Betty Honn, owner of the Animal Adoption Center in Henderson, said she plans to drop her appeal of a municipal court conviction of failure to provide adequate housing for the animals, because she can use the money it would cost better to take care of the animals than fight it in court.

"I was appealing the case to let people know the truth of the matter," Honn said, "but I can better use the money to take care of the animals which is my whole purpose anyhow."

Honn said she is still not straightened out from the Feb. fiasco when the county took the animals from the animal adoption center in Henderson.

"Because of the bad public-

ity people quit donating things and money to the center," Honn said, "and we desperately need food for the animals and the people who work there." Many of the animals were brought back sick, she said, and it has cost a fortune in veterinarian fees to get them better.

Following an inspection of the Honn facilities this week. Henderson city officials said the conditions were 100 per cent improved.

Honn said she needs to have an auxiliary of people who will advise her and help raise money for the facility.

"If everyone pitched in just a little bit it would help",

Honn said. "The problem I've taken on is the public's problem and when I have to spend money to defend myself it takes care away from the animals. I don't do this to be a martyr or movie star, Fenjoy it and I love animals, and there is never a dull moment."

She said she wishes that people would call her before they drop animals off into the desert.

The other night someone dropped off a large turkey in a box near her place. Later in the day they called to tell her it was there and the turkey was almost dead from heat.

Are you aware that chocolate is very susceptible to odors? Well, it is and that is one of the reasons Ethel M Chocolates has chosen the mesa area next to Buster Brown upon which to build their brand new company.

"The lack of pollution in that area, the public trust and the availability of a work force are some of the main reasons that we chose Henderson." explained Dr. Alan Thomas, general manager of the new company proposing to build here. Thomas. a doctor of food science, said he hoped the company, which will be making premium assorted chocolates to be distributed within a very close range of Henderson, would be ready to go into production in approximately one year, if all goes according to plan. They would employ about 40 persons to start with, he said. Thomas explained that the chocolates are along the same line as See's, however they are not made the same way. "Since they will be distributed locally we don't use preservatives and they will be aboslutely fresh." The new facility would cost in the neighborhood of \$3 million, attorney Kent Dawson, speaking for Ethel Mexplained to the city council. He appeared before the council seeking approval for an application for the project to be financed by revenue bonds to be issued in conjunction with the city's Public Improvement Trust. The council unanimously made a recommendation for approval. Dawson explained that Forrest E. Mars, formerly of the Mars Candy Company, now retired, was planning on putting up enough money to pay the principal and interest on the bonds but no obligation was put on the city or on the trust. "Neither the city nor the public trust would have any liability. If they (Ethel M) should fail it could affect the credit reputation of the city but Forrest Mars is posting the amount of the bonds issued ... and he brings 50 years of experience to the company," Dawson said.

Often I have seen Jordan and **Carter and Jody Powell sitting** together in heavy conversation; one could easily read the closeness these three men have.

## Judge Jensen Foresees Court **Every Day In Henderson**

Municipal Court Judge Jim Jensen, who began his third term in June, foresees a time that he will be holding court sessions every day of the week as the city continues to grow.

"If the city keeps growing at its present pace our court load could double in the next four years," Jensen said.

When Jensen began his term as Judge in 1971 he had one bailiff and one court clerk and held court twice a week. When he ran for office he promised a night court which he started shortly after he was elected. Now he holds adult arraignments Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday and trials Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday, and he holds juvenile traffic court on Wednesday afternoon and juvenile trials on Thursdays at 4 p.m. He now has a court

administrator, court clerk and clerk typist and two bailiffs.

In 1974 the court received a grant from the Department of Highway Safety to provide for a warrant officer. They started a court referral for alcohol related offenses. They had the grant for three years after which the city council agreed to continue the program.

"We've had good response with the program," Jensen said, "and I appreciate the city council picking up the program."

"At the time I ran for office, I said I'd be available at all times. My telephone is listed and I receive telephone calls all times of the day and night. I also initiated the release

# **City Endorses Early Emission Inspection Program**

"The pollution problem is carbon monoxide," Dave Houseton of the Clark County Citizens' Environmental Resources Advisory Board emphasized to city council members Monday night.

Board members appeared before the council to request an endorsement for the early implementation of a motor vehicle emission inspection and maintenance program.

Following the discussion the council voted unanimously to adopt an annual inspection program and their recommendation will now be. forwarded to the Clark County Commissioners who must adopt the program before it can become mandatory in Clark County.

Inspection-maintenance is the most cost-effective strategy available to county residents for reducing carbon monoxide emissions. Tests would be made in certified service stations and the driver would be given a sticker which he must present when getting his vehicle relicensed.

"The program is not free," the board spokesman said, "and the average cost is around \$13 with a \$2 fee for a certificate of compliance."

Originally the entire county was to begin the annual inspection in July of this year. However the 1979 Legislature voted to delay implementation of the program until July 1981.

At the present time only used vehicles which change . ownership or those being registered for the first time in Nevada must submit to emission checks.

However, the legislature gave counties with more than 100,000 population the option to begin the emission program at an earlier date. "This move by the state legislature was a copout," said Councilman Gary Price. "I'm disgusted with them and I don't want this clace to become another Los Angeles."

Gary Johnson, director of the chamber of commerce, said he hoped the city would agree. "Henderson should be on board in this maneuver."

"The worst part of the program is not the dollars and cents but the inconvenience ... the 20 minutes to get in and get out. I think we should implement it as soon as possible rather than wait until 1981."

The officials said that 80 percent of all carbon monoxide emission in the valley come from motor vehicles. It is predicted that these emissions will drop 20 percent the first year the proposed program is on line and will drop 30 percent over the first three years.

The current inspectionmaintenance program has been operating since 1974 and it is recommended that the expanded program begin on February 1, 1980. This would give the Department of Motor Vehicles, which would administer the program, sufficient time for the hiring of additional staff to prepare for the expanded program.

It was also pointed out that should the measurements of the vehicle being inspected not be in compliance with the set standards, the vehicle must be repaired and would then be re-inspected by the DMV free of charge.

Harry Polk, speaking from the audience, said he felt the program would be unfair to Henderson drivers.

"People from out of state don't have to pass this inspection," he said. "Fifty percent have a foreign license." "It's got to start some

# **Henderson K mart Store One** Of 1500 In Store's Chain

When the Henderson K mart store opens Aug. 2 near Boulder Highway, it will be another step in the K mart history which began in 1962. George A. Raymong, manager of the local store, announced that some of the top officials of the K mart Corporation, including Vice President Grant W. Mork, will join the grand opening.

K mart Corporation Management, led by Harry B. Cunningham, who rose from store manager of Chairman of the board, gambled \$80 million on its beliefs about the modern shopper when K mart was initiated in 1962.

The Corporation, formerly known as the S.S. Kresge Co., was founded in 1899. By 1912, the firm was operating the second largest group of variety stores in the world, and for nearly half a century, it was one of the most successful retail businesses. But retailing in America was changing.

In 1959, the management team started laying the groundwork for the Corporation's entry into a new field of retailing -- discount department stores -- an unproved business that was not highly regarded by most observers of general merchandising retailing.

The new venture involved a restructuring of the executive organization with top priority given to a stepped-up recruiting and training program at the store level.

real estate The department's initial assignment was the acquisition of 60 K mart sites. When the first K mart opened on Mar. 1, 1962, there were firm commitments for 32 others involving a financial obligation totaling over \$80 million.

Shortly after the first stores opened, it became obvious that the management's concept was viable. Public acceptance was overwhelming.

"Today's consumers are more knowledgeable about necessities, but they also have greater expectations about obtaining the nice things in life," management said.

They said the public is also under severe economic pressure due to continuous and increasing inflation and K mart's discount prices on quality merchandise make it possible for them to buy necessities and discretionary items while keeping a savings program in their budget.

## Page 4 The Police and Family Violence: Practice and Policy

#### by **Officer Robert Lindsey** Henderson . **Police Department Crime Prevention Unit**

For as long as there have been police, officers have been called upon to intervene in these most volatile of human conflicts -- the family disputes. There are impressive statistics that, despite the fact that the police typically disown this distasteful function, it is among the most frequent and - dangerous of our tasks. In fact. about 22 percent of police deaths occur while intervening a third party in disputes often between family members. About 40 percent of police injuries occur in the same way.

As for the public, there is evidence that homicide and assault are related to intimacy. Family members and friends are responsible for from 50 to -80 percent of homicide victims, depending upon the geographic location. Typically., family disputes are "resolved" by the temporary expedience of an arrest, often an empty gesture.

1 It has been hypothesized that a planned association between psychologists and police officers would result in a mixtureof insight and skill that would have some effect on the problem. If nothing else, interpersonal skill and competence specific to conflict-management might reduce injuries and deaths to both officers and

was hope that police could serve an early warning or case-finding function as a preventive mental health measure, a concept that is just gaining currency.

There are two ways of viewing the police in relation to domestie disturbances: They can be seen as "enforcers of the law" or they can be seen as "managers of human crisis and conflict'. If we take the first point of view, the objective of police intervention in a family dispute is simple and clear': To determine whether a law has been broken. If so, arrest and prosecute; if not, do nothing. Although this role definition certainly simplifies things for the officer, it does very little to help the majority of families who call the police. It has been found that in

most instances disputing parties do not wish to have a criminal sanction applied, such as arrest. Rather, the disputants want the police to- "do something", however illdefined that something may be.

While a serious dispute may itself constitute a crisis, often it is an expression of a deeper crisis in the life of a family. If police officers are prepared to deal with family conflicts swiftly and skillfully, then they are in an excellent position to make discriminations that can lead to more competent management of the dispute, and ultim-

In general, traditional. police practice in relation to family disputes tend to be ineffective for two reasons. One, it rarely prevents future violence.

Two, it fails to realize the constructive potential inherent in skillful management of family disputes. Despite the emphasis during the past decade on improving police intervention techniques, progress toward these ends has been painfully slow. The police system has been impeded in achieving change, not only by its traditional self-image as law enforcer, but also by the failure of society to appreciate fully the extent to which the police are called upon to deal with everyday crises and conflicts, with perceptions of police roles shaped by the fantasies of television producers. The public remains woefully ignorant of the reality and potential of skillful and competent police performance.

> Hence, there is no public pressure for competent performance or for the expenditure of fiscalresources in the direction of improving the police capabilities, or indeed, in developing the resource network to which police could make referral for more long-term assistance to disturbed families. What is being stated here is that a society cannot be accused of being irresponsible if it is - kept ignorant of realities, and for that reason does not

Mr. and Mrs. Festenese of Boulder City are very pleased with their solar screens and feel it was a wise investment. "They look beautiful, my plants are doing just great and when I

there is no heat to the touch," Mrs. Festenese said.

 Recently solar screens were installed at the federal building in Las Vegas, and over a 20-year period, the screens are expected to save \$422,500 in air conditioning costs.

Another feature of the screens is the ease in which they may be cared for. "You can use a vacuum or just wash them off with a hose," said Smith.

My friend Manuel Almarez died Sunday in Puerto Vallarta of a heart attack. While this does not concern any people in Boulder City or Henderson, I just won't let Manuel leave this world without an obituary.

For, you see, there are no newspapers in Puerto Vallarta that write - obituaries. If a family wants a community to know of a death, it must buy an advertisement.

Manuel was a special fellow to me because he was a brother-in-law. married to Eva's sister, Felicia. Felicia is a school teacher and Manuel was a tee-shirt factory pepresentative. Nothing big, you see.

Manuel had not only a handsome face but also a strong body that all Mexican young men have who have raised themselves up by their own bootstraps as workers from age five on.

Manuel was what they used to call a beach bum in his younger days. A beach bum was a kid who peddled anything from . fish on a stick to chiclets. Manuel sold spaces on the beach where tourists could place their towels and pads. Manuel sold second hand paperback books he had collected from other tourists. Manuel was so handsome American and Canadian single girls propositioned him constantly, buying his time during the visitor's entire vacation.

Manuel learned about life early as did all the



beach bum crowd. He learned English -- a sort of pigeon English and one would bet that he knew but few words he- was saying. Soon he was hired to be

a bell-hop at the swank Pasada Vallarta Hotel. Here he made money easily through tips and won applause from the management for his efficient handling of tourists. He soon was elevated to bell captain. One day a Mexican Hotel owner saw Manuel's potential and hired him to manage a hotel in Cuernavaoe. A year of this experience was enough because Manuel had to be -away from the people and the area he loved -- his wife, children and his friends in Puerto Vallarta.

He went home and took a job as a tee-shirt factory respresentative.

During my many winter stays in Mexico as an in-law member of the famous Mantecon family. I found Manuel in the same position as I was -sort of on the outside looking in -- and we spent hours chattering together. He told me how life was

a bowl of cherries as a beach bum, but that one day he decided to break away from that routine into a life where he would find love and happiness. having a wife, children and a home very much like his father and mother had. He set his cap on winning the belle of the

town -- Felicia Mantecon. To marry a Mantecon meant you had to meet the stern rules and regulations of that family's ruler, General Adan Mantecon, who had won. national fame as a fighting

revolutionary and as-right arm to Pancho Villa. Manuel passed the test. won "Fela" and - they lived happily ev er after --or rather until Sunday when a heart attack hit this strong lad of thirtyeight while he was playing with his four children at their home. It was Manuel who told

me how Mexicans shore fish. He taught me how to wrap a four hundred foot line around a discarded Coca Cola bottle and then put a weight at the ond of the line and five feet up from the end thread a shrimp on to a simple fish hook.

He taught me then how you swing the line over your head in a circle (like a cowboy does a lasso). When you have swung up enough speed you then send it out to hit behind an ocean wave as it breaks into shore.

Manuel said the bettom fish are always along those breakers. My problem was I could not throw far enough to reach the breakers. Stout-hearted Manuel would laugh and laugh and then toss a line out far beyond the breakers to show me again and again how to do it.

One of his big thrills was to see me catch a fish that way.

Manuel had other attributes. God gave him a rich Caruso-like singing voice. His wife also sang well, her father having gifted her with a trip to Europe to study voice. My friends from this area who

The news I have this week from Eva, who is in Vallarta, is that sadness prevades the community and the Mantecon family. She said that the four

children are grief stricken as is "Fela." It is my good fortune to have this newspaper perpetuate the story of Manuel's days on this earth. A finer man, a greater father and husband, never lived. May his soul rest in peace.

Usually, you will find that no matter- how often you change buses along the way, your suitcases will be in the luggage compartment of the vehicle which brings you to your final destination. However, there's always a chance that it ends up coming on a bus arriving a few hours

In order to go from Washington, D.C. to Boulder City, Nev., you first have to go to Los Angeles. That's where Amtrak drops you like a hot potato after pocketing \$180-plus, which doesn't include profits from ontrain revenue like restaurant bills and vendors' sales. From the -L.A. train terminal, they'll tell you, you have to pay your way to either the bus terminal and go on to L.V. and on to B.C. in a Greyhound---which costs money ---, or you pay your way to the airport, catch a \$50 flight to Vegas, and then part with more of the green stuff to get you to Herb's, Harry's or home. While I'm using the example of going from east to west, the reverse procedure won't be any

too. Changing buses may come unexpected and be a problem. Unexpected, because sometimes a driver will tell you that he-feels his bus isn't in as good a shape as thought, and therefore you might have to take your belongings out during one of the major stopovers and wait for another vehicle to be called into service.

and how to deal with the

Pittman discussed the sources of psychological stress, including intraorganizational practices and inter-organizational practices, the criminal justice system in general, public characteristics and police work itself. Pittman pointed out that the role of the policeman involves a high degree of accountability to many groups of people, including family, citizens, the police department and most importantly, themselves. "Learning to put yourself first is a key les-

son in learning how to cope with stress," Pittman explained. "Consider how you really feel instead of how you think you should feel."

Pittman discussed stress in relation to family problems as well as psychological burdens that police officers are confronted with while on the job. Pittman pointed out that underutilization of ability. lack of participation in decision making with the department, and limited feedback from suggestions are some of the key causes of feel-

ings of anxiety among cops.

Fear of safety is the most obvious cause of stress in the line of police work. Pittman said that training yields security. "It is the unexpected crisis situation that the police officer is always anticipating and routine training helps you deal with that . The officer must always be ready for that once in a lifetime crisis."

Also, change, even if it is for the better, yields stress. In reference to the fact that police generally view their promotional process as being somewhat limited and unfair, causing frustration among officers. Pittman said that even a promotion can cause negative mental reactions.

Getting in touch with your feelings from a psychological point of view is the main step in coping with stress. Pittman advocates an active. not passive, mode of dealing with your life. This, she said, helps people confront their fears and anxieties head-on and decide for themselves what to do with them at that point.

As a group, police officers suffer higher rates of coronary disease. premature death, circulatory and digestive problems and other major illnesses than workers of most other



stress should incorpooccupations. The aspects of police work that contribute to this high rate of health problems are shift work, eating practices, physical demands of the job and emotional pressures.

How does one get rid of these stressful feelings after they've been identified? Pittman suggests that you need to learn to identify your stress points and reserve time for other kinds of activities than those experienced on the job. Planned recreation. tions. #### Tips On Summer Eye Care

A vacation may not be just what the doctor ordered-for your eyes, unless you're careful.

Annoying and sometimes seriously sunburned eyes are just one of the hazards your eves may face on a vacation. Other typical vacationrelated problems are black eyes and eye socket fractures from baseball beanings or rackets, cuts and bruises from excursions into the woods, dry eyes from overexposure to wind and stinging, burning eyes from chlorinated swimming pools. Although the low-grade

irritation from pools usually clears up within a short time, cool compresses or decongesting eye drops available over the counter will ease discomfort, says the American Association of Ophthalmology, an organization of physicians specializing in eye care.

Eye drops can also help eyes dried by long exposure to the wind, but they should be used sparingly and according to directions. Those who have spent hours on a beach in the bright sun may also experience temporary night blindness, so they should be cautious about driving home at night.

A far more serious problem is the eye sunburn common to skiers. Temporary blindness known as actinic keratitis can result from too-great exposure to the intense ultraviolet rays

#### of the sun in clear air.

Like sunburn, its symptoms do not occur immediately, and the victim may not realize until the middle of the following night that his eyes have been burned. He may wake up in intense pain, unable to open his eyes.

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#### Needed: A New Word To Replace 'Planning'

All over America, and especially in Nevada, "Planners", by their very job title, give the impression that they are hired to do, and are doing, a job which is beyond the capability of any single human. They really aren't "planners." They are "data gatherers" or "census takers" or "information compilers" And even that function (or those functions) is limited beacuse there is at least one body of "data" that cannot be gathered. And it is important -- perhaps most important.

No "planners" (to use, again, the inadequate word) can possibly know how many people will cross our borders to enjoy the greener grass within our state; or how many people will avoid our state if one, a hundred or a thousand acres of that grass is blighted by drought. The ultimate decisions of inor out migration, of skills offered for sale, or withheld, of desires and aspriations of the thousands of individuals affected are unknown and unknowable. The contingencies are

so wide and varied that it is manifestly impossible to forecast all of them: and the cost of providing for even the most likely is staggering. But, of course, something can be done.

data base can be kept adequately current and available to all who want to make a decision about where they want to live and what they want to do with their lives, or what they want to do with that portion of their lives represented by their individual accumulation of assets.

The problems arise (and have arisen) when the "Planners" attempt to use the naked power

## Henderson Home News and Boulder City News The U.S.S. Reno: Pride of Nevada's Navy

The large part of Nevada's maritime history involves those ships of the U.S. Navy which have carried the name of the state, its counties and its communities. The best known of these vessels is the U.S.S. Nevada, a battleship which saw service in World War I. survived the attack on Pearl Harbor and saw action in both the Atlantic and the Pacific during World War II.

Among the lesser known ships having a Nevada connection was the U.S.S. Reno, a-light cruiser launched at the shipyards of the Bethlehem Steel Company in San Francisco on December 23, 1942. The name of the ship had been suggested by the Reno Chamber of Commerce since naval tradition dictates that cruisers be named after cities. but Congressman James G. Scrugham. Chairman of the House Sub-Committee on Naval Appropriations, was also from the riverside city, so the name made good political sense as well.

A number of prominent Nevadans attended both the keel laying on August 13, 1941 and the launching. Among these were Mayor August Frohlich of Reno and his wife. Mrs. Frohlich was called upon to christen the vessel. As the ship began to slide down the skids. Mrs. Frohlich swung the bottle with a downward motion and smashed it on the prow. "Tokvo, here we

come" someone shouted. but a newsman on the scene took a more sober view. "As the Reno broke loose and started down the way, the crowd was jubilant and excited," he later wrote. "As she floated away from the shore, the guests were quiet and some of them were misty-eyed. The launching of a new cruiser, especially one named for the hometown, is an inspiring, spectacle, one that makes a profound impression on even the most blase spectator."

The Reno was fitted out for combat duty and a shakedown cruise to San Diego was made in the spring of 1943. 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to visit and study Vienna-enough so as to detail it and recommend it.

Vienna is a city of the senses: the sound of symphonies, the taste of Sachertorte and Sehlaz, the rich sight of Baroque buildings and all their plump angels.

One is flooded with happiness and well-being as soon as you arrive, for Vienna is surely the most agreeable continental city in Europe.

It is also one of the few unchanged cities. Where other places have seen their splendid buildings fall before the builder and replaced by glass-andsteel rectangles, Vienna remains the romantic Bar-

oque city it was under its great 19th-century Emperor. Franz Joseph.

Yet for all its granduer and sweeping green parks, it is small, easily walked, a marvelous place for travelers.

For centuries, it has been a crossroads city. attracting a score of nationalities and making them its own - and it still treats the visitor with a very special grace (large or small, Vienna's hotels



are among the best in Europe, with silken, warming, comfortable service).

We visited The . Hofburg, the winter palace of the Habsburgs with its vast, impressive courtyards. It sits right in the center of town. It is where Carter and Brezhnev met. Actually a set of imperial palaces that started in the 13th century and kept growing like a small town, it holds the magnificent. Imperial Apartments and an assortment of museums, among them the Treasury, with the original bejeweled crown of the Holy Roman Empire, first worn a thousand years ago.

This sense of history's continuous thread also makes itself felt in the Spanish Riding School in a corner of the Hofburg.

Here, in a dazzling hall, the white Lipizzaner stallions put on a show of horsemanship that is exactly the same as it was 400 years ago.

And in the Hofburg's Imperial Chapel, the Vienna Choir Boys sing as boys have done since 1498 (for a few years Schubert
