanying him to our luncheon date was the man who will run the show here -- Jim Starke -- who filled us in on some pertinent operational facts, such as:

"Hiring of help will start a month to six weeks from now, although starting Wednesday we'll have application forms on hand and we'll welcome all applicants.

"Those who have already given us their names impress us greatly and we are sure the labor market here will be as fine as we expected.

"We will teach the employees as we go into production. We will bring in 15 to 20 technicians from the parent plant in Ashland City, Tennessee. We expect to be in production by Sept. 1.

"We will make a minimum of 250,000 heaters a year but will be able to do 100,000 more in time. We make a million units a year in Tennessee.

"Workers will be trained in all types of work, from punch presses to spray painting to welding to office work. Some women will be employed although the majority by far will be men. We have 1000 employees in Tennessee of which about 15 are women.

"We seek people who want stability in their jobs because the cost of training is impractical to have a big turnover."

Hospital Updates Cardiac Care Services

For the past month and a half some important changes have been taking place at St. Rose de Lima Hospital as a division of cardiology is being established on the first floor at the local hospital.

Dr. Edward Quinn of Southwest Heart Associates in Las Vegas explained the hospital administrators were anxious to upgrade the services of

their intensive care unit/ cardiac care unit so they could become more of a community hospital in the way of cardiac care.

Quinn, who is director of cardiology for the hospital, comes from Las Vegas three half days a week along with Erin McDonald, a registered nurse, who is a cardiac respiratory specialist and also works with the South-

west Heart Associates of Drs. Anthony Marlon, Joseph Kaufman and Quinn.

One of the new pieces of equipment in the cardiology unit is an exercise treadmill used for stress testing.

"And we are also in the process of hooking up our EKG which will patch into the computer at Southern Nevada Memorial Hospital and can give us an instant reading," Quinn

explained.

Heretofore it could take hours or days to get a reading.

The hospital's EKG is portable and can be used in the cardiac unit or taken to the emergency room, patient's room or any place else in the hospital where needed.

They also have a sonar machine which sees inside the heart and reads instantaneously.

"We are primarily con-

sultants," Quinn explained, "and the tests we run on patients, both in-patient and out-patient, are referred to us by other doctors."

One of the duties Quinn has assumed is lecturing to some of the nursing staff, "jacking everybody up another level so they will be prepared when the updates ICU/CCU is completed, hopefully next year."

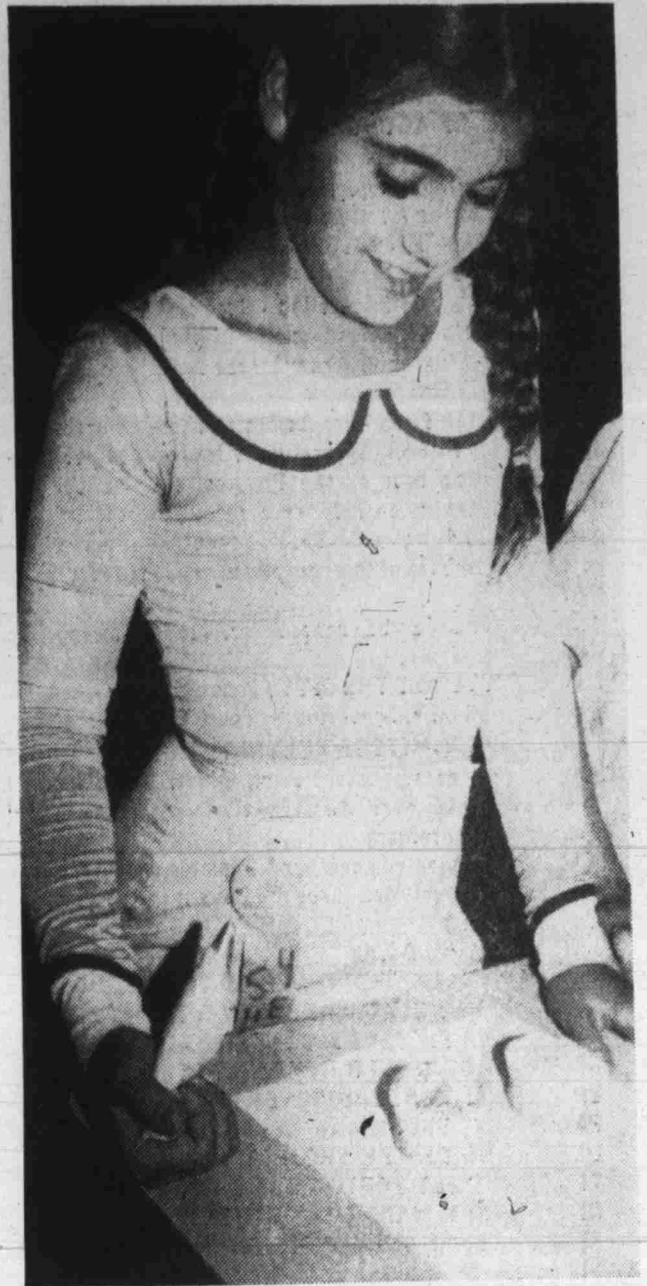


LAST WEEK the first session of the Henderson Public Library's summer reading program came to an end. Fourth, fifth and sixth graders in the

allowing seven hits - the Pass defense really tightening up and shutting down ten Paval baserunners.

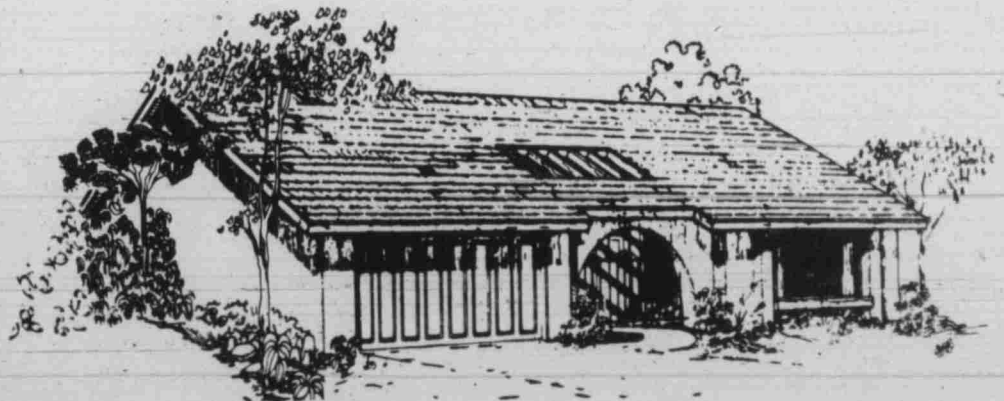

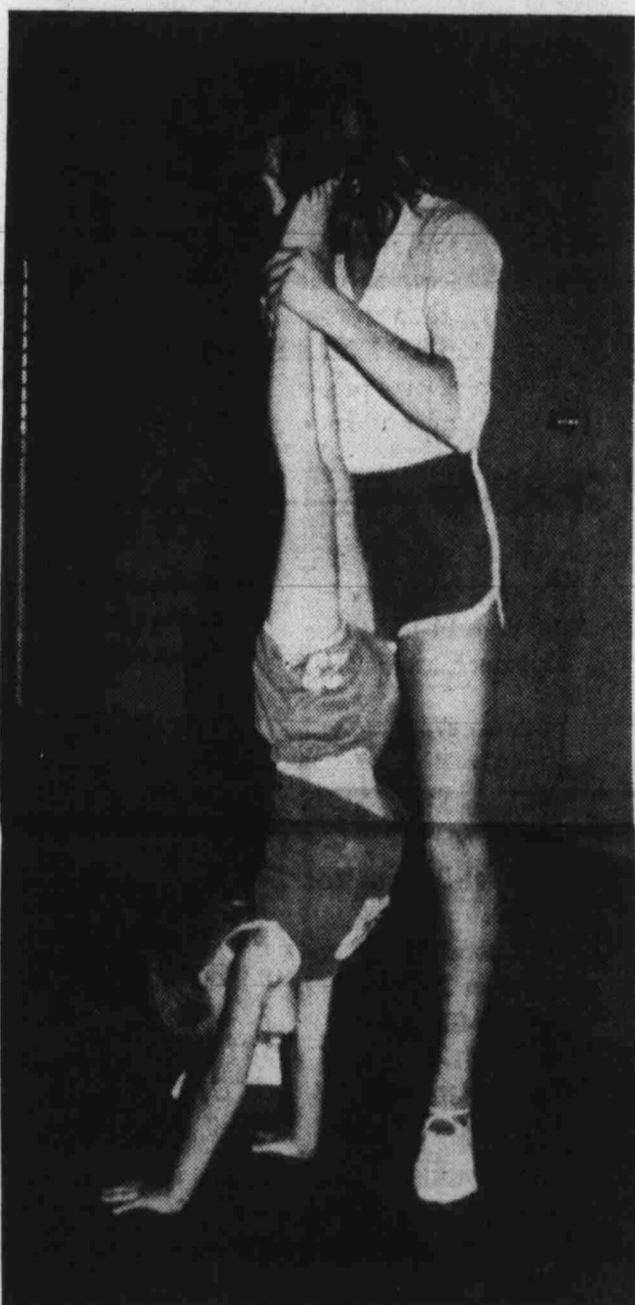

"The government can't do everything for everyone," Taylor said. He said he agreed with Senator Paul Laxalt's assessment of the talk that "he (Carter) wailed on Washington and then gave them more power."

Gary Johnson, manager of the Henderson Chamber of Commerce, said he is prepared to make serious changes in his pattern of living to be more conservative and resourceful with energy.

To back up his claim, Johnson purchased a motorcycle which he rides 99 per cent of the time and gets 50 miles to the gallon. If he is attending a meeting or luncheon he joins a car pool.

Last week Johnson and his wife took a vacation to San Diego and they rode the motorcycle. They rode 900 miles and it cost \$21.

He recently installed a new refrigeration unit, but to conserve, also installed a swamp cooler. Unless the humidity is unbearable they use the swamp cooler which he feels runs about one-tenth the cost of the refrigeration.

"His message is we've got to be more resourceful," Johnson said. "It's hard to do but we can learn to do the best we can with what we have."

Johnson said he is convinced the conservation is necessary. He said his gas bill was around \$80 but with the motorcycle it has been cut to \$26 per month.

"The only way to get the message through is in the pocket book," Johnson said. "What we have to do now is unprogram ourselves and stop spoiling ourselves, it's hard to do but we can."

Swimming Pool Feasibility Study Due Here

Boulder City
The feasibility study by Swimming Pool Consultant Milton Costello for the public swimming pool complex in Boulder City is completed and

should be in the hands of Recreation and Parks personnel by next week. The study represents the culmination of efforts of many, including local individuals and or-

ganizations who assisted in the gathering of input data for Costello.

Community involvement included the formation of a Swimming Pool Steering Committee composed of local residents. This committee divided into three smaller groups to explore areas of financing, facilities and community information and involvement. Final reports from these three sub-

committees were included in the material used by Costello in preparing his analysis and recommendations. An "attitude and interest" survey was conducted to poll residents on their use of the pool complex as well as to explore their areas of interest and attitudes towards an expanded pool operation. The extensive telephone survey was conducted through the assistance of several local organizations including the A.A.U.W., Beta Sigma Phi Lambda Chapter, Girl Scout

Troop Leaders and approximately 40 individual volunteers.

Results of the survey are reproduced here. The poll shows that the majority of people use the pool during the day, with 154 in the day, 44 evenings and 82 on weekends.

Children use the pool more with 120, 53 teenagers, 20 young adults, 88 adults and 13 senior citizens.

A total of 137 non-swimmers take instruction, 130 swimmers, 74 swimmers, 85 handicapped, and 108 pre-school children.

Concerning the fees, whether they are reasonable or not, 237 said the \$30 family ticket is reasonable, 22 no and 22 unknown.

A family ticket of \$20 for two members received a yes vote of 273, no of 24 and unknown 25.

The daily use for adults at 50 cents, 288 said it was reasonable, 15 no, and 21 unknown.

The daily use for child for 50 cents, 249 said it was reasonable, 36 no, and 21 unknown.

The senior citizen price of 25 cents per swim received a 272 yes vote, 13 no and 20 unknown.

Three hundred and 19 persons said they felt if the high school used the facilities the school district should contribute to the operating cost, 13 said no and 56 unknown. A total of 131 said the

present location of the pool is satisfactory, three said no.

Most people felt the hours were reasonable, and the majority felt a new pool should be paid for from bonding.


There are a lot of people you know and who know

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Willow Beach Campground To Close

The National Park Service campground and picnic area at Willow Beach, Ariz., was closed Monday because of potential flood hazards; Superintendent Jerry D. Wagers, Lake Mead National Recreation Area announced today. In addition, the concessioner trailer village will be closed and vacated by mid-August.

"The closure was necessary both to reduce the risk of property damage and to minimize the impact of flash floods on human safety, health and welfare," Wagers said. Recent investigations of flood potential have pointed out that from 6-13 feet of water are likely to flow down the washes in which facilities are located in the event of a 100-year flood.

Wagers said that all other facilities at Willow Beach on Lake Mohave remain open. Motel, restaurant, store, and marina services continue to be available at the Willow Beach Resort, and the public launch ramp and parking remain open for visitor use. Campers have been directed to other campgrounds at Boulder Beach and Temple Bar.

The potential of flash flooding in desert wash areas of Lake Mead National Recreation Area was demonstrated on September 14, 1974, when an intense thunderstorm in the 23 square mile Eldorado drainage resulted in a flash flood which destroyed the Eldorado Canyon Resort (Nelson's Landing) on the Nevada shore of Lake Mohave and resulted in the loss of nine lives and property damage estimated at \$475,000. Eldorado Canyon is approximately 14 miles south of the Willow Beach development.

The flood prompted the National Park Service to contract with the U.S. Geological Survey and the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers for a series of detailed hydrologic studies of existing, as well as proposed developments within the national Recreation Area.

The National Park Service received a detailed "Potential Flood and Debris Hazards" study from the U.S. Geological Survey covering Willow Beach. The report indicates that flood flows of a 100 year storm would send up to thirteen feet of water down Jumbo Wash which is the site of the Willow Beach campground. The drainage area for Jumbo Wash (36 square miles) is one and a half times larger than the Eldorado Canyon drainage. A 100 year storm would also send up to seven feet of water down Willow Beach Wash, threatening concessioner facilities, and six feet of water down Access Road Wash.

Upon review of the report, Wagers requested a flood mitigation study by an interdisciplinary team of professionals to examine possible alternatives to protect the development at Willow Beach from flood hazards. This study, completed in January 1979, placed the cost of mitigation measures at

more than 41 million dollars to protect against the 100 year flood. "The National Park Service will continue with studies to identify possible alternate safe locations for a campground and picnic areas in the vicinity," Wagers said. "Additional flood protection to the facilities which will remain at the development will be provided."

"We recognize the problems and inconvenience associated with this closure action," Wagers said. "However, we believe the knowledge of severe flash flood potential compels us to take action in the interest of public safety and to reduce property damage."

An informational public meeting was conducted Saturday at the Alan Bible

Visitor Center located four miles east of Boulder City at the intersection of Highway 93 and Lakeshore Road.

Additional meetings will be held to answer questions of concerned citizens. In addition, anyone having questions is encouraged to call the Superintendent's Office at (702) 293-4041.

National Park Service Announces Changes In Aids To Navigation

Superintendent Jerry D. Wagers announced today that two navigational lights on Lake Mead have been disestablished. One is the Callville Bay entrance light at: 36 degrees 07 minutes 57 seconds North 114 degrees 41 minutes 35 seconds West and the other is the Saddle Island light which is located on

the north side of the entrance to Boulder Harbor at: 36 degrees 03 minutes 17 seconds North 114 degrees 47 minutes 58 seconds West. The entrance to both Callville Bay and Boulder harbor have been more adequately marked by the installation of harbor entrance mid-channel buoys.

The mid-channel buoys

display a white light that flashes for 0.4 second, is off for 0.6 second, is on again for 0.4 second, then off for 3.6 seconds after which the sequence is repeated.

Santini Supports Development Of Gasohol Plants

Under a new federal program, farmers may be fueling their tractors with gasohol by 1981, according to Rep. Jim Santini, a member of the Congressional Gasohol Caucus.

Santini today threw his support behind a plan which calls for the Economic Development Administration (EDA) to spend \$10 million over the next three years to pay for construction of 100 small-scale alcohol fuel plants across the United States. The gasohol produced at the plants would be used solely by farmers and farm cooperatives as fuel for transportation.

"Combined with our other domestic sources of fuel, gasohol could become a key ingredient in our formula for curing this nation's energy ills," Santini said.

He explained that the

plants would be constructed as public works projects. Qualified public entities or non-profit organizations such as farm co-ops, economic development districts and public works authorities would be eligible to apply for the

funding. Ethanol and anhydrous alcohol are expected to be the main types of alcohol produced at the plants. The products would then be mixed with unleaded gasoline at a ratio of 90 percent gas/10 percent alcohol.

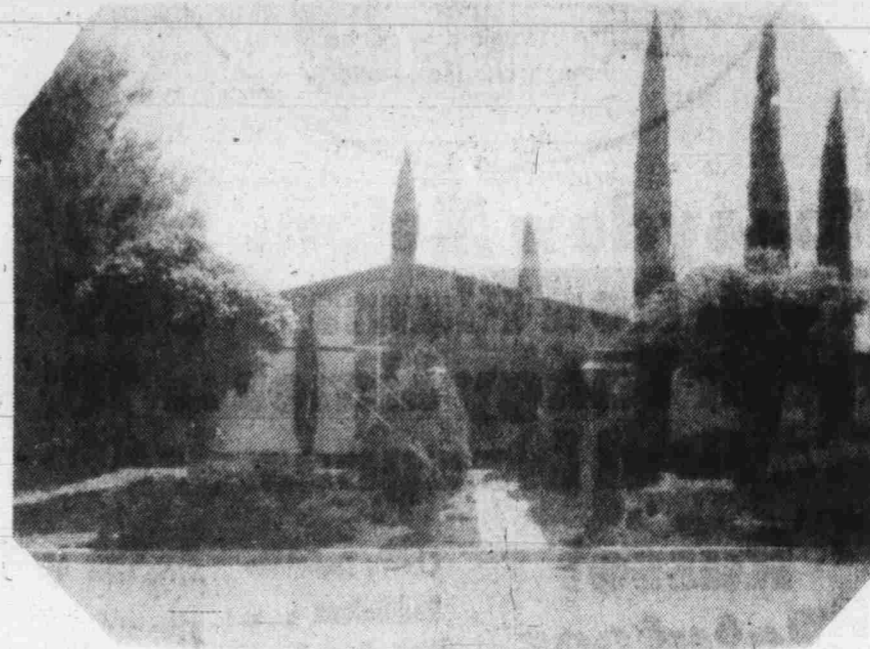

Spending Control Resisted By States and the Feds

By Ernest L. Newton

"From what pollsters, politicians and commentators tell us daily, most Americans think that Government has gotten 'out of hand'; that there is no one at the throttle; that, seemingly there are no throttles." Thus does David Walker of the Advisory Commission on Governmental Relations characterize the mood of America. There is reason to believe he is right.

The problem, then, is to either (1) to convince the people otherwise, or (2) to devise programs that will reduce the activities (and cost) of government.

At the moment, it appears that the governmental apparatus is pinning its hopes on efforts to convince the electorate that the administrative and legislative bodies can impose fiscal restraint; and that they will do so. They insist that either statutory or constitutional controls on growth of government are so inflexible that such controls cannot meet the needs of the people; that the hazards of natural disasters, unemployment and recession could not be countered by government spending to reduce or overcome economic destabilization.

With 50 years of governmental policies designed to induce inflation and dedicated to the theory that the votes of the majority of citizens are for sale (a not unreasonable theory) it will be difficult, if not impossible to convince a majority of the Congress that drastically reduced government spending and the resultant control of inflation will please a majority of the voters.

Despite the apprehension of the professionals in government, there is reason to believe that Americans will insist on direct restraint of government. That restraint is proposed by a score of bills in the Congress as statutory enactments; and is proposed by more than thirty states which have demanded that the Congress call a constitutional convention for the preparation of a limiting amendment to the federal constitution. Such a limit could be lifted by an extraordinary majority of both houses of the Congress.

It is not unreasonable to expect that by early 1980 the required 34 states will have demanded constitutional action. The danger of ill-considered action is minimized by the fact that, when and if proposed, such a constitutional amendment would have to be ratified by 38 states. The over-lying problem is that the Congress has interposed the power of the government in fields it should never have entered. That imposition has been disastrous to the finances and the character of the citizenry.

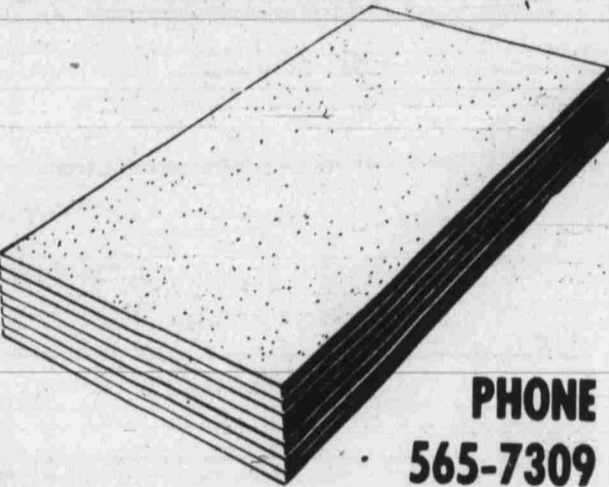

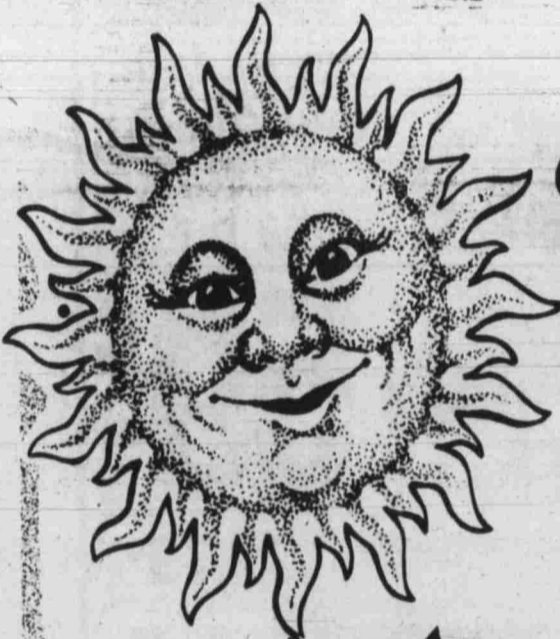

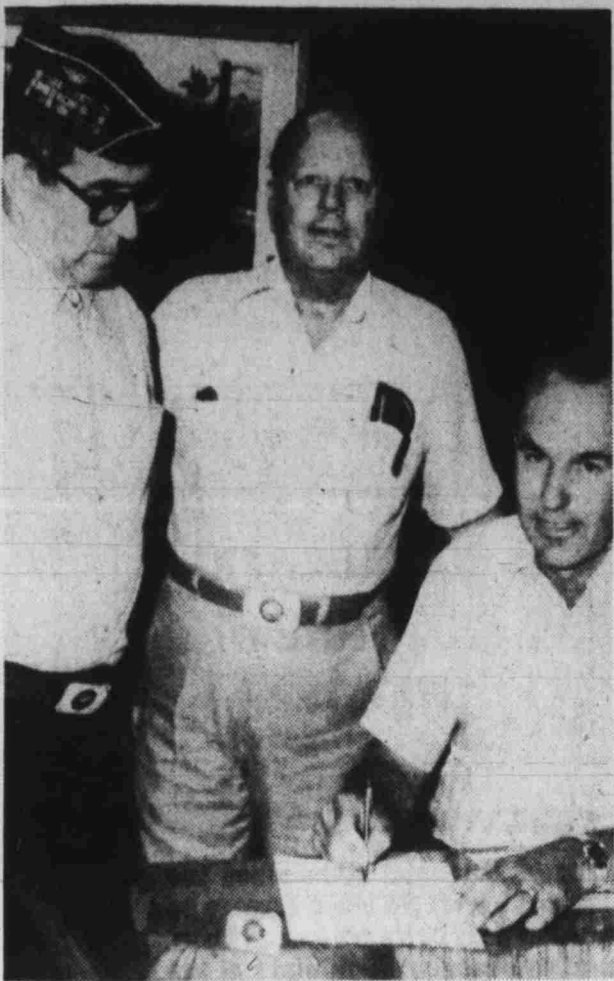

Proclamation

Cronk and Fontaine are the only two Boulder City members of the Las Vegas-based Chapter 7-11 of the American Ex-Prisoners of War organization. Fontaine is also the chairman of a nationwide ex-POW convention to be held in Las Vegas next July.

President Carter and Congress have proclaimed July 18 as National Prisoners in Action Recognition Day, and Mayor Robert S. Ferraro has followed suit by declaring this week POW-MIA Recognition Week for Boulder City. Following is the text of the mayor's proclamation.

WHEREAS, Nevadans will always remember the unselfish devotion to duty of our men and women in uniform; and WHEREAS, our servicemen have made innumerable sacrifices to preserve this great nation from its enemies; and WHEREAS, a total of 142,227 uniformed personnel were held as prisoners of war by this country's enemies during those periods of time designated as World War I, World War II, Korean War and Vietnam War; and WHEREAS, a total of 125,170 of these persons were returned to the United States military control upon liberation from the enemy; and

Should one want to pick out the typical "Action Person" filled with enthusiasm, optimism, and "get things done-ness," the perfect choice would be the personable Chuck Brechler. He has served with the Transportation Commission since the beginning as "first employee" in 1966, and is the only remaining employee of the first group. His persistence in the good led to putting through the problem of major street development by the legislature in 1965 such as: Charleston, Nellis, and Tropicana along with many others. The opening of Horizon Drive for development was one of Mr. Brechler's projects. He works a very full 5-day week with two nightly meetings of City Council and the Planning Commission. He presides over the other engineers and meets the responsibility.

Prior to his current position, Mr. Brechler served as City Engineer of Boulder City from 1962-1966. During this time the zoning and Sub-Division Ordinance was passed to his credit. Chuck was an avid ski-jumper in Wisconsin placing second and third in many contests or meets. He was a football star on his high school and college teams serving the position of quarterback. As a young man he took care of the outdoor City Ice Skating Rink. After graduation from high school he attended the Wisconsin Institute of Technology graduating (in a class of 16 students) with the Bachelor of Science Degree - Engineering Major. Three separate hunts will be open to residents; archery, muzzleloader and the general or any legal weapon hunt. Non-residents are only eligible to apply for an archery or general hunt tag.

Although all tag applications must be postmarked on or before July 25 to be eligible for the first drawing, such applications will be accepted from the post office by DOW until 5 p.m., August first.

The first drawing, shortly after the August 1 closing date, will be for those with preferential drawing status who applied for a tag. Preferential drawing status is

Applications for archery deer-hunt tags will be accepted through the postal system through August 7. Tags for this hunt after August 7 will

also be available on a first-to-apply, first-served basis.

Approximately four weeks are required for post deadline (August 1) processing of applications. Notices of applicant status will be mailed by the end of August.

The 1979 deer season brochures and tag applications forms are available at all NDOW offices and license agents throughout the state.

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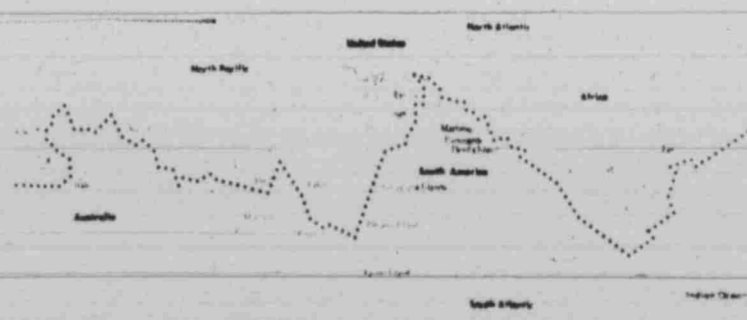
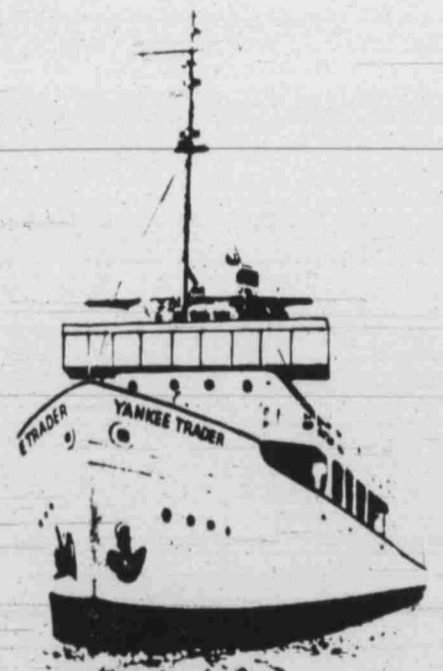
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All About Cheese

Beef prices are scheduled to go up - fish, that was usually one of the more economical foods, is hardly a buy these days, and the list goes on. But there is always cheese. Not to say that cheese hasn't escalated in price, but compared to beef, fish and yes, even chicken, cheese continues to be a bargain.

It is hardly news that cheese is a food that contains a lot of protein, vitamins, and other nutrients necessary to good health and physical stamina. So important has cheese become that today according to the U.S. Department of Agriculture, almost one-fifth of the U.S. milk production goes into cheese.

A few random bits of information about this fine food. When cheese making first began in this country about 150 years ago, the cheese took their names from the foreign places of their origin... Cheddar and Stilton, from England; Muenster from Germany; Port du Salut, Camembert, Brie, Roquefort from France; and Romano from Italy, to name a few. And what is the difference between process cheese and pasteurized process cheese food?

Pasteurized process cheese is a blend of fresh and aged natural cheeses which have been shredded, mixed and heated - pasteurized after which no further ripening occurs, according to the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

Pasteurized process cheese food is prepared in much the same manner except that it contains less cheese with nonfat dry milk or whey solids and water.

In our family, cheese was offered many times instead of sweets, and our innovative parents cut the different cheeses in easy-to-handle cubes, so love for cheese of any kind is common to all the members of my family.

A seafood crepe recipe which includes Swiss cheese is excellent for a late night supper and equally acceptable for a dinner party.

SEAFARER'S CREPES
Basic Crepes
4 eggs
¼ tsp. salt
2 cups flour
2 & one-third cups milk

½ cup vegetable oil
SEAFARER'S FILLING
One 10-oz. package little baby early peas frozen in butter sauce

One 10½ oz. can condensed cream of shrimp soup
One 2½ oz. jar sliced mushrooms, drained
¼ cup shredded Swiss cheese

2 Tbsp. dairy sour cream
One 4½ oz. can shrimp, rinsed and drained
12 crepes
one-third cup shredded Swiss cheese
Grated Parmesan cheese

BASIC CREPES: Beat eggs and salt together with an egg beater or electric mixer. Add flour and milk gradually and alternately, beating after each addition until smooth. Beat in oil. If you wish, leave the batter stand at room temperature for an hour.

Heat a 6 to 8 inch non-stick skillet-saute pan over a medium-high heat (regular skillets should be lightly greased). Lift the pan - above the heating element as you pour in 2 to 3 tablespoons of batter so it covers the bottom of the pan. Place the pan over the heat and cook until golden brown. Carefully turn the crepe with a rubber spatula. Remove crepe from pan with spatula and stack on a plate. Makes 25 or 30 crepes.

This basic recipe makes a lot of crepes - great for making ahead and keeping on hand. If you don't care to have the extras, simply cut the recipe in half to have enough for the Seafarer's Crepes.

SEAFARER'S FILLING: Cook peas according to package direction, only until thawed. Snip pouch and drain butter sauce into a medium saucepan; combine with soup and mushrooms; heat through. Stir in Swiss cheese and sour cream. Heat until cheese is melted.

Combine peas and shrimp; place 1 or 2 spoonful on each of 12 crepes. Top with a generous spoonful of soup mixture. Fold crepes and place, seam side up, in a large shallow baking dish or 2 each in individual baking dishes. Combine remaining peas and shrimp, if any, with remaining soup mixture; spoon over crepes.

Top with Swiss cheese and sprinkle with Parmesan cheese. Bake in preheated 350 degree oven for 20 to 30 minutes. Serves 6.

For appetizers, cheese of almost any kind, is most adaptable. Cream cheese with beaten egg yolk and grated onion, broiled on a cracker, is an easy and tasty appetizer. Another, is Chilies Rellanoes.

CHILIES RELANOEES
2 cans (4 oz. each) mild green chilies

3 cups (12 oz.) shredded Monterey Jack cheese

1½ cups (6 oz.) shredded sharp Cheddar cheese
2 eggs
2 Tbsp. milk
1 Tbsp. flour
*Preheat oven to 375

degrees. Lightly grease 9 x 9 x 1½ inches pan. Cut chilies into thin strips; remove seeds if a milder flavor is desired. Alternately layer chilies with cheeses, starting and ending with the cheese. Beat eggs, milk and flour together. Pour egg mix-

ture over layered ingredients and bake for about 1 hour, or until firm. Cut into small squares and serve warm.

Left-overs are frozen easily and equally good the next go-round. Try a new cheese this week.



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President Rutherford B. Hayes' Visit To The Comstock

On September 7, 1880, about a year after the visit by ex-President Grant and his party, Virginia City was host to an even more distinguished group, President Rutherford B. Hayes and his wife, General William T. Sherman, Secretary of War Alexander Ramsey and a number of lesser military and civilian officials from Washington D.C. As was the case a year earlier, the banks, hotels, leading

businesses and private homes were festooned with patriotic bunting and streamers and several large flags were suspended over the streets on the line of the parade.

The visitors were to be met at the Gold Hill depot at 3 p.m. while interested citizens began to line the streets early in the afternoon. C Street began to take on a holiday appearance as the military companies marched up and down and the bands practiced. A large crowd also collected at the depot and other spectators took positions on the embankment opposite the depot or perched themselves on the roofs of houses in the vicinity.

Just after 3:00 o'clock, the train came in sight and ground to a halt at the depot amid the deafening screams of steam whistles, the huzzas of the multitudes of well-wishers and the boom of cannons. Governor Kinkead, who had joined the President's party at Humboldt House the night before, was also on the train, as was Mayor Stephens of Virginia City, the Honorable C.C. Stevenson of Gold Hill and other dignitaries. B.C. Whitman, the Chairman of the Reception Committee, met the party and escorted them to their carriages. The members

of Phil Kearney Post No. 10, G.A.R., formed a mounted guard and President Hayes stood with uncovered head while the band played a patriotic piece.

The parade formed quickly and as the procession reached the top of the Divide, the whistle at the Combination Shaft gave the signal and every steamwhistle on the Comstock chimed in, raising a din over which only the twenty-one gun salute rendered by an artillery unit could be heard. Along the entire route, the sidewalks were thronged and the balconies and doors and windows were packed with spectators.

Halting at the International Hotel which had been hung with hundreds of Chinese lanterns and a double arch of lighted gas jets, the President and his party left their carriages and entered the establishment, but they were soon back out on the balcony where a handsome canopy of red, white and blue had been erected. The citizens gathered below to listen to a welcoming speech by the Mayor and an address by the President, the first ever to visit Nevada. Expressing his astonishment at the route taken by the V & T, Hayes praised the technology which had made the exploitation of

the mines possible and the industry and prosperity which he saw all around him. "Yours is a wild and barren region," he said, "but you have surrounded yourselves with all the comforts to be found in the most favored lands." Secretary of War Ramsey then spoke and was followed by General Sherman and General McDowell before the party re-boarded their carriages for a trip to the mines. The Star Spangled Banner and the large crowd began to disperse.

Under the guidance of Superintendent Patton, the party of seventeen descended the C and C Shaft and descended to the 2,300 foot level. All were astonished by the underground workings. Coming up to the 1,700 foot level, they walked to the Sutro Tunnel connection and on out to the ore breasts where the miners were at work. While there, Mrs. Hayes grasped a pick and dug out some ore, saying that she wanted to carry away a specimen of her own mining. The wonders of the mines so entranced the visitors that they wanted to stay on and explore further, but only General Sherman's teenage daughter ventured down to the very bottom of

the shaft. Johnny Noe, who had taken a picture of the Presidential party before they went down earlier in the afternoon, was on hand again to photograph them in their miners' garb, but the hour was late and his pictures did not turn out that time.

Dinner was served at the International following the mine tour. The famed hostelry had been decorated in magnificent style for the occasion. The lace curtains were draped with smilax and bouquets of flowers were arranged in vases. The word "Welcome" was artistically wrought in red and white roses and was mounted

over the window fronting the main entrance. About 8:00 o'clock, Professor Cara's Band began to play on the International's C Street balcony and the President came out a few minutes later. Speaking of his trip to the West, he assured the crowd that the affairs of the country were being well handled. In an offhand remark, he said that he would prefer to govern the country from Virginia City if he had the choice.

The Secretary of War then stepped forward to express his pleasure at being in Virginia City and "...far out of the way of the whales, the sharks and

other monsters...." he encountered daily in Washington. General Sherman then stepped forward and gave a first class patriotic talk, saying that the nation was in such good shape that things could go right along without politics or the aid of politicians. "We might now trust much to the good sense of the people," he said, "who would be very apt to stop any trouble that might be started." General McDowell also spoke briefly before the dignitaries returned to their dinner.

President Hayes and his party left for Carson City the next morning after another round of handshaking and backslapping at the Virginia City depot. In Carson City, the visitors were escorted to the Capitol for a reception and were then driven on to Lake Tahoe by the famed Hank Monk. At Glenbrook, they boarded the Meteor for a trip around the lake and later disembarked at Tahoe City for the trip to Truckee where a special train awaited to carry them on to San Francisco.

The use of the poem spread over the years in many ways, the Author was to later learn.

At the Andromedic Therapeutic Drug Treatment Center in Georgia the poem is painted on a wall next to a full length mirror so that those with drug and drug related problems may read it as they view themselves. A full page article in the Atlanta Journal on May 27, 1977 included a statement, "The poem is perhaps, the Anthem of drug rehabilitation."

In 1976 Peter DeAngelis set the poem to music with, TV personality, Guy Marks, reciting the words. The record was produced and Copyrighted by the Famous Music and Damian Music Publishing Companies.

Persons knowing Mr. Drew have written and supplied him with copies of other uses made of his poem. These have come from all parts of the U.S. and Canada.

Mr. Drew has published one booklet entitled "Rambles in Rhyme" and is preparing another, yet to be printed.

About the poem "Man In The Glass," Mr. Drew remarks that its popularity seems to off-set the defeat when it was never considered favorably as an entry in a contest sponsored by a Society of State Poets.

Royalties from the musical adaption have been dedicated to charitable purposes.

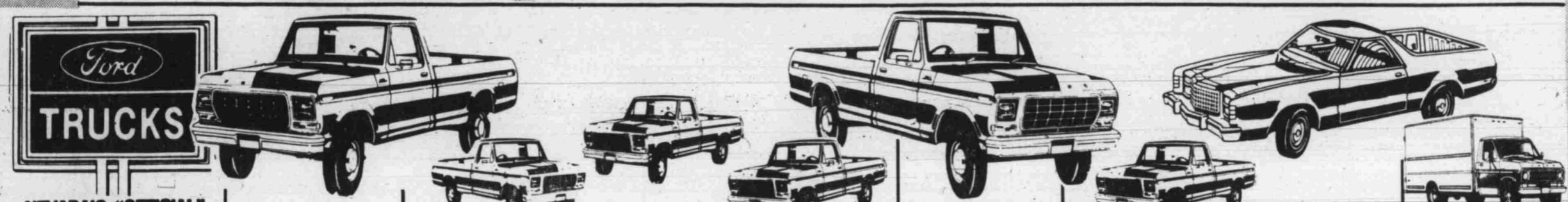
