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Police investigate separate armed robberies

Henderson police are investigating two separate armed robberies that occurred in different areas of town over the weekend.

Police are seeking a light-skinned black man for an early Friday robbery at Burger King, 4325 E. Sunset Road. Employees were robbed at gunpoint of an undisclosed amount of money about 12:15 a.m., police said.

The suspect was described as 5-feet, 7 inches tall, weighing about 130 pounds. He was wearing a black ski mask, black sweatshirt, black sweatpants and black tennis shoes.

"Henderson police and canine units responded to the scene and did an extensive search of the area for the suspect," an HPD press release stated. No suspect was located.

Police also are seeking two suspects involved in an early Monday robbery at Dale's Chevron gasoline station, 100 N. Boulder Highway.

An attendant was robbed about 1 a.m. of an undisclosed amount of cash by two armed men, police said.

Both suspects were in their mid-20s and wore stockings over their heads, police said.

The first suspect carried a handgun, police said. He was described as a black man, 5

feet, 11 inches tall and weighing about 200 pounds.

The other suspect carried a knife, police said. He was described as a white man, 5 feet 7 inches tall and weighing about 180 pounds.

"After committing the robbery," a press release stated, "They then locked the attendant in a storeroom and fled the station in an unknown direction."

The victim was subsequently released by a patron, police said.

Girl's death prompts formation of SADD unit; traffic panel mulls pedestrian-controlled light

In the wake of Faith Craig's death on Boulder Highway this

The Traffic Advisory Board continued discussion about the crossing to its May meeting, when it expects to have financial figures for costs to install a signal, possibly where a crosswalk currently exists.

City Traffic Engineer Ken Wiersma said during the board's meeting Thursday that crosswalks without signals "are, in fact, a traffic hazard."

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Kendall Williams promoted from assistant

Basic High names new head basketball coach

Kendall Williams, Basic High's assistant varsity boys basketball coach last season, was selected as the school's new head basketball coach Monday.

In an announcement made by Assistant Principal Pam Hawkins, the 31-year-old Williams was chosen from a field of 15 candidates. The former defensive back for the Arizona State University Sun Devils and the National Football League's Dallas Cowboys and Indianapolis Colts is a special education teacher at Basic.

Williams joined the Wolves' coaching staff last fall. He coaches varsity football and track and worked under former Basic head basketball coach John Williams during the 1989-90 season.

"He knows the program," Hawkins said. "We were looking for someone who was going to make a long-term commitment."

Kendall Williams fills an opening created March 9 when John Williams was dismissed after six years with the Wolves.

Williams, who received his bachelor's degree in special education from Arizona State, has coached a variety of youth sports in California, Arizona and Nevada since 1978.

"I have been coaching kids since I was a kid [myself]," he said.

The Long Beach, Calif., native said he realizes he will have to work hard to turn the Wolves' basketball fortunes

Residential construction tax to build parks recommended

A one-percent residential construction tax to help fund new parks was recommended by the Henderson Planning Commission on Thursday.

Tax money collected from developers will be used to acquire land and to construct parks, and to build capital improvements to existing parks.

"Although this act alone will not guarantee sufficient park funds, it will provide a substantial reservoir to use for additional matching funding from other sources," according to a staff report.

Adopted by the Henderson City Council in July 1982 but rescinded in August 1983, the tax was one of the recommendations of the Parks and Recreation Plan recently ap-

proved by the council.

The proposed tax is one percent of the value of the residential construction established for the building permit, or \$1,000 per dwelling unit, whichever is less. The value of apartments and residential dwelling units is \$32 per square foot for the purpose of calculating the tax. The ordinance is similar to those in effect in Las Vegas and North Las Vegas.

The city will be divided into five park districts, and funds must be spent within the same park district as the money is collected. The ordinance allows a refund if a park is not developed within three years after 75 percent of the dwelling units of the taxed development are occupied.

The ordinance also contains

refund provisions if the developer constructs a private or public park. A developer may also receive partial credit toward the residential construction tax for a park dedicated to the city. A subdivision developer may also be exempted from the tax if he posts a bond for the value of park improvements in an amount established by the City Engineer.

Terry Murphy, representing the Southern Nevada Homebuilders Association, expressed support for the tax and called it "very comprehensive and fair."

The ordinance will be forwarded to the City Council for a committee hearing.

In other business, the planners approved:

• An architectural review of the Island Park Apartments, 96 units on the southeast corner of Bluegrass Lane and Eastern Avenue in Green Valley.

• An architectural review of a 42,400 square-foot warehouse addition to the Berry Plastics plant. The addition will be located south of the existing plant and will be a one-story structure about 26 feet high.

• Willowbend Homes, a planned unit residential development of 82 townhomes on eight acres southwest of Windmill Parkway and Arroyo Grande Boulevard.

• A zoning ordinance amendment which adds the definition of a controlled access arterial street, and increases the width of primary arterials as they intersect.

• A zoning ordinance amendment which corrects an oversight in the city's new development code by specifying the minimum size of living area as 1,200 square feet in homes in the RR (rural residential) and RS-2 (single-family residential, with no more than two dwelling units an acre) districts.

The ordinance also increases from 15 to 20 feet the minimum front-yard setback on one- to four-family dwellings in all RM (multi-family residential) districts. The 20-foot front setback requirement encourages more open space for higher density projects as well as providing more light and air circulation throughout the buildings," a staff report said. "This also contributes to better fire safety."

Cattle Baron set to open in fall

The much-delayed opening of the Cattle Baron Casino and Restaurant may soon be over, said Noreen F. Depino, director of marketing and advertising for Walter Development Corp., last week.

The company is expected to close escrow on May 9, 1990 and immediately begin to upgrade the interior and exterior of the property, Depino added.

Once the upgrades are

completed, the Casino is expected to open in the fall, complete with country-western entertainment, a race and sports book, a 300-seat bingo palace, a keno lounge and three restaurants.

Walter Development Corp., will be the new owner, which will employ more than 450 employees. Walter Corp. headquarters are located in Beverly Hills, Calif., and own such properties as the Palm Springs Hilton, among others, company officials noted.

what, in my opinion, is pure, unadulterated trash being offered daily to young, impressionable minds.

The best — and quite possibly, the quickest — method to turn what is on television around is to switch to another station. If other stations are just as bad, turn off the set.

The next alternative is to protest — in writing — to the stations that air objectionable programs. That should be followed by a letter-writing campaign to the sponsors of such programs, advising them that their products will not be bought by the letter writers or their families until such time as they review their policy on financial support for those programs.

A good place to start might be with "The Simpsons," an enormously successful weekly cartoon sitcom that very subtly advocates disrespect for parental authority — and any other kind of authority as well. For years, we have seen mothers and fathers portrayed on television as little more than nimble-witted providers, suitable only as objects of ridicule by their offspring.

And what about the spate of R-rated movies that are suddenly appearing on the commercial channels? Apparently someone wants to watch such films.

Ultimately, it is the responsibility of the parent to determine how much television and what programs their children should watch.

Unfortunately, all too many parents use television as an unpaid baby sitter and really care less about what their children are exposed to. That is a dreadful shame!

What ever happened to good taste? And, in the same vein, what ever happened to conscientious, concerned and responsible parenthood?

He said, "Basically, crosswalks where you do not have protection [such as a signal light] provide a false sense of security."

Ken Mills, father of a 13-year-old girl who was with Faith Craig when she was struck and killed by a man later arrested for driving under the influence of alcohol, told the board he had at first insisted his daughter walk some two blocks to use the crosswalk at Barrett Street.

However, he said he could see that traffic ignored the flashing yellow lights and said his daughter and her friends "had trouble with that crosswalk several times."

His daughter, Kim Sulic, said she was coming home with Craig on April 10 to see if the other girl could spend the night during spring break. She said she didn't realize the red pickup truck was speeding, and thought there was time to make it across.

Still, she said, she crossed behind the truck and then turned around to realize that her friend had crossed in front and been carried down the road after impact.

Police said Craig, also 13, died on impact. An officer at the board meeting said 41-year-old Steven Barley, who was arrested in the death, had a blood alcohol level of 2.0. The legal limit in Nevada is 1.0.

Mills asked the traffic board to recommend an overpass be installed for Pittman neighborhood residents to cross Boulder Highway.

"I'd feel much safer with an overpass," said Kendra Thomas, another schoolmate of Craig's.

Sulic added, "We've had a lot of close calls while crossing."

Her mother, Carole Mills, added that with no traffic signals between Sunset Road and Lake Mead Drive, cars pick up speed rather than slow down while passing through the Pittman neighborhood.

"As a general rule," Wiersma told the board, "you don't want to have pedestrian/vehicle traffic mixed on the same surface." He felt a structure such as an overpass or underpass would be safer, but felt the cost could be prohibitive.

lived outside the boundaries. As of presstime Monday, Vondenbrink said there were four qualified candidates who had expressed written interest. Kesterson said her office had received two more that had not yet been forwarded to the City Clerk's office.

The qualified applicants include: Lavell "Chat" Chatterton, Richard Perkins, Larry Scheffler, C. Wayne Schlegel, Danny Kay Shaw and John Alvin Stuart.

Kesterson said she and each councilman, except Lawrence, will submit their top three

choices to the City Clerk's office for tabulation of the final three candidates.

She said the City Council will then hold a special meeting at 5 p.m. Monday to meet with the final choices. The Council may vote to close the public meeting during a portion of the meeting, she said.

Lawrence's successor should be selected during the April 30 meeting, Kesterson said. She added the new city councilman is expected to be installed during the May 15 City Council meeting.

City Councilman Andy Hafen questioned whether the flashing yellow lights at the Barrett Street crosswalk could be changed to a pedestrian-controlled traffic signal.

Wiersma said he would bring back to the next meeting the figures for converting those lights. In addition, he would investigate actual costs for an overpass and for installing a pedestrian-controlled signal by itself.

He said the city would also try to gather a count of pedestrians who cross on Boulder Highway and would look at a petition which Mills said was being signed by area residents.

Mills said after the meeting that the petition would be available for signatures at Ye Ole' Fishing Hole on Boulder Highway. He said convenience stores and casinos in the Pittman area also may have petitions for residents to sign.

Sulic said the accident "opened our eyes. It changed my [realization] about drunk driving completely."

Thomas said 345 students

had signed a petition expressing interest in joining the SADD chapter. They will appear before the student council to formally request the chapter be started.

Sulic displayed a SADD button her mother had given her. "I got [it] back," she said. Her father added, "It's been passing [around] among the kids."

The girls said that the school's student council obtained a tree which was to be planted on school grounds in memory of Faith Craig. A ceremony was planned after presstime Monday.

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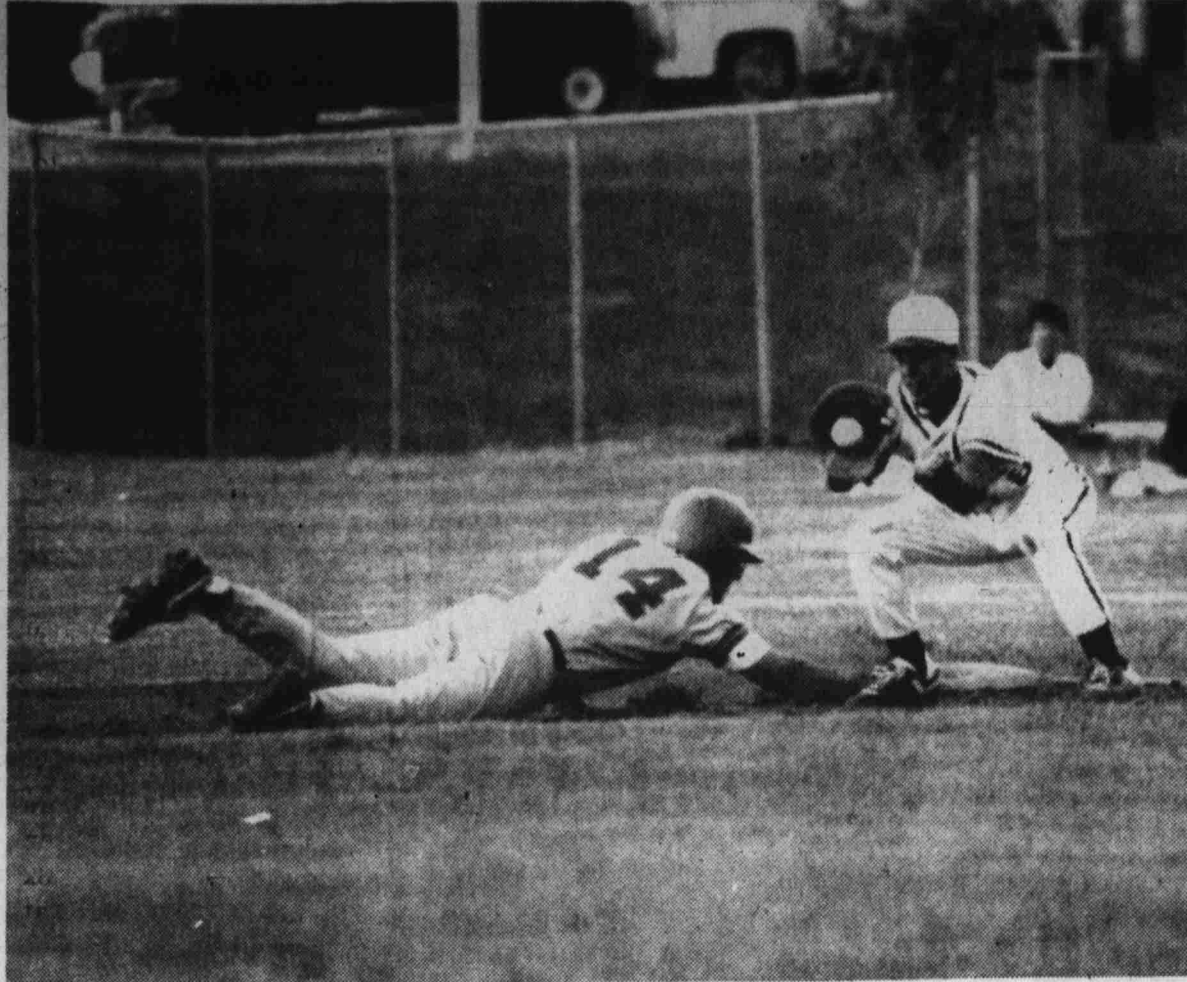

Segura out for season

It was the kind of victory the Basic High Wolves desperately needed.

Last Friday's 8-1 rain-shortened triumph over the Bishop Gorman Gaels at Dick Empson Field eased the pain of a 15-3 defeat to the Clark High Chargers Thursday.

The one-sided win over Gorman was the kind of bounce-back Basic Head Coach Gary Chaires desired—a righting of the ship in time for the last five games of the regular season. "We've got to establish consistency," Chaires said after the triumph, the Wolves' sixth in eight league games. "Every week, we need to win two out of three."

Junior righthander Brian Stauffer made his first pitching appearance in nine days count, as he held the Gaels to three hits while striking out seven batters. With the complete game win, Stauffer improved his record to 5-3.

Although he pitched behind on the count much of the afternoon, Stauffer recovered

quickly enough to gain the confidence of Chaires.

"We needed it from Brian," Chaires said. "We needed a complete game. It hurts not to have [pitcher Chuck] Segura."

The performance on the mound was particularly critical because Segura, a Wolves starter, was lost for the season Thursday when he severely sprained his left ankle while making a catch in centerfield.

Stauffer also lent an offensive hand against Gorman. His double drove home leftfielder Tim Woods with the Wolves' first run in the opening inning. Woods had reached base on a single.

Juniors Kevin Clark and Eddie Bustamante helped Basic break a 1-1 tie in the bottom of the third inning. Clark singled home two runs, and after a Gael error plated another tally, Bustamante came up with a hit-and-run single to make the score 5-1.

Gorman pitcher Guy Pinjuv came in for Gael starter Chris Leveque in the second inning, but he was generally ineffective. Pinjuv hit three Wolves

batters to spur the third-inning rally and uncorked two wild pitches to score a pair of Basic runs in the fourth.

The Wolves upped their lead to 8-1 in the bottom of the sixth. Leadoff batter Robbie Strehlow singled and Derek Fettkether doubled in Strehlow.

Moments later, umpires called the game because of rain and lightning.

Bustamante went 3-for-3. Clark was 2-for-3 with two RBIs and a run scored. Woods had two hits and scored three runs.

Basic falls to Clark

Clark collected seven extra base hits in the 15-3 win over the Wolves Thursday.

The Chargers scored four runs in the second, added four runs in the fourth and totaled seven runs in the fifth.

Clark leadoff batter Matt Johns had four hits in four at-bats against Basic. He doubled in a run in the second and fourth innings and recorded a three-run triple in the fifth.

Third baseman Pat Genovese also inflicted major damage

with a three-run, inside-the-park home run in the fourth.

Wolves shortstop Chris Sledge paced the Basic offense with two hits and two RBIs against Charger pitcher David Meng, who gained his fifth win in seven decisions.

Segura took the loss for the Wolves.

Basic travels to Valley

The Wolves gear for a key 3

p.m. game today at Valley. The Vikings, tied for first place in the Sunset Division at 5-3, lost a 7-2 decision at Eldorado Friday. That win helped the Sundevils maintain a two-game lead over Basic in the Sunrise Division.

Valley, 15-7 overall, defeated the Wolves 13-2 in an earlier non-conference meeting this season.

"We've got to be able to play with the better teams," Chaires said. "That is what we have not been doing."

Basic holds a 3-5 record against Southern AAA teams which have better than even overall marks this spring.

Lady Wolves win twice to even mark

For the second time this season, the Basic High Lady Wolves knocked off a first-place team in girls prep softball play.

Basic rallied from a 7-3 last-inning deficit Thursday at Cashman Junior High to pull out an 8-7 win against Sunset Division leader Clark.

The upset victory over the Lady Chargers, who have a 12-4 overall record entering Monday's rescheduled game with Western High after *Home News* deadline, was similar to a 3-2 Basic win at Western April 3. The Lady Warriors are atop the Sunrise Division.

After the win against Clark, the Lady Wolves came home Friday and outscored Bishop Gorman 4-1 to even their Southern AAA Conference mark at 4-4 and increase their overall record to 6-7. It was Basic's first two-game winning streak of the season.

Lady Wolves Head Coach Barb Gillaspay said her players seem to enjoy rugged competition.

"We seem to do better against the tougher teams," she said. "The kids are real psyched."

Basic catcher Tina Johnston recorded the key hit in the Lady Wolves' five-run, seventh-inning explosion versus Clark.

After Stacy Owens tripled in a run and Donna Acuna scored Owens with a single to make the score 7-5, two more runners reached base with one out.

Johnston then nailed a blast down the leftfield line for a three-run home run, giving Basic the lead for good.

"She hit it and it rolled," Gillaspay said of Johnston's second game-winning run batted in this year. Johnston had also homered in the Lady Wolves' first meeting with Clark in March.

The coach said a runner's interference call against Basic in the sixth inning aggravated the Lady Wolves and proved to be the catalyst in the victory.

The first phase of this work, begun over 6 months ago, involved extensive land use and traffic analysis as well as input from more than 400 citizens who attended informational meetings in mid-October and submitted written and oral comments and/or petitions. During this preliminary scoping process, the number of alternatives for this segment of the Beltway was reduced from nearly a dozen to seven and subsequently to three. It is these three alternatives that will be the subject of the EIS.

A SERIES OF INFORMATIONAL MEETINGS TO PRESENT THESE THREE ALTERNATIVES WILL BE HELD ON THE DATES AND IN THE LOCATIONS SHOWN ON THE ACCOMPANYING SKETCH.
