Police substation planned for GV Ranch

In the not-so-distant future Henderson residents who live in the Green Valley Ranch area will be closer to the police who protect their neighborhoods.

City officials are reviewing architectural plans and met with residents Wednesday and Thursday regarding a new Henderson Police substation at the corner of Green Valley Parkway and Benji.

The Henderson City Council approved building the police substation but have not yet

approved the architecture and location for the facility.

The police department hopes to break ground July 1 and to have the substation ready by early to mid-1999, Henderson Police Chief Tommy Burns said.

About 100 area residents attended the meeting Wednesday and about 40 people attended Thursday's meeting to listen to presentations from Burns, Henderson Parks and Recreation Department Director Steve Rongyocsik and architect Stephen Swisher.

The presentations informed residents of plans for a 40-acre Parks and Recreation center, which the Council approved as part of the \$54 million bond issue, and the new police substation, which will be adjacent to the center. Residents were later given the opportunity to ask questions and have their concerns addressed regarding the plans.

"It is essentially an office building for uniformed patrol officers," Burns said.

The 21,000-square-foot substation will sit on about three acres and will provide patrol opera-

tions for 70 sworn uniformed officers. The facility is designed to house 130 officers.

At the Thursday meeting, Burns explained the substation will provide a greater police presence in the area and will alleviate officers' 15- to 20-minute commutes from police headquarters downtown to their Green Valley work assignments, keeping them closer to their beats.

Teen pregnancies remain high, officials say

Teenage pregnancies continue to plague Henderson, which recently prompted a group of concerned residents to form a community action team to combat the problem.

Initiated by Jean Byrd, a St. Rose Dominican Hospital nurse, the action team is two months old and is trying to gather support and assistance from the community.

Byrd witnesses Henderson's teen pregnancy problem nearly every day at work. "I run the 'Baby Your Baby' program at St. Rose, which is a state-run campaign to find prenatal care and information for women regardless of their ability to pay," she said. "Many of my patients are teen mothers."

Birth rates by Henderson teens are not so much growing, but staying consistently high. Last year, 184 teen pregnancies (ages 14 to 19) were reported in

the city compared to 165 the previous year, according to the Clark County Health District's vital records department. The city's population grew 13.4% in that time. What percentage of that increase is represented by teenage girls was unavailable.

But, those numbers may even be higher because it's difficult to track the number of miscarriages. Teenage pregnancies are calculated by combining live births, legally induced abortions and miscarriages.

"It's difficult to calculate miscarriages because if they occur at home, many of them are not reported," Byrd said.

What percentage of those girls were married was also unavailable. But the births of married teens are not always a result of a planned pregnancy, according to Heidi Sakelarios, child and adolescent coordinator for the State

Basic High School steps into the spotlight with conference

It was the biggest event to happen at Basic High School this school year.

No, it wasn't a sporting event and performing arts had nothing to do with it either.

It was the 1998 Nevada Association of Student Councils' State Conference held on the campus Wednesday through Friday. More than 625 students and advisors from high schools across the state attended.

"It not only brings something to the school, it brings something to the entire community," said Basic High principal Horrace Smith of the Henderson school hosting the event. "I don't know if any other school could have done it better."

For the three days, attendees participated in leadership training, keynote addresses, community services projects, a current issues forum, a night at the MGM Grand Theme Park as well as a number of other various events.

"Without a doubt, this is the best conference that I've seen," said Raul Klein, NASC president and a student at Cimarron-Memorial High School. "I definitely got a new perspective on this conference."

"I used to think you just came here to have fun, meet a lot of people and learn new things. But,

there's a whole different side. When everybody's having fun, there's setting up to do. It's a lot of hard work."

The hard work started for Basic High nearly a year ago.

In fact, planning for the event began last spring after Basic High was awarded the bid to host the 1998 conference.

"I'm immensely proud of my students," said Tamathy Larned, Basic High's student council advisor. "If nothing else, it went smoothly — and that's a testament to planning."

Yes, planning included the normal things for a high school event — decorations.

The school's halls were decorated with signs for each respective high school as well as signs to compliment the rock 'n' roll theme of "Rockin' State in '98."

The school's gym also featured a giant guitar — resembling the one for the Hard Rock Hotel and Casino — and a sign reading "Welcome to fabulous Henderson," similar to the world-renowned sign located north-bound on Las Vegas Boulevard.

No one will forget Pepcon explosions

No one who was living in the Las Vegas valley on May 4, 1988, will forget that day.

A series of massive explosions shattered the Pacific Engineering (Pepcon) plant in the BMI complex. The blasts leveled the adjacent Kidd Marshmallow facility, killed two Pepcon workers, injured about 300 people and caused losses of more than \$80 million.

I was sports editor of the *Henderson Home News*. It was shortly before noon on a Wednesday when we first heard reports of a fire at the Pepcon plant. A rumble soon shook our newsroom at 22 Water St. Having grown up in California, I've felt earthquakes: A similar feeling of complete helplessness went through me that day.

News reporter Katherine Scott and the editor, the late John Dailey, had already left the building with cameras. Reporter Mark Brennan and I shortly took off in my car to see what was going on and to help record the event.

We were stopped at the traffic signal at Water Street and Lake Mead Drive when the most devastating blast occurred. We felt a concussion that jerked us to the right. We drove up Lake Mead as far as we could and started interviewing people to help with the coverage any way we could.

The *News* went out to the press a couple of hours late, with a re-built front

page with a large, vertical headline: "Boom!" Dailey's photos were later published around the world.

Pepcon was one of two producers of ammonium perchlorate, a crystalline white powder used in solid fuel rockets. Several theories about the fire were debated for years, including a spark from a welder's torch, a fire within the batch dryer or a leak in a buried natural gas line.

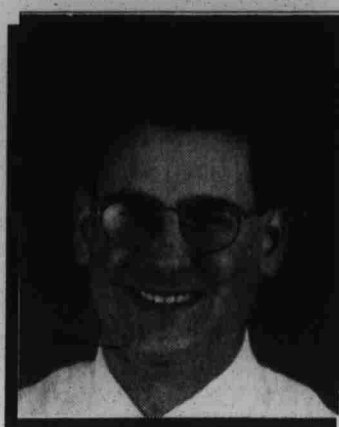
Whatever the cause, the fire quickly spread to stored AP, causing the explosions.

Kerr-McGee Chemical Corp., in the same BMI complex, was the only other producer of AP in the nation. Pepcon's AP operations moved to Utah, but Kerr-McGee continued production until last year.

The 1988 event drew national attention to the city. In the 10 years since, Henderson has drawn much more positive publicity for its continued growth.

Putting the event into context is easier. In the decade since the devastation, residents, city and county officials and the news media have put the BMI complex under a microscope.

Issues such as air and water quality, transportation of chemicals and products into and out of the industrial area, emergency communications and response,



and the aesthetics of the industrial plants have all been studied with much more vigor.

Did the explosion cause any long-term damage to the community? Other than frayed nerves, the answer has to be no. Henderson's growth was not affected and was the fastest-growing city in the country from 1990-96.

A major chlorine leak from Pioneer Chlor Alkali and other fires and leaks from Titanium Metals Corp. have done little to discourage new residents.

Those who have been here longer than 10 years know of the proud heritage of the industrial plants and the dangers they pose. Those who have moved in more recently must certainly be aware of the industrial complex.

Continued vigilance and a well-informed community are essential to keeping the industrial plants as safe as possible.

The *News* on Thursday will devote several stories to the subject of Pepcon on the 10-year anniversary of the blast.

Mobile home catches fire

A mobile home caught fire at about 3:15 p.m. Sunday in Vista Trailer Park, 901 S. Boulder Highway.

According to Henderson Battalion Chief Bob Maroney, the home in Space 144 caught fire when the homeowner strung a long extension cord from his neighbor's home to his water heater.

The power draw of the water heater was too great for the cord and overheated, setting the home on fire.

Maroney said the fire was extinguished quickly and there was little damage to the home's interior.

Police seek robbery suspects

A victim was struck in the back of the head with a blunt object and robbed while walking with his friend in the area of Burkholder and Rainbow at about 1:16 a.m. Saturday.

Two subjects approached the two friends. After one of the suspects hit the victim in the head, he began to beat him, then took his wallet and left the area on foot, a Henderson Police Department spokesperson said.

Officers patrolled the area but did not find the suspects. At about 1:45 a.m., another person contacted officers reporting the two suspects also robbed him at the same location.

The victim said as he walked in the area, the two people approached him and one of them brandished a silver metal semi-automatic pistol and demanded money.

The suspects escaped on foot with an unknown amount of money. Police tried to find the suspects once again but they have not been found.

The first suspect is described as a white male 16 to 17 years old, 5 feet 9 inches tall, 150 pounds, shaved head, wearing a black and white poncho with a Western design, cowboy hat and horseshoes.

The second suspect is described as a Hispanic male 16 to 17, also 5 feet 9, 150 pounds, wearing a white shirt and blue jeans.

Hand grenades found in truck

Henderson police found hand grenades in a pick-up truck during a traffic stop at about 4 a.m. Monday at the Jokers Wild Casino, 920 N. Boulder Highway.

When police searched the vehicle, they found a bag with the hand grenades. The car owner said they were dummy grenades.

The Henderson Police Department called the Henderson Fire Department to investigate.

The grenades' spoons and the pins were intact, Henderson Battalion Chief Bob Maroney said.

He added there were two pineapple grenades and one smooth grenade.

The Las Vegas Fire Department Bomb Squad took possession of the grenades. The squad will try to set them off to determine if the explosives are real.

If they explode, the truck owner, whose name was not released, will be charged with possession of explosives.

Two die in boating accident

Two men died at Lake Mead Recreation Area after their 14-foot Capri boat capsized sometime between 11 a.m. Thursday to 7:30 a.m. Friday.

According to Parks spokeswoman Karen Whitney, Harold Matthew Morgan, 51, was a Henderson resident and the boat owner. His body was taken to the Mohave County Coroner's office in Arizona. His cause of death was not released before *News* deadline.

Las Vegas resident William Gordon Snow, 37, was taken to the Clark County Coroner's office, which determined Snow died from drowning.

Whitney added the Mohave County Coroner's office performed the autopsy on Morgan Monday evening and his cause of death would possibly be released this morning.

She added both men launched the boat from Kingman Wash on the Arizona shore of Lake Mead. It was found capsized near Indian Canyon Cove in Arizona, about 12 miles northeast of Hoover Dam.

"The first victim was located by other visitors to the lake in the open water near mid-channel," Whitney said. "The second victim was located by National Park Service rangers on shore just south

of the boat. Both were wearing life jackets when they were found."

The National Park Service ranger/pilot, who patrols the lake from the air, spotted the sailboat while in flight. Another visitor to the Kingman Wash area called the Lake Mead NRA Dispatch Center at 10:30 p.m. on Thursday to report that he had seen the sailboat leave at 11 a.m. and that it had not returned.

A telephone call to the boat owner's residence indicated the two men were not expected back at home until Thursday night, Whitney said.

At first light, the park plane was airborne to attempt to locate the sailboat and check on the passengers' welfare. When the boat was found capsized, park rangers and Nevada Division of Wildlife officers began to search for the victims by boat.

Whitney said a wind advisory was in effect for Lake Mead Thursday, with winds forecasted at 25 to 35 miles per hour with gusts up to 50 miles per hour.

According to park rangers, winds of this speed can cause waves of six feet or higher on the Boulder Basin.

Two flags were flying on the developed area launch ramps indicating gale force winds were expected and only the largest of boats should consider launching,

Whitney said.

However there is no developed launch facility at the Kingman Wash, where the victims launched. A single flag indicates small craft warning with winds up to 38 miles per hour. Small craft are identified as those under 16 feet in length.

Park officials recommend visitors check the weather before leaving home on the VHF Weather Channel 1 or by calling the National Weather Service 24-hour recording, (702) 736-3854.

Once visitors arrive at the lake, they should check again either by telephone or by checking flags and weather conditions at the launch ramp.

Current temperature and wind conditions are also available by calling the Wind Talker recording stations at Lake Mead's Hemenway Harbor, (702) 294-2400; Callville Bay, (702)

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Overdue boater found

A search for an overdue boater on Lake Mead ended successfully at 3:20 a.m. Wednesday, April 22, when he was located in the Narrows area of Boulder Canyon by rescuers.

man, Richard Dietrich, had left home with his personal watercraft at 4:30 p.m. Tuesday for a late afternoon outing, expecting to be back by dark. His wife notified the National Park Service just before midnight that he had not returned home as expected.

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Two escape injury from plane crash

A husband and wife are lucky to be alive after escaping a plane crash with very few injuries at about 10:35 a.m. Sunday at Henderson Executive Airport.

Airport spokesperson Scott Russell said the National Transportation Safety Board will make the final determination of the cause of the crash. According to eyewitnesses, the plane landed when a gust of wind appeared to have grabbed the wing, flipping the plane over.

Russell said the two people, whose names were not released, escaped the rented Cessna 182 easily. They were both treated on the scene and were not transported to the hospital.

"Our concern was to make sure the people were safe," Russell said. "We are glad to hear the passengers were fine and also glad to hear the aircraft was not badly damaged."

The aircraft, which was from Arizona, was blown about 30 feet off the runway and landed upside down.

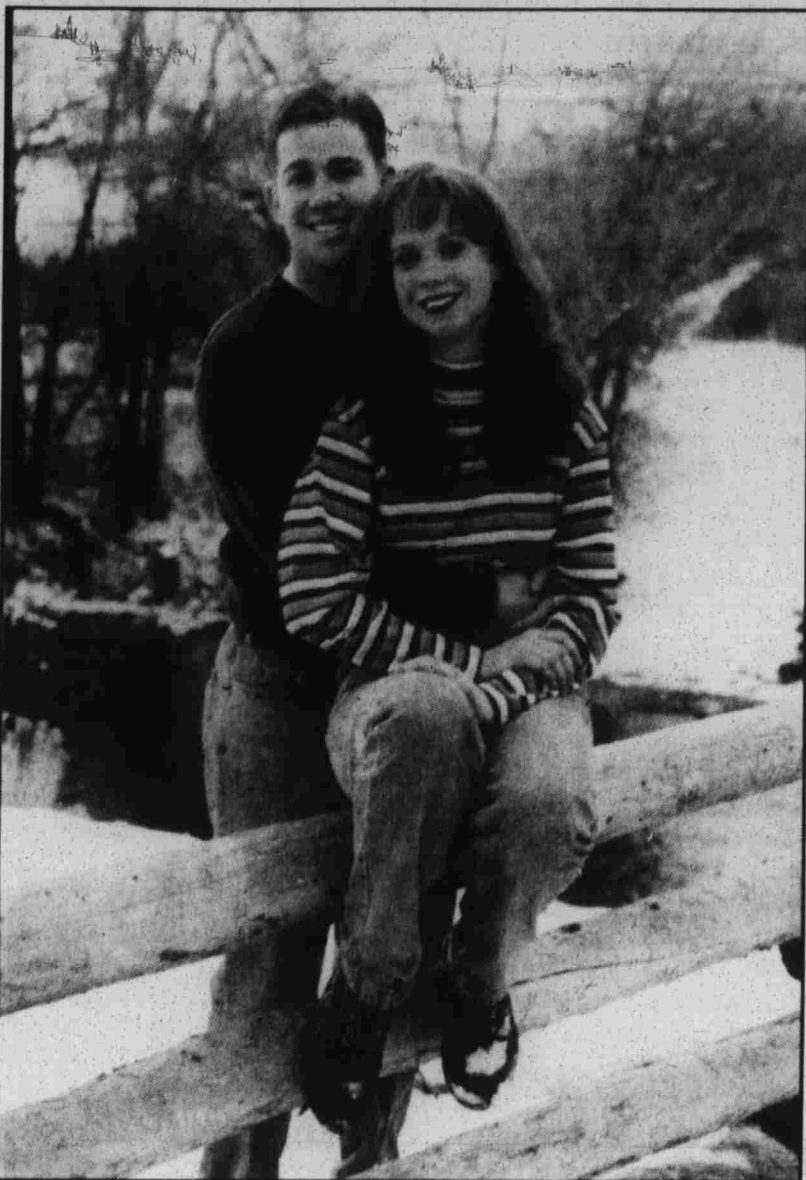
"It ended up just midway past the runway," Russell explained. Henderson Battalion Chief Bob Maroney said there was a small fuel leak to the plane but there was no fire. It was determined Sunday that it was too windy to right [turn it right side up] the plane. Russell said airport officials were planning to use a crane to move the aircraft off the runway Monday.

The runway was closed for about an hour not because it was deemed unsafe but because the emergency vehicles were parked

there while responding to the call. The Clark County Department of Aviation has been in control of Henderson Executive Airport for just more than two years.

Grand Canyon tour operators and private citizens use the airport. In addition, it is also used as a reliever airport for McCarran International Airport.

In 1997, there were about 64,000 total operations, averaging 170 to 175 take-offs and landings a day at Henderson Executive Airport.

Man charged with kidnapping

Henderson investigators charged Steven Houlihan, 25 of Henderson, with a third count of attempted kidnapping Thursday after they were able to link him to another attempted kidnapping that occurred Thursday, April 16.

Houlihan was already in custody after Henderson police officers arrested him Tuesday, April 21, for two counts of attempted kidnapping and one count of open and gross lewdness.

In the third charge, police allege Houlihan pulled up to an 11-year old girl while she was walking to school at about 9 a.m. on the 100 block of Basic Road, near the BMI pool.

Houlihan allegedly pulled up next to the female, pointed a handgun at her and ordered her into the car he was driving, Henderson Police Lt. J. Chambers said.

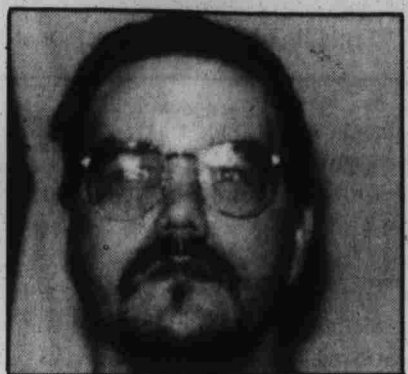
"She ran away but did not report the incident until a couple of days later," she added. "This female has identified Steve Thomas Houlihan as the male who threatened her."

The victim described the vehicle as an older gray two-door Nissan or Toyota, Chambers said.

A search warrant was served on Houlihan's car and police located several credit cards belonging to different women.

He did not have permission to have these credit cards and has been charged with possession of two or more credit cards of another person—a felony.

Houlihan is being held in the Henderson Detention Center on a total of \$304,000 bail for all the charges.

The investigation into Houlihan's activities has determined that he had access to a blue two-door Ford Escort. This vehicle was used for the attempted kidnapping that occurred on April 16. The other vehicle to which he had access was the tan four-door vehicle in which he was originally arrested.

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New high school's zoning to be decided

The Clark County School District Board of Trustees will meet tomorrow to discuss the attendance zones of three new high schools, one in Henderson, scheduled to open in fall 1999.

The meeting will begin at 6 p.m. in the board room of the Education Center, 2832 E. Flamingo Road. The unnamed Henderson high school will be located at College and Heather Drives.

The zoning recommendations affect students currently in grades seven through nine. Students who will be seniors during the 1999-2000 school year will not be affected by the rezoning. The new schools will open with only grades nine through 11 the first year.

The meeting is open to the public and parents will be able to voice their opinions and concerns about the zoning at the meeting.

Health Division. "Often parents make their daughters get married once they find out they are pregnant," she said.

Byrd has gathered several other St. Rose co-workers to help with the community action team. Others include members from Nevada State Welfare, the Henderson Boys and Girls Club, the Clark County Health District, Henderson Allied Community Advocates, University Cooperative Extension, the Clark County School District, Clark County Family and Youth Services, SafeHouse and Catholic Charities.

"[Local] teen pregnancies are definitely a problem and it appears to remain fairly consistent," said Becky Pintar, another action team member.

Pintar works for COSTAR, which administers four high schools throughout the Las Vegas Valley for at-risk teenagers, one of which is in Henderson. Horizon High Schools provide on-campus day care and resources and referrals for pre-natal care and baby checkups.

Horizon High School tries to make it less difficult for teen mothers to finish school. "It's so difficult on them because they are dealing with a lot of compound problems of trying to stay in school and be a parent. Most teens are not emotionally, socially and financially ready to be a parent, yet."

Teenage pregnancies often lead to adverse consequences such as poverty for both mother and child. Only 33% of high school girls who become pregnant receive their high school diploma before age 25, according to a 1996 national report.

The action team plans to target kids between 10 to 13 years old, stressing prevention so junior high kids will learn how to avoid the

problems Horizon High girls face on a daily basis.

The action team is still working on a curriculum. "It's premature to say if it will focus strictly on abstinence-only methods or contraception methods also," Byrd said.

The action team is reviewing a portion of the Smart Move program taught at the Henderson Boys and Girls Club. Smart Move stresses "abstinence is the best method," but also teaches kids about types of contraception, said Pat Petrie, director of operations of the Boys and Girls Club. It also targets junior high kids and each child is required to have a parental permission slip to participate.

The disadvantage of programs teaching abstinence-only information is that adolescents are denied information and skills they will need at some point in their sexual lives, according to a study by the World Health Organization. But the same study revealed comprehensive, abstinence-based programs that reach out to students and adults through a variety of mediums are the most successful indicators of teen pregnancy prevention.

The local action team is also reviewing programs currently used by other community action teams throughout the state. Byrd said the action team wants help from the local teens and from the rest of the community in choosing

a program. "It does us no good to choose a program because it works in another community, but our teens may not want to use those methods," she said.

The action team has had two meetings so far and is still in the planning stages. "We're starting to develop an action plan which first involves finding a location [to hold the meetings]," Byrd said.

Once they develop a plan of action, they will submit it to the Nevada Public Health Foundation. If it's approved, the Foundation will offer the team a \$5,000 seed grant to help start the program.

The State Team, a project of the Attorney General's office and the Nevada State Health Division, will then monitor the entire process and provide technical assistance as needed. The state has been doing this for other community action teams since Nevada received a poor ranking in reducing the pregnancy rate among its teens in 1995.

A 1993 Congressional study showed about 50% of married and

75% single teen mothers receive Aid to Families with Dependent Children benefits within four years of their first child's birth. In 1992, Nevada ranked second in the nation for teen pregnancy for the third consecutive year, according to Morbidity and Mortality Weekly Report, by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention published in 1995.

Nevada was also one of five states that did not have a significant decrease in teen pregnancy in a nationwide study between 1991-1995 (the most recent year for which state-specific data has been released).

As a result, the substation will help improve the efficiency of the patrol function because officers will be provided with lockers, office space and a work-out facility.

Instead of driving to and from headquarters to file reports, conduct briefings, access e-mail and perform other related police work, officers will be able to do those tasks as well as take citizen complaints, attend training sessions and video-conference with headquarters from the new one-story substation.

Burns said the substation will also be an advantage to citizens and area businesses because residents living in the area will have a more convenient access to services which previously required them to drive downtown to obtain.

A desk officer will be on duty from 7 a.m. to 10 p.m. Services will include police report filing, gun registration, obtaining dog license forms and information as well as use of a 750-square foot multi-purpose room which may be used for homeowners' association and Neighborhood Watch meetings, crime prevention training and other related uses. The room will also serve as an alternate Emergency Operation Center.

Police cars will also be available at this site. Initially, about 30-35 police cars will be in covered parking behind a secured wall. At full capacity, the substation's covered parking area will house about 70 patrol cars.

The facility will not be used for siren checks and will not house prisoners, police records, investigations or a dispatch center. Those functions will remain at their current downtown locations.

Residents will be allowed to meet with investigators, who will use the substation to meet and interview victims and witnesses from the Green Valley area.

"This substation will benefit the citizens, businesses and residents of this area of Henderson as well as the police force which protects it," Henderson Capt. Mike Mayberry said.

One woman at the meeting who lives right across the street from the proposed site did not wish to disclose her name and did not

want to comment because she disapproved.

Larry Ogden, another resident who lives in the area, said, "I think it's a great idea. I'm very supportive of it. I haven't seen any police cars around here in the year-and-a-half I've been here. It would be nice to have that presence."

Green Valley area resident Don Brittle came to the meeting mainly to hear about the park but said he is also in favor of the substation.

"I think it's a great idea. It will be a good facility for the community. I think we are lucky they're building it on this side of Lake Mead."

"In developing this project, the city of Henderson has worked closely with architects to ensure that it will be a positive amenity for the neighborhood," assistant to the city manager Vicki Taylor said.

The HPRD center is scheduled to break ground in 1999 with an estimated completion date of the year 2000.

It will have a promenade, special events plaza, an outdoor stage structure, amphitheater, central plaza, recreation and senior center, library and an aquatic center with a competition swimming pool, activity pool and diving tank, all subject to the City Council's approval.

Highway, in the River Mountain planning area, three acres of the project will be for a gasoline and convenience store and an additional 20 acres will be developed as the casino, the applicant said.

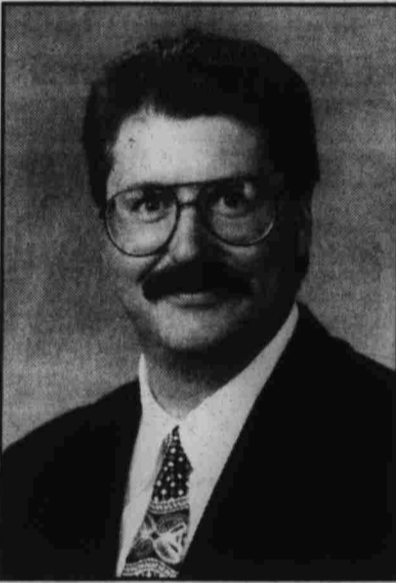
David Norris, land planner for the Henderson Planning Department, said the applicant is asking for use permits to allow for the convenience store and limited gaming facility.

Architectural plans for a casino are not before the planners yet, but the applicant was allowed to follow through with use permits because of stringent design guidelines already agreed to between the developer and the city.

The casino could operate between 75 and 199 slot machines and nine live games without a hotel. Though no architectural plans are before planners, design guidelines will allow for a 36,000-square-foot facility. The convenience store will be located at the corner of the project, off Wagon Wheel Drive.

Representatives of the applicant have stated to planning staff that the property will likely be sold and developed by someone other than Marnell Corrao Associates.

Law school dean speaks to Chamber

Aspiring lawyers no longer have to travel out of state for their legal education.

Not since the opening of the William S. Boyd School of Law at the University of Nevada, Las Vegas, which is currently in the admitting process and set to open in August.

School of Law Dean Richard J. Morgan spoke to the Henderson Chamber of Commerce at a luncheon earlier this month and said the law school will have five themes or goals — community service, elevating the stature of UNLV, professionalism, accessibility and excellence.

"We want UNLV to become a first-class university and we want to be a first-class law school," Morgan said.

He said the school will strive not only to benefit Las Vegas' legal community but will also work to provide legal assistance for the poor through community service requirements for students. Another goal is to improve the legal profession and make it stronger.

In terms of accessibility the school will offer a full-time and part-time program allowing working people access to a legal education.

"Back in the dark ages when I went to law school, it cost \$100 a year," Morgan said.

Tuition will cost \$7,000 a year for in-state residents and \$14,000 a year for out-of-state students. Students may try to defray costs via financial aid and scholarships.

Morgan said the price is reasonable and the eight-person faculty's goal is to ensure students are given a quality education

for their dollar. "Everybody always asks aren't there too many lawyers already," Morgan said jokingly.

The first class will have about 140 students, 65 part-time and 75 full-time, out of about 500 applicants.

For the first two and a half years, the school will be located at Paradise Elementary, 851 E. Tropicana. By the year 2000, the school will move to the James Dickinson Library at the center of the UNLV campus.

Paradise Elementary will move into a new building also on UNLV campus.

The William S. Boyd School of Law will not be geared toward producing legal specialists but will provide a general legal education and prepare students for the bar exam, Morgan said.

The program is not yet accredited but Morgan said no law school is accredited when it first starts. He added accreditation is critical to any law school. The Boyd School of Law will try to acquire accreditation from the American Bar Association by the time the first class graduates.

Morgan received a bachelor of arts in political science from UC-Berkeley and his J.D. in 1971 from the UCLA School of Law, serving on the *Law Review*. As a professor, he has taught commercial law, corporate finance and business organizations.

He served in various California law firms until accepting an associate professorship at Arizona State University College of Law in Tempe in June 1980, where he progressed to Dean before moving to UNLV.

Some of the plants include giant sahuaros (many of which are more than 100 years old), ocotillo trees, desert bird of paradise, yellow trumpet flowers and hedgehogs. The Cactus Garden is

Nevada's first botanical garden and one of the world's largest collections of its kind.

The Ethel M Chocolates Factory Tour and Cactus Garden attracts more than 700,000 visitors each year. The Cactus Garden is also a favorite spot for local schools, who bring their students to explore and study the desert foliage. The Cactus Garden is open from 8:30 a.m. to 7 p.m. and admission is free.

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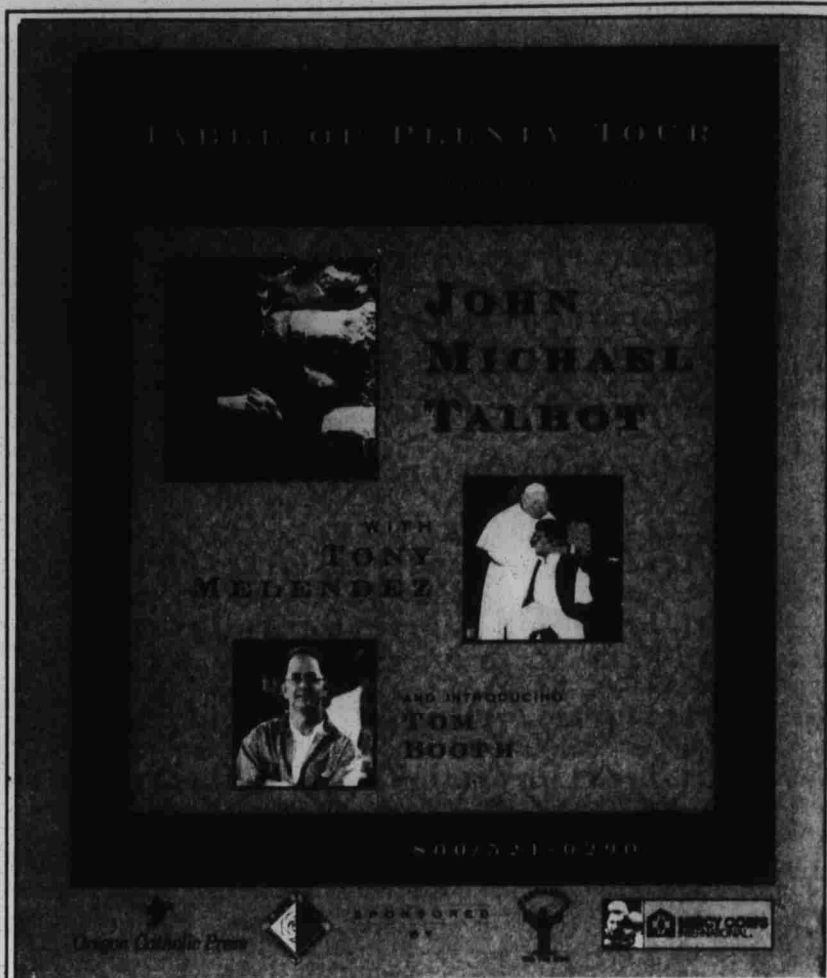

The Skyhawks had a tough battle in picking up the win over the Wolves.

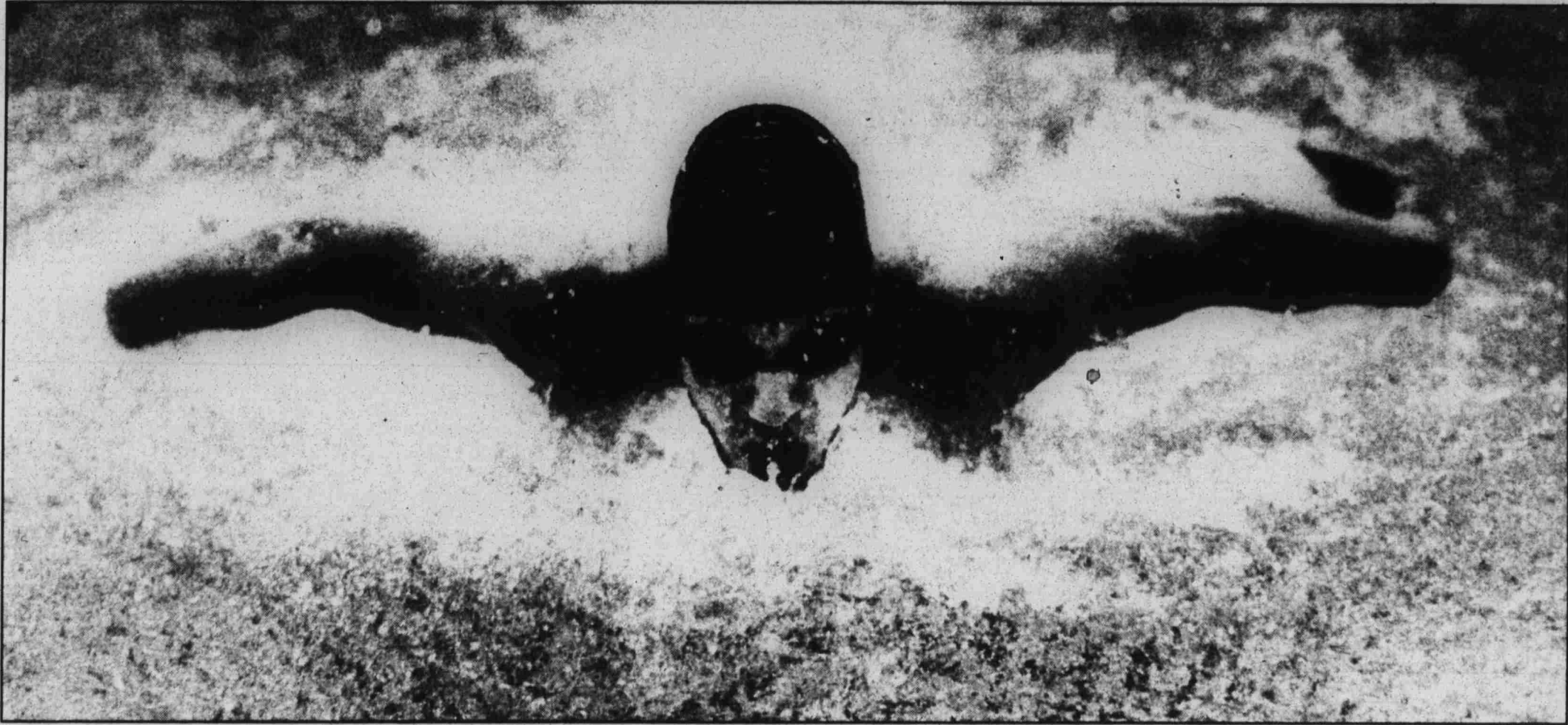

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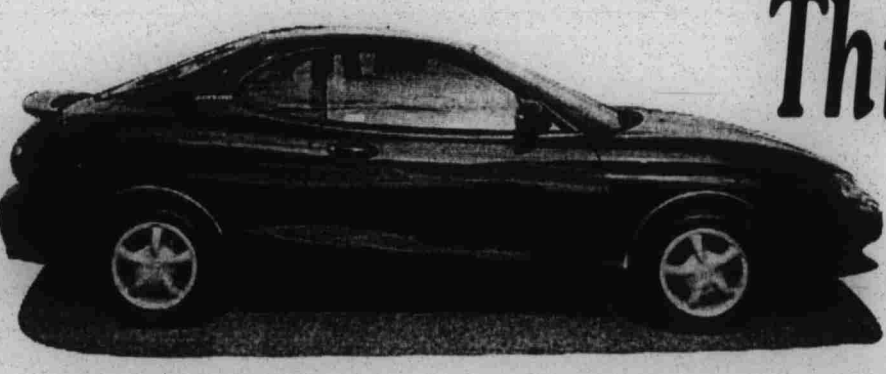
