Crime downtown quelled by police task force

The Henderson Police Department has created a special unit to tackle specific crime problems, and is crediting the unit with helping curb vandalism and break-ins at downtown businesses.

The Henderson Police Problem Solving Unit was formed last month in response to specific hotspots of crime and

Fed-up neighbors win battle for peace and quiet

Dirt-moving trucks driving north of Sunset Road at Pabco Road will not be driving late at night anymore, city of Henderson officials

After investigating complaints from neighbors about dust and noise, the city has banned the trucks from operating after 6 p.m. and from using their noisy engine breaks.

Since late August, residents near the Weston Hills development site - the trucks' destination - say the heavy machinery running late at night along Pabco has bothered them.

The trucks are noisy, and stop for a three-way stop sign at Sunset and Pabco,

Henderson Inspections Manager Greg Blackburn

"When, they drive with a full load, truckers use the engine brake and that makes an excessive amount of noise in neighborhoods," Blackburn said. "They can no longer use their engine brake."

Robin Vincent, a resident off Pabco near the intersection, said the noise kept her family up at night. It was so bad, she said, she thought she might have to move.

"Even with my son's air conditioner on, we can hear it," Vincent said.

The decision by the city means the trucks now can operate only between the used their engine brakes to hours of 6 a.m. and 6 p.m.

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Doctor prescribes movies as cure for many emotional problems

By BEN STEPHENS

Take in a double-feature and call me in the morning. That might be the prescription handed out by psychology professor Gary Solomon, who believes people can identify their problems and solve them by watching movies.

It's a technique he calls cinematherapy, and Solomon, a professor at Community College of Southern Nevada Henderson campus, has been perfecting it for the past 12

"We have an old saying 'a picture is worth a thousand words," Solomon said. "Well, I believe movies are worth trillions of words.'

Lacking confidence in yourself? "The Wizard of Oz" might be just what the doctor ordered. If someone is living in the past, "Casablanca" could teach them to let go. "A Clockwork Orange" could steer a person away from taking the wrong road in life.

Solomon, 57, has written two books on his technique: "The Motion Picture Prescrip-

tion" and "Reel Therapy." Each book lists 200 movies and their therapeutic values by category, including subcategories of films that cover several areas.

Dogville," Solomon said, is therapeutically the best film he has seen in the last five years. The movie is about a woman who is being chased by criminals and finds refuge in a small community, only to have the townspeople turn on her.

"It is an extraordinary piece of work that requires us to truly get in touch with our feelings," Solomon said...

Solomon prescribes movies to the patients he occasionally sees. In the sessions following his video prescription, he said, he and the patient discuss the film.

Solomon said he does not intend to influence people's interpretations of movies, but just suggests movies to them so that they can find their own meanings.

Solomon said cinematherapy is most often used to solve issues with relationships.



Shelton, a 2001 Silverado High School graduate and Lake Las Vegas resident, was one of nine street-smart contestants pitted against nine book-smart job candidates with high academic degrees from prestigious schools.

The last candidate standing wins the title of "The Apprentice" and will be given a high-level job within the Trump organization, with a starting salary exceeding six-figures.

Because of confidentiality clauses in Shelton's contract, NBC Entertainment spokesman Jim Dowd said, Shelton cannot talk to anyone about his experiences on the show until the episode airs in which he is fired or wins the job. Dowd said Shelton joined the cast "to have the opportunity to achieve another level of success by working with someone of Donald Trump's stature."

Trump is the son of a small businessman from Sheepshead Bay in Brooklyn, N.Y. He became a real estate mogul, buying and selling some of New York's most prestigious office and residential buildings. He also has owned several hotels and casinos, including Atlantic City's Taj Mahal. He has plans to build a 60-story luxury condominium tower on the Las Vegas

Principal Janet Dobry often seeks the help of community organizations to support her school, which qualifies for extra federal funding because of the number of students who receive free or low-cost government lunches.

At the Reading is Fundamental kickoff pep rally on Jan. 31, each student will be given several books to take home and add to their own collection - a considerable bonus at a school stretched for library books of its own.

Burkholder top school in county in 2004

Lval Burkholder Middle School was one of only seven middle schools in Clark County to earn a high-achieving designation in annual progress reports under the federal No Child Left Behind Act.

Burkholder was closed for demolition in June; the Clark County School District plans to rebuild the school by Au-

"It all comes down to the day to day work of teachers and students," said Burkholder's last principal, David Erbach.

"We tried to do some things in terms of test preparation," said Erbach, now principal at Mannion Middle School. "We also emphasized a lot of reviewing and going back to material over and over again, but there is no magic bullet or genius idea that is going to ensure the High Achieving designation."

The federal No Child Left Behind Act, signed into law by President Bush in January 2002, holds school districts accountable for the success of their students in meeting national standards of achievement. The progress report gauges everything from test scores to attendance.

The high-achieving designation is awarded to schools whose student body scores above national academic objectives.

Those same successful About 85 percent of Burkholder's 1,400 students and all of its teachers and administrators transferred to Man-

nion Middle School.

"It's the same staff, the same good teachers in the classrooms," Erbach said. Erbach said he is optimistic that Mannion will receive the high-achieving designation

"We still have to make sure that improvement keeps happening," Erbach said. "But every year the standards go up, so it will always be harder and harder."

A TEACHER'S VIEW Rene Hill

Spending time with your kids will pay off at school



As parents, we want to see our children succeed. This is especially true in the area of education. Children spend the first years

of their lives in this challenging environment, and there is much that parents can do to ensure their students'

Studies have found that students with involved parents are more likely to earn higher grades in the classroom, and score higher on

standardized tests such as the Nevada Proficiency Exam. ACT and SAT. Students also have better attendance records, earn more class credits, have better social skills. show good behavior and have a higher rate of graduation.

While these statistics may look impressive, you as a parent may wonder what you as a parent can do specifically to help your child in his or her school experience. There are several simple things that you can do to help your child from the early grades through high school.

The first thing to do is to

take time to talk with your. child, and really listen to what he or she has to say.

A Department of Education study showed that the average mother spends less than 30 minutes talking with her child, and the average father less than 15 minutes. When your children comes home from school, discuss their day. Make it a point to talk to each child one on one. Talk, sing, read, laugh and listen to your child. They will appreciate this time their entire

Another important thing is to take an active interest

in your child and what he or she is doing in school. Don't just ask "What did you do in school today?" Instead ask more specific questions such as, "How are you doing in school?" "What are your latest homework/test grades?" "Do you feel you are achieving your goals?" "What was the most interesting thing you did today in class?" What do you feel you did the best today?"

While these may seem like simple questions, they will reveal much about your students' progress and their perception of their own

school experience

In addition to asking your child if he or she has homework, ask to see graded assignments and tests. Look at the scores and discuss them with your child.

.Did your student understand the material taught? Did he or she have questions that were not answered to his or her understanding? In what areas or subjects does your student feel he or she is the weakest? What can your child do to strengthen this weakness? This strategy can be a key to future success in the classroom.

With time and a few simple questions, you as a parent can help your child to have a successful school experience.

By spending time with your student, discussing his or her day and reviewing both homework and completed assignments and tests, you can help to motivate your student to continue working hard toward success.

Regents squabble over salary for college president

By NICOLE FENEBERG LUCHT

The Board of Regents of the University and Community College System clashed over the \$225,000 salary that new Nevada State College President Fred Maryanski will earn, but approved hiring him.

Maryanski's salary makes him the second highest-paid president in the university and community college system, behind Carol Harter of UNLY, whose base salary is \$263,038. President John Lilley of University of Nevada, Reno, falls behind Maryanski, with a salary of \$213,210.19.

Regent Howard Rosenberg said he does not have any qualms with Maryanski, just his negotiated salary. The contract was negotiated by Interim Chancellor Jim Rogers.

"All of our presidents are far underpaid," Rogers said.

Regent Steve Sisolak said the president should be paid based on performance. Maryanski will have to raise money for the cash-strapped college.

"He hasn't yet produced," Sisolak said. "Every time we bring in a new president, they make more than what previous (presidents) made. These



aren't my (taxpayer) dollars I'm spending."

NSC has had four presidents in two years and, as of yet, has failed to raise the \$10 million

required by the state legislature for the college to gain access to the \$13 million already being held for the school by the Legislature. The money would be used to build the college's first building, a Liberal Arts building.

UCCSN salaries fall within board-approved ranges. The minimum a university and state college president can be paid is \$196,100. The maximum is \$333,900. The Board of Regents last approved the president's salary range March 2004. Community college president salaries have a different range.

Regent Mark Alden said Maryanski's salary is fair.

The motion to approve Maryanski to serve as NSC president passed, with Sisolak and Rosenberg voting against it. His first day will be Feb. 1.

As commission chairman, Reid will act as chief parliamentary officer during the commission's meetings, county spokesman Erik Pappa said. During his two-year term as chairman, Reid maintains. his one equal vote with other members of the board but he decides who will speak during meetings and for how long.

Reid said he wants to "improve Southern Nevada's quality of life in a meaningful way."

"We've done a lot to improve our master planning process and tackle the challenges of growth, from water and air quality to transporta-

tion and land use planning," he said in a statement.

. The commission also voted unanimously to have Myrna Williams continue her service as vice chairwoman of

the seven-member board. Five county commissioners who won election to office in November, were also sworn in Jan. 3.

The five - Tom Collins, Yvonne Atkinson Gates, Lynette Boggs McDonald, Chip Maxfield, and Bruce Woodbury - stood side-by-side. raised their hands and took the oath before Las Vegas Justice Court Chief Judge James M. Bixler.

College may seek funds from outside sources

Nevada State College may not seek funding from the Legislature for its first permanent building during the upcoming session, but may instead continue to seek necessary funds from outside sources, interim chancellor Jim Rogers said last week.

The Board of Regents on Jan. 7 gave Rogers approval to negotiate the 2005-07 Capital Improvement Priority List, which was approved by the board in June and August

At the meeting Rogers said he has discussed the possibility of getting \$9 million from other sources with Gov. Kenny Guinn, but said he could not disclose what was said.

"We don't want to speculate on what we don't know," Rogers said. "When a plan is adopted, it will be announced."

The college's \$10 million request, of which \$1 million has already been donated, currently is number five on the list of UCCSN projects to be funded.

The \$1 million was donated by an anonymous donor and is contingent on the additional \$9 million being funded, Rogers said.

The college also has pledges of \$2 million from Rogers, \$2 million from Las Vegas Sun President Brian Greenspun and \$1 million from Las Vegas attorney Robert Martin. The Greenspun family also owns Greenspun Media Group, which publishes the News. Those pledges are not earmarked for the first building but are also contingent on the first building being

More recently, NSC received five \$100,000 pledges with the same contingences as the first three pledges on Dec. 29 and 30. The pledges were made by tennis player Andre Agassi; golf course developer Billy Walters; Sletten Company president Erik Sletten; chief operating officer of Nevada State Bank Bill Martin; and Nevada Palace casino owner Bill Wortman.



Once the two groups entered the casino, another argument started between Christian and Barnett, and the fight broke out. As many as six people were involved, Station Casino spokeswoman Lesley Pittman said.

Christian told police he was afraid for his life during the fight, the report'said. "Christian said that in the process of being involved in the fight, he stabbed Barnett to protect himself," the report said.

Solomon said his own experience with cinema changed his life at age 15 when he saw a movie about poverty and its link to a lack of education. Functionally illiterate until the 10th grade, he said, he was terrified by what he saw.

"By the time I was in ninth grade, I was put in a class for retarded and slow children," he said.

After seeing the movie, he said, he was determined to do better in school. Little by little, he caught up to the rest of his classmates and went on to earn six college degrees, including two PhDs.

Cinematherapy works best for people who don't have severe problems, he said, those he calls the "worried well."

These are people who worry about common, everyday problems but otherwise function normally, he said.

"The individual this is good for is the one who has a temporary problem and needs a solution," he said.

People who are severely ill or have psychopathic disorders cannot be helped by cinematherapy alone, because they do not perceive things normally, Solomon said.

tion," he said.

Cinematherapy is an advancement of bibliotherapy. a practice used by psychiatrists in which they prescribe books to help their patients identify problem behavior, Solomon said.

Solomon does not teach cinematherapy in his college courses.

But he does use film clips. to illustrate behaviors to students and to generate discussion.

There's another plus to cinematherapy, he said. In contrast to expensive pharmaceutical prescriptions or live therapy, it only costs a few bucks to rent a move.

And, Solomon said, most of the movies he prescribes aren't even new releases.

Campus health center may close if grant request is refused

exam room," Ludwig said. "We are turning kids away now because we can only see one child at a time."

More than 4,600 students from nearby Robert Taylor and Sewell elementaries and Brown Junior High schools also are eligible to use the health center. It is run in partnership with Nevada State College, which provides a staff of health practitioners and office management.

If the city approves the grant request, Ludwig said, the proposed health center could accommodate more kids. If it doesn't, he said, the health center may close.

If the demand for care is too great and the space is too small, Ludwig said, the program could eventually be overwhelmed.

But the city faces an overwhelming demand of its own there were more than \$2.7 million in fund requests this year, and only about \$1.3 million available to give out.

"We are in competition for funding with some very longstanding Henderson projects," Ludwig said.

Students can come to the clinic for first aid, emergency care, physicals and immunizations. Dr. Carol Carpenter, project director for the Basic

Lima Hospital has expanded class quickly," Segal said. the health center's reach by supplying lab services and Xrays for qualifying students at Medicare rates.

Basic High's clinic worthy of city's support

High school is tough enough without having to try to comprehend variable equations or subject-verb agreement with a headache. But school nurses are limited in what they are allowed to do to help students who aren't feeling well.

Whereas some longtime Henderson residents may recall getting shots or polio vaccines in the school nurse's office, nowadays students can't get more than an opportunity to call their parents to come get them. No Tylenol for a headache, no Tums for an upset stomach. Just a chair, a phone and an uncomfortable wait.

Students at Basic High School are the exception to that rule. They are the lucky benefactors of a partnership between the school and Nevada State College at Henderson's health care program. College instructors and their students provide the staff and the school provides the space for a health clinic on the school premises. When Basic students are sick, the clinic has more to offer now than just sympathy. It can actually help.

The clinic is more than a convenience, though. It's a needed outreach to an underserved population, available to not only Basic students, but also those who attend its feeder schools, Brown Junior High and Taylor and Sewell elementary. These schools have higher-than-average rates of students who qualify for free or reduced-price lunches, one way of measuring their families' financial need. At Taylor, 76 percent of the students qualify, making it one of the neediest schools in the county. These are families that most often go without health care coverage and rely on trips to the emergency room when an illness has gone too far to ignore.

But like many good things, the future of the Basic clinic is threatened by a lack of resources. It is crowded into the small office of the school nurse, one room, allowing only one student at a time to be seen. Even with that limitation, the clinic has treated 250 students in its first semester. It could do much more, given its staff, with more space.

Officials are seeking \$121,018 in a federal community development block grant from Henderson to put up portable offices to give the clinic its own space and three exam rooms. They know the competition is tough. Last year, the city's grant advisory committee considered \$2.7 million in requests but had only \$1.3 million to give out. Clinic advocates know they are competing against long-standing and well-respected Henderson projects such as HACA and the Giving Life Ministries.

But health care is such a basic need, and the ability to provide it at school makes it available to children who otherwise wait until their condition forces a trip to the emergency room, which besides the cost to taxpayers can cause the students to miss days of school.

The clinic is an investment in preventative health care and in our children's education. It is worthy of the city's support.

A crack at taking responsibility



Have you ever had your windshield cracked or broken by a gravel truck? In my case maybe the question should be, How many times have you had your windshield broken or cracked by a gravel truck?

Over the years I have had several cracked windshields caused by an errant rock from some sort of construction vehicle. A few years back the windshield of a brand-new SUV was cracked from flying debris. Because it was new, I decided to have it fixed.

What a mistake. Within three weeks, the new glass was cracked.

In September we turned in two fleet vehicles from the newspaper and, to no one's surprise, both vehicles windshields were cracked.

By now you must be wondering what the rub of my point is. It is pretty simple and it all started back on Oct. 7, 2004, when I was driving the car we purchased to teach our oldest daughter to drive. Notice I didn't say "purchased for our daughter"?

Anyway, My bride and I were heading home from Las Vegas after doing some volunteer work. It was about 7 in the morning we were on the 95 heading south towards Henderson between Boulder Highway and Flamingo. This was a typical Thursday morning until we happened behind a Las Vegas Paving truck. I had slowed down making sure not to get too close, probably eight to 10 car lengths, waiting for the center lane to clear so I could move over. Then the truck crossed one of those steel bridge connectors, burping out rocks and sand from who knows where. The entire front of the car was peppered with chips, and the windshield was sandblasted but not broken.

Still primed from the month before over the cracked fleet windshields, I pulled along side the truck and honked at the driver. He could not duck far enough behind the cab to save his life. If he had leaned back any further, he would have strained his neck and back. Donna wrote

down the truck number and we went

about our way.

I had heard plenty of stories about gravel haulers going into denial with people who contact them about vehicle damage caused by their trucks, but I was stoked up enough to call.

When I called the corporate offices of Las Vegas Paving Corp., I asked the receptionist whom I would talk to about vehicle damage. She gave me the gentlemen's name and asked if she could transfer me.

She transferred me to Lou Esposito. He didn't answer and, of course, I got his voicemail. I didn't hear from him for a couple of days so I thought I would call again. This time I reached him and he told me it would be no problem. He took some information from me, stating he would send out a claim form or incident report.

Boy, that was easy, I thought. In a few days the form arrived, and I filled it out and sent it in.

Within 30 days I received a letter from the corporate law firm of Gifford Vernon & Barker. It read:

"Dear Mr. O'Callaghan,

This letter pertains to your auto windshield/vehicle damage that occurred on October 7, 2004, while traveling at/or near 515 / 95 south between Boulder Hwy, and Flamingo.

After review of all information, it is the decision of management that the facts do not show or corroborate any negligence on the part of Las Vegas Paving Corp., which would have resulted in damage to your vehicle and respectfully deny your claim. It is based in part on the information given in your report.

The decision to deny your claim is based on the following:

 The unit indicated in the report is a concrete batch truck. The materials when being hauled are contained in sealed/ locking bins preventing the materials from being expelled.

 This unit was empty at the time of this incident, as it was at the repair shop.

We regret that your vehicle sustained damage, however, we find no liability on

the part of Las Vegas Paving Corp. We suggest that you submit your claim for damage to your vehicle insurance com-

One moment I'll see if he is available, she said. After putting me on hold, she came back and said he was in a meeting and unavailable.

Listen I really need to speak to him because I am going to write a column about my experience with the company, I said.

"I'm sorry" she said, "I will give him a message."

OK, I thought I would give him the benefit of the doubt and call one more time before leaving on vacation. To my surprise, neither he nor a representaive of the company ever called back.

Really, I didn't expect them to fix the problem. I just wanted know if I was dreaming this whole thing and what was being fixed on the truck that peppered the car? I will never know.

One thing is for sure, the Nevada Legislature needs to stand up to gravel haulers and make them more accountable. If you're wondering why car insurance is so expensive, this may be a contributing factor. What are the chances of getting such legislation passed against the powerful trucking industry?

You have a better chance of getting the president of Las Vegas Paving Corp. to return your call.

Q&A WITH RORY REID

Reid: Growth a key issue for county

County Commissioner Rory Reid, who represents about half of Henderson, was elected last week as chairman of the County Commission for 2005. The son of Sen. Harry Reid, he is former chairman of the state Democratic Party and was elected to the Commission, his first run for public office, in 2002. He lives in Green Valley with his wife, Cindy, and their three children.

He sat with the News' editorial board last week to talk about issues of interest to Henderson. Following are excerpts:

Q: What issues have your constituents have been talking to you about?

A: The top issues in Clark County right now are growth, growth and growth, and when you say growth, they are really talking about the way it affects their quality of life. ... We need to make sure that the things that make this a great place to live — good wages, dynamic economy and affordable housing — continue into the future.

At least one of those is threatened now. Affordability of our housing has come into question. It's increased by 50% in one quarter, and what we're doing in the county is trying to ensure that our growth management policies are sufficient to ensure sustainability.

Q: A hot issue in Henderson is the heliport site, now near Sloan. There are some who still would like to see the site moved over by the Sunrise landfill. What are your thoughts?

A: The people of Henderson aren't impacted in a significant way right now, but people who live elsewhere in my district are as impacted as anybody.



Outbound helicopters going to the Grand Canyon go right down Tropicana Avenue, about 500 hundred feet off the ground. ... People have lived there for years and years, and when they moved there the helicopters were not an issue. But ... the number of helicopters have increased to the point that today we have as many as 90 flights a day over that part of town, 500 feet above the ground, which is a tremendous problem for them.

The site near Sloan seems to be the only place we've studied, that doesn't impactanyone directly.

Q: Property valuations are another hot-button issue. I realize that the Legislature will be dealing with this, but what are your thoughts?

A: I don't think there's any question that we need to do something. We need to protect the most vulnerable members of our society, on fixed incomes, who didn't expect property values to increase by 50 percent in one quarter. Who'd have thunk that? If people are on fixed incomes and pinching every penny and their property tax bill increases significantly I think you have to help them.



I think we also have the responsibility to address the perception that we are flush with money, tens of millions of dollars that we don't know what to do with. I think that as this debate continues, people will realize that is not the case.

about a light rail from Henderson to the Strip. What is the county's perspective on that?

A: To have a sustainable quality of life, I think we need to have a better mass transit system. You could have gold-plated seats and serve caviar on the CAT buses and lower the fares, and we still wouldn't have the ridership we want. There are just a certain percentage of people who won't ride public buses. They just won't. So we need to create systems that can serve that interest. One of them is the light rail that people are talking about.

I think it would be a great thing. Imagine if someone living out by the Nevada State College could get up in the morning, walk from their house, get on a train and be to work downtown in 15 minutes. It would be a good thing. It would improve the air quality, change the way Henderson



has developed.

Q: Green Valley is pretty well built out now. What's the next step?

A: I think the next step is urbanization. ... I don't know what the city of Henderson has done in respect to that, but if they haven't, they may need to get their arms around it, because cities, when they get older, they urbanize. That's what happens. We're a young city, so we have an opportunity to do it the right way, and we need to take advantage of it. We need to create environments where people can live, work and play without necessarily needing to climb into their car and driving somewhere and dirtying our air on the way. The District is the prototype, I think, of what we want, where people have entertainment, retail and residential opportunities within walking distance of one another.

Q: Affordability?

A: That's one problem ... the affordability. We have to find ways to create neighborhoods that have those amenities but are in reach of people economically.



Former DMV security guard learns to enjoy retirement

Walter Morton cherished his job as a security guard at the Henderson DMV

If Morton had his way, he would still be working there, but his health created a different plan for him. He retired in November because of compli-, Retiree cations from diabetes.

"I loved the job," said Morton, a Henderson resident since 2000. "It was the best job I could have gotten. If I weren't sick, I would be there right now.

Morton, 70, worked at the Henderson Department of Motor Vehicles for five years, but near the end of his time there he could barely feel his legs, feet and other extremities, which slowed him down and made him unable to do his job, he said. "My legs are gone. My feet are numb and my hands. are tingling," Morton said. "I was doing the best I could, but I found myself sitting down more than standing."

Morton was a valued employee at the DMV, said Branch Manager Linda VanTilborg.

"He was part of our DMV family," VanTilborg said. "He knew how to deal with people, and the techs felt very protected with him there."

She said that Morton had the uncanny ability to calm down - 10 in maintenance. He said upset patrons, and he was al. he enjoyed doing security for

ways in the right place to do so. But, she said, he did even more by helping alleviate long lines at the main desk where numbers are handed out.

Although DMV security guards-were not supposed to help customers, Morton did anyway. "Sometimes the line at my desk was as long as the line at the main desk," Morton said. "I got to be known. Every year when people came in to reregister their vehicles, they always came to me first because they remembered me knowing what was going on."

Morton learned about security from his 30 years in the Marine Corps. He spent his first 15 years in the engineers corps and the second 15 in military police. After retiring from the military as a master gunnery sergeant, Morton worked for 15 years for Southern California Edison — the first five as a security guard and the next

Edison, but the maintenance job paid much more because it was union.

Enlisting in the military opened up a whole new world for Morton, who was born and raised in Butler, Ga. - a small, rural town he said had no economic opportunity, especially for a black man in 1955. Morton had 11 brothers and two sisters, all older and out of the house during his early years.

"Butler was not too good for minorities," Morton said. "All of Georgia is very racist, it still is, although I had no problems there. There was just no work."

Instead of searching for work in his hometown, he joined the Marines at age 20. He moved to Detroit after high school, where he worked two jobs before going to boot camp.

While in the military, Morton traveled all over the world, including the Philippines, Japan, Okinawa and Puerto Rico, and he saw some action during his deployment to the Vietnam War from 1966 to 1967.

"Military life is great if you like the military," he said.

Along the way, Morton married the love of his life, Barbara, and they had four children two boys and two girls.

Lights, camera, action

Behind the scenes of 'American Casino'.

When Discovery Channel executives decided to create a reality television show featuring behind-the-scenes action of a Las Vegas casino, one particular hotel came to mind: Green Valley Ranch Resort & Spa in Henderson.

Described by Co-executive Producer Mark Finkelpearl as "the underdog against the Las Vegas Strip," Green Valley Ranch is handsdown the perfect location to catch the drama that comes along with running a casino.

"One of the wonderful things about Green Valley Ranch for TV is that physically it works really well in all aspects," Finkelpearl said. "At this casino, we can cover a lot of ground with the crews and really work it. There's a smaller staff than you'd find at say, MGM Grand or something. A place like that would be too big for us to really wrap our hands around."

Setting the show off the Strip may have seemed risky at first, Finkelpearl said, but the decision has paid off.

Going on No. 19 of 31 episodes, Discovery Channel's "American Casino" has proved to have staying power and has attracted a national audience, in comparison to Fox's "The Casino," based at the Golden Nugget in downtown Las Vegas, which quit airing after just one season of 13 episodes.

"Showcasing a casino that is off the Strip is actually what makes for compelling TV." Finkelpearl said. "At Green Valley Ranch, they have

to work extra hard to get people to Henderson, so there's a lot of drama there that attracts a good audience. These guys are put on the line in terms of creating a real luxurious spot — a spot that is appealing to high rollers who may otherwise spend time in the city."

Since the first airing of "American Casino," the Green Valley Ranch has seen a rise in the number of guests, most of whom are fans of the show, Producer Jamie Campione said.

"We have a lot of people here who come just because of the show," she said. "It has really

helped put it (the resort) on the map in a way, and people now see what they really have here — a place that is actually nicer than anything you'd find on the Strip.

This proved true New Year's Eve, when more than 1,550 revelers flocked to the resort for "The Big Apple Bash" and "JC2K Ultra Lounge" party, which stands for Jockey Club 2000 — a take-off of a themed party David deMontmollin, marketing manager of the resort and one of the employees prominantly featured on the reality show, had at his apartment at the Jockey Club in Las Vegas.

kid," Coombes said.

Rivera said the menu has expanded drastically since the restaurant opened.

But the wine menu is what has helped the restaurant build its reputation. Milo's boasts the largest selection of wine and beer in Boulder City, with 54 brands of beer and more than 450 different bottles of wine.

Prices range from \$4 to \$268 for a bottle of wine. The average dinner bill for two people is \$28.

"To find some of the wines, it is a lot of reading, and tasting. If you find a gem, you have to jump on it right away," Rivera said.

He said Milo's has keep its prices lower than the usual. At a typical Las Vegas restaurant, a customer can pay up to \$40 for a \$10 bottle of wine. At Milo's it might sell for \$23.

The staff tries to keep ordering the wine as approachable as the prices, Rivera said.

"Generally if you go to (a wine bar), it is not friendly to people that don't know anything about wine. It has a stuffy shirt atmosphere. We

aren't like that," he said. Rivera said Milo's will be expanding soon, opening a four-room bed and breakfast

in April. Milo's is open from 11 a.m. to 10 p.m. weekdays, until midnight Fridays and Satur-

Reality TV making casino workers, gamblers into stars

deMontmollin said.

"These parties can make for some of the best TV," he said. "With any special event, it's always hectic when it comes down to the wire and there's still a lot to be done."

With only minutes left until the doors were to open to let hundreds of partygoers inside on Dec. 31, casino staffers had their hands full putting on the finishing touches - and the cameras were there to catch all of the mayhem.

Busboys rushed through the resort's exquisite Estancia Ballroom with buckets of ice, and others scurried to place centerpieces on the tables. Technicians double-checked light and sound systems, and bartenders stocked up on liquor, mixers and garnish trays..

"As an onlooker, it appeared to be chaos up until the very last minute," Gina Lateef, spokeswoman for Station Casinos, said. "But it was a very orderly chaos. Everyone was busy, busy, busy - but it was all under control. It all got done just in the nick of time. I'm sure everyone will enjoy

watching that." Many fans of "American Casino," were at the party and even took pictures of deMontmollin as he was being taped

for the show.

"I couldn't believe it," he said. "I thought that was kind of funny. It's crazy, but people notice us out on the streets now and in the casino and take pictures of us."

In fact, deMontmollin can hardly go to the grocery store without being recognized, Finkelpearl said.

"It's really tough for him to go into a restaurant or store and not be approached by fans now," he said. "People love him. He is one of our most prominent characters

and very likable." Cast members such as De-Montmollin are one of the most appealing parts of the

show, Finkelpearl said. "I think there are a lot of characters on the show you couldn't draw if it were fiction," he said. "We've got some really unique people on the show. A lot of the main characters - people at midmanagement level — are really colorful and naturally pop on

the screen." Those who "bubble to the surface" on camera are the ones who get the most air

"Then they report to post-production and say, 'Hey, on Tape 123 you should really take a look at this guy,' and then we start to follow this person more and more for good television."

Casino guests also make for good television once they get over the initial shock of having the cameras on them, d eMontmollin said.

"I'm definitely used to the cameras around me by this point, but the guests aren't," he said. "So my job is to get them to forget the cameras are around. I've found that if I start joking around and acting natural, people around me get more comfortable and get back to their normal selves.

"Some of these guests are very interesting to watch, especially if we get a high-roller in the casino."

Locals and visitors alike may find themselves in the spotlight at the Green Valley Ranch, as the show still has 12 episodes to film, Campione

"We tape anything and everything about 10 hours a day," she said. "Anyone could end up on the show. That's the great thing about reality TV."





Sister Act

Sibling of famous comedian portrays saint's life

The sister of actor Bill Murray is, well, a sister, and she is coming to Boulder City and Henderson next week, following her family tradition: to put on a show.

Sister Nancy Murray, an Adrian-Dominican nun, will portray the life of St. Catherine of Siena at St. Andrews' Catholic Church in Boulder City on Jan. 16 and at St. Thomas More on Pecos Road in Henderson on Jan. 18. She also will perform at St. Joseph, Husband of Mary on West Sahara in Las Vegas on Jan. 23.

"She's excellent," said Sister Molly Nicholson, a friend of Murray and vice president of mission at St. Rose Dominican's Siena campus.

Murray changes the performance for the audience, Nicholson said. For example, when she performed at the St. Rose Siena campus, the group was in the healing garden.

"When she talked about God bridging the gap between us and Him, she ran up onto the bridge," Nicholson said. "She really gets into the specific area she's in.

"She's funny too. She's Bill Murray's sister, so

she comes by it naturally."

St. Catherine was born in Italy in 1347, a Dominican laywoman who, whether speaking to Popes, pastors or peasants, was unafraid to speak her mind about the events of the day.

Fearless in the face of death, Catherine ministered equally to the sick, poor and imprisoned. The portraval shows her as one who, despite personal hardships, was happy and full of practical wisdom.

Murray says her own family life allows her to relate to Catherine, said the Rev Joseph Annese, pastor of St. Andrew's. Murray is the oldest of

nine children, five of whom became actors, and Catherine was the 26th child in her family. Murray describes Catherine as a "feminine

role model" and a "restorer of unity to the church," Annese said.

While not yet as famous as her brother, even within her life as a nun she has made a career of performing. She has performed worldwide and last year presented her one-woman production in Rome, the Philippines, Pakistan and Taiwan, Annese said.

She can perform the show in either English or Spanish.

Murray took over the show several years ago from a fellow Adrian Dominican sister who died of cancer, Nicholson sasid. Murray turned it into a one-woman show and has been doing this as her full-time ministry for about three years, she said.

The show, about an hour and a half long, starts at St. Andrew's at 3:30 p.m. on Jan. 16. It begins at 7 p.m. at St. Thomas More. Admission is free.

St. Andrew's is located at 1399 San Felipe Drive, just south of Adams Street. St. Thomas More is at 130 N. Pecos Road, just north Pebble



Green Valley resident hosts own boxing program

When Henderson's James "Smitty" Smith was a kid growing up in Florida, he became friends with Muhammad Ali at the boxing legend's Miami Beach Fifth Street Gym. Thirty-three years later, Green Valley's Smith is still in the ring with the world's greatest boxers as host of "In This Corner," America's only half-hour syndicated boxing show.

For Smith, calling the shots has been a lifelong dream.

The former high school and college football player tried his glove at professional boxing in the early 80s, and after realizing he wasn't big enough for a professional football career, he turned to the world of sports media.


He stepped out of the ring to work as a sports director and talk host before launching his syndicated radio

shows, "Smitty's Sports Talk" and "Smitty's Ringside Seat." In the late 1990s, Smith relocated to Henderson with plans of starting a syndicated television show-focused on all things boxing.

"I did talk radio for nearly 20 years. Boxing was a great topic because I'm comfortable and knowledgeable about the sport," Smith said. "I always wanted to sit down with the biggest names in boxing in a television format. I knew that if I could pull it off, it would be in Vegas."

Smith said his wife of 24 years, Kim Smith, was a catalyst for the launch of "In This Corner.'

"Kim worked with my radio show for years," he said. "When I was trying to do both radio and television, it was Kim who said that it was time to move forward. As long as I was

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

Canfield does not have to look far for his model of success. The former midfielder captained Green Valley High School to the 1997 state title, and says he envisions the Patriots duplicating the Gatots' success in both boys and girls competition.

Considering the girls lost to Green Valley 6-0 last week, Canfield & Co. have their hands full.

"I have so much respect for Green Valley and its program," said the 24-year-old Canfield. "It was different being on the other side of the field and coaching against my old high school. I can't wait until we are competing at their level."

For the record, the girls team went winless in its first year, and has complied two wins and two ties this winter. The boys won one game in each of its first two seasons.

"Right now it is more or less a building process," Canfield said. "We have a new program

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and winning takes time. The most important thing is to always stay positive and keep encouraging the kids."

Canfield says the girls are ahead of the boys, mainly because of numbers. Over 40 girls came out this winter, whereas the Patriots had to cancel their junior varsity boys team because of low numbers.

"This is a process that has a lot of ups and downs," he said.

Canfield added that his coaching style is influenced from long days at Green Valley's soccer field, listening to coach Vince Hart shout out

doing radio, I wouldn't make the total commitment to television."

In April, Smith's dream became reality for a nationwide viewing audience. The Empire Sports Network, available on Direct TV and the Dish Network, was the first to carry "In This Corner."


In 2005, Smith said viewers could expect to see two-thirds of the heavyweight championship in a single episode.
