They live in the Townsite neighborhood, and Anthony is a cook at the Rainbow Club.

Raya commented that although their baby's due date was Jan. 8, "I'd been in and out of the hospital since Christmas Eve with false labor."

Increasingly in Nevada, elected public officials are saying yes to this question, almost always against the spirit of the state's Open Meeting Law, if not its specific provisions.

There has been a constant battle by the press to have negotiations performed by any governmental entity governed under some provisions of the law.

Usually these negotiations involve legal settlements or possible civil suits where the city or county involved stands to lose a lot of money. The entity's counsel says the attorney-client privilege must be preserved and thus the public is barred from negotiations. Often, the public is left in the dark when issues are settled and not made public.

Who is the client, anyway? We're asked to believe it is not us, the taxpayers, but our elected representatives, who might not have our interests at heart in light of their political future. Who will get the blame for the colossal judgment leveled against the county over their wastewater treatment lawsuit? Two who hired out-of-state lawyers and voted to go to court have already been re-elected.

Historically denied incorporation to gaming-free Boulder City, the county's oldest casino and its new 120-room hotel sets a number of Henderson firsts: the first multi-storied commercial building in the city, the first hotel with more than 100 rooms and the first gaming fullservice (lodging, restaurants and gambling) operation.

Long struggle taking shape

Local developer Richard MacDonald says he's been working on his proposed Mac-Donald Ranch so long he feels like "Captain Ahab with Moby

Many times larger than the legendary white whale, Mac-Donald Ranch is a proposed 3,210-acre mixed residential, commercial, business and recreational development Mac-Donald is seeking to establish South of East Lake Mead Drive.

The acreage includes some hillside property among the small mountains behind Black Mountain. The view afforded by these hillsides is a major asset to the project, MacDonald said.

"This is unique. There is no other site in the whole valley, that I know of, that actually has mountainside property."

Upscale housing will take up a large percentage of the hillside areas. MacDonald, in an interview last week, said he is planning to enforce strict estrictions on building in the

"In California you'll see peo-

ple taking bulldozers and pushing dirt over the side." he said. "You won't have any of that here. Anytime the natural landscape is disturbed you have to replace it. That way you don't mar the land."

Atop several of the hills will be restaurants. MacDonald said hilltop restaurants are popular in other southwestern cities but haven't been tried here. A western-style rib and steak place-"where you walk in with a tie and they cut it off and pin it to a wall; really laid back"and a Mexican restaurant are planned, as well as a special outdoor diner.

Wrapped around the bottom of the hills will be a golf course, 27 holes in all. The goir Jurse MacDonald said, will be another major selling point for the project.

MacDonald Ranch is divided roughly in three. Phase one will be developed in the center of the property, and will consist mostly of starter homes, along with some of the hillsid

end of the land, with more high-end mountainside homes. The third section, in the western portion, will be a retirement community and a business-commercial area. Other commercial uses will be sprinkled throughout the project.

Other highlights will include a pair of 18-acre resort hotels, modeled after similar facilities in Arizona. Two large "natural preservation parks" are included in the master plan. These will be landscaped areas for picnicing and hiking. Also slated for the project is a motion picture sound stage. If it becomes a reality, it could add to Nevada's already growing film industry.

MacDonald and his wife Clara have spent many years and many dollars (though they hesitate to say how much they've spent to date. "I have no idea," Rich said, "as a matter of fact, I hesitate to count it up.") developing the concept for MacDonald Ranch.

"We've looked at most projects in Southern California and Arizona," MacDonald said. "We have gotten so we can tell who the architect is by looking at it." "It's like a game," adds Clara, with a laugh.

Many of the design principles of the proposal have been adapted from things they've seen in California and Arizona communities, and while discussing MacDonald Ranch, he frequently compares some of its features with those of

developments in Palm Springs, Calif., Scottsdale, Ariz. and Phoenix, Ariz.

One concept he adapted from those communities is the need for lush landscaping. "There are places here where you get a \$20 tree every 30 feet with a big boulder in between. That's not quite what you'd call landscaping. Our concept is for first-rate professional landscaping. We're going to landscape quite heavily.

The project has already gone through one master plan revision, and MacDonald has stressed the need to maintain flexibility, to adapt to market conditions.

MacDonald said he thinks the golf course can be under construction within six months, with residential development beginning 18 months or two years from now. "There is still a lot of engineering work to be done," he said.

He is also looking forward to a local improvement district that will string utilities out to Sky Harbor airport. The industrial sites that would be opened up along Lake Mead Drive would benefit his project, he said, as well as the city.

"(This is) a unique enough site, and with the planning that's going into it, I don't think we can miss."

MacDonald's partner in the venture is Western DevCor, an Arizona-based firm that specializes in high-quality commercial developments.

Planners consider huge development

The Henderson Planning Commission will consider a trio of items concerning the proposed MacDonald Ranch development when they hold their first meeting of 1987 Thursday at 7:30 p.m.

MacDonald Ranch is slated to occupy more than 3,000 acres on the southern side of East Lake Mead Drive, and is the brainchild of local developer Richard MacDonald.

He is asking the commission to approve a revised master plan

for the project. MacDonald and his associates have shifted around the three villages within the development.

MacDonald is also requesting an amendment to the city comprehensive plan; he seeks a change in the land use policy plan that will change the desigation of the 3,210 acres from limited service area to a mix of residential, community and neighborhood shopping, tourist commercial, light industrial business park and public and semi-public designations.

Attached to that is a request

to designate the entire site as an area of special master plan.

The third item on Thursday's agenda requested by Mac-Donald is an amendment to the master streets and highways plan. He is seeking to realign portions of Horizon Drive and Green Valley Parkway.

Also on the agenda is a previously-tabled item concerning the Cosada Green Valley development.

At the last planning commission meeting, the commission continued the request for a planned unit residential development and tentative map review

The request is for a 15-acre piece of an overall 51-acre

development. The planning department staff said that several potential problems had to be worked out, such as the lack of a public road to the site, and recommended continuing the item antil this week.

The commission will also elect their 1987 slate of officers. The current officers are Paul Ruth, chairman, and Chapman Wooten, vice-chairman.

Another extra added into the new Railroad Pass was excess

air conditioning capacity, almost twice as much as needed. according to Belding. He said it would make possible an increased exchange of air flow through the building, hopefully keeping cigarette smoke to a minimum.

As part of the grand opening festivities Thursday and Friday, the Railroad Pass will be giving away thousands of dollars in cash each day including two midnight \$500 cash drawings. Free Keno, single deck 21, double-odds on

Craps and free Bingo Tuesday, Thursday and Sunday are always offered at the casino.

Also to be featured during the grand opening will be free Champagne and a \$2.49 special gourmet dinner buffet with a beverage included.

"We want all of Henderson to come and celebrate with us. We've been so pleased with the community's reaction to us and their support, we're very happy to be a part of Henderson," Belding said.

Railroad Pass first opened in

August 1931, capitalizing on its location and offering Boulder Dam workers a relief from the Boulder City federal reservation, where gaming and alcohol were outlawed.

Its modern revival was spearheaded by Bob Verchota, who purchased it in 1975 and set the property on a modernization program.

Current partners Mike Ensign, Bill Richardson and Belding have continued improvements with an extensive remodeling and expansion.

The Henderson City Council may realign wards that determine areas where candidates for city council must live and may approve changes to the master plan for a massive residential development in their Tuesday night meeting tonight.

Ward realignment is a biennial concern of city clerk

Dorothy Vondenbrink, who must ensure that all four city wards are within five percent real population level of each other.

Under the current plan, all four city councilmen will live in their own wards. In 1985, then Councilman Lorna Kesterson was realigned outside of the ward from which she was elected. That same year she was elected mayor.

The council will also consider a change to the city's comprehensive plan and accompaning zone changes for more than 500 acres of land involved in America Nevada Corporation's River Run residential development. The land is located south of current Green Valley developments and the Union Pacific Railroad spur.

A direction for the city hall project may be given to city staff as action and discussion are planned on the city halllibrary issue.

Council may also approve a new master streets and highways priority list and a legislative package in conjunction with the Nevada League of Cities and Clark County.

A committee meeting is scheduled for 6:45 p.m. followed by the council's regular meeting at 7 p.m. in city hall chambers at 243 Water Street.

Recently, the Nevada Supreme Court correctly rebuffed the most blatant abuse of the meeting law by a northern county's Board of Supervisors.

Under the law, personnel sessions may be closed to the public, however, no action may be taken. This public body wanted both to blame and fire their city manager in secret. Their action was nullified when the Supreme Court said no decisions could be arrived at in closed meeting, that all votes must be made before

Negotiation is a sticky subject for any public official. Diplomats usually conduct their business in secret, the classic reason for such secrecy being the need to preserve honor and prestige in the face of getting something that neither side sought.

Congressmen, Senators and state representatives, for the most part, conduct their most sensitive horse trading in private, either in closed legislative sessions or over a lunch or dinner with lobbyists and concerned parties.

Closed legislative sessions are becoming a joke because of leakers, those brave minions of the government who seek to enlarge their

importance by making themselves desired by reporters.

The private meeting between a power broker and a benefit scalar is quickly becoming to method of operation when seeking favor or relief from governmental power.

This is tragic because the whole idea of "sunshine" or open meeting laws is to expose the entire decision-making of government to public scrutiny, not merely to require mandatory an-

nouncement of decisions negotiated and agreed upon in private. The law seeks, without onerous language or requirements, to bring the discusssion and negotiation that will lead to new rules, ordinances and laws into public view, so that the very reasons those decisions were made may be examined.

Private meetings among public officials and private parties continue the erosion of the spirit of open meeting laws.

If all negotiations and discussion concerning a proposed governmental action is conducted in private, how is the public to know of whether or not decisions are rightly based or mere efforts to exculpate public officials?

Given Nevada's open meeting law, how can officials negotiate and discuss privately? It's relatively simple.

The law requires a quorum to constitute any meeting, open or closed. By going in pairs, on some boards trios, county commissioners or city councilmen to not constitute a quorum.

Yet, does anyone doubt that public business is not being discussed, that sometimes solutions are being negotiated, only to be announced and ratified at some later public meeting?

We don't have to look far for an example. Recently, your city council, sans Councilman Charlotte Yakubik, paired and met with publicly-appointed pairs from the Henderson District Public Library Board of Trustees.

No doubt that privacy may have made it easier to diffuse this tense situation, but we don't know what else may have been discussed, negotiated or tacitly agreed upon. Worse yet, we will have to depend only on the accounts of these public officials of the meeting, not on an official record or independently reported facts and statements.

Nothing illegal was done, but should this practice gain popularity among public officials, we might as well declare the spirit of the Open Meeting Law dead and see it only as another redtape procedural hurdle that government must pass.

Knowing sentiments on these matters run high, I welcome response to today's diatribe, and hopefully it too can be "Another view."



Water, sewer improvement costs 1986 key issue

Improvements to the city's water and sewer lines and the method of paying for them were among the key issues in Henderson during the second three months of the year.

The city council voted April 15 not to increase property taxes to pay for improvements to the two systems.

The action was turned down due to a 1978 commitment to the public not to raise taxes for payment of a bond issue.

On May 13, after postponing the issue a week to consider their options, the Henderson City Council approved the placement of three bonds on the September ballot and two other bonds which would be supported by revenues.

The council was informed state law requires bond issues go before voters if the project cannot be funded by its own revenues. The three issues placed on the ballot involved street improvements, fire protection and Boulder Highway beautification.

The city council approved water and sewer bonds be issued and rates be increased to cover the costs. Citizens were permitted 30 days to protest.

The council could have placed the water and sewer issues on the ballot also, but they felt that would have resulted in costing

citizens more money. The council took final official action at their regular meeting

June 17 when they voted to increase water and sewer rates effective July 1. They also approved a special election be held the same time

as the Sept. 2 primary election regarding three other bond questions involving fire protection, street improvements and Boulder Highway beautification. In other action regarding taxes, during a regular recessed

meeting April 8 the city council passed a resolution to put a tax increase on the ballots for the Sept. 2 election.

If passed, the increase would raise sales taxes a quarter-cent for flood control throughout the county.

April

The second quarter of the year began with a memorial service for the wife and son of City Councilman Carlton Lawrence. Marijane Lawrence, 61, and Richard Alan Lawrence, 36, died within months of each other suffering from the same symp-

toms, esophagal bleeding. Richard died in December in Bellflower, Calif. and Marijane died March 30 in Las Vegas.

Some 150 members of the Great Peace March passed through the western outskirts of Henderson April 10 on their trek from California to Washington D.C. They stopped for lunch on Eastern Avenue north of Lake Mead Drive on their way to spend two days at Sunset Park.

Basic High School senior Lisa Finney, 17, was crowned the 34th annual Miss Industrial Days April 12. An audience of some 1,500 persons attended the pageant.

First runner-up was Leah Fust, 18, and second runner-up was Angela Drake, 15.

The Industrial Days Parade April 19 had more than 175 entries and was attended by some 25,000 people. The event was the longest and best-attended in its 35-year-history.

Lake Mead fishing guide Al Cieri, author of a weekly Home News sports column, died in surgery April 18. Cieri, 50, also wrote for such national outdoors magazines as Field and Stream.

A Boulder City man was killed April 28 when his head was run over by a grader at a Green Valley construction site.

Mark Adams, grading foreman for Central Grading Company was kneeling down checking the ground when the Caterpillar 14G backed over him.

Henderson artist and freelance model Craig Burgwardt was judged best overall professional male model at the International Model and Talent Competition in Miami April 22. Also during April, C.P. National gas company reduced its

charges by 6.41 percent, dropping the average monthly bill by \$2.20. In mid-April the City of Henderson received the nation's

highest award for finanical reporting for its comprehensive annual financial report. The certificate of achievement for excellence in financial repor-

ting came from the Government Finance Officers Association of the United States and Canada.

City Finance Director Steven Hanson was lauded at the April 15 council meeting, where he shared credit with his staff including Thom Powell.

Also in mid-April Stauffer Chemical Company's Henderson chlor-alkali manufacturing facility reached five years and two million manhours worked without an on-the-job accident resulting in lost work time.

In the middle of April a wagon train for juvenile offenders camped on Bureau of Land Management property near Old Vegas on Boulder Highway.

Vision Quest, with 12 covered wagons, scores of horses and mules and some 50 teenagers spent their weekly two days of rest on the property. They slept in teepees and studied in a school bus that accompanies them.

The children and their supervisors left Tucson, Ariz, in January and expected to return by November.

Basic High School senior Daniel P. Watkins was named among 1,800 students across the country to receive the National Merit Scholarship. The \$2,000 scholarships are allocated on a state representational basis, according to each state's percentage of the total U.S. high school senior class.

May

On May 1 the city of Henderson filed a protest and motion to intervene with the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission regarding a project proposed by the Colorado River Commission.

The document accused the CRC of using "the FERC to thwart the Lake at Las Vegas resort development and thereby promote other resort developments, particularly those on the Colorado River at Laughlin, Nevada.'

In early May, Janet Clark was appointed director of the Henderon District Public Library.

She served four years as the children's librarian and had been acting director since the beginning of the year.

On May 9 Henderson police joined state narcotics and federal Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms agents in serving a search warrant on a local couple.

Jeffery Fredrickson and Tina Marie Fredrickson, both 28, were arrested in their home for narcotics and firearm violations. Officers seized a substance believed to be cocaine, an illegal firearm and large amounts of cash and drug praphernalia.

A convicted burglar being transported from Texas to California escaped from a Boulder Highway gas station on May 13.


The Wolves dominated Mar Vista High Tuesday with a 73-31 victory. Greene scored 18, Brady 14, Robinson 12 in the easy win.

Brady and Greene were named to the all-tourney team of the 11th annual Classic.


Basic coach John Robinson said the free throws were the key to the win. "They got ahead of us in the first quarter, but they held their cool and played tough defense."





the transport vehicle. He was caught at Echo Bay May 16. On May 20 the Henderson City Council approved a bid which came some \$17,000 more than budgeted to build a police transmitter building.

Police informed council the revamping of the city's communications systems hinged on constructing that building.

The East Leg Freeway that will eventually connect Henderson to Las Vegas came another step closer with the May 23 opening of the section ending at Flamingo Road.

Also on May 23, a 32-year-old Gothic Landscaping employee was killed at a Green Valley construction site. He died while attempting to repair a hydraulics system under the bed of a dump truck.

On May 27 police arrested on three kidnapping counts a man in jail on an unrelated charge.

Carmine Michael Caruso, 28, was charged with one count of first degree kidnapping and two counts of attempted kidnapping stemming from three separate incidents May 17 and 24.

Caruso was suspected in the kidnapping of a four-year-old girl and the attempted kidnappings of a 15-year-old girl and a ten-year-old girl.

The preschooler was found five blocks from her home by her father and a neighbor who pursued the suspect's vehicle.

A man who had recently moved to Henderson from Montana was killed May 26 when his car was hit in the rear by a vehicle driven by a man from Oklahoma.

Donald Franklin Horacek, 35, was ejected as his car rolled over twice on Lake Mead Drive and Navajo Drive. Frank Wade Urban was cited for driver inattention.

The May 21 shooting death of a Henderson resident in Las Vegas was found to be justifiable homicide by a coroner's jury May 30:

The five-woman, two-man jury deliberated about 20 minutes before finding the the death of 34-year-old Pete Arthur Crespin by a Las Vegas Metropolitan Police officer was justifiable.

Crespin was shot by 28-year-old Martin Lehtinen after the officer was struck by Crespin's Toyota station wagon during an undercover drug investigation.

Beginning June 1 rates for Nevada Power Company were

At their June 3 meeting the city council approved salary increases for those to be voted into office at the next election.

Henderson resident Rodney L. Fleming, 20, was killed by a drunk driver while riding a bicycle on Boulder Highway June 15. Everett J. White, 37, of Las Vegas was charged with felony driving while intoxicated.

Also during June, Basic High School senior Lawrence P. Gelbaugh was honored by the city of Henderson for being named as a U.S. Presidential Scholar.

Gelbaugh was one of 141 outstanding youths to receive the commendation from the White House and its Commission on Presidential Scholars.

Nevada School of Law maintains excellent pass rate

Old College, the Nevada School of Law, maintained its excellent pass rate for the Nevada State Bar Exam according to the 1986 figures released this week.

Thirty-three Nevada School of Law graduates took the exam last July and 24 passed, a success rate of 73 percent. That figure is up six percent from the 1985 rate of 67 percent for Nevada School of Law graduates.

The statewide pass rate for all those taking the exam was roughly 78 percent so, although the actual number of test takers and the schools they represent is not available at this time, The Nevada School of Law compares favorably with fully accredited schools in terms of the pass rate for the

Nevada Bar.

Sam Lionel of the law firm of Lionel, Sawyer and Collins, is the chairman of the Board of the Nevada State Bar Examiners, and he says he's "very pleased" with the Old College results.

That sentiment was echoed by Dean of Law, Felix Stumpf. With the Nevada School of Law applying for full accreditation from the American Bar Association late this Fall, Stumpf feels the numbers from the test reinforce an important point.

"The highly successful pass rate, both this year and last, underscores what we have been saying all along; that students at Old College, the Nevada School of Law are receiving a quality legal education. We've proven for the past two years that we can more than hold our own with the fully accredited schools and we're clearly demonstrating the need for an accredited law school in the State of Nevada."

Old College president Dr. Allan De Giulio is leading the school's drive to accreditation, and he, like Stumpf, feels the pass rate for graduates can only strengthen the school's position with regard to accreditation.

"Our success rate for two successive tests is a testament, certainly, to the high standards set by our professors. But, more importantly, it is a tribute to the students themselves. Their hard work and dedication is certainly manifest in the consistently high test scores they have achieved and they are to be congratulated.
