Local animal farm could face fines

The owner of a local animal sanctuary could face federal fines if improvements are not made to her Henderson property this month, a government official said.

Betty Honn, who has adopted would like to make." unwanted and exotic animals at . Honn's property, located on her property since 1977, said she does not have the money to complete repairs cited in a recent U.S. Department of Agriculture inspection report.

Greg Wallen, a USDA animal care inspector, said some of Honn's habitats were "below minimum standards" during a visit to the property in July. Honn has until the middle of August to comply with the report.

"All that I ask is that we be judged by the health and welfare of our animals," Honn said. "There are a lot of changes I

the city's west side, contains a collection of more than 1,500 animals and is a favorite visiting place for valley animal lovers. Betty Honn's Animal Adoptions, Ltd. is a non-profit organization that relies on public donations and contributions from local grocery stores to feed its animals.

Honn said she does not have money to paint the monkey cages or remove mounds of building materials from the property, both listed on the inspection report. She did, however, relocate some dog kennels and expand a baboon

cage as requested.

"He knows I can't comply to this," Honn said, adding she would need about \$8,000 to complete the repairs. "I can't comply to something if I don't have the money."

"If she doesn't meet these deadlines, violations will be issued," Wallen said. If the changes are not made by the next inspection, Wallen said he will issue a report to his supervisor, who will then decide what action to take.

He said Honn could face only a letter of warning or fines up to \$2,500 per violation.

Honn said she started painting the monkey cages but had to stop because the smell was harming the animals. "I'm not going to paint the shed," she said, "I have no place to put

"The monkeys have to live with it," Honn said.

According to Wallen, because Honn allows visitors to see her exotic animals, she is considered an exhibitor by the USDA, and like zoos, must conform to certain regulations. Honn said she disagrees with the classification.

"I'm not a zoo, I'm not a dog pound, and never have been," she said. "It's simple, I don't fit into their laws."

Honn said she would make a deal with the government if it meant she could keep her ani-

Residents vent concerns about apartments

Whitney Ranch residents vehemently told the Henderson Planning Commission Thursday that they do not want more apartments built in their neighborhood.

American West Development requested a zone change from rural residential to RM-28 (multifamily residential, with no more than 28 units an acre) and RS-6 (single-family residential) districts on 141 acres.

The zone request would increase the multi-family dwelling ratio in the neighborhood from 51% to 77%.

The commissioners listened to emotional statements from residents for an hour before tabling the item to Oct. 22. A lack of information and a fear of the item being brought into court were two reasons cited for the continuance.

Resident Lee Rich told the commissioners he is a real estate broker in both California and Nevada. "I have never in my life come across an issue of such gross misrepresentation,"Rich said. the developer promised that Whitney Ranch would have acres of open space, he added. "The only open space that I can find in my community is the center line on Whitney Ranch Drive."

Another resident, Phillip Goldstein, told the commissioners that he recently moved to Whitney Ranch and was promised a park at the bluffs. Goldstein said he is a lawyer and if the commissioners fear a lawsuit from the applicant, he too has an opportunity to sue. Then Goldstein turned to the standing-room-only crowd and asked if anyone would like to join film in the lawsuit, which elicited rousing applause.

Chairman Paul Ruth said he has been a commissioner for 10 or 12. years and, "I have never seen any application so bogus as this one. ... This smells so bad it would gag a maggot."

All the commissioners expressed their dissatisfaction with the application. Ruth warned the applicant, "If this does not come

back in the form that is palatable to the residents in Whitney Ranch, the planning commission is going to ask for a denial."

In other business, the commissioners approved a comprehensive plan amendment to change the land uses from tourist commercial to residential on 10 acres northwest of Racetrack Road and Sausalito Drive in the River Mountain neighborhood. The applicant, R.V. Jones, also requested a zone change from CC-G (community commercial with gaming enterprise overlay) district to RM-18 to construct a multi-family development.

A comprehensive plan amendment and a zone change for Racetrack Apartments, southwest of Racetrack Road and Newport Drive in the River Mountain neighborhood, was approved with Ruth opposing. A shopping center and 176 apartments will be built on the property.

In other business:

· A comprehensive plan amendment request from Cosmo World to develop Silver Canyon on 1,293 acres southeast of Lake Mead Drive in the Sky Harbor neighborhood was approved with Commissioner Kathy Smith abstaining.

 The commissioners approved a tentative map review for the Green Valley Business Park, consisting of 112 acres located at 19 Commerce Center Dr. in the Green Valley neighborhood.

· A use permit and architectural review from Silver West Real Estate Group to construct Green Valley Boat & RV Storage located at 19 Commerce Center Dr. in the Green Valley neighborhood were approved.

Sexual assault suspect arrested

Bail of \$70,000 was set Monday for a Las Vegas man charged with sexual assault and first degree kidnapping for an attack on a Henderson woman last week, according to a spokeswoman for Henderson Justice Court.

She said Justice of the Peace Rodney Burr set bail at \$50,000 for the kidnapping charge and \$20,000 for the sexual assault for 24-year-old Norman Andrew Collins.

No charges had been filed by the district attorney's office by the time Collins appeared in court Monday, the spokeswoman said.

Collins was arrested in Las

Vegas Thursday afternoon after a maroon Dodge van used in the assault was located earlier in the day.

A 33-year-old Henderson woman was held captive in the van for more than eight hours. Wednesday, during which she was sexually assaulted in a desert area of the Green Valley neighborhood, police said last week.

The van was located at the registered owner's address in Las Vegas Thursday morning, according to police. Collins "dropped the vehicle off

Ashway guilty of second-degree murder

Patrick James Ashway of Henderson was convicted Thursday of second-degree murder with use of a deadly weapon in the Jan. 24 shooting death of his girl friend in her Camarlo Park neighborhood home, a District Court spokeswoman said.

He is scheduled to be sentenced Sept.10 by District Court Judge

Thomas Foley in Dept. 13. His trial began with jury selection July 23, and closing arguments were held Aug. 4. The jury deliberated until nearly 2 p.m. Thursday.

Ashway, 17, claimed during the week-long trial that 18-year-old Colleen Marie Moore was shot in the head by accident during a struggle over a gun after she threatened to shoot herself, according to court records.

Witnesses for the prosecution indicated Ashway may have been upset because Moore was breaking up with him. She was killed with a 9 mm Colt automatic Ashway brought with him to her family's house.

Ashway also shot himself with the same weapon, police said. He was arrested by Henderson police upon his release from University Medical Center on Feb. 7.


How do I suggest a story idea?

Utility corridor could expand more than a mile, BLM plans

The Bureau of Land Management conducted a meeting Wednesday at Cashman Field to get comments on how to manage 3.7 million acres of public land in southern Nevada over the next 20

Hundreds of people listened as 50 concerned residents spoke out against the five alternatives the BLM has suggested for managing the land. In May the BLM produced a two-volume draft Stateline Resource Management Plan that incorporates 22 items that need to be reviewed within the five alternatives. Numerous people complained the 90-day review and comment period is not adequate to digest the information and make suggestions.

Chris Brown, southern Nevada program director for Citizen Alert, said no documented evidence shows extra wide utility corridors are needed. The corridors in all five alternatives traverse through Henderson to some extent.

The utility corridors would widen the existing corridor established through Henderson by more than a mile. Currently, the utility corridor that runs through the eastern part of Henderson then

south through the River Mountains is between 300-400 feet wide. The northeast boundary is near Lake Las Vegas and passes by the Levi Strauss factory.

The proposed expanded corridor would range from one to three, miles in width for all five alternatives.

The utility corridor has to run through Henderson property because of physical restrictions on Nevada land, said Bob Taylor, BLM district recreation and wilderness specialist, during a telephone interview. The Nevada Test Site, the bombing range and other federally owned land prevents the BLM from running a corridor elsewhere, he said.

The corridor would probably start from either Idaho, northern Nevada or central Utah, Taylor said. The utility corridor would probably be used for power plants, he added.

The power would be transferred to southern California. "Southern Nevada doesn't need the additional power," Taylor said. "Our needs are for peak power as opposed to base power.... Adequate power needs to be distributed in the West."

Peak power is for summer afternoons when the demand is high. Hoover Dam and generators around the valley are able to handle the peak power, Taylor said.


Other hot issues during the meeting included ranching and the environment. Numerous ranchers complained that they would lose their land under the proposed alternatives.

Decked out in a cowboy hat, red shin, blue jeans and boots, rancher Keith Nay said, "Before I leave, I'll either be handcuffed or dead."

Jeff Van Ee said he was concerned about the process used to develop the resource plan. He said he supported the desert tortoise but questioned how the boundaries were created.

People wishing to make comments on the Stateline Resource Management Plan originally had until Sept. 15. The BLM extended the time until Sept. 30 but is now seriously considering making another extension because the issue is so complex, said Jerry Wickstronmei, planning team leader for the BLM.

Wickstronmei said Jan. 1 may be the closing date for comments. Anyone wishing to receive a Stateline Resource Management Plan draft may call the BLM at

Macias is also charged with open and gross lewdness in the case, a court spokeswoman said.

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Henderson residents survive head-on auto collision

A 33-year-old Henderson man was in critical condition at University Medical Center Monday, two days after he was flown there following a traffic accident on Lake Mead Drive.

Henderson police said Jack Nehmelman was driving westbound in the eastbound lanes of Lake Mead Drive for an unknown reason when his 1987 Ford Bronco sideswiped one vehicle and crashed head-on into another about 2:45 p.m. Saturday.

Victoria Thomas, 30, told police she saw the Bronco coming toward her east of Arroyo Grande Boulevard. She said she tried to signal by flashing her lights and honking her horn as she swerved off the road to avoid him. The Las Vegas resident's 1985 GMC pickup truck suffered extensive damage along the entire driver's side.

After striking Thomas' truck, Nehmelman's Branco then slammed head-on into a 1977 Pontiac driven by 17-year-old Candale Kursturin of Henderson, police said.

Kursturin was conscious at the scene, although she was incoherent, HFD Battalion Chief Bill Kourim said Monday. He said she was taken to UMC by HFD ambulance after she was extricated from her vehicle.

A nursing supervisor at UMC said Monday that Kursturin was no longer a patient there, adding she believed she had been dis-

charged rather than transferred to another hospital.

Kourim said Kursturin was extricated from her vehicle 9 minutes after the first rescue workers arrived at the scene. He said it took 12 minutes to extricate Nehmelman, who was flown to UMC by Flight for Life.

"I can't be more proud of those [firefighters and paramedics]," Kourim said. "It was 'critical hour' for the patients ... the Golden Hour." He said Nehmelman left the scene after 28 minutes. "He was most critical and they had to get him stabilized," he said.

Kourim said Nehmelman was not wearing his seat belt, adding he believed Kursturin was also not wearing hers. "The crew did an absolutely astounding and amazing job," he added.

The battalion chief mentioned

it is the standard operating procedure for patients to be transported by HFD paramedics. "All the first patients in the patients," have the capability of transporting patients," he said, noting that only Henderson and Boulder City do so as a first preference.

"We do provide the service of transporting to the hospital from the scene of the emergency," whether that is an accident scene or a private home, Kourim said.

He said a televised report that ambulances were unable to respond to the accident may have stemmed from a misunderstanding regarding another emergency about the same time.

Child playing with matches causes Peppertree blaze

One unit in a four-plex condominium was inhabitable following a fire at the Peppertree complex on Sunset Road Saturday, according to the Henderson Fire Department.

"The fire crews did an excellent job in containing the fire and there was no extension to any of the other units [in the building]," HFD Battalion Chief Bill Kourim said Monday. there was extensive and water damage.

The upstairs residence on Avocado Drive was reported to be on fire shortly after 9:10 a.m.,

Kourim said. "While crews were en route, additional reports came in confirming [there was] a fire," he added.

"After crews arrived on scene they found the fire to be in the second story of the structure," Kourim said. He said the crews then entered the building to extinguish the blaze.

"One bedroom was gutted, but there was extensive heat, smoke and water damage to the rest of the structure," he said. Damage was estimated at about \$25,000 to \$30,000, he added. Kourim said the fire was still under investigation, but said it appeared to have been caused by a child playing with matches. Which of the family's five children may have caused the fire was unknown, he said.

Democratic presidential nominee Bill Clinton met privately Aug. 4 with Sens. Harry Reid and Richard Bryan, both D-Nev., who requested the meeting to discuss the Democratic presidential nominee's views on national issues affecting Nevada.

In a 45-minute meeting in Washington, the Nevada senators talked with Clinton about a wide range of Western issues, includ-

ing nuclear waste, water, public lands, and the economy.

"He was attentive to what we had to say. He struck me as a person who by nature is willing to listen," Reid said. "I believe Nevada would have an opportunity to make its case on issues affecting our state if he is elected President."

"Gov. Clinton was generous with his time," Bryan said. "He

listened carefully to our position on the issues facing Nevada. He indicated he wanted additional information on issues such as the nuclear waste dump and the Nevada Test Site."

The Nevada senators discussed the infringement on states' rights under legislation targeting Nevada as a nuclear dumping ground for the country.

"As a governor, he appreciates

the need to defend states' rights against federal intrusions," Bryan said.

The two senators said the meeting was significant because in recent weeks Clinton has been deluged with requests to meet with members of Congress and the nation's governors.

The facthe set aside time for two senators from a small state is telling," Reid said.



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



'GV scored again in the fourth on consecutive doubles by Tom LaRosa and Mike Loosbrook.








