### CCSD break-up discussed

Henderson residents will be given the opportunity to voice their opinions about the proposed school district deconsolidation at a town hall meeting in City Council Chambers, 240 Water St. at 7 p.m. Wednesday.

Citizens for Community Schools will hold the meeting to support Senate Bill 144, which may allow communities to create their own school districts.

This legislation resulted from the 1996 interim study committee and MAP report which examined school district structure in Nevada.

Currently, state statute dictates school district boundaries by county. This proposed legislation would change this law.

#### **Perkins, Titus** to host **Town Hall**

Assemblyman Richard Perkins and Senator Dina Titus will hold a legislative town hall meeting at 2 p.m. Saturday, April 26, in the Henderson City Council Chambers. The town hall meeting will follow the annual Heritage Days Parade in Hend-

Perkins and Titus represent most of Henderson except the Green Valley area. Perkins serves as the Assembly Majority Leader, and Titus is the Senate Majority Leader.

The town hall will offer Henderson residents the opportunity ask questions and air their views about the issues facing the 1997 Legislature.

### High school before panel

#### Campus would open 1999-2000

The Henderson Planning Commission will discuss an item this week which the Clark County School District anticipates will save \$10 million in taxpayers' money while also alleviating overcrowding for area high schools.

At a Thursday meeting, the Henderson Planning Commission will review a zone change, use permit and architectural review for a high school at 800 College Dr., in the Highland Hillsplanning

Planners will meet at 7 p.m., in City Council Chambers, 240 Water St., to discuss the school item and other unrelated items.

By using an agreement approved last fall by CCSD, a new Henderson high school will give students the best of both academic worlds - high school and college.

"It will allow students to take college classes while attending high school," said Dusty Dickens, director of demographics, zoning and realty for the CCSD.

She added that when high school is not in session, the college can use the vacant facility to supply adequate space for classes. With the CCSD and Community College sharing expenses for part of the facility, she said, both save on construction costs. The college had planned on building an expansion prior to the high school being constructed.

"It allows us to maximize our use. It's a win-win for everyone," Dickens said.

Anticipated to house 2,700 students, the school will likely draw students from the Basic, Silverado and Green Valley high school areas. A new school will supply education for the rapidly growing area of southern Henderson. The school is expected to open during the 1999-2000 school year.

Located at the corner of College and Heather Drives, the high school will be adjacent to the existing freeway interchange and the Community College of Southern Nevada. Planning staff's report states that once the school is completed, it is believed the high school and college will share various academic programs.

Constructed as a one- and twostory building, the 47-acre site will include a football field with 120-foot high light poles. Colors for the project include yellow, light blue and light orange.

In other news, planners are expected to:

•Rule on an architectural review for Fonzi's entertainment, dining and gaming facility. The project, on 5.6 acres at 1250 W. Sunset Road, in the Whitney Ranch planning area, is located on an outparcel for the Galleria at Sunset Mall. A 78,800-square-foot building with an entertainment center, restaurants, shops, meeting rooms and a casino are proposed. The application has been tabled at earlier planning meetings. ### FBI stats reveal decrease in violent crimes

Statistics released earlier this year from the FBI uniform crime reporting data for the city of Henderson reveal an overall reduction for Class 1 crimes.

The 4.3% reduction for Class 1 crimes includes murder, forcible rape, robbery, aggravated assault, burglary, larceny-theft, vehicletheft, and arson.

The numbers are as follows:

Henderson's population escalated to 132,560 in 1996 from 119.147 in 1995, an increase of approximately 11%.

Although the city saw increases in murder, from three in 1995 to eight in 1996, aggravated assault and burglary, decreases were recorded in forcible rape, robbery, larceny-theft, vehicle theft and

Henderson Police Chief Tommy Burns said, "In 1990, we had seven murders...the next year we had two murders in 1991, and homicides remained low until 1996, so there is no explanation.

Burns explained homicide for police is difficult to prevent, but there are rare exceptions. Domestic violence is one example, he said.

Statistics have shown counseling, intervention and follow-up helps in preventing domestic violence and consequently possible homicide, he said.

"He's [Young] been interested reads anything he can get his hands on. ..." Thompson said.



"From every indication, we're still the fastest-growing community in the nation," he said. Contrary to what political campaigns allege the growth will do to the area, he added, the city's

growth is beneficial. "People talk and I'm tired of biting my lip," he said. Many of the dangers being spoken about concerning negative aspects of growth, he said, are campaign

If growth is planned for, a community can thrive, he said.

"I think the business community is going to continue to thrive. I think we're going to continue to

years," he said.

Businesses such as Levi Strauss, Ocean Spray, the Auto Mall and Galleria Mall are a testament to the area's growth during his four years in office, he said. I've lived here a little more than 10

When exactly can I call myself a

Well, I guess I never can, by definition. But I really do feel like an old-timer when I tell people of those days long past when there was just one senior high school, when I could count the number of traffic signals in the city with the fingers of just two hands, when the background material for Planning Commission and City Council meetings was just 20 pages, when Sunset Road was just two lanes and a whole bunch of desert.

When I arrived to work in Henderson in 1986, the population of the city was just under 40,000 people. More than 100,000 people have moved here in 10 years.

Heritage Days and the municipal campaigns for Mayor and City Council is as good a time as any to consider the pros and cons of our growth, to reflect on where Henderson has been and where it's going.

If you're lucky enough to visit with a candidate for office in person, chief among your questions has to be: Should we try to slow growth? Is it possible to slow growth? Can we agree on a definition of quality growth?

Yes, our swelling population has provided many wonderful economic opportunities, brought nearly every imaginable kind of store and restaurant to within a 10-minute drive of every home and sparked the construction of resort-hotels.

But the growth has also brought traffic headaches and overcrowded schools, diminished the desert landscape, and increased the threat of crime. That hometown feel to which residents had grown accustomed is in danger every step of the

The spirit of a Homecoming football game the entire town relishes still flourishes in small towns across the country. But Henderson's spirit is now divided three ways among senior high schools and soon four ways.

The wonder of an intimate political campaign, where are few hundred votes make or break a candidate, has passed away. Now a few thousand votes are needed, and races are decided by voters who weren't even here during the last round of municipal elections.

The special places where residents go to



have fun change each year Who but a few visionaries could have imagined the Arroyo Grande Sports Complex, the Galleria at Sunset mall, the dancing fountains of the Green Valley Town Center or a Jack-Nicklaus-designed golf course on a man-made

This is not meant to lament days gone by or blindly cheer every piece of

development that comes along - it's only a reflection of someone who in most places would still be considered a newcomer. But in the hyper-changing landscape of Henderson, is most accurately a weathered, wary old-timer.

It takes all kinds of people to craft the Henderson we call home in 1997 - the industrial leaders, the developers, the bankers, the teachers and the laborers. They all should be remembered during this and every Heritage Days. Keep in mind that one day, these will be considered the "good old days."

Crimes per thousand for Henderson in 1995 were 42.4 based on a 119,000 population. Nevada's average was 67 crimes per thousand and nationwide it was 53, indicating Henderson's crime rate to be lower than the state and national average.

According to the Henderson Police Department crime statistics, even with the city's population increase from 1995 to 1996, Henderson's crimes per thousand decreased to 38 crimes per thousand based on a 132,560 population.

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

growth since 1992 include: business licenses increasing 52%, building permits issues increasing 116% and the city's assessed valuation increasing 90%.

During 1996; there were 15,710 building permits issued compared to 7,267 in 1992. Last year also saw 7,746 business licenses issued as 1992 posted 5,083. The city's assessed valuation has increased from \$1 billion in 1992 to \$1.9 billion in 1996.

The mayor said figures projected for 1998 total approximately \$2.8 billion in assessed valua-

"That represents a 171% increase from 1992," Groesbeck said. Other indicators point to Henderson as a premier commu-

nity, he said. The current population is approximately 145,000. During 1980, the population was 24,000. By the year 2000, according to projected population growth. Henderson will overtake Reno as the second largest city in the state with 185,000 residents, he said.

"In the four years I've been in office, we've never raised your

taxes one cent," he said, adding Henderson has one of the lowest tax rates in the state.

helped build an economically diverse community and supply jobs for residents, he said.

City Manager Phil Speight addressed some key concerns the city has.

> Additionally, he said, talk of legislators passing an infrastructure bill will also be negative for Henderson.

> "It [an infrastructure bill] will subsidize parks and recreation for the whole valley," he said.

"We will not get any parks because they will not subsidize any parks until everyone catches up with us," Speight said.

The city holds the same view for proposed tax equity for the county, he said.

Henderson enjoys the lowest tax rate in the county, with the exception of Boulder City. By equalizing taxes to supply services, the city's taxes would likely be raised, he said.


Fielding a question from the audience concerning air quality from the BMI complex, Speight said most problems occur because of the Timet plant.

Accidents at the plant have concerned city officials, but steps are being taken. A BMI steering committee meets regularly to assess all businesses at the site.

Additionally, he said, Timethas agreed to conduct an industrial audit to further determine what may be done to minimize accidents. The study is expected to cost between \$100,000 to \$150,000 and may pinpoint improvements which can be made.

In addition to the study and committee, state Sen. Dina Titus is proposing a bill which will hold industries more accountable for hazardous substances at plants.

The recent chlorine leaks at the TIMET plant have not only heightened safety concerns for those who live and work near the BMI complex, they have caused even greater concern for all BMI companies which have been dedicated to the safe operation of their plants for decades. supervisors and operators.

The BMI companies are also addressing the safety issue by placing more emphasis on reviewing processes to make sure they meet or exceed engineering and safety standards.

A decade ago, formal process hazards analyses were not conducted routinely by all chemical manufacturers. Today, however, process hazard studies are more regularly performed to insure the safety of the plants' operations and the surrounding com-

According to Greg Cowley, Kerr-McGee safety specialist, a process hazards analysis is performed with a team representing all areas of the

plant, including maintenance, safety, operations, engineering and environmental. Together, team members assess whether or not processes are being handled as safely as possible, and all possible scenarios and solutions are identified.

In fact, all BMI companies have undergone such studies, and have had regular inspections by such governmental entities as the Nevada Occupational Safety and Health Enforcement Section and the Nevada Division of Environmental Protection.

"Over the last 15 years, safety standards throughout the industry have been raised considerably," said Cowley. "Chemical manufacturers all aim for zero injuries and zero environmental emissions - not some arbitrary number once deemed acceptable by the industry.'

In fact, Kerr-McGee was the 1992 recipient of the Lammot DuPont Safety Award and a runner-up in 1996. Presented annually by the Chemical Manufacturers Association for improvements in industrial safety, the award is a coveted achievement throughout the chemical industry.

In a national ranking recently published by the National Safety Council, Kerr-McGee's Henderson Facility ranked number 20 among 57 plants of similar size and operation in terms of safety.

"While Kerr-McGee is proud of its safety record, the company is committed to continual improvement, as it hopes to compete on a par with the industry's standard-setting safety leaders like DuPont," said Cowley.

#### **BMI Pipeline Comes to Henderson's Rescue During Water Crisis**

When the City of Las Vegas' main water treatment facility was flooded out in February, the BMI water pipeline came to the City of Henderson's rescue, increasing its daily delivery to the City from five million gallons per day to 22 million gallons per day during the weekend crisis.

According to Kurt Segler, City of Henderson utility services manager, Henderson residents would not have even been aware of the water shortage except for the extensive media coverage.

"The City of Henderson is fortunate to have a back-up system in the BMI pipeline," said Segler. "We appreciated the swift cooperation of Basic Water Company, the BMI subsidiary which oversees the pipeline, in helping us to avert the crisis for our residents.'

Sixteen miles in length, the 40-inch pipeline has delivered water to the BMI complex since it was built in the 1940s by the U.S. government. Currently, more than 25 million gallons of Lake Mead water are pumped through the pipeline each day. Approximately 40 percent of the water is used by the BMI plants, while the remaining 60 percent is delivered to Lake Las Vegas, the City of Henderson, the National Park Service and the Nevada Department of Wildlife fish hatchery.





#### **Veterans of Foreign Wars Basic Post 3848 presents Veteran in the Spotlight**

An Army veteran who served in the Korean War is this month's "Veteran in the Spotlight. VFW Basic Post 3848 is proud to feature Willis M. Cleveland.

Born Aug. 7, 1929, in Sioux City, Iowa, he graduated from East High School. He enlisted in the U.S. Army on Oct. 19, 1949, and went to Fort Riley, Kansas for basic training. He was assigned to the 7th Infantry Division, 32nd Regiment, Company C.

The division was sent to Seattle, Wash., and it shipped out to Yokohama, Japan. After four months of occupation, they became a front-line outfit and were sent to Korea in the war against North Korea. Cleveland took part in the Inchon invasion, and was later wounded as they advanced and encountered the enemy in many battles.

Willis received the Combat Infantry Badge and the following medals: Good Conduct, Purple Heart, Korean Campaign and Korean Service.

He returned to Camp Atterbury, Ind., where he spent seven months in the hospital recovering from wounds suffered in the Korean campaign, and was assigned to Officers' Candidate School Division Weapons Committee at Fort Riley.

The highest rank he achieved was Private First Class, and he received his honorable discharge on Oct. 19, 1952, at Fort Riley.

His first civilian job was working in the Sioux City stockyards in November 1952. He attended Morningside College and received a bachelor's

After graduation, he worked at the KB Store as a manager trainee, where he met Esther. a credit manager. They were married in Sioux City on Aug. 7, 1959. When he retired in June 1994, Cleveland had been driving a bus for Sioux City for 26 years.

The couple moved to Henderson in August 1994, and now live in Las Vegas. He became a life member of the VFW Basic Post 3848 on June 29, 1996. He currently serves as secretary of the Home Committee, which plans most Post activities.

The Clevelands belong to the Henderson Methodist Church, and as part of a church group, they go to the Henderson Nursing Home each week and sing for residents.

Cleveland is a member of the Grotto of the Masonic Bodies. He also takes part in the VFW presentation of the American Flag to schools and organizations.
