




SULLIVAN – The only Sullivans we have discovered who seem to fit into the general pattern used for selecting Victory Village street names are the Sullivan Sisters (Min and Lou) who entertained the Henderson populace during early days here and Mark Sullivan, second in command of the Helldorado Parades. Shown is BMI's first entry for Helldorado, A SHOTGUN WEDDING, which won an award in the Old-Timers Parade. We think Mark Sullivan might have had an encouraging hand in this entry as he later managed the Industrial Days parades here.

COVER PICTURE – The first street map of Henderson was the Bus Route Map shown on the cover which was distributed through a special edition of the Basic Bombardier on July 7, 1944. This map was accompanied by a bus schedule showing how an entire town was given adequate bus service with only one bus operating from 6:25 a.m. to 11:35 p.m. The bus service covered all shifts and areas of the big BMI Plant and all areas of the town. No fares were collected by the driver. A ticket good for 20 rides was sold for \$1 and these cards were punched by the driver. Ride tickets were available in all parts of the plant and town. The tickets carried the name "Pony Express Stages."

Sodium Chlorate - widely used as a weed killer and defoliant and in the bleaching of paper. Potassium Chlorate is the oxidizer in matches. Kerr-McGee is the nation's largest producer of Potassium and Ammonium Perchlorates used chiefly as the oxidizer in solid propellant rocket fuels.

FLINTKOTE COMPANY - U. S. Lime Products Division - The largest producer of lime products in the eleven western states; products include high calcium limestone, dolomitic limestone, lime flux, high calcium quicklime, hydrated lime and pressure hydrated dolomitic lime distributed under the trade name "Miracle Lime."

STAUFFER CHEMICAL COMPANY - One of the world's largest producer of chlorine, sodium hydroxide and hyrdogen. Chlorine is used for the manufacture of insecticide intermediates, chlorinated hydrocarbons and for the treatment of drinking water. Sodium hydroxide is used in the manufacture of soaps and detergents. Thithion used in the production of insecticide.

MONTROSE CHEMICAL CORPORATION OF CALIFORNIA - Montrose Chemical Co. is an affiliate of Stauffer Chemical Co., and is the world's largest producer of DDT. This plant produces the raw materials, chloral and monochlorbenzene and paradichlorobenzene required in the production of DDT.



Operations at the Henderson Plant include the production of Sponge titanium and titanium ingots. Titanium is a light, strong, heat and corrosion resistant metal of wide application in aircraft and missile industries.

PACIFIC ENGINEERING & PRODUCTION COM-PANY OF NEVADA - One of the Nation's two producers of ammonium perchlorate, the oxidizer for all the high performance solid fuel rockets and missiles. The company has also adapted its electrolitic techniques and equipment to provide systems for the treatment of sewage plant effluents and other polluted waters.

STATE STOVE COMPANY - This company manufactures high quality gas and electric hot water heaters for home and industrial use.

JONES CHEMICAL COMPANY – This company bottles and distributes chlorine for the treatment of drinking water and the purification of swimming pool water and to other users of raw chlorine.

To these industries, Henderson Industrial Days 1972, "An Echo For Tomorrow" is dedicated.



HISTORY OF HENDERSON How Our City Streets Were Named

When McNeil Construction Company came to Henderson to build the Basic Magnesium Plant and Townsite, the McNeils appear to have chosen the easiest and least controversial method of naming the Townsite streets.

The main street was named Water Street and it was the route of the huge water mainfrom the water treatment plant to the BMP plant site.

The Rain Gods apparently thought this was a directional signal as the rain water for many years followed the route of the big pipeline, washing out vast areas of Water Street with every summer down-pour until a flood control project was completed with every summer.

Water Street was accompanied by Ocean, Pacific and Atlantic Avenues; and since it was a war plant, Army, Navy, Marine and Panama streets and a road called Victory, the ultimate reason for the entire project.

The streets were laid out in a camouflage design of loops and curves in various shapes and sizes and the flat-topped houses were painted in tri-colored horizontal stripes to make them difficult to see from the air.

Streets west of Water Street were named for metals and those east of Water were named for states. Basic Road formed the western boundary of the housing project and BMP Road separated it from the plant area.

More thought has undoubtedly been given to the naming of BMP Road than any other street in the city. It has been extended on both ends and now connects with the L.A. Freeway forming a shortcut to Lake Mead. It was first changed to Frontier Blvd. when Frontier was Henderson's telephone prefix. The extension from the city limits to Interstate 15 was called "the Sloan Cutoff" and the connecting road through the Lake Mead Recreation Area to Vegas Wash was called "Lake Mead Drive," also Nevada State Highway 41.

After our telephones lost their prefix the name Lake Mead Drive was adopted for the entire length of our longest street since most of the former Sloan Cutoff is now in the city limits.


VICTORY VILLAGE

The streets in Victory Village were named for plant personnel, local and state dignitaries.

Case Parkway, the main thoroughfare, was named for F.O. Case, BMP General Manager and Mann Avenue honored the name of Howard C. Mann, Project Manager.

McCarran Avenue was named for U.S. Senator Pat McCarran who visited the plant a number of times and played a large part in having tons of silver used for bus bar in the plant's electrical works to release needed copper for the war effort.

Governor E. P. Carville was also honored by having Carville Circle named for him and Scrugham Continued on Page 8







Drive was named for U. S. Senator James G. Scrugham, who served in both Congress and the U.S. Senate during construction of the plant. He had also previously served as Governor of Nevada. We found no record of his having visited at Basic Magnesium.

Sullivan Dr. may well have honored Mark Sullivan who took an active part in directing the Helldorado Parades and later directed Henderson Industrial Days Parades. Basic Magnesium workers had entries in the Helldorado parades before they even had houses to live in and Sullivan was the sort of a fellow who would have encouraged them to do this.

Cahlan Avenue was named to perpetuate the names of John and A. L. Cahlan, former owners of the Las Vegas Review Journal. During construction days of Henderson, L. G. McNeil and A.L. Cahlan became fast friends and John and Larry McNeil were also quite friendly. The Cahlans were also good friends of Howard Eells and John recalls that it was A. L. Cahlan, in his position on the Colorado River Commission, who got Eells to increase the size of the water pipe which was to bring water from Lake Mead to the plant in order that the future needs of Las Vegas might be met.

The Cahlans also did many favors for the plant executives. When the Basic office building, which was not finished, burned to the ground, most of the McNeil mail was delivered to the Review-Journal office and the company was able to continue operating effectively.

After the days at Basic, the McNeils moved into Las Vegas where they developed a great deal of acreage and in the Sctoch Eighty, just off the West Charleston area, the also named a street Cahlan as Victory Village was built as only temporary housing for plant workers.

This leaves us with Clark and Post which we have not yet been able to identify. CARVER PARK

This area was segregated during construction days and the housing complex at Carver Park was built to house the Negro people who were brought here from the deep south to work on the nation's number one war job.

Streets in Carver Park were given names which had a real meaning for the people who lived there and it was the only area of the city which had its own school.

Carver Street, as well as Carver Park, honored the name of Dr. George Washington Carver (1860-1943) born of slave parents near Diamond Grove, Mo. He left the farm where he was born when he was about 10 years old and worked his way through high school in Minneapolis, Kansas.

He graduated from Iowa State College of Agriculture and Mechanical Arts in 1894 and joined the college faculty, continuing his studies and specializing in bacteriological laboratory work in systematic botony.

In 1896 he became director of the Department of Agricultural Research at Tuskagee Normal and Industrial Institute (now Tuskegee Institute) where he began an exhaustive series of experiments with peanuts. He developed from the various parts of this







Wayland Seminary, Washington D. C. Appointed instructor in Hampton Institute, he trained 75 Indians under the American soldier and educator General Samuel Chapman Armstrong, and developed a night school.

In 1881 he was appointed organizer and principal of a Negro school in Tuskegee, Ala., which became known as Tuskegee Institute. In advancing the interests of this institution, Booker T. Washington became known as a public speaker and was recognized as the foremost exponent of the education and advancement of the Negro people. His birthplace is a national memorial.

Hampton and Tuskegee streets were named in

honor of the Hampton and Tuskegee Instutitions.

Lincoln Street is named for Abraham Lincoln, (1809-65) sixteenth President of the United States, undoubtedly the finest white friend the American Negro people ever had and we might add that his birthplace is also a national memorial.

MANGANESE PARK

Manganese Park was built especially for the workers at Manganese Inc. Whoever was assigned the task of naming the six streets must have been a lover of the desert and its flora as he selected the names of desert cacti.



The names are mostly Spanish and almost everyone is guilty of mispronouncing them. Now that we have a larger Spanish population here, it is hoped they will teach the natives how to say such words as Cholla and Ocotillo.



Cacti are indigenous to the Americans. They are found in teeming jungles, deserts and wind-swept plateaus from northern Canada through to the Southern tip of South America. Their spines, a definite characteristic.

SAGUARO Their spines, a definite characteristic, are for the purpose of shading the plant from the hot sun. They come in all sizes from that of a thimble to the giant Saguaro which often grows to a height of 40 feet. It is the state flower of Arizona.



The Joshua-tree is the oldest living plant of our desert. It is also found in western Arizona. It blooms in February with a tight, compact cluster of white flowers followed by fleshy fruits which are relished by cattle

and deer.



The Ocotillo is a member of the Candlewood family and not really a cactus. It is a thorny, desert semisucculent shrub and is able to conserve moisture by shedding its leaves when the ground is dry and refoliating after






are several species known as Adam's needle. Spanish Bayonet, Yucca, Bear Grass, etc.




and the fruit of the prickly-pears is used in making jellies, jams and candy. As for the street named Tuna -- may we suggest you confer with Webster about this.


