

# Las Vegas Downs To Open January 15

Construction at Las Vegas Downs Race Track is on schedule, the facility will be completed by December 23 and will open as scheduled on January 15, 1981, according to David Funk, General Manager.

Funk reported the progress of the track under construction at Henderson during the state racing commission meeting Thursday at the Flamingo Library building.

He said the track will "start schooling" the greyhounds on December 15 and estimates approximately 800 dogs will be available as regular dog racing is scheduled. The track will offer 12 races a night for six days a week and plans to inaugurate matinee racing at least twice a week.

He assured the racing commission Thursday, that the track will be operating on January 15 and therefore the \$50,000 performance bond posted with Cash, Sullivan and Cross Insurance Agency

will not be forfeit. The Funks posted the bond to assure "good faith" in completing the facility in time.

He also assured the racing commission that horse racing will begin by January 15, 1982. The Funks have a second \$50,000 performance bond posted in the horse racing question.

There were a number of Nevada based greyhound breeders in attendance for the meeting and Funk said he was working with the breeders to assure state-bred dogs would

have the opportunity to race at the track.

He said contracts are being sent to kennels and expects dogs to begin arriving early in December. He expects competitors from Florida, Arizona and other states with greyhound racing.

Saturday and Sunday will see a post time of 2 p.m., according to Funk, with evening performances starting at 8 p.m. There will be 287 evening performances in 1981.

Funk also told the commis-

sion that he is negotiating with a totalizer company and expects to send a copy of the contract to the commission by November 20. He said the photo finish camera will be supplied by Gordon Simmons Photography which provides photo finish equipment to other race tracks in the southwest.

In response to a question from the commission on track officials, Funk said Don Lanners, former racing secretary at Wheeling Downs in Wheeling, W.Va., has been

named director of Greyhound racing and Bruce Wentworth has been named director of parmutual services.

He indicated that the purse will be based on 3 percent of the mutual handle, a figure higher than the normal 2.8 percent at most greyhound tracks.

He also said two percent of the annual gross will go to the state and one percent to the racing commission with an-

Henderson city planners will get a preview of the planned Eldorado Club expansion and proposed hotel at a meeting to be held Thursday, Nov. 20 at 8 p.m. in the city council chambers.

facility expansion including a 108 room hotel and parking garage in the central business district.

In other actions the plan-

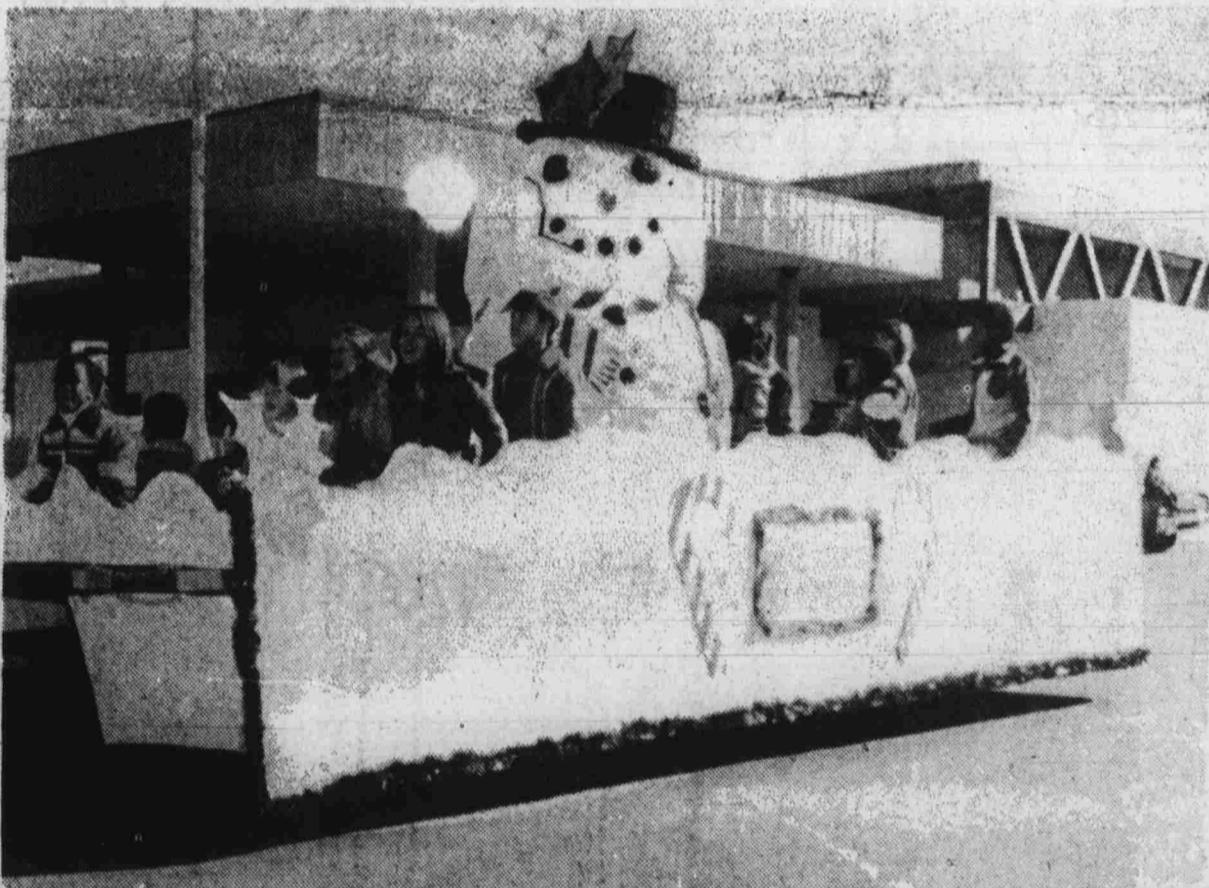

# Nordskog's Test Team Evaluates New Boats

Boat manufacturers from throughout the west brought stock models of their products to Lake Mead last week and handed them over to a team of boat experts headed by Bob Nordskog, publisher of the prestigious Powerboat Magazine and holder of several records in power boat racing.

Following a series of performance trials by Nordskog, the manufacturers returned to their respective home bases to eagerly await publication of the issue of Powerboat that will list each boat, its price and a complete comprehensive report of its behavior in the water under varied conditions as well as a critique of its construction and safety factors.

The activities on Lake Mead were a repeat of an earlier series of tests conducted on eastern built boats at Sarasota and Cypress Gardens, Florida.

Nordskog, is a demanding taskmaster who personally puts each boat through its paces. He's a tall personable, outgoing man with the handshake of a stevedore and makes no bones about the fact that he has the expertise, knowledge and intuition to evaluate each boat accurately as he puts it through its paces.

He spent three full days conducting the tests on a total of 26 boats all with the aid of his crew of specialists who man instruments and cameras from a large cruiser standing near the measured course.

Though a total of 2 to 3 hours are spent conducting the tests by the team, Nordskog spends 35-40 minutes conducting his runs which include a slalom course, speed run and airborne test.

He's been running these tests annually for the last ten years and does so without charge to the manufacturer.

"The whole thing started when my son bought a boat agency which was the largest marine agency on the west coast. We had a dealership on a very well known brand boat made by a highly reputable company but they didn't know what the hell they were doing. They were building an inferior product and when I became aware of this fact, I dropped the dealership. I thought it was unfair to the general public. Boat builders did not understand what the general public needed."

"As of ten years ago when I started testing, most boats I tested were a piece of junk." Nordskog describes his early testing experiences. "They were unsafe. That's when I decided to start the testing program."

At first, the manufacturers were suspicious that this man wanted to conduct tests without charge and was willing to make suggestions that would improve the boats.

But as time went on and his annual issue became a buyer's guide which continued to gain prestige manufacturers began looking to him for aid in their design and building methods.

"I can tell a bad boat within 30 seconds. Some that are not quite so bad take a little longer in handling." He says of his boat handling.

He started into boating on an amateur basis in 1948. He started racing unofficially in 1951. And he started racing professionally 19 years ago. He is 67 years old. He now holds more records in international boat racing than any boat racer today. He now holds 17 current records.

"This testing has given me an opportunity to do something for society." He says he does donate to charities, but with testing, he can donate his knowledge and background to the general boating public.

He said that two of the finest boats he tested this past week came from manufacturers who have been letting him test their boat since the beginning. The builders have listened and improved their product with each passing year.

"If a boat is absolutely unsafe, I tell them. If they refuse to take it off the market, then I publicize the fact. If they do take it off the market, I don't say a word."

Aside from his testing and racing interests, Bob Nordskog has plenty to keep himself busy. He owns the Los Angeles Skyhawks of the American Soccer League. His primary business is the manufacture of aircraft galleys for the airlines and a company that manufactures commissary trucks to service the airliners.

He recently bought out a division of Westinghouse that manufactures golf carts and other industrial machines. He is involved in manufacture of high performance race aircraft as well as race boats and cars. His corporate headquarters is located in Van Nuys, Calif.

Following Funk's presentation, the racing commission clarified rules under which a greyhound would be declared a Nevada bred dog. In order to give breeders the opportunity to list their dogs as Nevada bred, any dog whelped in Nevada after January 1, 1977 who remains in the state for at least 12 months, is considered Nevada bred and will be eligible for preference in races for Nevada breeds. Most states establish a special fund for winning dogs that are state bred.

The victim's cries attracted the attention of several residents on E. Pacific, who called police.

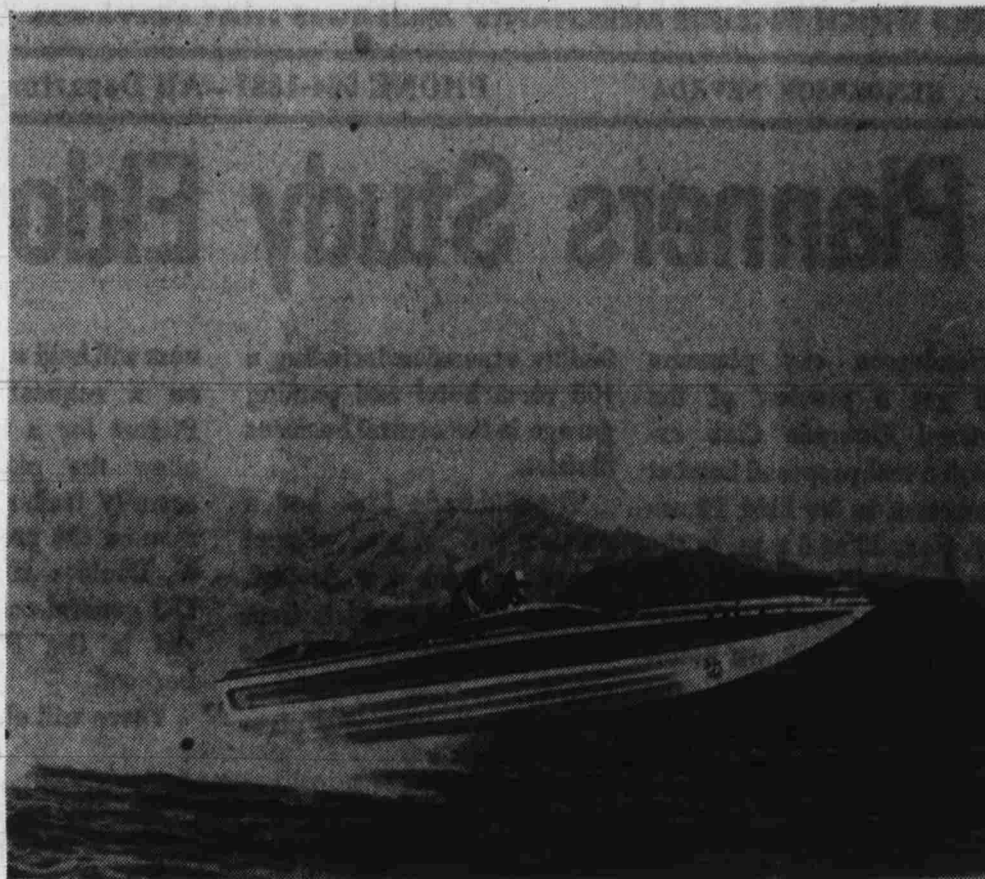
Murphy, who told police he is a waiter, is being held in a total of \$18,000 bail.

through the front door whereupon one brandished a shotgun and told the woman not to move.

Fearing for her safety, she ignored the advice and fled into the bedroom and out of the house through the French doors. In making her escape to a nearby residence, she sustained severe bruises and contusions from stumbling and falling on the rocky terrain.

Police were on the scene within minutes of being notified but the two men had eluded capture by driving away. At first it was thought that one of the suspects had fled on foot. An intensive ground and air search of the area was conducted without success. Six patrol units and the National Park Service plane took part in the search.

Authorities say the suspect vehicle is a late model Blazer, black with a red stripe, bearing Oregon plates. A regional All Points Bulletin has been sent regarding the vehicle and its occupants.

**Clara** - But Roberta, it is not too difficult to be realistic about the limited number of years left for a senior person. How does one ever plan on an 18 year old having his life end so precipitously?

**Roberta** - One thought, that in time may comfort you and even give you joy is that you knew that his was a happy, full life which he lived totally up to the last.

**Clara** - Roberta, the big effort for me now is to make my life meaningful. To think that I would outlive my grandson is very hard to take. But I try to remind myself I have children and grandchildren and must live, and yes, even celebrate Victor's life.

**Roberta** - What part of his life did Victor leave with you - what did he stand for?

**Clara** - To use only two words to describe Victor, I would say, free spirit. He lived in a family of great loving and joy and Victor shared all freely.

**Roberta** - That is one splendid gift you have from him.

**Clara** - Yes, Roberta, I am blessed that way. And I have just recently recognized that I needed to move from being involved in Victor's death and dying to his living. And I think and hope that will sustain me.

**Roberta** - Your belief in God will also sustain and support you.

**Clara** - Here again, I am trying hard to hold on to the promise of life everlasting. But anger gets in the way and also wondering if this is one of God's cruel jokes.

**Roberta** - Clara, having just lost your youngest sister, you do know that the anger is dissipated and the positive memories of her life have come through for you. So will it be with Victor.

**Clara** - I want his short life to be an exquisite example for full love and sharing - it was and I hope the clouds of grief will given way, soon, to the brightness of hope, love, and happy rememberings.

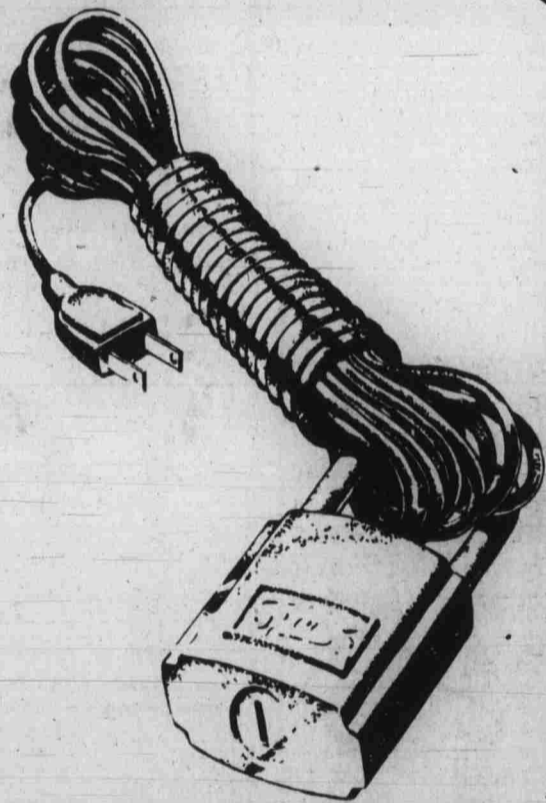

Juvenile Court Services Available in Henderson

Judge John F. Mendoza stated the Clark County Juvenile Court Services is in the process of decentralizing the Field Probation Services throughout the community: Probation Centers will be located in four quadrants in the metropolitan Las Vegas area and one center in Henderson. The addresses of the Probation Centers will be announced in the next few weeks. These centers will aid the Juvenile Court in meeting the existing goals of 1) protecting the community and 2) maximizing individual attention to children and families. Children referred to the Juvenile Court Services and placed under supervision would be assigned according to the location of their home to the Probation Center in that area. Delinquent youth would be assigned to one officer who would have the primary responsibility for that child during the entire time the child is under supervision of the Court. These community Probation Centers will encourage total family involvement in the entire probation process. There was an increase of 7% in the number of juveniles referred to the Juvenile Court and a 13% increase in juvenile offenses during the past 12 months. This increase in juvenile activity necessitates greater community protection which will be provided by having Probation Officers located throughout the community. An additional benefit of the center is that the Probation Officer can work with the elementary schools in their geographic area where they will work with youth on probation and present juvenile delinquency prevention programs. # Hunter Predicted Landslide Vote For Reagan In Mid-October

While most of the country and the news media were predicting a "nip-and-tuck" race between presidential candidates Jimmy Carter and

Ronald Reagan, local resident Don Hunter predicted a landslide election for Ronald Reagan in mid-October. Hunter, who works for the

Bureau of Mines in Boulder City, has been predicting the presidential races right since he came to the U.S. from England in 1958, but he said the rule he has used in the past was broken by this election and stands to be broken at the election in four years.

"Usually a president running for re-election wipes out his opponent after his first term," Hunter said. "If a president has a poor record then you can usually forecast that he will be dumped," Hunter said.

Hunter said he decided to work on the election in October when a fellow workman, a strong Reagan supporter, asked him to. Hunter slightly favored Carter.

On Oct. 14, he drew up a case for Carter for the most favorable case he could have and the worst. His worst estimate for Carter was a total of 81 electoral votes. The best total he could estimate for Carter was a total of 194.

He gave Carter a possible electoral vote from Massachusetts, Washington, D.C., North Carolina, Georgia, Ark-

ansas, Hawaii, Minnesota, Rhode Island, West Virginia, and Alabama.

He predicted the best total for Reagan would be 457 with the worst at 344.

The first presidential race he predicted was in 1948. He

said he liked the American elections more than the English. He predicted that Truman would win in 1948.

Hunter said in four years the swing will probably be against the Republicans because a president gets blamed for everything, even if there is

an earthquake in California. Unless Reagan is successful in turning the country around, he feels he will be defeated.

Hunter does not gamble on his predictions but usually wins. So it may be interesting to consult him in four years.

## Coach Trautwein's Recap

# 'Just Didn't Have Enough Size'

"Things started out pretty good -- we lost a couple of very close games, then in a few games we got overpowered," said Rich Trautwein after the close of his first season as head football coach for Basic High.

The Wolves did not see a victory this past season, but the coach was encouraged by an improving performance as the season drew on.

Trautwein's lament, was the physical size of his players compared to other teams in the AAA conference. "Our main weakness was size, we just didn't have enough."

Trautwein added that the Wolves had a shortage of players. "Many potential players didn't come out for football because of an attitude that's a holdover from the past. They heard practice was hard and boring and had the feeling that the team was losing all the time."

He said several players waited too late in the season to come out for football.

He brought a number of promising junior varsity players into the last weeks of the season and he noted he lost some varsity players because of defection. "they were good, but didn't believe in the team idea -- they thought more of them-

selves individually and no one else."

The varsity squad was also diminished because of injuries which left several promising players on the sidelines in the last few games.

Trautwein is looking hopefully toward the freshmen which fielded one of the best young teams in recent years.

"Though once again, size was against the freshman and presented a problem, but they were intense and went out there every week to win the game -- hopefully they stay around for three more years."

In discussing his strategy, Trautwein said he started with one

main offense but "you have to look at the team you've got. We started using a straight "T" offensively, but came across some pretty big people and wound up changing to the shotgun. Our boys just had trouble getting through with the "T"."

His quarterback for most of the season, Billy Bly, was a constantly improving player, said Trautwein who said Bly gained confidence with each game. "After a couple of incomplete passes, he would back off a little bit, but started getting the ball to his target more and more."

Size again, was the factor. Trautwein said the Wolves could throw and catch, but when they tried to run the ball, they were steam-rollered.

He selected several outstanding players for the season, leading off with Bob Scucci. "If his body was nearly as big as his heart," said Trautwein of his main workhorse, "he'd be the best ball player in this part of Nevada."

Mark Lompfrey came up for praise from the coach. "He did a good job on both sides of the ball," was said of the 5'10" 165 lb. linebacker.

Chris Heintz, the 170 lb. linebacker also came up for praise. "He excelled on the defensive game."

A newcomer to the squad, Kevin Sims was praised by the coach. "For a first year player, Sims did very well."

Randy Garrison, who started out quarterbacking the Wolves, was changed into a running back after the first few games and Trautwein said the 5'10" 150 player was one of the best players he had seen in that slot.

Robert Bess, who did a yeoman's job in the tackle position for the Wolves, was out for most of the last few games with an injury and Trautwein said his loss was a severe blow to the Wolves.

The meet will be held Friday, Saturday and Sunday, November 28-30, 1980 and local residents are invited to come.

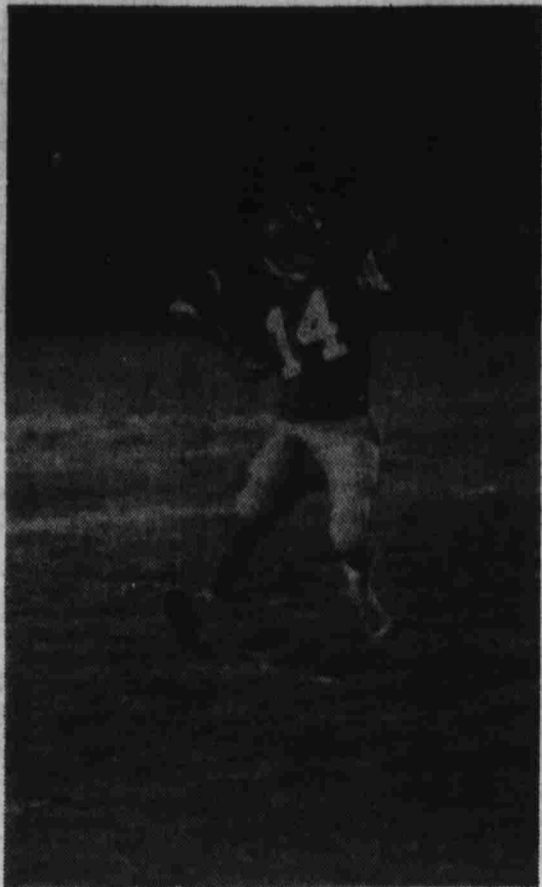
