Marriott's plans for GV before panel

Marriott hopes to bring 323 hotel rooms to Henderson, pending Planning Commission and City Council approval.

American Nevada Corp. is proposing two Marriott hotels in the Green Valley Town Center

ANC plans call for a four-story, 155-room building at 2800 N. Green Valley Parkway, at the corner of Sunset Road, and a fourbuilding complex consisting of 168-rooms at 2190 Olympic Ave., near Ramrod Avenue.

The Planning Commission will rule on the architectural reviews for the project and other unrelated items at 7 p.m. Thursday in City Council Chambers, 240 Water St.

The Courtyard by Marriott, at the corner of Sunset Road, will consist of an 82,000-square-foot building on 4.57 acres currently

zoned community commercial. The courtyard will have a 1,225 square-foot dining area and 1,513 square feet of meeting space.

The Marriott Residence Inn, between Olympic and Ramrod Avenues, will feature a 125,080square-foot building on 4.8 acres currently zoned community commercial. The building will include 944 square feet of meeting area.

anderburg welcomes students

A swell of people gathered at the new Vanderburg Elementary School Monday celebrating the opening of its doors and a return to normal sessions for students.

Following a musical presentation by the Green Valley High School marching band and flag salute by the Basic High School ROTC color guard; students, teachers, parents and others toured the school.

After the tour, students flocked to the rooms to begin their first day at the \$6.1 million school with a regular schedule beginning at 9:05 a.m.

There was more to celebrate than the opening of another school, however, principal Carolyn Reedom said.

"We're very excited about the new building opening for several reasons," she said. "One, there will no longer be double sessions and two, it's a new building with more space."

Reedom, who was previously the principal at McDoniel Elementary School, said the new facility will make things easier for students as more than 1,000 Henderson students from two schools return to a normal class schedule.

"We've made it work and the McCaw School has helped," she said of the previous three month's stay on double sessions at McCaw.

Since August, students from Vanderburg were on double sessions at McCaw. McCaw students attended the first session from 7 a.m. to noon while Vanderburg students attended the afternoon session.

Now that the double sessions are over, Reedom said, the students can settle back into a routine and expand their learning experience at the new building.

The 59,100-square-foot building has more room than other elementary schools, she

Approximately 570 students at the Vanderburg school began to acquaint themselves with the 20-classroom facility on Monday. The school is located south of Lake Mead Drive east of Green Valley Parkway in Green Valley Ranch.

Eight of the classrooms are double-wide and can be divided into two learning areas. If the rooms are divided, the school has the capacity for 28 classrooms and 660 students on a nine-month schedule.

The school is the first of 16

Mountain climbers raise money for Children's Home

Henderson real estate agent Mike Altishin found a new and innovative way to raise money for abused and neglected children - by climbing a mountain.

On Sept. 23-27, Altishin and eight others climbed to the top of the largest glacial peak in the lower 48 U.S. states, Mt. Rainier in Washington. Altishin raised about \$3,000 for the Southern Nevada Children's Home.

Originally, 26 people set out to make the 14,411-foot climb, but only nine made it to the top.

What possessed Altishin to make such a trip? It started when Altishin was at Sunset Park watching people run miniature motor boats in the lake when a little boy from the Southern Nevada Children's Home was drawn to him.

Altishin, 32, said the young boy approached and got really close to him as he talked to the realtor.

"I realized the boy had to be missing something in his life, then I noticed he was with a group of kids," Altishin said.

Altishin talked with the volunteers from the Southern Nevada Children's Home and learned that those children in the park were abused and neglected victims and wards of the

The home tries to get children have the opportunity to enjoy. short and long-term foster care

but the ultimate goal is to reunite the children with their birth parents. Altishin said the volunteers told him that doesn't happen often enough, and there are children who have lived at the home for four years.

Altishin visited the Children's Home and noticed the kids had life's basics but didn't have any extras like toys or baseball leagues - things many children

While Altishin was at the

Children's Home, he saw a little boy pulling on his shirt and mumbling to himself. He asked one of the volunteers what the

boy was saying. The volunteer told Altishin the boy was proud of the new shirt he was wearing and wanted to show it to him.

Altishin said the shirt didn't look new. "If anybody deserves a

Cyphers calls ethics complaint 'fishy'

Councilman Amanda Cyphers is calling an ethics complaint against her "frivolous" and "fishy."

Henderson resident Charles Caplinger filed a letter of complaint against Cyphers with the Nevada Commission on Ethics Nov. 25.

Caplinger, citing an Aug. 20
Home News story, claims
Cyphers acted unethically by
voting for a project for the
American Nevada Corp. after
speaking in favor of the project.

"Councilwoman Amanda Cyphers strongly advocated for American Nevada Corporation's cause in the local newspaper," he said in his letter. "...and then voted for their petition that evening. Should she not have reclused herself in that vote since she had declared herself an advocate for the petitioner?"

"In my opinion, I believe this

is the beginning of the retaliation for me airing the city's dirty laundry to the public," Cyphers said.

Cyphers, who spoke out against City Hall during a recent news media report, said the ethics investigation was motivated to tarnish her reputation as a Councilman.

"It smells funny. It smells very fishy," she said of the complaint wondering why it took three months after the questioned action for the letter to be filed.

The complaint stems from Cyphers speaking in favor of plans by ANC to build a casino in the Green Valley Ranch area of Henderson. Said Cyphers "You don't spend millions and billions of your dollars and create an eyesore."

She continued, saying that ANC's plans will not detract from the neighborhood because of their commitment to the community.

During discussions for the proposed casino, she said, she

had spoken to Caplinger for as long as an hour explaining her position and why she believed it was beneficial for the city. During the discussion, she recalled, he was fine with her actions concerning the project.

"If there's a perception there [that she supports ANC], then the perception is wrong," Cyphers said.

"I look at each project as how it is beneficial for the community," she said.

Cyphers added that Caplinger, who heads a group called Henderson Citizens for Ethical and Efficient Government, should have known better than to file a complaint which should not be taken seriously.

"For a group that is for an ethical government, filing a frivolous complaint is unethical itself because it is abusing the power of government by wasting [its] time," she said.

An ethics hearing regarding the complaint has not been set.

and Casino, 1951 Sunset Village Circle, southwest of Sunset Road and Mountain Vista Street. The project, proposed for the Green Valley North planning area, is located on 17 acres.

The four-story, 192-room hotel is proposed for 106,632 square feet. The casino area will consist of 84,000 square feet.

According to Henderson's Comprehensive Plan, the area for the proposed hotel-casino is unsuitable for casino uses because it lies within an identified "center" called the Sunset and Mountain Vista Business Corridor.

Since the proposed casino lays in the center, there is a conflict of uses, city staff concluded from the plan.

City staff has recommended denial for the project.

• Review an amendment to the master sign plan of Sunset Station Hotel and Casino, 1301 W. Sunset Road. Representatives are seeking signs for the entire site and are entitled by city codes to 17 freestanding signs totaling 26,801 square feet. Staff has recommended approval for the project.

•Consider an architectural review of a proposed addition to Berry Plastics, 800 E. Horizon Dr., in the Highland Hills planning area. Representatives for the business are seeking a 40,800-square-foot addition to the existing warehouse. Staff has recommended approval for the project.

•Consider an architectural review for The Original Pancake House at 2020 W. Sunset Road in the Green Valley North planning area. The proposed restaurant will be located in the Green Valley Business Park. The building will be 4,388 square feet. Staff has recommended approval for the project.

•Hear a use permit request for Chevy's Mexican Restaurant at 1300 W. Sunset Road in the Galleria at Sunset Mall. The restaurant will be located in the upper level of the mall. Staff has recommended approval for the item.

Wireless franchise fee before Council

A requirement of wireless communications companies to pay a franchise fee to the city of Henderson is expected to increase revenues for the city. However, it will also increase fees for users.

The item and other unrelated business will be discussed at a City Council committee meeting at 6:45 p.m. tonight. The regular meeting is set to begin at 7 p.m. in Council Chambers, 240 Water

The proposed ordinance stems from a state Senate bill requiring municipalities to determine franchise fees on utilities.

If approved, the city will charge a 5% franchise fee to utilities and the fee will raise customers' rates, said an industry official.

Helen Foley, a representative of 360° Communications, said applying the franchise fee to the wireless communication industry will force the utility to raise rates for customers.

Prior to the proposed ordinance, the city had no requirement to charge fees to cellular communications utilities.

Also part of the ordinance, franchise fees for other telephone utilities will be expanded to include intra-state long distance when computing how much the utility pays to the city.

Sprint Central Telephone pays Henderson a franchise fee of \$504,000 bi-annually. Including intra-state long distance could add as much as \$250,000 to Henderson's revenues bi-annually

This increase in the fee to the telephone utilities would likely raise rates for customers, Councilman Amanda Cyphers said.

In other business, the Council is expected to:

•Rule on a use permit request for a wireless communication monopole at 2525 Windmill Parkway, in the Green Valley South planning area. The proposed 55-foot monopole is unique in that it has no antennae protruding from the top like many other poles, said Planning Chairman Bob Unger. Planners recommend approval for the item.

•Hear a city requirement for a reclaimed water reservoir at Foothills at MacDonald Ranch. The 1.5 million-gallon reservoir was tabled Nov. 19 after Public Works Department staff motioned for a continuance to arrange financial obligations to fund the project.

•Rule on an ordinance to amend Henderson's municipal code by establishing height limits for freestanding signs. The ordinance is proposed to help minimize light pollution for residents. The Council tabled the item Nov. 19 to allow for more time to review the document and



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

An avid golfer, Sagers is coach of the Green Valley High School conference, zone, and state championship mens and womens



Tax facts on charitable contribution

December is the month when people are most likely to open their hearts and their checkbooks. Whether you're touched by the season or motivated by a tax deduction, the Nevada Society of CPAs suggests you familiarize vourself with the rules covering charitable deductions -and you'd better hurry. In order to claim a deduction on your 1996 tax return, you must mail your check or deliver donated property by the last day of the year.

In order to claim a charitable contribution, you must itemize your deductions on Schedule A of the federal tax return. The gift must be made to a qualified organization, such as a nonprofit religious, educational, scientific or charitable organization meeting IRS standards.

The amount of the deduction may depend on both the type of charity and nature of property contributed. However, donations to needy individuals and families are not deductible.

Donations of cash In most cases, cash donations MONEY MANAGEMENT

are fully deductible. However, if you get something in return, you may not be able to write off the

full amount of your contribution. For example, a \$150 ticket to a fund-raising charity ball includes dinner. If the value of the dinner is \$50, the deduction is limited to \$100, the difference between the price of the ticket and what as received in exchange. For gifts of

more than \$75, the law requires charities to advise contributors of the non-deductible amount.

The write-off is also limited when participating in a charity raffle. If there is a chance to win something, the law says it is gambling, not giving. There is no charitable deduction, but the costs for raffle or lottery tickets can be deducted against any kind of gambling winnings.

With a contribution of \$250 or more in cash or property, you must have a contemporaneous written receipt from the charity. For donations less than that amount, a cancelled check will suffice.

Property donations

The easiest way to contribute to charities is to write checks, but donations of property-from used clothing to valuable antiques can earn tax deductions also. With donated property, the deduction is generally equal to the fair market value of the property at the time you give it.

If the total value exceeds \$500, in addition to getting a contemporaneous written receipt, Form 8283, Noncash Charitable Contributions, must be filed with the tax return.

If donating a single item or group of items valued at more than \$5,000, an appraisal must be obtained from a qualified appraiser to determine the property's

To make the most of charitable contributions, consider the tax advantage of donating appreciated capital gains property that has been owned for more than a year, such as shares of stock or a mutual fund.

When donating long-term property that has appreciated in value, you earn a deduction for the property's fair market value and never have to pay capital gains tax on its appreciation. By contrast, if you donate cash and keep the appreciated assets, you'll face capital gains taxes when the sell the asset.

Volunteer-related expenses

In addition to deductions for contributions of cash or goods to charity, expenses incurred doing volunteer work on behalf of a charity can generally be written off. While claiming the value of time or services is not allowable, unreimbursed expenses can be deducted, such as the cost of telephone calls, stamps, stationery and other materials, as well as 50% of meal expenses and the cost and care of a required uniform while performing volunteer ser-

If a car is driven in connection with volunteer activities, a deduction of 12 cents per mile, plus other cash expenses, such as tolls and parking, is allowed. If using public transportation, fares can be counted as charitable deduc-

Beyond local transportation expenses, you may be able to write off the cost of travel, including meals and lodging, should volunteer efforts require an overnight stay away from home. There are limits on the deductibility of such expenses when there is an personal or vacation aspect to a trip. Don't underestimate tax

If you're anticipating a big tax bill this year, consider making extra charitable donations before year-end. Charitable gifts reduce taxable income and, in turn, your

If it sounds like Maddux is your typical next door neighbor type, you would be right.

"That's who I am," he said when asked about his down-toearth attitude. "I just happen to have a different job."

Rodger Fairless, Maddux's baseball coach at Valley in the mid-1980s, said what you see in Maddux is what you get.

"He's just a good kid." Fairless said. "He's a true baseball hero. He's the kind of person a kid can idolize. He just goes out and does his job."

But, Fairless said there is a drive in Maddux.

"His competitiveness is there," Fairless said. "He doesn't like to lose. You'll see."

Indeed.

Put a baseball or a golf club in his hands and he becomes a fierce competitor.

On this day, he shows solid golf skills from his monster drives to solid long irons, to deft chips to clutch putts.

A few examples:

· He drives the green on No. 18 at Wildhorse - no easy task with the hole playing about 310 yards with water in front.

· He sinks two 20-foot putts as the fifth and final putter in our group - again, no easy task.


