Henderson to take over St. Patrick's Day Parade

The Sons of Erin, which has had its St. Patrick's Day Parade in Las Vegas for the past 38 years, is moving the event to Henderson, because the cost of putting it on in Las Vegas was getting too high, the group said.

The city is saving the organization \$5,000 by providing barricades, policing and advertising through press releases, said Steve Morrissey, treasurer for the nonprofit group dedicated to the community and promoting Irish heritage. With the money saved, the group is hoping the event will make money to donate to various charities.

"In Las Vegas, we had to pay for all of that ourselves and our total was about \$11,000 to run the whole parade," he said. "This year, we'll probably run it for \$6,000.

"In the past, those extra


costs made it hard for us to raise money for charities, which is actually a big part of the parade."

Henderson will also benefit from the parade, said Bud Pico, special events manager for the Henderson Convention Center and Visitors Bureau.

"It's a little too soon to be talking money amounts, but there will be a tremendous economic impact on the city," Pico said. "We're expecting a high amount of people coming from outside of the Las Vegas area, from as far as New York City, for this event. My gut feeling is, it's going to have a huge impact for the downtown area and redevelopment efforts."

The one-mile parade down Water Street starts at 10 a.m. on March 19. It begins at the intersection of Water Street and Ocean Drive and ends at

Outpouring of support

Rainbow Club employees rally to raise funds for daughter of casino's slain slots manager

A day didn't go by in his seven years of working at the Rainbow Club Casino in Henderson that slots manager John McCoy didn't talk about his daughter.

Co-workers say McCoy, 60, spoke endlessly of 10-year-old Marissa McCoy and worked hard to pay for dance classes, piano lessons and a private-school education for the girl.

After McCoy's death Feb. 1 in what Metro Police are calling a random shooting not far from his home at Lone Mountain Road and Decatur Boulevard, his co-workers and friends at the downtown Henderson casino are trying to ensure Marissa is taken care of.

"She was the most important thing in his life," said co-worker and friend Richard Angora. "He always considered his time with her precious and said he'd work until the day he died to give her everything she needed."

Several fund-raisers have been started for the girl's education, Angora said.

"Keeping his daughter in that school
— that is what John would have wanted,"
he said. "So right now we're doing different things to raise money for her private school and maybe even for college if we can do that."

Besides having donation boxes at tables throughout the casino, employees are holding two raffles starting at 3 p.m. Feb. 14. One is for a classical guitar Angora donated. The other is for one of the casino's poker machines.

Tickets are \$10, and may be purchased at the casino cage or restaurant cashier.

Hawes said by Feb. 4 he had already seen an outpouring from the Henderson community, and prays citizens will continue to give anything they can.

"This afternoon, a gentleman I have never seen before walked right to the front of the restaurant, threw a \$100 bill into the collection box, and then just turned around and walked away without saying anything," he said. "That kind of gesture makes you realize that our whole community is touched by this. When someone like John (McCoy) is needlessly killed like this, the entire community loses. Everyone's feeling it."

McCoy was shot several times while

driving home after a swing shift.

McCoy was waiting at a stop sign on Lone Mountain Road near Decatur Boulevard just before midnight when, police allege, Jamar Green, 20, and Terrence Bowser, 19, pulled up alongside his car and fired three to four rounds.

Large case load leads to creation of third court seat

The number of cases Henderson's two Municipal Court judges have heard since 1997 has about doubled, prompting the court to add a seat for a third judge, officials said. And, if the city continues to grow at its current pace, a fourth judge will be needed in 2011 and a fifth in 2017, Court Administrator David Hayward said.

"The city of Henderson is growing and, unfortunately, there is crime that comes along with growth," said Diana Hampton, one of four candidates running for the newly created Municipal Court Department 3 seat. The other candidates in the April 5 primary election are David S. Gibson Jr., Kenneth Walker Long, and Michael L. Miller.

The Henderson Municipal Court adjudicates traffic and

misdemeanor cases, including DUI and domestic battery cases, originating in the city.

"It was absolutely necessary to create this third department," Hayward said. "There is a direct relationship between population growth and the number of new defendants who appear in Henderson Municipal Court. We had to find a way to keep up."

The Henderson City Council on Nov. 2 approved adding the third seat, which pays \$109,497 annually.

The number of defendants increased last year by 19 percent over the previous year,

Mayoral race heats up with two vying for Gibson's seat

For the first time since 1997, Mayor Jim Gibson will have competition for the seat he has held for seven years.

Laurie Robinson and Susan Gillean-Bedell have stepped into the political arena to face Gibson in the April primary after the incumbent ran unopposed in 2001. They registered for the election Feb. 3 and 4, the last two filing days, while Gibson entered the race Jan. 25.

"I'm running to preserve democracy," Gillean-Bedell said, saying that the spirit of democracy lies in competition. "We have thousands of military people fighting for other people's right to vote, and I thought somebody should throw his (or her) name in the

Gillean-Bedell is a banquet server at a casino she declined to identify who has been in Southern Nevada since 1974 and Henderson since 1987. Despite a lack of a college degree, she said she has learned much about politics from being a shop steward in the Culinary Union.

She said plans to run a grassroots campaign, knocking on many Henderson doors to reach the constituents.

Robinson is an insurance claims adjuster and has lived in Henderson for 10 years. She has a bachelor's degree in political science and a master's in management. This is the first public office both Robinson and Gillean-Bedell have

Robinson said she is running to hold city officials and staff accountable for their actions, citing points of contention with projects such as what

she called the never-ending street improvements on Horizon Ridge Parkway and City Hall expansion, which she called over budget. But Robinson also has set her sights on City Council ethics.

"Ifind it appalling that at any given time for a City Council vote, someone has to recuse themselves (from the vote)," Robinson said. "I'm running to make the City Council and the city of Henderson responsible to the people, not special interest groups. We need some

FEB. 3

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
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

Cotter High honors late Gov. O'Callaghan

Former Gov. Donal "Mike" O'Callaghan never forgot the people of the small town of Winona, Minn., a former classmate said.

School chum Ed Kohner remembers "Cal" - as he was known - as a "rough-aroundthe-edges kind of guy," someone he was proud to have known and wishes he had known better later in life.

"He was a dyed-in-the-wool fan of Cotter (High School)," said Kohner, class of 1948. O'Callaghan, who left high school early to join the Marine Corps, is listed as a graduate of the class of 1946. O'Callaghan, who died March 5, 2004, of a heart attack during Mass, was posthumously honored with Cotter High School's first Alumni Achievement Award on Feb. 3.

A veteran of three services - the Marine Corps, Army and Air Force — O'Callaghan was governor from 1971 to 1979. After he left the governor's mansion, O'Callaghan became publisher of the Henderson Home News and Boulder City News, as well as executive editor of the Las Vegas Sun. His children Tim O'Callaghan and Colleen O'Callaghan-Miele continue as co-publishers of the News.

In Winona, Mayor Jerry Miller, class of 1974, declared Feb. 3 "Mike O'Callaghan Day."

O'Callaghan-Miele said her father, raised in the back of the schoolhouse where his mother taught, was a brilliant man and could absorb everything. His mother signed paperwork to allow her son to join the military early.

A football game program dated in 1945 showed O'Callaghan, No. 42, played tackle. Kohner said after O'Callaghan went into the military, he would show up at school games in his Marine uniform and lead the crowd in cheering the home team on.

During the award ceremo-

ny, held during the school's annual Alumni Career Day, O'Callaghan's sons Brian and Michael spoke about their late father, Katrina Klink, development director for Cotter High School, said.

After Michael O'Callaghan spoke an international student from South Korea came up to Michael O'Callaghan and gave him a hug, thanking him for the former governor's role in liberating South Korea.

"Mike, he was in the Korean War and he lost his leg," sophomore student Yoon Ji Shin, 16; said. "Mike O'Callaghan had a special love for (South Korea). (He) helped my people be free."

Shin said her grandfather, who died about a year ago, also fought in the Korean

"If U.S. soldiers (had not fought), we wouldn't be able to worship, have a free country," Shin said.

Mike O'Callaghan also spent time overseeing the Nicaraguan and northern Iraq elections during the late 1980s and 1990s.

Hands-down, Mike de served this award," Klink said. "We wish we could have honored him during his life-

"This (award) hardly taps the surface," she said, "(to) find out how compassionate he was. (Mike O'Callaghan) is not just a list of accomplishments. He's a person of signif-

icance (who) touched lives." Kohner said even after leaving the southeast Minnesota town, Mike O'Callaghan kept in touch and would come visit. The last time was shortly before his death, to attend a friend's funeral. Kohner spent over an hour talking to O'Callaghan, reminiscing on the past.

"Who woulda ever thought that he would go to what he'd be?" Kohner said.

Four vie for municipal judgeship

Four candidates are vving for the new judgeship in the city's Municipal Court.

David Gibson, Jr., Diana Hampton, Mike Miller and Kenneth Walker-Long filed for the six-year term and have started campaigning with roadside signs and door-todoor calls

Gibson, the mayor's nephew and a Henderson native, is an attorney for the law offices of Mills and Mills and is pro tem justice of the peace for Clark County.

Gibson, 30, said most of his career decisions have been aimed toward an eventual judgeship, and the municipal elections are the perfect opportunity for him to do what he's always wanted.

"When I saw they were doing an at-large election with no incumbent in my own town, I thought there was no way I could pass the opportunity up," Gibson said. "My uncle's the mayor, so in other situations it just wouldn't look right. But with this election, the people of Henderson get to make the decision."

Hampton, who has been a Henderson city attorney since 2002, said she also was concerned about possible appearance of impropriety and has submitted her resignation so she can dedicate her time to the campaign.

"I absolutely love the city of Henderson, and I want to take my experience as city attorney to the people of Henderson," Hampton said. "I think I could do an outstanding job on the bench."

Hampton said she is the best candidate because of her "world view" of the judicial system.

"I have been in private practice as well as worked for the public. I have done on the bench and make deci-

sions based on experience," she said.

Gibson cites his lifelong relationship with the city, his experience in Justice Court and his work in every jurisdiction, including federal.

Miller also has judicial experience under his belt, currently working as judge pro tem for Henderson Justice and Municipal courts.

The 54-year-old said he has thought about running for Municipal Court Judge for the past year and enjoys serving the people of Henderson.

"With my experience, I think I'm the best choice to get the court system moving smoothly," he said. "I want to make sure each person who comes through there is heard and treated fairly, and try to make it as positive an experience as it can be in court."

Walker-Long, a prosecutor in North Las Vegas, said that though he lacks the judicial experience, working in "the busiest court in Nevada" has given him the experience necessary to help the city with its backlog of municipal court cases.

The judgeship, which pays \$109,497 annually, was approved by City Council in November to help the court keep up with the growing numbers of cases.

Walker-Longsaidheisinterested in becoming municipal court judge because "it is the place you can do the most good" for issues he feels the most strongly about, including drunken driving and domestic violence cases. The 35-year-old candidate said he was once an agent for an FBI team in Idaho and has an "excellent relationship" with law enforcement.

grow another 16 percent, to more than 28,000, this year, Hayward said.

"The two judges we have now are seeing about double the number of defendants they were seeing in 1997," he said. "With three judges, we're predicting caseloads for each judge to be cut down significantly.'

Cases are backing up in the judicial system as a result, Hayward said. The court is currently working 6,000 backlogged cases, and 5,000 contempt warrant cases are still waiting, he said. The new judge, who will begin work in July, will allow the court with incoming cases, he said.

If a new judge were not put into office, cases would continue to back up and the safety of residents could be compromised, he said.

Gibson, an attorney in the law offices of Mills and Mills and pro tem justice of the peace for Clark County, said the new seat is crucial to lightening the load for Department 1 Judge Ken Proctor and Department 2 Judge Douglas Hedger.

"I think it's really going to serve a good role and allow the other two judges to give more personal attention to their cases," said Gibson, the James B. Gibson.

Hampton, who has been a deputy city attorney for Hen-

derson since 2002, agreed. "Oftentimes, victims of domestic violence or DUI want to get their cases heard quickly, and this will help make sure that happen," she said.

Long, a prosecutor for the North Las Vegas, said municipal court cases deserve attention so anyone going through the court can be treated fair-

"I feel the most strongly about DUI and domestic violence cases — and it's these cases that need strong attention," he said. "Certainly

into these cases with an extra hand in the court."

Miller, judge pro tem for Henderson Justice and Municipal Courts, said Henderson is "booming" and a new judge is the only way to ensure cases will run through the court system smoothly.

"With all the growth, Henderson is really busting at the seams," he said. "We need to get someone in there who can shorten the length of time for these cases and get them taken care of."

Mannion Middle School students recently witnessed history in the making. They were in Washington, D.C., for President Bush's inauguration.

"It was cold, but they were so excited to be there," said Jackie Welch-Doubek, librarian at Mannion. The 22 students, family members and teachers were in Washington from Jan. 17 to Jan. 21.

Welch-Doubek was the coordinator for the trip and served as the group tour leader.

This is Welch-Doubek's fourth inauguration. In 1993, she took a group of students to see former President Bill Clinton's inauguration. She went back with another group of students in 1997 for his second inauguration. In 2001, when President Bush took office, she was there again.

"I went four years ago with my oldest son, and this year I went with my other two children," parent Jae Johnson said.

Welch-Doubek's has been taking students to Washington for years. This was her 12th trip. She used to make it an annual event but decided instead to make the trip every four years for the inauguration because of the history involved.

Johnson said her children loved it. "They have been so involved in the political process this year," she said.

Johnson accompanied her sixth grade son, Austin, and her daughter, Nalani, who is in fifth grade at J. Marlan Walker International.

"It was pretty amazing to me," Nalani said. The group also did a lot of sightseeing. In the five days they were in Washington, they toured the White House, the Pentagon, the Capitol, the United States Supreme Court, the United States Holocaust Memorial Museum, the International Spy Museum, the Smithsonian Institute and Mt. Vernon.

On a visit to Arlington National Cemetery, Welch-Doubek said, the group took part in a wreath-laying ceremony. Students Jullina Lozan, Christopher Young, Brittany Khoury, and Dalyn Ereckson had the honor of laying a wreath at the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier.

Welch-Doubek said it was a touching moment, especially for one of the grandparents who accompanied the students.


"Washington is an awesome history lesson," Welch-Doubek said.
"What they are studying in their history books jumps out at them." She said the students saw monuments and then remarked, "I read about that."

Welch-Doubek said the office of Sen. Harry Reid, D-Nev., helped make the trip possible. She made a call to his office in October to see about getting tickets to the inauguration. "We got premium spots to watch the inauguration," she said.

The senator's office also got the group tickets to tour the White House, the Pentagon and the Capitol.

Parents responsible for encouraging children to learn



In 1991, President Bush announced an ambitious initiative called America 2000, a strat-

egy designed to improve the country's educational system.

The first stated goal was that all children in America start school ready to learn. As the parent of a preschool child, you have

the chance to help prepare your child for school by turning his daily exposure to the media into a rich learning opportunity.

Each day when you turn the television to your child's favorite program, you are creating exposure to words. From the opening credits of programs to the commercials for fast-food and cereal, your emerging reader is learning to recognize symbols and words. This environment runs the range from

McDonalds to K-Mart to Cheerios. As a parent, you can encourage growth by repeating common words your child sees and have him repeat them.

While this may seem simple, you would be amazed at how quickly your child will learn these daily words.

daily words.

Another way to encourage your emerging reader is by reading daily to your child. Most young children develop a preference for a certain book or books.

and while it may seem boring or monotonous to the adult, children love to hear the same stories over and over.

Children learn through repetition and, again, the repeating of familiar words will add to reading growth. You will probably notice after reading with your child, he or she will begin to pick out words and repeat them to you.

There are so many simple ways to ready your child to begin the task of

reading, and it is important to start early.

Children are curious by nature, and by encouraging your child, you will build a lifelong reader. What better gift could we, as parents, bestow upon our children?



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
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

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Grant committee denies clinic

A committee rejected Basic High School's grant request to pay for a portable building for the school's free health clinic, in part because of Basic's "allor-nothing" approach, said Dave Beason, a member of the Program Advisory Commit-

The clinic, staffed by faculty of Nevada State College at Henderson, provides care for uninsured students from Basic and neighboring elementary and junior high schools.

"Why are we going to give them (Clark County School District) more money, when they (the school district) are doing such a poor job with what they have?" asked committee member Barbara Gomez during a meeting on Feb

Beason said there were discrepancies in the grant application, and only about three students a day are served by the health clinic. "I just don't think this is a priority," he

The Henderson City Council makes the final decision on which organizations should be recommended to receive the federal money.

The clinic had applied for a \$121,018 public facilities improvement grant.

Basic High Principal Susan Segal said she knew the clinic was vying for grant money with other worthwhile organizations.

"We knew it would be difficult. We will accept their decision and hopefully can find funding elsewhere," she

More than 500 students have been served by the clinic since the program began in August 2004, said Barbara Ludwig, a private consultant for Nevada State College.

The Basic clinic was among a dozen programs vying for part of \$640,000 in public facilities improvement funds. Five groups were recommended for funding, including the Nathan Adelson Hospice at \$446,000.

A total of \$1,250,000 is available this year through the Department of Housing



Officer lauded for reviving woman

Henderson police officer Seth Coleman says he gets embaressed when people call him a hero.

To him, reviving a 67year-old woman found unconscious in her Henderson home on Jan. 30 was what any other officer would have done.

"It's an awesome feeling, don't get me wrong," Cole-man said. "But I just did what I was trained for. I did what I'm here to do."

Coleman was called to check up on Mary Rowley at her home in the 300 block of Glasgow Street, near Warm Springs Road and East Lake Mead Drive, after her husband, who is recovering from

surgery at St. Rose Dominican Hospital's Sienna Campus, couldn't reach her and sive," he said. got worried, police said.

The man told police he calls to check on his wife every day at 8 a.m. because she has a history of diabetes and he worries about her, Coleman said.

Coleman went to the woman's house and after no one answered the door, walked to the back and looked into the window, police said. He saw the woman slumped in a recliner.

The officer broke a window with his baton and went into the home, calling the woman's name.

Rowley was unconsious, Coleman said.

"Her eyes were wide open, Rose Dominican Hospital's

but her head was down to her chest and she wasn't repon-

To be honest, when I first walked up to her, I truly thought she was dead. I kept telling her to wake up, wake up, but she wouldn't."

Coleman lifted the woman's chin, and she almost immediately gasped for air. The officer reclined the chair so that Rowley could lay flat on her back.

"I held her chin and kept her laying back like that for about 2 minutes before medical arrived to take over," Coleman said. "They got there and checked the woman's blood sugar and it was extremely low.'

Rowley was taken to St.

De Lima Campus, where she was in stable condition on Feb. 3. She would not speak with the News about the inci-

Medical officials said that if it were not for Coleman's efforts, the woman may have died, Henderson police spokesman Keith Paul said.

"Everyone in my family is really excited," Coleman

"My dad taped a story about me that was on the news and titled it 'Hero in Blue'," he added. "It does make me feel really good that I was there, right then, at the right time to do something big."

Police later found a 12-gauge shotgun, empty shells, ammunition, a ski mask and black gloves in the suspects' car, according to the documents. Green and Bowser face murder, conspiracy to commit murder and other charges. McCoy was taken to University Medical Center and pronounced

dead at 6:35 a.m.

News of McCoy's death came as a shock to employees of the Rainbow Club Casino, at 122 Water St., who were told about the shooting as soon as they arrived to work on Feb. 2. Days later, employees, who described themselves as a "tightknit family," said they still had a feeling of emptiness.

"Everybody's working and doing their jobs, but I wouldn't say it's business as usual," said Jack Hawes, assistant restaurant manager.

"We're all upset, angry, devastated. We're all thinking about a lot of things.

But the biggest thing on everybody's mind right now is Marissa

McCoy, he said. "Right after I heard the news, was sitting at my desk and looked over to my right and saw on the wall a picture she had drawn for her dad that said, 'To, daddy, love Marissa.' I just lost it then because I'm thinking, my God, what's go-

ing to happen to this little girl?" A bank account has also been set up a U.S. Bank for Marissa McCoy's education fund.

fresh blood in there.

"In my experience, we are watching people who are so interconnected, that have interest in what they are voting on, that the people don't get proper representation."

Gibson said he recognizes the importance of smart government.

"It is important that we maintain the integrity of our financial base," Gibson said. "That the government itself remain fiscally sound and we don't overspend. That we only do the prudent things. I think we get more bang for our dollar in our city than anybody else."

Gibson is an attorney and chairman of the Las Vegas Monorail Co. He said he has worked on many projects over the past seven years that he would like to see through to completion, such as the annexation of the large land purchase in west Henderson at last November's Bureau of Land Management auction, reorganizing city departments and repackaging development services. These are projects

that he said cannot be completed for several months. "Those are the kind of things that remain undone," Gibson said. "I started them, and I want to finish them."

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


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

Sons of Erin made right choice in move

When the Sons of Erin found themselves losing thousands of dollars a year on their annual St. Patrick's Day parade in downtown Las Vegas, they decided it might be time for a change. The parade, after all, was designed to be more than a celebration of all things Irish. The concession sales are supposed to raise money for the group's charitable work.

Instead, the Sons found their money was going to the Metro Police Department to pay off-duty officers for security and to the city of Las Vegas for barricades and cleanup.

it's a good deal for the Sons of Erin. Now, money that was spent on overhead can go into its bank account.... When the group went to downtown casinos for sponsorship, they were met with a lukewarm response. Only the Irish-themed Fitzgerald's stepped up, and it was with a small ad, according to the Las Vegas Sun.

So, when the Sons saw the crowd at last year's Springsational Heritage Days Festival in Hender-

son, the thought of leaving Las Vegas wasn't far behind.
As soon as they heard the word "parade," Henderson's mayor and other city officials opened their arms

and the city's wallet.

The city is picking up the tab for the police, barricades and cleanup this year, and the Irish will march straight down Water Street, instead of the circuitous route through downtown Las Vegas that ended at the

Fremont Street Experience.

It's a good deal for the Sons of Erin. Now, money that was being spent on overhead can go into its bank accounts to buy seniors dinners during the holidays. The group also won't have to compete for concession dollars

with a cluster of casinos just steps away.

On the other hand, the parade, which in the past has drawn 35,000 people, won't have the glamour associated with downtown Las Vegas. Henderson also is a longer drive for many past attendees. The Sons and the city will have to pull out all the stops to make this parade an event people will consider worth the trip and want to return to year after year.

Capturing the St. Patrick's Day parade is a four-leaf clover in the hat of Mayor Jim Gibson and the council, and it could be a nice shot in the arm for downtown businesses. Now, the hard work begins to make sure the party is a success.

The stakes are high for Henderson and for the Sons of Erin. A lukewarm turnout could be the beginning of the end for the parade and an impediment to the city drawing other big events downtown. The first step is the biggest.

Hard lessons need to be relearned



Growing
up in the
O'Callaghan
household had
many challenges, including
being accountable. For example, as a young

boy I couldn't understand the relevance or the importance of not eating California table grapes. Grapes were my favorite fruit and they were banned from our home.

I recall bringing a plastic bowl brimming with grapes home from a friend's house and was so excited to possess them, even though my mom would not buy them at the store. This memory is so vivid, not because of my procurement of forbidden fruit, but because of the wrath received from my father for bringing such contraband into our home.

I had not a clue about Cesar Chavez or his crusade to bring about basic workers' rights in the fields of California and eventually the nation by non-violent means. Through the eyes of a 5-yearold, it seemed pretty silly not eat those grapes. At the time I was quite upset about having to return them but later was content after my dad explained the position of the farm workers. He took us to the vineyards and the workers' encampment to see how they were forced to live. From that day forward I didn't think twice about not eating California table grapes.

For the past three years there has been another boycott brewing in the fields. It started with the Coalition of Immokalee Workers (CIW) in Immokalee, Fla. The CIW are employed by Six L's Packing Company, one of Florida's largest tomato growers.

One of Six L's largest buyers is Taco Bell, which the

CIW has targeted for boycott.
During the past year and a half Taco Bell has been under fire on college campuses across the country. The "Boot the Bell" campaign has been gaining steam and paying off in results since its formation in 2002.

What are the Immokalee farm workers asking of Taco Bell?

On the surface it doesn't appear to be much. However, a closer look reveals some conflicts. The farm workers are asking for a penny per pound more for picking Florida tomatoes. This doesn't

seem like much to ask from the food giant Yum! Brands, Inc, the parent company of Taco Bell. Among Yum!'s stable of food companies are KFC, Long John Silver's and Pizza Hut.

Taco Bell has stated they purchase a mere 1 percent of the tomatoes picked by the Immokalee farm workers and purchased from Six L's Packing Company. This statistic begs for some questions, such as who's buying the other 99 percent?

Why doesn't Taco Bell buy somewhere else? I don't know, but one thing is for sure: Somebody is profiting off the backs of poor work-

This begs another question. Who are these farm workers and why are they so vulnerable? Many are undocumented Haitian, Mayan and Mexican immigrants who fear reprisal from employers or possible deportation for organizing or seeking help from the government. It's disturbing that U.S. companies are exporting jobs by the tens of thousands, that Americans are too lazy to work hard-labor jobs, that we rely on modern-day slave labor from people escaping

the poverty of their own countries. Look around. It's not just Taco Bell. Who cuts our grass, builds our homes, nannies our children and does our laundry?

Is this the American way? Let's hope not! Someone recently told me, "Hope is not a strategy." What we need is a strategy and not a lot of hope

Stop blaming the illegal aliens for our problems, because most of the time we create our own problems. There is nothing free about the free enterprise system, because somewhere down the line it will have a cost. Tragically, it most often has a human cost, because, as the dollar shrinks in value, we look for lower labor, supply and delivery expenses.

Taco Bell has the ability to make a difference in the lives of farm workers by either forcing the hand of Six L's or pressuring other buyers into the mix. If I were Taco Bell, I would buy tomatoes elsewhere.

Session to focus on Nevada 'families'

Assemblyman Richard Perkins, speaker of the Assembly and a Democrat from Henderson, presided over the start of the 2005 Legislature this week.

Before he left for Carson City, he talked to News editors about some of his priorities.

Q: What are some of the issues you are most concerned about?

A: I think this session in my mind about how we treat Nevada's family. Every session has its own personality.

The tax debate was last session. This session is, where is Nevada heading, and where is Nevada going to be in 10 years, and how are we going to strengthen Nevada's families? That can happen in a number of ways. We've talked about putting together a lottery for the education system, particularly for books and class sizes, and that helps us strengthen our families by giving our students the tools they need to be successful.

Getting the parents more involved. The parents want to be involved, but sometimes they don't know how to reach out to the teachers or the administrators.



Minimum wage. The people spoke fairly loudly in the November election, I think it was 68 percent who support the minimum wage. We would have to wait to go through another vote in November 2006. Why do that when we could do it this session and get it done more quickly? We're already seeing with the cost of housing that minimum-wage families aren't able to afford a place to live or even rent small places. Minimum wage will help, I think, to strengthen our families.

The growth issues we're dealing with, primarily in Southern Nevada though not unique to Southern Nevada. Property tax relief is going to be a big headline of this session; how we accomplish that and at the same time make sure that our local governments have the revenue they need to provide public safety and educational programs. But growth is so different many issues. It's water, it's the cost of housing, and it's the property taxes.

the property taxes. One of my number one goals for this session is to return some of the sharpness and credibility to that institution. We had a very difficult legislative season, and I say season because it wasn't just one session. We had our legislative session, we had our special session, and then what we affectionately call the "extra session." It was pretty acrimonious, frankly, and I think we need to change that. We need to hold people accountable for things. We need to have respect in that institution.

We have a great hiring and firing plan in politicts. It's called an electon. But sometimes there's a time in between when we need to take care of things, take out



people who are not appropriate for serving in public office, and there's an ethics system to do that, and I just want to strengthen it a little bit. Why, when somebody confesses to three willful violations of the ethics code, do we even have to go through with the extensive efforts of an impeachment process? There's only one ethics infraction in this state that's criminal, and that's bribery. There are others that probably should be criminal.

Q: Other states have had the experience where they started the state lottery, and the money that was raised that was supposed to go toward education got raided. How do you prevent that?

A:We'll have to amend our Constitution in order for the lottery to occur. First of all, the money has to be earmarked for education, at least until a time when our state's priorities may be a little different. I hate to use the term "lockbox" because in past political circles it was overused, but locking it up so that it is absolutely protected by the Constitution. ... I don't want this money coming to the legislation; I want it going directly to the educational institution, that takes some of the political wrangling out of it.

Q: On the other side of the minimum wage issue: how does that impact small businesses?

A: We've thought about that a lot. It's the small businesses that I want to make sure are not negatively impacted. We have a fairly sizable contingent of small businesses that are prepared to come testify in favor of the minimum wage. This group is already



paying the minimum wage and talked about how it has not negatively impacted their businesses; they've got a higher quality of employees and the like. As well, we'll exempt out those businesses that cover health insurance for their employees. I can live with a lower minimum wage if somebody is taking care of that. Right now is the best time for us to do this because our economy could not be more robust. If we were in a lull, in a down cycle, it would be much harder for us to do

Q: How do you plan on providing tax property

A: I have a number of different ideas. First is the easiest, the quickest to implement, and having the least amount of negative impact on public policy, and that would be just for our local governments to do this without us having to get involved. They can lower their tax rates any time they want to. They can't increase them without legislative approval, but when it's this level — they can reset property taxes today.

There are 14 official proposals right now on how to deal with property taxes. Many of them are very viable; I'd say half of them could benefit from further discussion. The one I favor the most, the one I'm working on right now, is called the "home state exemption," or a "base"

That would be to take the first number of dollars in the assessment evaluation and exempt that from future increases. A \$100,000 exemption covers a \$300,000 house. And you don't do that on what's already being paid, just on future increases.

Study seeking participants | Retired Public Employees meet

The University of Nevada, Las Vegas Department of Physical Therapy has been awarded a grant from the American Parkinson Disease Association to conduct research on Parkinson's disease.

The program is looking for people who would like to participate. Subjects will be compensated and parking passes will be provided.

The study will focus on the effects of different types of training on balance in individuals with Parkinson's.

Parkinson's disease is a

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progressive disorder of the brain that causes four major problems or signs: slowing of movement, rigid muscles, trouble maintaining posture and balance, and tremors in various parts of the body.

These problems can lead to falling, which can lead to head injuries or fractures. A fall once a week is a common problem for 10 percent of patients with Parkinson's disease, the researchers said.

There are many treatments for this disease that help to manage the symptoms, according to the researchers.

Levodopa, also known as Sinemet, is a drug developed to help treat Parkinson's, but of all its benefits it does not help with improving bal-

With balance training there comes an increase in confidence in walking and getting around in the community, the researchers said. The goal of this study is to discover some of these techniques.

It was supposed to be the perfect deal.

The city of Henderson was going to sneak in under radar while Las Vegas and its mayor, Oscar Goodman, lived in a fantasy world of bringing in a Major League baseball team to Las Vegas. The city would scuttle in and entice the Las

Vegas 51s to jump one town

It was supposed to be a sure thing, that is, until the logistics came into play.

With no solid ground to stand on, little financial flexibility from Henderson city officials and an albatross called the Montreal Expos, the Las Vegas 51s have decided to remain in the Las Vegas. In essence, the deal is sounding its death knell with no one truly to blame except for a little bad luck and too much lapsed time thanks to the Expos relocation ordeal.

"I would say the Expos thing really hurt it," said Las Vegas 51s president Don Logan, who was quick to point out the deal is not totally dead from his end. "At the same time, it

still is a viable option. We are looking at every opportunity. Right now though, there are no calls coming from Henderson."


Originally, the Las Vegas 51s were to begin building a stadium in Henderson by the summer. In fact, the team was on the verge of announcing something resembling an early arrangement at the beginning of 2004 but then came the Expos ordeal.

Needing a home, Montreal - owned by Major League Baseball - gave Las Vegas and Goodman the idea that the Expos could actually end up in the Silver State. Coupled with Goodman's zeal for landing a professional sports team in Las Vegas, the 51s, who needed a new stadium as a

replacement for shoddy Cashman Field, got sent to the back of the line.

Instead of finishing the final portions of a deal to begin building a top-notch baseball facility off Russell Road near the Galleria at Sunset mall, all negotiations were put on hold.

Bowling legend thrives in Henderson

He won the most prestigious tournament on the Professional Bowler's Association (PBA) schedule, winning prize money that more than doubled the largest cash winnings ever on tour.

And he did it left-handed.

He is one of the bowling legends living among us in Henderson, and while other names like Wendy Macpherson, Tish Johnson, and Mike Devaney capture headlines with their bowling exploits, Roy Lown lives quietly in the glow of his important accomplishments.

Lown, living in El Paso, Texas, at the time, was a PBA Bowler at the very beginning, participating in its first-ever fifth place finish in the Showboat Invitatournament at Albany, N.Y., on May 24,

"I was managing the Freeway Lanes in El Paso when the PBA was started." Lown said. "Snead Christian, Harry Golden and I heard about the PBA, and because of the type of people involved such as Dick Weber, Don Carter and others, we knew it was due."

Life for a tour player was quite different then - not like today's PBA journeyman who can make \$40,000 for finishing last in every tournament - and Lown said he pocketed just under \$2,000 for his first year on the pro circuit. A good portion of that prize-money was for a

tional here in Southern Nevada. Where the legend grew, though, was at the National PBA Invitational at Para-

mus, New Jersey in May 1961. While the great Don Carter was making his way into the history books, including the Encyclopedia Brittanica, with his domination of 1961, including a win in the legendary All-Star, the World's Invitational, the PBA National Championship and the American Bowling Congress Masters, Lown was setting the stage for a bright spotlight of his

When the summer sun hits town, one new local sports team will be reveling during its moment in the sun.

"The Henderson area is a great baseball community and CCSN's field was just sitting there without anyone using in during the summer. What's great about this is that when out kids come in and play this summer, no one's future has been decided. They will come out and play with enthusiasm."

The team - which will broadcast all the games live on the radio while also producing a local weekly radio show - has already released a 37-man roster, but it will surely trim down once the Major League draft has taken place. Either way, it is chock-full of local standouts like Silverado grad Tyler Coon and Green Valley grads Ryan Tabor and Kyle Price as well as national standouts from schools like Louisiana State.

"I think the key to it is that we just have to have a topcaliber roster every summer," McPherson said. "This makes it valuable for the community., What you'll see in a few years when these kids go on to play professionally, their host homes here in town will follow them and the community will follow them. By the time they leave for the summer, they will have the feel that the city of Henderson was their niche and the community supported them., Having a top-notch roster every year is key."

The team will join the competitive Pacific Southwest League and will compete for the coveted National Baseball Congress World Series later this summer.

"I think it's great," league commissioner Dick "Chief" Twyman said. "I think they're going to bring a lot to the table. They will have a lot of experience too. Being in Southern Nevada rounds it off because its like a tri-state. The other teams are going to love going there. I think the Hustlers are going to enjoy being in the league and going to other cities.'

The team became a reality this past year when McPherson and local Harry Wade, who is a local ambassador for baseball, came together with the idea. Wade, who is leaving for Cuba to promote baseball next week, and McPherson both felt the city needed something special during the summer on the baseball diamond. They proposed the team to the league, began recruiting and found a home at Lied Field in Henderson.

During the games, alcohol will be served and there will be numerous promotions like fireworks and concerts at the local baseball park.

"I just think the facility itself. whether or not it's junior college or not, is a beautiful place to watch a ball game," McPherson said. "We will have concert nights, fireworks nights and we are going to take advantage of it all. I think it will be a chance for families to get in some inexpensive family time out at the game."

The radio show and game broadcasts also lend credibility to the team. With the weekly radio show, Stevey Mac's Sports Attack hosted by Mike Beasley, fans will get a chance to voice their own opinions about the team or any other local or national sporting issue. The show will begin Feb. 15, airing on Tuesdays, Wednesdays and Fridays on 1400 AM.

Green Valley High School boys hoops coach, Adam Patai, a true class act



It didn't take long for that Hoosier mentality to take over Green Valley's boys basketball program when first-

year coach Adam Patai took over late last spring.

This sportswriter instinctively knew things would be good for the Gators after the first time I spoke to Patai, whose name I can never pronounce correctly because, well, I'm an idiot. It's pronounced "Pay-Thai" not "Pa-tay" or "Patt-eye." All you game announcers take note because I have a feeling you will be introducing this man on more than a few occasions as the regional and state tournament begins.

This Green Valley team is legit and I like the way they play under Patai, who hails from the basketball capital of the world - Indiana

Now this is not meant as a knock to former Gator coach Jim Allen, who I respect greatly, but I just prefer the more laid back style Patai has instilled in his program. Another forward, Thomas Racioppo, also has given the Gators some solid scoring, but everything is wrapped up in a perfect package thanks to the amazing play and passing from senior point guard Jordan Ragan.

He was not this publication's preseason player of the year, but he has done nothing but prove us wrong all season long. I have seen Ragan make some passes I didn't think were physically possible. Like the Phoenix Suns in the NBA, this Gator

team is driven by the up-tempo play of its highly-talented point guard.

Under Patai, this Green Valley team has made itself a contender for the state title.

While Bishop Gorman is the acting 'bully' this year, I have no doubt both Green Valley and Coronado both have a solid shot of rolling through the regional tournament like Foothill did last year en route to the state finals.

I think Silverado - one of the great young teams in town - is simply too youthful to make any consistent playoff run.

One day, maybe next year, the Skyhawks will make an amazing run of their own, but there are still too many question marks past



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

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Stadium would have been part of larger redevelopment plan to include apartments, hospital

Fast forward to the last week in September and the Expos still hadn't announced a new location. Finally, and as expected, Major League Baseball finally announced the Expos would be moving to Washington, D.C., on Sept. 30.

During those nearly nine months of uncertainty, the land value in Henderson where the 51s had intended to move quadrupled in cost. All of a sudden, the deal began

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deteriorating beyond repair.

All parties involved refuse to blame any one person or circumstance — except for Major League Baseball's snaillike pace in the Expos derby.

"I haven't heard anything

from anyone in Henderson and I think it has to do with the Expos thing and the misinformation it created," Logan said. "It created a lot of issues and there was never any chance for Vegas to get it. The perception was that it might (get the team), so what are you going to do?'

The new stadium would have been one part of a larger redevelopment plan with a hospital, some high rise apartments with the stadium as the central draw in the plan.

Now it lies dead, not unlike the failed attempts by Henderson to lure Major League teams to town for a Spring Training site nearly 10 years ago. Everything just seemed so perfect. How did it all go wrong?

"I told everyone from Day One that the team was not coming here," Logan said. "It worked well to motivate other communities to step up and it did. I never, for one minute, believed it was going to happen.".

Regardless, the city has its own crown jewel with CCSN's Lied Field — arguably the best junior college baseball field in the nation — and baseball is still king in Southern Nevada. A major league team could still end up in Southern Nevada one day.

"What this did is it put Vegas on the map as a potential relocation city," Logan said. "I

think it's is incumbent on everyone to really taker a look at whether we want to get a major league baseball team here. If so we need to start making steps to make it doable, like a new stadium. It's going to happen one day so we need to start now."

Henderson city manager Phil Speight — who had been involved in the relocation talks — could not be reached for comment. Coincidentally, he was on the road in Washington, D.C., the new home of the Washington Nationals.

Lowe was the lone left-hander in tournament

"It was the first PBA tournament with added prize money, about \$75,000. I remember going into the bowling center and seeing the trophy the winner would get and I remember thinking 'That would be really nice," Lowe said.

The National Invitational was a very prestigious event, and a favorite of the fans, and that interest caught the attention of ABC Sports. ABC had been covering team bowling at that time, but the upstart PBA and this tournament in particular were intriguing enough to cause a change in plans, and when the tournament neared its close, the TV lights were up.

"We thought the TV would be great, but we thought it was just going to be a test run" Lown said. "We didn't know how big it was going to be."

Rather than the seven-game single elimination matches common to the PBA Tour to-day, this particular 1961 event had two-game matches after 24 games of qualifying. Lown, the lone left-hander in the

tournament, by virtue of qualifying 16th, drew tournament leader Don Carter. But defying the bowling convention of the day, Lown sent Carter to defeat by 15 pins and moved on to best Harold Zimmerman and Billy Golembiewski to advance to the telecast along with Pat Patterson, Glenn Allison and Rich Robinette.

"There were bleachers set up behind the TV pair, and there was room for about 3,000 people," Lown said. "It was a very nerve-wracking experience for everyone involved."

Allison and Patterson were household names, but not so for Lown.

"I had gotten some notoriety by winning some minor tournaments, including a 40-game tournament in Ogden (Utah)," Lown said, "but I was basically unknown when we got to TV."

In his two-game match against Patterson, the score was tied, another first in the PBA. Not having a procedure for such things, they chose a two-frame rolloff and Lown prevailed to move to the final, a best two-out-of-three game match with Robinette.

"ABC had a block of time, and Patterson and I tied, leading to the rolloff. The PBA had to make a decision on the fly of what to do." Lown said, "We didn't even know what was going to happen. The ABC broadcast was already a long one, and they extended it because of our overtime."

After splitting the first two games, Lown came through to take the title match by five pins and move permanently into the annals of bowling lore and taking home a \$15,000 check in the process.

Nowadays Lown continues to participate in his sport of choice in league bowling in the Las Vegas Valley, notably a scratch league on Tuesday nights at Gold Coast, and in the ABC Naitonal Championships each year. He has been honored with induction into the El Paso (Texas) Athletics Hall of Fame, the El Paso Bowling Association Hall of Fame, and the Texas State Bowling Hall of Fame.

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
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

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Having designed over 170 courses worldwide, renowned golf course architect Ted Robinson is

known for the challenge and playability of his layouts. The Tuscany Golf Club, located at the foot of Calico Hills, is certainly no exception.

Owned and operated by Rhodes Golf, Tuscany provides a wonderful array of fair and challenging holes. Wide fairways, well-bunkered greens, desert arroyos and water features highlight the course. Themed after an Italian style vineyard, the course also features unique stone ruins and wine barrel signage throughout.

As with many well designed courses, the first three holes at Tuscany provide the player with ample scoring opportunities. A solid drive on the par-4 first will leave a short iron to an elevated green and a good birdie chance. The 553 yard, downhill second is reachable for long hitters and is followed by the short 389 yard par-4 third.

After a fairly relaxing start, Tuscany starts to bear it's teeth at the 449 yard par-4 seventh and the demanding 434 yard par-4 ninth. The ninth is a dogleg left that plays to a green guarded by water in the front, left and back and bunkers on the right. Four is a great score and will provide a nice finish to the front-nine.

The back nine offers two difficult par-3s (Nos. 13-15) and the quirky 299 yard par-4 16th. A great example of risk/reward architecture, the 16th is drivable, but heavily guarded by bunkers on both sides of the green.

Many a match is decided on this hole.

The 18th is a classic finishing hole and one of the best in the Las Vegas valley. Playing 440 yards, the eighteenth requires a long, straight drive that will leave the player with a mid iron approach to an island green complete with waterfall.

An extremely intimidating shot, many players elect to lay up short on their second and protect against double bogey or worse. A great finish to a fun and yet challenging layout.

The clubhouse is scheduled to open in October of 2005. Aptly named the Olde World Tuscan Village, it will feature 31,000 square feet and contain a golf retail store, pub and fine dining restaurant as well as expansive banquet and meeting facilities.

"The clubhouse will be the centerpiece of the entire Tuscany facility and will provide unmatched views of the golf course, surrounding mountains and the Las Vegas Strip", said C.W. Woods, Tuscany's head golf professional.

Vo-Tech relay places third in Las Vegas Marathon

Vo-Tech's relay team ran into the record books Jan. 30 at the Las Vegas Marathon, placing third in an international field of 43 mixed division relay teams.

The team finished in 3:02:04, less than 15 minutes off the winning team and more than two-and-a-half hours faster than some other teams, said Tony Kyriacou, Vo-Tech's cross country and running club coach.

The course started in Jean and ended in Sunset Park.

Leading off for Vo-Tech was Mike Hartwell, two-time state cross-country meet qualifier. Devin Mancuso, Jose Mendoza and Chrystelle Schultz followed him, along with anchor Joaquin Gabaldon.

"Each of the first four runners completes a 5-mile leg. The anchor runs 6.2 miles," said Kyriacou, who teaches graphic design at Vo-Tech.

According to Kyriacou, other relay teams came from as far away as England, Florida, Boston and Philadelphia.

Vo-Tech, a magnet school that teaches career and technical skills, fields a crosscountry team that competes between September and November each year.

"Some of the other career and technical schools don't have athletics of any kind, but it's a big part of our program," Kyriacou said. "Crosscountry is our most populous and winningest sport. We had 43 runners this cross-country season."

Vo-Tech does not have a track and field program. Kyriacou said the schoolsponsored running club gives cross-country athletes

and those from other sports the opportunity to train in the off-season. "Students who run track and field for their schools are precluded from competing in runs during their season," he said. "If more than one runner participates in an event like the Las Vegas Marathon, it counts against the program and the number of meets the runners can participate in as a team."

The community also often benefits when Vo-Tech's runners hit the streets. "We participate in a lot of road races to benefit various charities. Every time we step up to the starting line we're giving back to the community," Kyriacou

Vorst Dates

Notables share the dating detours they've encountered on the road to love

Ah, Valentine's Day. Once a year we snuggle up to the hearts-and-flowers holiday and become instantromantics. We shower sweethearts with syrupy sentiments and look back, misty-eyed, at all those loving memories of courtship. Life is good.

Well, it's funny how the memory works because not every romance gets a perfect start. In fact, some have had downright disastrous beginnings. Some dates end up being etched permanently into the brain in a section marked, "Oh, don't go there."

Some local notables, including politicians, entertainers and business owners, were willing to share their own worst-date stories for this day of love. Some of the tales are funny, some are sweet and one is just strange. But all of them are as real as it gets.

Some dates don't just teeter but plunge into the truth-isstranger-than-fiction category. Henderson magician/comedian Amazing Johnathan was appearing at San Antonio

College in San Antonio, Texas, back in the early 1980s when the beautiful co-ed who booked the gig caught his eye. He asked her on

a date and they drove to the city's famous Riverwalk to sightsee and get

some Mexican food. "It was going really good too. I picked her up from school. We drove for about a half hour in the car, and parked the car and, "Pow," he says.

A parking gate dropped down and hit her on the head.

"She was knocked out for about a minute, and a security guard ran out and we tried to revive her," notes the comedian, who appears at the Riviera Hotel and Casino. "She had a bump on her head immediately and just wanted to go home. And I was back on the road again, looking for more adventures. I never talked to her after that."

Blind dates are usually the riskiest, perhaps the scariest, approach to meeting that perfect someone. But what's even worse is when the setup is, well, a setup.

Jill Lagan, executive director of the Boulder City Chamber of Commerce, was working at the Las Vegas district attorney's office as a process server 15 years ago when her co-workers decided it was time to fix her up with their version of Mr. Right.

"I was working in investigations in the (district attorney's) office in Las Vegas and a couple of detectives thought it would be funny to set me up on a blind date. I saw the picture of this guy and he was gor-

geous," Lagan remembers. But when she met her date at a steakhouse on Sahara Avenue, Lagan

knew she was in trouble. He didn't speak a word of English and the only Spanish she knew came from the menu at Taco Bell.

"It was all hand motions and shrugging the shoulders a lot. You know you had a lot of body movement but not a lot of understanding," says Lagan, chuckling.



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

The Jewish population - once flourishing in Europe has been crippled since World War II, Rabbi Sanford Akselrad of Congregation Ner Tamid says.

That will be his focus as he and his wife, Joni, join rabbis from around the world for a week this month in Prague, Budapest and Vienna, cities where the Jewish population has held on, and in some cases, resurged, he said.

"These areas were once rich in Jewish history and culture," the rabbi said.

Akselrad's first stop will be Budapest, Hungary, which has a Jewish population of 80,000, the largest in Europe, he said. While there, he will have the opportunity to visit Europe's largest functioning synagogue, with seating for 3,000, built in 1895. Ner Tamid seats

The Budapest synagogue was used as a holding cell by the Nazis before transporting Jews to concentration camps.

"It's one thing to read about the history," Akselrad said. "It's another to stand where life was once lived and atrocities were committed."

About 500,000 Hungarian Jews were killed in the Holocaust.

From Budapest, Akselrad will continue on to Vienna, Austria, where the Jewish community has been all but forgotten, he said.

"There isn't much visible of the Jewish community," the rabbi said of the former 19th century Jewish cultural cen-

CULTIVATOR'S CORNER Aggle Roberts

Early February the time to prune trees



of trees should be done in early February before the sap begins to

flow again. Do any major pruning after deciduous trees lose their leaves in the fall and before they leaf out in early spring.

Pruning trees improves appearances and protects health by removing dead, damaged or diseased parts. You prune for safety, to regulate fruit set and increase fruit size, and for structural strength.

Here are some basics of pruning:

Use a good pair of pruning shears for making small cuts up to one-half-inch in diameter. Use lopping shears with 24- to 30-inch handles for cuts up to 1 inch, and a pruning saw.

Always avoid leaving too much cut surface exposed. Don't cut so that you leave a stub. However, don't cut so close that you injure or undercut the bud you're trying to encourage. Not only does a proper cut look better, but smooth wounds heal more rapidly. Also, they are not likely to become infected as jagged, torn cuts. Stubs will never heal over.

To make the best cut, position the blade side of the shears or loppers closest to the portion of wood that is to remain on the plant. The correct way is to slant the cutting blade in the direction the bud points. Keep the lowest point of the cut even with the bud.

To remove a branch with a saw too heavy to support with a free hand, make a cut from underneath, halfway through the limb. Stub it off about 6 inches from the finished cut, sawing from the top of the fimb, then again at the proper place. This three cut process prevents splitting and bark stripping, both which could damage the tree.

The most important part of a plant to a pruner is the buds. You can manipulate

and direct plant growth by removing selected buds.

There are three classifications of buds: terminal, lateral and latent.

The terminal bud is at the end of a stem or branch. It carries the plant growth upward. If you remove terminal buds, you can cause increased growth in side buds, making denser, bushier plants.

Buds on the sides of stems and branches are lateral buds. They develop into leaves or as the plant become larger into branches. If you remove lateral buds, you change energy into terminal growth.

Buds may lie dormant on the stem or bark in some plants for many years. These are latent buds, starting growth only after pruning or injury removes growth above them. Latent buds account for the sprouting of shrubs and trees from stumps.

Pruning young shade trees is very important to keep them strong, attractive and long lasting. Prune newly planted trees to a single leader. This will make the tree look a little lopsided. However, it will fill in quickly and be a much stronger tree.

Large shade trees won't need much pruning if they were trained properly when young. Prune larger shade trees so there is a dominant trunk from which side branches grow. The side branches should spiral around the trunk about 18 inches apart from each other. The ideal shape for most snade trees is a strong, single main trunk from which wide crotched, evenly spaced branches arise.
