- Identify, form, and guide a team that is representative of the library and the community it serves.

SURVEY THE COMMUNITY

- Design a community assessment strategy incorporating reliable community-based instruments to assess the needs of the target population, tabulate, and present the results.
- Use the results to identify key partners and programs of interest to this audience.

IDENTIFY AND FORM PARTNERSHIPS

• Identify and target the types of partners and collaborators that will support successful programs that will reach this audience.

ENGAGE VOLUNTEERS


- Create diverse and meaningful skilled volunteer positions that will attract a broad range of community volunteers, especially baby boomers
- Engage this talent to extend the library's capacity in the community and to benefit from these new library advocates and supporters.

EVALUATE THE RESULTS OF PROGRAMS

- Develop measurable objectives and outcomes to evaluate a library program.
- Create valid instruments to evaluate library programs.
- Tabulate and interpret the data collected through program evaluation.


- Develop a reliable method for evaluating adult programs.

- Continue to seek and engage community partners and highly skilled volunteers.


