

# **Tortoises discovered** in developer's tract

By Ben Baker News Staff Writer The desert tortoises have made an appearance in a Henderson development. Chism Homes, ahousing tract developer, recently purchased some undeveloped land from the city. During inspection of the property, desert tortoises were discovered.

According to recently passed statutes concerning the animal, Chism Homes will have to obtain permits to remove the reptiles before construction can begin.

To do that, the developer has requested a contingency period of two years plus 60 days. The original period was 60 days. During that period of time, Chism Homes can back out of the deal and receive a refund, plus any accrued interest, of its deposit.

The Henderson City Council is expected to approve the measure during the regular meeting at 7 p.m. tonight at City Hall.

Developer Harry Christian will seek approval for a 11,507 squarefoot shopping center planned for the northwest comer of the Boulder Highway and Wells Street intersection.

According to information obtained from City Hall, Christian plans to build retail stores, offices and a health club at the site.

Central Security, a home alarm installation business owned by Joseph M. Corbin, is expected to n. The tirm, located 1729 W. Bonanza, Las Vegas, does not have a vaild Las Vegas business license, according to information obtained from City Hall.

Also, Corbin has not posted a \$10,000 surety bond as required by Henderson statutes, according to City Hall.

The council is expected to ratify an administrative suspension which could become a revocation pending a license revocation hearing.

Developer Jack Riley will present an architectural review to the council for a supper club on Boulder Highway near Magic Way.

An architectural review for a concrete batch plant near West Sunset Road and Eastgate Road is expected to be denied. The issue was presented to the Planning Commission which recommended denial.

City Hall staff recommended approval of the measure, pending 11 conditions, including some sort of dust mitigation plan.

# **Tiara single-family plan** to be considered Thursday

One example of many Green Valley residents' vigorous opposition to increased zoning density could reach a successful conclusion Thursday at the Henderson Planning Commis-

A California developer's proposal to build 138 condominium units south of Windmill Parkway east of the Eastern Avenue intersection met stiff resistence from area residents and was rejected by the planners in November. Now the applicant is seeking to build 61 single-family homes on the 10-acre property.

A public hearing on a zone change request from UR (urban reserve) to RS-6 (single family residential, with no more than six units an acre) is scheduled to be conducted.

Area residents previously

expressed concerns about increased traffic and crowding in schools" to fight the condominium project, which would have had a density of nearly 14 units an acre.

The planners will also consider a comprehensive plan amendment for the master planned community of MacDonald Ranch, south of Lake Mead Drive between Gibson Road and Pecos Road.

The planned unit residential developments of Green Valley-Pecos, 254 lots on 60 acres on the northwest corner of Robindale Road and Pecos Road, and Verde Viejo, 272. condominiums on 20 acres south of Warm Springs Road between Arroyo Grande Boulevard and Stephanie Street, will be considered.

A use permit and an architectural review for the proposed Highland Hills Baptist Church southeast of Horizon Drive and College Drive are also on the planners' agenda.

Architectural reviews of a 7,100 square-foot supper club at 333 W. Sunset in the Pittman neighborhood, and a 264-unit apartment complex at 400 N. Major Avenue in the Valley View neighborhood will also be considered.

Outlook bright for Southern Nevada in 1990s

To use a term from the world of gambling, Nevada is on a roll.

A recent study by State Policy Research Inc. of Alexandria, Va., rated Nevada's economic momentum index, as of October 198 9, at 4.8, alm two-and-a-half times that of the next closest state, Florida, which tallied in at a mere 1.9. The index compared the growth of each state to national

best economic performance in the nation with everything going for it - a growing population, sharp gains in jobs and rapidly rising personal income." Employment in the Silver State was up 7.06 percent in July 1989 as compared with July 1988. Similarly, the same report states that personal income for the first quarter of 1989 in Nevada was up a whopping 15 percent over the same period a year before.



more evident than in Las Vegas and its surrounding suburban communities - especially Henderson.

The area is currently undergoing an incredible construction boom, both in residential, commercial and investment properties, a boom that by comparison dwarfs the frenzied development experienced during gold and silver rush days of the 1850s and 1860s or even the sporadic, haphazard expansions of the 1930s and 1940s.

Employment in the Las Vegas area for the third quarter 1989, according to the National Real Estate Index, was even higher than the state rate -7.1 percent - and three times the 2.7 percent rate nationwide. More than 22,000 new jobs were created in the 12-month period ending in September 1989, the index stated.

Despite the strong local economy, the index indicated that "metropolitan Las Vegas office sector will likely soften in 1990" and cited an average price for Class A office space at \$127.14 per square foot and an average effective gross rent after concessions was \$17.50 per square foot.

As for warehousing, the Nevada Development Authority reported in late December 1989 that Southern Nevada is "one of the cheapest and bestsituated sites in the country for storing and distributing goods to California and the West." The NDA said that a recent study by a Princeton, N.J.,based consulting firm "concluded that the incorporated cities and adjacent rural areas of Las Vegas, North Las Vegas, Henderson, Boulder City and Mesquite offered not only the lowest annual operating costs of the surveyed sitce, but also

The retail sector in Las Vegas, according to the index, "lacks large shopping centers with 'name' tenants and construction has been modest relative to other real estate sectors." Locally, many developers tend to disagree and point out the numerous projects in the planning stage or already under construction, some of which are discussed below. Average price for Class A, neighborhood/small community centers in metropolitan Las Vegas is just over \$100 per square foot, and the average effective gross rent, including both anchor and satellite tenant space, was \$11.80 per square foot.

The index also noted that Las Vegas in recent years has been the nation's most active apartment market, on a per capita basis. In recent quarters, an average of 3,000 to 4,000 multifamily units have been completed with only a modest vacancy in most locations, it stated. The average price for Class A garden-style apartments in the third quarter was \$45.36 per square foot and the average effective gross rent was \$7.80 per square foot, the index said.

Figures released in late December 1989 by Centel, the Las Vegas telephone company, substantiate those figures. The company reported that it had installed a record 4,249 telephone lines during November, of which 2,917 were for residential service, topping a previous high of 3,949 set just the month before. As of Dec. 1, Centel spokespersons said, there were 412,149 telephones in the greater Las Vegas area, of which 296,355 were, residential.

### Suit filed against energy secretary

CARSON CITY-Attorney General Brian McKay filed a lawsuit last week against Energy Secretary James D. Watkins, charging Watkins with violations of the Nuclear Waste Policy Act by continuing to target Yucca Mountain as the site of a high-level nuclear waste repository.

The suit, filed in the 9th Circuit Court of Apeals in San Francisco, seeks a declaration by the court that Assembly Joint Resolution 4 and Assembly Joint Resolution 6, adopted by the 1989 Nevada Legislature and signed by Gov. Bob Miller, constitute a notice of disapproval of the Yucca Mountain site. Furthermore, it seeks to enjoin the Department of Energy from conducting any further studies of the site.

"Despite our notice to Congress that Nevada has disap-

proved the Yucca Mountain site and Congress' silent acceptance of that fact, Secretary Watkins continues to pursue the project," McKay said. "By doing so, the DOE is in clear violation of the law as dictated by the Nuclear Waste Policy

Act." Section 116(b) of the Act authorizes the state of Nevada to submit a notice of disapproval of the site to Congress. Under the law, Congress then has 90 days to override the disapproval notice. McKay in November issued an opinion saying that because Congress failed to respond to the notice conveyed with the adoption of AJR 4 and AJR 6, the designation of the Yucca Mountain site was disapproved as a matter of

One is Car Country, which is being built as the largest consortium of automobile dealers in the world, and is expected to include as many as 20 dealer showrooms, automobile accessory retail shops, a demonstration course and a casino hotel. With a price tag of \$100 million, it, too, will feature an amusement park, with restaurants, movie theaters, a 72-lane bowling alley and other entertainment facilities, primarily for families.

The other is Lake Las Vegas, the nearby multimillion-dollar resort community presently under construction. It will feature up to nine hotels and casinos, as many as half a dozen world-class golf courses and other recreation areas, all surrounding a gigantic man-made lake. The tourist commercial area of Lake Las Vegas will consist of 345 acres in seven parcels which will include, in addition to the hotels and casinos, cultural institutions, helicopter landing pads, dining and retail sales and service. The neighborhood shopping area of Lake Las Vegas, 62 acres in all, will provide commercial retail and service space with parking and supporting office facilities. Some 360 acres are planned for residential townhouses and single-family homes, as well as about 60 percent of the total 2,245-acre land space set aside for limited use and lake space.

Using the experience gained by other cities that suffered from too rapid expansion, local government officials take great pains to address the phenomenal growth in a sensible and cautious manner, insisting that developers also consider including schools, parks and public safety facilities in their plans.

During the 1980s, no other state grew at a faster rate than Nevada - and nowhere in Nevada did it grow faster than in Clark County, of which Henderson is the state's major industrial area. During the 1980s, the state's population burgeoned by 50 percent, mostly in Clark County, especially Henderson, which periodically has seen its population underestimated, thereby depriving the community of muchneeded revenue.

Ask any of the more than half a million people who reside in Southern Nevada and they will, almost to a man, say that this is a great place to live and work. And, as more and more people are finding out, it's an even greater place in which to invest.

# Henderson began 1989 with baby born to comatose father

The first child born in Henderson in 1989 was Paul Eugene Watts Jr. He was born at 12:31 a.m. Jan. 1, and weighed five pounds, 15 ounces. His mother lived in Boulder City; his father was in University Medical Center where he had been in a coma since an Oct. 25 motorcycle accident.

Henderson police ushered in the new year investigating an hour-old shooting in which a 16-year-old youth was shot in the arm during a shoot-out of Palo Verde Street.

Two semi-automatic pistols. one .25 caliber and the other .45 caliber, were used to fire into and from an apartment in the 800 block of the street. police said. Matthew Patrick Dawson, 20, was charged with battery with a deadly weapon.

A Carson City District Court on Jan. 5 ordered a new hearing to appeal the Nevada Department of Taxation's 1988 population estimates during Henderson's continuing battle to have the numbers reflect the community's growth. The numbers showed Henderson's population at 52,373, down nearly 2,000 residents from 54,590 certified for 1987.

Zollie Edward Dumas was sentenced to two life terms without possibility of parole for the murder of his live-in girlfriend following a jury trial in Clark County District Court Jan. 9 through 11. Dumas admitted killing Angela Denise Griffin on June 27, 1988, but said he did so in a jealous rage. Griffin was stabbed 24 times. - Basic High School took second place in the Kingman (Ariz.) 

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
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

## Wolves top Castle Park Centro's Smith ends Basic championship hopes in San Diego By Pat McDonnell

News Sports Editor SAN DIEGO-James Smith of El Centro (Calif.) High scored 29 points Thursday night to lead his team to a 65-55 victory over Basic High in the semifinals of the Rohr Aztec Christmas Classic.

Basic built a 19-16 advantage over Castle Park after a quarter and led 32-30 at halftime. The Wolves survived a cold shooting performance in the first two quarters, netting only 30 percent of their shots.

But the Wolves pulled away in the third quarter, outscoring Castle Park by a 12-4 margin. Williams said a new defensive look keyed the Basic run.

"We played tough that quarter. We went into a zone and Gibbs got a couple of steals," he said. "That helped."

A third suspect in a case involving the illegal killing of three, trophy-size Nevada mule deer has been arrested on several charges, including three gross misdemeanors that could result in fines of up to \$6.000 and three years in jail.

Kevin B. Frame, 31, of Salt Lake City, Utah, faces charges along with two other individuals who were arrested in early November. All three face a variety of charges steming from an intensive undercover

investigation in northeast Nevada.

Nevada Game Warden Gerry Smith said, "Randy P. Solmonsen, 31, of Yorba Linda, Calif., and Ronald B. Smith, 34, of Salt Lake, were arrested Nov. 7 in possession of a 32-inch, spread-six of six-point, mule deer head and cape, minus the body.

Smith faces a total of five gross misdemeanor and two misdemeanor charges. Frame faces three gross misdemeanor eight new teams will be added in Green Valley in 1990.
