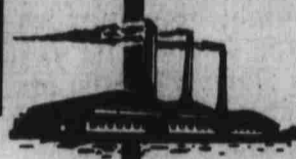

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## Council to Award \$5 Million Wastewater Contract

A \$4,647,000 bid for the city's wastewater treatment plant construction is expected to be awarded by the city council at a special meeting to be held this week.

A controversy erupted after the Feb. 11 bid opening, and the city chose the

low bidder, Paragon Energy Corporation of Kansas City. The second low bidder, Nielsen, Vasko and Earl, of Reno, complained that Paragon did not have the proper contractor's license at the time of the bid opening. Paragon had only a "B" license but later obtained the "A" license. NVE's bid was \$234,000 higher than the

Paragon bid.

A legal opinion on the matter was handed down in a previous similar matter by the attorney general's office when Governor Robert List was in office there. The legal decision allowed for awarding a contract to the lowest bidder and enabling the contractor to upgrade his license after the award.

City Attorney John Marchinao said he did not feel the fact that Paragon possessed only a "B" license at the time of the bid renders their bid non-responsive.

The bid council in March recommended awarding the bid to Paragon with the approval of the Environmental Protection Agency. City Manager Bob Anselmo said

the city received a letter this week saying the EPA was in agreement with the awarding of the bid to the lowest bidder.

The EPA will fund \$8 million of the project and the city will pay \$2.5 million. The bonds were recently sold for the city's portion of the project.

## Lieutenant Thompson Appointed To New Position

Lieutenant Tommy W. Thompson, who has been on staff with Henderson's Police Department and the Public Safety Division since 1967, was named as the Deputy Director of Public Safety in charge of support services last Monday evening by the Henderson City Council.

For Thompson, the promotion wasn't really anything to get overly excited about, because he had been involved with his current job for over a year.

"The job is really nothing new," cracked Thompson kiddingly, "only the title has changed."

Though Thompson, 38, may slightly joke about his new title, he is all business when it gets down to the fine line, and he feels that his support services department is of utmost importance to the overall balance of Henderson's Public Safety Department.

The new position, according to City Manager Bob Anselmo, will not increase the present staff.

Thompson initially began working in the support division of the police department in 1979, but when a structural change occurred within the city ranks, he also assumed control of the fire

department.

"My job is to provide support to both of the mainline division," Thompson said. "We try to take care of the logistics that are needed in

order to support both the police and the fire personnel," Thompson explained.

Thompson, and his staff of 17, are in charge of a pot-

pourri of items including records, communications, supplies, inventory control, evidence control, jail operations, civil processing, criminal identification, data processing, and budget operations.

"We take the burden off the line so they (police and fire personnel) don't need to worry about the mundane duties and operations," Thompson explained.

Thompson has an ongoing battle to reduce duplication within the Public Safety Department, as separate entities still remain from the time period when the police and fire departments were separate organizations. He also noted that the two agencies are still in the process of blending together to form one, cohesive unit.

"It is important for the personnel to understand that they are either involved with the police or fire department in title," explained Thompson, "but also that we are working together under the Department of Public Safety."

As a result of the single title, Thompson has seen a continued movement towards complete coordination and cooperation between the two groups, and that there is a definite cost benefit to taxpayers.

For example, during the recent incidents involving the gas leak in Green Valley and the gas truck rollover in Pittman, Thompson noted the cooperation that existed between the two groups.

"There was a lack of conflict in those situations," Thompson noted, "and that wouldn't have been the case just a few years ago."

A Southern California native, Thompson came to Las Vegas with his family in 1960. After a three-year stint in the Army, Thompson returned to the Las Vegas area and was employed in a number of odd jobs until he began working in the Communications Division of the Nevada Highway Patrol in 1966.

## Fitzgeralds Find Rocky Road to New Home

(Editor's Note: This is the second of a three part series on the Pittman Rehabilitation Program.)

In 1969 Mr. and Mrs. John Fitzgerald bought their home in Henderson's Pittman neighborhood and because of financial setbacks were unable over the years to put much money into the major improvements and repairs it needed.

Like many of the Pittman homes, it was at least thirty years old and was in a sorry state when Pittman became the target area of the HUD rehabilitation program.

The house was in need of such major repair work that

it was decided by the Rehabilitation Committee that the Fitzgeralds should be relocated to another apartment until the work on their home was completed.

The first application submitted by the Fitzgeralds was approved by the loan committee and they were moved to a motel.

Then apparently, the Loan Committee had questions on the contract of sale under which the couple bought their home and asked for a new loan application.

John Fitzgerald was injured in an industrial accident last year and is disabled. His wife suffered in-

juries in an auto accident this year and is undergoing therapy.

Fitzgerald says work began on the roof of the old structure and all of their personal possessions were boxed and ready to put into storage on May 1 when burglars ripped off the bars on the rear windows and burglarized the house taking much of the items in the boxes.

The couple tried to take inventory to determine what was missing and reported some items stolen that they later discovered were not.

The police department has not closed the case and

says the boxes are in storage and told the NEWS that the boxes will not be available for inventory for several weeks.

With the report of the theft and following confusion, Richard Heckendorf, director of the planning department apparently told the Fitzgeralds he thought they had constituted a fraud on the City of Henderson and the City's housing program and because of his belief he ordered all work on the Fitzgerald home stopped and directed that no additional funds were to be spent to pay for the rent in their apartment, a decision that should have been made

by the Loan Committee and would be subject to appeal to the City Council which must act on all such matters.

The Fitzgeralds sought help from an attorney and in a letter addressed to Heckendorf, the attorney asked that the planning director rescind the original decision to cancel the Fitzgerald's application.

In speaking with the city attorney and Heckendorf this week, the NEWS learned that the Fitzgeralds are still in their relocated position and funds are being provided for the rent.

Their new application for a loan will come before the Loan Committee next week.

Friends of Neldean (Mrs. Clyde) Haner, will be glad to know that while she is still in intensive care at St. Rose de Lima Hospital, her condition is stable and improving.

Nell has been a resident of the Triple K Trailer Park in Henderson for the past 20 years. She will be moving to Las Vegas soon to live with her married daughter, Karen Scarlett when she is dismissed from the hospital. She will miss her many friends here but hopes to keep in touch with them.

Visitors who have been here to see her include her nephew Jack Gleason of California, and Connie Hansen of Alaska.

If your water bill seems too high and you're using no more water, it's possible. A rate hike went into effect that brings the Henderson cost of water up to that of Boulder City.

Bill Cottrell, director of the Clark County Housing, said the water bill for Landsman Gardens was \$4700 for the month, making the bill \$47 for each apartment.

The Clark County Housing Authority had an item for discussion for 50 units of housing for elderly, for Henderson, however, Cottrell said the idea had to be dropped because the projects had to be sponsored by a non-profit organization and none was found in the short time they had to find one.

**Petition Author Mackay Resigns**

**Hesse President Says Company's Problems 'Blown Out of Proportion'**

Hesse Corporation president Mike Ireland said Thursday that recent labor problems at the plant "have been completely blown out of proportion" and added that last week's layoffs at the Henderson beverage truck body manufacturing plant were symptoms of the general slump in the economy.

About 13 to 14 workers were laid off last Tuesday and Wednesday, Ireland confirmed.

Workers involved with

union organization efforts at the plant have said in the past the layoffs were designed to break the union effort but Ireland countered that nothing could be further from the truth.

"We've had the same problems and slowdowns that every business in the country has had ... over the years we've had many layoffs at our Kansas City plant and we've had layoffs recently but they have never attracted the attention like the Hen-

derson plant." Ireland said "I don't think a privately owned business should have to run in the public eye."

Ireland said the local press had only listened to "a few trouble makers and the union organizers" and not employees who resented the adverse publicity and the problems a few workers had caused.

When asked about grievance petition author Dana Mackay and his recent resignation Wednesday Ireland said the company "absolutely 100 percent, denied charges" included in Mackay's resignation letter. Mackay, principal or-

ganizer of the union election at Hesse, said in the letter that before his second operation to remove polyps from his nose, company officials had agreed to assign him duties where he would not inhale as much dust. After he authored and circulated a petition that complained of dust and ventilation in the plant he was assigned to grind, one of the most dust producing jobs in the factory, according to Mackay.

"On eight occasions we requested that he bring us a written statement from his doctor about his condition," Ireland said. "But he never gave us that medical infor-

mation, he always chose to tell us himself concerning his condition."

Ireland concluded with the statement that his company would successfully defeat the union organizing effort as they have once before. "We'll fight it and we'll beat it," Ireland said. "Once management has beaten them they (unions) come back again and again."

According to National Labor Relations Board region 31 agent Bob Conrado a hearing that will determine whether or not a union election will be conducted is scheduled for July 15 in the board's Las Vegas office.

Until that time Conrado said he would work to obtain Hesse agreement to conduct an election.

If the hearing takes place a decision to direct or dismiss the election request will be made within 10 days to two weeks, according to Conrado. Then both sides have a 25-day period to file appeals to the hearing decision, those appeals must travel to Washington, D.C. Conrado said that he anticipated an election sometime at the end of August, however if the company agrees to an election quickly it could be as early as late July or early August.

Peggy Sue acquired a mixed scottish terrier, about one year old, because he spent nearly two days leaning against her cyclone fence looking hungry and thirsty.

Lois had noticed a large golden mixed collie walking down Water Street with the air of a absent minded stock broker earlier one day, then later as the thermometer climbed into the hundreds, he was seen standing across the street from the NEWS in the shade of a building, only now he gazed desperately at each passerby.

Lois walked across the street to check on any collar or identification and he had only a short hooked chain around his neck. He willingly followed her to the office and once inside the air conditioned building dropped gratefully onto the carpet. After a drink of water, went to sleep.

In Marilyn's case, she saw the huge tan and black shepherd mix wandering on Lake Mead Drive -- he was skinny and very thirsty. She opened her car door to look at him and he hopped in. According to Marilyn, when a

150 pound dog hops in your car you take him home. She adds however that her husband didn't think it was a very good Father's Day gift, especially since the Pearsons have three other dogs and several cats.

She tied the dog -- about one and one half years old, to a post in front of her home since her back yard was already occupied by dogs. Turns out he was loveable, playful, liked cats and they liked him.

Then began the three way project to find the owners of these dogs.

Peggy Sue was lucky and after a call to the Las Vegas Animal Shelter which listed the description of her found dog the owner called -- as a matter of fact three owners called before one determined it was her dog.

But that wasn't before the owner of the little terrier called the NEWS and spoke with Marilyn who thought she was calling about Marilyn's find. The mailman would not deliver as long as the dog was tied near the mailbox and an already irate hubby was getting crankier about the problem so the shepherd went home with a new master.

As the car with "Eucker" disappeared over the horizon, Marilyn's phone rang and the dog's original owner said she saw the pictures and description and it was her dog. She was relieved and happy and wanted her dog back. Marilyn told her where the dog could be found and sat back afraid to call the young man because he might be angry -- turns out he wasn't and was pleased to turn "Eucker" over to his owner. Strange coincidence the dog's original name was "Luger."

Shortly after the NEWS hit the streets Thursday morning and when Lois by now was about to decide she had now become the owner of three large, hairy and affectionate dogs, the phone in the office rang.

**City To Report on Wastewaters Plant Progress**

A report on the progress of the city's sewer treatment plant and a discussion on the construction of a new plant will be given at a meeting of the District air pollution control hearing board Wed., July 7 at 7:30 p.m. in the Clemens room at 625 Shadow Lane.

The city was cited recently because of odors from the sewer treatment plant and fined \$5,000. The city appealed the ruling and will report on the progress in correcting the situation.

The board will consider a progress report on corrective action and emissions monitoring on the ponds east of Pabco Road. Timet will also be involved in a report on controlling visible emissions

from the ingot melt shop.

There will be a continuation of a hearing regarding the final disposition of fugitive dust, in the vicinity of Smoke Ranch and Jones Road. Lincoln Wagon Trails Associates will discuss disturbing topsoil prior to issuance of required permit in the vicinity of Mojave and Pecos.

J.R. Jacks Trucking Co. will answer charges of failure to obtain a permit and fugitive dust emissions in the vicinity of Vegas Valley Drive and Hollywood Road.

the field, I felt that it was something that I wanted to do."

After a year with the Highway Patrol, Thompson began working with the Henderson Police Department in 1967. In the past 16 years, Thompson has steadily moved up through the ranks in the Henderson Department.

Thompson became a sergeant in 1969 and a lieutenant in 1972. In addition, he has also served as both the patrol and detective commander.

In 1975, Thompson attended a 13-week academy that was conducted by the Federal Bureau of Investigation, and in 1977, he concluded his studies at UNLV and received a Bachelors of Arts Degree in Law Enforcement.

"It was tough going to school part-time for six years and working," Thomp-

son said, "but getting the degree was something that I always wanted to do."

Thompson and his wife, Marlys, have one son, Gary, an acclaimed swimmer who will be a senior at Basic High School this fall.

Though his job is filled with several headaches and frustrating moments, Thompson admitted that he enjoys administrative work. "I am doing what I like" Thompson said. "I haven't been out in the field since 1977, and I don't miss it at all. It is a challenge to support over 100 people."

Law enforcement is a fascinating field, and Thompson said that it is hard to get bored once you begin working in this area.

"I must say that I never deal with the same things from day to day," Thompson said candidly. "I never have an opportunity to get into a rut because there are so

many different things to do -- even old problems need to be dealt with in new ways."

Nevertheless, Thompson, who said that he is an "impatient" man, revealed that there are problems with his line of work.

"It is frustrating," Thompson remarked, "to see things that need improvement, but can't be dealt with. It takes time to solve those problems," he reiterated, "and oftentimes you don't have the money to correct them."

Thompson has rapidly climbed the ladder in the law enforcement field, and he is happy with his present job.

"I'm where I want to be for the moment," Thompson said in a satisfied voice, "but eventually I would like to be in charge of a Department of Public Safety. At 38, I've got quite a few years ahead of me and a lot to learn."

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# Cannon Says GI's On Way To Winning Back Unemployment Pay

Senator Howard Cannon today praised action by a Senate Committee to restore unemployment benefits for honorably discharged servicemen.

"The Senate Finance Committee has taken the first step toward rectifying a wrong committed in the haste to pass a budget-cutting bill last year," Cannon said.

"Although the committee didn't go as far as I would have liked, it has made a major contribution."

Under terms of legislation being considered by the Finance Committee, honorably discharged servicemen who decline to re-enlist would be eligible for 13 weeks of unemployment compensation. Benefits would begin after a four-week waiting period if the serviceman can't find a job and had been in service for two years.

Cannon had co-sponsored a bill to grant a full 26 weeks of unemployment without a waiting period.

"If we're serious

about encouraging people to join the volunteer army, we should provide some sort of cushion when their hitch is up," Cannon said.

"Unemployment benefits are necessary in many cases to tide people over until they can enter the civilian work force once again."

Elimination of unemployment compensation was a little-noticed aspect of the budget reconciliation bill enacted last year, which trimmed domestic spending by some \$30 billion.

# Roommates Could Cause High-Toll Headaches

A recession economy is forcing some jobless Las Vegasans to live with friends and families. That means more people using the telephone, which can be a headache for the person responsible for paying the bill.

Credit representatives at Central Telephone - Nevada are cautioning customers who share households with others to keep close tabs on the long-distance calls placed

from their residence. "Some customers responsible for the account don't realize they've got a problem until the bill arrives in the mail," said Darlena Kern, Centel assistant credit manager. "Then they call us to complain that they didn't know their roommates were placing all those long-distance calls and that they shouldn't have to pay for them."

Kern pointed out that regardless who uses the phone, responsibility for payment still rests with the person whose name appears on the account.

And, under a 1981 Public Service Commission ruling, these customers may be required to post a deposit or increase an existing one. The PSC ruled a larger deposit could be required to accommodate high bills run up by people who are not

responsible parties for a certain telephone number.

Under the ruling, the responsible party's telephone deposit is based on an estimate of the total long-distance charges of anyone who resides with that customer and has access to the phone.

Also, if a friend's prior credit record with Centel is poor and includes a history of high usage, a steeper de-

posit may be required to cover that person's part of the bill.

"We're trying to protect customers who don't have this potential problem," Kern said. "When a high bill isn't paid, every customer absorbs those costs."

The percentage of customers involved is not high but the bills are extremely large, in most cases, she added.

# Female Veterans Increase During Past 11 Years

The number of female veterans has increased significantly during the past 11 years according to a report prepared by the Veterans Administration. The male veteran population is declining.

The report is the first in a new series of brief studies being prepared by the VA's Office of Reports and Statistics in Washington.

Veterans Administration Chief Robert P. Nimmo said these studies are essential in order for the Agency to address the needs of all veterans.

"Effective management of the wide range of VA programs is

greatly enhanced when a detailed profile of the veteran population is available," Nimmo said.

According to the study, the number of women on active military duty is also on the rise, indicating a continued increase in the number of female veterans in the coming years.

Women veterans totaled 742,000 on Sept. 30, 1981, or 2.5% of all living veterans. In the past five years the number of female veterans has increased by 26%. This large increase, since the mid-1970s, becomes

even more apparent when comparisons are made with the number of male veterans. The ratio of male veterans to female veterans stood at just over 50 to 1 during the first half of the 1970s, but dropped to 39.5 to 1 by the end of September 1981.

Other findings:

AGE - The median age of female veterans exceeded that of their male counterparts each year until 1979, after which their relative age pattern has been reversed. The age structures of these two groups is expected to become more and more divergent during the

next few years. As of September 1981, the median age for female veterans was 46.2 years compared to 50.3 years for male veterans.

PERIOD OF MILITARY SERVICE - The distribution of female veterans by period of military service was fairly similar to that to males at the end of 1981.

The major difference, and the one which largely explains the variances in the overall age structures of these two subgroups, is that a much greater proportion of women, 17%, than of men, 4%, had served in the armed forces during the post-

Vietnam era only.

EXPECTATIONS FOR THE FUTURE - The number of women in the armed forces will most likely continue to grow by significant numbers while the female veteran population is expected to maintain a course of steady growth in the future years.

The study points out that as the number of female veterans grows an increasingly vital aspect of the VA's mission will be the special consideration given to the problems of female veterans with respect to the administration of various types of veterans' programs such as medical care, counseling, loan guaranty and education.

## Seniors Needs Met, But Future In Danger Says Lyman

The immediate needs of Senior citizens are being met better today than in years, but our older citizens' futures are in danger, said congressional candidate James Lyman today.

"High inflation had been an unseen assailant committing crime after crime against seniors until President Reagan took office and arrested the attacker. Present economic policies have resulted in a zero percent inflation rate in wholesale prices for four months in 1982 and the elimination of double-digit inflation rates. This trend is of greater benefit to senior citizens and those on fixed incomes than any other segment of society," Lyman said.

In addition, this month's 7.4% cost of living allowance (COLA) increase, which seniors will see in their benefit checks

today (July 1) shows promises made to them for this year are being kept, he said.

There are currently over 36,000,000 Social Security recipients, 20,000,000 of which are retired workers. The 7.4% COLA increase is based on the consumer price index (CPI) from the beginning of the first quarter of 1981 to the end of the first quarter of 1982.

"It is the future of senior citizens and soon-to-be senior citizens that is in danger, such danger that only a major revamping of the Social Security system can protect them. Many politicians are scared to even talk about, let alone deal with the crisis the system faces, but there are a number of proposals being talked about for the development of a sane and solvent system," Lyman said.

## Cannon Introduces Bill to Aid Supplemental Benefits

A burial plot or funeral plan owned by an elderly person should not count as an asset in determining whether that person qualifies for Supplemental Security Income (SSI), Sen. Howard Cannon said today.

Cannon Wednesday introduced a bill (S.

2700) in the U.S. Senate which would exclude funeral arrangements from the assets determination. At present, an individual can possess only \$1,500 in assets and a couple only \$2,250 to qualify for SSI, he explained.

SSI is a program of supplemental assis-

tance under the Social Security program to aid indigent elderly people, the blind or disabled.

"The law currently exempts certain essentials from the assets calculation -- such things as a home, a car, property used for self-support and reason-

able amounts of life insurance," Cannon said.

"Funeral plans are not exempt, however. This forces the elderly to either forfeit the arrangements they have made for their funerals or to dispose of certain necessary assets. It is a tragic choice and one that shouldn't have to

be made by persons nearing the end of their lives."

Cannon said a similar bill has been introduced in the House of Representatives and that he was hopeful action would be taken in the current congressional session.

## Dumping Charges Prove False

Recent charges that Hesse Corporation's Henderson beverage truck body manufacturing plant has dumped "hazardous" wastes directly into holes on company property have proven to be incorrect according to Nevada State Environmental Protection Division official Vern Ross.

Ross told the HOME NEWS Thursday that the company had been dumping their industrial wastes into the ground on company property but said that the amount of dumping would have to be greater than 1000 kilograms per month before federal laws were violated.

Ross said the amount of materials dumped in no way approached the 1000 kilogram level. He also added that after recent conversations with state officials the company has stopped the dumping.

Hesse has had problems finding a dumping site that will accept their containerized wastes according to Ross since the passage of recent federal laws prohibiting the disposal of such wastes in an ordinary landfill. Ross said the company originally stored the waste on company property but when numerous efforts to find a legal dumping facility were unsuccessful "they're

only recourse was to put it into the ground."

Ross said that he thought the company could find a dumping facility with his help and that dumping that had occurred "posed no threat to ground water, public health or the environment."

After Ross had advised the company that ground dumping was "not a proper method" Hesse again began storing the liquid wastes, anticipating discovery of a legal dumping site according to Ross.

Ross prefaced his remarks by saying his June 21 visit to Hesse didn't warrant a full inspection or any fines or penalties.

## Cavnar Attacks Lyman's Use of Stockman

"David Stockman, Viet Nam War protester, should be campaigning in California for the likes of Jane Fonda's husband and not for James Lyman here in Nevada where we don't tolerate cowards," stated Peggy Cavnar, Republican candidate for U.S. Congress.

"What causes my stomach to churn more than anything else is the fact that my brother, Timmy, an eighteen year old U.S. Marine, died in action in that same war while Mr. Stockman led campus 'peacenik' protesters," she said.

Mrs. Cavnar wondered whether Steve Ritchie, a bonafide Viet Nam war hero, was unaware of the OMB Director's 'peacenik' background or has such a short memory that he would have Mr. Stockman in his home on behalf of Dr. Lyman's campaign.

"All of the money put in Lyman's campaign by the National Republican Committee and all of the Eastern campaign help and political big shots they bring into Nevada isn't going to help him one bit or conceal the fact that he is unable to campaign

on his own merit," Mrs. Cavnar said.

The former Assemblywoman also noted that Dr. Lyman who claims to be a conservative and says he fully endorses Reaganomics, wasn't exactly candid recently about his association with the National Conservative Political Action Committee (NCPAC). Mr. Stockman, on the other hand, was very candid with his statement in the Atlantic Monthly that the Reagan tax cut was actually a "Trojan Horse."

"On the one hand Dr. Lyman is trying to tie his campaign to Presi-

dent Reagan and conservatism, while at the same time he's bringing in Mr. Stockman who is a traitor to both," Mrs. Cavnar said.

"Combined and put in proper perspective, this pretty well indicates the direction and character of his campaign."

Mrs. Cavnar noted that the selection of Stockman was the third major mistake in Dr. Lyman's desperate attempt to try to get his campaign off the ground and shows how badly he is in need of help.

## Housing Authority Taking Applications

The Clark County Housing Authority is continuing to take applications for its low rent projects, in spite of existing waiting lists, it was announced this week by Bill Cottrell, Executive Director.

The Authority expects completion of its newest project, Hullum Homes, in late July. These 59 apartments located on Owens west of Nellis Boulevard, must generate an average monthly rent of about \$185 to \$225 per month; this means families must have incomes in the range of \$10,000 and upward.

"We find that some people think they have no chance of getting in because of the lists. This isn't true. In fact, if an applicant comes in now and we find that his rent would be higher than any of those on the current list, he will be housed before any-

one else," Cottrell said.

This situation reflects the current national policy on project income. Projects must be financially feasible, and to make this possible the Authority must balance the number of very low-income families with those having higher incomes.

Income limits for public housing have been revised to reflect the effects of inflation. Maximum permissible income for a family of four is

now \$18,800; this figure is adjusted up or down, depending on family size.

The Housing Authority will welcome applications for these units at its application office, 5064 East Flamingo Road (across from Sam's Town Casino). Office hours are 8:00 a.m. to 4:30 p.m., Monday through Friday. Persons interested in applying may phone 451-8041 for further information.

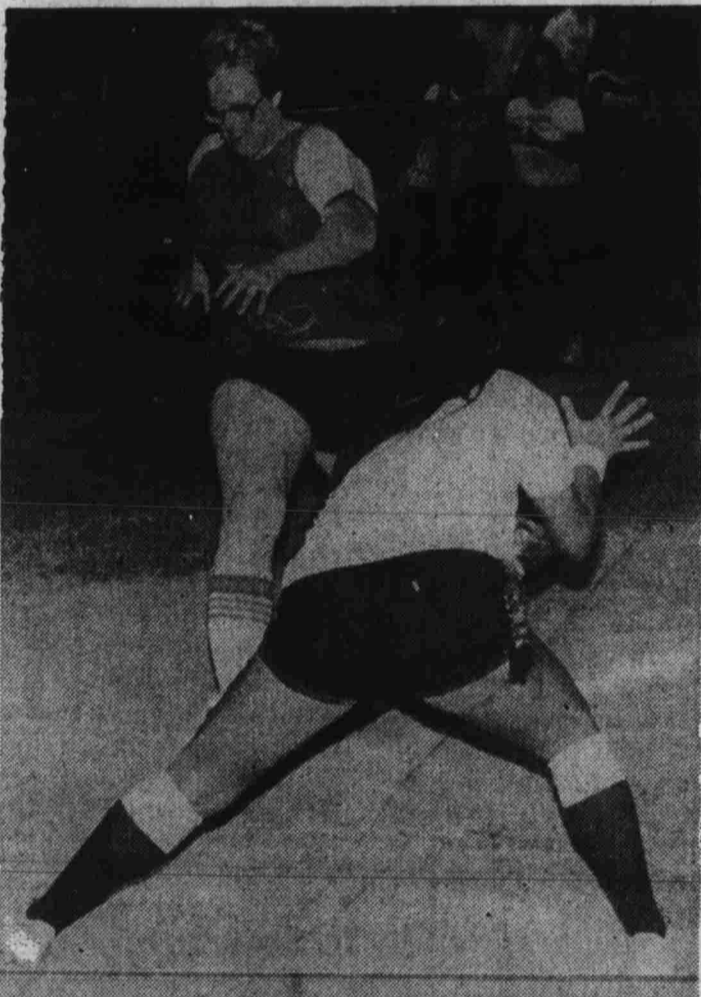

## Proposed Realignment Would Place Boulder In AAA League

Boulder City High School would become a member of the AAA league beginning in the fall of 1983 under a proposed realignment that was approved during the June 17-18 meeting of the Nevada Interscholastic Activities Association's Realignment Committee.

According to the proposal, Boulder City would be placed in the Sunrise Divi-

sion of the southern section of the AAA league with Basic, Eldorado, Gorman, Las Vegas, and Vo-Tech. The Sunset Division would be composed of Bonanza, Chaparral, Clark, Rancho, Valley, and Western.

"I intend to fight this thing all the way," said Boulder City High School Principal Brian Fox. "If we were just jammed into the AAA

league, I think that our whole athletic program would be killed in two years. We would become a zero on the map," Fox reiterated.

He continued, "It's early in the game, but people in Boulder City will be livid about this and I don't think that they will stand for it. We have good athletes in Boulder City... we just don't have as many."

Five realignment proposals were submitted to the realignment committee, including one by Fox, who was first informed of the proposed realignment last Wednesday.

The realignment committee used the following considerations when they were drawing up the final realignment proposal: 1) geographic location 2) com-

petitiveness of member schools 3) travel 4) reducing loss of school time 5) aligning schools that have similar programs 6) ease of scheduling.

It should be noted that enrollment, which has been the primary factor for determining athletic realignment in the past, was not even among the list of six

used by the realignment committee in order to make a final decision.

At the present time, enrollment is the basic factor used for the athletic realignment of Nevada schools, with the 17-member AA league composed of schools which have enrollments between 200-849 stu-

The World Boxing Council's No. 1 lightweight contender, and heir apparent to Alexis Arguello's championship, Edwin Rosario, takes on undefeated slugger Irleis "Cubanito" Perez Saturday, July 10, in a nationally televised, 10-round bout at the Hacienda Resort Hotel and Casino.

The action-packed card, promoted by Don Chargin Productions in association with the Hacienda, Paul Lowden, president and chairman of the board, Bernie Yuman, boxing consultant, begins at noon, Saturday the 10th. Doors to the Hacienda's Matador Arena open at 11:30 a.m.

Tickets for this "Battle of the Undefeated" are \$20 for ringside reserved and \$15 for general admission.

The main event will be televised live nationally by CBS but blacked out in the Las Vegas area.

Perfect is the way to describe these two fighters' records. Rosario, originally from Puerto Rico but now living in New York, is 25-0 with 24 knockouts. The 23-year-old Perez, originally from Cuba but now living in Westminster, Calif., is 23-0 with 19 knockouts.

Rosario, managed by the astute Jimmy Jacobs, would be considered a "phenom" or "blue chipper" in other sports based on his ability at such a tender age. He is a complete fighter, one without flaws. He has it all -- power from both sides, fine boxing technique, quick hands and feet, defense.

But while Perez may not have the No. 1 ranking he is a fine fighter and he holds a definite advantage over

Rosario -- size. Rosario is a compact 5-foot-5-inches while Perez is lanky and has a long reach by 5-foot-9½-inches. Perez, a former college student, is managed by Jackie McCoy, who has managed five world champions.

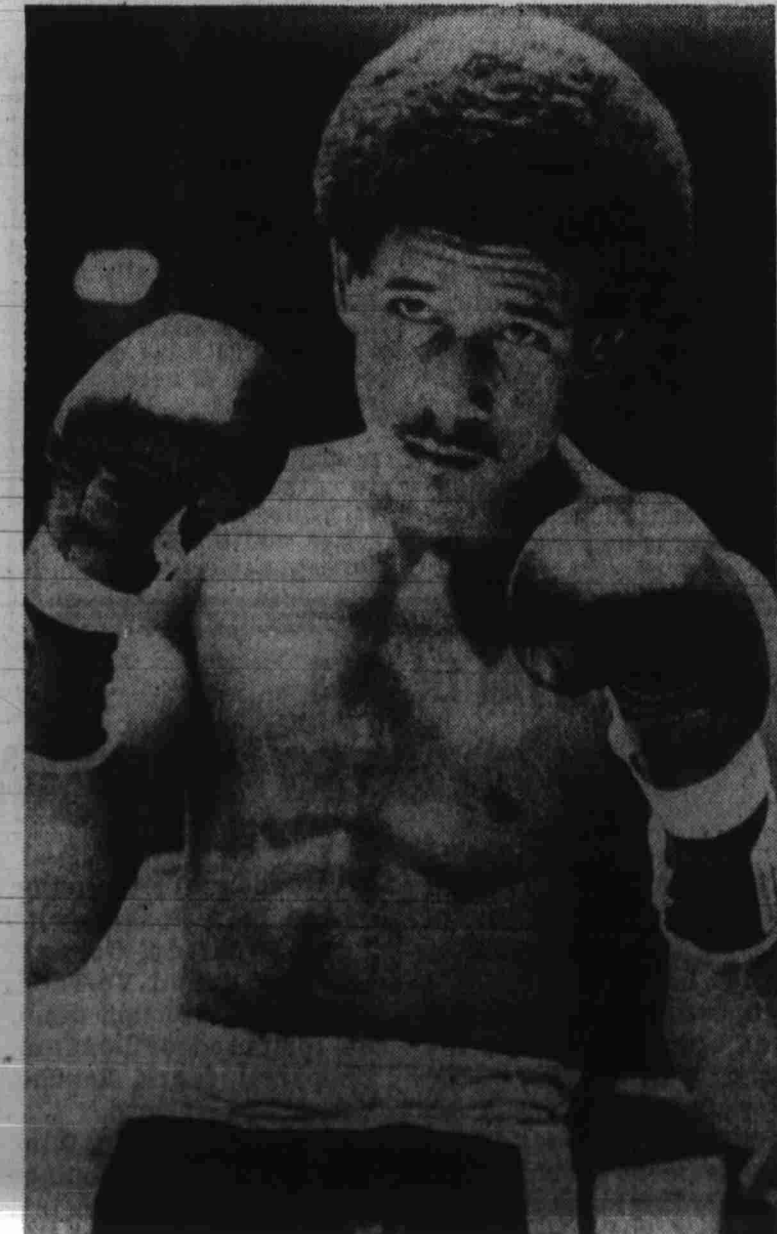
Rosario has had three fights this year, all in Las Vegas. On January 30 he stopped Ezzard Charles Adams in the third, on March 15 he halted Dennis Quimayousie in the first and on May 30 he earned his lofty rating in the lightweight division by dumping world-ranked Edwin Viruet in the third, the first time that Viruet had ever failed to go the distance.

Perez is 5-0 in 1982; four fights were in Los Angeles and one, on March 21, in Las Vegas. On Jan 30 he stop-

ped Earl Young in the first, on Feb. 18 he halted Jose Sanchez in the second, then in March he dispatched Charlie Evans in the sixth, on April 1 he dropped Daniel Patino in the first and on April 22 he took a 10-round decision over Art Leon, who holds a win over former WBC featherweight champion Bobby Chacon and who went the 15-round distance with Arguello in a WBC junior lightweight title bout in 1978.

Both fighters have enjoyed more success as pros as they did as amateurs. Rosario, who began fighting at the age eight, was 30-2 while Perez was 26-2-2.

This is the second major, nationally televised fight in three weeks at the Hacienda which is reemerging as a boxing power in Las Vegas after a seven-month hiatus.

dents.

In a summarizing statement, the realignment committee concluded that the proposal "would enhance and promote competition on an equal level throughout the state."

Elko High School, presently a member of the AA league, would also be affected by the proposal. Elko would be placed into the northern section of the AAA league.

Fox, who was obviously upset about the proposal, said, "The entire idea is totally and completely unacceptable to Boulder City High School, and it shows a

complete disregard to what is right, correct, and proper to Boulder City." Fox continued, "The realignment committee ignored the success of the current AA alignment."

Under the proposal made by Fox, a new AAAA league would be created for schools with excessively large enrollments. Boulder City would then become a member of a new AAA league which would be made up of member schools with enrollments in the neighborhood of 650-1600 students.

Royal Orser, the Principal

of Elko High School, made a similar proposal to the realignment committee whereby a new AAAA league would be formed.

"Eventually, we will become a member of the AAA," Fox said succinctly. "I believe that it is in the best interest of Boulder City High School to lay the groundwork for the creation of a new league."

Fox explained, "I want to protect Boulder City so that we won't be jammed into the AAA league as it is now, but the committee disregarded my proposal to create a new AAAA league."

## FOR PARENTS

ARE YOUR CHILDREN IN SHAPE?

When parents tell their children to "shape up," there's often a good reason behind it. Here's another one. One recent physical fitness study reveals that only 43 percent of young people in the United States can achieve the physical fitness standards that should be met by any healthy youngster.

It also shows what the average boy and girl in each age group can do in performing various exercises, and indicates how youngsters can get in better shape.

The Fitness Profile of American Youth, released by Nabisco Brands, Inc., and the Amateur Athletic Union, says most young Americans achieve their fitness peak at age 14. After that, fitness test scores flattened or dropped, especially among females. One reason may be that many schools discontinue compulsory gym after the eighth grade.

The Profile is based on an analysis of exercise tests conducted from 1979 to 1981 among more than four million Americans aged six through 17, as part of the ongoing Nabisco-AAU Physical Fitness Program. The young people attend more than 10,000 public and private schools, nationwide.

Over the years, they were tested on their ability to perform a wide variety of physical exercises, including distance runs, sprints, high jumps, longjumps, situps, pushups and pullups.

Here are some of the less-than-rosy results: The average 17-year-old boy takes 12.8 seconds to run 100 yards. But the average

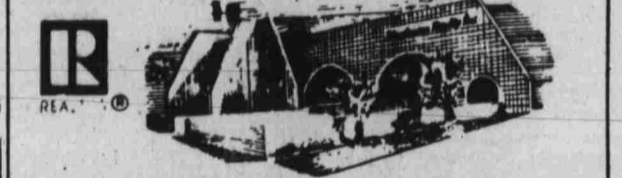
