Auto Mall back before planners

The Henderson Auto Mall is once again before the Henderson Planning Commission at 7 p.m. Thursday in City Hall.

The 70-acre mall, located on the west side of Gibson Road between Sunset Road and Galleria Drive in the Whitney Ranch neighborhood, was denied last year for a zone change.

According to city code, an applicant may approach the Council with another request after one year of being denied.

The applicant is asking for a zone change from IG-G (general industrial with gaming enterprise overlay) district to CA (auto mall commercial) district.

Although the zone change is similar to the original which was denied, several changes have occurred, including the applicant requesting the change. This time the applicant owns the property instead of a group of auto dealers.

The new zone change will also have some minor modifications to the design and landscaping, said Bill Smith, chiefplanner. The area will incorporate a tot lot and more open space, he added.

The original mall was denied by City Council, Smith said, because at that time it was believed that the city could only support acres.

one auto mall. Car Country was deemed the most viable project at the time.

But the market has changed, Smith said, and since then two other auto malls have requested zone changes in the Clark County "donut hole."

As of News deadline the Planning Department had not made a recommendation on the Henderson Auto Mall.

In other business, the planners will consider:

· A tentative map review of Green Valley/Pebble Commercial Center consisting of 111 acres located at the northwest corner of Lake Mead Drive and Green Valley Parkway, in the Green Valley South neighborhood.

· A zone change from singlefamily residential with six units an acre to an open space district to develop Black Mountain Country Club facilities at 500 Greenway Road, located in the Highland Hills neighborhood. The project will consist of a pro-shop, clubhouse, restaurant and supporting facilities.

· A planned unit residential development and tentative map review of Mountain Pointe Unit 1, located in the Green Valley South neighborhood. The project will consist of 112 units on 32

City voters to consider county's jail expansion

Why should Henderson resithe Clark County Detention Cen-

That question has been asked by many local taxpayers who will vote next week on whether to approve a \$20 million public safety bond question.

"All gross misdemeanor and felony prisoners, by law, are required to be housed in the County Jail," Assistant Sheriff Steve

Waugh said, adding the CCDC is the only such facility.

"City jails like [those in] dents help pay for expansion of Henderson and North Las Vegas ... can only hold felony and gross misdemeanor prisoners for a short time, prior to a legal process that they go through," he said. "They would only stay ... until they either bailed or were remanded to the custody of the sheriff for trial."

The local jail is designed for the


In 1967, Jack Clark came to the valley, and grew up between the Henderson and Las Vegas communities. Upon his discharge from the Army in 1986, he returned to Nevada.

Clark, 35, has been an officer with the Las Vegas Metropolitan Police Department for six years and more than three years ago, he moved into the Camarlo Park neighborhood. He is the father of a 13-year-old daughter and a 10-year-old son.

Clark insists on increased public safety and decreased school crowding, and calls for integrity to make city government more responsive to citizens.

"I'm not a Green Valley candidate, I'm a Henderson candidate and we all live in Henderson. And that was my

"I am not a role model ... I am paid to wreak havoc on the basketball court," intones the serious Barkley. "Parents should be

role models. Just because I dunk a basketball doesn't mean I should

raise your kids."


Indeed.

Barkley refuses to be a role model. Admire him for his athletic skills, his competitive drive. Judge him for what he does on the basketball court: his rebounding, his shooting, his dribbling, his passing. Yes, even judge him for the trash-talking, the flailing elbows, the flagrant fouls.

But after he steps off the court, his life is his own. Children should not look up to him, he says. Look up to your parents. Find other models on which to base your life.

Athletes are paid huge sums of money to play kids' games. They draw thousands of people to arenas and stadiums, they compel millions more to watch their games on television. We love to watch sports because games mean drama, games have conclusions, games are exhibits where humans pursue excellence, in unison or individually. We love our athletes in a special way because we root for them, we want them to succeed, we win vicariously when they succeed.

We stare at an athlete's every move. How many of us would like millions to watch us behind our desks in our offices and then discuss our every strength and weakness, our faults and our mistakes?

Considering whether to grant a work card, the chief"will consider the nature, extent and severity of the employee's prior criminal offenses, the length of time that had elapsed since such offense(s), the employee's activities since the convictions and evidence of the employee's rehabilitation," according to the proposed ordinance.

Those criteria are not stated in the current ordinance.

Imprisoned in-laws don't bring daughter back

Henderson dad still seeks child

Although Anthony Seger's former in-laws are imprisoned for attempts on his life, their convictions don't give Seger what he really wants: his daughter.

Six-year-old Angelica is most likely in England with her mother, Seger's ex-wife Raya Oberle. Although a British court refused in April to enforce the Nevada order giving Seger custody, Oberle's husband is scheduled to be transfered from that country this month.

If they return to the United States, the Nevada warrant for Oberle's arrest could be enforced. And Jelly, as Seger calls his daughter, would come home to him in Henderson.

But the U.S. Air Force, with which Oberle's husband serves, won't say where the family is going next, according to Seger's attorney Michael Root.

In the meantime, Seger believes his life is still in danger.

Oberle's parents and sister were sentenced last month for their parts in two attempts to kill him; an arson and a murder-for-hire.

Seger strongly believes, "My ex-wife is involved in this up to herneck." And he believes another attempt was made on his life when he traveled to England for the hearing in April.

"My cousin's car [was] parked across the street from the courthouse," he said. Minutes afterthey left the hearing, while driving some 80 mph on the freeway, a

tire blew out.

"The tires were just put on two weeks before court," Seger said. "[They] were cut half-way through on the sidewall" in what he believes was a deliberate attempt to cause a potentially fatal accident.

Family history

Angelica (Jelly) Seger was born in Henderson one minute after

midnight on Jan. 1, 1987, the first child born in Nevada that year. Seger said she was also the first child born on the West Coast. "There was only one [baby in the country born earlier], in New York, that was born at 12 [o'clock] and 30 seconds," he said.

When the couple divorced nearly two years later, Oberle waskidnapped by her mother. Seger's former in-laws have been convicted for attempts on his life.

"I took her to court about 15 times," Seger recalled. Reasons included concealment of the child, disconnecting the telephone service and denying information, he

Following a full-day hearing in Clark County District Court in November last year, then-Domestic Court Referee Gloria Sanchez recommended Seger be awarded primary custody of the

"This court is sad to see that [Oberle's] alienation of Angelica this court's stern warning on Sept. 6, 1991," Sanchez stated in a court document. "That's when she was ordered one last chance to give me ev-

erything to do with Angelica, let me talk with my daughter once a week and notify me wherever Angelica is," Seger said of the September hearing.

Although they appeared in court again in November 1991, postponements continued for another full year before Seger was given custody.

During that time, Seger said, "I had my summer visitation and I had my Christmas visitation.' However, according to Sanchez' order, Seger was denied a Thanksgiving visit and later only allowed five days with his daughter, although she was in Nevada since the first week of November.

Neglecting to provide school, medical and other information regarding the child was also noted, as well as the Oberle's cutting off their telephone service.

"The court can find no excuse or reason for [Oberle's] act of terminating her telephone service in England," Sanchez' order stated. It also stated, "... the court finds that this is inexcusable considering that the only visitation Mr. Seger is allowed most of the time is telephone visitation."

Sanchez ordered Oberle to turn Angelica over to Seger on Nov. 10, 1992, but instead she left with the child.

Library announces new director

The Henderson District Public Library trustees announced a new librarian has been named to replace James I. Gibson Library director Carroll Gardner, who is retiring in a month.

John Gettelman, assistant director of the Wauwatosa, Wisc., Public Library since 1982, will come on board July 30.

"I think the board did a wonderful job in selecting," trustee Othena Williams said. "He was so energetic and enthused and impressed with this library and the

"He is very knowledgeable. ...

I feel that we're going to be in very good hands."

Gettelman, 47, received his schooling at the University of Wisconsin at Milwaukee. He has a master's degree with an emphasis on public library administration and services and a

bachelor's degree in sociology. A former member of the public library board of trustees, he is also a part-time library building con-

sultant with an architectural firm. "To pull up 40 years residency with his wife and his children: I pray that this community and all of us make him feel welcome," Williams added.

Gardner said Gettelman's ob-

jective when he applied for the job was to "direct an active and progressive public library." She added his position as a trustee, "sitting on the other side of the table not only as administrator but as a policy-setter," provides a new angle to his experience.

Gettelman also emphasizes the importance of public and staff relations and fund-raising, Gardner said.

"He told me last night the reason he took this job was the wonderful staff," she said Wednesday.

Gettelman and three other applicants met one-on-one with library staff last weekend as part of the selection process.

"I am just thrilled. He's more than good enough," she continued. "This library's going to take off under his leadership."

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Emissions standards beefed up

Valley residents will breathe a little easier thanks to stricter standards for emissions from construction sites.

At a public hearing Thursday, the Clark County Health District board approved amendments to require construction sites to reduce inhalable particulates.

The Southern Nevada area is only one of five areas in the country that has been rated serious for non-attainment by the Environmental Protection Agency, said Michael Naylor, director of Clark County Air Pollution Control Division.

The amendments, which go into affect Aug. 2, require construction sites to be treated similar to industrial plants. The plants have been required to offset several types of emissions with payments to public works departments to mitigate the pollution problem.

"I've worked in this office for. 16 years and we have always regulated industry and construction but there has been a double standard," Naylor said. "Both can emit the same emission. This puts things on a more equal footing.

"It doesn't matter where the particulant matter (dust) comes from. It could be at a rock-crushing plant which is permanent or at a construction site crushing rock

Construction sites on more than five acres will be required to pay \$550 per ton of emissions. The money will go to the public works department closest to where the work is being done. The money will be used to pave roads, Naylor said. The roads cannot be part of an improvement district or have been previously scheduled to be paved with other funds, he added.

The money will be assessed to construction sites for both residential and commercial use. Naylor estimates a home-buyer will see the cost rise \$15. He added that approximately \$400,000 will be raised per year from the fee.

Rally to protest state education cuts

A group of parents concerned about education funding is planning a rally Thursday, June 3, to protest current and possible future cuts to the state education budget.

The rally will be held from 5 to 6 p.m. outside the Clark County School District education center, 2832 E. Flamingo Road.

It is sponsored by a recently formed parent-driven coalition whose goal is a stable tax base and increased funding for education.

"This demonstration is an endof-the-rope rally to let legislators and the governor know that we won't tolerate education cuts," said Wanda Rosenbaum, an organizer of the parent coalition. "School is almost out, but education legislation isn't. We urge people to join the effort to let our elected officials know that children are a most precious resource."

The group also is inviting those concerned about education funding to attend weekly meetings of the district's legislative ad hoc committee, which are held while the Legislature is in session. The meetings begin at noon Fridays at the education center.

The mission of the group is identified by the acronym REACH: Restore funding to education, Educate and empower parents, Achieve a fair and stable tax base, Commit adequate funding to accountable education programs, and Help attain public support for education.

District Court Judge Gerald Bongiovanni approved Sanchez' recommendation in an order enterred Nov. 16, giving Seger sole custody of the child. A warrant for Oberle's arrest was entered Dec. 7.

Murder attempts

Seger believes the first murder attempt was made in June 1991 when "my house was firebombed," he said, "I had a hunch [who did it], but no evidence to prove so.'

In January 1993, he was approached by a stranger who said he had been paid by Oberle's family to kill Seger. Seger said two other attempts are believed to have been made in the interim.

Police later said Oberle's mother, 63-year-old Doris Decaro, was the "mastermind" of the plot to kill Seger. District Court Judge Lee Gates sentenced her last month to one year in Nevada State Prison, although the Parole and Probation report recommended probation.

A week later, Gates sentenced her husband, 66-year-old Raymond Decaro to four months of house arrest. A court spokesperson said Decaro's ill health prevented a jail sentence.

The couple's 33-year-old daughter, Sylvia was sentenced to six months in the Clark County Detention Center.

All three, who live in Pahrump, had originally been charged with solicitation to commit murder. Doris Decaro pleaded guilty to that charge, while the other two pleaded guilty to conspiracy to commit arson.

"For their age," Seger said, "I was surprised that they got what they got." He added, "I can live with it."

Current status

Seger, 30, continues to work as a line cook at the Rainbow Club in downtown Henderson, where he said he has been employed since 1979 except for a two-month absence in 1982. He added he is the union's shop steward, and was on the negotiation committee for the current contract.

A resident of Henderson since 1971, Seger lives with his wife. Lorraine in the Townsite neighborhood. His stepdaughter, Billie Jo, is 7 years old.

The last time he saw his daughter was "when I was over in England. The last day I got to see Angelica -locked in a welfare office with two guards and Raya's husband - for one hour."

He said of the visit nearly two months ago, "You could tell the manipulation was going on still to this day." He added Angelica knew something about the cases against her mother's family.

"Angelica asked me, why do I hate her grandmother and grandfather so much," he said. "I told her I don't hate them, they hate me. And that's between me and her mother, and her not to worry



Grady sees benefits of K-9 Therapy

Brian J. Grady, a real estate professional with CENTURY 21 Action Network and a director on the K-9 Therapists of Southern Névada Board of Directors, has seen the impact the K-9 Therapy Program has on sick people.

In connection with the K-9 Therapy program and Therapy Dogs International (TDI), Grady and his dog Caesar, a five-year old collie that he rescued from the pound, visit patients at the University Medical Center (UMC) every Monday evening and at the Las Vegas Convalescent Center every Wednesday evening.

"Almost every patient encountered thoroughly enjoys the visits and typically requests that we stop by their room during our next visit. Also, the doctors and nurses are generally very receptive as well and spend time with the dogs too," Grady said.

Generally, four or five members from the group meet with their pets at UMC on Monday evenings. They then spend one and one-half hours "making the rounds" and visiting patients in the Intensive Care Unit, Cancer





Writing skills develop friendships

An English project for ninthgrade students at Green Valley High School blossomed into friendships with elementary school students.

Candace Hunt's students recently published stories about their pen pals from Tate Elementary School.

As with any friendship, the warm relationship developed over time. The students corresponded for seven months and the Green Valley High students gleaned information to write and publish stories about their new friends. They presented the second-graders with individual narratives about the youngsters as super heroes in adventure stories.

The idea was the brainchild of Hunt and second-grade teacher Sandra Van Rhyn. They met at a professional growth workshop last summer and decided to implement the pen pal concept.

The project was part of the high school students' grade. But more importantly, the project would become a part of the children's lives, Hunt warned her students.

On the chalkboard in one class, the second-graders created a

count-down list not for the end of school but when their pen pals would visit and present them with their stories.

When the ninth-graders disembarked from the bus, the children greeted them with signs welcoming them. The second-graders also made brownies and other treats for their new friends.

Only one student did not follow through on her part of the relationship by not writing a story for a child. The repercussions were enormous. "I had one girl who was unable to make it and her pen pal sat down and cried," Hunt said. "She was so disappointed."

Hunt promised the child that a personal story will be written very soon.

Not counting the one person who did not turn in a story, Hunt said, she was happy with the work of her students. When students have to turn in major projects (book reports, etc.) Hunt said she usually only receives 70%. "From that standpoint, this was phenomenal."

In addition to learning about writing and publishing, the students learned how to communicate with children. "They learned how to be positive," Hunt said. "The students were sensitive and kind."

Hunt may expand the pen pal project next year.

more minor crimes that occur and legally keep in our facility." within Henderson, Waugh said. When a person is charged with a felony or gross misdemeanor, they would be held in the county jail and transferred here to appear in court. "We make runs to Henderson every day," he added.

Although the Las Vegas Metropolitan Police Department has three issues on the ballot, the jail is the only one that affects Henderson, he said. "One is for 300 officers, another is for seven neighborhood stations."

Those will be voted on by residents of Las Vegas and unincorporated Clark County, which Waugh noted is Metro's "service base."

The jail is a county-wide issue, he said, "and therefore it is voted on by everyone within Clark County."

Henderson, North Las Vegas, Boulder City and Mesquite are the only cities in the county, in addition to Las Vegas, that are incorporated, according to Waugh.

If the bond issue passes, the explanation on the sample ballot states, "The cost of the ad valorem tax increase for the owner of a \$100,000 home is estimated to average \$3.03 per year."

"If it doesn't pass," Waugh said, "then we will have to implement ways of keeping the population down. What that would amount to ... is to place a cap on the number of people that we can effectively

He warned, "Down the road a little ways [felons] would be let

out pending trial." All this year, he said, "We are on a daily basis over capacity" at the jail. There are some 1,470 beds in the jail, "but for management purposes, as far as being able to classify inmates and keep

them separated ... the actual

manageable number is about 90%

of-that." He explained that 1,340 to 1,350 beds should be in use according to the current structure at CCDC. "We've been running over 1,500 since the first of the year."

The jail, located on Lewis Avenue and Casino Center Boulevard, was designed with expansion in mind, Waugh said. "When this facility was built there were provisions made ... to tunnel under Lewis and put in an additional tower to the south."

However, he said no design has been made yet and it could be built single-story rather than as a tower.

"We would tie the two buildings together, either by tunnel if we can't vacate the street, or by adjoining if we can," Waugh said.

If the bond issue passes, the \$20 million would add about 500 beds to the current capacity, he said. No kitchen or medical facilities would need to be built, he said. adding the current building was designed for the expansion.

very diverse community. We've got working class people all the way up to the very wealthy. Outwardly it's a nice community and the problems that we're facing now are more the problems that we will face in the next 10 years if we don't deal with them."

The Newcomer

"One of the advantages to being a political newcomer, is that we can approach things with fresh ideas. We can approach things with imagination, we don't have to go by the old rules. If the old rules had worked, I wouldn't be here. They haven't worked."

Public Safety

"We certainly need to be higher than one police officer per 1,000 people but we need to take an honest look at the kinds of crimes he have and what our officers are responding to. Our police officers sometimes will wait 20 minutes for a back-up on a violent domestic disturbance. A lot of this information comes from the officers themselves, that's the best source of information."

Funding Emergency Services

"I truly believe the vast majority of businesses in Henderson and developers in Henderson have an interest in the community. ... They have the resources to help the community, and [if] they're asked, I think they will.

"Throughout the country this happens all the time that the private sector comes together to give

public services the things that they need, you see it in arts and entertainment all the time. There's no reason that we can't do it for our specific needs which is a hazardous materials unit."

Emergency Notification

"The single biggest problem is the notification of the citizens. With the technology that we have today it may be possible for us to ring 700 phones at the same time. This plan doesn't have to be complicated, it just has to work.

"Once we get people to watch TV or turn their radio on, we can tell them what to do."

Low Voter Turnout

"I'm disappointed. No matter who wins, it's disappointing to think that 10,000 people will make the decision for a community of this size on who is going to lead them for the next four years.

"I think people have become very cynical toward all levels of politics. ... First we have to get in [office] and then we have to demonstrate to people that it doesn't have to be like that. We should stand as an example of what a city can accomplish.'

Attracting Industry

"Some of the computer industry in the Silicon Valley is even looking for new homes — that would be ideal. Henderson is ideal for that type of environment.

"That's certainly one of the businesses that I would like to attract is the computer industry. It's a clean industry, it's generally expanding, it's generally improv-

ing, the technology gets better.
"We as a city need to decide what kinds of businesses would be acceptable to the community atlarge, what direction our community wants to go in industry, and then approach those businesses and try to create an environment that makes it worthwhile for them to come to Henderson."

Problems

"We as a city have failed to address where we need to go in 10 years. The problems that were outlined in the 1984 Master Plan have yet to be effectively addressed."

The Future

"I think what our city can be in 10 years is a business hub where we've created real jobs and we've had real progress in all areas of town—not uneven progress. That everybody knows that they're going to get a fairshake and they're going to play on an even playing field when they go before City Council, whatevertheir issue may

"That we'll have a safe city and that our community will feel secure in their environment. I truly believe we can accomplish these things. How hard is it if people are on different sides of an issue to bring them together and ask them to compromise?"





the fire department grew 76% and the last four years our population only grew 53 or 54%. ...

"Everyone does whatever they want to with statistics and percentages, as well I will, and that's to be expected. But I'm dealing with real facts, real numbers."

The Future

"We're going to continue to get our share of housing growth and as the valley grows we're going to eventually run out of one of our most precious resources, and that's water for growth. ... We all here today will have water, [but] there won't be growth water.

"At that point, we'll more than likely have to stop and then everything that's here today, I see an appreciation in values - you can't replace it.

"As the city grows, if we grow at a much slower percentage, our revenue for public services can keep up easier. We're always behind the curve because first comes the people and the property that creates the taxes and the needs ... then comes the revenue from that."

Problems

"It's always a problem to play catch-up but I don't believe yet the citizens of this city are ready to say, 'No, stop, we're in, shut the door, don't let anybody else in."

As Councilman

"I think one person can make a big difference. I'm personally goal-driven to gothe job done and I'm going to fight for every dime for my city. You continuously work with the other members ... to let them know what you are trying to achieve. It's teamwork, it's camaraderie, it's trust."

The Community "It's still friendly, it's still smalltown. We have reached a much





According to the Nevada Society of CPAs, selecting the right location for your business directly affects its profitability. Here are some general guidelines you can follow to help you make the right choice.

Locate to Serve Your Target Market

Describe the background of your potential clients as specifically as possible, focusing on age, income level, hobbies and other aspect of their backgrounds that may be relevant to your particular business. The look for a location that enables you to have contact with these potential clients.

Examine Area Statistics

To find out whether a community is comprised of individuals who meet your target market description, contact the local census bureau. It can supply you with details about a community's population, such as the average income, predominant occupations and median age.

Besides the census bureau, other sources of background information include local government agencies, chambers of commerce, the Small Business Administration, trade associations, local newspapers and even local resi-

Accessibility and Curb Appeal Match your location to the customers you want to serve, making sure your location is near major access roads and public transportation. Be sure parking facilities are convenient and safely lit if your business will be open during

evening hours.

Take as much interest in the physical appearance of the building where your business will be located, as you do in your own appearance. A store, building or office front that is well-maintained says more about your business and how you run it than any advertisement could say.

One donation has the potential of helping three individuals because the blood is separated into different components: red blood cells for surgical patients; platelets for leukemia and other cancer patients; and, cryoprecipitate, a special clotting agent, for those with hemophilia.

Take Note of Your Neighbors

When considering a location, be sure to determine the proximity of your competition. If there are already a number of established businesses similar to yours in the area, you may want to consider a different location.

Take time to think about how your business complements others already in the area. For example, if you're in the retail business, you might want a location near other retail outlets. Finally, CPAs urge you to select a location that fits your pocketbook. Be sure that maintaining your business in the new location will not burden you financial, especially if your business is not prospering.


