### Police substation planned for GV Ranch

In the not-so-distant future Henderson residents who live in the Green Valley Ranch area will be closer to the police who protect their neighborhoods.

City officials are reviewing architectural plans and met with residents Wednesday and Thursday regarding a new Henderson Police substation at the corner of Green Valley Parkway and Benji.

The Henderson City Council approved building the police substation but have not yet approved the architecture and location for the

The police department hopes to break ground July 1 and to have the substation ready by earlyto mid-1999, Henderson Police Chief Tommy Burns said.

About 100 area residents attended the meeting Wednesday and about 40 people attended Thursday's meeting to listen to presentations from Burns, Henderson Parks and Recreation Department Director Steve Rongvocsik and architect Stephen Swisher.

The presentations informed residents of plans for a 40-acre Parks and Recreation center, which the Council approved as part of the \$54 million bond issue, and the new police substation, which will be adjacent to the center. Residents were later given the opportunity to ask questions and have their concerns addressed regarding the

"It is essentially an office building for uniformed patrol officers," Burns said.

The 21,000-square-foot substation will sit on about three acres and will provide patrol operations for 70 sworn uniformed officers. The facility is designed to house 130 officers.

At the Thursday meeting, Burns explained the substation will provide a greater police presence in the area and will alleviate officers' 15- to 20- minute commutes from police headquarters downtown to their Green Valley work assignments, keeping them closer to their beats.

### Teen pregnancies remain high, officials say

Teenage pregnancies continue to plague Henderson, which recently prompted a group of concerned residents to form a community action team to combat the problem.

Initiated by Jean Byrd, a St. Rose Dominican Hospital nurse, the action team is two months old and is trying to gather support and assistance from the community.

Byrd witnesses Henderson's teen pregnancy problem nearly every day at work. "I run the 'Baby Your Baby' program at St. Rose, which is a state-run campaign to find prenatal care and information for women regardless of their ability to pay," she said. "Many of my patients are teen mothers."

Birth rates by Henderson teens are not so much growing, but staying consistently high. Last year, 184 teen pregnancies (ages 14 to 19) were reported in

the city compared to 165 the previous year, according to the Clark County Health District's vital records department. The city's population grew 13.4% in that time. What percentage of that increase is represented by teenage girls was unavailable.

But, those numbers may even be higher because it's difficult to track the number of miscarriages. Teenage pregnancies are calculated by combining live births, legally induced abortions and miscarriages.

"It's difficult to calculate miscarriages because if they occur at home, many of them are not reported," Byrd said.

What percentage of those girls were married was also unavailable. But the births of married teens are not always a result of a planned pregnancy, according to Heidi Sakelarios, child and adolescent coordinator for the State



A veteran of World War II and the Korean War, he has dedicated his life's work to law


enforcement since 1946.

### No one will forget Pepcon explosions

No one who was living in the Las Vegas valley on May 4, 1988, will forget that day.

A series of massive explosions shattered the Pacific Engineering (Pepcon) plant in the BMI complex. The blasts leveled the adjacent Kidd Marshmallow facility, killed two Pepcon workers, injured about 300 people and caused losses of more than \$80 million.

I was sports editor of the Henderson Home News. It was shortly before noon on a Wednesday when we first heard reports of a fire at the Pepcon plant. A rumble soon shook our newsroom at 22 Water St. Having grown up in California, I've felt earthquakes: A similar feeling of complete helplessness went through me that day.

News reporter Katherine Scott and the editor, the late John Dailey, had already left the building with cameras. Reporter Mark Brennan and I shortly took off in my car to see what was going on and to help record the event.

We were stopped at the traffic signal at Water Street and Lake Mead Drive when the most devastating blast occurred. We felt a concussion that jerked us to the right. We drove up Lake Mead as far as we could and started interviewing people to help with the coverage any way we could.

The News went out to the press a couple of hours late, with a re-built front

Pepcon was one of two producers of ammonium perchlorate, a crystalline white powder used in solid fuel rockets. Several theories about the fire were debated for years, including a spark from a welder's torch, a fire within the batch dryer or a leak in a buried natural gas line.

Whatever the cause, the fire quickly spread to stored AP, causing the explosions. Kerr-McGee Chemical Corp., in the

same BMI complex, was the only other producer of AP in the nation. Pepcon's AP operations moved to Utah, but Kerr-McGee continued production until last year.

The 1988 event drew national attention to the city. In the 10 years since, Henderson has drawn much more positive publicity for its continued growth.

Putting the event into context is easier. In the decade since the devastation, residents, city and county officials and the news media have put the BMI complex under a microscope.

Issues such as air and water quality, transportation of chemicals and products into and out of the industrial area, emergency communications and response,

and the aesthetics of the industrial plants have all been studied with much more vigor.

Did the explosion cause any long-term damage to the community? Other than frayed nerves, the answer has to be no. Henderson's growth was not affected and was the fasted-growing city in the country from 1990-96.

A major chlorine leak from Pioneer Chlor Alkali and other fires and leaks from Titanium Metals Corp. have done little to discourage new residents.

Those who have been here longer than 10 years know of the proud heritage of the industrial plants and the dangers they pose. Those who have moved in more recently must certainly be aware of the industrial complex.

Continued vigilance and a wellinformed community are essential to keeping the industrial plants as safe as possible.

The News on Thursday will devote several stories to the subject of Pepcon on the 10-year anniversary of the blast.

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

### Two escape injury from plane crash

A husband and wife are lucky to be alive after escaping a plane crash with very few injuries at about 10:35 a.m. Sunday at Henderson Executive Airport.

Airport spokesperson Scott Russell said the National Transportation Safety Board will make the final determination of the cause of the crash. According to eyewitnesses, the plane landed when a gust of wind appeared to have grabbed the wing, flipping the plane over.

Russell said the two people, whose names were not released, escaped the rented Cessna 182 easily. They were both treated on the scene and were not transported to the hospital.

"Our concern was to make sure the people were safe," Russell said. We are glad to hear the passengers were fine and also glad to hear the aircraft was not badly damaged."

The aircraft, which was from Arizona, was blown about 30 feet off the runway and landed upside

"It ended up just midway past there while responding to the call. the runway," Russell explained.

Henderson Battalion Chief Bob Maroney said there was a small fuel leak to the plane but there was no fire. It was determined Sunday that it was too windy to right [turn it right side up] the plane. Russell said airport officials were planning to use a crane to move the aircraft off the runway Monday.

The runway was closed for about an hour not because it was deemed unsafe but because the emergency vehicles were parked

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

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



Health Division. "Often parents make their daughters get married once they find out they are pregnant," she said.

Byrd has gathered several other St. Rose co-workers to help with the community action team. Others include members from Nevada State Welfare, the Henderson Boys and Girls Club, the Clark County Health District, Henderson Allied Community Advocates, University Cooperative Extension, the Clark County School District, Clark County Family and Youth Services, SafeHouse and Catholic Charities.

"[Local] teen pregnancies are definitely a problem and it appears to remain fairly consistent," said Becky Pintar, another action team member.

Pintar works for COSTAR. which administers four high schools throughout the Las Vegas Valley for at-risk teenagers, one of which is in Henderson. Horizon High Schools provide on-campus day care and resources and referrals for pre-natal care and baby checkups.

Horizon High School tries to make it less difficult for teen mothers to finish school. "It's so difficult on them beause they are dealing with a lot of compound problems of trying to stay in school and be a parent. Most teens are not emotionally, socially and financially ready to be a parent,

Teenage pregnancies often lead to adverse consequences such as poverty for both mother and child. Only 33% of high school girls who become pregnant receive their high school diploma before age 25, according to a 1996 national report.

The action team plans to target kids between 10 to 13 years old, stressing prevention sojunior high

problems Horizon High girls face on a daily basis.

The action team is still working on a curriculum. "It's premature to say if it will focus strictly on abstinence-only methods or contraception methods also," Byrd said.

The action team is reviewing a portion of the Smart Move program taught at the Henderson Boys and Girls Club. Smart Move stresses "abstinence is the best method," but also teaches kids about types of contraception, said Pat Petrie, director of operations of the Boys and Girls Club. It also targets junior high kids and each child is required to have a parental permission slip to participate.

The disadvantage of programs teaching abstinence-only information is that adolescents are denied information and skills they will need at some point in their sexual lives, according to a study by the World Health Organization. But the same study revealed comprehensive, abstinence-based programs that reach out to students and adults through a variety of mediums are the most successful indicators of teen pregnancy prevention.

The local action team is also reviewing programs currently used by other community action teams throughout the state. Byrd said the action team wants help from the local teens and from the kids will learn how to avoid the rest of the community in choosing

The State Team, a project of the Attorney General's office and the Nevada State Health Division, will then monitor the entire process and provide technical assistance as needed. The state has been doing this for other community action teams since Nevada received a poor ranking in reducing the pregnancy rate among its teens in 1995.

A 1993 Congressional study showed about 50% of married and 75% single teen mothers receive Aid to Families with Dependent Children benefits within four years of their first child's birth. In 1992, Nevada ranked second in the nation for teen pregnancy for the third consecutive year, according to Morbidity and Mortality Weekly Report, by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention published in 1995.

Nevada was also one of five states that did not have a significant decrease in teen pregnancy in a nationwide study between 1991-1995 (the most recent year for which state-specific data has been released).

A desk officer will be on duty from 7 a.m. to 10 p.m. Services will include police report filing, gun registration, obtaining dog license forms and information as well as use of a 750-square foot multi-purpose room which may be used for homeowners' association and Neighborhood Watch meetings, crime prevention training and other related uses. The room will also serve as an alternate Emergency Operation Center.

Police cars will also be available at this site. Initially, about 30-35 police cars will be in covered parking behind a secured wall. At full capacity, the substation's covered parking area will house about 70 patrol cars.

The facility will not be used for siren checks and will not house prisoners, police records, investigations or a dispatch center. Those functions will remain at their current downtown locations.



Highway, in the River Mountain planning area, three acres of the project will be for a gasoline and convenience store and an additional 20 acres will be developed as the casino, the applicant said.

David Norris, land planner for the Henderson Planning Department, said the applicant is asking for use permits to allow for the convenience store and limited gaming facility.

Architectural plans for a casino are not before the planners yet, but the applicant was allowed to follow through with use permits because of stringent design guidelines already agreed to between the developer and the city.

The casino could operate between 75 and 199 slot machines and nine live games without a hotel. Though no architectural plans are before planners, design guidelines will allow for a 36,000square-foot facility. convenience store will be located at the corner of the project, off Wagon Wheel Drive.

Representatives of the applicant have stated to planning staff that the property will likely be sold and developed by someone other than Marnell Corrao Associates.

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

### Law school dean speaks to Chamber

Aspiring lawyers no longer have to travel out of state for their legal education.

Not since the opening of the William S. Boyd School of Law at the University of Nevada, Las Vegas, which is currently in the admitting process and set to open in August.

School of Law Dean Richard J. Morgan spoke to the Henderson Chamber of Commerce at a luncheon earlier this month and said the law school will have five themes or goals - community service, elevating the stature of UNLV, professionalism, accessibility and excellence.

"We want UNLV to become a first-class university and we want to be a first-class law school," Morgan said.

not only to benefit Las Vegas' legal community but will also work to provide legal assistance for the poor through community service requirements for students. Another goal is to improve the legal profession and make it stronger.

In terms of accessibility the school will offer a full-time and part-time program allowing working people access to a legal education.



### Garden in f

One of the most colorful and visually stunning places in Southern Nevada - that doesn't include neon—is now in full bloom.

It came a little late this year, thanks to El Niño, but the colorful desert flowers are now blooming at the Ethel M Chocolates Cactus Garden.

Located next to the Ethel M Chocolates factory, the Cactus Garden spreads out over three acres and showcases more than 300 species of plants. Half are cacti and succulents largely native to the American Southwest, and the remaining, desert trees and shrubs are from the Southwest U.S. and Australia. All of the plants were chosen both for their beauty and their ability to adapt to the climate of Southern Nevada.

"When Forrest Mars created the Ethel M Chocolates Factory 15 years ago, his fondness for desert landscaping resulted in this

beautiful garden," said Karen Thomson of Ethel M Chocolates. "It is the perfect place to appreciate the beauty of the desert, and there is no more beautiful time than now when the flowers are in bloom."

Some of the plants include giant sahuaros (many of which are more than 100 years old), ocotillo trees, desert bird of paradise, yellow trumpet flowers and hedgehogs. The Cactus Garden is Nevada's first botanical garden and one of the world's largest collections of its kind.

The Ethel M Chocolates Factory Tour and Cactus Garden attracts more than 700,000 visitors each year. The top four teams qualify for the zone playoffs and Silverado currently has the upperhand for the top spot in the Sunrise.


"It's all up to us to take care of business on our own," Pope said.
