Michelle Strafella, 11 -- "Love, Sidney. I like it because I like the characters that play on it and it deals with things that happen at home. I like the little girl, too."



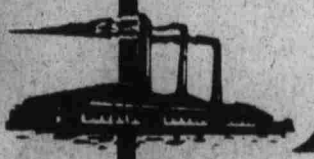

Something that should be of great concern to everyone in this nation was a story that appeared in the newspaper last week.

Because the Reagan administration cut funeral allowances for veterans from \$450 to \$150, 1,000 bodies are expected to pile up at the morgue in Los Angeles County. They cannot be buried. State and federal codes forbid burying war veterans in paupers' graves, so the coroners cannot afford to do anything but store the bodies.

According to the story, at least six dead war veterans are in the morgue awaiting burial, and a Veterans' Administration spokesman said he has been told as many as 22, and perhaps more, may not have been buried.

"We expect approximately 1,000 bodies of indigent veterans in a year's time in the county," said Maj. Robert Kingsbury, director of the

Strauss Layoffs Do Not Mean Eventual Shutdown

"This place is not going to close down. The rumors are totally unfounded," was the statement to the HOME NEWS from Greg Fennell of Levi Strauss Friday.

Fennell said the plant has

cut back one shift and 88 workers were laid off leaving approximately 260 people still working at the distribution site. There have been rumors that Strauss may close its Henderson plant.

He said the cutbacks were due to the general economic slowdown and it is doubtful the second shift will be reinstated in the near future.

Fennell said Strauss will begin shipping a new product called the "Working

Man's Cowboy Jean" and he said the company is excited about the new look. Though similar to the "501" jean, he said the Cowboy Jean is designed to slip over cowboy boots though it has a straight leg.

The new jeans will be initially distributed in the Dallas area early in April and

\$19 Million Flood Control Funds Presented To County

State Treasurer Stan Colton presented a check for \$19 million for Clark County Monday, bringing about the purchase of the county's flood control bonds by the Nevada Municipal Bond Bank.

Created by the 1981 Nevada State Legislature, the Municipal Bond Bank's purpose is to reduce the interest rate at which the state's local governments would otherwise borrow money. By providing access to the credit markets based on the state's high-grade AA bond rating, local governments can sell bonds at a reduced rate.

"The higher the (bond) rating, the less the interest," Colton explained, adding that local governments do not have as high a rating as the state.

The first funds allocated for flood control are to be used for the \$5.3 million project located in the Flamingo-

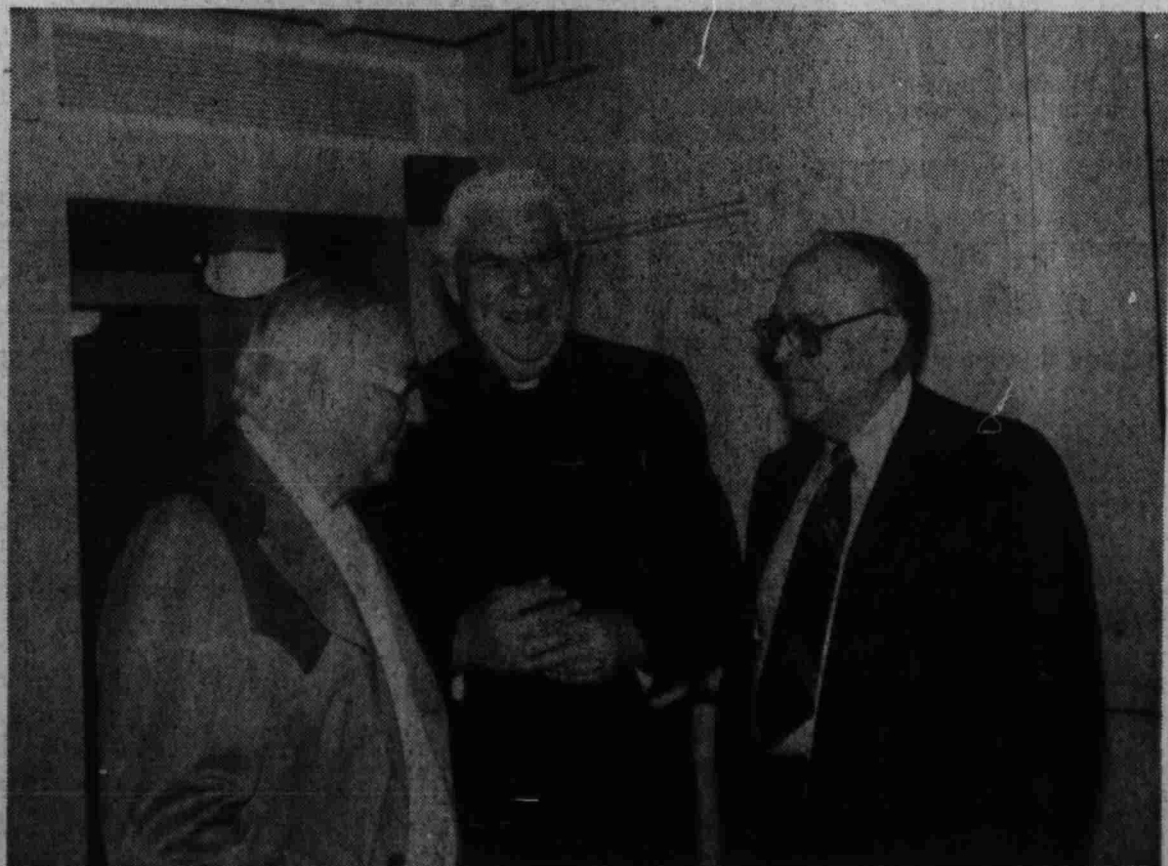
Decatur area in Las Vegas.

Colton said Nevada's Municipal Bond Bank is the first of its type in the United States, although five other states have something similar. "But the savings to taxpayers is not as much" as Nevada's Colton said.

"Once we finance all \$32 million of authorized flood control bonds through the Bond Bank, the savings in interest costs to the county's taxpayers will exceed \$5 million," Colton added.

In addition to flood control projects, Henderson will also receive approximately \$2.5 million for sewer treatment expansion. Seventy-five percent of the cost of the project will be paid by the federal government and the other 25 percent by Henderson, with the use of the Bond Bank funds.

"We're very proud of this," Colton said of the Municipal Bond Bank.

county's Veterans Affairs office.

To me that is a very sad commentary.

The following I thought was of interest from the University of Nevada.

Fireless cookers, used by Americans in the 1800's and early 1900's might have a place in the 1980's and beyond suggests a retired University of Nevada Reno professor.

"The cookers could have economical and energy saving possibilities," says Dr. Joseph H. Robertson, professor emeritus of range science, UNR Ag. College. "And, in today's busy world with both wife and husband working they may even be a time saver."

What is a fireless cooker? Dr. Robertson exhibited one. He said the simplest fireless cookers consist of an outer container and an inner nest

with insulating material in between. "Sort of a super thermos," he explained. The kind of a container one wants, he said, depends on a person's aesthetic tastes. Nowadays all would have to be homemade. A corrugated cardboard box, an old trunk, a garbage can, or a specially made wooden or metal box will work. The nest is a cylindrical hole in the middle of the container, made to fit the cooking vessel snugly.

"The idea of the cookers," Dr. Robertson noted, "is to hold the heat of a partially cooked food, so that its own heat finishes the job." He explained that dishes improved by long, slow cooking are best for the fireless cookers. Those requiring high dry heat are unsuitable. Hot breakfast cereals, stews, soups, vegetables, tougher meats, puddings, and steamed breads are the kind of food preparations that are best suited for the cooking devices.

The cookers are used by

partially cooking the required dish on the stove and then removing it and immediately putting it into the devices. They hold the heat with little loss, if insulated properly and allow cooking to continue.

Some advantages of the cookers, says Dr. Robertson, is that cooking can continue while time is being spent elsewhere, the food need not be watched, it takes no further energy, and all these things can add up to money saved. "In the old days," says Dr. Robertson, "cereal might be prepared before going to bed and would be ready for breakfast when a person got up. It was not necessary, then, to cook."

The nest in the cookers can be made out of cardboard or any of the materials previously mentioned and made to fit the pots intended to be put into it. The nest is surrounded by insulation such as styrofoam, crumpled newspapers, urethane, wool, cotton, and other organic materials. Those who might desire more information on such cookers can contact Dr. Robertson.

Timet Not Fined For Violations

Because Timet had taken corrective action for 18 incidents of air pollution, no fines were issued by the Clark County Air Pollution Control Hearing board on Wednesday.

Michael Naylor, district administrator for the air pollution, explained to the board that a series of letters between the Timet firm and the district outlined corrective action for each incident.

Board member George Brizendine questioned one of the violations listed as employee error under the "malfunction" section of the county regulations.

If health officials term a violation an accidental equipment breakdown, the administrator may issue corrective action under revised regulations and the board does not need to consider the case or take further action unless the company requests a hearing.

Brizendine asked why Timet was given corrective action in a letter dated Dec. 17 outlining 15 separate incidents of visible pollution clouds from chlorine processing towers lasting a total of 1 1/2 hours.

The seven-minute incident - last of the 15 violations - was the item in question. In that incident, someone left a valve open on the control equipment, called a

scrubber.

Moments before Naylor made his report - including Timet's citations - the board fined WMK Transit Mix, a concrete manufacturing plant in Henderson, \$200 and ordered corrective action after a half-hour of testimony.

That incident, Brizendine pointed out, was also due to employee error. On Dec. 17 a collecting bag clearing fly ash from the air came loose, releasing a cloud 150 feet into the air extending about 35 feet from the silo.

SMK admitted violating the emission standards, and the board found the firm guilty of releasing visible contaminants, not considered a malfunction.

"I'm just wondering if we owe Timet anything," Brizendine said.

Timet is in the process of installing multimillion-dollar equipment to remove 10,000 tons a year of chlorine fumes from Henderson's air.

For installing the new equipment, the firm was granted a variance allowing emissions to occur. But APCD records show that permit had expired in June 1981.

Naylor ordered Timet in the Dec. 17 letter to clean up its chlorine controls by Jan. 1, 1982, or face possible board action.

In other action, the board accepted Timet's progress

report on neutralizing open ponds full of hydrogen chloride that blew over a nearby housing development last summer resulting in two citizen lawsuits against the company, the Health District, Clark County and the state.

Timet Environmental Engineer Don Baker reported that permanent solutions to the odor problems should be in operation by July and August in two-part cleanup. The liquid acid will be neutralized before reaching the holding ponds, he explained.

For five months about 150 residents complained to APCD about the odors which caused eye, nose and throat irritation, fainting and vomiting.

The board fined the company \$13,000 and ordered it to clean up the ponds permanently.

Timet has dumped about 6,000 tons of soda ash - effectively stopping the irritating odors - into the ponds, costing \$770,000.

However, warm weather increases the escape of the acid from the ponds, and board members expressed concern the summer of 1982 would be a repeat of last year.

"With the number of lawsuits against me right now," Baker said, "no, we won't operate ponds on the ragged edge."

by May or June will be distributed throughout the nation.

Fennell also said the local distribution point will begin shipping to Penny's and Sears in the near future.

Until now the Strauss

label has not been available at those popular retail outlets but he said Strauss is in the process of opening new channels of distribution which will give Levi Strauss increased exposure to the public.

The plant is now capable of shipping 220,000 units a day and is no where near that capacity, he noted therefore there are no plans in the works to expand the plant.

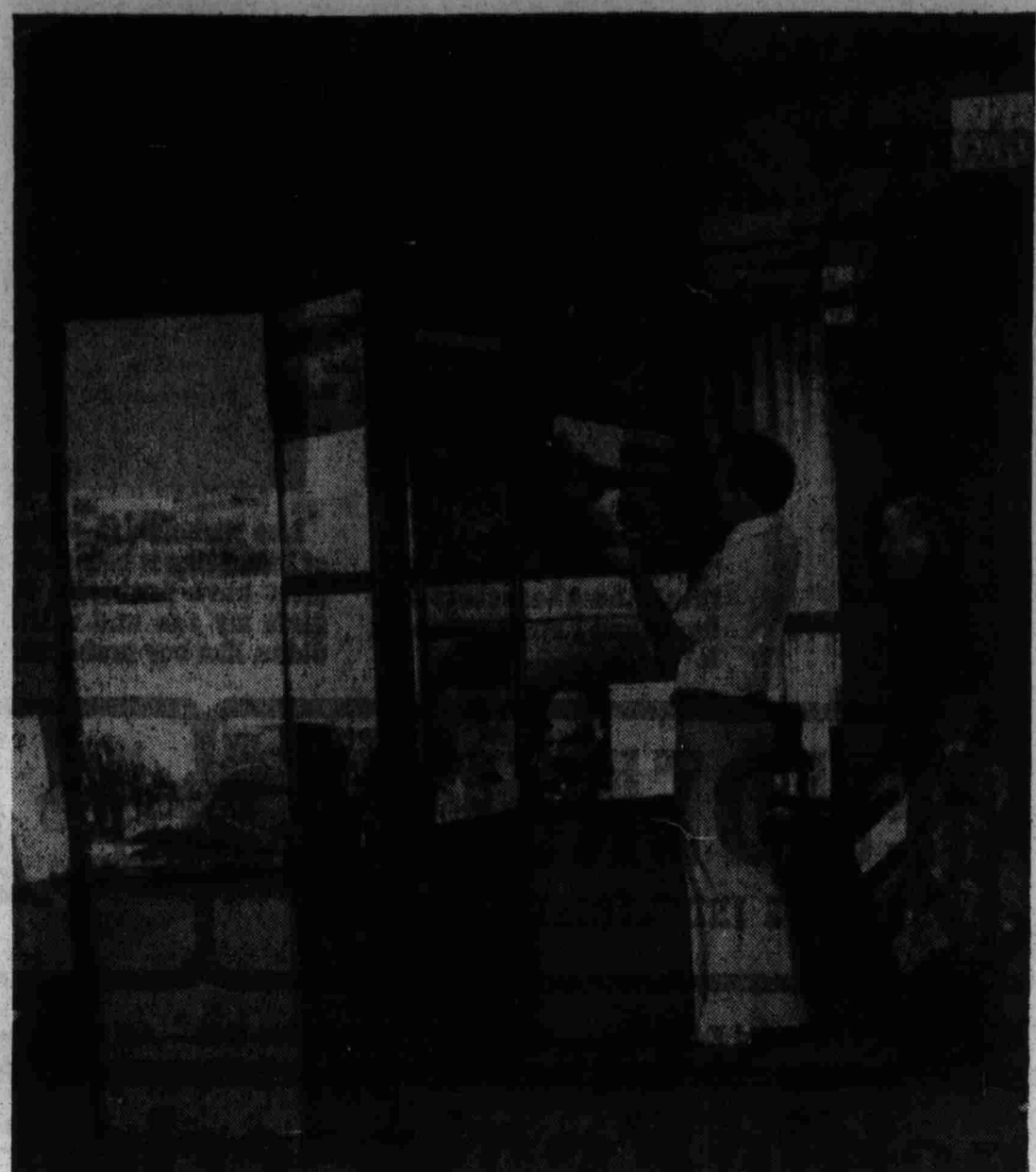

Suspected Sex Offender Back in Jail

An alleged sex offender is back in jail and his bail has been revoked following charges he returned to the scene of the crime last Friday and threatened the children involved.

Terrence Doyle McMullin, 22, of 137 W. Basic was arrested by police in Pittman Park after a small girl ran to the nearby firehouse crying and reporting an incident underway in the park restrooms.

Firemen called police then ran to the park where McMullin was arrested.

He was charged with three counts of lewdness with a

minor under the age of fourteen and bail was set at \$15,000. Later, he confessed to committing the same offense several months ago in O'Callaghan Park. Total bail was set at \$30,000. Bail was reduced to \$1,000 by District Court Judge Steven Huffaker and McMullin was released.

The mother of one of the children involved in the Pittman charge, called the HOME NEWS early Friday to say McMullin was out on bail and had returned to the neighborhood. He had been identified by other youngsters.

The HOME NEWS called Huffaker's office with the

information Friday and was advised he was in the process of moving to Juvenile Court where he was scheduled to assume his new post Monday.

Though Huffaker did not return the call to the HOME NEWS, he did call Henderson police and order McMullin to submit to a polygraph test which was administered by the public defender's office who is handling McMullin's defense.

Following the polygraph test, Huffaker revoked McMullin's bail and he was arrested at his home by police on Saturday, January 16.

No Transfer For Prisoner

A prisoner in the Henderson Jail has additional charges of first degree arson to face after police found him attempting to set fire to a pile of papers in his cell.

Vincent Edward Smith told jailers he wanted to be transferred from the Henderson jail to the Clark County jail and had been told the only

way he could be transferred would be on a felony charge. He is in Henderson on a misdemeanor.

Police told Smith he was

being charged with two counts of first degree arson, a misdemeanor, and he was returned to cell number 5 in the Henderson City Jail.

A large crowd attended the dedication ceremonies and open house marking the opening of St. Rose de Lima Hospital's intensive coronary care unit and radiology room Thursday afternoon and evening.

The benediction was given by the Most Reverend Norman F. McFarland, Bishop of Reno - Las Vegas, of the Catholic Church. Greetings were extended by Glen Taylor, vice president of the board of trustees and Sister Maureen Comer, O.P. administrator.

To Drink or Not To Drink--Is That the Only Question?

"A national analysis of drinking among youth found that 45 percent of the teens surveyed report at least one episode of being high, tight, or drunk, while 19 percent report getting drunk at least once a month," according to the National Institute on Alcohol Abuse and Alcoholism (NIAAA). This statistic appears in an article in the December/January issue of PTA Today, the journal of the National PTA, which focuses on "Parent Education: Communicating with our Children about Alcohol and Sex." The cited statistic does not necessarily indicate that teenage drinking in the U.S. is a problem; however, it does alert parents that alcohol is a popular and available drug among teens and that some instruction in its use and/or abuse is necessary.

The article discusses how parents can help their children make responsible decisions regarding alcohol use--when or if to drink, how much, for what reason. A good suggestion offered in the brochure, "You Asked for It: Information on Alcohol, Other Drugs, and Teenagers," is "That being responsible means avoiding the kind of drug use where you or someone else might get

hurt." This might include not driving while under the influence or not driving with someone who has had too much to drink; not mixing other drugs and alcohol; avoiding alcohol if you're pregnant, etc.

According to the PTA Today article, knowing the facts about alcohol and its effects will help your children reach a responsible decision. Fact: alcohol is a depressant that slows the activity of the brain and spinal cord. Fact: once a person becomes intoxicated, it takes the body approximately 1 1/2 hours to recover for each drink consumed.

Other influences which affect a child's decision to drink include peer pressure and parental example. David Hancock, in a pamphlet titled Points for Parents Perplexed About Drugs, says "Parents need to face their own reactions to group pressure, including the social pressures to drink, so strong in our society." Following that, parents might open a discussion about peer pressure with their children by asking such questions as "hol because of some physical condition."

Call Underground Alert to Locate Lines

Seven Nevada utilities have joined forces to establish a single phone number to call for location of underground utility lines. Centel, Nevada Power, Southwest Gas, CP National, and the Las Vegas Valley Water District have been joined by Sierra Pacific Power and Nevada Bell, both of Reno, in the system.

By calling Underground Service Alert (USA) at 1-800-227-2600, contractors and do-it-yourselfers planning to dig a hole or trench can find out if a natural gas, water, power or tele-

phone line is buried where they intend to dig. "We do require 48 hours notice, however," said Jan Strobel of Nevada Power, spokesperson for the utilities. "Everyone planning to dig a hole or trench should call USA for a line location," said Strobel. "If they don't, they could hit a line and be injured or cause an interruption of service for a lot of people," she added. "They also would have to pay the cost of repairs and for any gas lost."

The new system covers most of the state of

Nevada, including such communities as Elko, Ely, and Boulder City. "Eventually, we hope to have it extended to all communities in the state, no matter how remote," said Strobel.

Planning for the state-wide system was initiated by Walter Hernandez, gas pipeline safety engineer, for the Public Service Commission of Nevada (PSCN). It is being administered by USA of Concord, California, which also administers a similar system in the northern part of that state.

A one-call system had

already been in effect in Clark County since 1978. With all the utilities joining together in USA, northern Nevada now will be included in a one-call system for the first time.

"We expect this system to have a significant impact on the number of line breaks experienced statewide," said Strobel. "This new system will make it convenient for contractors who operate statewide to call before they dig anywhere in the state."

John Downey Completes Navy Training

Navy Fireman Recruit John M. Downey, son of John A. and Helen M. Downey of 231 Nebraska St., Henderson, Nev. has completed recruit training at the Naval Training Center, San Diego.

During the eight week training cycle, trainees studied general military subjects designed to prepare them for further academic and on-the-job training in one of

the Navy's 85 basic occupational fields. Included in their studies were seamanship, close order drill, Naval history and first aid. Personnel who complete this course of

instruction are eligible for three hours of college credit in Physical Education and Hygiene.

A 1979 graduate of Basic High School, he joined the Navy in October 1981.

Officials Eye Budget Restrictions

Many areas across the country will not have the money they've had in the past to cope with traffic control and roadway maintenance geared to winter conditions.

This prediction was voiced today by Richard Tippie, manager of the National Safety Council's Traffic Safety Department.

"Revenue reductions and their related budget cuts," Tippie warned, "are sure to curtail the customary level of manpower, equipment and materials needed to keep vehicles moving on winter clogged roads."

Economic downturns, reduced gasoline and user taxes and curtailed funding at all levels -- federal, state and local -- are the culprits, Tippie contends. He emphasizes that these restrictions place an even greater burden on every driver's know-how to overcome adverse winter road conditions.

Tippie views these economic and legislative trends from the vantage point of the National Safety Council's Committee on Winter Driving Hazards and its years of research related to driver and vehicle problems created by winter's deadly tricks.

According to Council skid testers, poor traction and reduced visibility create the major difficulties when winter weather turns treacherous.

These problems are compounded when maintenance and traffic control operations are curtailed or delayed. Sliding off the road, skidding into intersections, and rear-end collisions increase.

Tippie reviewed precautions recommended by the Council's committee to help make winter driving as trouble free as possible:

Take precautions in case you do encounter traffic tie-ups.

Safety check your trunk. Emergency gear should include at least a glass scraper-snow brush; booster cables; flares or emergency lights; a shovel; sand, rock salt or traction mats; a tow chain or strap; extra windshield washer fluid; blankets; and tire chains.

Keep your exhaust system, battery and emergency equipment in dependable condition.

Keep your gas tank reasonably full at all times.

Practice common sense winter driving know-how.

Anticipate situations that require reduced speed -- slick road surfaces, turning maneuvers and intersections.

Increase following distances.

Use extra care in signalling other drivers who seem to be following too close and who may be unable to stop.

Always buckle-up your safety belt.

Guard against overconfidence in yourself.

Sharpen your winter driving skills even more.

Keep a constant check of weather and road conditions wherever and whenever you must drive.

Stay off the roads, when you can, until they can be cleared.

Guard against overconfidence in your car.

Make sure defrosters and windshield wiper blades can clean slush or wet snow off your windshield. Replenish antifreeze fluid in windshield washers.

See that your car has needed tune-ups and thorough mechanical checks.

Use good tires with proper treads for your driving conditions.

Have brakes checked for equalized braking.

If you must drive during severe snow and ice conditions, tests by the Council have demonstrated that reinforced tire chains far out-perform any other traction equipment. They provide from four to seven times the pulling ability of regular tires for climbing icy grades or for going through deep snow.

"Remember," Tippie concluded, "thorough preparation and a healthy respect for winter's hazardous driving situations are two important ways to offset traffic control and highway maintenance cut-backs."

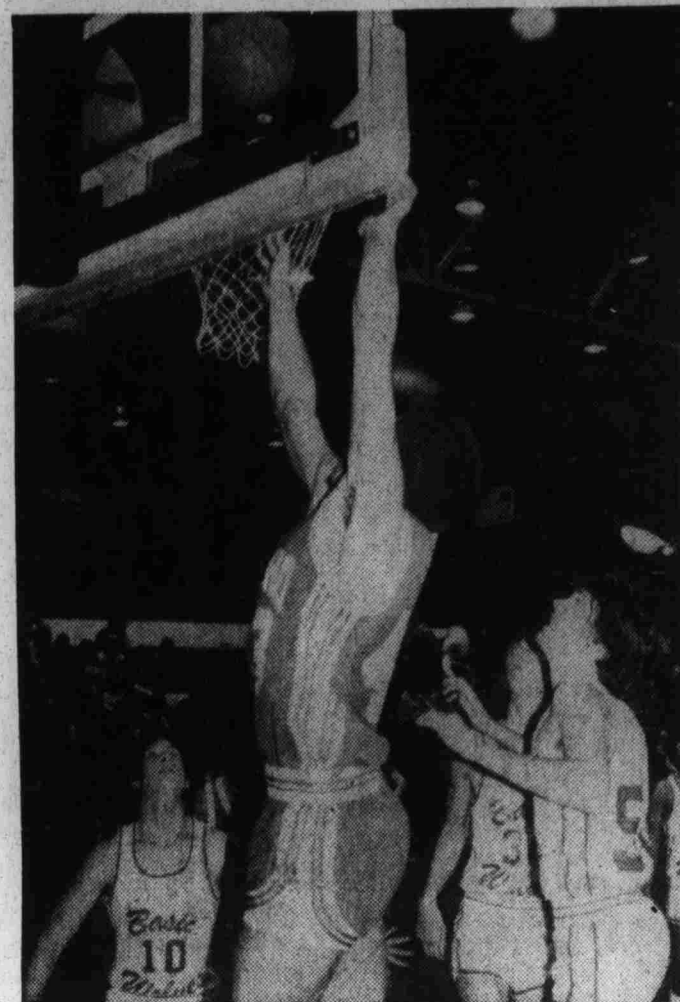
In the Rancho game Basic shot as well as they ever had Montoya said. The team recorded a 57 percent field goal record. "We just didn't execute well," Montoya said.

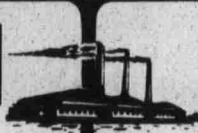

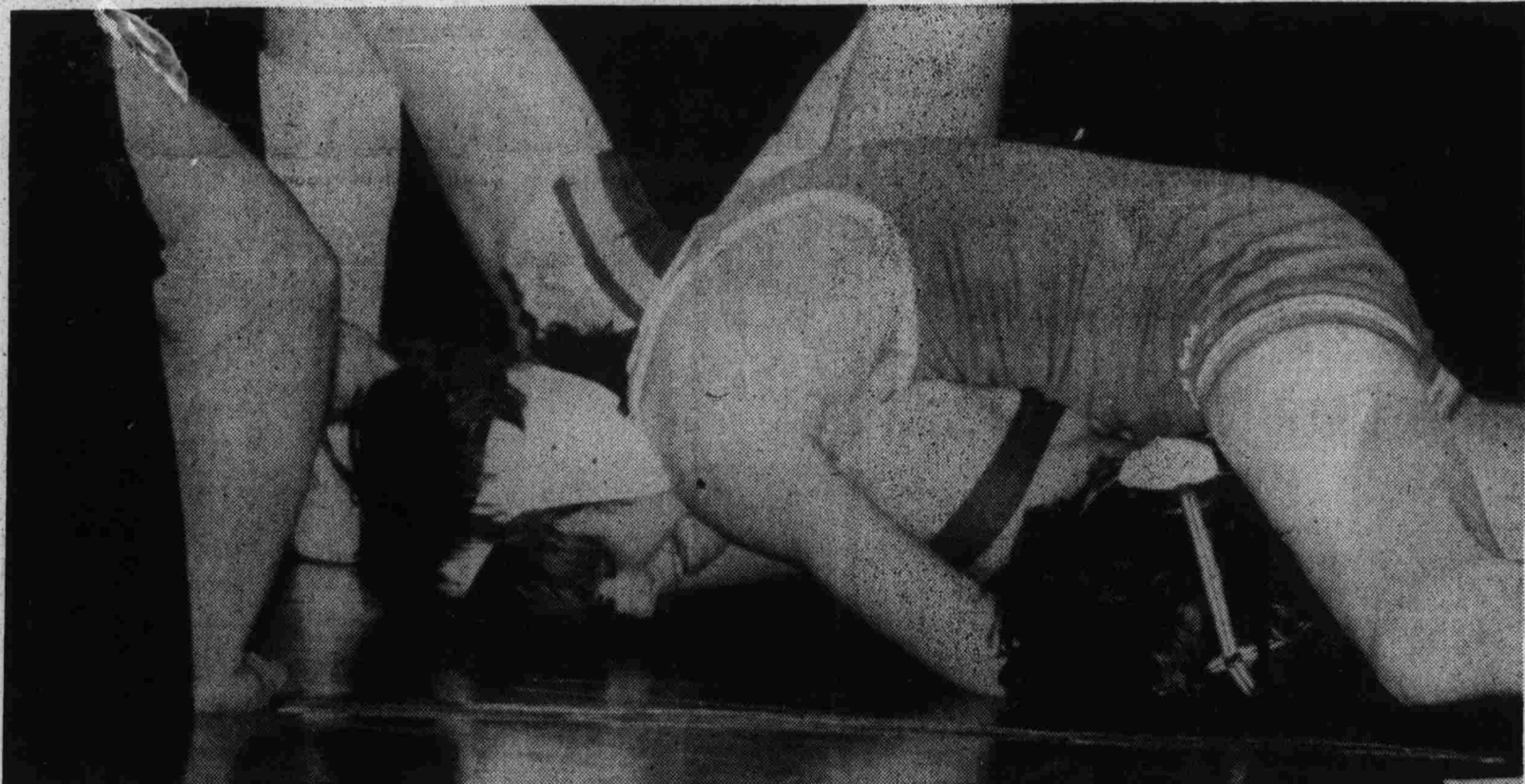
Maurice Hernandez con-

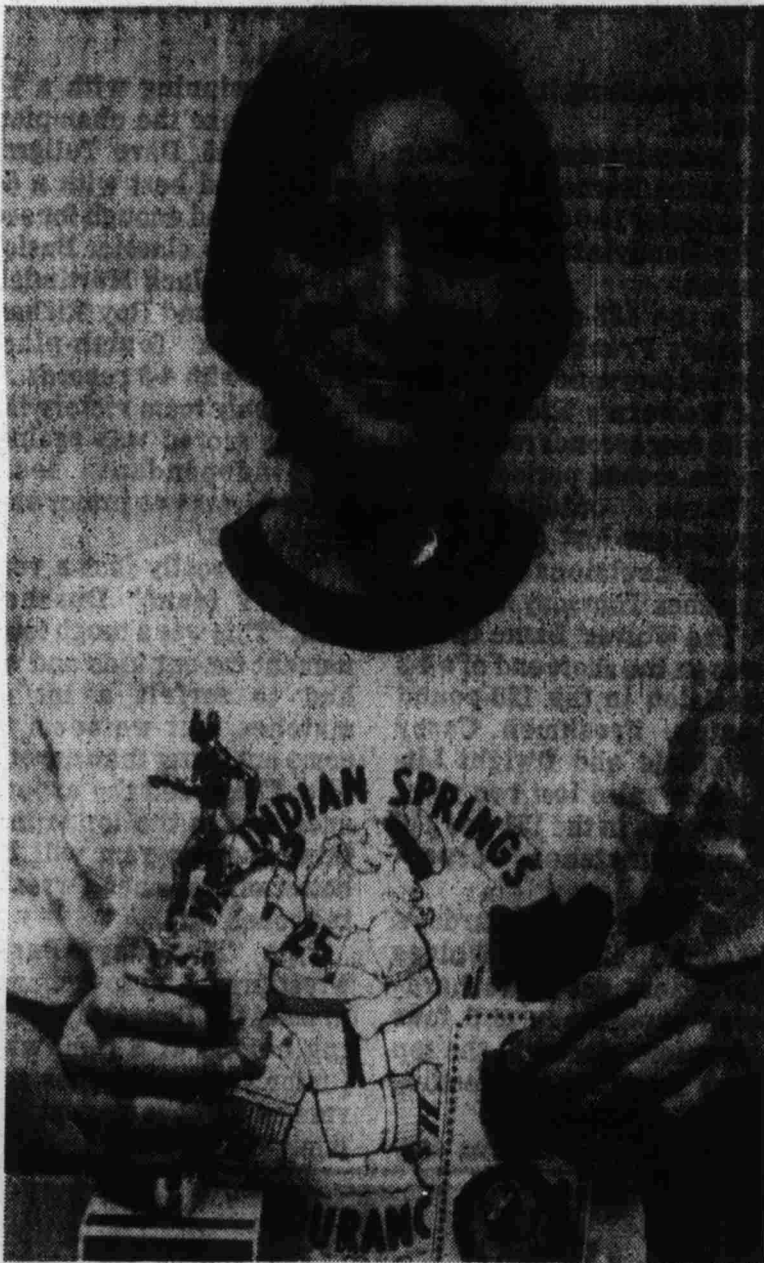

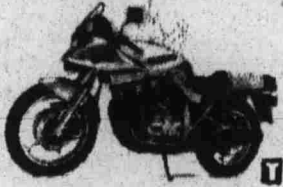


