# **Sunset Station tops off**

Brighter days are rising for the Sunset Station Hotel and Casino, Henderson's first gaming resort scheduled to open.

Construction workers dusted off their coveralls and Station Casino representatives joined in the fun Friday to celebrate the final beam placed on top of the Henderson development at Sunset Road and Stephanie Street.

Scheduled to open sometime during June or July, the toppingoff ceremony marks the beginning for a final phase of construction for the project.

There was no added pressure or diversion from Station Casino's plans while developing the area's first gaming resort, said General Manager Don Marrandino. Like all other Sta-

tion Casino projects, Sunset Station will make the customer

"Our primary concern is to make it fun for all," Marrandino said.

An underlying factor of the fun, however, are the benefits the opening of the property will have on the area, he said. "[When the Sunset Station

opens,] we'll have several hundred thousand of people coming to the area to discover what it's all about," he said.

"They will visit the mall across the street and stop at local restaurants," he said.

With the influx of people visiting the area, Marrandino said, he expects more valley residents to become familiar with Henderson and discover it as an area to spend their leisure time.


Sitting on 100 acres across

from the Galleria at Sunset Mall. Sunset Station will include a 20story hotel with 500 rooms and is estimated to employ 2,000 people.

The main facility will be 360,000 square feet. Also featured is a 13-screen movie theater which has been operational since May 1996.

Following the theme of a Spanish/Mediterranean railway station, the property will be European in design and architecture, Marrandino said. Glazed roof tiles, fountains, ceramic tiled columns and a ceiling painting of the sky will be prominent throughout. Another feature which will make the resort stand out will be brilliant colors, including shades of red

# Middle school students submit banner to contest

Thousands of middle school students are participating in a national art event, "Wave Your Banner: Exploring Community Through Art," sponsored by the Getty Education Institute for the Arts.

Working as a team with classmates and their teacher, children at Burkholder Middle School created a colorful 3-foot x 4-foot banner from fabric, paint and mixed media to illustrate the unique qualities of their community.

In May, one banner from each state will be selected for outdoor display at the Getty Center in Los Angeles, scheduled to topen in late 1997. The visual arts and humanities complex will feature the new J. Paul Getty Museum, conservation laboratories, research facilities, a multi- purpose auditorium and extensive public gardens.

The rest of the banners submitted will also be exhibited electronically on ArtsEdNet, the Getty Education Institute's Web site (www.artsednet. getty.edu.)

Leilani Lattin Duke, director of the Getty Education Institute for the Arts, said, "The project is meant to enrich students and teachers in every middle school classroom, and to help demonstrate the value an education in the arts brings to students and their communities."

All entries will be reviewed by a selection com-

mittee. State finalists will be selected by a random drawing. To qualify for the drawing, entries will be judged for creativity, artistic merit and a comprehensive approach to making and understanding art (art produc-tion, art history, art criticism and aesthetics).

The two-year project will culminate with the three-day "Kids Congress on Art," to be held at the new Getty Center in late fall 1997.

One student from each finalist classroom, with an accompanying parent, teacher or administrator, will travel to Los Angeles for the Congress to participate in workshops with prominent artists and arts educators.

They will also tour significant art and cultural sites, including the Getty Center, the new Getty Museum, artists' studios and creative centers of the entertainment industry.

The Institute is dedicated to improving the quality and status of arts education in schools. It initiates and supports programs in four areas:

advocacy for the value of art in education; professional development for teachers and administrators in schools and universities; theory development; and curriculum development.

Students from area high schools obtained a first-hand look at the world outside of school-the professional world, during the 33rd annual "Boss for a Day" program Thursday.

The program, coordinated by the Henderson Chamber of Commerce, is designed to allow students to take a realistic look at how businesses actually operate from the inside and to allow them to experience a job they may wish to pursue in their future.

In addition to the first-hand observation, they learned the educational prerequisites of their respective fields of interest, including information about what college courses or training is needed to enter a certain profession.

More than 80 local businesses participated and 168 high school students were selected to participate in a typical workday of area businesses.

Students from Green Valley High School, Basic High School and Lake Mead Christian Academy indicated their area or field of interest and were matched to spend a day observing and asking questions about a specific occupation.

Alice Martz, executive director of the Chamber of Commerce, said, "I like the program because businesses take the time to show students what is going on in the professional and work world and how businesses are run."

Among the participants was the city of Henderson. Students were assigned to different department heads and staff

# **Muni Court** to charge new fee

People using the Henderson Municipal Court system will now have to pay an additional \$10 administrative fee on sentences imposed by a Municipal Court Judge.

The Henderson City Council approved the ordinance Tuesday, and the Henderson Municipal Court started imposing the fee Thursday.

According to Municipal Court Judge Ken Proctor, Henderson is the last city in the valley to put the administrative fee into effect.

When a defendant pleads guilty, guilty but mentally ill or is found guilty of a misdemeanor, including the violation of any municipal ordinance, the municipal judge will include in the sentence the \$10 fee as an administrative assessment for the provision of court facilities.

The administrative fee is not included in the fine but is taxed against the defendant in addition to the fine. If the defendant is found not guilty or the charges are dismissed, the money deposited with the court will be returned to the defendant.

The money raised from the fee will go into a fund that can only be used for future municipal court expansion.

"It was our feeling that the plan for expansion is now, rather than waiting for the need [to arise] to try to find the money," Proctor said.

Proctor said if Henderson's growth continues at its present rate, the fund will be needed.

"I would expect in two to three years, we'll need a third judge, then in two to three more years, we'll need a fourth judge," Proctor added.

Legislation passed in 1995 allows counties with populations exceeding 400,000 people to charge the \$10 fee to all those convicted in municipal court.

"Legislation saw the need for future construction of court facilities throughout the state," Proctor said. "They want to implement a method to generate funds for future construction."

He added a bill going through the Legislature will extend the right to all cities and counties to charge the fee.

When asked about alternative methods for raising revenues Proctor cited raising taxes and promoting bond issues.

"Implementing the \$10 fee seemed like the least offensive method," Proctor said.

Court officials anticipate that

the administrative fee will gerate about \$800,000 in reven over the next five years.

# Tuesday posed difficult questions in newsrooms

Tuesday, Feb. 4, 1997, reminded me a lot of another date in history, Tuesday, Jan. 20, 1981.

It was on that day when the American hostages in Iran were released and Ronald Reagan was sworn in as president of the United States. The two events were related as the Iranians did not want to release the hostages until Jimmy Carter was officially out of office. It was a stunning news day, filled with memorable images and difficult decisions in newsrooms.

I saved the San Diego Tribune's Page 1 from that day because it was easy to see that was the end of one era and the beginning of another in recent American history. It is hanging on my office wall right now.

This past Tuesday was not nearly as momentous. But two big, unrelated stories occurred simultaneously and more difficult decisions had to be made in newsrooms across the country.

The O.J. Simpson civil case verdict was handed down as the same time as President Clinton gave the first State of the Union address of his second term.

Timing is everything for broadcast media. A verdict was ready about two hours before Clinton was scheduled to speak, but the judge delayed the

announcements until all the main figures in the case could be present in the courtroom.

MSNBC, CNBC, Headline News and the E Channel devoted most of those two hours to Simpson speculation. The major networks went with Clinton's delivery and just as he was wrapping it up, about 7 p.m. our time, the first verdict was announced: Simpson would be held liable for the death of his ex-wife Nicole and Ron Goldman.

Ironies mounted throughout the evening.

 In a high-tech news-gathering world, the decision was relayed by kindergartenlike flash cards from a media trailer where the audio feed from the courtroom was set

· A helicopter again followed Simpson in a car, this time stopping at a local ice cream shop after the verdicts.

•When the low-speed Bronco chase occurred in June 1994, the Houston Rockets were playing the New York Knicks in the NBA Finals. NBC, for a time, had a split screen with the game and the chase. Tuesday, the Rockets and the Knicks were again playing.



Clinton and his advisors were likely very concerned that their message would not get through and indeed the story appeared on the bottom of the fold of most major newspapers the next day in favor of the Simpson verdict.

On the other hand, many more Americans were near their TVs Tuesday because they were

awaiting Simpson news and were more likely to catch a few minutes of the president's speech.

What Clinton had to say makes more of an impact on our lives than whether Simpson was found liable, but the Simpson case has been such a major part of our culture for the past few years.

Give the networks credit for making a difficult decision to run with the president and leave the speculative buildup to the E channel and others who have been on the O.J. watch for so long.

What will Geraldo Rivera and Charles Grodin talk about after this week?

# **GVHS** wins Science Bowl, represents state

Green Valley High School defeated Valley High in the Regional Science Bowl Competition, and will represent Nevada in the National Science Bowl, May 2-5, at the National 4-H Center in Chevy Chase, Md.

The Nevada Regional Science Bowl, sponsored by the U.S. Department of Energy's Nevada Operations Office, paired 31 teams in an academic competition on astronomy, biology, chemistry, computer science, earth science, mathematics and physics.

The winning team was coached by teachers Michelle Sonnelitter and Carl Jarvinen. Team members Karamveer S. Jhawar, Joshua M. Peltier, Shia-Ying Fang, Andrew Hagopian and Steve Col were undefeated during the entire competition.

More than 100 students representing Nevada and Utah high schools competed in the fifth annual event at UNLV. The university was one of the many local sponsors of the competition. Other DOE-sponsored regional science bowls are held across the country.

Green Valley received \$2,000 from the Nevada Operations Office to be used for the school's science and mathematics departments. Valley placed second and received \$1,500 from the Desert Research Institute.

Reno's Team A finished third and received \$1,000 from a joint contribution by Science Applications International Corporation and Community Action Recycling Program. Fourth-place Clark High received \$500 from UNLV.

DOE established the Science Bowl in 1991 to motivate highschool students to pursue scientific and technical careers and promote science and mathematics literacy.

Two four-member teams match academic expertise. Questions may be multiple-choice or shortanswer, in the areas of chemistry, biology, physics, mathematics, astronomy, earth science or computer science.

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# **Construction booms in Lake Mead Corridor**

Development along Green Valley Parkway near Lake Mead Drive has begun to boom as businesses and merchants begin to establish services along the "Lake Mead Corridor."

Three projects by the 'American Nevada Corp. will provide residents with services in the area which six months ago largely laid vacant.

"The beltway's coming through in 1998 and will open the area up for more development," said American Nevada Corp. representative Trish Lee.

Lee said the development along Green Valley Parkway is preparing the area for an expected interest from area business people and residents as they look for a place to work and live.


Development is blossoming, she said, because once the beltway is finished, it will link the area of Henderson to other businesses in Las Vegas and the airport within minutes.

ANC's Tech Park, Corporate she said.

"A lot of businesses are establishing themselves along the Lake Mead Corridor anticipating further development," she said.

The Tech Park features 60,000 square feet of space across two buildings. The multi-phased project has already attracted Nextlink, a provider of telecommunications services, who leased a 33,000-square-foot space. The company will be fully operational by May.

Six buildings totaling 200,000 square feet of space will be of-

> fered at the project for businesses. The research and development/ office space may feature businesses which offer storage and light distribution.

Phase one of the project cost approximately \$3.9 million.

Of interest to residents to the area, Lee said, is the Pebble Beach Market Place.

The shopping center is to feature a Smith's supermarket to open in early April.

Jeff Becker, an ANC repre-

sentative who is in charge of the project, said a total of 160,000 square feet of shopping and related stores will be offered at the plaza.

Already operational, he said. is a Bank of America which is located in a parcel in the parking lot of the plaza. Additional restaurants and a proposed medical facility are also planned for outparcels in the plaza.

In addition to planned businesses located in the parking lot area of the plaza, he said, the

plaza itself will feature many additional service-based busi-

Becker said stores surrounding Smith's will be similar to those at other area locations. but will cater to the community more by offering specialty stores such as up-scale bakeries and other stores.

Additional development along Green Valley Parkway includes the corporate center which will be home for a variety of officebased businesses.

To help provide area elderly services, representatives from Delmar Gardens will present plans this week to develop the remainder of its facility in the Green Valley South area.

The Henderson Planning Commission will meet at 7 p.m. Thursday in City Council Chambers, 240 Water St. to hear plans for the facility and other unrelated items during a regular meeting.

Before plans for the facility can proceed, planners must rule on a comprehensive plan amendment, zone change, use permit and architectural review for a new phase for the center.

Representatives of Delmar Gardens, 100 Delmar Gardens Dr. south of Wigwam Parkway, are proposing a 116-bed facility in 64 single-story apartments for elderly care. The new phase will be attached to the existing

# **DOE Extends Comment Period** on Proposed Yucca Mountain Regulations to March 17, 1997

The U.S. Department of Energy (DOE) is proposing to amend its guidelines for recommending potential repository sites. The proposed amendments would establish site-specific guidelines for evaluating the suitability of Yucca Mountain for development as a repository. The proposed amendments focus on the ability of a repository system at the Yucca Mountain site to protect health and safety by adequately containing and isolating waste, rather than on evaluating each technical aspect of the site independently.

The comments received will assist the DOE in the rulemaking process. Please note that, although the original notice of proposed rulemaking stated that the written comment period is open until February 14, 1997, DOE has extended this written comment period by 31 days in response to a number of requests received from the public. The written comment period will now end March 17, 1997. All written comments must be received by this date to ensure consideration by DOE. Comments may be submitted by U.S. Mail to: April Gil, U.S. Department of Energy, Office of Civilian Radioactive Waste Management, Yucca Mountain Site Characterization Office, Docket No. RW-RM-96-100, P.O. # Free guided hikes at Lake Mead

Valley residents have a national park in their own backyard - the Lake Mead National Recreation area is twice the size of Rhode Island and is the third largest area of the National Park System outside Alaska.

The cooler temperatures offer residents and visitors the opportunity to explore the natural beauty of Lake Mead National Recreation Area so the National Park Service is inviting the public to join a free guided hike each Saturday morning until April 5.

"Exploring the Lake Mead area can make you realize what diverse life is there," said Karen Whitney, NPS public information officer.

Only a small amount of the Lake Mead Recreational Area is water-based, about 13%. The other 87% is land-based. The land includes trails, desert flowers and wildlife, including lizzards, bobcats, Big Horn sheep, even a mountain lion or two.

"The desert is a surprisingly diverse place ... You can see the plant's adaptations to store water and the adaptations animals make to protect themselves from the heat," Whitney added.

People walk at their own pace on the hikes that vary in length and difficulty and explore wash bottoms, rock canyons and alternative trails.

Whitney said of the other 374 national park units, Lake Mead is the third most used with three times more visitors than Yellowstone or Yosemite.

"Going on a hike is good way to get acquainted with the desert ... It makes it/less threatening if you go with a group," Whitney

"This way you can get a taste of the desert with a guide who can make new people comfortable with the area."

Tourists also can learn about the history of the area and view prehistoric rock art and petrographs.

Planned hikes will go to the Liberty Bell Arch, Wetlands Trail, and Horsethief Canyon. Whitney said long pants and sunglasses are recommended.

Reservations can be made two weeks in advance starting on

the program is attributed to its family orientation. "As Henderson continues to grow, there's an increasing demand for family activities that do not separate family members," she said.



throughout the city. They went through a normal day's activities, learning how bosses and supervisors make decisions, delegate work and interact with the public and other agencies.

Observers were assigned to city departments including the Mayor's Office, City Manager, City Attorney, Fire Administration, Fire Prevention, Municipal Court; the Police-Department and 11 other departments.

Ten students spent the day with the Henderson Police Department, getting an overview of the entire facility.

After the department orienation, they learned about specific branches, including animal control, dispatch, records and other administrative posts.

Although students are the "Boss for the Day," they spend more time observing than dictating.

Henderson Police administrative secretary Gloria Campman said she enjoys spending time with the students.

The only drawback is they [city administration] don't let them [the students] give us a raise," Campman joked.



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

# Personal financial plans: Mapping your fiscal future

If you think only the wealthy need personal financial plans, . think again. Apersonal financial plan serves as a road map to a financial future by identifying financial goals, assessing current financial position, and providing strategies for reaching goals.

Plain and simple, it can help you make the most of your money. The Nevada Society of CPAs provides a step-by-step overview for preparing a financial plan.

#### Set financial goals

If you were planning a long road trip, most likely you would have a destination in mind. When it comes to planning a financial future, goals serve as a destination, pointing you in the right direction.

Do you want to save for a down

payment on a house or for a European vacation? Over the long term, are you planning to send your children to college or retire

Be sure to put specific shortand long-term goals in writing to help you stay on course.

Anticipate that there will be stops along the way. Some might be expected—getting married, buying a home, or having children. Others might come as a surprise—you may lose your job or become unable to work, or, on the brighter side, you could win the lottery or come into a large inheritance.

Determine net worth

The next step is to determine where you currently stand financially. Put together a personal balance sheet of assets - what you own - such as the value of investments, retirement plan. and home. It also should show liabilities - what you owe-such as mortgage, home equity loans and credit card balances. The difference between the total value of what you own and what you owe is your net worth.

To accomplish goals, you need to make net worth grow. Basically, there are four ways to increase net worth: through money saved from earnings; through income from savings and investments and increases in the market value of investments; by building equity in a home; and by reducing debt.

Two financial exercises to help build net worth are preparing a budget and devising an investment plan.

Prepare a budget

Before preparing a budget, it's helpful to put together a cash flow statement tracking income and expenses over a period of time. By analyzing the cash flow statement, you should be able to see if you spend too much in certain categories and not enough in others. It is then up to you to establish a budget setting spending limits and generating income for saving toward goals. Keep in mind the more realistic a budget, and the more realistic you are about sticking to it, the better the chance of meeting goals.

Devise an investment plan

As assets grow, an investment strategy becomes another important element of a financial plan. Begin by investigating different investment options. such as stocks, bonds, and mutual funds to determine which work best. As you divide assets among different investments, be sure the allocation is consistent with financial goals, tolerance for risk, and investment time

frame. Also, be sure your portfolio is diversified; a sensible mix can reduce risk and improve long-term returns.

Protect your assets

Building assets is important, but it's equally important to protect assets. You'll want to be sure you have adequate life, medical, disability, property loss, and personal liability insurance. And, since needs always change, reevaluate these plans annually.

Many people seriously underestimate the value of their estates. If your net worth statement shows you're worth close to one-half million dollars, you. should seriously consider the need for an estate plan. Learn how wills, living trusts, and other

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estate planning tools can help save federal estate taxes.

As you prepare your personal financial plan, you may want to consult with a CPA who can also advise on the role taxes play in the plan.


