## on negotiations with fired architect


Attorney William Terry, who represents architect Dennis Rusk, said Monday he had been contacted by deputy district attorney James Taylor in response to a Dec. 2 letter asking the library board to reconsider their Nov. 19 letter terminating Rusk's services. Terry and Rusk met with

Taylor and library director Janet Clark on Friday. Taylor related Monday that

nothing was formally decided and he will brief the board Thursday. He added negotiations are continuing.

Clark confirmed the meeting was held but referred questions to Taylor. Board chariman Rosa Herwick indicated awareness that the attorney

# Planners OK huge residential project

by Scott Dickensheets Home News Staff Writer Local developer Rich Mac-Donald saw the Henderson Planning Commission approve revisions to the master plan of his ambitious MacDonald Ranch project Thursday night. MacDonald Ranch is a proposed 3,210 acre residential development MacDonald is seeking to build south of Lake Mead Drive.

The original master plan was approved by the commission and the Henderson City Council in April last year. The revisions before the planners Thursday night called for a reduced population density, an extra nine-hole golf course (making a total of 27 holes of golf within the project), expanded commercial space, and increased open space.

Although the plan calls for 102 acres of "natural preservation parks," which will be oriented toward hiking and picnicing, the planners tacked on a provision that MacDonald dedicate approximately 25 acres for a community park within the development.

Other conditions of the master plan approval include a hydrological study and a utilities analysis and dedication of a two-acre combination police-fire facility site. The commission also approved a move to designate the Ranch as an area of special master plan and the realignment of portions of Horizon Drive and Green Valley Parkway.

#### Cosada

The planners also approved a previously-tabled item concerning Cosada Green Valley, a 15-acre development within a 51-acre project.

The item was tabled at the commission's Dec. 18 meeting when the planning department staff raised several concerns with the proposal. Among the concerns was the lack of a public access to the 90-lot site, which is located in the interior of the otherwise undeveloped 51 acres. The developers wished to have a private road access.

That was ironed out, as was a question concerning a proposed lake on the property. Conceived primarily as an amenity, the one-acre lake came into conflict with a Henderson Public Works Department policy that potable water may not be used for lakes of this sort.

The renovation included a brand new bathhouse, a wading pool, a diving tank, and a recreational swimming pool with lap lanes.

**Developers from Indiana on** July 15 proposed a six-to-eight story hotel on the civic center site. Although the proposal by Pannos Development Corporation never came to fruition, the action prompted city officials to begin soliciting a hotel for the site.

Human bones were found in the desert south of Railroad Pass July 17 by a Boulder City man who was surveying land along the road to Searchlight. The Coroner's office said the bones of a man between 30 and 40 years old had been in the desert between eight weeks to eight months.

Cause of death of the unidentified man was determined to be from a blunt trauma to his head and a puncture of his back.

On July 22 Governor Richard Bryan presented a number of safety awards to employees at Titanium Metals. Timet had completed 750,000 manhours without a lost-time accident and was aiming for one million.

Some of the 40 employees of Pacific Engineering and Production Company of Nevada (PEPCON) laid off after the space shuttle Challenger exploded were rehired beginning in July. PEPCON produces ammonium perchlorate, a component used in shuttle fuel.

The Economic Development Commission denied the Henderson Chamber of Commerce state economic development funds. Commission staff recommended funding be given to regional development agencies such as the Nevada Development Authority.

The East Leg Freeway was opened to Tropicana on Aug.29.

Also during August C.P. National gas company applied to lower its rates 5.62 percent. The average monthly bill would be reduced \$1.61.

In mid-August Titanium Metals Corp. announced they settled a lawsuit filed by the Environmental Protection Agency over alleged violations of the plant's discharge permit.

#### September

Henderson voters passed two of three local bond issues Sept. 2. They also approved a sales tax increase to finance flood control in the county, but turned down the Boulder Highway Beautification project by 99 votes.

At their meeting Sept. 3, the city council approved \$50,000 for the city to conduct a population study. A difference of some 6,000 citizens in state and federal figures has cost the city revenue, staff revealed.



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
## **Republican women** to install officers



# **Basket at buzzer beats Basic**

The quarter ended with Rancho ahead 46-42.

For the Rams, Brown finished with 18 points, and Westley Gardner had 14. **Guards Brandon and Carlton** Johnson were held to two apiece.


Brady and Robinson both had 15 to lead the Wolves: Greene had nine.

NO-LOOK PASS-Scott Robinson, who scored 15, passe off in the second half Friday against the Rams.


# Ram defense jumps on Lady Wolves early

The 6-5 Wolves, 0-2 in league play, face Las Vegas tonight at 6 in the Basic gym.




SHUT OUT-Vance Kennedy defeated Dennis Ross 15-0 to give the Wolves a 24-3 ead against Western.
