Mission Plaza before Council

Proponents will have their last chance to argue for the construction of the Mission Plaza shopping center tonight.

The Henderson City Council is expected to consider a zone change for the matter during its regular meeting at 7 p.m. in City Hall, 240 Water St. A committee meeting is scheduled to begin at 6:15 p.m.

The Henderson Planning Commission recommended 5-1 on Jan. 18 the City Council deny the zone change for the northwest corner of College and Horizon Drives. The center would include a Vons grocery store, coffee shop, pizza restaurant, dry cleaners and other smaller commercial uses.

The zone change request by Terra West Development is from a single-family residential district to neighborhood-commercial on the 10-acre site.

Opponents of the plan have cited increased traffic, noise and aesthetic concerns. Proponents have said they would like the increased convenience of a grocery store off Boulder Highway.

Planning Commissioners said that three corners of the intersection are already zoned for commercial uses before voting against the project.

Appeals of several other Planning Commission recommendations for denial are also on the Council's agenda:

- A planned unit development and tentative map review for a proposed commercial subdivision at the southwest corner of College and Horizon Drive.

- An appeal of a comprehensive plan amendment and zone for a bowling alley and supper club northwest of Horizon Ridge Parkway and Green Valley Parkway.

- An appeal of a zone change from urban-reserve to neighborhood-commercial for the Arroyo Grande Sports Plaza.

Also on the Council's agenda is a request to allow an expanded child care facility at 907 Center St. in the Valley View neighborhood. The issue was tabled at the last Council meeting for further research by staff.

Seven Hills offers unique view

The developers of Seven Hills, a master planned community south of Lake Mead Drive, went to great lengths to create a residential atmosphere atypical of others in the valley.

Located at 2,350 feet above sea level, the development starts 350 feet above the valley floor with home sites as high as 650 feet above. Panoramic views are only part of the package, however.

The development team chose Italian Renaissance and Spanish eclectic architectural themes to complement the mountainous terrain, according to Sheila Egger, manager of builder relations.

The information and sales office, now open on the property, exemplifies this unique architectural style. It features balconies, French doors, arched windows, a courtyard and central cupola.

Preserving and enhancing the natural landscape has remained a foremost concern in the development of Seven Hills, Egger said. More than one-third of the total acreage will be preserved

American Nevada becomes partner in Seven Hills master plan

American Nevada Corp., the primary developer of Green Valley and Green Valley Ranch, has become a partner in developing Seven Hills master-planned community. The 1,300-acre residential development is under development near Eastern and Lake Mead Drive.

An agreement was signed Jan. 30 between Forest City Enterprises and Terry Johnston selling American Nevada Corp. one-third ownership in the master-planned community, according to Bob

Monchien, president of the Land Division for Forest City Enterprises.

"This gives us a perpetual presence in Southern Nevada," said Dave Olson, senior vice president of marketing for American Nevada Corp. "It affords us the opportunity to continue developing in the south."

"We have the staff available. It's a win-win situation for both companies," American Nevada Corp. officials approached Forest City because they are running out of land to develop.

Forest City Enterprises, a national publicly-traded real estate company headquartered in Cleveland, had owned 55% of the master-planned community and Canadian developer Terry Johnston had owned 45% of the development.

The new agreement provides all partners equal one-third ownership, with Forest City continuing as the managing partner and American Nevada

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as natural open space or enhanced to create recreational amenities such as parks or trails.

More than eight and one-half miles of hiking trails will wind through the landscape, connecting each of the 25 communities with parks and eventually a school.

Nine community parks are planned in the development. They will feature traditional amenities such as picnic areas, children's play areas and basketball and baseball facilities as well as an amphitheater and interactive water sculpture.

The development's recre-

are situated on plateaus with expansive views of the valley.

A gated, custom-home community will be built around the golf course. The 1,300-acre development includes sites for 3,400 homes including 420 custom homes.

Two communities have begun construction in the first phase of development. Starting prices for homes will range from \$106,000 for a townhome product to \$150,000 for a 1,900-square-foot home.

Another unique aspect of the development is that no palm trees will be used in the landscaping. Only deciduous and pine trees will line the streets, parks and walkways.

The Seven Hills Development is located near the intersection of Lake Mead Drive and Eastern Avenue. The property was once designated for the site of Cosmo World gaming and residential project.

However, the owner faced financial difficulties and Terry Johnston, a Canadian real estate developer, acquired the property. He joined forces with Forest City Enterprises, the developer of the Galleria at Sunset Mall, to create Seven Hills.

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Price increase

Planners to look at revised rock operation

Plans for a rock-crushing plant at 50 W. Mission Dr. in the Paradise Hills neighborhood will appear before the Henderson Planning Commission Thursday.

The proposed plant, which was tabled during a Dec. 21 planning meeting, is on 164.5 acres of land. It was tabled by commissioners to allow Rainbow Development Corp. officials time to discuss their differences with residents in the area, said Bill Smith of the Planning Department.

"There's some better understanding now about the proposal ... There is a possibility they can come to an agreement," Smith said.

Smith met with the developer and residents in a joint meeting over the weekend. He said the meeting was beneficial for both sides. During the meeting, the project was outlined and the developer listened to residents'

concerns and proposed alternatives, Smith said.

In November a use permit was denied for the project due to residents' concerns of excess noise, traffic, and dust it will bring to the neighborhood. Commissioners rejected the use permit with the stipulation that the developer will meet with residents in the area and develop alternatives.

The commission is scheduled to meet at 7 p.m. Thursday in City Hall, 240 Water St.

In other business, planners will:

- Review amended development standards for the Henderson Commerce Center on Marks Street and Warm Springs Road in the Whitney Ranch planning area. Master

•In the city's heart, at the Arroyo Grande Sports Complex, near Stephanie Street, recreation enthusiasts will find plenty of baseball fields, trails, a basketball court and other activities. The complex, a jewel in the crown of the hard-working Henderson Parks and Recreation Department, will celebrate its grand opening the weekend of Feb. 16-18. Look for details of the celebration in upcoming editions.

•Along booming Sunset Road, the Galleria Mall's exterior is nearly finished and workers are putting the finishing touches on the inside for its long-awaited Feb. 28 opening.

•The Valley Auto Mall is booming and a grand opening block party will be held Saturday.

•Construction has become more noticeable at the sites of what will be Henderson's first hotel-casinos: the Reserve at Lake Mead Drive and the expressway and the Sunset Station at Sunset and Stephanie. Residents craving entertainment and gaming are looking forward to the new local opportunities.

•Way over on the city's west side, earth is being moved dramatically to build a golf course that will be the centerpiece of the Seven Hills project. To give you an idea of the views and the rugged terrain, the impressive Information Center is at the same altitude above sea-level as the pod of the Stratosphere, a project official pointed out last week. Corporation becoming the development manager.

"Efforts to complete Seven Hills as an exceptional and unique residential community will continue," Monchien said. "We're enthusiastic to become a partner with American Nevada Corp. with their strong reputation for enhancing the quality of life in Southern Nevada."

According to Tony Traub, president and CEO of American Nevada Corp., a partnership in Seven Hills provides American Nevada's Community Development Division with the opportunity to continue developing in Southern Nevada after Green Valley and Green Valley Ranch are sold out.

"We're anticipating a strong housing market in Southern Nevada for the next two or three years. We want to make certain we stay on the cutting edge," Traub said. "We believe Seven Hills helps us achieve that objective."

"An additional benefit of working with Forest City and Terry Johnston is the potential for making Seven Hills one of

the foremost master-planned communities in the country," Traub said.

"Forest City is excited," said Sheila Egger, manager of builder relations for Seven Hills. "American Nevada Corp. brings a lot of expertise."

Seven Hills is located in the foothills of the Black Mountain range south of Henderson. Lewis Homes, J.M. Peters, Desert Wind Homes, Kimball Hill Homes, and Greenpark are building approximately 1,000 homes in the first phase of Seven Hills. In addition, Fairfield will construct 320 executive apartment homes on the northeast parcel of the community.

Upon completion, the community will contain approximately 3,400 homes in 25 neighborhoods, including 420 luxury estate homes; an 18-hole, par 72 championship golf course designed by award winning golf course architect Rees Jones; nine public and private parks with tennis courts, volleyball quads, baseball diamonds and children's play equipment; eight-and-a-half miles of pedestrian walkways with recessed pas-

sageways, night lighting and bicycle security patrols; and an amphitheatre which overlooks the Las Vegas skyline.

Aquatics Center half-way complete

Henderson Parks and Recreation Department officials, along with subcontractors and planners, are diving into plans for the Black Mountain Aquatics Center to complete construction ahead of schedule.

Officials are coordinating efforts to open the facility for Memorial Day weekend, a week ahead of the initial June 5 deadline.

Contractors and subcontractors for the facility held a meeting

Thursday to outline their progress. The meeting was the second of three meetings to be held before the building opens in late May.

Deadlines are being met and subcontractors are completing their work, said John Simmons, HPRD coordinator. According to Simmons, contractors estimate the project is 52% complete.

HPRD officials hope to have the facility open a week ahead of schedule because of anticipated increased use of recreation facilities by area visitors and

residents over the holiday weekend.

The skeleton of the facility is complete. Water, electrical and plaster work is slowly forming the interior structure.

On March 1, work on the water slide will begin, followed by work on the pool area. Landscaping for the structure is being planned and will be coordinated around construction efforts, Simmons said.

The project is one of 27 projects in development by the department.

The facility features a pool and 150-foot water slide, along with a picnic area, sand volleyball court, basketball, tennis and racquetball courts. A full-sized gymnasium, classrooms, meeting rooms and a community policing facility will be included in the 40,000-square-foot recreational facility.

Cobb to be honored

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Vallez sentenced for other charges

When Manny Vallez was convicted of first-degree murder for the shooting death of a local high school student, he could have been sentenced to death.

Instead, jurors in November delivered a lenient sentence of life with the possibility of parole.

Vallez, 22, will have to serve at least 20 years in prison before becoming eligible for parole, but he may have another chance.

On Thursday, Vallez appeared before District Judge Lee Gates to be sentenced on the remaining charges stemming from the Feb. 17, 1995, shooting which left Matthew Reynolds, 17, dead and his friend Todd Wittlief, then 20, seriously injured with a bullet wound to the chest.

The night of the shooting, two groups of young people were involved in an altercation that eventually erupted in gunfire at the the Unocal gas station at

Sunset Road and Mountain Vista Street in the Green Valley neighborhood of Henderson.

Witnesses testified they first saw Vallez fire the gun from the car as it approached Reynolds and his friends. Reynolds was killed when Vallez left the vehicle and fired a .38 caliber revolver into the teen's chest at close range.

Vallez maintained that he fired in self-defense. According to witnesses, Wittlief had a 9mm gun at the time of the fight.

Moreover, defense attorney David Schieck said the Reynolds group was the aggressor the night of the shooting and were looking for trouble.

Prior to issuing a sentence for the lesser charges Thursday, though, Gates alluded to the ease with which young men solve disputes with guns. But he too delivered a more lenient sentence than was sought by prosecutors. Throughout the murder trial,

Deputy District Attorney Mel Harmon said Vallez possessed a "shoot 'em up philosophy and a hair trigger mentality." Harmon had sought the death penalty for Vallez.

At Thursday's sentencing, Harmon once again argued for a stiff sentence and said Vallez "shouldn't be given any free shots."

In the end though, Gates sentenced Vallez to 10 years in prison for shooting Wittlief and tacked on three more for discharging a firearm out the window of a vehicle.

Gates had the option of ruling the additional sentences to run one after the other, for which Harmon had argued, but he ordered them to run concurrently.

If Gates had not ruled the additional sentences to run concurrently, the minimum time served by Vallez would have been increased by several years.

Lake Las Vegas officials also recently announced that Nicklaus will design the first of three resort courses located at NorthShore.

Lyle Anderson, who has developed three golf courses in Golf Digest's top 100, will team with Nicklaus and Lake Las Vegas to develop the NorthShore course.

Development proposals for the 1,394-acre NorthShore include exclusive resort hotel and casinos, world-class spa facilities, three 18-hole championship golf courses, two commercial resort villages, restaurants, and equestrian and tennis facilities.

Nicklaus, *Golf* magazine's "Golfer of the Century" has earned global recognition for his innovative golf course designs. In 1973, he founded Nicklaus Design, a professional firm specializing in golf course design based in North Palm Beach, Fla.

His signature courses are located in 23 countries and five continents. His 100th course

opened in 1993 at the Las Campanas community in Santa Fe, N.M.

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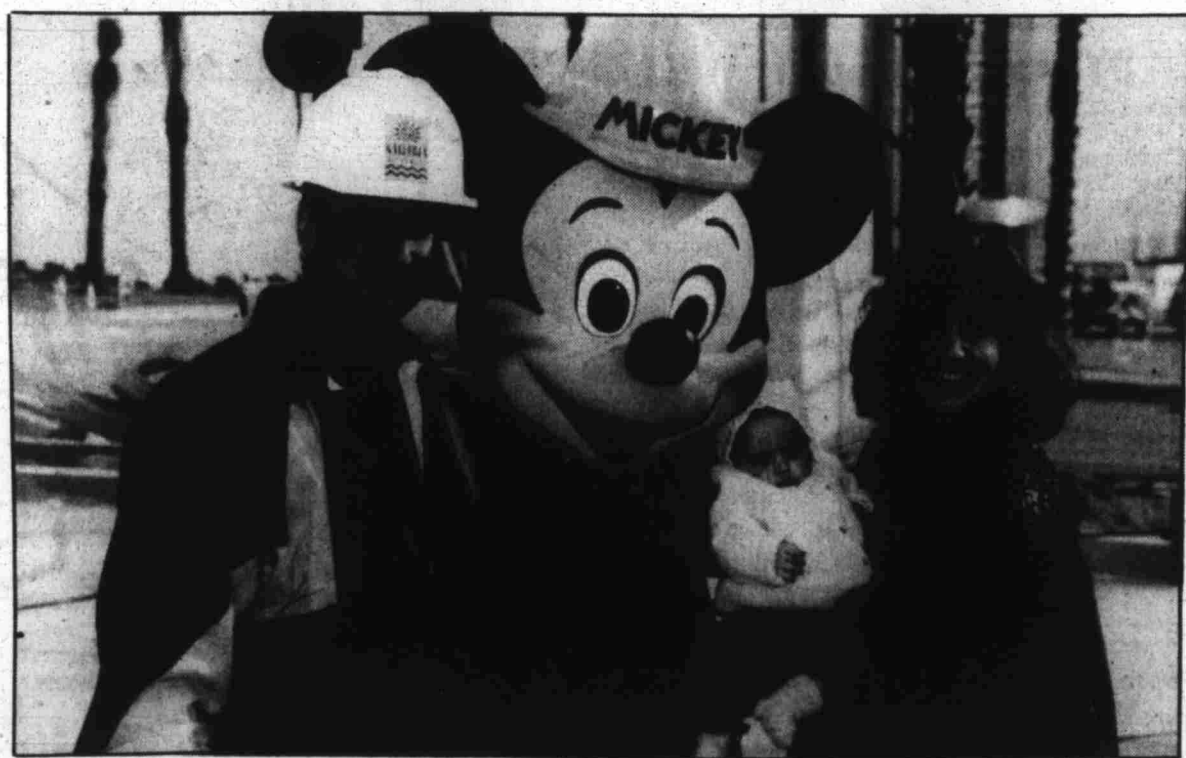

Students master math using Japanese method

Sixth-grader Becky Kreps was struggling in math. She had difficulty keeping up with the other students and was transferred to a special class for extra help.

Then approximately three months ago, Kreps began learning a Japanese math instruction method. At the Green Valley Kumon Math Center, she learned to master math using "old-fashioned" methods such as drill-and-practice.

Kreps is now back in the regular math class, and her grades continue to improve.

Although the Kumon program does not guarantee that a student's grades will increase, this often occurs as the student's math skills become more proficient, she learns better study habits and builds self-esteem, instructor Cyndi Horner said.

The Kumon method is an individualized study program that places emphasis on accuracy and speed. When a student enters the program, he or she is given a diagnostic evaluation test. Work is then assigned according to the student's ability.

A Kumon student must master one skill level before proceeding to the next. This is accomplished through repetition and immediate correction of errors. Students must also be able to complete worksheets within a predetermined time limit.

The Kumon math method is designed to supplement normal school curriculum. It can be used as a remedial or accelerated program, depending on the needs of the child.

Archana Nigam, an elementary school teacher, enrolled her seven-year-old daughter, Anjali, in the Kumon Center because of the challenge it presents and to increase Anjali's self-esteem.

"I think she needs more traditional drill and practice," Nigam said. "This is a low stress level, and they have early success. She has just taken off on it."

Horner encourages her students to spend approximately 20 minutes each day on their Kumon math worksheets. Parents are asked to grade the work as soon as their child has completed it. The students then correct their errors immediately, right after the mistake is made.

Home grading has two purposes, according to the Kumon parents' manual: it motivates the

child and keeps parents informed on their student's progress.

Potential benefits to the child include improved math proficiency, an increased attention span, the ability to complete tasks, improved organizational skills and speed and accuracy.

Students as young as 20 months have enrolled in Kumon Math Centers around the world. The course is also open to adults. Students attending the Green Valley math center range in age from 3 to 13.

Horner, who started the math center partly to help her own children, now has 20 students. Her daughter, Michelle, 10, was enrolled in the program in Cali-

fornia. When Horner moved to the valley, she tried to locate a Kumon Center to continue the instruction, but the program was not taught locally.

Recognizing a potential need, Horner opened the Green Valley Kumon Center in the Renata's Plaza on Sunset Road four months ago. Students attend class every Tuesday and Friday. The center is open from 1:30 p.m. until 5:30 p.m. The enrollment fee is \$70 per month.

The Kumon method of math instruction was started in Japan by educator Toru Kumon. More than 2 million children in 20 different countries are enrolled in the course.
