

SNOW IN THE HENDERSON HILLS



A two-day winter storm left peaks of the River Mountains behind Sun City Anthem blanketed with about 4 feet of snow Monday afternoon, according to the National Weather Service. The storm, which came in from the Pacific Ocean, began late Saturday night and by Monday morning had left mountains snow capped and valley streets drenched in rain, according to the National Weather Service. A total of 1.5 inches of rain was recorded for the city of Henderson Monday afternoon, while Las Vegas received 1.04 inches and Boulder City received 2.03 inches. For the weekend, forecasters predict a 30 percent chance of more rain Saturday night, with another winter storm for surrounding mountains expected Sunday night.

Residents shocked by property tax increases

Skyrocketing property values are putting a squeeze on many homeowners at tax time and have prompted calls for a cap on yearly assessments.

The value of some homes for the 2005 tax year has increased as much as 60 percent, Clark County Assessor Mark Schofield said. Since tax notices were mailed out Nov. 10, the assessor's office has received 1,500 to 2,000 phone calls a day from property owners blindsided by the size of the increases, Schofield said.

Tony Cutropia, a six-year resident of Sun City MacDonald Ranch, saw his property valuation increase

\$323,000 to \$418,000 - a hike of more than 29 percent.

For retirees like Cutropia, who lives on fixed income, increases in living costs, such as taxes, can drastically change their quality of life.

"This to me was not in proportion with what we're making. We get small increases in our Social Security or maybe some of our pensions, but I think it has affected the community because we can't go out and do many of the things we like to do," Cutr-

ropia said. "We can't go out and patronize businesses. We can't afford to go out as much," he said.

Proposal for island at Lake Las Vegas gets nod from commission

Plans to transform part of the Lake Las Vegas Resort into a man-made island with luxury houses, condos and restaurants has won approval by the Henderson Planning Commis-

While developers still have some safety concerns to iron out, planning commissioners last week gave resort representatives the go-ahead to continue with their plans until the proposal goes before the City Council on Dec. 16 for final approval.

Commissioners voted 6-0 to approve the plans presented by the resort's chief operating officer, Brad Nelson, for Moroccan-influenced architecture, small winding streets and trails.

"This is an absolutely gorgeous project," said Commissioner George Bochanis. 'I'd love to see some Mediterranean style come to Hender-

If approved by the City Council, construction of the island may begin as early as next year and would be slated for completion within about 5

years, Nelson said. To create the island, developers plan to dig out a 25-foot deep, half-mile channel from the tip of a peninsula to separate about 55 acres of land, he

said. Commissioners at the Nov. 18 meeting said their only concern so far is that a proposed underground parking garage would not have radio or cellular phone coverage in case of emergencies.

"That is a problem because if there is a crime committed or an emergency like someone having a heart attack down there, no one can call out for help," said Henderson Deputy Fire Marshall Fulton Cochran. "So, that will be something we

will need to work with."

It is too early to determine every safety issue and fix it, Cochran said. But, he said, "Lake Las Vegas is working with us to make sure it's a safe community..."

Residents and visitors would be able to access the island from the mainland by two bridges built over the water. The bridges would be built high enough so that sailboats and yachts could pass underneath, Nelson said.

While two hotel-casinos and several restaurants planned for the island, the majority of the land would be used for residential development, Nelson said.

Homes would range in size from 400-square-foot condos to 5,000-square-foot penthouses, which could cost several million dollars each, he said.

Anthem residents fighting cell tower

Sprint ensures 26-foot-tower will resemble light pole

Residents of Sun City Anthem say they paid big money for houses overlooking the golf course, not for a view of a metal cell tower Sprint wants to build on the property.

"Not in my backyard," resident Harry Sarzasy said Thursday at a Henderson Planning Commission meeting where Sprint asked for final approval to build the 26-foot-tall tower.

"We paid \$120,000 extra when we purchased our house just to have the view we have and we just don't want to have to look at this thing. shouldn't have to."

Sprint previously had gotten approval from golf course owners Troon Revere Holdings for what Sprint representative Tracy Cline called a "simple request" to place the tower.

About a dozen Anthem residents who showed up for the meeting at Henderson City Hall shared Sarzasy's objection to the tower, which would be about 1,000 feet from their

"Nobody who lives along our street wants to see this thing just plopped down right smack dab in the gorgeous view we have," said Sarzasy's wife, Mary Frank. "I think someone should consider that

we don't want Sprint to just drop this thing in on us."

Commissioners asked Cline to hold a neighborhood meeting to discuss the proposal and try to reach a compromise.

"I will do it, but I don't know I can gain very much from it," Cline said. "I don't think I can make these folks happy, but I'll be happy to try."

City auctioning 547 acres of federal land next year

The city of Henderson plans to auction off land near the Henderson Executive Airport beginning next year, pending congressional approval of a bill backed by Sens. Harry Reid, D-Nev., and John Ensign,

The bill, introduced Nov. 18, calls for the transfer of about 547 acres of federal land in an area the city annexed in 2000. Lawmakers are expected to take up the bill during the legislative session that begins in January.

The Bureau of Land Management "has designated this parcel for disposal because of its urban surroundings and its isolation from other public land, which renders it difficult

for the agency to manage," a statement from Reid's office

Once the land is transferred to the city, Henderson will break it up into smaller parcels and sell it for nonresidential development.

Zoning cannot be enforced without transferring the land because the federal government is not subject to city laws and ordinances.

By subdividing the properties, the city expects to yield a larger return, said John Rinaldi Jr., manager of the city's office of property management and redevelopment. He said he could not estimate the land's value because each parcel is going to be released over a long period of time.

"We can't predict how much

money it is going to be involved," Rinaldi said. "It's really a function of when the parcels are put on the market and the size they are and the condition of the market at the time when it is sold."

Although the value cannot be determined yet, Rinaldi said the city also benefits because it can control the area's growth.

"We also get the ability to guide development around Henderson Executive Airport," Rinaldi said. "We want to ensure and guarantee we don't have residential development in close proximity to the air-

"By the city taking titles to these properties, we can zone 'it to make sure development will be compatible with the airport," he said.

The city plans to zone the property for business parks and industrial development, "which would help diversify our employment base, which is a goal of the city," Rinaldi said. Land not sold after 20 years will return to the federal government, but that is not expected to happen, Rinaldi said.

The city's charter requires that all land sales be made at fair market value. The city would take bids, and the city council selects the highest bid-

After selling the land, the city will deposit 85 percent of the proceeds in a special account as part of the Southern Nevada Public Land Management Act of 1998. This money goes to the federal government.

The city keeps 10 percent for its expenses and 5 percent goes to the state for general education programs.

The city may elect to retain some of the land for public use, such as for parks.

Wildhorse granted its use permit

The Henderson Planning Commission on Thursday approved a conditional use permit for Wright Golf Managment to run the newly reopened Wildhorse Golf Club and its restaurant at 2100 West Warm Springs Road

The golf course's previous permit expired between the time the club closed in February for renovations and its reopening Nov. 3. Conditional use permits expire if they are not used within 180 days and must be reapplied for.

Wildhorse Golf Club was inaugurated Friday as Henderson's first municipal golf course

The city acquired the golf course during a land swap in which two city-owned parcels were traded for residential development use to Wildhorse Enterprises, a partner with The Walters Group and American Nevada Co.

District to get propane tank

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The Henderson Planning Commission on Thursday approved letting the Clark County School District place a 1000-gallon propane

tank at the school district's maintenance headquarters at 1180 Military Tribute Place.

The propane tank will be used to fuel forklifts and other heavy machinery during school-related maintenance projects.

Ner Tamid design review approved


The Henderson Planning Commission voted 6-0 Thursday night to award a conditional use permit and approve the design review of a synagogue to be built for use by Congregation Ner Tamid.

Groundbreaking for the new building, which will stand on 8.5 acres of land at the corner of I-215 and Valle Verde Drive in Henderson, is slated for June, said the congregation's Executive Director Irv Duchowny. Construction is expected to be complete by August 2006, he said.


The new facility will replace a building at 2761 Emerson Ave. in Las Vegas and will feature a temple, social hall, religious school, early childhood center, full kitchen, soccer fields and an outdoor amphitheater.

Once the facility is up and running, Duchowny said, he hopes the congregation can start a full-time, private day school.









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Roadhouse ready to wrangle guests for outdoor events

Henderson residents can expect more outdoor events at the Roadhouse Casino now that the city planning commission has granted it a conditional use permit.

In a 6-0 vote, commissioners

approved the permit that will allow Roadhouse to hold backto-back events on a three-acre lot outside the casino at 2100 N. Boulder Highway.

"We had been using temporary permits to have rodeos on the property, but now that we have this new permit, we can hold events whenever we want and won't have to keep reapplying," casino General Manager Joe Sulima said.

Sulima said he plans to hold a number of outdoor concerts beginning next year.

The casino also is interested in holding classic car shows and other family activities, he said.

Sulima received the permit on the condition that the casino submit plans to the city for trail and landscape improvements, as required by the Boulder Highway Beautification Program, said Principal

Planner Deena Woodbury of the city of Henderson.

"The condition is that their plans have to be submitted and approved by the city before the next event is held," she said.

Sulima said the city is requiring the casino to build a 12-foot-wide blacktop trail that has to traverse the prop-

erty in front of the building. "We're in the process of getting that done now," he said.

Concordia Homes again denied by planning commission on previously proposed project

A representative for Concordia Homes of Nevada was caught trying to present a previously denied plan for a housing development as a new design to the Henderson Planning Commission on Thursday night.

Company representative John Marchiano presented a design review named "Autumn Ridge," which he proposed to be developed on 10 acres of land near the southeast corner of Bermuda Road and Liberty Heights Avenue in Henderson.

The design review of the proposed residential models featured nearly identical looking two-story homes with garages lined up next to each other.

Commissioner George Bochanis looked at the design review and pointed out that it looked exactly like a previously submitted project that had been denied.

Marchiano shrugged and tried to convince commissioners that the plan was different from the other project because it featured more windows, city-required window popstone veneer.

"Yeah, but it's still the same product with no elevation changes or setbacks like we needed," Bochanis said. "It just looks like garages and driveways all the way down. It just looks like the same product actually."

Shaking his head, Marchiano looked at commissioners and chuckled.

"I don't want to say you caught me, but well, OK, you caught me," Marchiano said.


Commissioners couldn't stop themselves from smiling at Marchiano and moved to give the representative a 30day continuance to redesign his product and come back for approval.

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Nearly one year later, fatal crash still far from resolved

Nearly one year after a fatal car accident on Nov. 10, 2003. killed Henderson teenagers Kyle Poff, Travis Dunning and Josh Parry, injured Cody Frederick and landed the intoxicated teen driver in the Clark County Juvenile Detention Center, the Roman family of Henderson has agreed on a \$300,000 insurance settlement to be split among the four families of the dead and

injured teens.

The driver, who was 16 at the time of the accident, allegedly consumed several beers at the Roman household before driving his car into a wall on Silver Springs Parkway at 80 mph. Bob and Pamela Roman claim they were unaware the boy been drinking at their

Since the crash the case has served as a focal point for debate over teens and drinking. The driver initially was charged as an adult, but a

group of mothers calling themselves Moms on a Mission pushed to move his case to juvenile court. Stop DUI, a nonprofit advocacy group, pushed for greater punishment.

"In this situation, there was a lot of blame to be shared in many different directions," Sandy Heverly, executive director of Stop DUI, said.

The driver is slated to be released from Juvenile Detention on Feb. 23, 2006, and will remain on probation until he is

For the families involved, resentment and anger linger, and the settlement offer is no help.

"It's going to be a long road,"

said Rick Poff, father of Kyle. "Personally, I don't care about the money. That has nothing to do with it. I want the Romans to accept the responsibility, to take the blame. For them to never admit to making a mistake is a joke. They shouldn't have been sleeping while kids were there drinking-period."

Tina Parry, mother of Josh, echoed these sentiments. "With the Romans," she said, "it's not about the money. I would have been much happier if they were prosecuted." Mark L. Gentile, lawyer for the teen driver, refused comment.

No charges have been brought against the Roman

family, who insist the settlement is not an admission of guilt. "I see this settlement as an insurance company that doesn't want to go through a court battle," said Bob Roman, "that just wants to make it go away."

Poff recently suggested he "might go after them (the Romans) civilly."

"It didn't cost them a dime," Poff said. "The insurance company picked it up, which is ridiculous. ... I don't know if I'm going to accept the settlement or not. What's your kid worth? \$75,000? I don't even want to see it. What am I going to buy, a new toy?"

The Romans, Poffs and Par-

rys agreed money would not bring the boys back. What they do not agree on is the question of fault. "If I were to apologize," Roman said, "it would be an empty apology, because what would I apologize for? For going to bed? There was wrong done, but I don't think it was anything my wife or I did."

Calls to the Roman's lawyer. Raymond Gates, were not re-

"We're going to be sued for failure to supervise," Roman said. "Who was really failing to supervise? These things happened at 12:35—curfew is 12. Where were the parents? Were they in bed? Were they checking up on their kids?"

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Night flights may cause more noise

Residents of Henderson's Whitney Ranch community could be hearing more latenight flights taking off over their homes, if Southwest Airlines follows through with plans to add more red-eye flights at McCarran International Airport.

Southwest announced Nov. 10 that it is considering adding more departing flights to East Coast destinations between 10 p.m. and 1 a.m.

Although Southwest has not announced specific plans yet, Randy Walker, director of the Clark County Department of Aviation, speculated the carrier could add 12 departures to its current 15 without causing a ripple in McCarran's operation. Now, 76 flights depart nightly between 10 p.m. and 1 a.m.

Walker said the noise impact should be minimal, because Southwest operates newer Boeing 737s, which are quieter than their predecessors.

"Really, there would be no change in the way the planes fly," Walker said. "There are just a few more of them."

The only region of Henderson that would be affected would be Whitney Ranch and

the surrounding area, which is under the flight path of the planes, Walker said.

Henderson resident Linda Doane said she would not mind if more flights were added even though her apartment complex near the intersection of Ramrod Avenue and Mountain Vista Street is almost directly under many flights departing from McCarran.

As a traveler, Doane said, the flights would be more of a benefit than a nuisance, and the noise in the area has become a fact of life she knew about when she moved into the complex in July. "Frankly, I don't even hear them," Doane said. "And any kind of noise you just get used to."

Taylor was killed in a traffic





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

Education summit tackles class size, district growth

Schools in the southeast part of the Las Vegas Valley, which includes Henderson and Boulder City, are doing a good job of building to keep up with growth, but, like the rest of the Clark County School District. they are having trouble keeping down class size, officials said during an education summit Saturday.

School Board member Mary Beth Scow, who represents the area, said during the all-day meeting to look to the district's future that the building program started under the 1998 bond issue, which authorized \$3.5 billion districtwide, has been going well. The building is needed to

keep up with growth of 10,000 to 12,000 new students who enroll in the school district annually, officials.

"The growth is so enormous, we do zoning that's impacting a hundred schools at a time," Scow said. "We have people come from all over the country to see how we do this. They can't even fathom doing the zoning we do."

But despite the expansive building program, class size and crowding continues to be an issue in Clark County, Carolyn Edwards, former chairwoman of the Attendance Zone Advisory Commission and board member of Nevadans for Quality Education, said.

Reducing the teacher to student ratio should be a priority across the board, kindergarten through high school, she said during the portion on class size, led by Scow. During a brainstorming session, the group concluded that a ratio of 1-to-24 was ideal, and pennedin "Lobby legislature for class size reduction from K-12" at the top of their policy list.

Class size was one of three top concerns that surfaced during a July survey of voters conducted by R&R Partners in partnership with the school

Asked what would improve quality of education in the future respondents answered teacher quality, class size and funding were their greatest concerns.

"The problem is that you can't build the school before the students are there." Scow said.

Paul Gerner, associate superintendent of facilities, quickly noted, "Well, they get there so fast, very shortly after we build the school, they fill

Students in the group gave a close-up view of class crowd-

"We have 12 portables outside for the AP classes at Boulder," Richard Stewart, a senior at Boulder City High School, said. "Each AP English class

For classified

has at least 36 kids. They have to have extra chairs. They don't have desks. They sit in a circle."

The bottom line, Scow said, is money. "When you really start looking at how things have to be done, almost everything would require more

funding," she said.

"Some of it could come from reallocation of resources," Scow said, "but almost 90 percent of our operational funding is in salaries. It's very hard to relocate resources when you only have 10 percent to work with."



The Salvation Army dealing with setbacks for the holidays

As The Salvation Army begins its annual Christmas Kettle program in Southern Nevada this holiday season, it is confronting a couple of major hurdles, both locally and nationally.

A dire need for local bell

ringers to staff Christmas kettle locations out front of retail stores combined with the loss of a major national retailer's support plague the effort, whose kickoff date is Friday.

Charles Desiderio, director of development and marketing for Salvation Army in Las Ve-

gas, said at least 100 people are still needed to ring bells in Henderson, Boulder City, Las Vegas and North Las Vegas.

Many of the bell-ringing positions are paid, Desiderio said, but the call has remained unanswered. The paid positions are in addition to the volunteer help pledged by fraternal organizations, city governments and private businesses.

Bell ringers began ringing Wednesday in Boulder City out front of Albertson's, Vons and Boulder Dam Credit Union. However, even the Salvation Army in Boulder City is feeling the pinch this season, searching for three paid bell ringers and volunteers.

Jack Edwards, director of the Salvation Army in Boulder City said he is concerned that the \$18,000 raised in the city in 2003 may be hard to beat or even match if the kettles go unstaffed.

The second setback the Salvation Army is facing came after Target Corp. informed the charity in January that bell ringers would no longer be allowed on its properties.

Desiderio estimated the company's change of heart would cause a loss of \$40,000 in all of Southern Nevada. Salvation Army estimated a loss of \$9 million nationally, 10 percent of the \$93 million collected in 2003.

"Target was our single best resource," Desiderio said. "That's going to hurt us big

According to a Target statement, the Salvation Army drive had been the one exception in its longtime no-solicitation policy. It cited an increasing number of inquiries by other groups to solicit and decided it needed to be consistent.

To help offset the loss of Target's withdrawal, Wells Fargo established a Christmas Kettle Fund at all of its locations.

having Desiderio said enough people and money is crucial to repeating the success of last year's toy drive, which narrowly met its goal of serving 11,000 children.

"That's the biggest we've ever had in Vegas," Desiderio

For 2004, Salvation Army has raised the bar to 13,000 children who will be served by the effort, which requires the donation of 40,000 toys, with the goal of giving two to three toys to every child, Desiderio said.

To complement the Christmas Kettle program, Salvation Army is continuing its Christmas Angels program setting up angel trees inside stores throughout the valley.

On angel trees hang children's wish lists for shoppers to take and buy the items on the lists. The gifts are then wrapped by the Salvation Army and given to families on Dec. 15 through 17 at Cashman Field.

In Boulder City, the only angel tree location begins on Nov. 29 inside Boulder Dam Credit Union.

The Christmas Kettle and Christmas Angel programs officially begin with a kickoff celebration Nov. 26 at 11 a.m. at the Las Vegas Premium Outlets, 875 S. Grand Central Parkway. Las Vegas Mayor Oscar Goodman, Congressman Jon Porter, R-Nev., and comedian Sandy Hackett will be the featured speakers at the event.



More delays expected on Horizon Ridge

For the next 280 days, expect zone after zone of construction on Horizon Ridge Parkway as crews improve the parkway between Gibson Road

and Seven Hills Drive. Clay Jensen, project engineer of Public Works Engineering for the city of Henderson,

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least one lane for traffic in each direction on Horizon Ridge Parkway.


"Hopefully it won't get much worse (than current conditions)," Jensen said. "We're going to do our best."

Improvements to the parkway will include water, sewer and drainage improvements, paving, curbing, gutters, lighting and sidewalks. Jensen said the work is expected to be complete by Sept. 25, 2005.

Multiple crews will work on different parts of the parkway at different times to try to keep traffic flowing, Jensen said.

The project is being funded with \$6 million from the Regional Transportation Commission and \$2.8 million from the Local Improvement District revolving fund.
















Henderson woman appears on NBC's 'Fear Factor'

Kathy Micali had everything NBC's "Fear Factor" was looking for - the look, the personality and the drive to win the \$50,000 prize.

Micali appeared as a contestant on the reality series "Fear Factor: Thanksgiving on Nov. 22 during a special extended holiday episode.

The 27-year-old Henderson resident said her fitness background as a personal trainer and owner of Elite Wellness, a gym and juice bar, may have given her an advantage.

A group of Micali's friends had a viewing party for her, cheering as she was introduced to some 13.5 million viewers.

The show, not for the weak of stomach, featured Micali and five other contestants willing to do anything from climbing a rope-ladder behind a moving sailboat in the Pacific Ocean to devouring turkey smothered in maggots to pulling oneself under a boat to grab flags underwater.



Tower with a view

The modern conveniences of life have their price. Automobiles create pollution and need gas, air conditioning brings high power bills and TVs often create slothful spouses

who won't share the remote. Cell phones? Once you've had one, you may find they're indispensable. But, besides the oafs who bellow their private conversations in a crowd, they come with a cost many local

residents are loathe to pay: cell phone towers. The only thing more annoying than having a call cut out is having the tower block your view.

The problem is that to provide decent service, cell phone companies need to keep building the towers and, as houses push out toward the edges of the Las Vegas Valley, the companies are constantly searching for new sites.

Sprint officials thought they had a sure thing when they reached an agreement with Troon Revere Holdings to put one at The Revere at Anthem golf course. Sprint representative Tracy Cline called it a "simple request."

But such a request can't be simple when homeowners paid as much as a \$120,000 premium for a view of the golf course - a view that didn't include a 26-foot-tall cell tower.

Ten of those neighbors gave Cline and the Henderson Planning Commission some static about it when the deal came for approval last week.

They were blunt about their objection: Not in my back yard,

You can't blame them. They not only paid for a clear view of the golf course, they also live by their homeowner association's covenants that limit the kind of construction they can do on their own property. They just want the same consideration from the golf course operators.

That puts Sprint into a tough position. It said it would disguise the tower as a light pole, but a light pole is no better than a cell tower, neighbors said.

The company offered to make the tower look like a palm tree, but the golf course operator objected, saying it would be the only palm on the course.

Looks like Sprint might need to call its real estate agent and start looking for a new site, perhaps one without a \$120,000 view.

When there is no justice in serving justice



On March 16 Jeff Roussin had a great day, closed a nice deal at work, celebrated the deal by having dinner with his boss. What he didn't expect was by midnight he would be heading to prison.

After dinner Roussin headed home around 10:30 p.m. He was winding his way through Seven Hills when he got lost. He turned onto Whispering Ridge Court and found himself in a roundabout intersecting Emerald Moon. His family told me he hit the curb of the roundabout, breaking a front wheel. He called a towing company, which told him it would be about an hour before they could get there, so he went back to his boss's house to wait. In the meantime a neighbor called the police to report an accident. The police arrived to an empty vehicle and the tow truck driver. Moments later Roussin arrived with his boss to meet the tow truck, and now the police.

Roussin was charged with failure to give full-time attention, leaving the scene of an accident and failure to change address on an operator's license, according to the Henderson Police report. There was no property damage other than the broken wheel on his vehicle. He did admit to having beer with dinner but was clearly not under the influence. In fact he was not charged with DUI.

So how did Jeff Roussin end up in prison? For the previous four years and eight months Roussin had been a model probationer serving a five-year probation for his involvement in a 1998 fatal accident that resulted in the death of a mother and child and left the community stunned.

During his strict probation he was reguired to abstain from alcohol and submit to random drug and alcohol testing.

Because he admitted to drinking a small amount of alcohol March 16, he was arrested for the probation violation.

The abstention of alcohol in his probation doesn't make any sense in the first place. At the time of the fatal accident in 1998 he was not under the influence. His black Jeep Cherokee never made contact with the victims' vehicle. Roussin is the victim of circumstances of his own making.

Those circumstances began Aug. 11, 1998, when he and a friend headed to Roussin's house after a round of golf. Roussin, a successful entrepreneur, was driving his Cherokee, the friend a Dodge Truck.

Yes, life was indeed good for Roussin.

Now, because of a broken wheel, Roussin has been in prison for the past seven months, which is a crime in itself, awaiting a decision from the parole board on his release.

However, his life changed in the little time it took him to drive from the golf course to a block or so from his house.

As the two turned north on Sausalito from Racetrack Road the drive home turned into a quick drag race. It ended as quickly as it started, with Roussin backing off. But around the blind corner ahead were the mother and child in an oncoming vehicle. The other driver was ahead eight car lengths and rounded the blind corner. In a flash the child was dead and his mother lay dying.

Roussin and his friend accepted plea deals from Deputy District Attorney Gary Booker.

Roussin was given five years' probation, ordered to wear a victim's memorial bracelet and pay \$50,000 in restitution to the victim's family. Roussin lost everything, including his business.

After the accident, I followed it for a short time in the newspapers, however after six years the shock and memory were long gone - until a friend asked me to look into Roussin's probation revocation.

Now, because of a broken wheel, Roussin has been in prison for the past seven months, which is a crime in itself, awaiting a decision from the parole board on his release.

He's had a tough time in prison getting any kind of assistance for referral to minimum security or work camp. The plea agreement has permanently labeled him a Serious Offender with alcohol abuse. This just isn't factual.

In a letter from Bill Donat, of the Offender Management Division, Nevada Department of Corrections, to Roussin's attorney, Donat states, "Based on the nature of the offense and deaths resulting from the case, he (Roussin) is not viewed as appropriate for community trustee assignment. This excludes Residential Confinement and Re-Entry Drug Court."

After reading numerous letters from good people in our community and reviewing documents, I am outraged at what has happened to him.

Despite what appears on the surface, he is a good citizen who was active in his church, working a good job and paying his debt back to society.

In a letter to Gov. Kenny Guinn, Roussin's pastor, the Rev. Hilda Pecoraro of Green Valley Presbyterian Church,

"Jeff's consistency in worship leadership and involvement in other areas of the church as not escaped the notice of others. Jeff has been approached on more than one occasion to consider becoming an officer of the church as well as working in the youth program"

In January of this year he started a new job with Village Oaks Mortgage.

He has a history of hard work and good ethics. Again, he's praised by his boss, Heather Zabrosky in a letter to the governor. She writes, "Since he (Roussin) was employed at Village Oaks Mortgage the first of this year, he has become an irreplaceable asset to my company. He is trusted and respected by his coworkers and clients; he has in a very short time grown my business to the point where I am desperate for him to return to work."

Hindsight is 20/20. He should have never accepted the same plea agreement as his friend, who is now a free man.

On Aug. 11, 1998, he was not under the influence. He was not directly involved in the accident, although he was a contributor in circumstance. He was in the proper travel lane. Yes, he was speeding, yet I can't figure out how they possibly reached the alleged speeds of 60 to 80 mph. The stretch of road is no longer than an eighth of a mile. It would be impossible to negotiate the approximate 65-degree turn at speeds greater than 40 mph.

Today Roussin is rotting in prison waiting for the parole board to release their decision. My only hope is they read a little deeper and sift out the facts. If they only read the plea agreement they will never know what a good person he is or how well he complied with his probation. That he never failed a drug or alcohol test. He never missed a victim restitution payment.

In reading the court documents, I got the feeling District Judge Lee Gates probably wanted to deny the revocation of Roussin's probation. His honor said, "The guy has been on probation for five years, which is two years more than what the law requires since it only requires that he be on for three years; however, technically he did break his probation and the court believes that the state has proven that he violated his probation by having a drink."

Caught in a Catch-22 Roussin will serve his time, rebuild his life and resume 20 years of restitution payments.

"The market customer will be the person who is looking for a vacation home — maybe it's even their second or third," Nelson said.

final approval for the proposed tower at their Dec. 16 meeting.

Cline told residents and commissioners that the cell tower is necessary to provide adequate cellular phone coverage to homes located northwest and southwest of the golf course.

"And this is not some huge object being built here," Cline said. "It is just going to be a 26-foot pole that really just looks like a light pole or decorative flag pole. It is only 20 inches in diameter."

If planning commissioners approve, the cell tower will be placed beside a small, one-story brick building on the golf course, near Hampton Road and Pine Prairie Avenue, that houses bathrooms and storage closets.

Cline said the cell tower would only be slightly taller than the building and that with a light on top, wouldn't look like a cell tower.

But Anthem residents still didn't buy it.

"There is no reason to make

it look like a light pole," said resident William Quigly. "The golf course is closed at night. There is just no reason to light

that area, and frankly, no one

wants to see that area lit up.

"Besides, it looks to me that
it will be much bigger than an
ordinary light pole. It just isn't
going to match aesthetically
and I'm actually afraid this
could decrease the property
value of our home."

Commissioner Gerri Schroder told residents she "guarantees their property value will not go down" from the addition of a cell tower and offered the idea of disguising the tower as a palm tree, which she said was done to a similar tower placed near her Henderson home.

Residents nodded and clapped at that idea. But Cline interrupted and said the golf course already had disapproved of the palm tree option.

"We tried that idea, but the golf course didn't like it because there is really no other foliage in that area and it just wouldn't match," he said.

Health district to distribute 10,000 flu vaccines

Those looking for the flu vaccine are in luck.

The Clark County Health District acquired more than 10,000 doses of vaccine on Tuesday from the Nevada State Health Division and the Washoe County Health District.

A clinic administering the shots for high-risk adults will be open from 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Tuesday and for several more days at the Ravenholt Public Health Center, 625 Shadow Lane, in Las Vegas, near the Charleston Boulevard exit from Interstate15.

"With no flu activity observed in Clark County this season, there is still time for those at the greatest risk for flu complications to receive protection from the vaccine," the district's chief health officer, Dr. Donald Kwalick, said in a news release.

The health district ordered its vaccine doses from Chiron Corp., a British flu vaccine manufacturer that was expected to provide 50 million doses nationwide before it discovered contamination at its plant in Liverpool, England. Those doses never arrived.

"We've gotten a lot of calls

from concerned people in the community used to getting the flu vaccine," health district spokesman David Tonelli said. "It's a great thing for them that we can now call them and invite them to come down and get their shots," he said. "The fact that we have no flu activity in the county yet means we have time to get these people fully-immunized prior to arrival of flu season."

Tonelli said the clinic would most likely be able to administer 2,000 shots a day. "Everybody doesn't have to come down on the very first day," he said.

Since the information about the confamination was released, there had been a valleywide scramble for vaccine on the part of doctors and patients.

And people in Henderson not wishing to make the trip to Las Vegas still may have a difficult time getting a flu shot because many doctors, medical centers and clinics are running short because of unfilled orders and high demand.

Physicians Medical Center Chief Operating Officer Sharon Kaufman said the center's three locations received 1,500 doses from Aventis, another vaccine manufacturer. Flu vaccine eligibility

As of Monday, Kaufman said, her three clinics down to 25 remaining doses.

"We always order them the year before," Kaufman said. "We gave them to all our patients over 65 that were chronically ill. We should be out by next week."

Alamo Medical Clinic's Dr. Tony Alamo said his clinic usually orders 500 flu shots, but this year's delivery never arrived because of the contamination problem.

Alamo said he hasn't received many flu cases, but he is bracing for when the weath-

er cools down.

Alamo said the vaccine does not cover all flu strains, but other medicines can decrease the number of days flu sufferers feel sick. The window for success with the flu vaccine is closing, because the best time to receive the shot is during October, he said.

Alamo said the vaccine is meant for high-risk patients, but news reports about the shortage have prompted people who never thought about getting a shot before asking for the vaccine. "Something I've seen in my practice is the hysteria of not having the influenza vaccine," he said.

For the Clark County Health District's distribution of the flu vaccine, methods of payment include Medicare Part B, Medicare Railroad Part B, Medicaid, Secure Horizons and Senior Dimensions. Patients must present their insurance card or Medicaid voucher at the time of service.

For those not covered or without proof of insurance, the cost is \$20.

Cutropia said he is pushing his neighbors to call state lawmakers and urge them to pass a law that would put a 6 percent cap on how much property assessments can increase each year for tax purposes.

Assembly Speaker Richard Perkins, D-Henderson, said he has received a number of calls from constituents about the property value problem.

"I've seen my own property valuations go sky high. I'm recognizing those with modest means and fixed incomes are really in a pinch," he said.

Schofield said the Legislature has to be careful, however, that it maintains a large enough tax pool to adequately fund city and county operating budgets

"If you go below 6 percent,

that is going to create a loss for local governments. The loss may be made up by growth, but the governments are going to start to hemorrhage financially," he said.

"This would also affect the school district. Any property tax the school district loses would have to be made up by the state."

Assemblyman Bob Seale, R-Henderson, said the issue must be addressed thoughtfully and carefully. "This has ramifications long into the future. We're constantly looking for more money for schools, and it is important we continue to fund them."

In the meantime, homeowners who believe their property has been overvalued, can appeal to the county's Board of Equalization.

For the appeal to be success-

ful, the assessment must be higher than the property's value on the open market, Schofield said. "Ninety-nine percent of the time it is not," he said.

In a normal year, the assessor's office handles between 750 and 850 appeal requests. The county assessor's office already has had 325 appeal requests and the number is expected to keep climbing before the Jan. 18 deadline.

"This is not a normal year," Schofield said. "However, we are not being avalanched with appeals like we thought we would be."

Property assessments will begin again in July for the 2006 tax year.

student Kim Jacobs was suspended in September for refusing to comply with the school's standard attire policy. The policy required students to wear

certain color pants and shirts.

Jacobs, who is being represented by the American Civil Liberties Union of Nevada, is suing the district, alleging that her First Amendment rights

were violated.

At their Nov. 18 meeting, school district trustees voted that schools must poll parents and receive the approval of 55 percent of respondents before instituting a dress code. Parents must be polled again every four years.

Parents who don't want to send their children to uniformmandatory schools can apply to send them to another school.

Jacobs' attorney, ACLU general counsel Allen Lichtenstein, said parents were rarely polled in the past about dress policies. There was no poll conducted at Liberty High before Fernandez instituted the standard attire policy.

"The school district attempted to circumvent the process by calling it other than a uniform," he said.

And the question of surveying parents is still a point of contention.

"Frankly," Lichtenstein said,
"changes made at the (Nov. 18)
School Board meeting only
made it easier for them. The
new policy has no threshold
for return rate, so they could
get 10 percent of the parents

sending back survey forms, and if 50 percent of that 10 percent approves, they can claim approval. They lowered the bar significantly to claim

parental support."
Fernandez said, "I know we live in a society that is more concerned with what is legal than what is right. I really commend the Liberty students who are still wearing the uniform. They're student leaders."

Laura Warren, a junior at Del Sol High School said some teachers asked students to continue wearing the Dress For Success uniform, despite an injunction preventing enforcement. "They say we should wear it to support them," said Warren. She said she felt pressured to not disappoint her teachers.


"We are not issuing any kinds of punishments for not complying," said Del Sol Principal John Barlow.

Breana Belanger, a Del Sol sophomore, said some students still following the dress code didn't realize the court had lifted it and others didn't want the clothes they bought for school to go to waste.

Belanger, standing with friends after school last Friday, was not dressed in the standard student attire. "I knew," she said, "but lots of people didn't."

For Lichtenstein, there is no confusion. "Without any enforcement mechanism, school uniforms are not mandatory, and no one is obliged to wear one," he said.

"Any principal or teacher that gives any impression otherwise is violating district rules and policy."





NOTICE OF PREHEARING CONFERENCE Nevada Power Company ("NPC") filed with the Public Utilities Commission of Nevada ("Commission") an Application, designated as Docket No. 04-11028, for authority to collect deferred energy expenses and to reset the Base Tariff Energy Rate ("BTER") for collection of projected future energy costs. NPC seeks authority to modify its energy costs. NPC seeks authority to modify its energy rates, which are comprised of a deferred energy accounting adjustment ("DEAA") and a BTER, in order to establish a new DEAA to collect \$115,865,638 in deferred energy costs experienced during the period October 1, 2003, through September 30, 2004, and to modify the current particular and the content of the BTER to collect projected future energy costs beginning April 1, 2005.

NPC requests that the recovery of the DEAA balance in this filing be delayed until May of 2006 and be collected over 22 months. When implemented, recovery of the DEAA balance in this filing would result in an addition to the energy rates in effect from previous Commission orders of \$.00383/kilowatt-hour ("kWh") for residential customers and \$0.00291/kWh for non-residential customers. NPC has also requested in Docket No. 04-10024 that the implementation of the DEAA changes authorized in its last deferred energy filing (Docket No. 03-11019) be delayed from January 1, 2005, to March 31, 2005. NPC also proposes in this filing a BTER of \$0.05006/kWh for residential customers and \$0.05204 for non-residential customers. The current BTER is \$.04577/kWh for residential customers and \$.04738/kWh for non-residential customers. When combined with the effects of prior Commission orders, the proposals to delay implementations of DEAA rates and institute the new BTERs would result in decreases in energy rates of 0.77% for residential customers and 3.76% for non-residential customers, or 2.40% overall on April 1, 2005. If NPC's request for delayed implementation of the DEAA changes authorized in Docket No. 03-11019 is

not approved in Docket No. 04-10024, NPC's requested BTER would be modified to be 5.05274/kWh for residential customers and \$.05440/kWh for non-residential customers. This, in combination with the effects of prior Commission orders, would result in increases in energy rates of 7.56% for residential customers and 9.02% for nonresidential customers, or 8.34% overall.

NPC also filed with the Commission an Application,

designated as Docket No. 04-11029, for approval of proposed rates to recover the expenses of developing its Resource Plan.

Specifically, NPC requests recovery for costs related to trial Demand Side Management ("DSM") and energy conservation programs and costs associated with the cost/benefits analysis of participating in regional transmission organizations ("RTOs") incurred during the period October 1, 2003, through September 30, 2004. NPC seeks to recover \$8,061,111 in DSM and energy conservation program costs and \$72,574 in costs related to analysis of participation in RTOs.

The proposed adjustment to the current Base Tariff General Rate ("BTGR") is \$0.00043 per kilowatthour, which would replace the \$.00060 currently in effect. This would result in a decrease in NPC's BTGR of approximately 0.17% for residential customers and 0.20% for tomers and 0.20% for non-residential customers. NPC requests that the proposed BTGR decrease in the instant docket be implemented coincidentally with the proposed BTER rate change in Docket No.

Docket Nos. 04-11028 and 04-11029 have been con-

solidated for hearing purposes.







UNLV's defensive line coach the past



five seasons, the Henderson resident knows his time in Southern Nevada is coming to an end. John Robinson retired last month as the Rebels' head coach, and Wederquist knows the

replacement will more than likely hire his own staff.

That's good news for Wederquist, and bad news for the local community. Wederquist proved his worth over

the years with UNLV, guiding a defensive line that produced two NFL draft picks and was consistently the Rebels' strength on game days.

He's also a quality guy, something families at Foothill High School have know since Day 1 as Wederquist's two sons, Nate and Justin, played football for the Falcons.

Now he's on the market and should be a hot commodity.

"I'm 44 years old and certainly not going to take a job anywhere," Wederquist said. "I'm going to evaluate everything and see what is out there for

You won't hear Wederquist complain about moving to another university after all, that's simply part of the unstable coaching profession. You will, however, hear him complain about the Rebels' many critics, especially those of the legendary Robinson.

"Everyone in town thinks they know how to run a college football program," Wederquist said. "It's important the next coach is not just a quick fix. It has to be a long-term fix. (UNLV) has finally established itself in the Mountain West and as a Division-I program."

And, that is something Wederquist said would help build his resume. Even after the Rebels struggled to a 2-9 mark this year, the coach looks back on the past five years as a great experience.

"The bottom line is that we had erratic play in certain positions," he said. "College football is not very forgiving and we didn't get over the hump. The thing people need to understand is that John Robinson made this program better."

Wederquist said there is a good nucleus in place for the next coach, a nucleus that includes his oldest son Nate. Nate Wederquist is Henderson's top receiver ever (in terms of catches and reception yards) and will be a red-shirt sophomore safety next fall.

"He (Nate) is a Rebel," Craig Wederquist said. "It was not like it was a package deal because I was the defensive line coach. He was a good Nevada high school football player and he

wanted to be a Rebel." OVERTIME: The prep basketball season is set to tip-off next week, marking Alma Randolph's 14th straight year at the helm of Green Valley's girls program. This streak is more than any other coach, both boys and girls, in the Las Vegas Valley. "If you're in a good situation, why mess it up," the humble Randolph said. In 14 years, the coach has brought her values and discipline to over 200 girls, a stat that is more important than banners hanging in the gym - not that the program does not have its share of regional titles.

"This is definitely my biggest individual accomplishment," said Mayville on receiving the honor. "I wasn't really expecting anything like this. It's really cool."

Playing both ways for an entire season, Mayville says it was harder than he had thought.

"I'd have to say it definitely was," he said. "I feel I did everything I could to help our team. Coach Fenton did a great job of putting me in a place to -succeed. It felt like it started out difficult but towards the middle of the season it got easier. At the end, I think it took its toll because it got a little harder but evened itself out."



Local man swims for victims of domestic violence

Sometimes, the loudest voice is not verbal but through action.

For local Steve Stephens, his quest to raise funds and awareness for domestic violence victims came out as a

Stephens, an abuse survivor himself, recently swam for 24straight hours at the Club Sport Green Valley, raising more than \$7,500 for the Safe Nest emergency shelters in town.

"It stems from my own sexual, mental and physical abuse that happened to me as a child," Stephens said. "In finishing my degree four years ago at Oregon State, I did a swim for kids with cancer.

"I knew I had one more swim left in me. To really draw attention to the masses, the media plays a pretty important vehicle and we decided to do something totally outside of the box (to raise the awareness)."

In front of a cheering crowd at the Club Sport, Stephens sprinted his final two laps to complete the feat.

Getting only a five minutes break every two hours, Stephens was joined by family members, friends and others

with a special barbeque catered by Sammy's Wood Fired Grill. With domestic abuse a darkstain on our society, Safe Nest

helps those who are victimized by this cowardly act, which is why Stephens says he knew he needed to help raise

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awareness and funds for the

"When you're leaving an abusive situation, you're moving into an unknown," he said. "You need help from people like the Safe Nest to help you through it, which is why we wanted to help."

Safe Nest was more than gracious for Stephens' sacrifice.

"It was truly an amazing feat," said Jennifer Floro, who was on the organizing committee as well as the Safe Nest board of directors. "The amount of time and dedication and training hours he spent preparing for it all.

"It was just phenomenal that he spent so much time on that and that he completed. We appreciate the exposure he brought to the cause and the donations he brought in were the icing on the cake."

Once it was time to begin the swim, Stephens - said he changed his mood and became focused on the task at hand.

"One, I was very dedicated but when I jumped into the water, I was very focused," Stephens said. "When you do a 24-hour swim, you can't do it all at once so you have to take it slow. I wanted to get through the darkness first so I started the swim at night. Some members of the Las Vegas Gladiators (arena football team) showed up.

"Early in the morning, I hit my second wall - I went through five — and some lady jumped into water with me and handed me \$1,000 worth of Safe Nest checks for donation. It was a very emotional experience."

Green Valley's Foley signs with UNR | Griego inks with UNLV's softball team

Green Valley shortstop Ryan Foley has been covering the left side of the Gators' infield for what seems like an eterni-

Foley, on Green Valley's varsity squad since his freshman year, has been a mainstay of consistency and smoothness. With a solid stick at the plate teamed with him athletic ability, Foley recently signed his national letter-of-intent to play baseball for the University of Nevada-Reno.

"What I was looking for was education and baseball," Foley said. "They offered the full ride for education and their type of baseball program is open for anyone. If you're a senior, you aren't given anything. It's going to give me an education and a chance to play right away."

Over the past two seasons, Foley has hit .392 in 217 atbats, sliding in safely on 29-of-31 stolen base attempts while making just 13 errors in 163 chances at short. After batting .393 with 23 RBI, 38 runs scored and 17 stolen bases for the Gators this past spring, Foley is set to take his play to the next level — the Division-I level.


"Ryan has actually been on varsity since he was a freshman," Green Valley coach Nick Garritano said. "He started at short in the 2003 state championship season. He's been our shortstop for three years. We're just thrilled as a program to see this happen to him.

"Anytime a kid can go on to college and get a scholarship to play is a great thing. It's pretty extra-special for Ryan because he's been with us for four years."

Having been apart of one state title team for the Gators in 2003, Foley has been able to join more than a few future stars during their prep career. He's played with current minor league baseball players (2003 grad Jordan Parraz) as well as a handful of junior college and Division-I players.

His experience alongside them has made him one of the top prospects for the 2004 spring season in Southern Nevada. The lessons he learned while among them still stick with him, according to Foley, and he is ready to pass on his own sage advice to Green Valley's current crop of younger players.

"When I was a freshmen or sophomore, they all helped me along," he said. "Now they look up to me. I'm in more of a lead-

"They've taught me the hard work and I've worked on that as the years have gone on. I've tried to keep that same attitude now that I'm a senior."

The preparations he is making for the college experience will be an easier one thanks to his time in the prestigious Henderson-area baseball pro-

"Playing at Green Valley kind of gets you ready for college," Foley said. "It has helped me with confidence, knowing that I can play with the best players. Our division is pretty strong and I've played with a lot of the players who have come out of Green Valley too and that's helped my confi-

More than a few schools showed interest in Foley, but

he chose UNR over the rest. "I was looking at Arizona,

California and here (in Nevada)," Foley said. "When Reno started approaching me, it started to become more and more of an option. I started looking at what kind of education I could get and they also have a baseball program similar to Green Valley's.

"It was exactly what I wanted. At the beginning, they were on my radar but the more I looked into it, the better an option it became for me."

Garritano says he believes Foley will be a solid addition to any program he joins simply because his "baseball IQ."

"I think his overall knowledge of the game is unbelievable," the coach said. "He always seems like he's in the right spot at the right time. He understands angles and to understand the middle infield,

Griego has been part of Silverado's varsity team since her freshman year, helping the Skyhawks keep their much-documented streak of consecutive regional titles alive.


The school has never lost a regional (formerly zone) title in its 10-year history.


"My maturity has definitely grown over the years," Griego said Friday before signing her papers at the school,


That holds especially true during last year's regional tournament where Griego helped key victories over Green Valley and Las Vegas en route to the Sunrise regional title.


Ben Jacobs was sick of los-

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As a freshman starter for Foothill's football team last year, D'Angelo Jones generally was a quiet workhorse, gaining more than 1,200 yards.

Heading into his sophomore season this past fall, Jones was expected to be a force to be reckoned with.

Jones lived up to the hype and then some, gaining 2,043 yards on 255 carries with 27 touchdowns, which is why he is the 2004 selection as the News' Offensive Player of the Year.

"I didn't really even know what to expect heading into the season, to tell you the truth," Jones said. "I just went hard every day on getting ready and on my game. I just try to play my part and do my best to do what it takes to help my team."

Teaming with the News' 2004 Player of the Year Arthur Mayville, who was the team's quarterback, Jones led an offense that simply dominated opponents on the ground. The duo combined to gain 3,132 yards on the ground with 42 combined touchdown scores.

Much of the success was Jones' natural skills but with Mayville and both Falcon fullbacks Michael Stokes and Xavier Stover, the holes looked a little bigger than originally expected.

"I felt lucky having them blocking and having Arthur back there with me too," Jones said. "I knew they wouldn't let me down and they would always try their best to give us some room on the line.

"Arthur and I had the confidence, or tried to. We got brought down a few times, but we just tried to run hard."

Jones has made marked improvements from his freshmen season to his second with Foothill. His improvement make him arguably the best running back in the state, proving his worth as he competes with Las Vegas High's Eric Jordan.

Although Jordan gained more regular season yardage than Jones, it must be noted Jones played considerably less minutes than Jordan thanks to a handful of Foothill blowout wins.

"Basically, I physically got faster and mentally, I tried to learn how to be a leader," Jones said. "I wanted to try and help others out too. Last year, I kind of played scared every

game because I was young and everything. This year I didn't think about it. I just went out there and played."

His secret to success, although more obvious than expected, is efficient.

"I just try not to let the first guy bring me down," Jones said. "I just want to get past that first guy and see what happens from there."

What happens past that point is utter physical giftedness. Not only has Jones been able to run for touchdowns, he can throw them too.

More than a few times this

season Jones has passed for scores on halfback passes.

Jones credits his coaching staff for him being prepared for anything that may come along.

"The coaches have really helped me," Jones said. "Coach (Rick) Stanley, our running backs coach, has been awesome. They had us doing our drills in practice and it helped me on my cuts. All of the coaches have helped me a lot."


As a rare junior vet next year, Jones says he wants to lead by example and outwork his teammates. If he does this, the team will surely continue to improve.

verado coach Doug Thornhill said. "We hope to put 15 to 20 pounds on him by next year. We definitely think he's a D-I candidate."

He was, however, according to Cougar coach Paul Berg, the athlete with the biggest heart and most determination.


The 5-foot-8, 165-pound Orozco was honored last Wednesday with the Mike O'-Callaghan 'Go For Broke' award, capping a career at


Coronado the safety says was the time of his life.

Liberty's Attolico, recovering from leg injury, wins 'Go For Broke'

Rocky Attolico's senior season produced few memories. That is, until this past Thurs-

The Liberty High School linebacker won his school's first-ever Mike O'Callaghan 'Go For Broke' award, presented by the Henderson Home News and its publisher Tim O'Callaghan during the Patri-

It seemed only fitting that Attolico be honored with the award. He played just two games this year, severely breaking his leg against Del Sol and spending over two weeks in the hospital while undergoing three surgeries.

Now, the 5-foot-9, 170pounder has more than the titanium rod that is permanently inserted into his leg as a souvenir from this past season.

"It was very hard going to the games and not being able to play," Attolico said.

He added that doctors momentarily explored thought of amputating his limb - a measure he said wasn't needed after a surgery drained the fluid in his leg.

Mike O'Callaghan, who created this award over 21 years

ago, lost his leg during the Ko-

rean War, earning the Bronze Star with the "V," denoting val-While fighting Chinese Communists, O'Callaghan took a direct hit on his lower leg from

an 82 mm mortar round while helping save a wounded member of his unit, according to published reports.

O'Callaghan, the report continued, would not allow himself to be evacuated after the injury, remaining in command until the enemy withdrew.

This kind of courage is O'Callaghan sometning learned during his childhood, growing up on a farm in Wis-

He became enamored with Japanese-American troops that were preparing to fight in World War II at Camp McCoy (Wisc.).

This group of soldiers, part of the 100th Battalion, 442 Regimental Combat team, adopted the motto 'go for broke' and took that mentality into some of the wars' toughest battles.

Attolico, who transferred to Liberty from Templeton High School in San Luis Obispo, Calif., missed the opening games of the season because of transcript problems, finally reaching the field in Week

He said he was named the team's Defensive Player of the week after leading them in tackles, but saw his season end on a freak accident during punt coverage.

"It's easier now," Attolico said of dealing with the injury. "I always knew it would be Ok. It was just going to take some time."

Future races attracted many film and television stars and

Norm Johnson, an off-road classic race in its first year. It astronaut Gordon Cooper. In 1975 — less than a decade after the race was born - the Mint 400 attracted 354 cars and 51 bikes competing for a piece of the \$100,000 guaranteed purse.

A racing enthusiast since the time he was 15, Johnson is still racing in his 70s. In fact, he captured a victory in an openroad race this past May and also has a third place finish this year in his 2000 Camaro.

"The adrenaline rush from racing is like nothing else," said Johnson, who also worked as a Las Vegas Sun reporter and was nominated for a Pulitzer Prize while covering the Watts Riots for the Copley

ter, about the idea," Floro said. "They were trying to figure out how they were going to make it happen.


"It was brought in front of our board, we thought it was a great idea and we hopped on board to help him."

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


stand how to keep the ball in the infield.



Talking Turkey: How to bake that beloved bird

By TARA MARAS

o thoughts of making turkey turn your legs to gravy?

The annual day of giving thanks can easily cause rookie cooks across the country to fall to pieces. Questions may abound, from how to stuff a turkey, to where to stick the meat thermometer.

But 'tis the season when poultry pros light up turkey hotlines and chefs emerge from behind kitchen doors to offer sage wisdom to a panicked public.

According to David Caplan, kitchen manager at Carrabba's Italian Grill, 10160 S. Eastern Ave., the No. 1 Thanksgiving Day turkey blunder is overcooking the

"People need to simply follow the package's directions," he said. "If they do, there will be fewer dry turkeys, come dinnertime."

Caplan recommends that cooks arm themselves with the season's most sought-after secret weapon —the meat thermometer.

Caplan is not alone in his cooking counsel. According to Butterball's Web site, www.butterball.com, two of the Top 10 turkey questions concern proper use of the meat thermometer.

Butterball's turkey frequently asked questions (FAQs) suggest sticking an oven-safe meat thermometer in the bird's lower thigh be-

fore cooking. Be careful not to touch thermometer tip to turkey bone.

Marge Klindera, supervisor of the Butterball Turkey Talk-

Line, said the magic temperature is 180 degrees.

"When the thigh comes to-180 degrees, the center of the breast needs to read 170," she

said

And whether the stuffing is filled with sausage, shallots or shitake mushrooms, if it's stuffed in the bird, it must

reach 160 degrees to be food safe, said Klindera.

But, what if the thermometer isn't sharp enough to make a dent in the icicle-encrusted turkey?

Turns out, still-frozen turkeys are to Thanksgiving morning what Lions football is to Thanksgiving afternoon.

According to Klindera, if the turkey has been defrosting, the cold bath method will easily finish the job.

"Submerge the turkey in cold, clean water," she said. "It will take about 30 minutes per pound to defrost."

While it's a gamble to roast a frozen gobbler, Klindera says it can be done.

"If the turkey's frozen, it will roast unevenly and it's hard to judge the meat's temperature," she said.

According to Caplan, however, a frozen turkey the day of the feast means it's time to consider eating out.

Does eating turkey make you sleepy?

No. It's a myth. You can't pin post-dinner drowsiness on the Thanksgiving bird. The most likely culprit is high carbohydrate intake from a big multicourse meal. The lethargy you experience can be attributed to blood rushing from the brain to the stomach to aid digestion. Recent studies have associated L-tryptophan, an essential amino acid, to drowsiness. Although it occurs naturally in turkey, you'd have to consume massive amounts of meat on an empty stomach for it to cause any sedative effect. any sedative effect.

Do all turkeys gobble?

It's a guy thing. Only toms gobble. Hens make a clicking noise.

Can turkeys fly?

Domesticated turkeys can't, but wild turkeys can fly up to 55 mph for short distances. They're also fast on their feet, hitting land speeds of up to 25 mph.

Why do turkeys gobble?

Toms gobble in the spring and fall to attract hens for mating. In the wild, toms also like to gobble when they hear loud sounds and when they settle in for the night. On a still day, a gobbling turkey can be heard a mile

How did turkey become part of Thanksgiving?

Availability probably dictated menu choice. At the time the Pilgrims first celebrated Thanksgiving, turkey was a dietary mainstay. In fact, they ate so much turkey that it probably wasn't much of a treat. Turkey meat from wild and domesticated birds was also a staple in the diet of many Indian tribes.

What do you call that thing that hangs off the turkey's beak?

The flesh-like appendage that dangles from a turkey's forehead is called the "snood". It's very long on male turkeys and hangs down over the beak.

What's that fleshy red growth at the turkey's neck?

The anatomically correct term is "wattle". When a tom is feeling amorous, the wattle and the snood become very bright red.

Does a turkey have ears?

Turkeys don't have ears as we think of them, but they do have excellent hearing. It would be difficult for a predator to approach without being heard first. Turkeys also have keen eyesight and see in color. However, their night vision and depth perception are poor. Their sense of taste is much more sensitive than their sense


Has Thanksgiving always been celebrated on the same day?

The lures no angler should be without



It was grueling work, but I've finally narrowed the field. down to a large handful of lures

that are favorites among local anglers. Mind you, this is a small list of thousands, if not millions of lures on the market today. The lures I've chosen are proven effective, not only by me, but also by folks such as **Anglers Edge Guide Service** owner John Wood and experienced anglers, Kevin Leonard and Dave Grosshiem, owner

of Laker Plaza. We'll start by introducing some of John Woods' favorites. Remember, John has more than 30 years of fishing experience and has caught, and likely released more fish than you or I will see in our lifetime. Fishing is his bread and butter; he cannot afford errors in judgment, especially

when it comes to his gear. John's all time favorite when it comes to monster stripers is without a doubt the Ol' Henry 2 by 4, which is impressive in design and size. Float this baby slowly on the surface at night, and just hang on. When the fish hits this lure you risk having your shoulder dislocated.

Warning: Do not try to cast this lure. Buy it and you'll understand why.

The Ol' Henry also comes in a castable 6-inch broken back model and a straight back version.

John prefers to fish top water with the Lucky Craft Gunfish 115. Lucky Craft is a proven name in the industry; the Gunfish is no exception. It's a definite must have when you're at the edge of a huge striper boil.

Two more favorites that he now keeps in his arsenal are new to the Las Vegas valley. The L.A. Slider is made by Brian Hawkins in Temecula, Calif., and will soon be manufactured by Megabaits. This beauty is much like a Sassy Shad with one very huge difference - the jig head, which

comes in a variety of sizes, slips easily inside of the lure, making it a part of the body. It's effective on largemouth and stripers, and can be fished in many ways.

Another of John's favorites is now the Reel Hunter by Barefoot Fishing. A few weeks ago, John caught and released over 100 fish on this jig alone. He has caught so many fish on this lure, and they have hit so hard, he has had to replace the split rings on some of them because they were straightening out. Laker Plaza is the only place you can get them in Nevada and they don't stay on the shelves long.

Other favorites for the striper angler include the ever faithful Bomber Long A; cast or trolled, it will get the job

If you want to drive a few fish crazy, toss out a Pencil Popper by Cotton Cordell. It comes in a variety of colors, but it's hard to beat the trout pattern.

One of my all time favorites is, of course, the Assassin. It comes in a huge variety of colors and four different sizes.

The new Assassins Blade incorporates a willow leaf spinner blade in place of the rubber tail that drives the fish mad. This is by far one of the best lures on the market

when it comes to quality and craftsmanship, and the price is unbelievably affordable at nearly half the price of other big swimbaits.

Another fantastic lure that was introduced to Southern Nevada is the awesome A.B.T. Gladiator. This jewel will not only entice the stripers, but it drives the largemouth crazy, bringing out the pure mean they're known for. Alan Borden, inventor of the Gladiator, spent thousands of hours developing the action, and believe me when I tell you it has paid off.

Another great product when it comes to working double duty is the Rebel Jumpin' Minnow. This topwater lure fits in the palm of your hand but packs a mighty punch. The favorite color for this lure is bone white. It will bring stripers to the surface when many others fail.

The Super Spook by Hed-

don is another such favorite that finicky fish find irre-Both of these lures are very effective on stripers and


If you're a bass angler and

you're looking for some great worms, then look no further. The Roboworm has taken the bass world by storm and has proven to be a favorite among pros and amateurs alike. I'm not sure what it is about these slimy little buggers, but the fish absolutely love them. Bass anglers have told me that the fish tend to hold on to these a little longer, giving the slow angler a chance to set the hook. Many of the other worms are often spit out quickly, once inhaled by the

Remember, anybody can throw a ball, but it takes practice and patience to get it over the plate.

'Tis the season to go shopping for a Christmas tree

Shopping for Christmas trees and holiday plants is at the top of most gardeners' lists this time of year.

To know which plants to purchase and how to care for them is most important.

Here are some helpful suggestions on Christmas trees to get you into the holiday mode:

Selection

Purchase your tree early to get the best selection.

Always feel the foliage to determine its freshness. Fresh needles are soft and pliable. They bend, while the dry needles break.

Avoid any tree where the outside needles shed in abundance.

Bringing a tree home

After bringing the tree to your home cut at least an inch off the trunk end.

This is a must in order to remove the solidified resins that block the entry of water into the tree.

After this cut, immediately place the tree in a bucket of water. Place in a cool, shaded place.

Protect the tree from wind and sun to retain moisture until brought indoors. These trees usually take in about two quarts of water a day so keep the bucket full.

Re-cut the trunk end about one inch again when you bring the tree into your home.

Place the tree in a stand capable of holding at least one gallon of water.

Keep the tree stand full of water. This is very important because a dry tree inside a home is a serious fire hazard. Dry needles contain turpentine and are highly flamma-

Inside home care

Keep the tree away from heat vents, fireplaces and direct sun rays, which draw more moisture from the air.

Your tree should be placed in the coolest room in your house.

Check the lights

It is best to use only approved lights, bulbs and trimmings when decorating your tree. Always check the light cords and plugs for exposed wires.

Keep all tree light bulb sockets full. Replace any burned-out bulbs as soon as possible and don't forget to unplug the cords before retiring or leaving your home.

After Christmas

Discard your tree as soon as the needles start to dry.

Living Christmas trees

Purchase a living Christmas Tree to be used indoors, and then planted outdoors later.

A good selection of trees available is Mondel, Aleppo, Japanese and stone pines. These are good choices for

Keep your live tree outdoors as long as possible. Do not expose it to warm indoor conditions any longer than seven to 10 days.

Keep it away from heat sources and do not leave the lights on longer than necessary.

Watering is critical when caring for this tree. It is especially important during and after the time you bring the tree into the home.

Avoid flocking

It is best not to flock a living Christmas tree.

If you do, give the tree a good hosing with a strong spray of water, before you plant it.







Making the buyer's agent a buyer's ally



You're finally ready to take the plunge.

Now more than a "home-looker," you've crossed the threshold into the territory of "potential buyer."

How, however, do you decide that a Realtor®

you've located will become your ally in negotiations?

Buyers in the past have shopped alone, with spouse, or with significant other.

However, with increased emphasis on specialization in many professions the idea of a Realtor® advocating either for a buyer or seller has begun to take hold.

A significant number of buyers have begun to shop with their Realtors®. And a smaller number of those buyers select a Realtor® who works on their behalf as a buyer's agent.

A buyer's agent serves the buyer's interests alone. Her or his loyalties remain with the buyer. He or she becomes the buyer's ally.

A buyer's agent typically does not list properties.

If he or she does list, a tour of properties for a buyer to view may not include the agent's listing if it fails to satisfy the buyer's requirements.

Should a buyer indicate interest in viewing a listing of the buyer's agent, the agent in advance indicates the limits on her or his communication between buyer and sell-

For example, the buyer's agent remains neutral with respect to buyer or seller motivation and price that she or he thinks may be acceptable to either.

In some cases, a buyer's agent who lists may refer the buyer to another agent to represent her or his interests.
