Blunt trauma killed baby born in desert

by Katherine E. Scott Iome News Staff Writer A baby who died shortly after being born early Saturday in the desert south of Henderson suffered blunt trauma probably not associated with the childbirth, according to the Clark County Coroner's office.

Las Vegas Metropolitan moth Police were treating the death boyf

as suspicious since the unnamed baby boy was pronounced dead about 5 a.m. at a Henderson hospital.

Metro homicide sergeant Ted Rosen mentioned pending criminal charges are being determined by the Clark County District Attorney's office. He commonted the baby

south of the National Guard Armory when she felt ill about 1 a.m. Saturday.

He said Beth Davis, 35, went outside the tent and with aid from her boyfriend Bernard Walton gave birth to a baby boy. The homicide sergeant noted there were complications and

baby showed no signs of life when Henderson authorities arrived.

The EMTs transported Davis and the baby to St. Rose de Lima Hospital. Rosen mentioned Davis was hemorrhaging due to the birth. He said the baby was dead on arrival.

Rosen commented Davis said the death was an accident.



Buyers active Vegas Old

by Scott Dickensheets Home News Staff Writer A Henderson businessman's deal to purchase the defunct and bankrupt Old Vegas theme park has apparently disintegrated, and a Las Vegas development firm is now negotiating to buy it.

Don French, an official of the Houston-based Westworld company, current owners of Old Vegas, said Thursday that their contract with Henderson businessman Maurice Threinen has been terminated. Instead, Westworld is working with MarCor Development, a Las Vegas company.

French said he has been negotiating with MarCor for about 45 days, and Threinen's contract was defaulted prior to that.

"Everything is off (with Threinen)," he said. "They did not perform to the terms of the contract and the contract expired." He declined to elaborate the point.

Of the deal with MarCor, French would only say, "Earnest money has been deposited," but he would not elaborate, nor disclose the pur-


Students investigate court procedures

by Katherine E. Scott Home News Staff Writer The judge's solemn face reflected the task before her as she entered the courtroom draped in the black robe of her position. Without moving an unneccessary muscle she slipped onto the bench, soberly facing the principals in the case.

By the end of the May 21 hearing in Henderson Justice Court, Judge Nancy Kapcia had to do more than just determine who should have custody of David Perkins.

She had to successfully execute a project on which she had worked long and hard, and she had to do it within 40 minutes.

Nancy Kapcia is a 13-yearold eighth-grade student at Brown Junior High School. The mock hearing in the Henderson courtroom was her project, all the way from researching how to do it to formally instructing the Academically Talented class.

"It's her baby," AT teacher Lucille Owen remarked before the hearing began in the courtroom of Henderson Justice Court Judge R. Larry Tabony. She continued, "I'm just along to make it legal."

Owen explained, "Nancy is the one who's worked with Judge Tabony and instructed three weeks' worth of classes."

Tabony gleefully sabotaged Kapcia's composure during the hearing, through subtle and overt instructions to Perkins, whose custody was being fought over by his "mother" and his "uncle."

The genuine judge's scheme ultimately accomplished its goal: Several times Kapcia could not suppress a grin or a giggle, and her ultimate decision was obviously influenced by Tabony's meddling.

Dallas Wisehaupt, Perkins' probation officer, was the first witness in the mock hearing

Feds nix Henderson for visual arts grant

by Scott Dickensheets Home News Staff Writer Henderson was not among the cities chosen to continue pursuit of a federal visual arts grant, but city officials were encouraged to firm up their application and try again, according to Henderson economic development director Ann Barron

While in Washington D.C. in March, city officials learned of an opportunity to obtain federal funding for a visual arts master plan. The deadline for letters of intent had passed, but they were allowed to stitch one together and submit it anyway. The National Endowment for the Arts would evaluate the letters and then invite full applications.

Though city leaders were optimistic, Henderson was not among those cities invited to apply further.

According to Barron, the reply from the National Endowment for the Arts encouraged them to submit another letter for the next round of grants, tentatively set for October.

They strongly suggested the city set up a visual arts citizens advisory group, as well as finetune their application. The Nevada State Council on the Arts has entered the picture, offering to assist the city in organizing the advisory

held after school let out for the day.

Prosecuting attorney Richard Leavitt, representing Perkins' uncle, shuffled through some legal-sized papers and questioned Wisehaupt hesitantly.

His opposing counsel Aaron Peeples spoke in rapid-fire recitation, and his composure was calmer than Leavitt's pacing as he questioned witnesses.

Perkins frequently interrupted Wisehaupt's testimony, throwing paper airplanes, loudly crumpling notebook paper and tossing it across the courtroom at the pseudo-judge.

(Perhaps his actions had nothing to do with Tabony, who was sitting in the jury box grinning broadly at him while repeatedly pantomiming a toss toward Kapcia.)

Wisehaupt told the court he was incapable of helping the delinquent child. He commented Perkins told him his mother beat him with a belt, adding, "I saw the scars."

Peeples, the defense attorney, responded: "Have you ever seen his mother beat him?"

After studying Judge Tabony's technique with Wisehaupt, bailiff Cliff Meier took over the duty of swearing in the witnesses.

Perkins testified next, claiming his mother drinks alcohol "twice an hour" and beats him "all the time."

Answering "yes and no" questions he told the court he did not want to go to reform school, that he gets along with his uncle and would like to live with the man.

Responding to questions by his mother's attorney, Perkins admitted he didn't like having to live in Texas, where is uncle resides. Before stepping down from the stand (and possibly instigated by his private, pre-trial conference with Judge Tabony), Perkins told Judge Kapcia: "I don't like my mom, I don't like my dad, and I don't like you either!" Kapcia, who had ignored Perkins' previous behavior, warned him another such remark would find him in contempt of court. Next on the stand came Perkins' uncle, Ben Williams. As an obstetrician, Williams said he earns \$215,000 a year. Well-groomed and wearing a dark suit, he said he had never raised a child, but intended to put Perkins in a military school. Perkins continued his disruptive behavior, throwing things at the judge, making faces at her while standing on a chair. (Which may have been

unrelated to Tabony's whispering: "Keep misbehaving. Walk around the courtroom. Just ignore her.")

That proved to tax Kapcia's patience. "Bailiff," she instructed, "would you please remove him from the courtroom?"

A struggle ensued as Meier tried to do so. They dodged and scuffled in front of the bench until Meier lifted Perkins by one thigh. Perkins hung onto the larger boy's leg at a slightlyupside-down angle, his own free leg dangling.

While Perkins remained frozen in that position, Meier limped out of the courtroom.

A giggle escaped Kapcia and she announced: "You may proceed."

Neatly attired in a kneelength dress, Perkins' mother Tanya Brown snapped her answers as she testified. She said she has a \$10,000 annual income and \$13,000 in savings. Brown claimed her son is uncontrollable, and has run away three times in four years. He is now on probation for shoplifting.

When Williams asked if Perkins could be uncontrollable because of his environment, Brown retorted: "I don't hit him."

She asked that Perkins be put in a reform school.

Neighbor and former babysitter Joe Groft testified Perkins "would not go to bed on time," and would often sneak out and come back smelling of beer.

He felt that "not all" of Perkins' problems were caused by his mother.

Throughout the testimony Perkins would reenter the courtroom, only to have Meier forceably remove him.

And when you read all those amazing plans and ideas emanating from city hall, remember Henderson is a Gemini, living in a world of ideas that often never come to fruition.






Hawkins speaks to McCaw students


pionship bracket waiting for the winner between the Pink Panthers and the Dodgers. The championship game will be played on Wednesday, June 10 at 4:30 p.m.
