Library director resigns

Library to explore separation from County

The Henderson Library District Board of Directors on Friday accepted the resignation of library director John Gettelman and appointed children's librarian Zuki Landau as the new director.

Gettelman resigned due to personal and health reasons. The board commended Landau for filling in for Gettelman while he was ill.

A public search was not advertised for the position because the board felt Landau was the best selection. She has been running the library for the last six months while Gettelman was

The vote was 4-0 with Othena Williams absent.

Separation with County

The second major disclosure was a draft proposal for exploratory legislation to separate all ties with Clark County. The board is considering the idea to allow better control over its own funds.

Clark County manages the financial aspect of the Henderson Library District by investing the library's money and paying its bills. Board member Selma Bartiett said the library needs to handle its own funds in a less costly manner.

Because of the city's growth,

Trustees to name school sites

For the past several months, sub-committees along with school officials have been wrangling over the issue about future sites for elementary schools.

Specific sites will be discussed by the Clark County School District Trustees at 5:30 p.m. tonight in the Education Center, 2832 E. Flamingo Road.

Twelve elementary schools are scheduled to be built during the first phase of the \$605 bond buildout with two schools to be located be in the Henderson area.

Anumber of people have been looking into potential sites and relieving overcrowded existing schools, said Dusty Dickens, real property management coordinator for the school district.

A companion item on the Trustee agenda concerns site acquisition for land near the Green Valley Parkway and Lake Mead Drive area. Bond Oversight Committee member Selma Bartlett has questioned why the school district is going to spend \$684,000 to secure a 16-acre parcel.

The city prides itself on its commitment to schools and officials have boasted on several occasions that they have secured 13 elementary school sites from master plan developers who want to build in Henderson. No other municipality in the valley has secured any land for elementary schools.

City Attorney Shauna Hughes said the wording on the Trustee agenda is misleading. Hughes said the school district is aware of the sites the city has secured for elementary schools.

More than 100 bills targeting education have been proposed

this legislative session. Trying to understand what each bill means and the status of each one was the focus of Wednesday's informational meeting at Green Valley High School.
The bills consider many as-

pects of education - from requiring mandatory kindergarten to breaking up the Clark County School District.

Marcia Garcia, an organizer of the meeting, told a handful of people the legislative process can be very confusing. "It is almost

like Greek sometimes and if you are confused, you can call the Legislature Council Bureau and they can cut through most of it.

"A therefore and wherefore can change a bill," she added. She informed parents about

the various hotlines they can call. The legislative hotline 1-(702) 687-5545 is where a person can track a bill to see if it is still in committee or on the floor of the Assembly or Senate.

Garcia referred to Bill Hanlon's column in the News concerning teacher licensing. Hanlon wrote about two bills that have been introduced by Assemblywoman Sandra Tiffany.

Ensuring teachers remain qualified over time is the focus of

one bill. Hanlon stated upon renewing their license, most teachers take classes that will help them work with their own students. But a small percentage do not take classes in their specialized field which can leave students short-changed, he said.

AB 290 will require teachers to take classes in their field when renewing their license.

Another bill, AB 291, focus on alternative licensing. The bill would allow experts in fields other than education to enter the teaching profession while

Planners OK signs at Crossroads at Sunset

The Crossroads at Sunset, a commercial center on Sunset Road near the intersection with Stephanie Street, moved one step closer to development with the approval of a master sign plan Thursday night.

The center will be anchored by such retailers as Toys R Us and Sports Authority, with other smaller businesses filling shops in between. It will be located on a 14-acre parcel of land across Sunset from the existing Target shopping center.

The developer asked planners for a variance on the maximum sign height for the center. The existing requirement allowed a maximum height of 27 feet. The developer said a sign that size did not allow adequate space for the center's large retail businesses.

Chairman Ron Frame said it was important to set a precedent in the Sunset/Stephanie area to ensure consistency with future

commercial development. The Galleria at Sunset Mall and a casino/hotel will be located at the intersection as well.

"I think we're making a statement at this point," Frame

Commissioner Bob Ungersaid that he felt it was important to keep the signs in the 20-foot range along that section of Sunset Road because it would create a unique, attractive corridor.

The commission voted to allow a sign 30 feet high, or equal in height to the Target sign across the street.

In other business, the commissioners voted to:

•Recommend approval of Snap Tow's plans to expand their facility at 1105 N. Boulder Highway. Commissioners had some concern regarding the in-stallation of barbed wire at the top of a block wall surrounding

Superhighway needs signs, limits, directions

Computers have brought wonderful sed and versatility to our lives. In fact, I'm writing this column on a laptop computer sitting in a car speeding back to Henderson from a Sunday in beautiful Sedona, Ariz.

After communing with nature along Oak Creek and leisurely sampling dozens of art galleries in the bustling little community, I was yanked back into the fast-paced, high-tech world of 1995 at a gas station where I simply swiped my gasoline credit card through a computer set-up at the pump and started filling my

As we embarked on the highway back home, my mind drifted to another kind of highway — the information superhighway.

Will I still have a job at a newspaper in five or 10 years? After everybody has a personal computer at home and a laptap on the road, how will people get their information? Will they still read newspapers and magazines? What will become of television newscasts?

For years many have predicted custom-made electronic newspapers where people simply dial up all the information in which they're interested on their home computer. Newspapers are old (anywhere from six to 15 hours from deadline to doorstep), gray, dirty and require lots of forests.

The "information superhighway," or the Internet, seems to provide all the timely information people crave in an inexpensive way.

But what a newspaper has and the Internet doesn't is an editor. The very charm of the Internet is that everyone can get on and say anything at anytime.

The Internet has no sense of authority, no check for accuracy, no sense of being comprehensive. Editors are filters, the gate-keepers of information. Editors throw out the junk, prioritize and label information for quick scanning.

Sure you can access the Library of Congress on the Internet and you can subscribe to electronic news services that have editors, but you can also get on bulletin boards where experts and school kids mix it up, and whizzes and wannabee experts provide all sorts of information, opinion and reports.



It's like reading a letters to the editor page with hundreds of unedited letters. It's like listening to a radio call-in show with no host to direct the traffic and questions.

Newspapers have a certain structure so people know where to look for the information they're seeking. Readers know they shouldn't buy USA Today to find out about the

school situation in Henderson. They know they should not subscribe to the Home News to read about the O.J. Simpson trial.

Even the computer age will need editors, who set up the guideposts for information along the "information superhighway."

Just as signs on the freeway home from Arizona point the right direction, show boundaries and define limits, so must the information superhighway have signs that lead the way for information consumers.

Travis Cochran, a local Boy Scout, received one of the organization's most prestigious awards, the Heroism Award, for saving the life of a three-year-old boy.

Cochran was awarded Feb. 22 during the annual Boy Scout dinner. The award is given only

to those Scouts who "demonstrate heroism and skill in saving or attempting to save life at minimum risk to self."

Last July, Cochran, 11, and his family were visiting some friends when a 3-year-old boy slipped into the pool. The boy slipped under a floating raft and could not be seen by the adults at the poolside. Cochran noticed the child, yelled to alert the others,

Planners OK Sunset Village Square

After months of delays, businesses planning to locate in Sunset Village Square, a commercial center located at Sunset Road and Mountain Vista Street, passed the Henderson Planning Commission on Thursday.

The 17.2-acre commercial center will include Hungry Hunter, East Side Mario's, **Boston Chicken and Fatburger** restaurants as well as a Discount Tire store, Midas Muffler Shop and Texaco gas station/ mini mart.

Most of the businesses had trouble conforming to Planning Department's specifications. Planners require continuity in landscaping, use of color, and architectural design for any shopping center.

Most of the Sunset Village Square businesses have specific, nationally recognized building colors and designs. Some concessions were made on both sides, and agreeable designs were presented by all of the planned businesses.

Fatburger representatives requested a last-minute change on the location of their drivethrough window, which altered traffic patterns in the center. Planning staff commented that a traffic engineer would need to review the plan before a recommendation could be made. The representative withdrew his request.

The commission voted to approve the original plan, with the condition that no major changes are made which require the design to come before planning in the future.

Commissioner David Wood expressed disapproval of the business' tendency to present major plan changes the night of a meeting, without time for the planners' review.

Representatives of the fastfood restaurant presented a photo of a Palm Springs Fatburger which showed a "toned-down" version of the trademark yellow building with turquoise and red accent colors. The planners narrowly agreed to the building colors after some discussion. The other businesses in the center will use gray as a primary color.

"Gray is what they paint prisons I believe; gray is not a fun color," a Fatburger representative said.

No color boards with samples of the colors to be used were submitted at the meeting. Approval was given with the condition that the colors presented in the Palm Springs store photo be used on the Henderson store.

Commissioners Ron Frame, Chat Chatterton and Joann Huffaker voted against the color and design plans.

A master sign plan, which details the number, height and type of signs the center will have, was approved by the planning commission. The tallest freestanding sign will be 15 feet high.

All items approved by the planning commission will be forwarded to the City Council meeting on March 21 for final action.

The tax code allows you to deduct expenses of your office at home only if you qualify under strict tests. One test allows a deduction if your office at home is the "principal place of business" for the business you conduct

the business, but rather, to the "principal place of business".

Therefore, it follows that the most important or significant place for the business must be determined. Although no one test "will yield a clear answer in every case" and each case depends upon its particular facts, the following are the two primary considerations in deciding whether a home office is the taxpayer's principal place of business: 1) the "relative importance" of the activities performed at each business location, and 2) the time spent at each place.

The Soliman decision, January 1993, was supposed to resolve once and for all the nagging question of when an office at home is the taxpayer's principal place of business. But IRS is still sorting out the consequences of the Supreme Court's decision.

The most recent IRS pronouncement deals with the relationship between the Supreme Court's two tests, namely the "relative importance" test and the "time" test.

IRS says that, consistent with the Supreme Court's analysis in Soliman, it will first apply the "relative importance" test by comparing the activities performed at home with those carried on elsewhere. If the "relative importance" tests yield no definitive answer to the principal place of business inquiry, IRS will look to the "time" test.

One observation is that although IRS says that its ruling is "consistent with the Supreme Court's analysis in Soliman, ' IRS seems to indicate that it will apply the "time" test only where the "relative importance" test does not yield an answer. The principal author of the ruling, while refusing to call the "time" test a "tie breaker", did say that if the "relative importance" test yields an answer, there is no need to look at the time spent.

An analysis of the relative importance of the functions per-

requires, as a preliminary step. an objective description of the particular characteristics of the business in question.

If the nature of the trade or profession requires the taxpayer to meet or confer with clients or patients or to deliver goods or services to a customer, the place where that contact occurs is given great weight in determing the place where the most important functions are performed. For example, consider a self-

employed plumber who spends

most of his time doing plumbing work in customers' homes and offices. Although he does spend time in an office in his home talking with customers by phone, deciding what supplies to order, and reviewing the books of the business, IRS won't allow a deduction for his office-at-home expenses because the essence of his business is the work he does at his customers' homes or offices. The activities he performs

at home are less important. Or, take the case of a selfemployed author who does her writing in her office at home, but spends some of her time at other locations doing research, meeting with her publishers, and attending promotional events. Here, the IRS concedes that the office at home is the author's principal place of business, since writing is the essence of her trade. Herother activities, while important, take second place to the actual writing.

In some cases, however, the "relative importance" test doesn't give a clear answer. Then, says the IRS, the "time" test comes into play.

For example, take a retailer of custom jewelry who sells her wares at craft shows and by mail. She spends about 25 hours a week in her office at home filling mail orders, ordering supplies, and keeping her books. She also spends about 15 hours a week at craft shows. Both activities

IRS says that the essence of the retailer's business is selling jewelry to customers. But the most important selling activities are performed in more than one location. Since the "relative importance" test doesn't resolve this case, the "time" test must be used. Here, since the retailer spends more time working at home than at craft shows, her office at home is her principal place of business.

As this example shows, proper planning can be the key to nailing down the deduction for office-at-home expenses. By understanding the rules and what IRS is looking for, you can increase your deductions to the legal maximum

If appropriate to their business, taxpayers should consider meeting with clients and customers in their home office, since this factor is examined when determining the nature and functions of the taxpayer's trade or business.

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
