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FOLLMER AND LOWMAN NAMED TO NEVADA STATE COUNCIL ON THE ARTS

Helene Follmer and Zel Lowman, arts leaders from Las Vegas, have been named by Governor List to the Nevada State Council on the Arts for 1981-82.

Helene Follmer is currently second vice president of the Allied Arts Council, and has been an active supporter of the arts community in Southern Nevada for the last twenty years, as well as a leader in other volunteer organizations including the Clark County and the Nevada State Medical Auxiliaries, Junior League, Voluntary Action, Frontier Girl Scout Council, and the Clark County Chapter of the American Cancer Society.

Earlier this year, Follmer was awarded the Governor's Arts Award by the Nevada State Council. She is a member of the Executive Board of Young Audiences, member of the board of the Southern Nevada Music

School, and a member of the executive committee for the newly formed Nevada Museum of Fine Arts Board.

Zel Lowman, realtor, tenor, and freelance consultant, is president of the Symphonic and Chamber Music Society of Las Vegas and a trustee of the Southern Nevada Summer Music School.

Lowman was organizing president of the Nevada Alliance for the Arts and has served as president of the Allied Arts Council, on the board of directors of the Southern Nevada Museum, chairman of the scholarship committee of the Artists and Craftsman's Guild and as a member of the Southern Nevada scholarship committe for the University of Southern California Idyllwild School of Music and the Arts. He is a graduate of Western State College of Colorado, where he majored in English, was president of Mixed Chorus, sang in choirs, quartets, and light opera productions, and acted in dramatic productions.

Lowman has extensive experience in communications, organization, and administration and has used these talents in support of many community agencies in Southern Nevada. He has a distinguished record of community development in the state.

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Las Vegas Theater Better Than Ever by Pat Pearson

In the last theater season in Las Vegas, pressures mainly economic forced the closure of three local theater groups; Mariah Productions, Horizon Unlimited, and TASI. Meadows Playhouse was pushed right to the edge of extinction. The average cost for a small and simple production runs around \$2,000, and this money, if not subsidized from other areas, generally comes directly out of the pocket of someone who can only dream of breaking even.

Despite this constant pressure, the accompanying drama season schedule (pages 8 and 9) shows that theater in Southern Nevada is more than healthy. The number and variety of productions to be seen in the coming season is astonishing. And the calendar is not totally comprehensive. Some scheduling is not yet complete, and numbers of small productions can be expected, as usual, to suddenly appear in the middle of the season as out of nowhere, which demonstrates that one of theater's most severe problems locally lies in getting the word out.

Meadows Playhouse, whose survival for at least another-season is now apparently assured, opens its season with the musical "Guys and Dolls," and has managed to obtain the services of the well known actor Bobby Sargent, who will play Nathan Detroit. The rest of the Meadows season ranges from classics like "My Fair Lady" and "Who's Afraid of Virginia Woolf" to the unfamiliar.

Rainbow Company Children's Theatre opens with "The Sound of Music" and will end with "To Kill a Mockingbird," for another professional season of handsome productions that will challenge children rather than condescend to them.

Las Vegas Little Theatre opens with "You're a Good Man, Charlie Brown" and ends with "Finian's Rainbow," with a season of generally quite serious drama sandwiched between. The season for LVLT has actually already begun, however, with a very successful run of "Cat on a Hot Tin Roof."

Las Vegas Community Theatre opens with the musical "Showboat" and will concentrate on musicals and comedies. The final show of the season will be "Hello, Dolly."

Judy Bayley Theatre at UNLV begins by playing host to the touring Acting Company, who will present four plays, starting with "Waiting for Godot." The season runs through plays by Garcia Lorca and Sam Shepard to the closer, "Jesus Christ Superstar."

Clark County Community College has not yet prepared its entire schedule, but will begin with the intriguing title, "A Coupla White Chicks Sitting Around Talking." A production of "Bleacher Bums" has been rumored as a season closer, with no date set as yet.

Theatre Exposed, specializing in recent American works, recently ended a bill of two David Mamet plays, both most interesting and worth seeing for audiences interested in the direction of modern drama. "Sexual Perversity in Chicago was an especially entertaining comment on contemporary life. Theatre Exposed will run its coming season at Reed Whipple. The only production scheduled so far opens on Halloween with readings in horror, probably from the works of Stephen King.

Allied Arts Council members are granted ticket discounts by most local theater groups.

Bobby will be playing Nathan Detroit, the fun-loving gambler who runs a floating crap game and who strings along a sentimental chorus girl for 14 years. Bobby Sargent came to Las Vegas via Broadway and Hollywood where he wore three hats as an actor, stand-up comedian and writer. As an actor he appeared in varied roles such as the Persian Peddler in "Oklahoma," as George in "Of Mice and Men," Nick Potter in "Holiday," Kalenkov in "You Can't Take It With You,"and Alfred P. Doolittle in "My Fair Lady."

As a comedian he has worked every major theater, cafe and T. V. variety show, and almost every major hotel on the Las Vegas strip. As a writer he did special material on the "Jack Paar Show," "The Colgate Comedy Hour," "Jackie Gleason Show," "Ed Sullivan Show," "Merv Griffin Show," as well as many others. Bobby just finished a very successful run at the Union Plaza in "The Odd Couple."

The best movie I saw last year was the French Prize winner "A Simple Story." A plus for the series is the fun of watching the chic audience which always includes many European - Las Vegans and listening to the glamorous polyglot of international accents. KNPR will be airing a series of radio dramas in October at 6:30 in the evenings. They will include "Lord of the Rings," "Star Wars," "Sherlock Holmes," and "A Hitch Hiker's Guide to the Galaxy."

Nevada Dance Theater, our renowned ballet company, is offering us their 10th season, and Carol Rae, the talented dance professor at UNLV, reports this year's students are even more alluring and versatile than last year's. The Arts Council Dance Division will be jointly coordinated by Joanne Lentino and Cathy Gilbreath who did a masterly job organizing the dance performance at the Allied Arts Festival. And there are the colorful, spirited ethnic dancers: The Folklorico Mexicanos, the Teatro Espanol de Nevada, the Leinani Dancers, the J.B.Two - Steppers, the Ethnic Express, and the International Folk Dance Ansamble of Nevada. Bring the kids. Anyone who hasn't discovered that Las Vegas Jazz is primo and that jazz fans are friendly, relaxed, welcoming people is missing one of the joys of life in the fast lane. From Big Band to Blues to Caribbean percussion, the Jazz Society offers the creme de la creme.

Any violent death is regrettable, but the world needs music to stay human and nothing is farther from the random ugly destruction of life than the sensibility of the musician. In addition to classrooms and rehearsal space, there will be a gallery: One more place for visual artists to display their work. This limited area will not meet the requirements for a world class exhibit space. That dream is in the heads of the Nevada Museum of Fine Arts organizing committee. The MGM Jubilee Benefit in July provided the kickoff for this Arts Council project. Soon the building campaign will be the hottest item on the drawing boards in some of the most glamorous circles in town. A special thanks to the hundreds of musicians, dancers, artists, performers, technicians, committee members, and volunteers who worked hard to make the August 15th Allied Arts Festival a success. It was an enormous undertaking that required many hours and good will from a large network of arts supporters. Planning is already underway for next year's festival. Yes, there will be a student and senior admission. Yes, there will be some events during the day for children. We welcome constructive suggestions, especially in writing, and hope as the year's plans take shape that members will ioin us in the effort.

Important Note: The UNLV Master Series, produced by Charles Vanda, is sold out. However, some seats are always available for each performance. Call 739-3840 for reservations. This year's program is proof of Mr. Vanda's determination to singlehandedly refute the dumb cliche' that No One Good Comes To Las Vegas. We could have asked for no finer artist than Zubin Mehta to start the new season (although some of us would have preferred Bach to Brahms and Satie to Ravel...). Season ticket holders should let the box office know if their seats will be used. There are many music lovers who will be glad to buy those seats at the door.

NEVADA DANCE THEATRE & THE MASTER SERIES: CLASSIC BEAUTIES

Eight celebrated artists from around the world will lend their talents to the 1981-82 Master Series Season. UNLV's Artemus W. Ham Concert Hall will serve as the site of the concerts, which begin at 8:00 pm.

Zubin Mehta and the New York Philharmonic opened the Master Series August 27, with violinist Glenn Dicterow.

Violinist Eugene Fodor will appear next, for a September 23 recital. He has captured the public imagination as have few other native-born performers. In 1974, the Colorado native catapulted into international prominence when he became the first violinist from the Western world to win the top prize in Russia's prestigious Tchaikovsky Violin Competition. He has since performed hundreds of engagements as solo recitalist and with the major symphony orchestras of North America.

The Maracaibo Symphony from Venezuela will appear in Las Vegas on October 26 under the direction of Eduardo Rahn on its first North American tour. Maracaibo is the second largest city of Venezuela, but it is best known for having the number one orchestra in South America. The Maracaibo Symphony Orchestra is composed of Americans, Poles, Romanians, and Venezuelans and performs nine months of the year in its own regular concert series in addition to touring.

One of the most traveled orchestras in the nation, the Utah Symphony, will bring its music to Las Vegas on November 11. The Utah Symphony ranks third in the nation in the total number of performances given by a major orchestra, and it is the only professional orchestra serving a land area of more than 300,000 square miles. Varujan Kojian joined the symphony in 1980 for his first season as musical director and conductor.

The Orchestre National de France, one of France's leading ensembles, will bring its 105-piece orchestra to Las Vegas on December 15. During the Paris concert

season the orchestra regularly participates in France's major festivals, making many appearances each year in the Theatre de Champs-Elysees. Lorin Maazel, who worked mostly with the Cleveland Orchestra and the Vienna State Opera, began conducting the Orchestre National de France in 1977.

Starr Danias, principal ballerina for the Joffrey Ballet, will recreate the legendary artistry of Anna Pavlova

on January 19, 1982. "The Pavlova Celebration" will feature a full company of dancers, specially selected to adhere to the high artistic aspiration of the celebration. Gregory King, formerly of the National Ballet Company of Canada, the Joffrey Ballet and the Jose Greco Dance Company, will partner Danias in several of the Pavlova divertissements, along with major male guest stars.

Andre Previn and the Pittsburg Symphony will come to Las Vegas on February 26, 1982. Previn assumed the post of Pittsburg Symphony Music Director in 1976, and his impact was felt immediately with the expansion of the Pittsburg subscription concert schedule reinstatement of the orchestra into the recording business and national exposure via the Public Broadcasting System television series, "Previn and the Pittsburg." In addition to Previn's position with the symphony, he is Music Director for the Pittsburg Symphony Chamber Orchestra.

The grand finale to the season will come on March 22, 1982, when Richard Sheldon and his 11-year-old Opera A La Carte present "The Mikado," Gilbert and Sullivan's famous operetta. The company will perform "The Mikado" in its full length version. Founded in the spring of 1970 by Sheldon, a noted Gilbert and Sullivan specialist from England, Opera A La Carte offers the foremost Gilbert and Sullivan Repertory Company in the country.

Charles Vanda, Master Series director, reports that the 1981-81 season is sold out on a subscription basis, but that there are still tickets available for individual concerts.

"The success of the Master Series proves that if you deliver a first class production to the people of Las Vegas, they will support it," he said. "This series is the most successful classical series in the U.S. and is entirely self-supporting. HIGH LIGHTS:

VISUAL ARTS IN THE ALLIED ARTS FESTIVAL

Allied Arts Festival at the Meadows Mall on August 15th, offered a wide variety of style and media in the visual arts: Watercolor and oil paintings of realistic scenes as well as abstract pastels, acrylics and collage paintings; traditional portraits and landscape photographs and polaroid collages; sculpture in wood and metal, and ceramic and porcelain vases and plates.

An innovative art experience for the Las Vegas audience were the progressive art displays of Paul Tzanotopoulos, Marlene Franks and Phillip Di Marino.

Paul's multi-media presentation "Dirty Red And Harry" was designed for viewer participation. Several projectors, fitted with color filter, projected a life- size store front scene on a wall while a motion picture of feeding birds was projected

on the floor with accompanying sound. Visitors walking in front of the projectors cast their shadows on the wall and thus became part of the scene.

Marlene Franks, coordinator of the Las Vegas Video Artists Workshop, had individual artists participate in a video presentation. Some artists dealt with the video camera as if it were a drawing tool to create new visual images, while others used the camera to explore universal feelings. such as pain in Marlene Franks " A Few Moments In Time," disillusionment in Cindy McCoy's "Critique," and the joy of remembering good times in Phyllis Fischer's "Going Calling."

Phillip Di Marino juxtaposed his expressionistic drawing of a mutilated child with a journalistic documentary of the massacre in El Salvador on


MGM GRAND




KUNV STORY

KUNV 91.5 FM is looking for people who want to work at the radio station. Anyone who would like to be the next Dan Rather, Frank Reynolds, Tom Snyder, Barbara Walters, or Howard Cosell, is invited to call the station at 739-3877. The invitation is particularly directed at people who want to get into broadcasting, but don't have any actual experience.

KUNV officially signed on the air April 23, 1981, and broadcasts to the Las Vegas area with 14,700 watts of stereo power. About 75 per cent of the station budget is derived from UNLV student fees; the remainder comes from private donations. The station is staffed primarily by students, and currently broadcasts from 6 am. to 2 am. 7 days a week.

Music programs are broadcast from studios located in the Dunes Hotel and Country Club; news, sports, and public affairs air from studios in the Moyer Student Union at UNLV. Programming includes classical music, jazz, rock and roll, and on weekends a contemporary rhythm and blues show and a Spanish show, "Sabado Especial." The station also produces a number of local news and public affairs programs, including "Senior Sounds," "KUNV Newsmagazine," and a comprehensive sports program. In the fall, KUNV will begin broadcasting play-by-play action of high school football and basketball games, as well as Lady Rebel basketball.


IN THE HEAT OF THE NIGHT & NEVADA NOSTALGIA

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
SAINT LOUIS SYMPHONY OFFERS RARE WORK

In 1968, when the City Savings Bank of Gelsenkirchen, West Germany, commissioned composer Bernd Alois Zimmermann to create a work in honor of its centenary, the officials never expected the vivid work they received. This intense, provocative composition, "Photoptosis: Prelude for Large Orchestra," together with a virtuoso performance by Czechoslovakian pianist classic 1830 composition "Symphonie fan-Rudolf Firkusny, highlight another exciting performance by the Saint Louis Symphony Orchestra during its 1980-1981 season. The concert, directed by Leonard Slatkin, will air on KNPR (89.5 FM) Friday, Sept. 25 at 7 p.m.

Zimmermann's work, which opens the program, is an aural interpretation of the visual affliction suffered by the composer which eventually led to his suicide in 1970. The disease is one in which the open eye perceives brilliant, stabbing flashes of light.

Following Zimmermann's remarkable composition, the SAINT LOUIS SYMPHONY ORCHESTRA presents a performance by soloist Rudolph Firkusny, acknowledged as one of the world's leading pianists. Firkusny performs Schumann's Concerto in A Minor for Piano and Orchestra, Opus 54. Describing the performance, critic Frank Peters of the St. Louis Post Dispatch wrote, "Schumann's gentle poetry sang from keyboard and orchestra with equal eloquence. One could hear far more of Schumann (in this) than in those conventional performances where a pianist, so to speak, is exhibited."

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
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
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
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The concert concludes with Hector Berlioz's tastique," Opus 14, the first major symphony created by a French composer. The work, which evokes the drugged dreams of a young artist, was dedicated to the young actress Harriet Smithson, whom he later married.

LENNON LITHOGRAPHS — SEPT. 23-24

"Bag One" is a suite of 14 lithographs created by John Lennon over a period of months in 1969. They depict the events at the time of his marriage to Yoko Ono. They include their wedding ceremony in the local magistrate's office on Gibraltar, the Amsterdam Bed-In for peace, and John and Yoko together on their Paris honeymoon. Eight of the pieces are clearly erotic in nature and sparked controversy at the first exhibition at the London Art Gallery in January of 1970. A complaint charging they were indecent resulted in their confiscation by Scotland Yard. In answer to the charges, those defending the disputed pieces introduced works by other artists, including Picasso, which contained similar subject matter. The case was later dismissed. Less conservative critics saw in the renderings a vitality and simplicity of line constructed as an obvious testimony of love and devotion to Yoko, his new partner in life.
