

Man pleads guilty to lewdness charges

Sexual assault counts to be dropped

A Henderson man arrested in May for the sexual assaults of several young girls is scheduled for sentencing on July 27 after pleading guilty to three counts of lewdness with a minor, according to Clark County District Court.

Joseph Lanzon, 66, who lived in the Highland Village Apartments on Taylor Street, was originally charged with four counts of sexual assault and six counts of lewdness with a minor under the age of 14, police said.

Six victims ranged in age from 3 to 7, HPD Detective Nick Roble said. He said Lanzon reportedly enticed the girls into his apartment using candy and toys.

In a plea bargain arrangement, Lanzon pleaded guilty on June 29 to three counts of lewdness with a minor, according to District Court records. All other charges are to be dismissed when he appears for sentencing by District Court Judge Lee Gates in Department 8.

The records state that the prosecuting attorney agreed to make no recommendations whether the sentences should run concurrently or consecutively when Lanzon is sentenced later this month. Whether he may be eligible for probation will depend on the outcome of a psychological examination, according to court records.

Lanzon was arrested on May 4 after one of the girls told her mother what happened, Roble said. Further investigation revealed six victims, he said, adding the incidents occurred over a period lasting at least several months.

In addition, he said Lanzon's 28-year-old stepdaughter informed police that she had been molested over a period of about seven years, beginning when she was 9 years old.

Teen's suicide threat ends peacefully after shooting

An unemployed Valley View neighborhood teenager was arrested after shooting through his bedroom wall following a family fight about 12:15 p.m. Wednesday, Henderson police reported.

Richard Luke Famam, 19, was charged with discharging a firearm where people may be endangered, police said. According to police, bullets from Farnam's .22 caliber rifle penetrated the wall of the residence, exiting into the neighborhood on Fullerton Street.

Farnam threatened to commit \$2,500, police said.





Of equal importance to River Mountain homeowners was the question of a new ordinance recently passed by the Henderson City Council that requires off-site improvements to be installed. Offsite improvements include any combination of pavement, curbs, gutters, sidewalks and street lights. Other improvements include sewer and water hook-ups which must be brought across the face of the lot in order for the next lotowner to continue the process.

The ordinance requires anyone seeking a new building permit to construct off-site improvements before the permit is issued. Some residents were concerned that requiring improvements on an individual lot basis would create "patchwork" pavement throughout the neighborhood. Others cited the ordinance as a way to make an LID creation look like a better alternative than patchworking.

Councilmen Andy Hafen and Lorin L. William were on hand with Public Works Director Mark Calhoun, Chief Planner Bill Smith and other city staffers to explain the ordinance.

Williams said the ordinance's intent was not to force homeowners in the River Mountain neighborhood into choosing between patchwork improvements or an LID, but rather to stop homebuilders in Henderson from circumventing their responsibilities as developers.

"We have never forced an LID. I truly believe the council will defer off-sites when you come in," Williams said referring to the option of asking the council for a deferment of off-site improvements.

Hafen agreed, adding that he "does not believe the intent of the resolution is to require someone in Section 27 to put in full off-site improvements if they come in for a building permit."

Despite the assurances, resi-

dents noted that the deferals of off-site improvements will be conditioned as the City Council sees fit. Williams refuted the argument, saying that the "deferments will most likely be until an LID is developed."

He added that LID's are brought forth as a citizens' project and are not forced or required by the city. The process of creating an LID starts with a citizens' petition in' favor of some types of improvements-something River Mountain neighborhood residents are not doing, Williams said.

City officials told the group that a survey sheet has been sent to homeowners in areas such as the River Mountain neighborhood to see if residents are interested in improvements and if so, what types.

Calhoun said that recent numbers indicate that property owners in the River Mountain neighborhood are two-to-one against "any types of off-site improvements."

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



Voters to receive new polling place information

The Clark County Election Department is mailing more than 300,000 notices to every registered voter in Clark County advising them of their precinct and the location where they will vote in the 1992 elections, Registrar of Voters Deborah West announced.

Due to reapportionment of political districts, more than 40,000 registered voters will find that their precincts have changed since

voting in the 1990 elections. This, combined with an estimated 20% increase in the number of registered voters, has necessitated the creation of 200 new precincts in addition to the 640 assigned in 1990, West said.

To assist voters in locating their polling place the names of crossstreets around the polling place will also be provided as a part of the notice.

"Because so many voters are affected by these changes, we wanted to provide this information as early as possible," West said. Completed forms must be received by the Election Department by Aug. 1 to be valid for the Sept. Primary Election. Voters may also call the Election Department at 455-7370 to request a mail-in form



Rotarians updated on gang activity

Lt. Mike Hawkins, Unit Commander for Metro's Special Enforcement Detail (Gang Detail), recently brought the Henderson Rotary Club up-to-date with the gang problems facing the entire Las Vegas Valley.

Beginning with some history, the 21-year Metro veteran explained the definition of a street gang as "a group of individuals that have a common identifying sign or symbol and whose members engage in criminal activities."

The Crips started in South Central Los Angeles in the late 1960s. They were kids attending school who started muggings, robberies and extortions. They adopted the color blue for identification.

Another group was formed at Washington High School as protection from the Crips who were coming in. This group adopted the color of their school, red, and called themselves Bloods.

These gangs spread out over the neighborhoods and "the cycle has kept perpetuating itself," Hawkins said. The Los Angeles area has approximately 100,000 gang members.

"There are five basic categories in Las Vegas, along ethnic lines," he explained. Metro has identified 68 different black gangs (Bloods and Crips and their sub gangs) with a membership in excess of 2,000. They comprise 63% of the total gang membership in the valley."

There are 25 Hispanic gangs with 500 members, 12 Asian gangs

with close to 500 members, 12 mixed race gangs with about 200 members and four white gangs with 170 members.

There are seven separate gangs in Henderson with a membership of 200, according to Hawkins.

Why do kids join gangs?

"Ninety-one percent of all gang members are from minority races, kids facing what they see as a hopeless future. Most coming from single family homes with no positive male influence in the home.

"They lack basic social skills. They lack basic educational attainments, have low self-esteem." Hawkins explained gangs provide outlets for kids who can become somebody. "Best drug dealer, best shooter, best thief."

He said they learn at a very young age our criminal justice system is lacking, that they won't be held accountable for their crimes in most instances.

"They can commit robberies, burglaries, sell narcotics, especially as juveniles, and once in the criminal justice system, there is very little done either as punishment or as correction for that behavior. They hold the system in contempt."

In Las Vegas in 1991 there were 17 homicides in which either the victim or the suspect was a gang member.

There were 130 reported shootings. Many go unreported. There have been 11 innocent people shot in Las Vegas over the past two years. Fortunately none have died as a result of gun shot wounds.

"People say this only happens in ghetto areas. It doesn't affect me.

"These kids are packing guns, going to the same social gathering" you and your family go to. If you go to the movies, go shopping or out in public, you are going to be exposed at some time or another to the violence that's associated with them," Hawkins warned.

Within Metro 28 commissioned officers are dedicated to work the street gang issue. In 1988 there were only four officers.

He said the police are trying to make "quality arrests" with hopes of longer prison sentences for gang members.

In 1991 they made in excess of 800 arrests, seized 140 guns and served 92 search warrants. They plan to continue targeting the hardcore leaders within the gangs. Programs are being offered in

the valley to deter "wannabees and gonnabees" from becoming hardcore gang members.

"What gangs do is a police problem but why kids join is a social problem and has to be addressed by all of society," Hawkins concluded.


