City, Anthem hosting explosive celebrations

The biggest celebration in the city of Henderson will be even more explosive this year.

In addition to organizing the annual Fourth of July celebration at Morrell Park, the city is co-sponsoring a fireworks show and jazz concert at Anthem Hills Park.

City officials said hosting a celebration in the Anthem area addresses growth but will not take away from downtown festivities.

"The traditional Fourth of July celebration has a well established audience," Sue Kohl, assistant recreation coordinator, said. "(Anthem Hills) will be low key.'

Last year, more than 40,000 people celebrated Independence Day at Morrell Park, located on Basic Road and Water Street. Event coordinator Carolyn Anderson said Fourth of July is the largest holiday celebrated by the city.

"It's become a family tradition and visitors are amazed by the hometown feeling," Anderson said.

The Henderson Civic Symphony, Randy Anderson Band. and Marty Mahoney's Press Band will perform patriotic melodies throughout the celebration. Line dance music by Birdie Bridges will also be among the musical performances.

Veterans want more holiday recognition

For some citizens, Independence Day carries more meaning than the fireworks, barbecues and celebrations.

For many American war veterans, the day serves as a reminder of the very freedoms for which they fought.

"Being a veteran of a foreign war, we've all experienced fighting for the freedoms we celebrate," Robert Garlow said,

adding comment about today's soldiers. "They are basically in harms way every day, so we can have the freedoms we celebrate on the Fourth."

Garlow, commander of Boulder City's Veterans of Foreign Wars Post 36, served in the Air Force from 1966 to 1986 and fought in the Vietnam War from 1969 to 1970.

Ashby served in various conflicts in Central and South America from 1983 to 1987.

He said Independence Day does not mean very much for the youth of today. However, he added that since the terrorist attacks of Sept. 11, 2001, the meaning has been appreciated more than ever before.

City settles suit with developer

The city attorney office resolved a long-standing dispute with Thomas & Mack Co. this week, awarding the developer a settlement Henderson officials considered to be "not far from the middle."

The Henderson City Council approved the \$3.35 million settlement earlier, which took the two parties months of negotiations to reach.

"This matter was several years old and we were millions of dollars apart," Henderson City Attorney Shauna Hughes said.

The dispute concerned a 17acre parcel of land owned by Thomas & Mack at Sunset and Gibson roads. The city of Henderson acquired approximately 7,000 square feet of the property for the Gibson Road realignment in 2000.

According to Assistant City Attorney Andy Urban, both the city and Thomas & Mack to the value discrepancy, Co. had the land appraised and agreed there were no physical property damages caused by the project. However, the two appraisers did not agree on the damages to the property's residual value.

"It wasn't the size of the land we acquired, it was the location," Urban said.

Thomas and Mack's appraiser assessed the land as having lost approximately 40 percent of its value. The price per square foot was thought to have declined from \$10 to \$6.

"We felt the land's value was in the hundself of thousands of dollars and they thought it was worth in the millions of dollars," Hughes said.

"Thomas & Mack's appraiser assessed up to \$6 million in damages," Urban said. "We compromised by settling the

Urban noted the city of Henderson had used Thomas & Mack's appraiser in the past and found him to be very reputable. That factor, in addition caused the city attorney's office to open negotiations rather than take the case to trial.

"The weaknesses in the case caused us to opt for the 3 or 4 months of negotiations," Urban said.

Galleria mall hosting summer blood drive

Everyone can save a life Monday during a blood drive at the Galleria at Sunset mall on Sunset Road.

United Blood Services is coordinating the drive because it has been in emergency status, experiencing shortages in negative A and B blood types.

"We're hurting," UBS spokesperson Dan Perlstein said.

Blood donations normally suffer "seasonal difficulties," according to Perlstein, but supply shortages have been hitting the valley 30 days earlier.

He also said there has been a decrease in people showing up for donation appointments. As a result, more than 10,000 units of blood will be imported into Southern Nevada this year.

"Las Vegas is at the bottom of the barrel in blood donation," Perlstein said. "But this is a vibrant community and we shouldn't have to rely on imported blood."

UBS distributes 230 units of blood throughout the valley every day, which translates to 86,000 units per year. Perlstein said one blood drive contributes an average of 60 units of blood to the supply.

"If there is a serious accident, we would need between 50 to 60 units of blood for one person," he said. "Imagine how many would be needed for multiple (accident) victims."

Holocaust survivor speaks to crowd at Anthem Center

Although most Americans could never know the horror of the Holocaust first hand, Stephen Nasser was there to experience it. Now, 50 years later, he is sharing what he calls the defining period of his life with others.

"For 25 years I had nightmares where I would wake up crying," Nasser said, recalling how he dealt with the atrocities by Nazi soldiers. "Now I have come clean and feel good."

Nasser, a Henderson resident since 1991, spoke Sunday to a crowded room at Sun City Anthem's Anthem Center about his survival during the trying time. His book, My Brother's Voice, is a factual account of his time spent in a Nazi prison camp as a young

Nasser was 13 when his family was hauled away to the Auschwitz concentration camp. Boxcars carried them for five days to the camp where Nasser would see his entire family exterminated. Including his mother and brother, 20 family members were taken.

He was the only one to survive.

Nasser lived in the internment camp for more than a year before he was liberated by American troops in 1944. Suring that time he saw more atrocities than any one person could imagine.

His first day at the camp, he saw his uncle slain for snoring too loudly. He saw thousands of men and women shuffled into buildings under the guise that they were being cleansed, only to be covered in their ash after they had been incinerat-

"Thankfully my father died in 1943," Nasser told the crowd. "God must have done him a favor because he probably would not have made it through."

She is also a recipient of the Carver-Washington Award from the Baltimore Tuskegee Alumni Association (1995), the Andrew White Medal from Loyola College (1997), and the President's Medal from the Johns Hopkins University

He held his brother's head and shared his last breath as he died from starvation in the camp barracks, emaciated into a skeleton.

"I lifted up his bunk to find his food there," Nasser said, tears streaming down his cheeks. "He was far past starvation. His body could not digest the food at that point."

Nasser had kept a journal during his time there, much like the famous Anne Frank diary. He used a Boy Scout knife to write on cement paper bound together with wire.

"Anne Frank died, but her diary lived on," Nasser said. "I was the opposite. My diary was gone, but I got to live. I am sure she would have traded if she

could."

On April 30, 1945, this journal was lost in the final chapter of Nasser's life with the Nazis. They had told the prisoners that they were being set free and were taken back to their village. Nasser was too weak to exit the train and collapsed onto the floor. He heard machine guns and realized it was a trick. His people, mowed down in the very village in which they had lived their entire lives until the Holocaust.

Some of villagers made it back to the train and collapsed on top of Nasser. He lied underneath those dead men until a United States soldier found

"I passed out under the pile

of dead bodies after I had been shot in the knee by an American plane," Nasser said. "Then I woke up in a hospital and everything was white.

thought I was in heaven." When Nasser entered the camp, he weighed little more than 130 pounds. In the hospital the nurses weighed him in at a meager 72 pounds.

He spent two and a half months in the hospital before he was strong enough to walk again. In the end, 11,000 people went through Nasser's prison camp during the year he was there.

When he was freed, only 200 survived the starvation and hard labor. In total, the Holocaust claimed the lives of 6

million Jews and 5 million oth-

Nasser had to keep his memoirs from print for 50 years in order to protect his uncle.

While at the camp, Nasser's aunt Mary and her infant son were brutally murdered by Nazi officers when she refused to give the child up. Upon retuning home, Nasser did not have the heart to tell his uncle what conditions they had died

Nasser's uncle passed away in 1996. Nasser was now free to tell the world what he had suffered.

Stephens Press printed the book in 2003 and it is current-

ly in its fourth printing. Today Nasser holds no ill feelings toward Germany for the pain he endured. However, he will never forgive the Nazis

for what they did. "I hope I live past 100," Nasser proclaimed. "If I do, I will' have outlived every Nazi who tried to kill us. Put me in a room with a Nazi and only one of us would come out alive, and I think it would be me."



AMI's purpose is to strengthen the moral and spiritual foundation of the family and the home. Currently, it chooses to fight against pornography and the influence music television has upon young people.


"I stand firm in the fight



"It was probably harder than what I had at Division 1 because Coach Garritano was so intense," Grose said, reminiscing about the intensity drills the coach inflicted on his players where all they did was run. "When we had to practice so hard, if I could have come home and had a Players Drink. it would have been a whole lot easier."





Shelton recalls growing up with late President Reagan

Vida Isherwood Shelton has had the honor and privilege of seeing the country evolve for nearly a century now.

The 99-year old Illinois native reflects on her life with pride as she thumbs through the withered, yellow pages of her scrapbooks and shows her large collection of memorabilia.

She keeps alive the fading memory of early America by preserving artifacts such as her 1869 receipt book. Back in those days, the word receipt meant recipe.

"You're almost visiting a museum when you come here," Shelton said. "When you've lived to be 100, you have a lot of stuff."

Shelton began her life in Tampico, Ill., a small town with a population of 850. She was

born on Jan. 18, 1905, six years before the boy who would later be known as President Ronald Reagan was born in the second story apartment of the local bank.

Her father, George W. Isherwood, was the owner and editor of the town's weekly newspaper, The Tampico Tornado. She can remember her father talking about the day Ronald's mother, Nelle, came to the Tornado to make his birth announcement.

"She said it would be a nicename for a movie star," Shelton said. "My father thought she was crazy."

She went to school with Reagan where his mother taught them elocution classes. Nelle's memory stayed with her a long time, said Shelton, who saw Reagan's mother every time she would watch the President speak.

"I would think, 'There's gestures,' " she said.

Nelle and all of those hand She attributed Reagan's

affinity for jellybeans to his father, Jack, who worked in the local Pitney's grocery store. She said he would give a handful of them to the children if they behaved well in the store.

Reagan lived in Tampico until he was 11 years old when his father Jack got another job in a shoe store 30 miles away in the town of Dixon. According to Shelton, Reagan later claimed Dixon as his hometown because Tampico didn't have a public restroom or a restaurant.

Shelton recalled that 30-mile

trip to Dixon taking a number of hours to make during the times of the horse and buggy. It was not until 1927 that Shelton bought her first automobile, a 1927 Ford touring car for which she paid \$150.

"There wasn't any other color than black," she said.

She remembers having to wear a veil to keep from getting dirty as she drove because the roads were all dirt in those days.

As a child of an era when the milkman existed, Shelton recalls many aspects of life during those simpler times. In her day, movies were just a dime and dinners were just a dollar.

"That was a big, big price for a dinner back then," she said.

The same year Shelton graduated from the horse and buggy, she graduated from the Emerson College of Oratory in Boston, Mass. She later pursued a career as a junior college professor.

Shelton witnessed all the evolution and some of what she considers the devolution of the 20 Century.

"Things are better, but I don't think people are," she said. "As you get older, it seems like people are so busy they don't have time for anyone else. We all took care of each other and nowadays you don't know your next door

Clark County science teachers return from conference

Smart teachers make smart students.

This new idea may not be exactly true. Nevertheless, several Clark County School District educators have recently expanded their knowledge by attending the Annual JASON Conference in Milwaukee, Wis., to ensure their students receive well-rounded science instruction.

Linda Arnone - a physical science teacher at Thurman White Middle School — went to Milwaukee June 23 to 25 with fellow White teacher Patty Moore, Sharon Pearson of Bob Miller Middle School, Judy Kraus of James Gibson Elementary School, Pam Locascio of Lorna Kesterson Elementary School, and educators from Las Vegas schools and the district's School-Community Partnership Program.

"This is a really exciting program," Arnone said about the 16-year-old JASON Project. "It helps keep science fresh for me and it helps me

learn. I have learned so much. I've met teachers from all over the world."

Then again, Arnone isn't the ordinary JASON educator. She has been involved with the JASON Project — an integrated curriculum in which students work with scientists and learn subject specific material as well as cutting edge technology - for 12 years. Arnone is also on the advisory committee for the Argonaut selection process.

This year the JASON Project will investigate the disappearing Mississippi Delta wetlands. Arnone said four or five researchers go to the selected site and explore the area. Eventually, the JASON researchers make a recommendation for the future of that issue.

Southern Nevada has its own wetlands near Sam Boyd Stadium. "It will be a very nice connection," Arnone said. "That's not something a lot of people in Southern Nevada know about. It's a nice little tie in."

In January, JASON Project 16 will visit the Mis-

sissippi Delta where the giant river meets the Gulf of Mexico in New Orleans, La.

Arnone said 16 student Argonauts and four teacher Argonauts attend the actual scientific exploration in Louisiana. Southern Nevada has three student finalists, who will be interviewing over the summer but may not be chosen against a competitive international field. Locascio has been selected one of four teacher Argonauts.

"The Mississippi Delta is a very interesting place," Arnone said after learning much at the conference. "It is a place that needs protection. They are losing the wetlands at an alarming rate, which I didn't know."

There are several factors to the disappearing wetlands including the effects of the nutria, a large rodent from South America brought to the United States for its fur. "They have teeth like a beaver and are helping strip the wetlands," Arnone said. "They have gotten loose and found a comfortable environment in the Mississippi Delta and all over the South."

Besides the introduction of foreign species to the area, human activity has affected the habitat overall. The river has been redirected, so it no longer flows naturally. The fishing and shrimping industries have been instrumental in the reduction of sea life in and around the area of New Orleans.

JASON Project looks at all of these issues, makes a recommendation, and involves students of all ages across the nation to take part either personally or by telecast of live events along with a well-coordinated classroom pro-

"This program is very effective," Arnone said. "It gives teachers a really good overview of the subject."

Students can witness the JASON Project field exploration in January through their schools at Community College of Southern Nevada's Cheyenne Campus.

Lamping Elementary unveils science museum on campus

Frank Lamping Elementary School opened its Air to Space Museum with an open house and student guided tours Tuesday evening.

For the past year, students have been researching and developing the science exhibits that now line each of the school's three wings.

"Each grade level focused on a different aspect of flight," principal Michael O'Dowd

From flight aviation to space flight, students' reports and replicas span the entire history of the science. There are

also exhibits about the solar system and the moon and its phases.

The exhibit will be on display-open to the public for the next year.

The museum has brought the only Space Explorers Program in the western United States. It represents the first phase of the program.

The second phase of the program will arrive this fall. Last year, the Lamping community raised more than \$2 million to purchase space shuttle mission control simulators to allow students hands-on train-

The simulators will be locat-

ed within the school until a 4,000-square-foot building is built, which is to be named the William McCool Science Center in honor of the NASA astro-

McCool died with his crew when the space shuttle Columbia exploded during re-entry into the Earth's atmosphere.

McCool's parents, Audrey and Barry, are working closely with the school to bring the innovative team-building curriculum to Nevada.

The Las Vegas residents and UNLV academics were special guests at the ribbon cutting ceremony.

"My son frequently spoke to

school children about the space program, encouraging them to become interested in science and pursue their dreams," Barry McCool said.


William, McCool was planning to pursue a teaching career after his retirement from







Fletcher Music offers lessons to anyone starting for as little as \$19.90.









Iraqi sovereignty came two days ahead of schedule when political authority was handed to the new interim government Monday.

The handover took place between U.S. Administrator Paul Bremer and Iraq's senior judge, Mahdi Mahmoud. U.S. officials say security concerns prompted the early transfer.

Rep. Jon Porter, R-Nev., spent five days in Iraq during Father's Day weekend as part of an oversight mission for the U.S. House of Representa-

"I was anticipating it to happen on June 30," Porter said. "But they did the right thing. The sooner, the better."

Iraqi Interim Prime Minister Ayad Allawi will lead the country until national elections in January.

"There are serious challenges (in Iraq) and there is going to be a lot of work to do," Porter said. "Terrorists don't want their children to be free or their young women to vote."

Veterans of Foreign Wars Post 36 commander Robert Garlow said Iraqi people have to take charge of their coun-

He said this was always the plan.

"We didn't go in there to make them a state or a commonwealth," Garlow said. "We just want to give them their freedom and control."

Rep. Shelly Berkeley, D-Nev., however, said the cost of achieving the transition of power has been high.

According to a USA Today report, more than 848 Amer-

ican servicemen have died since the war began March 19, 2003, and 140,000 troops will continue to occupy Iraq, combating an increasingly violent insurgency.

"More will be asked of our troops in the ongoing effort to create a secure and stable Iraq," Berkeley said.

Berkeley said efforts to gain international support have "fallen short," despite NATO's recent decision to provide equipment and military training for Iraqi security forces. The agreement was reached Sunday at a NATO summit in Istanbul, Turkey.

In the meantime, Porter said he is not sure how many more troops will be needed in Iraq or how long their occupation will be.

"Once we get through the elections, we'll see what we should do," Porter said. "From now until then, it will be turbulent times."







Priorities: High school baseball or Little League

There's a divisive debate heating up in some coaching circles as the Ameri-

can Legion baseball season heats up.



It centers on whether or not the athletes, after making a physical and financial commitment to play for their respective Legion teams, should

still continue to play Little League and Little League All-Stars once the Legion season begins.

I feel strongly that once you get into the high school ranks, Little League should be a thing of the past. When I was starting high school, we didn't have Junior American Legion like there is today, but we still were committed to doing anything we could to start our high school careers early.

Many Junior Legion teams and varsity Legion teams are now suffering the same problems as All-Star tournaments heat up around the valley.

Countless athletes are forgoing their Legion teams to participate in their All-Star games, leaving their Legion teams scrambling for players during the mid-summer onslaught of baseball games.

While Little League is nice, I totally disagree with kids skipping out on what amounts to the beginning of their high school careers for All-Stars.

The summer Legion season doesn't have any "official" ties to the high school teams, but when the high school coaches are at the helm of the teams, they remember these type of slights.

Commitment is everything and you never get a second chance to make a first impression.

Basically, some players are turning their backs on their high school teammates for their shots at what — an All-Star patch and two more weeks of ego boosting Little League coaches telling them they are all that?

My opinion — and this is just my opinion so take it for what it's worth — is that once you start your high school career, everything Little League should be a distant memory. Why on earth should you forgo your chance to compete against the top high school players so you can play against "Little Leaguers" and the like?

The more pitches you see against better competition, the better a hitter you'll become. The better the hitters a pitcher faces, the better that player will become on the mound.

I am fully supportive of Little League, but once you get to 14 or 15 years old, it's time, unless you were cut from your high school team, to hang up the Little League T-shirts and start wearing your school colors.

Top-of-the-line players should take off the patches, start their prep careers and leave the parentally contaminated political madness of Little League baseball behind.

After all, it's your high school teammates that will be with you the next four years, not the muttish mix of mercenary All-Stars you play with on your Little League team two weeks out of every year.

Of course this is just this sportswriter's opinion. High school Legion coaches don't feel this way, or do they?

Foothill's Cassandra Strickland headed to Junior Olympics

When she started her sophomore school year at Foothill High School, Cassandra Strickland hadn't ever competed at the varsity level in the triple jump, the long jump or the high jump.

In fact, she wasn't even a member of Foothill's track team, but at the persistence of her father and the constant effort of Falcon track and field coach Greg Walker, Strickland finally relented.

Fast forward three years later and Strickland, who recently graduated, is a two-time state champion, a state record holder and a recent signee of the University of California-Berkeley.

"Cal just had a good balance between academics and athletics at the school," said Strickland, who signed a week after winning her second state title this past May. "I visited them once, the day before regionals, and it was a good reaction once I got there.

"I knew I wanted to go there. I like the coaches and I liked the athletes."

Now Strickland has her sights set on winning gold at this year's Junior Olympics.

Strickland, who set a personal record in winning the recent Western Regional meet in San Diego with a triple jump of 40 feet, 10 inches, is set to compete in the Junior Olympics July 22-25.

At the meet, she'll once again test her skills against the top high school athletes in the world.

"I've had the chance to compete with them already but this one is going to be special because the professionals are going to be there," Strickland said. "It's going to be crazy and I'll probably get star-struck."

Competing in the Junior Olympics is a far cry from the struggling sophomore who almost gave up midway through her first season. But soon after starting, her improvement began to increase exponentially and by the time the season was

over, she was the triple jump state champion.

"I actually wasn't doing well and I wanted to quit the triple jump," she said. "Then every so often, I started to increase in spurts and I started doing well. I didn't have any idea of how to do it at the beginning.

"It was unrealistic to win state and it came out of nowhere. It was a big thing for Foothill too be-

cause I was the first state champion at the school. I was surprised it happened."

With all athletes, there also comes a time when they must fight through injuries and adversity which is what made Strickland's junior season a growing process to say the least.

GV grad Krynzel starts rehab after suffering injury

When former Green Valley standout Dave Krynzel started the 2004 season with the Milwaukee Brewers' triple-A affiliate Indiana Indians, it seemed only a matter of time before the 1999 grad would be called up to the Major Leagues.

But 16 games into the season Krynzel fouled a ball off his foot April 25, breaking the bone in his foot and leaving him on the disabled list for an expected time of 8-12

Just eight weeks later, Krynzel is back and ready for action as he begins his rehab assignment with the Arizona Brewers, a rookie league team for the Brewers.

"It feels great to get back out here," Krynzel said. "I'm feeling great, doing fine and I'm having a good time working again. It feels good to be playing baseball."


Krynzel was batting .263 in 57 atbats with Indianapolis before the injury, hitting two home runs and knocking in five runs while stealing three bases.

The injury slowed what seemed to be a fast-track path for the talented center fielder.

"Triple-A was really fun before the injury because it's great baseball," Krynzel said. "I definitely was starting to feel comfortable and I was realizing what you need to do to be a good player at that level.

"The at-bats, the attitude and all that, you have to be real consistent in every part of the game. The triple-A pitching is really good and the big league pitching is even better so it was getting me prepared."

"I'm getting my body back in shape, fine-tuning it back into baseball condition," Krynzel said. "It's work everyday and that's it. I know that after the first week of games, it'll feel like it will never stop."


After losing to Bishop Gorman in its first meeting 7-6, Coronado's American Legion baseball team fell short again Monday, this time at home, 11-

Medrano said. "He is a little lefty with a lot of movement on the ball. It's nothing overpowering, but the location is key."


Jake Gibson went 2-for-3 with two stolen bases to pace the attack and Medrano said his entire lineup is contribut-

CCSN's Tabor returns early from Alaskan league after suffering injury





But after a poor showing by the Gators teamed with questions about a shoulder injury, his stock seemingly fell as he waited for colleges to call.





After manuevring through the winner's bracket, the Coyotes were swept by Dixie in the finals. The sweep eliminated the defending national champions from the postseason as Dixie — which won three games that afternoon to upset the Coyotes — went on to win the NJCAA National title.

Now, the Coyotes have more to prove next spring, which is why Tabor says conditioning is going to be important for the whole team, including himself.

With the summer being a nice break from all things school, Tabor also is taking it easy when he's not working out for next spring.

"In the offseason I try to not think about things too much," he said. "I want to get my legs and my body stronger in the weight room so I can improve every time I go out there."

Whatever he's been doing, it has worked.

Tabor has gained consider-

able weight since he transfered to CCSN, adding much needed mass to the pitcher's lanky physique.

"I transferred from UNLV weighing about 160 pounds and I'm already up to 180 now, so it's working," Tabor said.

Tabor also is working towards a professional career.

After being drafted by the Philadelphia Phillies in 2003, Tabor was drafted by the New York Yankees this past spring and according to Tabor, they will pursue him as a draft-and-follow option.

The knowlege that he is getting solid looks from Major League teams is fuel for Tabor as he continues to condition himself physically and emotionally. "It motivates me a lot because it's always been my goal to play professional baseball," Tabor said. "If I can move up further in the draft every year, it would help reach that goal."

Tabor says he is happy the Yankees took the draft-andfollow risk. He says it shows that he is indeed a Major League prospect.

"The Yankees wanted a draft-and-follow, and a whole year could go either way so it's a big risk for them," he said. "I'm glad they took a chance on me and are willing to wait that year."

After starting the season as the favorite to win the state title again and winning every meet she competed in, Strickland was nearly out after suffering a hairline fracture in her ankle two weeks before the regional meet.

Facing a tough decision, Strickland played through the pain and won the regional in the triple jump, the long jump and the high jump.

But the injury came back to haunt her as she struggled in the state meet, taking second in the triple jump, second in the long jump and third in the high jump.

"It was really tough once I hurt my ankle because I couldn't put much pressure on it,"
Strickland said. "I was disappointed, of course, but I realized that I was a main member
of the team as a captain.

"I knew what I could do and I knew my ability. I wanted to get back to where I was the previous season and I tried my best."

After suffering the disappointment of losing her state title, Strickland came back with a vengeance her senior year and won the state title, breaking a personal best record while setting the state record in the triple jump.

"It was my senior year and I wasn't trying to lose to anyone younger than me," Strickland said. "During the summer between my senior year and junior year, I met some coaches that helped me train prior to the season.

"I was working on everything and weightlifting. Into the season I stopped lifting but at practice, I kept running and jumping and I improved. I peaked at the end of the year when you're supposed to."

The highlight was breaking the 40-foot marker, which she did in her state title appear-

ance.

"Breaking the '39 mental block' and get to 40 was amazing," she said. "I broke a personal record and a state record at the same time so my name will stay up on the board. At that time, I was jumping around like crazy so everyone knew I had done something special."

Strickland also fared well in her other events, taking second in the long jump and tying for second in the high jump.

Not soon after, she signed with Cal — ranked in the top 20 nationally — before heading to San Diego and the Western Regional where she finished first in the triple jump (40 feet, 10 inches) and third in the long jump (18 feet, 1 inch).

Strickland is heading to a school with four recent All-Americans — including one in the triple jump — not to mention one that boasts 44 former Olympians, two of which who competed in the triple jump.

ompeted in the triple jump.

The school also boasts six

former gold medallists, two silver medallists and two bronze medallists.

"It would be a great opportunity to get a chance to compete in the Olympics," Strickland said. "That is something I am going to strive for now once I start college."

Now, with a bright future with the Golden Bears, Strickland is living out her dreams while also getting a free education.

"It's a big relief and once I think about it, it's really amazing," Strickland said. "I'm going to be going through school without having to pay for anything.

"After I started track I thought about it all the time, but before I started, I didn't even think about attending college on a track scholar-ship."

What a difference three years makes.



Serve up Hot Dogs this Fourth of July

You're not in a hot dog eating contest, yet you're craving a Fourth of July frank. The National Hog Dog and Sausage Council offers this recipe for hot dogs, with a New Orleans-style kick:

RILLED DOGS WITH CREOLE SAUCE Makes enough for 10 hot dogs

5 slices bacon, diced 1/2 cup chopped onion 1/4 cup chopped green pepper 14.5-oz. can diced tomatoes 1/4 tsp. chili powde 1/4 tsp. paprika

1/8 tsp. garlic powder 1/4 tsp. dried oregano 1/4 tsp. dried thyme 1/4 tsp. salt 1/8 tsp. black pepper 1/8 tsp. cayenne pepper 10 hot dogs or knockwurst

10 hot dog buns, split

Cook bacon over medium heat in a heavy skillet until crisp. Remove and reserve bacon

Drain all but 2 tsps. of the bacon drippings. Add onion and green pepper, and cook until soft. Stir in diced tomatoes, all spices and seasonings. Reduce heat, cover and gently simmer for 15 minutes. Preheat a gas or charcoal grill to medium heat. Place hot dogs/wurst on grill rack, about 4 to 5 inches from the heat. Cook hot dogs/wurst to an internal temperature of 165 degrees.

During the last three to four minutes of cooking, open hot dog buns and lightly toast over indirect heat. Place hot dogs/wurst into toasted buns. Ladle creole sauce over hot dogs/wurst. Sprinkle with chopped bacon

Tomato disorders a common problem for Southern Nevada growers

No matter how you pronounce it, a tomato still taste great. But, latelyit seems harsh climate and nutrient deficiencies have contributed to an in-

crease in disorders, limiting tomato production. Problems include:

• Blossom Drop — Daytime

temperatures higher than 90 degrees or nighttimes higher than 75 will cause blossom termination. Sustained, hot temperatures at night burn up the

food reserves produced by the don't grow properly. The bottomato during the day.

 Blossom End Rot — When the developing fruit doesn't obtain enough calcium, its cells don't grow properly. The bottom of the tomato becomes hard, black and unappealing. This disorder appears when the fruit is young. It's not that

there was insufficient calcium in the soil, but rather the fruit received insufficient water, which carries calcium to the growing tissue.

• Curling Leaves — Curling leaves on healthy tomatoes is common. Some varieties naturally curl more than others.. Sunny days, staking and excessive pruning can also cause curl. If leaves build up excessive carbohydrate (food) levels, curl re-

curl results.
There is a virus disease,

transmitted
by the sugar beet leafhopper,
called Curly Top disease.
Leaves of infected plants roll
upward, with some twisting.
The veins on the underside of
the leaf turn purple, the foliage
becomes a dull yellow and the
plant stops growing. The fruit
on the vine ripens prematurely
without increasing in size, and
the plant eventually dies. In-

moved as a sanitary measure.

• Sunscald — Large green and near-ripe tomatoes sunscald easily when exposed to extreme heat and bright sun. Tissue develops a blistered, water-soaked appearance, which leads to sunken areas.


• Fruit Cracking — When temperature climbs above 90 degrees and irrigation or high relative humidity follows, the moisture promotes extremely rapid growth and excessive cell enlargement within the fruit; cracks result. An even supply of moisture should prevent this. Try covering the ground under the tomatoes with two to four inches of mulch — but not too close to the stem.

Once tomatoes start ripening, check vines daily so they're harvested at their peak. Cut or gently twist off the fruits, while supporting the vine to keep from damaging it.

Ripe tomatoes can stay refrigerated for several weeks, and green ones will eventually ripen if kept in a warm place, out of direct sunlight. To slowly ripen them, and thereby extend your harvest, wrap them in newspaper and place in a dark, cool area, checking frequently to make sure none rot.



 Scouting provides the confidence, determination and skills needed to thrive in today's world.

In Southern Nevada, the first Girl Scout troop was organized on April 15, 1932, in Boulder City, with 22 girls.

Currently, Henderson has 27 Girl Scout troops with approximately 300 girl members and 94 adult members; Boulder City has four troops, with approximately 68 girl members and 28 adult members.



'Fahrenheit 9/11': Filmmaker's op-ed piece, fact or fiction?

HE: The first time he took just a microphone and a camera to expose injustice to Flint, Mich., in "Roger and Me." Last year, he took on the National Rifle Association in "Bowling for Columbine." Now, controversial filmmaker Michael Moore preys on more victims of loss in a near treasonous attempt to discredit our current president in this week's flick, "Fahrenheit 9/11."

SHE: Moore is the narrator in his latest documentary. He follows the time period from a few months before the Sept. 11, 2001, tragedy to the present, in the Bush Administration. He looks to uncover several inconsistencies within the administration, as well as key problems he sees with the Bush family. In the end, it is Moore's objective to shed light on a president he clearly feels should not have been in office in the first place.

HE: While built upon pretty solid filmmaking, I find it hard to believe the film deserved the Cannes Film Festival's top honor, the Palme d'Or. Of course it was the French and the liberal members of the entertainment business who

gave it to him, so I guess I shouldn't be too surprised. Not even his best work, "Fahrenheit 9/11" is Moore's attempt to indict our sitting president for various conspiracies such as big oil, stealing. elections, creating a war in Iraq as well as for simply being a poor leader during the

Funny but, immediately after Sept. 11, Bush's approval ratings were the highest of any sitting president — ever. Moore is preying on the short memories or ignorance of those who too soon forget what an amazing leader he was during the single worst day in our country's history.

· SHE: There is nothing groundbreaking or innovative about this film, but it is well made. Moore is clear in his point, although he never just comes out and says what he hopes the audience will infer.

More than likely, this film would have collected a few liberal fans here and there. But the hype beforehand greatly helped launch it as a "mustsee" pre-election film.

HE: Moore is a talented opinion-based documentary director. It's unfortunate he uses his talents to profit from the misfortunes of the less fortunate. I've heard nothing about how any of the \$21.8 million the film earned in its opening weekend went to the crumbling families and hurting Iraqis he exploits to further his overly liberal agenda.

The movie is a compilation of footage and out-of-context sound bytes mixed together to seemingly indict Bush on circumstantial evidence. In a court of law, it would not warrant an indictment, nonetheless a conviction.

SHE: I agree. A lot of dates are left out as Moore goes

back and forth between different time periods, as if he did not trust his audience to catch his point. He almost had me believing until he said Bush used the media to make his evil plan come to fruition. As if the media is conservative and would ever knowingly help a republican? That deduction is so absurd it made me think the rest of the flick was a little off base as well.

HE: Political disagreements aside, Moore is very talented and gives a cynical point of view some laughs. The way he puts people on camera in uncomfortable positions is both funny and entertaining. The whole bit where he attempts to get members of congress which only boasts one congressman with a child currently serving in Iraq — to volunteer their own children for military service is priceless.

"Bowling for Columbine" truly changed my opinion on gun control, but "Fahrenheit 9/11" did little, but add to my resolve as a staunch supporter for our current (and hopefully second-term) president. It's too much opinion and not enough fact. His resources aren't a wide spectrum of characters, but better yet the who's who of the far left "Fahrenheit 9/11" for being one-sided, but it's frustrating Moore barely acknowledges there even is another side. Just as he accuses President Bush, he preys on fear mongering to get his point across. .

SHE: The truth is, Moore was less concerned about generating compassion for people in Flint, Mich. - who he claims are being taken advantage of - than he is about exposing them. It is so exploitive at times, it is difficult to watch. We see a mother of a soldier, who has just been killed in Iraq, double over in grief. Instead of comforting

her, the camera zooms out to catch all the emotion. It is sick in this regard.

HE: Just like the upcoming election, this movie is polarizing. If you don't approve of Bush, you might like it. If you are a staunch supporter, you will probably hate it and be moved to frustration because you are unable to defend him to the rest of the audience.

As a film, this is nothing special. On a political scale, it reminds me of "The Passion of the Christ." Free speech is just that, and this is an interpretation of the president's legacy interpreted by Moore the same way "The Passion" was Mel Gibson's interpretation of the final days of Jesus Christ. Only this time, the film didn't face near as much resistance. I find that a little ironic since one has been a source of spiritual awakening in many, while the other merely incites divisiveness on both ends of the political spectrum.

SHE: Moore's style is interesting and in-your-face; however, after leaving the theater, instead of feeling his desired reaction of outraged, I felt sad. Instead of deploring the military, I felt like I wanted to join them. Moore does make some Agood points about Iraq and I don't have a problem withthe relationship between the Bush's and Bin Ladins, but they are overshadowed by the sucker punches he decides to throw. Still, I would recommend seeing this film - discover what you believe is truth. I give it a B-.

HE: For his crowd, the film is a rallying cry, but for others, it's a reminder that a long, divisive road lies ahead as we progress towards the 2004 presidential election. Regardless, the film isn't the best documentary I have seen, and it isn't even Moore's best. I give it a C+, but have to give Moore, who is trying to get his point across, an "A" for effort.







Diplomate in Low Vision Care helps those with macular degeneration to keep reading and driving.

Just because you have macular degeneration (or other vision-limiting conditions) doesn't always mean you must give up driv-

Ever look through a pair of field glasses or binoculars? Things look bigger and closer, and much easier to see. A California optometrist, Dr. Richard J. Shuldiner, is using miniaturized binoculars or telescopes to help people who have lost vision from macular degeneration or other eye conditions.

"Some of my patients consider me the last stop for people who have vision loss." Said Dr. Shuldiner, a low vision optometrist who limits his practice to visually impaired patients in San Bernardino, Mission Viejo, Palm Springs, Long Beach, Barstow, Burbank

and San Diego County. "People don't know that there are doctors who are very experienced in low vision care," Dr. Shuldiner happens to be one of only 51 Low Vision Diplomats in the world, from the American Academy of Optometry.
"To become a Diplomate," says Dr.
Shuldiner, "took five years of study and the
passing of various tests given by the Academy. It was a tremendous challenge but well worth the effort."

Macular Degeneration is the most common eye disease amongst the senior popula-tion. As many as 25% of those over 65 have some degree of degeneration. The macula is one small part of the entire retina, but it is the most sensitive and gives us sharp images.



When it degenerates, macular degeneration leaves a blind spot right in the center of vision making it impossible to recognize faces, read a book, or pass-the driver's vision

The experts do not know what causes macular degeneration. But it is known that factor. Other factors are smoking, aging of

course, and improper nutrition. There are two types, wet and dry. Nine out of ten people who have macular degeneration have the dry type. There is no medical treatment except for vitamins. The wet type is more aggressive and results in more dramatic vision loss. It involves leaky blood vessels that can sometimes be scaled with hot or cold laser. Unfortunately, it's a temporary fix since other leaks usually occur. Neither type

can be reversed or cured "My job is to figure out everything and anything possible to keep a person functioning," he said,

Even if it's driving. Donald Paquette, 72, a former county assessor from Anaheim, California saw Dr. Shuldiner last November. "I could not read the street signs soon enough when driving, and I couldn't read my saxophone music

Dr. Shuldiner fit him with bioptic telescope glasses. "Amazing!" says Donald. "I can read the street signs twice as far as I did before. I can play my sax again. Happy day!" Dr. Shuldiner also provided special "prismatic" reading glasses to make the newspaper a little easier to read.

. Carole Buckles, 71 of Arcadia California came to Dr. Shuldiner on the advise of a friend. "I wanted to be able to keep driving and do the fun things in life." One of those fun things is Angels Baseball. "I love going to Angel Stadium and now I can see those close plays again" she says.

Dr. Shuldiner prescription bioptic tele-

scopic glasses to read signs and see traffic lights farther away.

As Carole puts it, "These telescope glasses that Dr. Shuldiner has provided not only allows me to read signs from a farther distance, but makes driving much easier". "I've also used them to watch television so I don't have to sit so close. Definitely worth the \$1975 cost. I don't know why I waited two years to do this; I should have "come

"Telescopic glasses usually cost over \$2000", says Dr. Shuldiner, "especially if we build them with an automatic sunglass. Ellen Imboden traveled from Sweden

and was helped with two pairs of glasses: special \$475 prismatic glasses that let her read newsprint, as well as bioptic telescopes to continue driving in Sweden. Low vision devices are not always expensive. Some reading glasses cost as little







To avoid motor-travel interruptions, consider the following precautionary measures before mapping out your next excursion.

1. Tires — Check for uneven wear, cracking, peeling or bumps along the sidewall.

Rotate, balance and inflate all four tires to the manufacturers recommended PSI for a fully loaded vehicle.

2. Oil — Change your auto's oil. Synthetic oil resists breakdown in high heat and humidity. Oil changes are recommended every 3,000 miles and should be done by a reputable dealer using OEM parts.

3. Battery — The average lifespan of a battery is three years. Extreme heat or cold will reduce the life expectancy to two years or less. Determine how old your battery is and check for dry cells. Fill the liquid cavities with distilled water only! Clean off any corrosion around the posts or metal connectors. Tighten all cables and secure the battery in its' housing.

4. Washer fluid - Fill all washer fluid reservoirs. Vehicles with rear wipers often have a second container located in the rear near the light housing and accessible

through the trunk interior. 5. Brake and Transmission

fluid - Automobile manufac-

ing diagnostic. Remember to shut off your air conditioning before you turn off the engine, this reduces the demand on the vehicle's electrical system when you start the motor.

8. Air filter - Change your air filter every six months or 6,000 miles, for enhanced vehicle performance and gas

9. Roof rack - All vehicles have a total load limit. The load allowance includes the amount of weight the roof rack can bear, usually 150 pounds or less. The roof rack load allowance must be included in the total vehicle weight limit. This weight limit includes the vehicle's curb weight plus the average weight of the occupants, belongs, fuel and roof cargo: Overloading the vehicle may result in vehicle instability, tire blow-out, and reduced fuel economy. Local truck stops have vehicle scales available to check your load

weight. 10. Towing - In addition to measuring weight allowances in your vehicle, review the maximum trailer weight rating of your vehicle when fully loaded. A weight distributing receiver with electrical outlet for trailer brake lights and hook-ups for safety chains is the preferred towing method of most manufacturers.
