# Magoo's Bar gets go-ahead

The selling of liquor and the possibility of increased traffic accidents were reasons why residents opposed a use permit request for MaGoo's Bar and Grill, 520 Lake Mead Dr. But after hearing testimony from both sides, the Henderson Planning Commission approved the permit at its meeting Thursday.

Commissioner Jo Ann Huffaker opposed the permit. MaGoo's Bar and Grill will occupy 5,300 square feet in the recently approved Lake Mead Garden Center, which consists of a plant nursery and landscape supply.

Resident Eve Lynkleinman said she was worried about the danger of traffic crossing Lake Mead Drive. Because the intersections of Ivy Street and Lake Mead Drive, and Burkholder Boulevard and Lake Mead Drive have a high rate of accidents, Lynkleinman said she was concerned about more traffic from the restaurant.

Her other concerns include selling liquor and the proximity of the restaurant to a family trailer park. The project is only 88 feet

farther than the 1,500-foot minimum distance city requirement to allow establishments selling liquor near churches.

The other concern Lynkleinman expressed was the devaluation of homes in the neighborhood with a bar in their backyards. "That's where our children play in the desert chasing lizards."

Applicant Terry Caudill said he is not operating a bar, but a supper club. "A supper club is needed in Henderson because there is a shortage."

Restaurant traffic will not travel at the same speed as on Lake Mead Drive, Caudill said, because the restaurant is behind a frontage road. Although he plans to have the supper club open 24 hours, he said most of the traffic will be in the evenings.

Commissioner Ron Frame asked if a fence could be built. The developer said a fence will be built with gates.

In other business, the planners: • Unanimously approved two unrelated zoning ordinance

## Kerr-McGee election scheduled

"Based upon the input of other employees the regional director reconsidered his decision and decided to revoke his approval of the withdrawal of the petition," Rose said.

The elections will be conducted by a board worker who will tally the results after the last election session around 3:30 p.m. The company and the union have a week to object to election procedures and their effect on the results.

# Man realizes one wish, hopes for another

## Facing cancer, fan L.A. bound

Danny Cognac is much like any other 29-year-old man. In the corner of his bedroom, a stereo reflects a craving for music. Magazine and newspaper clippings share the walls with posters of beautiful women showing a lot of skin. He sports a pierced ear, a sharp haircut and a strong sense of humor.

However, Danny is set apart from others by his wheelchair and his cerebral palsy. And, unlike many of us who don't think twice about what tomorrow may bring, this sick young man does.

Danny knows the pile of tomorrows he has stuffed in his pocket is getting lighter. But, on the other side, he also has a pocket full of dreams. And this week, one of them is coming true.

Prince, the infamous pop singer and composer, has long been Danny's idol. The artist's photos adorn the man's walls, while his music fills his heart. Prince doesn't lie, Danny said, and "he talks real about God."

Tomorrow, Danny and his mother Gerri will hop a plane to Los Angeles, check into a hotel and rest up. Later, a van will take them to "Gram Slam," Prince's

famous bar. This is the closest Danny will get to his elusive idol, but to him, it's the next best thing.

United Cerebral Palsy of Southern Nevada arranged for Danny's trip. The group got America West to fly the Cognacs, an attendant and a UCP representative to California. It also got Marriot Courtyards to front the hotel rooms.

All this for a man who doctors said in October had three months to live, thanks to the cancer that has invaded his body.

Sitting in his kitchen Friday, Danny said he was excited for his trip and a day at Venice Beach. "The only thing he said, 'I got to die first to get my wish,'" his mother said. "But they made it bearable for him to die happy."

Translated through his mother, Danny talked about his idol. "He makes sense, some people don't make sense," he said. "They all just holler."

"It's a big thing," he said, adding he can't wait for his trip. "It's going slow."

But, Danny has another dream, a wish to experience a milestone in every man and woman's life. His 30th birthday. And it comes Jan. 6.

"The doctors are lying. I'm going to live and I'm going to fight," Danny said of his most recent diagnosis. He refused chemotherapy or radiation treatment for the cancer in his belly and said things are now in God's

hands.

But Danny is making his own choices. He has taken care of the arrangements for his death, he has even requested "Danny Boy" be sung on the second night of his wake. And while these things are difficult for anyone to deal with, let alone a young adult, he said he is not angry.

However, Danny plans to see his birthday. He even requested the party for the following weekend so people can stay "all night and all day."


"He said he's going to fight to be here," his mother said. "And I believe he will. He's got the will and he asked God."

Danny agreed, and added he wants to stay at least until June 7, Prince's birthday.

He is thankful for living, Danny said, but added both life and death are scary. "Life stinks sometimes," he said, adding he wished he had money for a handicap van and a bigger house to get around in.

But right now, Danny's thoughts are with his tomorrows. His trip to Los Angeles, how he wants at least one more visit to his favorite hotspot, the Lake Mead Lounge, and the tape of Prince's songs he made for his funeral.

And as many of us continue to take our tomorrows for granted, Danny offers a bit of advice. "Don't give up," he said. "Don't give up to the beast, he'll kill you."

## Steelworkers reject offer, negotiations break down

Negotiations between Titanium Metals Corp. (Timet) officials and Steel Workers Local 4856 broke down Thursday, ending a meeting that lasted only two hours, said Doug McMullin, the president of the Union.

McMullin said the company put a best and final financial offer on the table and asked the Union if they would agree to it. When the Union rejected the offer, the Timet people left, he said.

"The company got up and walked out," McMullin said. Brent Peterson, the human resources manager at Timet, said the problem was there were too many offers. He said there was the current company offer, a Union counter-offer and yet the Union wanted to come up with another offer.

"The union told us they wanted the rest of the afternoon and Friday to come up with another counter-offer," Peterson said.

The hold-up in the talks seems to be over money; a change from

the Union's earlier stated concern about pensions and contracting language. "We put out a hypothetical to them that if we were able to solve the language issues, would that resolve the dispute?" Peterson said. "We were told, 'No, absolutely not.'"

McMullin said the Union had asked the company if they were in a position of being unable to afford the Union's demands. "They said, 'No we're not,'" McMullin said.

Peterson said the company cannot afford to add to its costs

and cannot grant the Union what it wants. "We have laid out what we feel is the best offer we can. Unfortunately, the Union's expectations are significantly

higher." Both the Union and the company are waiting for Jack Bates, the federal mediator handling the dispute, to call another meeting.

A Sunday morning fire forced a family out of the house they rented and killed their dog.

Three rooms in the house were heavily damaged by flames and the other half of the house suffered smoke damage. The building was declared unsafe to occupy and the family will stay with relatives.

"Anything that is beyond the stage of being able to put out with a small extinguisher should be cause to evacuate," Kreutzer said. "Don't delay calling the Fire Department and call from a neighbor's house."

## River Mountain changes before planners

Three items which may change the face of the River Mountain neighborhood will be heard during the Henderson Planning Commission meeting at 7 p.m. Thursday at City Hall.

The first item that will affect the River Mountain neighborhood residents is a zone change request from RS-2 (single-family residential with no more than two houses per acre) to neighborhood commercial at 1,500 Wagon Wheel Drive and Appaloosa Road.

The second zone change in the River Mountain area is from community commercial with gaming enterprise to RS-6 (single-family residential) on 20 acres to

develop Valley View Meadow at the intersection of Sausalito Drive and Pimlico Drive.

Planners will also hear a use permit to allow development and operation of a gasoline service station called Old Vegas Convenience Store.

The store will consist of 3,000 square feet on a 40,000-square-foot parcel at 2440 S. Boulder Highway. Old Vegas Convenience Store will be located on the southwest corner of Wagon Wheel Drive and the temporary Boulder Highway alignment in the River Mountain neighborhood. The area is zoned community commercial with gaming enterprise overlay district.

The convenience store is part of the master plan for the Old Vegas

project which received a use permit Sept. 9 for hotels with a total of 4,000 rooms and a recreational park with 522 spaces.

In other business, the planners will hear:

- A zone change from open space to neighborhood commercial on three acres to develop a professional office complex located on the west side of Green Valley Parkway at Windmill Parkway and Pitman Wash in the Green Valley South neighborhood.

- A planned unit development and tentative map of Four Kids Industrial Park consisting of three lots on 20 acres at the northeast corner of Olsen and Eagle Rock Road in the Calico Ridge neighborhood. The area is zoned industrial park.

- A zone change from community commercial to public and semi-public district on 12 acres to allow for expansion of cemetery uses at the southeast corner of Pioneer Street and McKenzie Street in the Valley View neighborhood.

- A use permit to allow day care at 1901 N. Green Valley Parkway in a proposed neighborhood commercial district at the west side of Green Valley Parkway at Windmill Parkway, south of Pittman Wash in the Green Valley South neighborhood.

- An architectural review to construct the Wild West Casino at Boulder Market Place, at 754 S. Boulder Highway in the Valley View neighborhood. The project consists of 5,844 square feet.

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

 Strategic Plan 2000 features 11 strategies addressing key educa-

 The 11 strategies were identified by a 43-member strategic planning team this August. The team also reviewed and revised the district's beliefs, missions and goals. From there, each strategy was assigned to an action team, which developed step-by-step procedures on implementing each strategy. Action team members included hundreds of community, business and district volunteers.  
 Then in November, each of the 11 action plans was reviewed by the overall strategic planning team. The original action plans and the revisions made by the overall team will be presented to the School Board Wednesday, along with two additional strate-

gies for consideration. One potential strategy emphasizes problem solving and critical thinking skills; another addresses competency in the fundamental skills of reading, composition, math, science and social studies.

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# No free lunch at high schools

One local parent is questioning whether high schools are providing balanced lunches for everyone or whether the schools are trying to make a quick buck.

Lois Denaut said nutritional meals have gone to the wayside to make room for soda machines, hamburgers and other fast food. In the process, children from poor families have lost their chance to have a meal during school.

According to the Clark County School District Food Service Department, 2,620 students participate in the National School Lunch Program at the 18 local elementary, junior high or middle schools — 2,078 students are on the free program and 542 students are on the reduced program.

But the program is not offered at high schools.

The Clark County Board of Trustees removed high schools from the National School Lunch Program in 1982 because the program was suffering a financial loss, said Dan McPartlin, director of food service for the school district.

"There was not enough participation in the program to get reimbursement," McPartlin said. "The paying student is a big player in the equation. If that student is not eating there, then we're taking a loss."

He added that students were leaving campuses for food available at nearby restaurants. "There was a change in menu items to bring harmony with what is available off campus."

The National School Lunch Program does not allow soda, certain candy, gum or Popsicles to be sold during lunch in cafeterias. So the school district dropped the program and changed the menu to accommodate a wider variety of tastes.

Denaut said, "If you ask a kid to chose between nachos, burgers and sodas or a nutritious meal, they're going to go for the junk food."

She added that she didn't understand why the program is taking a loss if it is federally funded.

McPartlin said more students do not qualify for the free lunch program than those who do. "The free students who qualify are nowhere near the number of students in the high schools. The key is to attract the paying student. We have more students who do not qualify than those who do qualify."

He added that federal regulations prevent the school district from splitting the menu into two for students who qualify and those who do not. "We have to offer the same meals."

The Food Service Department

made \$9,188 by selling lunch items at Basic High School last year but lost \$3,363 at Green Valley High School, McPartlin said.

Basic High principal Stephen Augsburger said the student store made approximately \$200 in November selling soda, candy and other pre-packaged items. That money is used for extra-curricular activities and academic activities, he added.

Augsburger said the school also offers a Project Lunch Program for underprivileged children. Donations have been solicited from staff and community members to help needy children buy a lunch, he added. Students need to go through a screening process at the school office to make sure they qualify.

Green Valley High School principal Carroll Johnston said he did not have the financial statement from the student store available. He added that sales have been down since the pizza parlor and restaurant opened next door.

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
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

# Gas still flows at 7-Eleven

Gas is flowing at the 7-Eleven convenience store at Pacific Avenue and Horizon Drive, yet the store did not follow proper procedures to build the new islands.

In an effort to properly follow the review process, the city of Henderson brought an item before the Planning Commission Thursday. Zoning administrator Wayne Loftus said, "We initiated this review now because we didn't do it right the first time."

The mistake allowed the relocation of gas islands and a canopy without an architectural review. The 19-foot-high Citigo canopy and 12 gas pumps are in operation without city approval.

Although the convenience store has had pumps for several years, according to city ordinance, relocating the islands requires an architectural review because the project consists of more than \$5,000 in changes.

Nearby neighbors claim they have been adversely affected by the relocation of the canopy and gas pumps and one resident has retained a lawyer to fight the problem.

The original one-island gas pump was in front of the store which acted as a buffer for the neighbors. The relocation to the

south side of the property of two gas islands and a 19-foot-high lighted canopy infringes on neighbors' quality of life, residents claim.

Loftus said the Planning Department wanted the review so it could identify the issues and needs of the neighborhood. Lighting and noise were two issues Loftus addressed as possible problems for the neighbors.

Rick Zamarchi, market manager for 7-Eleven, said the relocation of the gas islands improves traffic congestion at the store and the intersection. The old gas pumps tied up traffic at the store, he said, and the new islands now decrease traffic on Pacific Avenue.

Zamarchi proposed two remedies to alleviate the residents' concerns. 7-Eleven would install directional shields on the canopy

to direct light away from the houses, he said. The company would also have a sound engineer conduct a study to determine if any noise reduction is needed.

But Robert Graham, an attorney representing a neighbor, said the failure to obtain an architectural review was only the latest in a series of blunders that have been committed since 1979. Graham gave the history of the project and highlighted how deceit or oversight has occurred several times.

Commissioner Earl Floyd said he has been following the project since its creation. "It's been one mistake after another. It shouldn't continue. It needs to stop. I don't know what can be done but something needs to be done."

The current problem was originally thought to be a benefit to the area, neighbors thought, Graham said. Since there was no public notice of the work, neighbors thought the island was being torn down when construction work began at the site. Several weeks later, neighbors were upset to see work at the back of the building for new islands.

One neighbor who had her house up for sale prior to the island relocation, cannot find a buyer, he said. His client has had to put up sunscreens on their windows, not because of the summer sun, but

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

## If the dream is big enough...

### Second-half spurt keeps girls unbeaten as Cimarron looms

Down 31-21 at halftime and playing with two ill starters, the Basic girls' basketball team could have excused themselves and let Cheyenne win Friday.

Could have...but they didn't. Playing at home, however, gave the Lady Wolves a spark that led to their best half of basketball this season, Basic girls' head coach Jan Van Tuyl said after the come-from-behind 58-43 win.

"We were sluggish to start and down maybe eight or 10-0. We were rattled. At halftime, I told them calmly that the pride in the team has to come from them," Van Tuyl enthused. "In the second half, Cheyenne couldn't stay with Jen Ebert, Brandy [DePoorter] or Jen Martindale. Brandy scored eight points in the third quarter. She came into her own as a point guard on the varsity tonight!"

After a weak opening half, heroics were spread around freely

among Basic players in the second half. Despite using good athletes and trying hard, Cheyenne scored only 12 points in the last 16 minutes of the non-league game.

#### On comeback trail

It could have been worse for Basic if Martindale, post Andrea Wise and guard Sheri Wells had not combined to make 12-of-16 free throws in the second quarter after Van Tuyl removed Ebert — one of three team captains — from the court abruptly. After all, Basic made only 3-of-28 field goal attempts in the first half.

The third quarter opened with freshman guard DePoorter setting a new standard for herself as she took outlet pass after outlet pass and drove to the bucket on each opportunity in the third period. Her eight points sparked a deluge of Basic excellence, as the Lady Wolves went on a 16-6 rampage to tie the game at 37-37.

The momentum continued in Basic's favor in the fourth quarter with a 21-6 advantage. Martindale and Wise both played while ill, and they both led Basic with 15 points each Friday in courageous

performances, Van Tuyl said. Martindale spent much of the night on the charity stripe where she converted 9-of-14 freebies. She also registered five assists.

At 6-foot-1, Wise was a force inside. Not only did she score in double figures for her second consecutive game, but Van Tuyl said she grabbed 23 rebounds, 18 on the defensive boards, against a quick Cheyenne squad.

"Andrea is capable of being a very strong rebounder when she decides to play, and she did Friday," the coach added.

#### Point totals

DePoorter finished with 10 points, Ebert added nine, Jennifer Ullrich and Sina Nofogataoa each chipped in three points. As a team, Basic converted 20-of-41 free throws. Cheyenne, which lost three players to foul trouble, made 8-of-20 charity shots. Ebert also stood out with six blocked shots in the win.

DePoorter and Martindale — also team captains — led the home team in steals Friday as DePoorter grabbed 11 and Martindale stole six. In the second half, Cheyenne found Lady Wolves everywhere on the court.

"We were almost hesitant in the first half, and Cheyenne is a good ball club — they've got some athletes. But our girls' work ethic showed tonight. It's the best game I've seen the kids play!" the coach commented.



## Glover nips Petrie, 7-6

### Basic scores five pins at Clark

It was expected to be the early-season wrestling match to behold: Glover versus Petrie.

In reality, the match lasted the standard six minutes, which was a little too short for 189-pound standout Jim Petrie of Basic. Petrie lost a dramatic 7-6 match to Glover — a 2-time defending State Champion at 171 — Thursday at Clark High School.

Basic had already clinched the team honors in the dual meet, 41-24, when Petrie, a cadet All-American and fourth-place finisher at State in February, took the mat against the more muscular Glover, Basic wrestling coach Jim Duschen said Monday.

"It was a nip-and-tuck match the whole way. There were a lot of close calls. Jim was in on some take-downs that he couldn't finish on the edge of the mat," Duschen said.

Known for his speed and strength, Glover registered the initial take-down in the first round, but Petrie escaped. Late in the first period, Petrie registered his only take-down of the powerful Glover to take a 3-2 lead.

In the second period, Petrie escaped from the down position to take a 4-2 advantage, but Glover scored a take-down to tie the battle, 4-4, with two minutes remaining.

In the final session with the score tied 5-5, Glover scored the go-ahead take-down. A true wrestling technician, the Basic junior escaped late in the match, but didn't have enough time to mount a charge, the coach said.

#### Early pins secure win

The Wolves secured their win Thursday with five early pins and five opening victories.

Ben Morris opened the night at 103 with a pace-setting 13-1 major decision over a traditionally strong Jason Chao. At 112, Chad Evans pinned Troy Stark of Clark in 2:35.

Brad Frederickson also pinned his Clark foe, Nick Gandolfo, in 5:23. Frederickson led 7-4 going into the third period when he got a reversal and a quick fall on

Gandolfo, Duschen added.

Basic's Dan Salas pinned Alfred Drake in 3:46 at 125, and J.P. Yeoman dominated his Charger foe, Chris Powell, 15-2, at 130.

The winning streak was halted, however, by Clark's Buck Lee — a State qualifier last season — as Lee posted a 9-4 win over a competitive, improving Louis Hawkins at 135. Back to form, Basic's Matt Lenox pinned Jeff Cook of Clark in 1:59. At 145, Toby Fronczek pinned Terry Cox of Clark in 3:42.

That brought up another key match at 152 between Billy Spielberg and State qualifier A.J. Washington of Clark. Spielberg wrestled smartly and intensely to post an 11-6 decision over Washington. Charger Clarence Lawson won at 160 by forfeit to begin the Clark rally.

Clark's Josh Carr pinned Jose Ortiz of Basic in 2:39 to delight the home fans at Clark. Then Glover edged past Petrie in the showcase match. At heavyweight, Basic's Mike Beardall got caught in a headlock early, which spelled his doom.

Clark's Anthony Griffith pinned Beardall in 1:34. Petrie and Beardall both lost their first matches of the young season to Clark.

#### JV wins too

In JV wrestling action at Clark Thursday, Basic won a 39-30 decision with only eight grapplers taking the mat.

Duschen said his young Wolves posted falls at 112 with Bill Johnson, 119 with Eugene Gentry, 130 with Jeremy Evans, 152 with James Lochner and at 160 with Matt Segler. Of the eight JV Wolves to take the mat, seven posted wins.

Thursday Basic will travel to Cimarron-Memorial for a dual meet to commence at 6 p.m. for JV grapplers and near 7:30 p.m. for the varsity teams. The Spartans sport a fairly strong team.

Over the weekend, Basic will also participate in the Chaparral Invitational meet, which runs Friday and Saturday.

## Brisendine, Gifford hit hoops

### Cheyenne hangs on for 68-60 victory

Competitive once again, the Basic Wolves dropped a 68-60 basketball decision at Cheyenne High School Friday.

If not for an unproductive third quarter, which allowed the Desert Shield a 15-6 run, the Wolves (0-3) may have won their first contest. In fact Basic exploded with its best offensive effort of the season in the final minutes, Basic head coach John Williams said Sunday.

"It was our best quarter all year. Nineteen was our previous best. Billy Boyle and Joey Valles each had two threes. Ryan Gifford and Brenon Jones both had six points — it was spread around," Williams said of the 28-point outburst.

"Cheyenne outscored us in the third quarter big. Even our lay-

ups wouldn't drop. We had six points, and I think most of them were lay-ups," he added.

Even the 28-25 run couldn't reel in the Desert Shield, however. Led by Tomay Holdip, who averaged 22 points before Friday, and Shonray Johnson, Cheyenne's top scorers were limited to 11 and 12 point, respectively. Johnson converted 6-of-8 free throws to aid his team.

Charity shots contributed to Basic's downfall again, the coach said. Cheyenne converted 21-of-33 free throws while the Wolves only shot nine. They made just two. It's the third consecutive game Basic has been outshot by a significant number on the charity stripe, Williams said.

Cheyenne was whistled for 10 team fouls although the Desert Shield used a full-court press more than half the game. The Wolves got whistled 24 times, he added.

Guard Robert Brisendine led the way with 14 points for the

Wolves. He shared the spotlight with wing Gifford who poured in 12 points. Gifford also pulled down nine rebounds while swishing 5-of-7 shots from the field.

Valles hit a trio of 3-pointers to finish with 11 points, giving the Wolves three players in double figures for the first time this season. Boyle, who hit two 3-pointers, and Jones each added eight points, and Johnny Williams contributed six.

Power forward Mitch Wilson played less than half the game due to shin splints. In extreme pain at times, Wilson was held to one point. Post Leonard Taylor saw even less playing time as the flu left him on the bench for all but one minute of the game, the coach said.

Behind Gifford's effort on the boards, Basic pulled down a season-high 33 rebounds. Without two big men, it was an accomplishment for the Wolves.

"That takes two of our big guys away, and that makes us about the same size as them. Cheyenne is a good team. They have some big boys, big bodies in there, and they used a full-court press on us, but we did a good job," Williams said.

Basic hosts Western today at 6 p.m. for the varsity teams.


