Yellowjackets Edge Wolves

With Blythe boasting 15 returning lettermen, they barely edged out the Basic Wolves by a 2-0 score. Basic went into the game the underdog after Blythe's victory over a strong Yuma team from Arizona by a score of 15-0.

This was Basic's first game of the year. One of the main factors contributing to Basic's loss was the number of offside penalties. The Wolves' defense held the Yellowjackets in check throughout the game.

The first quarter went as follows: Basic won the toss and elected to receive. The ball was taken on the 20-yard line by Sid Packard, who took it up to the 38-yard line. Theo Williams carried the ball off left tackle for five yards on the first play. The Wolves made a first down on the next play. The Wolves failed to make another first down and kicked to Blythe. On a bad pass from center, Mel Bailey failed to get the kick away and was thrown for a loss. Blythe then took over on the Basic 40-yard line from where they marched down to about the 25-yard stripe, but failed to score. Basic then took over again, and with the hard running of co-captain Theo Williams and pass snatching ability of "Moose" Hansen and Don Doughty, Basic marched down to Blythe's 15 when the first quarter ended.

At the start of the second quarter Basic went down to the 7-yard line only to be penalized. The Wolves lost the ball on downs, recovering it again on a fumble. Basic threatened to score, only to be penalized again. The

rest of the second quarter found both teams fighting it out around midfield. The Wolves had possession of the ball the remainder of the second period. By half time, the Basic Wolves had made 137 yards from scrimmage to Blythe's 21. On punts Basic averaged 60 yards, and Blythe 43. The Wolves made five first downs to the Yellowjackets' one. The whole first half Basic had outplayed the Blythe team. But penalties held the Wolves from scoring. Basic threatened to score four times to Blythe's once in the first half.

At the start of the second half co-captain Chuck Hansen kicked off to the Yellowjackets. Both teams fought evenly until Blythe marched down to the Basic 5-yard line where they had first down and goal to go. But the strong Basic line held fast and the Wolves took over on their own 3-yard stripe. The Wolves failed to get a first down on three tries. Mel Bailey attempted to kick from his own end zone, but he failed; as he was badly rushed by the right end of Blythe, who blocked the kick, the ball rolling to the end zone where Don Doughty, end, picked it up, but was tackled immediately. It was then declared a safety and the score was Blythe 2, Basic 0 as the third quarter ended.

The fourth quarter found Blythe threatening to score once but most of the time the Wolves had possession of the ball. Losing by two points, Basic tightened up and tried to score, marching from their own 20-yard line to the Blythe 13 when the final gun went off. All through the game the Basic Wolves had outplayed a much.

Wolves Meet Riffs

On Saturday afternoon the Basic Wolves will meet a powerful Barstow team. This is Basic's fourth game of the year, but the second Tri-State game. As of now, the Wolves are in third place in the Tri-State loop, having lost their first game to Blythe, California. In order to stay in the top of the league's standings, Basic will have to win this game. Not much is known of the Barstow squad, but every year they turn out a big, powerful team. Basic so far has won one game and lost one.
