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Gans not as healthy as he appeared

The last act starred a headshaven coroner and a physician who greatly resembles longtime Vegas stand-up Pete Barbutti.

The room was small, but filled. It would have been a fitting setting for a lounge show if not for the gravity of the subject: The official cause of death of Danny Gans, who was discovered having trouble breathing by his wife, Julie, about 3:44 a.m.

Clark County Coroner Mike Murphy, flanked on his left by medical examiner Dr. Gary Telgenhoff, who performed the autopsy on Gans, addressed the media on June 9.

Gans died as a result of suffering a toxic reaction to the painkiller Dilaudid, an opiate similar to morphine. Murphy said Gans was taking the pain medication to treat chronic pain syndrome, a contributing cause of his death

Murphy refused to use the term "overdose," as it's not a medically applied term used in the cause of death.

Gans, a sturdily built age 52 at the time of his death, also suffered from hypertensive cardiovascular disease and a condition known as polycythemia, described by Murphy as a red blood cell disorder that has the opposite effect as anemia. The person suffers an abundance of red blood cells, in effect.

Officially, the explanation has been made public. But the discussion of Gans' death likely won't cease for some time, as observers remember his reputation for missing shows for somewhat unexplained reasons.

One of the questions tossed out was if any steroids were found in Gans' system.

Murphy responded that the only drugs identified were those that contributed to his death the painkillers.

At this moment, I remember a master showman and a family man who, tragically, wasn't nearly as healthy as his image

Having a ball

Henderson-based shoe retailer hits 10-year benchmark

In the lobby of the corporateoffices of Zappos.comin Henderson, amid plaques, awards and framed magazine articles about the company on display, are a pair of nondescript brown Airwalk shoes and a photo of small San Francisco home.

The shoes are the type that founder Nick Swinmurn couldn't find after a day of shoe shopping in San Francisco in 1999, and the small home is where he hatched the idea for an online shoe retailer.

At the time, California was at the forefront of the dotcom boom, and Swinmurn's site was one of hun-

dreds of upstarts. What is unique is that 10 years later, after the dotcom boom went bust and a vast majority of online startups went the way of the dodo, Zappos has experienced a

meteoric rise to success. It reached \$1 billion in annual sales last year, cracking Fortune Magazine's list of best companies to work for and, on June 1, marked

its 10th anniversary.

In December 1999, Swinmurn and the small group of workers who started the company had used up their investor seed money and were still nowhere near profitability. Convinced they had failed, a group went out to get drinks, commiserate and figure

out what to do next. Matt Burchard, who now directs Zappos' online marketing team, was the fifth employee to join the company and remembers that day well.

While the group was out, he said, Tony Hsieh, who had been the primary investor - he became a millionaire the year before, at age 24, when he sold an online advertising company to Microsoft for \$265 million called Swinmurn and said he would give the company enough money for one more month of operation.

But it had to show serious improvement. And it did.

"I never thought we'd be here," Burchard said. "It's

amazing. ... If Tony hadn't made that phone call, my life would be very different.'

Hsieh eventually became more involved in the company's day-to-day operations and, before long, he was on board as CEO.

As Zappos has grown, it has become known as much for its relaxed working atmosphere as for customer service.

Call center employees don't have scripts and are encouraged to have fun with customers; each department has its own decor and theme; every employee gets a free lunch each day, and you're just as likely to see an employee parade making its way through the company's headquarters as

you are a mail cart. "Our No. 1 priority is the company culture," Hsieh said. "Our whole belief is that if we get the culture right, then everything else, including the customer service, will fall into place."

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Man charged after children left in car seats

A man accused of leaving two toddlers tied up in a Silverado area garage said he was upset that he had to babysit his girlfriend's children and went to a bar to watch a basketball game, a Metro Police report said.

Jonathan Weaver, 20, was



arrested on chargesofchild abuse and endangerment, kidnapping and attempted murder after police broke into an apartment complex

garage in the 10000 block of South Spencer Street about 8:15 p.m. Tuesday and found the 1- and 2-yearold children tied up in their car seats, police said.

The children, who had been left in the garage for more than two hours, were also gagged with cloth and a shirt was pulled over the younger child's face, police said.

At a hearing on June 16, bail for Weaver was set at \$400,000.

children did not die, did not suffocate," Chief Deputy District Attorney Craig Hendricks

Deputy Public Defender Amy Johnson, who represented Weaver at the hearing, said Weaver made a "terrible mistake," but he did not mean the children any harm. She said the kidnapping and attempted murder charges were not warranted.

The toddlers were discovered after a woman walking through the parking lot of the complex where Weaver lives heard crying coming from the garage and alerted police, authorities said.

The mother of the children, Amy Beltran, 20, told police she asked Weaver to watch her sons while she attended night school.

Weaver said he was upset he had to baby-sit the children because he had wanted to watch a Las Vegas 51s baseball game, according to the police report. After leaving the children, he went to a neighborhood bar, the report said.

Weaver initially told police he had left the children with Beltran's parents, but then "It's a miracle that these said he left them in the garage

while he went and watched an NBA finals basketball game at a bar, the report said. He reportedly told officers he watched the second half of the game, but didn't realize how long he was gone, the report said.

Weaver reportedly told police he didn't think leaving the children in the garage was a big deal because they have had "camp outs" there in the past.

He said he played with them inside the garage for about 20 minutes and waited for them to fall asleep before leaving, the report said.

Weaver told police he "could not believe what he was about to do next," but he decided to tie the children because he was afraid they would grab tools stored in the garage and hurt themselves, according to the report.

Beltran, who is pregnant with Weaver's child, is not facing charges, police said.

She told police she often leaves her sons in Weaver's care and had no concerns about Weaver or his parenting

The fire did damage the inside of the house on the first and second floors. Smoke and fire damage was extensive throughout the home, Morris said.


Firefighters have determined the fire was accidental, but they are still investigating the cause, Morris said.

Green Valley Principal Jeffrey Horn attributed the school's continued success to the hard work of the students and to the support they receive from the staff and community.


"We're proud of our commitment to excellence and to the kids," he said.

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

Maglev link from California to Vegas a winning concept

This nation must do a far better job of cleaning up the environment and reversing its dependency on fossil fuel consumption, which contributes to global warming.

One solution is to develop a nationwide network of highspeed rail lines that not only could rival the connectivity of the U.S. interstate highway system, but also could do a far better job of relieving traffic congestion while getting passengers to their destinations faster. Having cleaner air to breathe would be a bonus.

As reporters Lisa Mascaro and Richard Velotta reminded Las Vegas Sun readers, the city now has two competing high-speed-rail proposals that aim to connect Southern Nevada with Southern California. But only one of them, a magnetic levitation train that can travel up to 300 miles an hour, truly represents the future.

The downside of the other proposal, for the DesertXpress system, which would employ the antiquated technology of steel wheels on steel tracks, is that it would travel at only half the speed and go only as far as Victorville, Calif.

Proponents of the maglev line, a nonprofit venture that would be overseen by the California-Nevada Super Speed Train Commission, intend to run their line to Anaheim, Calif. This represents a significant advantage over DesertXpress for many reasons.

One is that Southern Californians traveling to Las Vegas aboard a magley train would avoid the horrendous traffic that turns the route from the Interstate 10/Interstate 15 interchange to the Cajon Pass into a parking lot. Driving to Victorville would add hours to their commute, increase air pollution and leave motorists frustrated.

Another advantage of maglev is that there are plans to connect the Las Vegas line with a high-speed route running from San Diego to San Francisco and Sacramento.

Finally, the Las Vegas and California links could se vital building blocks in the quest for a national high-speed-

It is for these reasons that we strongly urge the Obama administration and Congress to include the proposed Las Vegas maglev train in the funding mix for the \$8 billion in federal money set aside for high-speed-rail development.

Federal involvement may be the ticket to protect credit card information

Despite what credit card companies would have you believe, the computer networks that handle transactions are vulnerable to hackers.

The Associated Press reported that since 2006, more than 70 retailers and credit card companies have reported security breaches, including one that left 100 million accounts exposed to thieves. Experts say there are likely many more breaches that have gone unnoticed or unreported. In an analysis of industry records, the AP found that

companies that deal with credit card transactions haven't

taken sufficient precautions to ward

off identity thieves.

In 2006, a group of major credit little fraud is just card companies formed the Payment Card Industry Security Standards Council to set uniform security rules for merchants. Most merchants 93 percent of large retailers and 88 percent of mid-size ones - have complied with the standards. But the standards aren't terribly rigorous,

requiring the installation of basic software and an annual test of the security system. The standards allow more than 99 percent of retailers to test and evaluate themselves.

The credit card industry has balked at taking steps to increase security levels, such as encrypting all data it sends over computer networks, because it says added measures would be too expensive and would slow customer transactions. The companies are taking a risk at the expense of millions of card holders. Apparently, a little fraud is just the cost of doing business, but it is disastrous for the customer who is victimized.

Considering how much of the economy is made up of credit and debit card transactions, that is unacceptable. If the credit card industry won't improve standards, the federal government should step in to protect consumers.

For too many drivers, red means go



It was just a couple of years ago that cops and reporters gathered at Rainbow Boulevard and Craig Road. Although police

and journalists don't always play nice together, on this occasion - a news conference to announce an awarenessraising campaign - they were partners.


The campaign was called "Red Means Stop," and it was designed to get people to quit running red lights. We had agreed to publicize it in our Home News group of community newspapers.

At the time we launched this campaign in 2007, and perhaps continuing to this day — there is a surprising lack of current data on the topic — Nevada was one of the nation's leaders in per capita deaths as a result of drivers disobeying traffic signals.

We held the news conference at the intersection of Rainbow and Craig for somber symbolic reasons: It had been the intersection at which the first fatality of 2007 had occurred.

The media don't like news conferences to begin with. and on such a hot August day this one was even less appealing. But with the sheriff and a couple of police chiefs, a parking lot of Metro squad cars and legions of motorcycle officers all on hand, the event moved forward.

The loud collision occurred as we were taking our places in front of the cameras. Right

behind the large promotional sign we used as a lectern backdrop, a driver had run a red light and mashed a car turning in front of him. It was too ironic, so much so that a few observers thought the event was staged. Some cameras even got footage. Luckily, there were no serious injuries, and we felt we had picked up another testimonial to how widespread the problem with red lights was.

I'd thought this to be the most stunning possible example of the problem. But that only lasted until the

middle of last month. On Saturday, May 23, a Metro officer and a local woman suffered minor injuries in a crash that occurred after his police cruiser disregarded a red light and entered the intersection at Ann Road and Jones Boulevard.

And then a couple of days later, on Monday, May 25, a Metro Police patrol car sailed through a red light at Rainbow Boulevard and Twain Avenue, smacking straight into a passenger vehicle, the pair of them then careening into two other cars.

Unlike the crash that killed Officer James Manor on May 7, neither Metro vehicle was engaged in a pursuit or responding to an emergency call. But like Manor, neither one was using its lights or

So now we have even better perspective as to how widespread the problem is locally. And also an indication that things aren't likely to change in the short term.

As it did in 2005 and in 2007, a proposal to legalize the use of photo-radar cameras in Nevada once again went nowhere in Carson City. Oh, all the historic arguments for and against were employed when it came up in April. After a debate about the intrusiveness of the system,

its effectiveness, costs and potential revenue, the bill quietly went bye-bye, keeping with tradition.

A new concern that surfaced, though, is that there is no consensus as to whether photo-radar cameras are in fact a deterrent to red-light runners. Many parts of the U.S. think they are, but now some studies are showing up that indicate otherwise.

Some of these studies are put out by organizations such as the National Motorist Association, which long has carried a torch against photo radar. But there are other reports as well.

So here we are. Although I'm guessing it's a trend that Metro won't let continue, we can now add police cruisers to drivers of all ages, piloting every type of vehicle including the occasional bus, who all are in too much of a hurry to pause for a red light. And we can't do anything about it.

Even if photo radar were a deterrent to red-light runners — and the jury may be out on this - the fact is that it is not soon going to be legalized anyway. This means that, aside from stationing police at key intersections in town neither practical nor possible we're going to have to rely on awareness campaigns, supported by local media. A lot of media.

After all, we have to do something. When we lose touch with such a basic rule in our society, only bad things can happen.

Veterans' stories an important part of our past



Several years ago, I got involved in one of the most heart-rending projects I've faced in more than 40 years of volunteer-

A national effort by AARP was under way, in cooperation with the Library of Congress, to gather information from

veterans of World War II. Not information about the war, mind you. Information about their feelings, their friends or some reminiscences - just non-war stuff

in general. The plan was to sit down with your dad, your grandpa or your uncle - anyone with whom you would feel comfortable.

It would be you, your beloved veteran and a tape recorder. What would you talk about if not war?

How about the food? What happened at mail call? How did you get new boots if you needed them? Where were you stationed? How did you get cigarettes, soap or chewing gum?

AARP collected thousands of stories, which now reside in the Archives of the United States in the Library of Congress. I spoke with dozens of friends, many of whom didn't want to talk until we had several plain and simple conversations.

Among the tapes is a large notebook with many handwritten pages and drawings gathered several years ago by

the journalism students at Las Vegas High School.

Much has been written about the efforts of these youngsters to get their relatives' stories on tape. I am sure both questioner and respondent felt so much love after they exchanged thoughts.

This all came back to me after I read recently that Gen. George Patton's son, also a general, lost all his war records in a fire several years ago. His son had spent six years in carefully measured sessions, taping conversations with his father about his war experiences and those of his grandfather.

Most World War II veterans will go to their graves with their stories untold. That is

not the way it should be. There would no better a gift for a teenager than a tape recorder (yep, the old fashioned kind. They can make a CD later) and the tapes to record their family's history. Forget about announcer-quality recording. It's the words that count. If there isn't a veteran in the family, what an opportunity still to pass down some wisdom.

You will have helped save the past for the future.

LaQuan Phillips had June 9 circled on his calendar for

As the days and weeks leading up to the big day passed, he dreamed of walking across the stage at his graduation to pick up his diploma.

And the key for the Green Valley High senior was walking, because for a long time, he

In a terrifying moment on the football field, Phillips was temporarily paralyzed in September when he bruised his spine while making a tackle.

As he worked through the sometimes agonizing rehabilitation, the vision of walking with his classmates on graduation day helped keep him go-

On June 9, Phillips, with the help of a cane, gingerly climbed the stage stairs at the Thomas & Mack Center and received his diploma.

A crowd of 8,000 people gave him a standing ovation as he passed his cane to escort and teammate Skyler Holloway and walked the last few feet by himself.

"I said I was going to walk. I'm a man of my word," said Phillips, whose name was called first. "I never stayed fo-

evening, but in a wheelchair and with limited movement in his arms and legs. He eventually ditched the wheelchair in late December, walking with the help of a walker, and continued to attend twice-weekly to therapy sessions at Health-South Rehabilitation Center in Henderson.

The reward for the hard work came at graduation.

With Holloway's help, Phillips, a four-year member of the school choir, slowly walked from his spot on the stage and down a small flight of stairs to sing at the ceremony.

"I remember being at his bedside after he got hurt and how upbeat he was about walking again," Holloway said. "He has a really strong faith."

Phillips said he is 75 percent recovered and promised


ular season, 18 teams will play on live television. Palo Verde, Bishop Gorman, Centennial and Las Vegas High will each appear twice.

Jeff Malm's professional baseball dreams are now one step closer to becoming

The defending American League champion Tampa Bay Rays selected the Bishop Gorman pitcher/first baseman Wednesday in the fifth round (No. 169) of the 2009 MLB Entry Draft.

"I'm really excited," Malm said. "They are a great organization with a great farm system. They are really good at developing players, too. I'm excited to have this opportunity."

The 6-foot-2, 225-pound Malm helped lead the Gaels to its fourth consecutive 4A state championship this season, batting .564 with 17 home runs and 69 RBIs this season. On the mound, he was 11-1 with a 1.50 ERA and 87 strikeouts.

Malm has already signed a college scholarship with USC, but he can opt out the commitment if he signs a professional contract with Tampa Bay. The deadline for that decision is Aug. 15.

"The uncertainty of not knowing where you are going makes you feel real un-comfortable," Malm said. "Now we can move forward and start negotiating. We will try to work something out and if not, I have a great option at USC still."

Malm, who tied the alltime national high school career hit list with 277, did have hopes of hearing his name called in the first three rounds of the draft Tuesday.

Despite falling into the second day, Malm remains positive about his future in the majors.

"You never know with these kinds of things and a lot of different emotions go through you," Malm said. "I never got too down on myself. Today I was fortunate enough to get picked pretty early and I'm happy with this opportunity."

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At the Dyspeptics Club, South's high opinion of his own declarer-play skills is matched only by North's low opinion. In today's deal North was a little concerned that he might have missed a slam. So he was less

than pleased when his partner went down in game.

Against four spades West led the heart king, and without giving the matter much thought, South called for the ace from dummy. Declarer looked aggrieved when East ruffed, and even more so when the club jack was returned. The queen lost to the king, West cashed a heart, and eventually South lost a diamond to go one

Four hearts was a big bid for West to make, vulnerable, and South should have guarded against the bid being based on an eight-card suit. Declarer can afford to play low on the heart lead, and low again on the heart continuation. Should a third heart be played, East ruffs the ace, but South overruffs, pulls trumps, then runs the diamond 10. Although this loses to East's queen, there is now a diamond available on which to discard the club loser, and declarer's losses are held to two hearts and one diamond.

Nor does it help the defense if East trumps his partner's second heart lead and returns a club. South rises with the ace, then draws trumps, again losing just three tricks since a loser can be pitched on the heart ace.

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

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



TAX CREDIT CAN BE USED AT CLOSING

According to an FHA document released on May 29th, first-time buyers using FHA financing will be able to use their \$8,000 federal housing tax credit at the closing table, rather than waiting for a tax refund.

First Time Buyers Can Apply to Use Tax Credit

The program will allow all first-time buyers using FHA mortgages to apply their tax credit at closing, not just FHA borrowers working with a state housing finance agency. Many such agencies have already established programs that allow borrowers to do just that.

How It Works

- Buyers cannot use the tax credit as part of the initial 3.5% down payment required for an FHA mortgage.
- Lenders, agencies, and others will be allowed to purchase the credit from buyers, who can then use the proceeds for closing costs or to increase their down payment beyond the 3.5%.
- Lenders and agencies will then be able to convert the tax credit into a second lien on the property. If a borrower fails to repay the tax-credit advance by the agreed-upon date (i.e. sending a check after their federal tax refund arrives), then the loan will convert to a second mortgage.
- Lenders and agencies can either require monthly payments on this loan or simply hold it as a "soft" second, receiving the proceeds when the home is: next sold.

Other Guidelines

Buyers cannot combine the tax credit advance and an FHA mortgage to get "cash back" on their loan. They also cannot borrow more for the tax-credit-funded second mortgage than the total required for their down payment, closing costs and prepaid expenses.

Parents and students are finding purchasing a condo to be one-third less than their monthly on-campus housing costs.

The cost for room and board at The University of Nevada-Las Vegas is \$10,730 for one year, or \$894 per month (based on 12 monthly payments). Purchasing a condo can range from \$260 to \$550 monthly, which includes principal, insurance, taxes and Home Dwners Association fees.

Currently, there are 761 Condos listed for under \$75,000 in the Las Vegas Valley, which includes 28 for under \$25,000.

Some parents are choosing to purchase condos for their students, due to the affordability of condos in Las Vegas and the surrounding areas near the LMCV campus. After the 4 years of schooling, the student would be able to recover some of their investment, even at a 2% appreciation.

Parents and students are reviewing tax benefits to owning a condo, and in some cases there is a benefit.
