

Henderson, Nevada, Pacific Engineering & Production Co. of Nevada ("OTC"), a Nevada corporation ("PEPCON"), and American Pacific Corporation ("PSE"), a Delaware Corporation ("AMPAC"), today jointly announced the signing of a plan of reorganization providing for a merger of PEPCON into a newly-organized subsidiary AMPAC. PEPCON of shareholders would receive AMPAC common stock upon the effectiveness of the merger.

Under the agreement each 1.1111 shares of PEP-CON common stock will be converted into one (1) share of AMPAC common stock subject to further customary approvals including requisite governmental approvals

and approval of PEPCON shareholders. AMPAC. currently owns approximately 13 percent of the outstanding common stock of PEP-CON. It is now anticipated that the PEPCON shareholders' meeting to consider the merger will be held in early 1982. Approval of AMPAC shareholders will not be required.

PEPCON is a producer of perchlorate chemicals and certain pollution abatement equipment which is associated with PEPCON's electrochemical technology.

AMPAC is engaged in real estate operations and investments and financial services consisting principally of pension plan administration and insurance management.

Something that should be of great concern to everyone in this nation was a story that appeared in the newspaper last week.

Because the Reagan administration cut funeral allowances for veterans from \$450 to \$150, 1,000 bodies are expected to pile up at the morgue in Los Angeles County. They cannot be buried. State and federal codes forbid burying war veterans in paupers' graves, so the coroners cannot afford to do anything but store the bodies.

According to the story, at least six dead war veterans are in the morgue awaiting burial, and a Veterans' Ad-ministration spokesman said he has been told as many as 22, and perhaps more, may not have been buried.

"We expect approximately 1,000 bodies of indigent veterans in a year's time in the county," said Maj. Robert Kingsbury, director of the

Strauss Layoffs Do Not Mean Eventual Shutdown

by Lois J. Cherry "This place is not going to close down. The rumors are totally unfounded," was the statement to the HOME **NEWS from Greg Fennell of** Levi Strauss Friday. Fennell said the plant has

cut back one shift and 88 workers were laid off leaving approximately 260 people still working at the distribution site. There have been rumors that Strauss may close its Henderson plant.

He said the cutbacks were due to the general economic slowdown and it is doubtful the second shift will be reinstated in the near future.

Fennell said Strauss will begin shipping a new product called the "Working

Man's Cowboy Jean" and he said the company is excited about the new look. Though similar to the "501" jean, he said the Cowboy Jean is designed to slip over cowboy boots though it has a straight leg.

The new jeans will be initially distributed in the Dallas area early in April and

\$19 Million Flood Control Funds Presented To County

State Treasurer Stan Colton presented a check for \$19 million for Clark County Monday, bringing about the purchase of the county's flood control bonds by the Nevada Municipal Bond Bank.

Created by the 1981 Nevada State Legislature, the Municipal Bond Bank's purpose is to reduce the interest rate at which the state's local govern-ments would otherwise borrow money. By providing access to the credit markets based on the state's highgrade AA bond rating, local governments can sell bonds at a reduced rate.

"The higher the (bond) rating, the less the interest," Colton explained, adding that local governments do not have as high a rating as the state.

The first funds allocated for flood control are to be used for the \$5.3 million project located in the Flamingo-

Decatur area in Las Vegas. Colton said Nevada's Municipal Bond Bank is the first of its type in the United States, although five other states have something similar. "But the sayings to taxpayers is not as much' as Nevada's Colton said.

"Once we finance all \$32 million of authorized flood control bonds through the Bond Bank, the savings in interest costs to the county's tarpayers will exceed \$5 million," Colton added,

In addition to flood control projects, Henderson will also receive approximately \$2.5 million for sewer treatment expansion. Seventy-five per-cent of the cost of the project will be paid by the federal government and the other 25 percent by Henderson, with the use of the Bond Bank funds.

"We're very proud of this," Colton said of the Municipal Bond Bank.

Fireless cookers, used by Americans in the 1800's and early 1900's might have a place in the 1980's and beyond suggests a retired University of Nevada Reno professor,

"The_cookers could have economical and energy saving possibilities," says Dr. Joseph H. Robertson, professor emeritus of range science, UNR Ag. College, "And, in today's busy world with both wife and husband working they may even be a time saver.

What is a fireless cooker? Dr. Robertson exhibited one. He said the simplest fireless cookers consist of an outer container and an inner nest with insulating material in between. "Sort of a super thermos," he explained. The kind of a container one wants, he said, depends on a person's aesthetic tastes. Nowadays all would have to be homemade. A corrugated cardboard box, an old trunk, a garbage can, or a specially made wooden or metal box will work. The nest is a cylindrical hole in the middle of the container, made to fit the cooking vessel snugly.


"The idea of the cookers," Dr. Robertson noted, "is to hold the heat of a partially cooked food, so that its own heat finishes the job." He explained that dishes improved by long, slow cooking are best for the fireless cookers. Those requiring high dry heat are unsuitable. Hot breakfast cereals, stews, soups, vegetables, tougher meats, puddings, and steamed breads are the kind of food preparations that are best suited for the cooking devices.

The cookers are used, by

partially cooking the required dish on the stove and then removing it and immediately putting it into the devices. They hold the heat with little loss, if insulated properly and allow cooking to continue.

Some advantages of the cookers, says Dr. Robertson, is that cooking can continue while time is being spent elsewhere, the food need not be watched, it takes no further energy, and all these things can add up to money saved. "In the old days," says Dr. Robertson, "cereal might be prepared before going to bed and would be ready for breakfast when a person got up. It was. not necessary, then, to cook."

The nest in the cookers can be made out of cardboard or any of the materials previously mentioned and made to fit the pots intended to be put into it. The nest is surrounded by insulation such as styrofoam, crumpled newspapers, urethane, wool, cotten, and other organic materials. Those who might desire more information on such cookers can contact Dr. Robertson.

Timet Not Fined For Violations scrubber.

Because Timet had taken corrective action for 18 incidents of air pollution, no fines were issued by the **Clark County Air Pollution** Control Hearing board on Wednesday.

Michael Naylor, district administrator for the air pollution, explained to the board that a series of letters between the Timet firm and the district outlined corrective action for each incident. **Board** member George Brizendine questioned one of the violations listed as employee error under the "malfunction" section of the county regulations.

If health officials term a violation an accidental equipment breakdown, the administrator may issue corrective action under revised regulations and the board does not need to consider the case or take further action unless the

Moments before Naylor made his report - including Timet's citations - the board fined WMK Transit Mix, a concrete manufacturing plant in Henderson, \$200 and ordered corrective action after a half-hour of testimony.

That incident, Brizendine pointed out, was also due to employee error. On Dec. 17 a collecting bag clearing fly ash from the air came loose, releasing a cloud 150 feet into the air extending about 35 feet from the silo.

SMK admitted violating the emission standards, and the board found the firm guilty of releasing visible contaminants, not considered a malfunction.

"I'm just wondering if we owe Timet anything," Brizendine said.

Timet is in the process of installing multimillion - dol-

ponds full of hydrogen chloride that blew over a nearby housing development last summer resulting in two citizen lawsuits against the company, the Health District, Clark County and the state.

Timet Environmental Engineer Don Baker reported that permanent solutions to the odor problems should be in operation by July and August in two-part cleanup. The liquid acid will be neutralized before reaching the holding ponds, he explained.

For five months about 150 residents complained to APCD about the odors which caused eye, nose and throat irritation, fainting and vomiting.

The board fined the company \$13,000 and ordered it to clean up the ponds - permanently.

Brizendine asked why Timet was given corrective action in a letter dated Dec. 17 outlining 15 separate incidents of visible pollution clouds from chlorine processing towers lasting a total of 1½ hours.

The seven-minute incident - last of the 15 violations - was the item in question. In that incident, someone left a valve open on the control equipment, called a

lar equipment to remove 10,000 tons a year of chlorine fumes from Henderson's air.

For installing the new equipment, the firm was granted a variance allowing emissions to occur. But APCD records show that permit had expired in June 1981.

Naylor ordered Timet in the Dec. 17 letter to clean up its chlorine controls by Jan. 1, 1982, or face possible board action.

In other action, the board accepted Timet's progress

Timet has dumped about 6,000 tons of soda ash - effectively stopping the irritating odors - into the ponds, costing \$770,000.

However, warm weather increases the escape of the acid from the ponds, and board members expressed concern the summer of 1982 would be a repeat of last year.

"With the number of lawsuits against me right now," Baker said, "no, we won't operate ponds on the ragged adge."

Though Huffaker did not return the call to the HOME NEWS, he did call Henderson police and order McMullin to submit to a polygraph test which was administered by the public defender's office who is handling McMullin's defense.

Following the polygraph test, Huffaker revoked Mc Mullin's bail and he was arrested at his home by police on Saturday, January 16.



Nevada Seven utilities have joined forces to establish a single phone number to call for location of underground utility lines. Centel, Nevada Power, Southwest Gas, CP National, and the Las Vegas Valley Water District have been joined by Sierra Pacific Power and Nevada Bell, both of Reno, in the system.

By calling Underground Service Alert (USA) at 1-800-227-2600, contractors and do-ityourselfers planning to dig a hole or trench can find out if a natural gas, water, power or tele-

any gas lost." The new system covers most of the state of

Nevada, including such communities as Elko, Ely, and Boulder City. "Eventually, we hope to have it extended to all communities in the state, no matter how remote," said Strobel.

Planning for the state-wide system was initiated by Walter Hernandez, gas pipeline safety engineer, for the Public Service Commission of Nevada (PSCN). It is being administered by USA of Concord, California, which also administers a similar system in the northern part of that state. A one-call system had

Tippie views these economic and legislative trends from the vantage point of the National Safety Council's Committee on Winter Driving Hazards and its years of research related to driver and vehicle problems created by winter's deadly tricks.

According to Council skid testers, poor traction and reduced visibility create the major difficulties when winter weather turns treacherous.

These problems are compounded when maintenance and traffic control operations are curtailed or delayed. Sliding off the road, skidding into intersections, and rear-end collisions increase.

Tippie reviewed precautions recommended by the Council's committee to help make winter driving as trouble free as possible:
